READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania* *Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Proclamation

Implementing the National Incident Management System

December 20, 2004

Whereas, In Homeland Security Directive (HSPD)-5, the President directed the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security to develop and administer a National Incident Management System (NIMS), which would provide a consistent nationwide approach for federal, state, local, and tribal governments to work together more effectively and efficiently to prevent, prepare for, respond to, and recover from domestic incidents, regardless of cause, size or complexity; and

Whereas, the collective input and guidance from all federal, state, local, and tribal homeland security partners has been, and will continue to be, vital to the development, effective implementation and utilization of a comprehensive NIMS; and

Whereas, it is necessary that all federal, state, local, and tribal emergency agencies and personnel coordinate their efforts to effectively and efficiently provide the highest levels of incident management; and

Whereas, to facilitate the most efficient and effective incident management it is critical that federal, state, local, and tribal organizations utilize standardized terminology, standardized organizational structures, interoperable communications, consolidated action plans, unified command structures, uniform personnel qualification standards, uniform standards for planning, training, and exercising, comprehensive resource management, and designated incident facilities during emergencies or disasters; and

Whereas, the NIMS standardized procedures for managing personnel, communications, facilities and resources will improve the state's ability to utilize federal funding to enhance local and state agency readiness, maintain first responder safety, and streamline incident management processes; and

Whereas, the Incident Command System components of NIMS are already an integral part of various incident management activities throughout the state, including all public safety and emergency response organizations training programs; and

Whereas, the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks (9-11 Commission) recommended adoption of a standardized Incident Command System.

Now Therefore, Pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the provisions of the Emergency Management Services Code (35 Pa.C.S. Section 7101 et seq., as amended), I do hereby mandate the National Incident Management System be utilized for all incident management in the Commonwealth. I further proclaim this to take effect immediately.

Given under my hand and the Seal of the Governor, at the City of Harrisburg, this twentieth day of December in the year of our Lord two thousand four and of the Commonwealth the two hundred and twenty-ninth.

On October 23, 2004, the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing published proposed revisions to the sentencing guidelines (34 Pa.B. 5746) for purposes of soliciting comments. Public hearings were held in the following locations:

During its Quarterly Meeting on Wednesday, December 15, 2004, the Commission adopted several changes to the initial proposal, both in response to comments received and relating to recently enacted legislation. The Commission is hereby submitting these modified proposed revisions to the sentencing guidelines for purposes of soliciting comments.

The Commission will be holding a public hearing to receive comments on the modified proposed revisions to the sentencing guidelines as follows:

The Commission will evaluate the proposed revisions after consideration of the testimony and comments re-ceived. Any amendments adopted by the Commission will be submitted to the General Assembly for review via publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. Proposed amendments become effective 90 days after publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin unless rejected by concurrent resolution of the General Assembly.

Commentary on Annex A

The Commission adopted the following changes to the initial proposal (34 Pa.B. 5746), both in response to comments received and relating to recently enacted legislation.

Revisions to Sections 303.4 through 303.8—Prior Record Score

The standards contained in this section relate to Prior Record Score (PRS) policies, including the PRS categories, identification of previous adjudications and convictions included in the calculation of the PRS, and the relative weight of those previous adjudications and convictions in determining the PRS category. The PRS reflects both the number and severity of previous adjudications and convictions. The PRS is not a separate punishment, but rather a reflection of the seriousness of previous offenses.

The initial proposal contained a modification of the definition of REVOC in Section 303.4(a)(1) to limit its application to offenders with a current conviction and two

or more previous convictions or adjudications for crimes of violence. This was viewed as consistent with the original intent in the development of the REVOC category in the 4th Edition guidelines. In response to concerns expressed during public hearings that such a change would reduce recommendations for serious Level 5 offenders with two previous convictions for crimes of violence, the Commission is proposing a return to the definition of REVOC contained in the 5th Edition guidelines: offenders who have two or more previous convictions or adjudications for four-point offenses and whose current conviction carries an Offense Gravity Score of 9 or higher.

The initial proposal also contained a modification to the description of prior convictions in Section 303.5 concerning un-sentenced convictions and adequacy of prior record score. The Commission is proposing modified descriptions to clarify the intent of the subsections and to address concerns regarding the use of excluded offenses.

Revisions to Sections 303.9 through 303.14—Guideline sentence recommendations

The standards contained in this section relate to guideline sentence recommendations, including general provisions, enhancements for possession or use of a deadly weapon, enhancements for distribution of a controlled substance to a minor or in a school zone, sentencing levels and programs, aggravated and mitigated circumstances, and economic sanctions.

In Section 303.10 the Commission has proposed a narrowing of the circumstances for which the deadly weapon/used enhancement would apply. The enhancement would continue to apply if an offender used a deadly weapon to threaten or injure another individual, but not if it was otherwise used in the furtherance of the crime. Neither deadly weapon enhancement would apply to a theft when the property stolen was a firearm. The Commission also has proposed a refinement of the definition of 'school' in the Youth/School Enhancement to reflect that the enhancement applies when the distribution occurs within 1000 feet of the real property on which the school is located. Both of these proposals are in response to recent decisions by the Pennsylvania Superior Court.

In Sections 303.11and 303.12, the Commission has incorporated the recently enacted state intermediate punishment sentencing alternative into the sentencing levels and sentencing programs sections.

PART VIII. CRIMINAL SENTENCING

CHAPTER 303. SENTENCING GUIDELINES

§ 303.1. Sentencing guidelines standards.

