

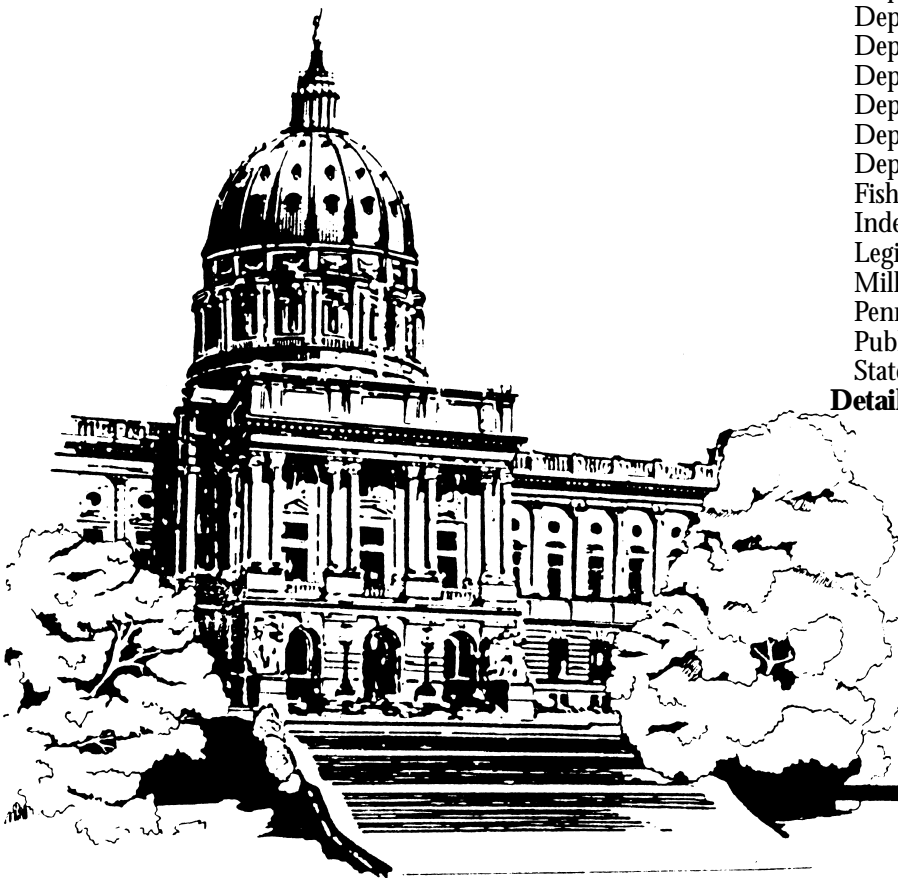

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

PART I. GENERAL [231 PA. CODE CHS. 200 AND 2250]

Promulgation and Amendment of Notes to Rules Governing Notice of Orders and Joinder of Additional Defendants; Proposed Recommendation No. 208

The Civil Procedural Rules Committee proposes that the note to Rule of Civil Procedure 236(d) governing notice by the prothonotary of the entry of an order or judgment be amended and that notes to Rules 2252(d) and 2255(b) governing joinder of additional defendants be promulgated, as set forth herein. The proposed recommendation is being submitted to the bench and bar for comments and suggestions prior to its submission to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

The Explanatory Comment which appears in connection with the proposed recommendation has been inserted by the Committee for the convenience of the bench and bar. It will not constitute part of the rules of civil procedure or be officially adopted or promulgated by the Court.

Annex A TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 200. BUSINESS OF COURTS

Rule 236. Notice by Prothonotary of Entry of Order or Judgment.

* * * * *

(d) The prothonotary may give the notice required by subdivision (a) or notice of other matters by facsimile transmission or other electronic means if the party to whom the notice is to be given or the party's attorney has filed a written request for such method of notification or has included a facsimile or other electronic address on a prior legal paper filed in the action.

Official Note: Except as provided by subdivision (a)(1) relating to the entry of a judgment by confession, Rule 236 does not prescribe a particular method of giving notice. **Methods of notice properly used by the prothonotary include, but are not limited to, service via United States mail and courthouse mail.** Subdivision (d) governs facsimile transmission and other electronic means if the prothonotary chooses to use such a method.

* * * * *

CHAPTER 2250. JOINDER OF ADDITIONAL DEFENDANTS

Rule 2252. Right to Join Additional Defendants.

* * * * *

(d) If the person sought to be joined is a party, the joining party shall, without moving for severance or the filing of a praecipe for a writ or a complaint, assert in the answer as new matter that such party is alone liable to the plaintiff or liable over to the joining party or jointly or severally liable to the plaintiff or liable to the joining party directly setting forth the ground therefor. The case shall proceed thereafter as if such party had been joined by a writ or a complaint.

Official Note: In providing for the joinder as an additional defendant of a person already a party to the action, Rule 2252(d) is a device for asserting a cross-claim between defendants and additional defendants.

* * * * *

Rule 2255. Procedure.

* * * * *

(b) No pleadings shall be filed between the additional defendant and any party other than the one joining the additional defendant except that the additional defendant may file a counterclaim against the plaintiff.

Official Note: In an action in which there is more than one additional defendant, Rule 2255(b) does not bar proceedings pursuant to Rule 2252(d) either between the additional defendants inter se or between the additional defendants and any other party to the action.

* * * * *

Explanatory Comment

I. Amendment to the note to Rule 236(d)

Rule 236 governs the notice to be given by the prothonotary of the entry of an order or judgment. The proposed amendment to the first paragraph of the note to subdivision (d) of the rule arises from a suggestion that Rule 236 specifically provide for notice by courthouse mail, i.e., placing a copy of the order in the attorney's courthouse mailbox.

Except with respect to subdivision (a)(1) which provides for notice by "ordinary mail" of the entry of a judgment by confession, the rule "does not prescribe a particular method of giving notice." Subdivision (d) relating to notice by facsimile transmission is applicable only if the prothonotary chooses that method of notice.

Since the rule does not prescribe a particular means of notice except as to judgments entered by confession, the rule already accommodates notice by courthouse mail. The proposed revision to the first paragraph of the note to subdivision (d) expressly states the existing availability of courthouse mail as a method of giving notice. The revision effects no change in practice or procedure.

II. Amendments to Rule 2252(d) and 2255(b)

Attorneys frequently raise the issue of the relationship of Rules 2252(d) and 2255(b) governing the joinder of additional defendants. Rule 2252(d) provides that a person already a party to an action may be joined as an additional defendant by asserting the basis for joinder in the answer to the complaint as new matter. Rule 2255(b) limits the filing of pleadings between the additional defendant and parties other than the party joining the additional defendant with the exception that a counterclaim may be filed by the additional defendant against the plaintiff.

The new notes proposed to be added to Rules 2252(d) and 2255(b) are intended to make clear that Rule 2255(b) does not bar the assertion of a cross-claim between parties to an action. Specifically, a defendant or an additional defendant may assert a claim against another party to the action through the joinder rules. See the commentary to the 1969 amendments to Rule 2252 in XLI Pennsylvania Bar Association Quarterly 33 (October 1969)) and Goodrich-Amram (1st ed. Supplement 1977) ("Further, the Committee decided to enlarge the scope of the additional defendant practice to permit the equivalent of the cross-claim between two defendants under the federal rules."). See also *Findlay Twp. v. Ryan Homes, Inc.*, 279 Pa. Superior Ct. 294, 420 A.2d 1241 (1980) ("Therefore the object of the rule was to limit pleadings generally and allow responsive pleadings only between

those parties properly joined and having adverse interests." "We find no conflict between Rules 2252(d) and 2255(b) . . .")

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1910. ACTIONS FOR SUPPORT

Rule 1910.11. Office Conference. Subsequent Proceedings. Order.

* * * * *

(c) At the conference, the parties shall furnish to the officer true copies of their most recent federal income tax returns, their pay stubs for the preceding six months, verification of child care expenses and proof of medical coverage which they may have or have available to them. In addition, they shall provide copies of their [**income and expense statements**] **Income and Expense Statements** in the [**form**] **forms** required by Rule 1910.27(c), completed as set forth below.

