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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

There are no restrictions on the republication of official documents appearing in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted

proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Bradford County Rule of Judicial Administration 5000.7-1.

Whenever testimony from a prior proceeding is incorporated into the record at any trial or hearing, and the court deems it necessary for some or all of the prior testimony to be transcribed, the costs of transcription of the prior testimony will be divided evenly between or among the parties, unless otherwise directed by the court. Costs of transcription shall be paid when and as directed by the court.

If the testimony to be incorporated has already been transcribed and billed to the County of Bradford, the parties shall be obligated to pay the customary rate for private parties. The County of Bradford will be reimbursed for the per page rate that it has advanced to the reporter and the reporter shall be paid the balance.

Bradford County Rule of Judicial Administration 1901.

Prompt Disposition of Matters; Termination of Inactive Cases.

- (1) The Prothonotary shall, upon the periodic request of the Court Administrator, cause a computer-generated report to be prepared which lists all civil matters, except support and eminent domain proceedings, in which no steps or proceedings have been docketed for two years or more prior thereto.
- (2) Upon receipt of the report prepared by the Prothonotary, the Court Administrator shall give to all counsel of record, and to all parties for whom no appearance has been entered at least thirty (30) day's notice of the court's intention to terminate the matter as provided by Pa.R.J.A.No. 1901(c). The Court Administrator shall note therein that a rule has been entered to show cause by written objection why the matter should not be dismissed pursuant to Rule Pa.R.J.A. No. 1901.
- (3) If any such notices are returned by the postal authorities as undelivered for any reason, the Court Administrator shall forward said notice to the Prothonotary's Office for placement in the official file. The Prothonotary's Office shall prepare a list of any such cases and cause the same to be published one time in the *Bradford County Law Journal*, together with a notice that said cases will be terminated 30 days after the date on which the list is published. The cost of publication shall be borne by the office of the Prothonotary. The Prothonotary shall transmit a copy of such a list to the Court Administrator.
- (4) If no written objection is docketed prior to the date set for the rule returnable or within thirty (30) days after publication as set forth in (3) above, an order shall be entered by the Court dismissing the matter with prejudice for failure to prosecute under the provisions of this rule. If objections are filed, the court will review any objections and, if appropriate, schedule a hearing thereon.
- (5) Each district justice shall, at least annually, compile a list of civil and criminal summary cases filed in their offices in which no steps or proceedings have been taken for two years or more prior thereto. Notice of intention to terminate shall be given by the district justice as set forth in Pa.R.J.A. 1901(c). In criminal summary cases, district justices shall give notice thereof to the District Attorney, any private prosecutor, the defendant, and the defendant's attorney of record as provided by Pa.R.J.A. 1901(c).
- (6) If any such notices are returned by the postal authorities as undelivered, the district justice shall prepare a list thereof and cause the same to be published one time in the *Bradford County Law Journal*, together with a notice that said cases will be terminated thirty

- (30) days after the date on which the list is published. The cost of publication shall be borne by the office of the district justice.
- (7) If no written objection is received by the district justice prior to the date set for the rule returnable or within thirty (30) days after publication as set forth in (6)

above, an order shall be entered dismissing the matter with prejudice for failure to prosecute under the provisions of this rule.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 31—INSURANCE

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT [31 PA. CODE CH. 111] Pennsylvania Fair Plan

The Insurance Department (Department) hereby deletes Chapter 111 (relating to Pennsylvania Fair Plan) under the authority of sections 206, 506, 1501 and 1502 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 66, 186, 411 and 412); and The Pennsylvania Fair Plan Act (act) (40 P. S. §§ 1600.101—1600.502).

Purpose

The purpose of this final rulemaking is to delete Chapter 111 to eliminate redundant regulations. The Department adopted the regulations more than 20 years ago to implement the provisions of act. The act provides for the establishment of an Industry Placement Facility to assure fair access to insurance requirements (FAIR Plan) in order to make available basic property insurance for residential and commercial properties in this Commonwealth.

The provisions of these regulations are sufficiently addressed in the act, and the regulations in no manner enhance the authorizing statute. Therefore, they are found to be redundant, and it is no longer necessary to include these regulations.

Comments

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published in 27 Pa. B. 1565 (March 29, 1997) with a 30-day public comment period.

No comments were received from the legislative standing committees, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) or the public.

Affected Parties

The deletion of these regulations affect all property and casualty insurers licensed to do business in this Commonwealth.

Fiscal Impact

The deletion of these regulations has no fiscal impact because of the redundant nature of the regulations to the act. The regulatory provisions remain in effect under the statute.

Paperwork

There is no impact on paperwork as a result of the deletion of this chapter.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), the Department submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking on March 17, 1997, to IRRC, the Chairpersons of the House Insurance Committee and the Senate Banking and Insurance Committee. In addition to submitting the proposed rulemaking, the Department has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a

detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Department in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1. A copy of the material is available to the public upon request.

In preparing these final-form regulations, the Department has considered all comments received from IRRC, the Committees and the public. These final-form regulations were deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees on August 13, 1997. IRRC met on August 13, 1997, and approved the amendments in accordance with section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act.

Findings

The Insurance Commissioner finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt this rulemaking as amended by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968, (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) The adoption of this rulemaking in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Insurance Commissioner, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Department, 31 Pa. Code Chapter 111, are amended by deleting §§ 111.1—111.4 to read as set forth at 27 Pa.B. 1565.
- (b) The Commissioner shall submit this order and 27 Pa.B. 1565 to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.
- (c) The Commissioner shall certify this order and 27 Pa.B. 1565 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) The amendments adopted by this order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

[31 PA. CODE CH. 113] Certificates of Insurance

The Insurance Department (Department) deletes Chapter 113, Subchapter C (relating to certificates of insurance) under the authority of sections 206, 506, 1501 and 1502 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 66, 186, 411 and 412); and The Insurance Company Law of 1921 (act) (40 P. S. §§ 361—991).