(a) The court shall consider the sentencing guidelines in determining the appropriate sentence for offenders convicted of, or pleading guilty or nolo contendere to, felonies and misdemeanors. Where crimes merge for sentencing purposes, the court shall consider the sentencing guidelines only on the higher graded offense.

(b) The sentencing guidelines do not apply to sentences imposed as a result of the following: accelerated rehabilitative disposition; disposition in lieu of trial; direct or indirect contempt of court; violations of protection from abuse orders; revocation of probation, intermediate punishment or parole.

(c) The sentencing guidelines shall apply to all offenses committed on or after the effective date of the guidelines. Amendments to the guidelines shall apply to all offenses committed on or after the date the amendment becomes part of the guidelines.

(1) When there are current multiple convictions for offenses that overlap two sets of guidelines, the former guidelines shall apply to offenses that occur prior to the effective date of the amendment and the later guidelines shall apply to offenses that occur on or after the effective date of the amendment. If the specific dates of the offenses cannot be determined, then the later guidelines shall apply to all offenses.

(2) The initial sentencing guidelines went into effect on July 22, 1982 and applied to all crimes committed on or after that date. Amendments to the guidelines went into effect in June 1983, January 1986 and June 1986. On October 7, 1987 the Pennsylvania Supreme Court invalidated the guidelines due to a procedural error that occurred in 1981 when the legislature rejected the first set of guidelines. New guidelines were drafted and became effective on April, 25, 1988. Amendments to the guidelines went into effect August 9, 1991 and December 20, 1991. **[A revised] Revised** sets of guidelines became effective August 12, 1994 and June 13, 1997.

(d) In every case in which **[the] a** court of record imposes a sentence for a felony or misdemeanor, the court shall make as a part of the record, and disclose in open court at the time of sentencing, a statement of the reason or reasons for the sentence imposed. In every case where **[the] a** court of record imposes an aggravated or mitigated sentence, or a sentence outside the sentencing guidelines, **[the court shall provide a contempo**raneous written statement of **]** the reason or reasons for the deviation from the standard range of the guidelines [. These reasons] shall be recorded on the Guideline Sentence Form, a copy of which [is forwarded] shall be electronically transmitted to the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing in the manner described in § 303.1(e).

(e) [A Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing Guideline Sentence Form shall be completed at the court's direction and shall be made a part of the record no later than 30 days after the date of each sentencing and a copy shall be forwarded to the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing.] Unless otherwise provided by the Commission, the JNETbased Sentencing Guidelines Software Web application (SGS Web) shall be used at the court's direction to prepare all guideline-required sentencing information. The completed Guideline Sentence Form shall be made a part of the record and the information electronically submitted to the Commission via SGS Web no later than 30 days after the date of sentencing.

§ 303.2. Procedure for determining the guideline sentence.

(a) For each conviction offense of a judicial proceeding, t[T]he procedure for determining the guideline sentence shall be as follows:

(1) Determine the Offense Gravity Score as described in § 303.3 and § 303.15.

(2) Determine the Prior Record Score as described in § 303.4—§ 303.8.

(3) Determine the guideline sentence recommendation as described in § 303.9—§ 303.14, including Deadly Weapon Enhancement and Youth/School Enhancement (§ 303.10), and aggravating or mitigating circumstances (§ 303.13).

(b) Judicial proceeding. A judicial proceeding is a proceeding in which all offenses for which the offender has been convicted are pending before the court for sentencing at the same time. A judicial proceeding may include multiple offenses and transactions.

§ 303.3. Offense Gravity Score—general.

(a) An Offense Gravity Score is given for each offense. The Offense Gravity Scores are located in § 303.15.

(b) Subcategorized offenses. Certain offenses are subcategorized and scored by the Commission according to the particular circumstances of the offense. The court determines which Offense Gravity Score, located in § 303.15, applies. These offenses are designated by an asterisk [*].

(c) *Inchoate offenses*. Inchoate offenses are scored as follows:

(1) Convictions for attempt, solicitation, or conspiracy to commit a Felony 1 offense receive an Offense Gravity Score of one point less than the offense attempted, solicited, or which was the object of the conspiracy.

(2) Convictions for attempt, solicitation, or conspiracy to commit any offense which is not a Felony 1 offense, receive the Offense Gravity Score of the offense attempted, solicited, or which was the object of the conspiracy.

(3) Convictions for attempt, solicitation, or conspiracy to commit any offense under The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act (35 P. S. § 780-101 -§ 780-144) receive the Offense Gravity Score of the offense attempted, solicited, or which was the object of the conspiracy.

(4) Exception for inchoate murder convictions. Convictions for attempt, solicitation, or conspiracy to commit murder receive the Offense Gravity Score of 14 if there is serious bodily injury and 13 if there is no serious bodily injury.

(d) *Ethnic Intimidation.* Convictions for Ethnic Intimidation (18 Pa.C.S. § 2710) receive an Offense Gravity Score that is one point higher than the offense which was the object of the Ethnic Intimidation. When the object offense is murder of the third degree, a conviction for Ethnic Intimidation receives the highest Offense Gravity Score.

(e) Violations of The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act (35 P. S. §§ 780-101—780-144). If any mixture or compound contains any detectable amount of a controlled substance, the entire amount of the mixture or compound shall be deemed to be composed of the controlled substance. If a mixture or compound contains a detectable amount of more than one controlled substance, the mixture or compound shall be deemed to be composed entirely of the controlled substance which has the highest Offense Gravity Score.