(1) For cases which can be determined according to the guideline formula, the [**income and the expense statement need show only income and extraordinary**] **Income Statement must be completed and the Expense Statement at Rule 1910.27(c)(2)(A) should be completed if a party is claiming unusual needs and unusual fixed expenses.**

(2) For cases which are decided according to *Melzer v. Witsberger*, **505 Pa. 462**, 480 A.2d 991 (1984), the [**entire income and expense statement**] **Income Statement and the Expense Statement at Rule 1910.27(c)(2)(B) must be completed.**

* * * * *

Explanatory Comment—1994

* * * * *

Because the guidelines are income driven, the trier of fact has little need for the expense information required in the [**income and expense statement**] **Income and Expense Statement**. Therefore in guideline cases, the rule no longer requires that expense information be provided. If a party feels that there are expenses so extraordinary that they merit consideration by the trier of fact, that party is free to provide the information. In cases decided according to *Melzer v. Witsberger*, **505 Pa. 462, 480 A.2d 991 (1984)**, living expenses are properly considered, and therefore must be presented on the [**income and expense statement**] **Income and Expense Statement**.

Explanatory Comment—2006

The amendments reflect the separated Income Statement and Expense Statements in Rule 1910.27(c).

Rule 1910.27. Form of Complaint. Order. Income and Expense Statement. Health Insurance Coverage Information Form. Form of Support Order. Form Petition for Modification.

(b) The order to be attached at the front of the complaint set forth in subdivision (a) shall be in substantially the following form:

(2) **Expense Statements.** An Expense Statement is not required in cases which can be determined pursuant to the guidelines unless a party avers unusual needs and expenses that may warrant a deviation from the guideline amount of support pursuant to Rule 1910.16-5 or an apportionment of expenses pursuant to Rule 1910.16-6. (See Rule 1910.11(c)(1)). Child support is calculated under the guidelines based upon the net incomes of the parties, with additional amounts ordered as necessary to provide for child care expenses, health insurance premiums, unreimbursed medical expenses, mortgage payments and other needs, contingent upon the obligor's ability to pay. The Expense Statement in subparagraph (A) below shall be utilized if a party is claiming that he or she has unusual needs and unusual fixed expenses that may warrant deviation or adjustment in a case determined under the guidelines. In cases which must be determined pursuant to *Melzer v. Witsberger*, 505 Pa. 462, 480 A.2d 991 (1984), because the parties' combined net monthly income exceeds \$20,000 per month, the parties must complete the Expense Statement in subparagraph (B) below.

(A) **Guidelines Expense Statement. Unusual Needs and Unusual Fixed Expenses.** At the conference, each party must provide receipts or other verification of needs and expenses claimed on this statement.

Explanatory Comment—2006

Rule 1910.27(c) is amended to separate income and expense information and to elicit the expense information relevant in cases that fall within the guidelines, as well as those that do not. In cases which can be determined under the guidelines, no expense information need be provided unless a party is claiming unusual needs and expenses that may warrant a deviation pursuant to Rule 1910.16-5 or an apportionment of expenses pursuant to Rule 1910.16-6. If a party is claiming such expenses, the form at subsection (c)(2)(A) should be submitted. A separate expense form for cases in which the parties combined monthly net income exceeds \$20,000 is set forth at subsection (c)(2)(B).

Rule 1910.11(c) was amended, effective in March 1995, to provide that only income and extraordinary expenses need be shown on the Income and Expense Statement in cases which can be determined pursuant to the guidelines. The Explanatory Comment—1994 explained the rationale for the amendment:

Because the guidelines are income driven, the trier of fact has little need for the expense information required in the Income and Expense Statement. Therefore, in guideline cases, the rule no longer requires that expense information be provided. If a party feels that there are expenses so extraordinary that they merit consideration by the trier of fact, that party is free to provide the information. In cases decided pursuant to *Melzer v. Witsberger*, 505 Pa. 462, 480 A.2d 991 (1984), living expenses are properly considered, and therefore must be presented on the Income and Expense Statement.

Nevertheless, because space for both income and expense information was provided on the same form Income and Expense Statement, parties often needlessly expended time and effort to provide expense information that was not relevant at the conference. The amendments are intended to clarify and simplify the submission of expense information.

CHAPTER 1920. ACTIONS OF DIVORCE OR FOR ANNULMENT OF MARRIAGE

Rule 1920.31. Joinder of Related Claims. Child and Spousal Support. Alimony. Alimony Pendente Lite. Counsel Fees. Expenses.

(a)(1) Within thirty days after the service of the pleading or petition containing a claim for child or spousal support, alimony, alimony pendente lite or counsel fees, costs and expenses, each party shall file a true copy of the most recent federal income tax return, pay stubs for the preceding six months [and], a completed [income and expense statement in the manner and] Income Statement in the form required at Rule 1910.27(c)(1) and a completed Expense Statement in the form required by [Rules 1910.11 and] Rule 1910.27 (c)(2)(B).

* * * * *

(3) When a claim for support or alimony pendente lite is filed as a count in a divorce rather than as a separate action, the award shall be retroactive to the date of the [written demand for hearing unless the order states otherwise] complaint, so long as the moving party delivers a copy of the complaint to the domestic relations section with a demand for hearing at the time that the divorce complaint containing a claim for spousal support or alimony pendente lite is filed. [If a demand for hearing appears conspicuously on the front of the divorce pleading, support or alimony pendente lite shall be awarded retroactive to the date of filing of that pleading and the matter shall be set promptly for hearing.

Official Note: At the time a hearing is demanded on the issue of support, a copy of the divorce pleading which contains that count must be delivered to the domestic relations section.]

* * * * *

[Explanatory Note—1983

Subdivision (a) as originally promulgated required each party to file a completed income and expense statement within thirty days after service of the pleading or petition containing a related claim for relief. That requirement remains unchanged. However, the rule is conformed to Support Rule 1910.11(c) by also requiring each party to file within the same thirty day period a copy of his or her most recent income tax return and the pay stubs for the preceding six months.

New subdivision (a)(2) incorporates by reference Discovery Rule 4019 governing sanctions. When there is a failure to file the documents required by subdivision (a)(1), the broad spectrum of sanctions which is available under Rule 4019(c) will permit the court to impose the sanction appropriate to the facts of the case.

Explanatory Comment—1991

The Divorce Code of 1980 has been modified by two recent Acts of Assembly. First, the Divorce Code was codified as part of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes by Act 1990-206. Second, the Divorce Code was substantially amended by Act 1988-13. Many of the rules of civil procedure covered by Recommendation 5 have been amended as a result of this legislation.

I. Codification. Old Rules 1920.1 through 1920.92 were promulgated in 1980 to implement the then recently enacted Divorce Code. The old rules contain many references to the Divorce Code which was enacted as part of the Unconsolidated Statutes, 23 P. S. § 101 et seq.

Act 206 of 1990, effective March 19, 1991, repealed the Divorce Code as enacted in 1980 and re-enacted it as Part IV of the Domestic Relations Code, 23 Pa.C.S. § 3101 et seq. Part IV of the Domestic Relations Code continues to be known as the Divorce Code. All statutory references in the new rules refer to the Divorce Code as it is now codified.

For more than ten years, the term “Section 201(c) or (d)” divorce has meant a “no-fault” divorce. Under the new codification, the grounds for a no-fault divorce will be found in Section 3301(c) and (d) of the Divorce Code, 23 Pa.S.C. § 3301(c) and (d). This is one example of the revisions to the divorce rules necessitated by the codification. These revisions merely correct obsolete references and effect no change in practice or procedure. The Committee is developing a proposal to review all of the domestic relations rules to include the new statutory references.

II. Spousal Support. Section 3104 (formerly Section 301) of the Divorce Code, which enumerates the various claims that may be joined in an action of divorce, was amended by Act 1988-13 to include “spousal support.” Old Rule 1920.31, governing the joinder of related claims, has been amended to include the reference to spousal support in conformity with the Divorce Code as amended.