Purpose

The purpose of this final rulemaking is to delete §§ 113.31 and 113.32, to eliminate redundant regulations. The Department adopted the regulations over 20 years ago to caution and advise insurers and their representatives that many noninsurance entities require the submission of certificates of insurance by their insurance carrier, which may vary from the basic insurance policy. The regulations further simply reiterate that section 354 of the act (40 P. S. § 477b) prohibits the use of policy forms and documents that have not been approved by the Department, including certificates of insurance. As the provisions of these regulations are sufficiently addressed in the act, and the regulations in no manner enhance the authorizing statute, it is found to be redundant. Therefore, it is no longer necessary to continue these sections within the Department regulations.

Comments

Notice of this proposed rulemaking was published at 27 Pa.B. 1564 (March 29, 1997) with a 30-day public comment period.

No comments were received from the standing committees, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) or the public.

Affected Parties

The deletion of the regulations affects insurance companies licensed to do business in this Commonwealth.

Fiscal Impact

There is no fiscal impact as a result of the deletion of these sections because of the redundant nature of the regulations in relation to the statute. The regulatory provisions remain in effect under the statute.

Paperwork

There is no impact on paperwork as a result of the deletion of these regulations.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS

[37 PA. CODE CH. 93]

State Correctional Institutions and Facilities

The Department of Corrections (Department) acting under the authority conferred by the Prison Medical Services Act (act) (61 P. S. §§ 1011—1017), and Act 53 of 1996, gives public notice of its intention to adopt amendments to Chapter 93 (relating to State correctional institutions and facilities).

The proposed amendment will enable the Department to impose fees on inmates in State correctional institutions and facilities for the provision of certain medical services. The proposed amendment will also require inmates who are covered by medical insurance to pay for the medical services through that insurance as far as the medical insurance policy may allow. The proposed amendment includes formal changes to the regulations. Section 93.12 (relating to care and treatment) is amended to include subsections that contain definitions, specify what medical services will and will not be subject to a fee, require inmates who are covered by medical insurance to pay for the costs of those services through that insurance and describe the procedures to be used for the collection of the fees.

Section 93.12 is first proposed to be amended by designating its current and only subsection as subsection (a). Subsection (b) is proposed to be added to include definitions for the terms "Department," "fee," "inmate," "health care professional" and "medical service." Subsection (c) is added to designate the medical services for which a fee will be charged. Subsection (d) is added to designate the medical services for which a fee will not be charged. Subsection (e) is added to establish the amount of the fee to be charged for certain medical services and when the fee will be assessed. Subsection (e) also confers upon the Department the authority to modify the fee amount upon 60 days written notice to the inmate population. Subsection (f) is added to describe how payment of fees will be accomplished. Subsection (g) is added to require inmates who have medical insurance to pay for their own medical needs through that insurance. Subsection (h) is added to require the Department to include an explanation of the medical service fee program in the Inmate Handbook.

Background and Need for the Proposed Amendments

The amendment is proposed in accordance with the statutory mandate of the act and Act 53 of 1996. The act and Act 53 of 1996 establish the Prison Medical Services Program (Program) within the Department and direct the Department to issue regulations to implement the Program and to require inmates who are covered by medical insurance to pay for their medical needs through that insurance. The act states that the regulations shall specify the medical services which are subject to fees, the fee amounts, payment procedures, medical services that are not subject to fees and fees applicable to medical emergencies, chronic care and preexisting conditions.

Implementation of the Program will result in immediate savings to the taxpayers of this Commonwealth. Inmates will be required to pay for a portion of the

medical services actually used. This is in contrast to the present system where inmates receive free medical services at taxpayer expense. Additionally, it is anticipated that inmates will be less likely to seek and use medical services unnecessarily when they will be partly responsible for paying for those services. The money earned through the assessment of fees for medical services for inmates will be placed in the General Fund.

Fiscal Impact

The proposed amendment will require that inmates incarcerated within State correctional institutions and facilities pay a \$2 fee for certain medical services provided to them and to pay two-thirds of the total cost of medical services that are provided to another inmate as a result of the paying inmate's assaultive conduct. The proposed amendment will also require inmates who are covered by medical insurance to pay for their medical needs through that insurance. The proposed amendment will have no other direct fiscal impact on the private sector, the general public or political subdivisions. The additional revenue generated through the collection of fees will be deposited in the General Fund as required by the act.

Paperwork Requirements

The proposed amendment will create minimal additional paperwork for the private sector in that few inmates are covered by medical insurance that would require the filing of many medical claims with private insurance companies. The proposed amendment will not create any additional paperwork for the general public or political subdivisions of this Commonwealth. Minimal additional paperwork will be required for the Department. The Department will collect the fees through an inmate authorization form, which will describe the medical service to be provided and advise the inmate of the fee to be deducted from the inmate's account. The authorization form will then be forwarded to the institution's business office for debiting the inmate's account. The act also requires that the Department conduct an annual audit of the Program and submit an annual report to the Chairpersons and Minority Chairpersons of the Appropriations Committee and the Judiciary Committee of the Senate and the Chairpersons and Minority Chairpersons of the Appropriations Committee and the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on September 24, 1997, the Department submitted a copy of the proposed amendment to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Judiciary Committees (Committees). In addition to submitting the proposed amendment, the Department has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Department in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Improving Government Regulations." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

If IRRC has objections to the proposed amendment, it will notify the Department within 10 days of the close of the Committees' comment period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of

the amendments, by the Department, the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised.

Statutory Authority

The Department's authority to establish the Program and impose the fees established by the proposed amendment is set forth in section 3(b) of the act (61 P. S. § 1013(b)) and Act 53 of 1996.

Effective Date

The proposed amendment shall be effective upon closure of the public comment period, the regulatory review process and subsequent publication as final rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Subpart B. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS

CHAPTER 93. STATE CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTIONS AND FACILITIES

Subchapter A. RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES

- § 93.12. [Care and treatment] Prison Medical Services Program.
- (a) Every institution will establish procedures to permit inmates to have access to health care staff, prescribed treatment for serious medical needs, appropriate nutrition, exercise and personal hygiene items.
- (b) The following words and phrases, when used in this section, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

 ${\it Department} {\it --} The \ \ Department \ \ of \ \ Corrections \ \ of \ the \ Commonwealth.$

Fee—The portion of the actual cost of a medical service provided to an inmate which the Department has determined shall be charged to the inmate.