(1) Exception for prescription pills. The exception to subsection (e) above is for violations of 35 P. S. § 780-113 (a)(12) **[(relating to fraudulent prescriptions)]**, (a)(14), and (a)(30) when **narcotic** prescription pills of Schedule II are involved. For such violations it is the number of pills rather than the amount of the controlled substance which is considered in determining the Offense Gravity Score. (See § 303.15.)

(f) Omnibus Offense Gravity Scores. The Omnibus Offense Gravity Score is applied when the offense is not otherwise listed in § 303.15, or when the grade of an offense listed in § 303.15 has changed, unless application of this section would result in a lower Offense Gravity Score for an increased grading of the offense. The Omnibus Offense Gravity Scores are provided below and in the listing at § 303.15:

§ 303.4. Prior Record Score—categories.

(a) *Prior Record Score categories.* Determination of the correct Prior Record Score category under this section is based on the type and number of prior convictions (§ 303.5) and prior juvenile adjudications (§ 303.6). There are eight Prior Record Score categories: Repeat Violent Offender [REVOC], Repeat Felony 1 and Felony 2 Offender [RFEL], and point-based categories of 0, 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.

(1) Repeat Violent Offender Category [REVOC]. Offenders who have two or more previous convictions or adjudications for four point offenses (§ 303.7(a)(1) and § 303.15) and whose current conviction carries an Offense Gravity Score of 9 or higher shall be classified in the Repeat Violent Offender Category.

(2) Repeat Felony 1 and Felony 2 Offender Category [RFEL]. Offenders who have previous convictions or adjudications for Felony 1 and/or Felony 2 offenses which total 6 or more in the prior record, and who do not fall within the Repeat Violent Offender Category, shall be classified in the repeat Felony 1 and Felony 2 Offender Category.

(3) *Point-based Categories (0-5).* Offenders who do not fall into the REVOC or RFEL categories shall be classified in a Point-based Category. The Prior Record Score shall be the sum of the points accrued based on previous convictions or adjudications, up to a maximum of five points.

§ 303.5. Prior Record Score—prior convictions.

[(a) All prior convictions shall be counted in the Prior Record Score, except certain prior convictions from sentences described in (b).

(b) When a sentence for a prior conviction was imposed totally concurrent to another sentence, or was served totally concurrent to another sentence, only the conviction with the greatest number of points under § 303.7 shall be counted.

(c) Totally concurrent. A conviction is considered totally concurrent if the sentence imposed did not increase the term of probation, intermediate punishment, partial or total confinement of any sentence.

(a) If there is a single offense in the judicial proceeding, that offense shall be counted in the calculation of the Prior Record Score.

(b) If there are multiple offenses in the judicial proceeding:

(1) The most serious offense of the judicial proceeding shall be counted in the calculation of the Prior Record Score.

(2) Any offense for which a sentence of partial or total confinement is imposed consecutive to a sentence for another offense in the judicial proceeding shall be counted in the calculation of the Prior Record Score.

(c) Un-sentenced convictions. If no sentence has yet to be imposed on an offense, the offense shall not be counted in the calculation of the Prior Record Score.

(d) Adequacy of the Prior Record Score. The court may consider at sentencing previous convictions, juvenile adjudications or dispositions not counted in the calculation of the Prior Record Score, in addition to other factors deemed appropriate by the court.

§ 303.6. Prior Record Score—prior juvenile adjudications.

(a) *Juvenile adjudication criteria*. Prior juvenile adjudications are counted in the Prior Record Score when the following criteria are met:

(1) The juvenile offense occurred on or after the offender's 14th birthday, and

(2) There was an express finding by the juvenile court that the adjudication was for a felony or one of the Misdemeanor 1 offenses listed in § 303.7(a)(4).

(b) Only the most serious juvenile adjudication of each prior disposition is counted in the Prior Record Score. No other prior juvenile adjudication shall be counted in the Prior Record Score. (c) *Lapsing of juvenile adjudications*. Prior juvenile adjudications for four point offenses listed in § 303.7(a)(1) shall always be included in the Prior Record Score, provided the criteria in subsection (a) above are met:

(1) All other juvenile adjudications not identified above in subsection (a) lapse and shall not be counted in the Prior Record Score if the offender was 28 years of age or older at the time the current offense was committed.

(2) Nothing in this section shall prevent the court from considering lapsed prior adjudications at the time of sentencing.

§ 303.7. Prior Record Score—guideline points scoring.

(a) Scoring of prior convictions and adjudications is provided below and in the listing of offenses at § 303.15:

(1) Four Point Offenses. Four points are added for each prior conviction or adjudication for the following offenses: Murder, and attempt, solicitation or conspiracy to commit Murder

[Voluntary Manslaughter]

Drug Delivery Resulting in Death

Aggravated Assault (causing serious bodily injury)

Kidnapping

Rape Involuntary Deviate Sexual Intercourse

Arson (resulting in bodily injury or a person inside at start)

Burglary (adapted structure, person present)

Robbery (inflicts serious bodily injury)

Robbery of Motor Vehicle (inflicts serious bodily injury)

All other completed crimes of violence, as defined in 42 Pa.C.S. § 9714(g), excluding inchoates.