III. Living Separate and Apart. Section 3301(d) (formerly Section 301(d)) of the Divorce Code, providing for a no-fault divorce where the marriage is irretrievably broken and the parties have lived separate and apart, was amended by Act 1988-13 to reduce the waiting period from three years to two years. Old Rule 1920.72(c), governing the form of the plaintiff’s affidavit, makes reference to this three year period. New Rule 1920.72(c) refers to the two year period of separation.

Old Rule 1920.42(a), governing the procedure in a divorce under Section 3301(d) of the Divorce Code, referred to “the plaintiff” filing an affidavit. Old Rule 1920.72(c) provides the form of the “Plaintiff’s” affidavit. However, the Divorce Code uses the phrase “an affidavit has been filed.” Consequently, there is no reason why a defendant may not file the

affidavit to initiate the procedure for entering the decree. Old Rules 1920.42(a)(2) and (c)(2) and 1920.72(c) and (d) have been revised to allow filing of the affidavit by either party.

IV. Establishing Grounds for Divorce. New Section 3301(e) (formerly Section 201(e)) of the Divorce Code was added by Act 1988-13, and provides that, if grounds are established under the no-fault provisions of Sections 3301(c) or (d), “the court shall grant a divorce without requiring a hearing on any other grounds.” A note has been added to old Rule 1920.51 referring to this provision.

V. Inventory; Pre-trial Statement. Section 3505(b) (formerly Section 403(b)) of the Divorce Code was enacted in 1980 provides for “an inventory and appraisal of all property owned or possessed at the time the action was commenced.” Old Rule 1920.33 was adopted to implement this provision. The rule did not work very well. The inventory and appraisal were seldom filed within sixty days after a claim for determination and distribution of property is filed, as required by the rule. The old rule further required that the parties use the date the action was commenced as the valuation date. In most instances, the date the action was commenced was irrelevant for valuation purposes.

Section 3505(b)(1) of the Divorce Code, as amended by Act 1988-13, requires that the inventory and appraisal contain a list of property owned or possessed by either or both parties as of both the date of separation and a date thirty days prior to the date of the hearing on equitable distribution. There are three problems with this Divorce Code provision. First, the date of separation is frequently unclear and is itself a disputed issue in the action. Second, an inventory which contains values and liabilities as of a date thirty days prior to trial must be filed very late in the proceedings. Third, even if the date of separation is undisputed, a valuation as of that date is frequently irrelevant.

New Rules 1920.33 and 1920.75 rescind old Rules 1920.33 and 1920.75, and suspend Section 3505(b) as amended by Acts 1988-13 and 1990-206. New Rule 1920.33 substitutes the devices of an inventory and a pre-trial statement. New Rule 1920.75 provides a form for the inventory.

New Rule 1920.33(a) requires that each party file an inventory within ninety days after the filing of a claim for the distribution of property. The inventory must include “all property owned or possessed at the time the action was commenced,” including all marital property, as well as all non-marital property. At this point in the action, a valuation of the property need not be provided.

New Rule 1920.75 provides for a form of inventory which is consistent with the requirements of new Rule 1920.33(a). For the most part, the only information that is required is a description of the property involved in the claim and the identification of the owners. The form of inventory retains the checklist of property found in the old rule.

New Rule 1920.33(b) requires each party to file and serve a pre-trial statement within the time specified by court order or the written direction of the master, or, if none, at least sixty days before the hearing on the claim for distribution of property. Eleven subparagraphs specify the content of the

pre-trial statement. Preparation of the pre-trial statement requires the parties to prepare their cases well before trial, thus facilitating the presentation of evidence at the trial, and enhancing the prospect of early settlement.

Section 3505(b)(2) of the Divorce Code provides for the inventory and appraisal to contain a valuation of the property as of three dates: the date of acquisition, the date of separation and the date thirty days prior to the date of the hearing on equitable distribution. New Rule 1920.33(b)(1) does not specify a date for valuation. It provides that the pre-trial statement shall include a list of assets specifying "(i) the marital assets, their value, the date of valuation . . . and (ii) the non-marital assets, their value, the date of valuation . . .". It is incumbent upon each party to show why property should or should not be valued as of a certain date. Consequently, each party needs to provide the value as of the date he or she intends to prove at the hearing. Three valuations are generally unnecessary.

Section 3505(b)(3) of the Divorce Code provides for the inventory and appraisal to contain a list of liabilities of either or both parties as of thirty days prior to the date of the hearing on equitable distribution. New Rule 1920.33(b)(6) requires the pre-trial statement to include the current expense statement required in an action for support if the party filing the statement intends to offer testimony concerning his or her expenses. Subparagraph (10) of the new rule requires that the pre-trial statement includes "a list of marital debts including the amount of each debt as of the date of separation" and specified additional information concerning that debt. New Rule 1920.33 is therefore more comprehensive than the Divorce Code because it requires a current expense statement and a history of marital debt.

New Rule 1920.33(c) provides for sanctions as authorized by Discovery Rule 4019(c) for failure to file either the inventory or the pre-trial statement.

New Rule 1920.33(d) provides two evidentiary sanctions relating only to the pre-trial statement. Under subparagraph (1), a party may be barred from offering any testimony or introducing any evidence with regard to a matter not included in the statement. Subparagraph (2) provides that a party may not offer testimony or introduce evidence which "is inconsistent with or which goes beyond the fair scope of the information in the pre-trial statement."

The evidentiary sanctions set forth in new Rule 1920.33(d) do not apply to the inventory. Because the inventory is filed within ninety days after a claim has been made for equitable distribution, there may be insufficient time for the parties to learn of all of the property which may be subject to that claim. Consequently, the rule contemplates that any omissions will be corrected in the pre-trial statement.

Act 1988-13 added new Section 3502(e) (formerly Section 401(k)) to the Divorce Code relating to enforcement of an order or an agreement of equitable distribution. New Rule 1920.33(e) states that orders for equitable distribution entered pursuant to the Divorce Code may be enforced as provided

by the rules governing actions for support and divorce, and under the Divorce Code. Remedies available for enforcement for equitable distribution orders are set forth in Divorce Code Sections 3323(b) (formerly Section 410(b)) and 3505(a) (formerly 403(a)), as well as Section 3502(e).

It should be noted that 23 Pa.C.S. § 3105(a) (formerly Section 401.1(a)) states that an agreement is enforceable by any means available pursuant to the Divorce Code for enforcement of an order, as though the agreement were an order of court, except as otherwise provided in the agreement. Thus, although new Rule 1920.33(e) refers only to enforcement of orders, it also applies to enforcement of agreements.

Explanatory Comment—1994

In its opinion in *McKeown v. McKeown*, 417 Pa. Super 520, 612 A.2d 1060 (1992), the court indicates that spousal support cannot be converted automatically to alimony pendente lite. However, in many cases there is a need for alimony pendente lite after the decree is entered, just as there is spousal support before. Because of the recent change in Rule 1910.16-1, which states that the amount of alimony pendente lite is determined according to the guidelines, there is little difference between the two. Although the entitlement defense continues to be available, if the dependent spouse is already receiving spousal support, the amended rule permits automatic conversion to alimony pendente lite upon entry of the decree.

Explanatory Comment—1995

New subdivision (a)(3) is added because, unlike a separate action for support, a count in a divorce which requires support is often filed in the interest of preserving every possible claim rather than because either party wishes to have that claim heard. Where a support claim is not pursued for months, or even years, allowing retroactivity to the date of filing in accordance with Rule 1910.17 can create massive and unjust arrearages.

This amendment permits retroactivity only for the period of time during which the support claim has been actively pursued. Thus, if a demand for support hearing appears on the front of a divorce pleading, support is available retroactive to the date of filing. However, where the demand does not appear on the front of the divorce pleading, retroactivity will be allowed only from the date upon which the hearing is eventually demanded.]