Health care professional—A physician, physician assistant, nurse, dentist, optometric professional or other person licensed to provide health care under the laws of the Commonwealth.

Inmate—A person confined to a correctional institution, motivational boot camp, community corrections center or other facility operated by the Department, its agent or contractor.

Medical service—A service the object of which is the diagnosis, evaluation, treatment or preservation of the health of the human body, including its organs, structures, systems or other components. The term shall be interpreted broadly and includes, but not be limited to, diagnostic testing, prescribing and administering medication, surgical procedures, dental care, eye care, the furnishing of prosthetic appliances and devices and any other type of treatment or preventative care, whether performed on an inpatient or outpatient basis.

- (c) The Department will charge a fee to an inmate for one or more of the following:
 - (1) Medical service requested by the inmate.
- (2) Nonemergency medical service provided to the inmate unless the medical service is provided during a follow-up appointment or was previously recommended or prescribed by a health care professional employed by the Department or its contractors.
- (3) Medical service provided to the inmate as the result of a self-inflicted injury or illness, including emergency medical service provided to the inmate as the result of a self-inflicted injury or illness.
- (4) An initial medication prescription except as provided in subsection (d).
- (5) Medical service provided to another inmate as a result of assaultive conduct engaged in by the inmate to be charged the fee.
- (6) Medical service provided to the inmate as a result of an injury or illness arising from the inmate's participation in a sport.
- (7) Medical service provided to the inmate to determine whether the inmate's physical condition is suitable for participation in a sport unless the medical service is provided as part of the inmate's initial, annual or biennial physical examination.
- (d) The Department will not charge a fee to an inmate for any of the following:
- (1) A physical, dental or mental health screening provided to the inmate upon intake.
- (2) An immunization, tuberculosis test, Hepatitis B vaccination or other treatment initiated by the Department for public health reasons.
 - (3) An institutional transfer screening.
- (4) An annual and biennial physical and dental examination.
- (5) A medical service provided to the inmate during a follow-up appointment scheduled by a health care professional employed by the Department or its contractors.
 - (6) Mental health treatment.
 - (7) Chronic care.
 - (8) Infirmary and long-term care.

- (9) A medical referral ordered by a health care professional employed by the Department or its contractors.
- (10) A medical service provided to the inmate during a medical emergency unless the medical emergency resulted from a self-inflicted injury or illness as determined by the health care professional providing the medical service.
- (11) A l aboratory test, electrocardiogram, dressing change or other treatment ordered by a health care professional employed by the Department or its contractors.
 - (12) A prenatal care.
- (13) A medical service provided as a result of an injury or illness arising from the inmate's institutional work assignment.
- (14) Medication prescription subsequent to the initial medication prescription provided to an inmate for the same illness or condition.
- (15) A social service program including, but not limited to, substance abuse groups and counseling.
 - (16) A psychotropic medication.
- (17) A medication prescribed for the inmate for public health reasons.
- (18) A physical, dental and mental health screening performed at the request of the Department.
- (19) A medical service provided to the inmate to determine whether the inmate's physical condition is suitable for an institutional work assignment.
 - (20) An eyeglass prescription.
 - (21) Dentures.
- (22) Prosthetic devices excluding customized items.
- (e) The fee for a medical service in subsection (c) is \$2, except that an inmate shall be required to pay a fee equivalent to two-thirds of the total cost of medical services provided to another inmate as a result of the inmate's assaultive conduct. The fee will be assessed each time a medical service in subsection (c) is provided to the inmate or as a result of the inmate's actions. The Department may modify the fee to be charged for any medical

- service in subsection (c). Each inmate will receive 60 days written notice of the implementation of the Prison Medical Services Program (Program). Each inmate will receive written notice of any changes in medical service fees and payment procedures at least 60 days prior to the effective date of the changes.
- (f) Payment for any medical service in subsection (c) shall be accomplished according to the following procedures:
- (1) At the time a medical service is to be provided to the inmate, the inmate will be informed by the Department or its health care contractor whether a fee will be charged for the medical service and will be provided with an authorization form. The authorization form will describe the medical service to be provided and authorize the institution to deduct the fee from the inmate's account.
- (2) An inmate who wishes to receive a medical service after being advised that a fee will be charged for the medical service, shall sign the authorization form acknowledging that the inmate's account will be debited for the fee. A nonemergency medical service will not be provided to an inmate who refuses to sign the authorization form after having been advised that a fee will be charged for the medical service. An inmate will not be denied access to medical services because of an inability to pay the required fee. If an inmate lacks sufficient funds to pay a medical service fee, the inmate's account will be debited and the fee recouped as soon as sufficient funds are deposited in the inmate's account.
- (3) The Department may seek to recover any amount owed for medical services fees by an inmate upon release in the manner provided by law.
- (g) Inmates who have medical insurance shall pay for their own medical needs through that insurance by submitting the proper paperwork to their insurance carrier.
- (h) The Department will include an explanation of the Program in the *Inmate Handbook*.

The Department of Community and Economic Development (DĈED) proposes to adopt the Commonwealth's Action Plan for (FFY) 1998 and the program year which starts on January 1, 1998. The 1998 Action Plan is an annual update of the Commonwealth's Consolidated Plan for FFY 1995 through 1999. The Action Plan contained herein is the third annual update of the Consolidated Plan submitted by the Commonwealth.

The 1998 Action Plan (Plan) updates documents previously submitted to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development(HUD). These documents include the nonhousing community development plan and changes that DCED implemented in the application process concerning the three programs administered by DCED. The programs administered by DCED are the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), the

HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) and the Emergency Shelter Grant(ESG) programs. The Department of Health (DOH) administers the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) program. No changes other than the reorganization of DOH are reported concerning the HOPWA program.

This summary is designed to provide an opportunity to citizens, local government officials and interested organizations of the Commonwealth to comment about the Plan. Written comments should be submitted to Aldona Kartorie, Office of Community Development and Housing, Department of Community and Economic Development, Room 509 Forum Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120. Written comments must be received by November 3, 1997.