Ethnic Intimidation to any Felony 1 offense

(2) *Three Point Offenses.* Three points are added for each prior conviction or adjudication for the following offenses:

All other Felony 1 offenses not listed in § 303.7 (a)(1). All **other** inchoates to offenses listed in § 303.7 (a)(1). **[Sexual Assault**

Aggravated Indecent Assault

Violation of 35 P. S. §§ 780-113(a)(12)(14) or (30) involving 50 grams or more, including inchoates involving 50 grams or more.

(3) Two Point Offenses. Two points are added for each

- prior conviction or adjudication for the following offenses: All other Felony 2 offenses not listed in § 303.7 (a)(1) or (a)(2).
 - All felony drug violations not listed in § 303.7 (a)(2), including inchoates.

(4) One Point Offenses. One point is added for each prior conviction or adjudication for the following offenses:

All other felony offenses not listed in § 303.7 (a)(1), (a)(2) or (a)(3).

Any of the following Misdemeanor 1 offenses that involve weapons:

Possessing Instruments of Crime (possession of a weapon)

Prohibited Offensive Weapons

Use or Possession of Electric or Electronic Incapacitation Device

Possession of Weapon on School Property

Possession of Firearm or Other Dangerous Weapon in Court Facility

Violations of the Pennsylvania Uniform Firearms Act

- Any of the following Misdemeanor 1 offenses that involve death or danger to children:
 - Involuntary Manslaughter Simple Assault (against child under 12 years of age by adult 21 years of age or older)
 - Luring a Child into a Vehicle
 - Indecent Assault ([involving minors] complainant is less than 13 years of age)
 - Indecent Exposure (persons **present are** less than age 16 [**present**])

Endangering Welfare of Children

Dealing in Infant Children

Corruption of Minors (of a sexual nature)

Unlawful contact or communication with minor [Homicide by Vehicle]

Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Controlled Substance [when the grade is a Misdemeanor

1.], except for a first offense.

(5) *Other Misdemeanor Offenses.* All other misdemeanor offenses are designated by an "m" in the offense listing at § 303.15, and are scored as follows:

(i) One point is added if the offender was previously convicted of two or three misdemeanors.

(ii) Two points are added if the offender was previously convicted of four to six misdemeanors.

(iii) Three points are added if the offender was previously convicted of seven or more misdemeanors.

§ 303.8. Prior Record Score—miscellaneous.

(a) Prior convictions and adjudications of delinquency. A prior conviction means "previously convicted" as defined in 42 Pa.C.S. § 2154(a)(2). A prior adjudication of delinquency means "previously adjudicated delinquent" as defined in 42 Pa.C.S. § 2154(a)(2). In order for an offense to be considered in the Prior Record Score, both the commission of and conviction for the previous offense must occur before the commission of the current offense.

(b) *Inchoate offenses.* Unless otherwise provided in § 303.7 or § 303.15, a prior conviction or adjudication of delinquency for criminal attempt, criminal solicitation or criminal conspiracy is scored under § 303.7 based upon the grade of the inchoate offense.

(c) *Ethnic Intimidation*. Unless otherwise provided in § 303.7 or § 303.15, a prior conviction or adjudication of delinquency for Ethnic Intimidation is scored under § 303.7 based upon the grade of the Ethnic Intimidation.

(d) Former Pennsylvania offenses.

(1) A prior conviction or adjudication of delinquency under former Pennsylvania law is scored as a conviction for the current equivalent Pennsylvania offense.

(2) When there is no current equivalent Pennsylvania offense, prior convictions or adjudications of delinquency are scored under § 303.7 based on the grade of the offense. When a prior conviction or adjudication of delinquency was for a felony, but the grade of the felony is unknown, it shall be treated as a Felony 3. When a prior conviction was for a misdemeanor, but the grade of the misdemeanor is unknown, it shall be treated as other misdemeanors. When it cannot be determined if the prior conviction was a felony, one point misdemeanors, or other misdemeanors, it shall be treated as other misdemeanors, it shall be treated as other misdemeanors. When a prior conviction is for a crime which has a summary grade, and the grade of the conviction is unknown, the prior conviction shall not be counted in the Prior Record Score.

(e) A prior conviction or adjudication of delinquency for an offense which was misgraded is scored as a conviction for the current equivalent Pennsylvania offense.

(f) Out-of-state, federal or foreign offenses.

(1) An out-of-state, federal or foreign conviction or adjudication of delinquency is scored as a conviction for the current equivalent Pennsylvania offense.

(2) A court-martial for a criminal offense under the Uniform Code of Military Justice is considered a federal conviction and is scored as a conviction for the current equivalent Pennsylvania offense. Non-judicial punishments or administrative actions (e.g., Article 15, Article 134) which are not convictions shall not be counted in the Prior Record Score.

(3) When there is no current equivalent Pennsylvania offense, determine the current equivalent Pennsylvania grade of the offense based on the maximum sentence permitted, and then apply § 303.8(d)(2).

(g) *Excluded offenses, charges and convictions.* The following types of offenses, charges and convictions shall not be scored in the Prior Record Score:

(1) Summary offenses, violations of local ordinances, direct or indirect contempt of court, violation of protection from abuse orders, and dispositions under Pa.R.Crim.P. Rules **[175–186] 300–320** (relating to accelerated rehabilitative disposition), 35 P. S. § 780-117 (relating to probation without verdict) or 35 P. S. § 780-118 (relating to disposition in lieu of trial or criminal punishment)**[**, shall not be used in computing the Prior Record Score **]**.

(2) A charge which is nolle prossed, dismissed, or on which a demurrer is sustained.

(3) Any prior conviction which contributed to an increase in the grade of a subsequent conviction, except for prior Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Controlled Substance convictions. [shall not be used in computing the Prior Record Score.]