Rule 1920.33. Joinder of Related Claims. Distribution of Property. Enforcement.

(a) Within ninety days after service of a pleading or petition containing a claim for determination and distribution of property under Section 3502 of the Divorce Code, each party shall file an inventory specifically describing all property owned or possessed at the time the action was commenced. The inventory shall set forth as of the date of the filing of the complaint:

* * * * *

(b) Within the time required by order of court or written directive of the master or, if none, at least sixty days before the scheduled hearing on the claim for the determination and distribution of property, each party shall file and serve upon the other party a pre-trial statement. The pre-trial statement shall include the

following matters, together with any additional information required by special order of the court:

(1) a list of assets, which may be in chart form, specifying:

(i) the marital assets, their value, the date of the valuation, whether any portion of the value is non-marital, and any liens or encumbrances thereon[,]; and

* * * * *

(6) if the party intends to offer any testimony as to his or her expenses, [a current expense statement] an Expense Statement in the form required by [the practice and procedure governing an action in support] Rule 1910.27(c)(2)(B);

* * * * *

[Official Note: See, inter alia, Section 3323(b) of the Divorce Code relating to enforcement of the rights of any party under a decree, Section 3505(a) relating to injunction against disposition of property pending suit, and Section 3502(e) providing remedies for failure to comply with an order of equitable distribution or the terms of an agreement between the parties.]

Rule 1920.54. Hearing by Master. Report. Related Claims.

(a) If claims for child support, alimony pendente lite, or counsel fees and expenses have been referred to a master pursuant to Rule 1920.51(a), the master's report shall contain separate sections captioned "Child Support," "Alimony Pendente Lite," or "Counsel Fees and Expenses" as appropriate. The report may be in narrative form stating the reasons for the recommendation and shall include a proposed order stating:

(1) the amount of support or alimony pendente lite[,];

(2) by and for whom it shall be paid[,]; and

* * * * *

The [income and expense statements] Income and Expense Statements shall be attached to the report.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 12—COMMERCE, TRADE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

[12 PA. CODE CH. 141]

Community Development Grant Program

The Department of Community and Economic Development (Department), under section 1764 of the Community Development Block Grant Entitlement Program for Nonurban Counties and Certain Other Municipalities (act) (35 P. S. § 1764), amends Chapter 141 (relating to community development grant program).

Introduction

This final-omitted rulemaking is in response to Governor Rendell's Economic Stimulus Package as it relates to the 108 loan guarantee program. Under the current regulations, nonentitlement public entities may obtain Federally guaranteed loans through the Commonwealth to fund their economic development projects and undertake revitalization activities by committing the use of future Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to pay off the loan in case of default. The final-omitted rulemaking will increase the amount of loan guarantee funds available, double the duration of the loan guarantee period and provide additional security from the Commonwealth for the loan guarantee. This final-omitted rulemaking should make the 108 loan guarantee program more attractive to nonentitlement public entities, which previously viewed the program as too burdensome and complicated for smaller communities to use.

Analysis

Section 141.302 (relating to definitions) is amended to add definitions of "joint public entities," "consortium" and "consortium member."

Section 141.303 (relating to applicability of HUD implementing regulations) is amended to clarify that an application for 108 loan guarantees shall be submitted to and approved by the Department before it may be submitted to United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Section 141.304 (relating to limitations on loan commitments—entitlement public entities) is amended to revise the funding limitation for entitlement entities and to clarify that the funding limitation applies to both single public entities and joint public entities.

Section 141.305 (relating to limitations on loan commitments—nonentitlement public entities) is amended to revise the funding limitation for nonentitlement public entities; to clarify that the \$3 million funding limitation established in this section applies to individual public entities; and to designate the existing paragraph as subsection (a). Subsection (b) is added to clarify that although a county may apply for assistance on behalf of multiple nonentitlement public entities, the county's funding limitation is \$7 million. Subsection (c) is added to require consortium membership for nonentitlement entities seeking assistance under this program.

Section 141.306 is rescinded, as the amended regulations clearly recognize joint public entity applications for assistance.

Section 141.307(a) (relating to limitations on loan commitments—public entities) is amended to change the limitation on the repayment period for a guaranteed loan from 10 years to 20 years. Subsection (b) is amended to broaden the security offered by the Department to HUD.

Subsection (c) is deleted and replaced with language which would permit the Department to provide an additional guarantee from sources other than the public entity's annual CDBG grant, as well as clarifying that an additional guarantee would supersede the use of the public entity's CDBG funds as a source to guarantee debt payments for a section 108 loan. Subsection (e) is amended to permit amortization variations if approved in writing by the Department. Subsection (f) is amended to include HUD in the contracting process. Subsection (g) is amended to require security in addition to a pledge of CDBG allocations when the pledge of the allocation is insufficient.

Section 141.309(a) (relating to Department approval) is amended to permit the Department to consider factors other than those listed in this subsection when determining whether to disapprove a loan guarantee request or approve a loan guarantee request for an amount less than requested.

Fiscal Impact

The final-omitted rulemaking is cost neutral with respect to political subdivisions and the public. The Commonwealth will incur costs totaling \$1,475,500, of which \$880,000 will be expended in the first year to establish a loan loss reserve fund and \$198,500 will be expended each year over the next 3 years to cover technical assistance costs. The costs incurred in administering this program and providing technical assistance will be covered through the Federal CDBG administrative funds available through this program and within existing authorization levels of those funds. While there are potential costs that may be incurred in future years if loans default, these costs will be absorbed by either the loan loss account that will be established with the new approach to administering the program or the use of CDBG program funds, or both.

Paperwork

No new or different paperwork requirements are imposed as a result of the final-omitted rulemaking.

Notice

Notice of proposed rulemaking has been omitted under section 204(3) of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. § 1204), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL), which specifies that a regulation may be adopted without notice of proposed rulemaking if proposed rulemaking procedures are "in the circumstances impracticable, unnecessary, or contrary to the public interest" or if it relates to "Commonwealth property, loans, grants, benefits or contracts" The existing regulations are directly related to a Commonwealth loan guarantee program.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on October 24, 2005, the Department

submitted a copy of the final-omitted rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Commerce Committee and the Senate Community and Economic Development Committee. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, on November 30, 2005, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on December 1, 2005, and approved the final-omitted rulemaking.

Effective Date/Sunset Date

The final-omitted rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The regulations will be monitored on a regular basis and updated as needed.

Findings

The Department finds that:

(1) The proposed rulemaking procedures in sections 201 and 202 of the CDL (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) are unnecessary because the amendments are directly related to a Commonwealth loan guarantee program.

(2) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments has been omitted under section 204 of the CDL and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code § 7.4.

(3) Delay in implementing the final-omitted rulemaking will have a serious adverse impact on the public interest.

Order

The Department, acting under the authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 12 Pa. Code Chapter 141, are amended by deleting § 141.306 and amending §§ 141.302—141.305, 141.307 and 141.309 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as to legality as required by law.

(c) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Subpart C. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND HOUSING

CHAPTER 141. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT GRANT PROGRAM

SECTION 108 LOAN PROGRAM

§ 141.302. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this section, §§ 141.301 and 141.303—141.309, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Consortium—A group of public entities that have entered into an agreement with the Department to apply jointly for an allocation of section 108 loan guarantee funds from HUD.

Consortium member—A public entity that has agreed to participate in the consortium to access section 108 loan guarantee funds from HUD.

Entitlement public entity—A city, county, borough, incorporated town or township that qualifies as an eligible entitlement entity under section 3 of the act (35 P.S. § 1753).

Joint public entities—Two or more public entities or a county that applies on behalf of a public entity, or both, which participate in a joint municipal or regional project.

Nonentitlement public entity—A unit of general local government that is eligible to participate in the State administered CDBG Program and which is not an eligible entitlement entity under section 3 of the act.

Public entity—A unit of general local government that is eligible to participate in the State administered CDBG Program.

§ 141.303. Applicability of HUD implementing regulations.