In addition, a public hearing has been scheduled as follows: October 21, 1997, Department of Community and Economic Development, Room 321 Forum Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120, 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

Applicants for funding from Federal housing programs must obtain certification that their proposed use of HUD assistance will be consistent with the applicable Plan for the area.

The Plan will have a major impact on the types, location and number of affordable housing units generated and preserved in this Commonwealth as well as the infrastructure and public facilities, services and other economic and community development initiatives that Commonwealth communities will undertake.

Content

The major change discussed in the Plan is the Single Application Process implemented by DCED on July 1, 1997. No other major changes have occurred and all priorities are intact. DCED has undertaken the initiative, for the first time ever, to apply for Super NOFA funding.

HAZARDOUS SITES CLEAN-UP

Proposed Response Gilbert Darnley/Petroleum Recovery Services Site, Greene Township, Beaver County.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1304) (HSCA), is proposing a response action for the Darnley Site, located at 105 Francis Drive, Greene Township. The Darnley Site is approximately 1 acre in size and was used for the disposal of hazardous and residual wastes.

During an emergency action, the Department removed more than 100,000 gallons of waste from the site that was contained in drums and tanks, and also removed visible contaminated surface soils. Information collected by the Department during the emergency response show that buried wastes and contaminated subsurface soils remain on site and may possibly affect groundwater and surface water. Because groundwater is a source of drinking water for adjacent residents and surface water is used for live stock, a potential threat exists by direct contact.

The purpose of the proposed response is to determine 1) the nature and extent of groundwater contamination, 2) the nature and extent of soil contamination, 3) the volume and nature of waste remaining onsite, 4) the potential risk posed to residential wells, and 5) the need for remedial action.

The Department considered the following options: (1) no action, (2) restricting access by fencing the site, and (3) further investigation to characterize the site and risk posed by the site.

Options 1 and 2 would allow potential hazardous wastes to remain onsite to possibly affect groundwater and surface waters. Additionally, no risks would be identified under these options.

Option 2 would restrict direct contact with the waste but not qualify any risks associated with groundwater and surface water. Option 3 would characterize the nature of the risks and provide a basis for determining any remedial response action.

The Department proposes Option 3 be implemented.

This notice is being provided under section 506(b) of HSCA. The administrative record which contains the information that forms the basis and documents the selection of this response action is available for public review and comment. Notice of Intent to Revise Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) Landfill Operating Permit

Under section 111(d) of the 1990 Clean Air Act Amendments, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promulgated Emission Guidelines (EG) for existing MSW landfills to control the emission of landfill gases. Proposed Revision to the State Implementation Plan for Oxides of Nitrogen and Volatile Organic Compounds and Notice of Public Hearing

On December 19, 1996, the Department of Environmental Protection conducted a public hearing to solicit comments on a proposed nitrogen oxides Reasonably Available Control Technology (RACT) determination and proposed operating permit issuance for various combustion sources (boilers, and the like) owned and operated by The Magee Carpet Company in the Town of Bloomsburg, Columbia County. The Department subsequently issued an operating permit, identified as OP-19-0001, to The Magee Carpet Company for these sources on January 22, 1997 and, on July 7, 1997, transferred the respective operating permit to a successor, Magee Rieter Automotive Systems.

Magee found that it was unable to meet the nitrogen oxides emission limit established in operating permit OP-19-0001 for one of its combustion sources, a 60 million BTU per hour anthracite coal and carpet scrap pelletfired traveling grate boiler identified as boiler #4, and further determined that this failure was due to an erroneous estimation of the boiler's nitrogen oxides emission potential at the time of the RACT plan and operating permit application submission.

Magee has now identified the boiler's true nitrogen oxides emission potential and has provided the Department with a revised RACT analysis for the respective boiler. After evaluating this information, the Department has made a preliminary determination that the proposed revisions should be approved.

The revised nitrogen oxides emission limits and annual coal/carpet scrap pellet usage limitation to which the Department has preliminarily determined boiler #4 should be subject to are .55 pounds of nitrogen oxides per million BTU of heat input, 57.8 tons of nitrogen oxides per 12 consecutive month period and 9,150 tons of coal and carpet scrap pellets burned per 12 consecutive month period.

If approved, the revised nitrogen oxides emission limits and coal/carpet scrap pellet usage limitation will be incorporated into a revised operating permit and submitted to the United States Environmental Protection Agency as a revision to Pennsylvania State Implementation Plan.

One public hearing will be held for the purpose of receiving comments on the proposed revised operating permit and the proposed SIP revision. The hearing will be held on November 5, 1997 at 1 p.m. at the DEP Northcentral Regional Office, 208 West Third Street, Suite 101, Williamsport, PA. The public is invited to comment on the proposal. Revised NPDES General Permit PAG-2 for Discharges of Stormwater Associated With Construction Activities (1997 Amendment)

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) by this notice is revising and renewing the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit for Stormwater Discharges Associated with Construction Activity (PAG-2) which was originally issued on October 10, 1992 (22 Pa.B 5063) with technical corrections on January 23, 1993 (23 Pa.B 492). PAG-2 is scheduled to expire on October 9, 1997. On October 19, 1996, the Department published a notice of proposed revisions to PAG-2 in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, 26 Pa. B. 5055, with a 30-day public comment period. The Department has received comments regarding the proposed revisions from 17 individuals representing the building industry, county conservation districts and State and Federal agencies. After consideration of the comments, the Department is amending the permit as follows:

- The filing fee has been increased from the current \$100 to \$250.
- The upper acreage limitation of 25 acres for participation in PAG-2 has been eliminated.
- Monitoring requirements have been revised to require visual site inspections of erosion and sediment control best management practices.
- Requirements have been added for preconstruction notification and conferences.
- Erosion and sediment control plans are required to be developed, submitted and approved for all spoil areas, borrow areas and phased projects.
- The permit encourages pollution prevention techniques by prohibiting its use in special protection waters, and by requiring proper disposal or recycling of building materials and wastes.
- The permit has been clarified so that both the permittee and copermittees are responsible for filing transfer agreements, maintaining erosion and sediment control best management practices (BMPs), and providing required notifications to the reviewing entity.
- Requirements have been added for the consideration of Federal and State threatened or endangered species and their habitat.
- Clarification has been provided to ensure that coal and noncoal mining activities are not eligible for coverage under this permit.
- Clarification has been added to ensure that wetlands are adequately protected.
- Conditions of the permit which were determined to be unnecessary, redundant or prescriptive have been eliminated.