§ 303.9. Guideline sentence recommendation: general.

(a) *Basic sentence recommendations*. Guideline sentence recommendations are based on the Offense Gravity Score and Prior Record Score. In most cases, the sentence recommendations are found in the Basic Sentencing Matrix (§ 303.16). The Basic Sentencing Matrix specifies a range of sentences (i.e.-standard range) that shall be considered by the court for each combination of Offense Gravity Score [OGS] and Prior Record Score [PRS].

(b) *Deadly Weapon Enhancement sentence recommendations.* If the court determines that an offender possessed a deadly weapon pursuant to § 303.10(a)(1), the court shall instead consider the DWE/Possessed Matrix (§ 303.17). If the court determines that an offender used a deadly weapon pursuant to § 303.10(a)(2), the court shall instead consider the DWE/Used Matrix (§ 303.18). Both enhanced matrices specify a range of sentences (i.e.standard range) that shall be considered by the court for each combination of Offense Gravity Score [OGS] and Prior Record Score [PRS].

(c) Youth/School Enhancement sentence recommendations. If the court determines that an offender violated the drug act pursuant to § 303.10(b), 12 months shall be added to the lower limit of the standard range of the applicable sentencing matrix and 36 months shall be added to the upper limit of the standard range of the applicable sentencing matrix. The range of sentences (i.e.-standard range) shall be considered by the court for each combination of Offense Gravity Score [OGS] and Prior Record Score [PRS].

(d) Aggravated and mitigated sentence recommendations. To determine the aggravated and mitigated sentence recommendations, apply § 303.13.

(e) *Numeric sentence recommendations*. All numbers in sentence recommendations suggest months of minimum confinement pursuant to 42 Pa.C.S. § 9755(b) (partial confinement) and § 9756(b) (total confinement).

(f) Alphabetic sentence recommendations. RS in the sentence recommendation, an abbreviation for Restorative Sanctions, suggests use of the least restrictive, nonconfinement sentencing alternatives described in 42 Pa.C.S. § 9753 (determination of guilt without further penalty), § 9754 (order of probation) and § 9758 (fine), and include § 9763 (intermediate punishment) when limited to restorative sanction programs (see § 303.12(a)(5)). 42 Pa.C.S. § 9721(c) (mandatory restitution) is also in cluded in RS. No specific recommendations are provided for periods of supervision or amounts of fines for these non-confinement sentencing alternatives. RIP in the sentence recommendation, an abbreviation for Restrictive Intermediate Punishments, suggests use of Restrictive Intermediate Punishments pursuant to § 303.12(a)(4).

(g) When the guideline sentence recommendation exceeds that permitted by 18 Pa.C.S. § 1103 and § 1104 (relating to sentence of imprisonment for felony and misdemeanor) and 42 Pa.C.S. § 9755(b) and § 9756(b) (relating to sentence of partial and total confinement) or other applicable statute setting the maximum term of confinement, then the statutory limit is the longest guideline sentence recommendation. For the purposes of the guidelines, the statutory limit is the longest legal minimum sentence, which is one-half the maximum allowed by law.

(h) *Mandatory sentences*. The court has no authority to impose a sentence less than that required by a mandatory minimum provision established in statute. When the guideline range is lower than that required by a mandatory sentencing statute, the mandatory minimum requirement supersedes the sentence recommendation. When the sentence recommendation is higher than that required by a mandatory sentencing statute, the court shall consider the guideline sentence recommendation.

(i) Driving Under the Influence. The court shall consider the sentence recommendations pursuant to this section (§ 303.9) for an offender convicted under 75 Pa.C.S. **[§ 3731] 3802** (Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Controlled Substance). The court may use a **[q]Q**ualified **Restrictive [i]Intermediate [p]P**unishment pursuant to § 303.12(a)(6) to satisfy the mandatory minimum requirement.

§ 303.10. Guideline sentence recommendations: enhancements.

(a) Deadly Weapon Enhancement.

(1) When the court determines that the offender possessed a deadly weapon during the commission of the current conviction offense, the court shall consider the DWE/Possessed Matrix (§ 303.17). An offender has possessed a deadly weapon if any of the following were on the offender's person or within his immediate physical control: (i) Any firearm, (as defined in 42 Pa.C.S. § 9712) whether loaded or unloaded, or

(ii) Any dangerous weapon (as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 913), or

(iii) Any device, implement, or instrumentality designed as a weapon or capable of producing death or serious bodily injury where the court determines that the defendant intended to use the weapon to threaten or injure another individual.

(2) When the court determines that the offender used a deadly weapon during the commission of the current conviction offense, the court shall consider the DWE/Used Matrix (§ 303.18). An offender has used a deadly weapon if any of the following were employed by the offender in a way that threatened or injured another individual **[or in the furtherance of the crime]**:

(i) Any firearm, (as defined in 42 Pa.C.S. § 9712) whether loaded or unloaded, or

(ii) Any dangerous weapon (as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 913), or

(iii) Any device, implement, or instrumentality capable of producing death or serious bodily injury.

(3) There shall be no Deadly Weapon Enhancement for the following offenses:

(i) Possessing Instruments of Crime

(ii) Prohibited Offensive Weapons

(iii) Possession of Weapon on School Property

(iv) Possession of Firearm or Other Dangerous Weapon in Court Facility

(v) Simple Assault (18 Pa.C.S. § 2701(a)(2))

(vi) Aggravated Assault (18 Pa.C.S. § 2702(a)(4))

(vii) Theft when property stolen is a firearm (18 Pa.C.S. Chapter 39)

(viii) Violations of the Pennsylvania Uniform Firearms Act

(ix) Any other offense for which possession of a deadly weapon is an element of the statutory definition.