(a) An application for loan guarantees by the Department must meet the requirements in 24 CFR Subchapter C, Subpart M (relating to loan guarantees).

(b) An application for State guarantees submitted with or without assistance from the State shall first be submitted to, and approved by the Department before it may be submitted to HUD.

§ 141.304. Limitations on loan commitments—entitlement public entities.

The amount of loan guarantees that an entitlement public entity receives may not exceed the amount of a public entity's CDBG allocation that can support annual debt service payments based on the average amount of the CDBG allocation for the past 3 years or \$7 million, whichever is less. This maximum amount applies to both single public entity applicants and joint public entity applicants.

§ 141.305. Limitations on loan commitments—nonentitlement public entities.

(a) The total amount of a loan guarantee made to a nonentitlement public entity may not exceed \$3 million.

(b) The maximum aggregate amount of section 108 loan assistance made to a county which applies on behalf of multiple nonentitlement public entities may not exceed \$7,000,000.

(c) Nonentitlement public entities shall join the consortium before applying for section 108 loan guarantee funds from the Department.

§ 141.306. (Reserved).

§ 141.307. Limitations on loan commitments—public entities.

(a) The repayment period for a guaranteed loan may not exceed 20 years.

(b) The security offered by the Department to HUD will include a pledge of all grants made to the State or for which the State may become eligible under applicable Federal law and regulations.

(c) The State may provide an additional guarantee from sources other than the public entity's annual CDBG grant. The additional State guarantee will supersede the use of the public entity's CDBG grant funds as a source to guarantee debt payments for a section 108 loan.

(d) A public entity shall pledge the full amount of CDBG grants to be received during the period of the loan guarantee. Grant amounts for any year sufficient to pay current debt service may not be expended until the debt service for that year has been paid, or until the public entity provides the Department with satisfactory evidence that funds to pay current debt service have been placed in a trust account.

(e) Loans must be amortized on an annual basis, unless otherwise approved in writing by the Department.

(f) A public entity shall enter into a contract with the Department and HUD, in a form acceptable to the Department and HUD, for the repayment of notes or other obligations guaranteed under this section, §§ 141.301—141.305, 141.308 and 141.309.

(g) Security in addition to a pledge of CDBG allocations will be required when the pledge of the allocations is not sufficient to protect all of the potential liability of the Department.

§ 141.309. Department approval.

(a) The Department may disapprove loan guarantees or may approve a guarantee for an amount less than requested, for reasons including one or more of the following:

(1) The Department determines that the guarantee in light of the financial condition of the applicant, the viability of the project or the costs of the project, constitutes an unacceptable financial risk.

(2) The requested guarantee amount exceeds one or more of the limitations in this section and §§ 141.301—141.308 or in applicable Federal regulations.

(3) Funds are not available in the amount requested.

(4) The performance of the public entity under §§ 141.61, 141.62, 141.81, 141.101, 141.102, 141.121—141.125 and 141.141—141.157 is unacceptable.

(5) The activities to be undertaken are ineligible under State or Federal law or regulations.

(b) The Department will notify the public entity in writing that the guarantee has been approved, reduced or disapproved. If the guarantee is reduced or disapproved, the public entity will be informed of the specific reasons

for that action. If the guarantee is acceptable, the Department will approve the application of the public entity to HUD for its commitment.

Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program

The Department of Public Welfare (Department), under the authority of Subarticle F of Article XVII-A of The Fiscal Code (72 P. S. §§ 1751-A and 1752-A), added by the act of December 16, 2005 (P. L. 439, No. 81) (Act 81) and section 403(b) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 403(b)), adds Subchapter B (relating to State emergency energy assistance fund) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Omission of Proposed Rulemaking

Notice of proposed rulemaking is omitted in accordance with section 204(3) of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. § 1204(3)), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL), and 1 Pa. Code § 7.4(3). Under Act 81, the Governor has published an emergency declaration in which he has found that, as a result of natural disasters throughout the country, home heating fuel and natural gas prices have risen and the available Federal Home Energy Assistance funds are not sufficient to meet the needs of low-income residents of this Commonwealth. The Governor has determined that, as a result, there is a threat to public health.

The Department finds that, under the present circumstances, notice of proposed rulemaking is impracticable and contrary to the public interest because the time periods required for regulatory review and comment under the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.1—745.14), section 204 of the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. § 732-204) and sections 201 and 203 of the CDL (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1203) would take several months. This delay would not allow for prompt implementation of the Emergency Energy Assistance Fund to benefit low-income residents in need of assistance with their home energy needs.

In addition, the Department is adopting Subchapter B because of an emergency, as that term is defined in section 6 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.6). Immediate emergency-certified regulations are needed to address the threat to public health occasioned by rising home heating fuel and natural gas prices. These costs adversely impact low-income residents of this Commonwealth. As a result, the General Assembly enacted Act 81 to appropriate funds to the Emergency Energy Assistance Fund. The Governor, under Act 81, has declared that recent natural disasters and high energy prices are a threat to public health and insufficient Federal funds are available to meet the need. Also, Act 81 explicitly authorizes the Department to publish emergency regulations for the Emergency Energy Assistance Fund.

Under section 6(d) of the Regulatory Review Act, the final-omitted rulemaking takes effect immediately and remains in effect for 120 days. During the 120-day period, the final-omitted rulemaking is subject to review under

the procedures for review of a final-omit regulation under section 6(d) of the Regulatory Review Act.

Purpose

The purpose of this final-omitted rulemaking is to comply with Act 81. Act 81 requires that the criteria and emergency regulations for this program be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* along with the publication of the Governor's requisite declaration of a threat to public health and insufficient Federal home energy assistance funds to meet the needs of low-income residents of this Commonwealth. The Department will follow criteria set forth in the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2006 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Final State Plan and the regulations in Subchapter A (relating to Federal Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program) in administering the Emergency Energy Assistance Fund.¹

Requirements

The Department has amended Chapter 601 by dividing it into two subchapters. Subchapter A contains the requirements for the Federal LIHEAP program. New Subchapter B describes the eligibility criteria for the State-funded Emergency Energy Assistance Fund and establishes a sunset date. Specifically, § 601.151 (relating to eligibility criteria) provides that the eligibility criteria and benefits for the State Emergency Energy Assistance Fund shall be as set forth in the Commonwealth's FFY 2006 LIHEAP State Plan and Subchapter A. Section 601.152 (relating to sunset date) provides for the program to sunset on June 30, 2006.

Affected Individuals and Organizations

Low-income Pennsylvanians in need of home energy assistance will benefit from the availability of the Emergency Energy Assistance Fund.

Accomplishments and Benefits

The final-omitted rulemaking will benefit low-income Pennsylvanians by providing State funds in addition to the Federal LIHEAP funds for eligible households.

Fiscal Impact

Under Act 81, an amount of up to one mill of the gross receipts tax has been appropriated from the General Fund to the Emergency Energy Assistance Fund for the fiscal year from July 1, 2005, to June 30, 2006.

Paperwork Requirements

No additional paperwork requirements are anticipated as a result of this final-omitted rulemaking.

Effective Date

The final-omitted rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Public Comment

Although this rulemaking is being adopted without publication as a proposed rulemaking, interested persons are invited to submit written comments, suggestions or objections regarding the rulemaking to the Department of Public Welfare, Office of Income Maintenance, Edward J. Zogby, Director, Bureau of Policy, Room 431 Health and Welfare Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120. Comments will be reviewed and considered for any subsequent revision of the regulations.

This final-omitted rulemaking will sunset on June 30, 2006.

Regulatory Review Act

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(c)), on January 10, 2006, the Department submitted a copy of this final-omitted rulemaking to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Health and Human Services and the Senate Committee on Public Health and Welfare. On the same date, the final-omitted rulemaking was submitted to the Office of the Attorney General for review and approval under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act.

In addition to submitting the final-omitted rulemaking, the Department has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Department. A copy of this form is available to the public upon request.