Extension of Coverage under PAG-2 issued in 1992

The Department is, by this notice, granting permission for persons who submitted an administratively complete and acceptable Notice of Intent (NOI) seeking coverage under PAG-2 (1992) on or after April 9, 1997, but before October 10, 1997, to continue their stormwater discharge associated with construction activities until October 9, 2002 under the terms and conditions of PAG-2 (1992).

The Department is, by this notice, extending the coverage of PAG-2 (1992) until December 31, 1997 for those persons who submitted an administratively complete and acceptable NOI prior to April 9, 1997. Persons in this category who wish to continue a stormwater discharge associated with construction activities may extend coverage beyond December 31, 1997 under PAG-2 (1992) by submitting an administratively complete and acceptable NOI on or before December 31, 1997. Upon receipt of an administratively complete and acceptable NOI, the reviewing entity will acknowledge and administratively extend the coverage under the terms and conditions of PAG-2 (1992) until October 9, 2002. The fee for continued coverage is \$100.

Persons seeking to continue a discharge of stormwater associated with construction activities, who do not submit an NOI request for extension of coverage on or before December 31, 1997 must apply for PAG-2 (1997 Amendment), or an individual NPDES Permit for Stormwater Discharge Associated with Construction Activities, to extend the coverage.

New Authorizations for Stormwater Discharges Associated with Construction Activities

Persons requesting authorization on or after October 10, 1997 to discharge stormwater associated with construction activities must apply for coverage under PAG-2 (1997 Amendment) accompanied by a \$250 filing fee, or an individual NPDES Permit for Stormwater Discharges Associated with Construction Activities.

Public Comment and Response

The major public comments and the Department's responses follow:

A commentator questioned the justification for a renewal fee, and for increasing the processing fee from \$100 to \$250 for projects under PAG-2 (1997 Amendment). Under the NPDES regulations at 25 Pa. Code, Chapter 92, the renewal of permit coverage requires an application fee. By this notice, the Department is continuing the \$100 fee for renewal of coverage under PAG-2 (1992). The justification for increasing the fee for PAG-2 (1997 Amendment) is based on a survey conducted by the Department of the actual costs associated with the processing of a permit application and related activities by the reviewing entities. The results of the survey indicated that the cost of processing a NOI averaged 12.5 hours per application at a rate of \$20 per hour or \$250.

One commentator recommended that clarification be provided for phased projects and the requirements for specific erosion and sediment control plans. The Department has clarified that the coverage under the permit is only granted for those phases or parcels of a project that have an approved erosion and sediment control plan.

One commentator questioned whether there is a need for individual NPDES permits for stormwater discharges from construction activities. Discharges of stormwater associated with construction activity that do not meet the terms and conditions of PAG-2 (for example, discharges to waters classified as special protection), or that fall within § 92.83(b) (relating to inclusion of individual dischargers in general NPDES permits), must seek an individual NPDES permit to discharge.

A commentator recommended that a wetland determination be conducted if hydric soils are present prior to authorizing coverage under a general permit. The Department has amended the permit so that when the reviewing entity finds that hydric soils are present, a wetland determination may be required to adequately determine the effectiveness of the erosion and sediment control plan.

A commentator recommended that the PA Natural Diversity Inventory (PNDI) be utilized to search for potential impacts to threatened and endangered species during the general permit review. The Department has amended the permit to be consistent with the proposed EPA general permit for stormwater discharged from construction activities, 62 Fed. Reg. 29785 (June 2, 1997), which requires protection of Federal threatened and endangered species and their habitat.

One commentator requested that the Department state the effluent limitations for sediment discharges, and describe how monitoring of these discharges is to be conducted. Effluent limitations are in the form of properly designed, implemented and maintained best management practices. Permittees and copermittees must conduct visual inspection of their best management practices weekly and after each rain event to ensure that the best management practices are working properly and effectively to prevent pollution to waters of this Commonwealth.

The proposed revisions to this general permit have been sent to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Regional Administrator for Region III. The scope of work includes, but is not limited to, replacement of existing floating Pier Nos. 2, 5, 6 and 7; add utilities to Pier No. 4; rehabilitate two comfort stations to include ADA requirements; rehabilitate existing utilities on Piers A and B and replace roof on Administration Building.

Project No. DGS 182-14—Flood Protection Project, Borough of Coalport, Clearfield County, PA. Construction

Cost: \$1,000,000. The scope of work includes, but is not limited to, earth levees, concrete flood walls, stream channel improvements, and the like on Clearfield Creek, Blain Run and an unnamed tributary. The flood protection line could be as much as 7,000 feet.

Request for Information Regarding Campaign Finance Reporting Software

Introduction

On May 20, 1997, Governor Tom Ridge and Secretary of the Commonwealth Yvette Kane unveiled the Ridge Administration's initiative for disclosure of campaign finance information to the public through electronic filing and posting of campaign contribution and expense reports. The initiative is funded by a \$370,000 appropriation requested by the Governor and approved by the General Assembly for the current fiscal year. The Department of State (Department) and its administrative head, Secretary Kane, are responsible for planning and implementing the initiative.

Through a Request for Information (RFI) the Department is seeking comment from computer software vendors regarding the development of campaign contribution and expense report software. In particular, the Department is asking vendors to critique the format and specifications for reporting software that it proposes to mandate, which are briefly summarized. Vendors may also inform the Department whether they intend to make their products compatible with the Department's software specifications, and thereby enable their customers to produce reports on diskette for filing with the Department.

Purpose and Goals of the Campaign Finance Disclosure Initiative

The purpose of the initiative is to put the Commonwealth in the forefront of the states in providing accurate, timely information to the public about political campaign contributions and expenditures. The initiative also furthers Governor Ridge's commitment to provide greater public access to information maintained by the government in a more "user-friendly" manner.