(4) The Deadly Weapon Enhancement shall apply to each conviction offense for which a deadly weapon is possessed or used.

(b) *Youth/School Enhancement*

(1) When the court determines that the offender either distributed a controlled substance to a person or persons under the age of 18 in violation of 35 P. S. § 780-114, or manufactured, delivered or possessed with intent to deliver a controlled substance within 1000 feet of **the real property on which is located** a public or private elementary or secondary school, the court shall consider the range of sentences described in § 303.9(c).

(2) The Youth/School Enhancement only applies to violations of 35 P. S. § 780-113(a)(14) and (a)(30).

(3) The Youth/School Enhancement shall apply to each violation which meets the criteria above.

§ 303.11. Guideline sentence recommendation: sentencing levels.

(a) *Purpose of sentence.* In writing the sentencing guidelines, the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing strives to provide a benchmark for the judges of Pennsylvania. The sentencing guidelines provide sanctions proportionate to the severity of the crime and the severity of

the offender's prior conviction record. This establishes a sentencing system with a primary focus on retribution, but one in which the recommendations allow for the fulfillment of other sentencing purposes including rehabilitation, deterrence, and incapacitation. To facilitate consideration of sentencing options consistent with the intent of the sentencing guidelines, the Commission has established five sentencing levels. Each level targets certain types of offenders, and describes ranges of sentencing options available to the court.

(b) Sentencing levels. The sentencing level is based on the standard range of the sentencing recommendation. Refer to § 303.9 to determine which sentence recommendation (i.e.—Basic, Deadly Weapon Enhancement or Youth/School Enhancement) applies. In any case where an individual or aggregate sentence recommendation may include total confinement, county or state intermediate punishment is recommended for eligible offenders.

The descriptions of the five sentencing levels are as follows:

(1) Level 1—Level 1 provides sentence recommendations for the least serious offenders with no more than one prior misdemeanor conviction, such that the standard range is limited to Restorative Sanctions **[[RS]]** (**RS**). The primary purpose of this level is to provide the minimal control necessary to fulfill court-ordered obligations. The following sentencing option is available:

Restorative Sanctions (§ 303.9(f))

(2) Level 2—Level 2 provides sentence recommendations for generally non-violent offenders and those with numerous less serious prior convictions, such that the standard range requires a county sentence but permits both incarceration and non-confinement. The standard range is defined as having an upper limit of less than 12 months and a lower limit of Restorative Sanctions **[[RS]] (RS)**. The primary purposes of this level are control over the offender and restitution to victims. Treatment is recommended for drug dependent offenders. The following sentencing options are available:

Total confinement in a county facility under a county sentence (see 61 P. S. § 331.17).

Partial confinement in a county facility

County [Restrictive] Intermediate Punishment[s] (see § 303.12(a) for eligibility criteria)

Restorative Sanctions (§ 303.9(f))

(3) Level 3-Level 3 provides sentence recommendations for serious offenders and those with numerous prior convictions, such that the standard range requires incarceration or County [a Restrictive] Intermediate Punishment [[RIP]], but in all cases permits a county sentence. The standard range is defined as having a lower limit of incarceration of less than 12 months. Included in Level 3 are those offenses for which a mandatory minimum sentence of less than 12 months applies and for which a[n] state or county intermediate punishment sentence is authorized by statute. The primary purposes of this level are retribution and control over the offender. If eligible, treatment is recommended for drug dependent offenders in lieu of incarceration. The following sentencing options are available:

Total confinement in a state facility.

Total confinement in a state facility, with participation in the State Motivational Boot Camp (see § 303.12(b) for eligibility criteria)

State Intermediate Punishment (see § 303.12(c) for eligibility criteria)

Total confinement in a county facility under a state or county sentence (see 61 P. S. § 331.17).

Partial confinement in a county facility.

County [Restrictive] Intermediate Punishment (see § 303.12(a) for eligibility criteria)

(4) Level 4-Level 4 provides sentence recommendations for very serious offenders and those with numerous prior convictions, such that the standard range requires state incarceration but permits it to be served in a county facility. The standard range is defined as having a lower limit of incarceration of greater than 12 months but less than 30 months, but limited to offenses with an Offense Gravity Score of less than 9. Included in Level 4 are those offenses for which a mandatory minimum sentence of less than 30 months applies and for which a[n] state or county intermediate punishment sentence is authorized by statute. The primary purposes of the sentencing options at this level are punishment and incapacitation. However, it is recognized that certain offenders at this level are permitted to serve a sentence of total confinement in a county facility, and some non-violent offenders may benefit from drug and alcohol treatment. If eligible, state intermediate punishment is recommended for drug dependent offenders. The following sentencing options are available:

Total confinement in a state facility.

Total confinement in a state facility, with participation in the State Motivational Boot Camp (see § 303.12(b) for eligibility criteria)

State Intermediate Punishment (see § 303.12(c) for eligibility criteria)

Total confinement in a county facility as a state offender. (see 61 P. S. § 331.17).