Findings

The Department finds that:

(1) Notice of proposed rulemaking is omitted in accordance with section 204(3) of the CDL, 1 Pa. Code § 7.4(3) and section 6(d) of the Regulatory Review Act because notice of proposed rulemaking is, under the circumstances, impracticable and contrary to the public interest.

(2) The adoption of this final-omitted rulemaking in the manner provided by this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of Act 81.

(3) Adoption by this final-omitted rulemaking is necessary to ameliorate an emergency condition that threatens the public health.

Order

The Department, acting under section 1752-A of The Fiscal Code and section 403(b) of the Public Welfare Code orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 55 Pa. Code Chapter 601, are amended by adding §§ 601.151 and 601.152 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Secretary of the Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Offices of General Counsel and Attorney General for approval as to legality and form as required by law.

(c) The Secretary of the Department shall certify and deposit this order and Annex A with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Declaration of Emergency Threat to Public Health

Whereas, Due to recent natural disasters that have occurred in various parts of the country, the cost of home heating fuel and natural gas has been rising, and will continue to rise sharply; and

Whereas, the rise in the cost of home heating fuel and natural gas is having, and will continue to have, a huge impact on low-income Commonwealth residents; and

Whereas, the inability of low-income Commonwealth residents to pay for home heating fuel and natural gas in the coming winter months is a threat to their health.

Now Therefore, pursuant to the provisions of Subsection 7301(c) of the Emergency Management Services Code (35 Pa.C.S. Section 7101 et seq.) and Subarticle F, Section 1752-A of the Fiscal Code (Act No. 81 of 2005), I do hereby declare that high energy prices caused by weather conditions constitute an emergency threat to public health within this Commonwealth and that available federal home energy assistance funds are not sufficient to meet the needs of residents.

Further, I hereby direct and authorize the Secretary of Public Welfare to administer state funds from the Energy Emergency Assistance Fund available to those in need in a manner consistent with the criteria under the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (55 Pa. Code 601 et seq.) and the regulatory changes published concurrently with this declaration.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of February 2006

The Department of Banking (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), hereby determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of February 2006 is 7 1/4%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. No. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which

the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 4.60 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 7.10 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 7 1/4%.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person

shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

For further information concerning the content of a Notice of Intent to Remediate, contact the environmental cleanup program manager in the Department regional office before which the notice appears. If information concerning this acknowledgment is required in an alternative form, contact the community relations coordinator at the appropriate regional office. The air contaminant emissions from the printing press will be controlled by an existing regenerative thermal oxidizer.

The proposed modification will utilize inks and cleaning solvents for the printing of nonflooring materials that contain VOCs and HAPs. The proposed modification will also limit the facility as a whole to emit less than 7 tons of individual HAP and 10 tons of combined HAPs in any 12-consecutive month period. The VOC emissions from the proposed modification will be included within the facility's existing emission limitation of 250 tons of VOC in any 12-consecutive month period. The facility is also required to keep records on a monthly basis and submit semi-annual reports to verify compliance with the facility-wide VOC and HAPs emission limitations.

The Department of Environmental Protection's (Department) review of the information provided by Armstrong World Industries, Inc. indicates that the proposed modification will comply with all air quality requirements, including the best available technology requirement of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12 pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants. The proposed modification will also comply with the applicable requirements of 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart FFF (Standards of Performance for Flexible Vinyl and Urethane Coating

and Printing), 60.580—60.585. Based on these findings, the Department intends to approve the application and issue plan approval for the proposed modification, including printing of non-flooring materials in the existing 9-station rotogravure printing press. Additionally, if the Department determines that the facility is operating in compliance with the plan approval conditions, the conditions established in the plan approval will be incorporated into the State-only operating permit No. 18-00004 by means of an administrative amendment under 25 Pa. Code § 127.450.

The following is a summary of the conditions that the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements.

1. Under the Best Available Technology (BAT) provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the emission of any individual HAP from all sources at the facility shall not exceed 7.0 tons in any 12-consecutive month period. The allowable individual HAPs are toluene and other alkyl aromatics (family), methylene diphenyl diisocyanate and other diisocyanates (family), methyl isobutyl ketone, xylenes, hexane, alcohols (family) and glycol ethers. Additionally, all sources at the facility shall emit no greater than 0.5 ton of any individual HAP that is not listed previously as an allowable individual HAP. The emission of total combined HAPs from all sources at the facility shall not exceed 10.0 tons in any 12-consecutive month period. The permittee shall not emit polychlorobiphenols, mercury, lead, polycyclic organic matter, dioxins or furans from any source at the facility.

2. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall not process more than 70 million square feet of nonflooring substrate through Source ID P101 in any 12-consecutive month period.

3. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the emission of VOCs from all sources at the facility shall not equal or exceed 250 tons in any 12-consecutive month period.

4. The permittee shall keep up-to-date records of Certified Product Data Sheets (CPDSs) that identify the VOC content and HAP content of each VOC and/or HAP containing material used at the facility.

5. The permittee shall keep records of the amount of nonflooring substrate processed through Source ID P101 each month.

6. The permittee shall keep records of the identity, type, and amount of each VOC and/or HAP containing material used each month in association with the printing of nonflooring materials in Source ID P101.

7. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code Sections 127.1 and 127.12, Source ID P101 shall not be operated without the simultaneous operation of regenerative thermal oxidizer (ID C01). The emission of VOCs and HAPs from Source ID P101 shall be controlled by ID C01.

8. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the VOC and HAP emissions from the printing of nonflooring materials in Source ID P101 shall be captured with an efficiency of 100% and exhausted to ID C01. Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provisions in 25 Pa. Code § 129.67 and 40 CFR 60.582(a)(2).

9. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, ID C01 shall destroy the VOC and HAP emissions ducted to it from all sources at the facility

associated with the production area (solvent process area) at a destruction efficiency of no less than 95% (by weight). Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provisions in 25 Pa. Code § 129.67 and 40 CFR Part 60.582(a)(2).

10. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, within 120 days of the issuance of this plan approval, the permittee shall perform stack testing upon the inlet and outlet of ID C01 while ID C01 is being used to control emissions from the printing of nonflooring substrates in Source ID P101 to determine the VOC/HAP destruction efficiency of ID C01 to verify compliance with the destruction efficiency limitation. The testing shall be performed while Source ID P101 is operating at a representative rate of production, using test methods and procedures approved by the Department. During the stack testing, the temperature set-point of the combustion chamber of ID C01 shall be 1,450°F and the actual instantaneous temperature of the combustion chamber of ID C01 shall not go below 1,400°F. Compliance with the requirement for the timing of the source testing specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provisions in 40 CFR 60.8(a) and 583(d).

11. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall operate ID C01 at a temperature of at least 1,400°F.

12. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, ID C01 shall be equipped with two thermocouples to monitor and record the temperature of the combustion chamber of ID C01 on a continuous basis. Compliance with the temperature monitoring and recording requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provision in 40 CFR 60.584(b).

13. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall determine the VOC destruction efficiency of ID C01 on a quarterly basis using a total hydrocarbon analyzer. The VOC destruction efficiency shall be determined by measuring the VOC concentration at the inlet and outlet of the incinerator. A zero and span calibration shall be performed on the total hydrocarbon analyzer immediately prior to the testing of the inlet of ID C01, immediately prior to the testing of the outlet of ID C01, and immediately after the testing of the outlet of ID C01.

14. The permittee shall keep records of the supporting calculations for VOC and HAP emissions from all sources at the facility on a monthly basis and shall verify compliance with the VOC and HAP emission limitations in any 12-consecutive month period.

15. The permittee shall keep records of the dates and results of the VOC concentration stack tests, including total hydrocarbon analyzer tests with calibration data, and shall verify compliance with the VOC destruction efficiency requirement specified for ID C01.

16. The permittee shall keep records of the temperature of ID C01 on a monthly basis and shall verify compliance with the operating temperature requirement of 1,400°F specified for ID C01.

17. The permittee shall keep records of the dates and results of the temperature device accuracy tests on a monthly basis and shall verify compliance with the temperature device accuracy requirement specified for ID C01.