Beginning with the primary election cycle in the Spring of 1998, the campaign contribution and expense reports filed by all candidates for Statewide office (that is, Governor and Lieutenant Governor) and their campaign committees will be posted on the Commonwealth's Internet homepage for public inspection. The Department is currently developing an electronic campaign finance database with auxiliary components necessary for processing the database information and posting it to the web.

Initially, the Department will accept campaign contribution and expense reports for electronic filing only on micro diskette. The Department is exploring the possibility of accepting the reports via modem or some other form of electronic file transfer in the future. In order to facilitate the timely, accurate and efficient disclosure of campaign finance data on the Internet, the Governor and the Secretary have publicly advocated that the 1998 primary candidates for Statewide office and their committees file their reports on diskette.

Information obtained from paper form filings will have to be manually entered into the database. Since manual data entry is expensive and time-consuming, it is in the interests of both public information and government efficiency that as many candidates as possible adopt diskette filing as early as possible. One of the ultimate goals of the initiative is to make diskette filing preferable to paper form filing.

Another of the Administration's goals is to post on the Internet all candidate and committee reports filed with the Department by the year 2000. There are approximately 12,000 campaign finance reports filed with the Department each year.

Pennsylvania's Campaign Finance Reporting System

The Campaign Expense Reporting Law (law) (25 P. S. §§ 3241-3260b) governs the disclosure of contribution and expenditure information in Pennsylvania elections. The Law defines contributions and expenditures, identifies the candidates and political committees required to file reports, establishes a schedule of reporting, prohibits the making of contributions or expenditures by certain entities and creates a system of enforcement.

The Secretary of the Commonwealth is the official responsible for administering certain aspects of the law Statewide and the supervisor of campaign finance reporting by candidates for Statewide office, the General Assembly and most judicial offices, as well as the committees established to support those candidates. The campaign finance disclosure initiative encompasses only those reports that are filed with the Secretary in the Department's Bureau of Commissions, Elections and Legislation. Most candidates for local government office and their affiliated committees file reports at the county level.

The Secretary has the authority, among other things, to prescribe the forms for the various reports and statements required by the law. Filers who submit their contribution and expense reports on diskette in the approved format will no longer have to use or file the Department's paper "Campaign Expense Report" form (Form DSEB-502). However, for the purposes of authentication, a diskette filer will be required to submit a one-page affidavit form bearing the required original signatures.

The Secretary has prescribed other types of registration and report forms for the use of candidates and committees. The Department does not immediately intend to accept diskette filing of these other forms. However, the Department is hopeful that vendors will provide software that enables their clients to complete and print hard copies of the other types of forms.

Summary of Proposed Software Format and Specifications for Diskette Filing

The Department proposes to accept a contribution and expense report on diskette in lieu of a paper Form DSEB-502 only if the format and content of the diskette meets the Department's technical specifications. Vendors should be aware that the specifications, as set forth in the following, are still in the proposal stage and are subject to revision before final approval and publication.

A report must be submitted on a 3.5 inch micro diskette formatted for 1.44 megabyte capacity. Only MS-DOS/Windows compatible diskettes will be accepted. If necessary, a single report may be submitted on more than one diskette.

All data files must use the ASCII character set. All data files must be coma (,) delimited, that is, a coma must

separate all fields in the data files. All data files must be text qualified with double quotation marks (""), that is, any field defined as alphanumeric, and only a field so defined, must be enclosed by double quotation marks. A sample of the mandatory data file format is provided as follows:

1234, "Mary Jones", 150.00, "123 East Main Street", "Anytown", "PA", "171021234"

In this sample, there are seven fields. The first field is a numeric registration number field, followed by an alphanumeric name field, a numeric dollar amount field, an alphanumeric address field, an alphanumeric city field, an alphanumeric state code field, and finally, an alphanumeric zip code field.

A diskette may contain up to five data files, as follows:

- The FILER.TXT file will store basic information about the candidate or committee filing the report. This file must be included in all diskette reports.
- The file designated CONTRIB.TXT will consist of a separate record for each monetary or in-kind contribution received from a contributor who, during the reporting period, made one or more contributions to the candidate or committee in an aggregate amount or value in excess of \$50. This file must also be included in all reports submitted on diskette.
- The RECEIPT.TXT file will consist of a separate record for each receipt obtained by the candidate or committee during the reporting period that was not a monetary or in-kind contribution. Examples of the receipts to be included in this file are interest income, loans and refunds. If the candidate or committee obtains no receipts during the reporting period, this file need not be included in the diskette report.
- EXPENSE.TXT will consist of a separate record for each expenditure made by the candidate or committee during the reporting period. This file must also be included in all reports submitted on diskette.
- The DEBT.TXT file will consist of a separate record for each unpaid debt or obligation of the candidate or committee that remains outstanding as of the end of the reporting period. If there are no outstanding debts or obligations as of the end of the reporting period, this file need not be included in the diskette report.

Multiple campaign finance reports may be filed at one time. For example, a candidate's report may be submitted along with the report of an associated political committee. In the case of multiple filings, the FILER.TXT file must contain one record for each candidate or committee that is submitting a report, and there must be separate CONTRIB.TXT, RECEIPT.TXT, EXPENSE.TXT and DEBT.TXT files for each candidate or committee. If a multiple filing is too large to fit on one diskette, the required files may be put on more than one diskette. However, no single text file may span more than one diskette.

The RFI includes the following attachments that provide detailed information about the proposed software specifications and the campaign finance reporting system:

- Appendix A, which is a copy of the Department's informational pamphlet entitled "Campaign Expense Reporting Law," which includes the text of the Law;
- Appendix B, which is a copy of the basic paper form approved by the Secretary for the reporting of contributions and expenditures, Form DSEB-502 (revised 12/85);

• Appendix C, which contains copies of other basic forms prescribed by the Secretary for the use of filers;

- Appendix D, a chart listing 1998 election dates and the campaign finance reporting schedule for 1998, which is representative of the Law's annual reporting regimen;
- Appendix E, which contains detailed file layouts and specifications for each of the five data files listed above and completion instructions for the fields within each file;
- Appendix F, which contains lists of the county codes, election cycle report codes, expense codes, party codes and office codes that candidates and committees must use to complete certain fields in a campaign contribution and expense report on diskette.