County [Restrictive] Intermediate Punishment (see § 303.12.(a) for eligibility criteria)

(5) Level 5—Level 5 provides sentence recommendations for the most violent offenders and those with major drug convictions, such that the conviction has an Offense Gravity Score of 9 or greater or the standard range requires state incarceration in a state facility. The standard range in such a case is defined as having a lower limit of **[30]** 12 months or greater. Included in Level 5 are those offenses for which a mandatory minimum sentence of 30 months or greater applies and for which a state intermediate punishment sentence is authorized by statute. The primary purposes of the sentencing options at this level are punishment commensurate with the seriousness of the criminal behavior and incapacitation to protect the public. If eligible, state intermediate punishment is recommended for drug dependent offenders. The following sentencing options are available:

Total confinement in a state facility.

Total confinement in a state facility, with participation in the State Motivational Boot Camp (see § 303.12(b) for eligibility criteria)

State Intermediate Punishment (see § 303.12(c) for eligibility criteria)

§ 303.12. Guideline sentence recommendations: sentencing programs.

(a) County intermediate punishment [program].

(1) Eligibility.

(i) The following regulations and statutes govern operation of and eligibility for county intermediate punishment programs:

37 Pa. Code § 451.1 et seq.

42 Pa.C.S. § 9729, § 9763, [and] § 9773 and Chapter 98.

[61 P. S. § 1101—§ 1114.]

204 Pa. Code § 303.8 and § 303.9.

(ii) Sentence recommendations which include an option of **County [Restrictive]** Intermediate Punishment**[s]** for certain offenders are designated as shaded cells in the guideline matrices.

(2) The county intermediate punishment plan provides a mechanism to advise the court of the extent and availability of services and programs authorized in the county. This plan includes information on the appropriate classification and use of county programs based on program-specific requirements.

(3) Intermediate punishments classifications. In order to incorporate intermediate punishment programs into the sentencing levels, the Commission has classified intermediate punishment programs as Restrictive Intermediate Punishments (RIP) and restorative sanction programs. Additionally, specific intermediate punishment programs have been identified in legislation (42 Pa.C.S. §§ 9763(c) and 9804(b)) and regulation (37 Pa. Code § 451.52) as authorized sentences for conviction under 75 Pa.C.S. § [3731(e)] 3802 (relating to Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Controlled Substance); the Commission has classified these programs as [q]Qualified Restrictive Intermediate Punishments.

(4) Restrictive Intermediate Punishments (RIP). Restrictive Intermediate Punishments are defined as programs that provide for strict supervision of the offender. [Restrictive Intermediate Punishments may be imposed only if the court has been granted sentencing authority by the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (pursuant to 42 Pa.C.S. § 9729).] The county intermediate punishment board is required to develop assessment and evaluation procedures to assure the appropriate targeting of offenders. All programs must meet the minimum standards provided in the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency regulations (37 Pa. Code Chapter 451) for intermediate punishments.

(i) Restrictive Intermediate Punishments (RIP) either:

(A) house the offender full or part time; or

(B) significantly restrict the offender's movement and monitor the offender's compliance with the program(s); or

(C) involve a combination of programs that meet the standards set forth above.

(ii) An offender under consideration for Restrictive Intermediate Punishments at Level 4 or Level 3 shall have a diagnostic assessment of dependency on alcohol or other drugs conducted by one of the following: the Pennsylvania Department of Health's **[Office] Bureau** of Drug and Alcohol Programs (**[O]B**DAP) or a designee; the county authority on drugs and alcohol or a designee; or clinical personnel of a facility licensed by the **[Office] Bureau** of Drug and Alcohol Programs.

(iii) An offender assessed to be dependent shall be evaluated for purposes of a treatment recommendation by one of the above listed assessors. The evaluation shall take into account the level of motivation of the offender. If sentenced to a Restrictive Intermediate Punishment, the sentence shall be consistent with the level of care and length of stay prescribed in the treatment recommendation, regardless of the standard range sentencing recommendation.

(iv) An offender assessed as not in need of drug or alcohol treatment may be placed in any approved Restrictive Intermediate Punishment program. Each day of participation in a Restrictive Intermediate Punishment program or combination of programs shall be considered the equivalent of one day of total confinement for guideline sentence recommendations.

(v) The court may impose a **[q]**Qualified Restrictive Intermediate Punishment in lieu of incarceration for **[any] certain** convictions under 75 Pa.C.S. § **[3731] 3802** (relating to Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Controlled Substance).

(5) *Restorative sanction programs.* Restorative sanction programs are the least restrictive, non-confinement intermediate punishments. Restorative sanction programs are generally used in conjunction with Restrictive Intermediate Punishments as the level of supervision is reduced, but may also be used as separate sanctions under any of the non-confinement sentencing alternatives provided in the statute (see § 303.9(f)).

(i) Restorative sanction programs:

(A) are the least restrictive in terms of constraint of offender's liberties;

(B) do not involve the housing of the offender (either full or part time); and

(C) focus on restoring the victim to pre-offense status.

(6) Qualified Restrictive Intermediate Punishments. In accordance with **42 Pa.C.S. §§ 9763(c), 9804(b) and** 37 Pa. Code § 451[.52 (relating to sentencing restrictions for driving under the influence convictions)], [**q**]Qualified Restrictive Intermediate Punishment programs may be used to satisfy the mandatory minimum sentencing requirements of certain convictions under 75 Pa.C.S. § [3731] 3802.