18. The permittee shall submit reports to the Department on a semi-annual basis that include the supporting

calculations used to verify compliance with the VOC destruction efficiency requirement specified for ID C01.

19. The permittee shall submit reports to the Department on a semi-annual basis that include the supporting calculations used to verify compliance with the VOC and HAP emission limitations for all sources at the facility in any 12-consecutive month period.

20. The permittee shall test the thermocouples associated with ID C01 on a monthly basis and maintain an accuracy of plus or minus 2°F. The permittee shall utilize approved QA/QC practices that are adequate to ensure continuing validity of data and proper performance of the thermocouples. Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provision in 40 CFR 60.584(b)(1).

21. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall ensure that ID C01 has reached its minimum operating temperature before placing any affected source on line.

22. Under the BAT provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall have an alarm system that alerts when the temperature of ID C01 falls below 1,423°F. This alarm system shall automatically shutdown all processes exhausted to ID C01 after no more than a 10-minute delay.

23. The permittee shall record all instances that the temperature of ID C01 falls below 1,423°F while the emissions from any source at the facility are being controlled by ID C01. Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provision in 40 CFR 60.584(b)(2).

24. The permittee shall submit reports to the Department on a semi-annual basis that include the records of all instances that the temperature of ID C01 falls below 1,423°F while the emissions from any source at the facility are being controlled by ID C01. Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provision in 40 CFR 60.585(b)(3).

25. Source ID P101 is subject to 25 Pa. Code § 129.67. The permittee shall comply with all the applicable requirements specified in 25 Pa. Code § 129.67.

26. Nonflooring substrates printed from Source ID P101 are subject to 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart FFF. The permittee shall comply with all the applicable requirements specified in 40 CFR 60.580—60.585.

27. The Request for Determination of Requirement of Plan Approval/Operating Permit (RFD) forms approved for printing on polyvinyl alcohol (PVOH) film on March 4, 2005, and for printing on polyester ("Mylar") film on April 5, 2005, including all conditions of approval, are superseded by this plan approval.

28. All conditions contained in TVOP 18-00004 remain in effect unless superseded or amended by conditions contained in this plan approval. If there is a conflict between a condition contained in this plan approval and a condition contained in TVOP 18-00004, the permittee shall comply with the condition contained in this plan approval.

The respective plant incorporates various pieces of stone crushing, screening, conveying, and the like equipment as well as an 890 horsepower diesel engine, a 270 horsepower diesel engine and several minor air contamination sources such as a diesel fuel storage tank. The fugitive PM emissions, including PM10 from the stone crushing, screening, conveying, and the like equipment are controlled by a water spray dust suppression system. The fugitive PM and PM10 emissions resulting from the use of site roadways are controlled by a water truck. The facility is not expected to emit more than 14.02 tons of PM, 6.56 tons of PM10, 10.46 tons of NOx, 2.8 tons of CO, 2.76 tons of SOx and 1.31 tons of total hydrocarbons per year.

The facility is not a major (Title V) facility for any air contaminant.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) proposes to incorporate into the operating permit to be issued conditions requiring compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants as well as conditions previously established in Plan Approval 57-310-001, issued on August 29, 2005.

These previously-established conditions include:

1. Conditions limiting the operation of the stone crushing, screening, conveying, and the like equipment and the two associated diesel engines to no more than 2,000 hours in any 12-consecutive month period.
2. A condition requiring the stone crushing, screening, conveying, and the like equipment to be equipped with a water spray dust suppression system which shall incorporate at least six spray bars with at least three spray nozzles each.
3. A condition requiring the water spray dust suppression system to incorporate strainers to prevent nozzle pluggage.
4. A condition requiring a water truck equipped with a spray bar to be kept on site at all times and used, as needed, for the control of fugitive particulate matter from plant roadways and stockpile areas.
5. Conditions prohibiting the operation of the stone crushing, screening, conveying, etc. equipment if either the water spray dust suppression system or the water truck is incapable of operation.
6. A condition requiring the plant to incorporate the hydrants or hose connections as are needed to permit the use of hoses to control fugitive particulate matter from material stockpiles.
7. Conditions limiting the sulfur content of the diesel fuel used in the diesel engines to .3% by weight.
8. A condition limiting the NOx, CO and total hydrocarbon emissions from the 890 horsepower diesel engine to 2.77, .23 and .32 grams per horsepower-hour, respectively.
9. A condition limiting the NOx, CO and total hydrocarbon emissions from the 270 horsepower diesel engine to 8.44, 3.03 and 1.14 grams per horsepower-hour, respectively.
10. A condition requiring the injection timing of the 270 horsepower diesel engine to be retarded at least 4° relative to standard timing.

11. A condition requiring the maintenance of records of the number of hours the stone crushing plant operates each month as well as the number of hours each of the two diesel engines operates each month.

The Department additionally proposes to incorporate into the operating permit to be issued a new condition requiring the maintenance of records of the identity and amount of aerosol degreasers used at the facility each month.

Written comments, objections or requests for informal conferences on applications may be submitted by any person or any officer or head of any Federal, State or local government agency or authority to the Department at the district mining office indicated before an application within 30 days of this publication, or within 30 days after the last publication of the applicant's newspaper advertisement, as provided by 25 Pa. Code §§ 77.121—77.123 and 86.31—86.34.

Where any of the mining activities listed will have discharges of wastewater to streams, the Department will incorporate NPDES permits into the mining activity permits issued in response to these applications. NPDES permits will contain, at a minimum, technology-based effluent limitations as identified in this notice for the respective coal and noncoal applications. In addition, more restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on dis-

charge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining which may occur will be incorporated into a mining activity permit, when necessary, for compliance with water quality standards (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 93 and 95). Laboratories Approved to Determine Analyses of Blood and/or Serum for Controlled Substances

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and/or the Federal Clinical Laboratory Improvement Act of 1967 (42 U.S.C.A. § 263a) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of blood and/or serum for the determination of controlled substances. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories. These laboratories are also approved and designated for purposes of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of services which will reflect the presence of controlled substances or their biotransformation products in blood and/or serum.

Depending upon their capability and performance in proficiency surveys, laboratories are approved to perform screening and/or confirmatory analyses on blood and/or serum. Laboratories approved to perform screening analyses are designated on the approval list by an "S" followed by the letters "B" for blood and/or "Se" for serum. Laboratories approved to screen both blood and serum would therefore have "SBSe" listed after their laboratory name. Laboratories approved to offer confirmatory analyses will be designated on the approval list by a "C" followed by the letters "B" for blood and/or "Se" for serum. Laboratories approved to perform confirmatory analyses on both serum and blood would therefore have "CBSe" listed after the name of their laboratory.

Screening analyses provide a presumptive indication that a controlled substance is present. Confirmatory testing is used to substantiate screening results.

Persons seeking forensic blood and/or serum analysis services from any of the listed laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the medicolegal purposes. They should also determine that the director of the facility is

agreeable to performing analyses for forensic purposes. Persons seeking the analyses are responsible for specifying the extent to which the presence of a controlled substance is to be verified. That specification should be predicated upon the purpose for which the analysis is being sought.

The name of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the location, personnel and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. Laboratories Approved to Determine Blood Alcohol Content

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code §§ 5.50 and 5.103 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services; and blood tests for blood alcohol content) to perform alcohol analyses of blood and/or serum and plasma. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories.

Since procedures for determining the alcohol content of serum and plasma are identical and results obtained from serum or plasma derived from a blood sample are the same, laboratories that demonstrate reliability in the analysis of serum proficiency testing specimens are approved to analyze both serum and plasma. These laboratories are also approved and designated under the provisions of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of specialized services which will reflect the presence of alcohol in blood and/or serum and plasma. Laboratories located outside the Commonwealth may not provide blood and/or serum and plasma alcohol testing services in this Commonwealth unless they are specifically licensed by the Department under the Clinical Laboratory Act.