General Response Guidelines

The following is a list of topics that the Department encourages software vendors to discuss in their responses to the RFI:

- Are you willing and able to make your products compatible with the Department's proposed software format and specifications, and thereby enable diskette filing by your customers who must file reports with the Department?
- If the answer to the above question is "yes," can you make and distribute the necessary software modifications prior to the 1998 Primary Election reporting cycle? If the answer to the above question is "no," why not? Would your answer be different if the Department were to change its proposed filing format or specifications in any way?
- Do you have any comments regarding the structure of the Department's proposed electronic filing format, and can you suggest any modifications to improve or simplify campaign contribution and expense reporting on diskette?
- Are there necessary files or fields missing from the Department's proposed specifications? Should any of the fields be enlarged to accommodate more characters?
- Are the Department's proposed instructions for completing the fields clear and adequate?
- Do you have any comments regarding the proposed filing codes? Can you recommend additional expense codes that diskette filers might commonly use?

This list is not all-inclusive, and the Department welcomes all information and comment on the RFI subject that any vendor wishes to provide. Responding vendors may wish to address only some of the suggested topics or other topics altogether, which is acceptable to the Department.

All responses to the RFI become the property of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, which may use the responses for any purpose without incurring any obligation to compensate or seek the approval of any vendor. Opinion and Order

The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) continues to be concerned about the ability of many water and wastewater systems to meet the regulatory challenges of the future. Many systems are over 100 years old and require major reinvestment in basic infrastructure. These systems also face the requirements of new drinking water quality standards developed under the Safe Drinking Water Act, adding significantly to both capital costs and operating expenses. Many systems have not increased rates when needed and now find themselves nonprofitable and unable to acquire financing to make these necessary improvements. The number of customer service complaints have been increasing yearly and requests for large rate increases have also generated numerous rate complaints.

In 1990, the Commission joined with the Department of Environmental Resources (DER)(now Department of Environmental Protection (DEP)) and Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PENNVEST) in an interagency study—State Initiatives to Address Non-Viable Small Water Systems in Pennsylvania. The study concluded that, in order for a utility to be able to provide safe and reliable service at affordable rates, the utility must remain viable.

A viable water system is one which is self-sustaining and has the commitment and financial, managerial and technical capabilities to reliably meet Commission and DEP requirements on a long-term basis.

In order to assist in the overall objective of obtaining viability for all jurisdictional water systems in this Commonwealth, the Commission determined that it was appropriate to issue a Small Drinking Water System Viability Policy Statement at a Public Meeting on October 28, 1993. The Policy Statement defined viability and set forth the objective to work closely with DEP and other agencies and organizations involved in safe drinking water programs by discouraging the creation of new nonviable systems, and at the same time, encourage the restructur-

ing of existing nonviable systems. A comparable Viability Policy Statement was adopted by DEP on July 23, 1992.

To facilitate implementation of the Policy Statement, the Commission considered it imperative to work closely with DEP and formalized this working relationship with an interagency Memorandum of Understanding approved at the same Public Meeting. The signing of that Memorandum of Understanding marked a significant step to lead both agencies toward closer cooperation and improved regulatory actions in joint efforts to resolve the water purveyor challenges faced by this Commonwealth.

As an added implementation of the Policy Statement, the Commission also considers it imperative to work closely with PENNVEST and wishes to formalize this working relationship with an interagency Memorandum of Understanding. The signing of this Memorandum of Understanding will mark another significant step in closer cooperation and coordination of actions in joint efforts to resolve the water/wastewater system challenges of the Commission.

Accordingly, under 66 Pa. C.S. §§ 501, 1301, 1501 and 1505, section 102 of the act of July 31, 1968, (P. L. 769, No. 240), as amended, 45 P. S. § 1102, and 71 P. S. §§ 181—182 the Commission has the authority to approve this Memorandum of Understanding; *Therefore, It Is Ordered That:*

- 1. The Commission hereby adopts the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) as follows:
- 2. A copy of this Order together with the MOU be served upon the Office of Trial Staff, the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, the Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection and Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority.
- 3. Upon execution of the MOU, the Order and the MOU shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. *By the Commission*

Memorandum of Understanding

Between the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority and the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission

This Memorandum of Understanding entered into this 22nd day of July, 1997, by and between the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PENNVEST) and the Public Utility Commission (PUC), each agencies of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Whereas, Sections 501 and 502 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 181 and 182) require Commonwealth departments and agencies to coordinate their work and activities with other Commonwealth departments and agencies.

Whereas, both PENNVEST and the PUC are concerned about management and operational issues with potentially nonviable public water and wastewater systems which provide drinking water or wastewater service to the public.

Whereas, it is PENNVEST's and the PUC's objective to work closely together and with other agencies and organizations involved in the provision of safe drinking water to encourage the restructuring of troubled water systems in order to substantially reduce the number of existing nonviable water systems and ensure the long-term viability of all new drinking water systems.

Whereas, a viable system is one which is self-sustaining, has the commitment and the financial, managerial and technical capability to reliably meet Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and PUC requirements on a long-term basis.

Whereas, both agencies affirm that they will cooperate fully in achieving the common goal of improving water and wastewater system viability through various methods including regionalization and restructuring.

Now, Therefore, to accomplish the common goal of improving water and wastewater system viability, both agencies shall cooperatively undertake the following initiatives:

- (1) Develop joint policies to discourage the formation of new potentially nonviable water and wastewater systems and/or the continuation of existing nonviable water and wastewater systems. Use low interest loans, grants or other incentive based financing upon qualification where applicable.
- (2) Promote sound business operations and the continuous provision of quality water and wastewater service that meets the Safe Drinking Water Act, the requirements of the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and the Public Utility Code.
- (3) Encourage any existing system requesting PEN-NVEST funding to develop and implement comprehensive water and wastewater system facilities plans, management plans and financial plans in order to promote sound business operations and the continuous provision of quality service that meets the Safe Drinking Water Act, the requirements of the DEP and the Public Utility Code.
- (4) Participate in a joint application conference (DEP, PENNVEST, PUC) for prospective water and wastewater utilities to identify other options to the creation of any new system.
- (5) Encourage comprehensive planning at the local, county and regional levels to ensure water and wastewater system viability and to address potentially nonviable water and wastewater systems. Encourage use of the Business Plan as a viability assessment tool.
- (6) Foster and coordinate the restructuring of contiguous and noncontiguous public utility systems, some of which are nonviable, to form viable utility systems.
- (7) Provide and/or facilitate financial assistance and examine alternative rate-making and lending policies for projects which comply with the intent of items (2), (3), (4) and (5) above, and for projects which make systems viable through compliance with the intent of items (2), (3), (4) and (5) above.
- (8) Participate in the development of safety net programs and procedures to deal with nonviable or abandoned public utility systems. Implement solutions where applicable.
- (9) Educate the public, whenever possible, regarding public water and wastewater system regulation, planning and viability issues, as well as the associated cost and the public health benefits derived.
- (10) Jointly participate in the PUC "Problem Water Company Task Force," the "Friday Group," and the DEP Technical Assistance Center for Small Water Systems Board (TAC Board). Use DEP Statewide mapping data base identifying locations of all water systems.

- (11) Identify policies and procedures that present barriers to small system restructuring and seek solutions to these institutional barriers.
- (12) Meet as often as necessary, but at least quarterly, to review progress toward improving water and wastewater system viability in Pennsylvania, to resolve any issues which have been identified by the staff of either agency, and to educate agency staff concerning new regulations, requirements or policies.
- (13) For all water and wastewater systems having or applying for financial assistance from PENNVEST and regulated by the PUC, both agencies shall:
- (A) Continue to work together to develop strategies to address capacity development for troubled systems.
- (B) Work together to facilitate and/or coordinate regional solutions to troubled system problems whenever possible.
- (C) Explore all options to develop a more aggressive joint agency policy to collect delinquent loan payments of PUC regulated systems and reexamine PENNVEST collateral process options.
- (D) Work to ensure that troubled investor owned utilities with projects that have significant impact on public health, public safety, compliance and the environment have access to funding through the PENNVEST program.
- (E) Jointly, including DEP, attend any prefiling meetings whenever necessary.
- (F) Encourage all borrowers to file a "Self-Assessment Guide" with each loan application (PENNVEST) and applications for Certificates of Public Convenience (PUC). Jointly review each PUC regulated utility plan.
- (G) Develop and implement cooperative strategies that will enable any interested and eligible system to access the application process.
- (H) Work cooperatively to establish timely review of PUC regulated rate structures to meet scheduled PENNVEST debt service requirements.
- (14) For all water and wastewater systems having or applying for financial assistance from PENNVEST and regulated by the PUC, PENNVEST shall:
- (A) Inform PUC of all prefiling conferences and all applications filed with PENNVEST.
- (B) Make funds readily available to troubled investor owned utilities following the established PENNVEST rating criteria for obtaining assistance and financing priorities contained in the Act, and the requirements of the Federal and State revolving loan fund for drinking water systems.
- (C) Make loan funds available to capable and proximate viable systems: if they take over an identified proximate troubled system, or agree to acquire and improve a nonviable system that would otherwise qualify for funding.
- (D) Use available utility mapping data bases to identify systems that should be considered in regionalization projects.
- (E) Provide the PUC with a list of all projects per PENNVEST board meeting and the final action on each project.

- (F) Provide the PUC with a copy of the General Assembly Annual Report of PENNVEST yearly.
- (G) Make available all loan information pertaining to any PUC regulated utility for PUC audit purposes.
- (H) Institute an aggressive loan collection policy to insure the continued availability of PENNVEST funds.
- (I) Participate in ongoing initiatives, such as the "Problem Water Company Task Force" and the "Friday Group," to provide the lender's perspective on issues that relate to the investor owned water and wastewater utilities.
- (15) For all water and wastewater systems having or applying for financial assistance from PENNVEST and regulated by PUC, the PUC shall:
- (A) Institute an aggressive policy to support PEN-NVEST in collection of loans from PUC regulated water and wastewater utilities by developing an annual review process of all PUC regulated systems with PENNVEST financing.
- (B) Work toward regional solutions, wherever possible, when attempting to solve troubled system problems.
- (C) Require a business plan from all applicants requesting new Certificates of Public Convenience.
- (D) Approve the abandonment of service for a PUC regulated utility with an outstanding PENNVEST loan balance, only upon considering the status of the outstanding PENNVEST debt and/or satisfaction of said debt.
- (E) Use existing PUC enforcement policies, and/or develop new enforcement strategies, if necessary, to ensure that the rate increases approved by the PUC to pay for the PENNVEST debt service is used for the intended purpose.
- (F) When requested, provide PENNVEST with recommendations on investor owned utilities' ability to meet PUC standards as they relate to a system's financial, managerial and technical capacity.
- (G) When requested, participate in loan repayment meetings and support PENNVEST efforts to ensure repayment of funds loaned to PUC regulated utilities.
- (H) Notify PENNVEST on a timely basis of any known outstanding technical, managerial or financial capacity issues that relate to systems that may be, or have been, funded through PENNVEST.
- (I) Provide PENNVEST with a comprehensive list, by county, of all PUC regulated water and wastewater utilities in Pennsylvania, updated periodically.
- (J) Identify for PENNVEST any PUC regulated system project that may need assistance to fund capital improvements including: utility name, address, contact person, phone number and the type of improvement anticipated and related construction cost estimate if available.

The parties to this Memorandum set forth the following as the terms and conditions of their understanding:

- (1) This Memorandum is not intended to and does not create any contractual rights or obligations with respect to the signatory agencies or any other parties;
- (2) Any dispute arising hereunder shall be submitted to the Office of General Counsel for final resolution; and
- (3) Either party may terminate this Memorandum upon written notice to the other party.

The parties hereby acknowledge the foregoing as the terms and conditions of their understanding.