Persons seeking forensic blood and/or serum and plasma analysis services from the following designated laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for forensic purposes and that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing determinations for this purpose. The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semi-annually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The name of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the location, personnel and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. When changes of this type occur, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name change, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test if the name of the facility changed, the Clinical Laboratory Permit numbers of the facilities are included in the lists of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory at the time the list was prepared.

The Department's blood alcohol and serum/plasma alcohol proficiency testing programs are approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in accordance with the requirements contained in the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 CFR §§ 493.901 and 493.937) which are administered by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). Participation in these programs may therefore be used to demonstrate acceptable performance for approval purposes under both Federal and Commonwealth statutes.

Laboratories Approved to Determine Urine Controlled Substance Content

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. § 2151—2165) and/or the Federal Clinical Laboratory Improvement Act of 1967 (42 U.S.C.A. § 263a) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of urine for the determination of controlled substances or their biotransformation products. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in tests conducted by the Bureau of Laboratories of the Department. These laboratories are also approved and designated for purposes of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of services which will reflect the presence of controlled substances or their biotransformation products in urine.

Depending upon their capability and performance in proficiency surveys, laboratories are approved to perform screening and/or confirmatory urine drug analyses. Laboratories approved to perform screening tests only are designated on the approval list by an "S" after the laboratory's name. Laboratories approved to perform confirmatory testing only are designated by a "C" following the laboratory's name. Those approved to perform both screening and confirmatory analyses are designated by the letters "SC." Screening analyses provide a presumptive indication that a controlled substance is present. Confirmatory testing is used to substantiate screening results.

Persons seeking forensic urine drug analysis services from any of the listed laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the purpose. They should also determine that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing analyses for that purpose. Persons seeking the analyses are responsible for specifying the extent to which the presence of a controlled substance is to be verified. That specification should be predicated upon the purpose for which the analysis is being sought.

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The name of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the location, personnel, and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. When changes of this type occur, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name change, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test if the name of the facility changed, the Clinical Laboratory Permit numbers of the facilities are included in the lists of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory at the time the list was prepared.

Laboratories Approved to Perform Blood Lead and/or Erythrocyte Protoporphyrin Determinations

The following laboratories are licensed in accordance with the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P. S. §§ 2151—2165) and/or the Federal Clinical Laboratory Improvement Act of 1967 (42 U.S.C.A. § 263a), and are currently approved under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of blood for lead or erythrocyte protoporphyrin content. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic evaluations conducted by the Bureau of Laboratories of the Department of Health (Department).

Lead poisoning is a reportable noncommunicable disease. Approved laboratories which offer blood lead testing services are required to inform the Department of actual or possible incidents of this condition in accordance with 28 Pa. Code § 27.34 (relating to reporting cases of lead poisoning). These regulations specify the following requirements for reporting by clinical laboratories.

(1) A clinical laboratory shall report all blood lead test results on both venous and capillary specimens for per-

sons under 16 years of age to the Department's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program, Division of Maternal and Child Health, Bureau of Family Health.

(2) A clinical laboratory shall report an elevated blood lead level in a person 16 years of age or older to the Department's Division of Environmental Health Epidemiology, Bureau of Epidemiology or to other locations as designated by the Department. An elevated blood lead level is defined by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH). As of January 26, 2002, NIOSH defines an elevated blood lead level as a venous blood lead level of 25 micrograms per deciliter or higher. The Department will publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* any NIOSH update of the definition within 30 days of NIOSH's notification to the Department.

(3) A clinical laboratory which conducts blood lead tests on 100 or more specimens per month shall submit results electronically in a format specified by the Department.

(4) A clinical laboratory which conducts blood lead tests on less than 100 blood lead specimens per month shall submit results either electronically or by hard copy in the format specified by the Department.

(5) A laboratory which performs blood lead tests on blood specimens collected in this Commonwealth shall be licensed as a clinical laboratory and shall be specifically approved by the Department to conduct those tests.

(6) Blood lead analyses requested for occupational health purposes on blood specimens collected in this Commonwealth shall be performed only by laboratories which are licensed and approved as specified in paragraph (5), and which are also approved by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration of the United States Department of Labor under 29 CFR 1910.1025(j)(2)(iii) (relating to lead).

(7) A clinical laboratory shall complete a blood lead test within 5 work days of the receipt of the blood specimen and shall submit the case report to the Department by the close of business of the next work day after the day on which the test was performed. The clinical laboratory shall submit a report of lead poisoning using either the hard-copy form or electronic transmission format specified by the Department.

(8) When a clinical laboratory receives a blood specimen without all of the information required for reporting purposes, the clinical laboratory shall test the specimen and shall submit the incomplete report to the Department.

Erythrocyte protoporphyrin determinations may be performed as an adjunct determination to substantiate blood lead levels of 25 micrograms per deciliter or higher. Since erythrocyte protoporphyrin concentrations may not increase as a result of low-level exposures to lead, direct blood lead analysis is the only reliable method for identifying individuals with blood lead concentrations below 25 micrograms per deciliter.

Persons seeking blood lead or erythrocyte protoporphyrin analyses should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the purpose for which the analyses are sought. Laboratories offering blood lead analysis only are designated with the letter "L" following the name of the laboratory. Those offering erythrocyte protoporphyrin analysis only are designated with the letter "P." Laboratories offering both services are designated with the letters "LP."

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsyl-*

vania Bulletin. The name of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the location, personnel and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. When changes of this type occur, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name change, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test if the name of the facility changed, the Clinical Laboratory Permit numbers of the facilities are included in the lists of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory at the time the list was prepared.

The Department's blood lead proficiency testing program is approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in accordance with the requirements contained in the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 CFR 493.901 and 493.937) which are administered by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). Participation in these programs may therefore be used to demonstrate acceptable performance for approval purposes under both Federal and Commonwealth statutes.

Prehospital Practitioner Scope of Practice

Under 28 Pa. Code §§ 1003.21(c)(13), 1003.22(e)(3), 1003.23(f), 1003.24(e) and 1003.25b(c), the Department of Health (Department) is publishing the scope of practice for ambulance attendants, first responders, emergency medical technicians (EMT), EMT-paramedics and prehospital registered nurses (PHRN) under the Emergency Medical Services Act (35 P. S. §§ 6921—6938).

Skills identified may be performed by a prehospital practitioner at the practitioner's level of certification/recognition only if the practitioner has successfully completed training (cognitive, affective and psychomotor) on the specified skill, which includes training to perform the skill on adults, children and infants, as appropriate.

A PHRN with medical command authorization may perform, in addition to those services within an EMT-paramedic's scope of practice, other services authorized by The Professional Nursing Law (63 P. S. §§ 211—225.5), when authorized by a medical command physician through either online medical command or standing medical treatment protocols. To administer drugs in addition to those permitted by applicable medical treatment protocols, a PHRN must also have received approval to do so by the advanced life support (ALS) service medical director of the ALS ambulance service under which the PHRN is functioning.

This list supersedes the list of skills in the scope of practice of prehospital personnel published at 35 Pa.B. 4374 (August 6, 2005). Two changes are made. Use of an inspiratory impedance threshold device is added to the EMT-paramedic's scope of practice under "airway/ventilation/ oxygenation." This device may be used if authorized by the ALS service medical director and after personnel are appropriately educated in the use of the device. Also added to the EMT-paramedic's scope of practice is intranasal medication administration. This route of administration for appropriate medications included on the approved drug list is added to the EMT-paramedic's scope of practice under "medication administration routes."

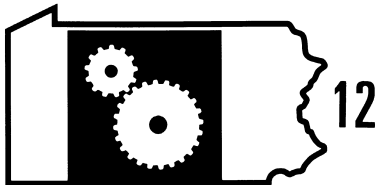

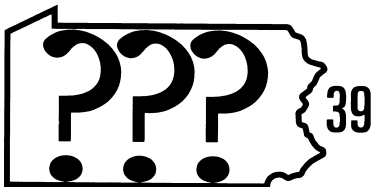