(i) Unless otherwise provided in statute, Qualified Restrictive Intermediate Punishment programs include:

(A) [residential inpatient drug and alcohol programs or residential rehabilitative center programs; or] if the defendant is determined to be in need of drug and alcohol treatment, a sentence to intermediate punishment shall include participation in drug and alcohol treatment under 75 Pa.C.S. § 3815(c), and may be combined with:

1. house arrest with electronic surveillance; or

2. a partial confinement program such as work release, a work camp or a halfway facility.

(B) [house arrest and electronic monitoring combined with drug and alcohol treatment] if the defendant is determined not to be in need of drug and alcohol treatment, a sentence to intermediate punishment may only include: 1. house arrest with electronic surveillance; or

2. partial confinement programs such as work release, a work camp or a halfway facility; or

3. any combination of Qualified Restrictive Intermediate Punishment programs.

(b) State Motivational Boot Camp.

(1) Eligibility.

(i) The following statute governs operation of and eligibility for the State Motivational Boot Camp:

61 P. S. § 1121-§ 1129

(ii) Sentence recommendations which include boot camp eligible offenders are designated by the letters BC in the cells of the Basic Sentencing Matrix (§ 303.16).

(2) The court shall indicate on the offender's commitment order and the Guideline Sentence Form if the offender is authorized as eligible for the boot camp program. The Department of Corrections makes the final determination as to whether the offender will be accepted into the boot camp program.

(c) State Intermediate Punishment.

(1) Eligibility.

(i) The following statute governs operation of and eligibility for State Intermediate Punishment:

42 Pa.C.S. Chapter 99

(ii) Any person convicted of a drug-related offense for which the sentence recommendation includes total confinement in a state facility may be considered for state intermediate punishment.

(4) The court may, upon motion of the Commonwealth and agreement of the defendant, commit a defendant to the custody of the Department of Corrections for the purpose of evaluating whether the defendant would benefit from a drug offender treatment program and whether treatment in a drug offender treatment program is appropriate.

(5) Upon receipt of a recommendation for placement in a drug offender treatment program from the Department of Corrections, and agreement of the attorney for the Commonwealth and the defendant, the court may sentence an eligible offender to a period of 24 months of state intermediate punishment.

(6) The court may impose a consecutive period of probation. The total duration of a sentence of state intermediate punishment and consecutive probation may not exceed the maximum term for which the eligible offender could otherwise be sentenced.

§ 303.13. Guideline sentence recommendations: aggravated and mitigated circumstances.

(a) When the court determines that an aggravating circumstance(s) is present, it may impose an aggravated sentence as follows:

(1) For the Offense Gravity Scores of 9, 10, 11, 12[,] and 13 [and 14] the court may impose a sentence that is up to 12 months longer than the upper limit of the standard range.

(2) For the Offense Gravity Score of 8, the court may impose a sentence that is up to 9 months longer than the upper limit of the standard range.

(3) For the Offense Gravity Scores of 6 and 7, the court may impose a sentence that is up to 6 months longer than the upper limit of the standard range.

(4) For the Offense Gravity Scores of 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, the court may impose a sentence that is up to 3 months longer than the upper limit of the standard range.

(5) When the standard range is Restorative Sanctions (RS), the aggravated sentence recommendation is RIP-3.

(b) When the court determines that a mitigating circumstance(s) is present, it may impose a mitigated sentence as follows:

(1) For the Offense Gravity Scores of 9, 10, 11, 12,13, and 14 the court may impose a sentence that is up to 12 months shorter than the lower limit of the standard range.

(2) For the Offense Gravity Score of 8, the court may impose a sentence that is up to 9 months shorter than the lower limit of the standard range.

(3) For the Offense Gravity Scores of 6 and 7, the court may impose a sentence that is up to 6 months shorter than the lower limit of the standard range.

(4) For the Offense Gravity Scores of 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, the court may impose a sentence that is up to 3 months shorter than the lower limit of the standard range.

(5) When the bottom of the standard range is less than or equal to 3 months of incarceration, the lower limit of the mitigated sentence recommendation is Restorative Sanctions (RS).

(6) In no case where a Deadly Weapon Enhancement is applied may the mitigated sentence recommendation be lower than 3 months.

(c) When the court imposes an aggravated or mitigated sentence, it shall state the reasons on the record and on the Guideline Sentence Form, a copy of which is [forwarded] electronically transmitted to the Commission on Sentencing in the manner described in § 303.1(e).

§ 303.14. Guideline sentence recommendations—[fines and restitution] economic sanctions.

(a) Fines [and restitution].

(1) Fines [and restitution, as provided by law,] may be added to any guideline sentence[.], as authorized by law. Relevant statutes include but are not limited to:

(i) 18 Pa.C.S. § 1101 (relating to fines)

(ii) 35 P. S. § 780-113(b)-(o) (relating to controlled substances)

(iii) 42 Pa.C.S. § 9726 (relating to fine as a sentence)

(iv) 42 Pa.C.S. § 9758 (relating to imposition of a fine)

(v) 75 Pa.C.S. § 3804 (relating to fines for DUI)

(2) A fine, within the limits established by law, shall be considered by the court when the offender is convicted of 35 P. S. § 780-113(a)(12), (14) or (30), and the drug involved is **[2.5 or more grams of]** any of the following: a controlled substance or counterfeit substance classified in Schedule I or II and which is a narcotic; phencyclidine, methamphetamine, or cocaine, including the isomers, salts, compounds, salts of isomers, or deriva-

tives of phencyclidine, methamphetamine, or cocaine; or is **in excess of** one thousand pounds **[or more]** of marijuana. Such fine shall be of an amount that is at least sufficient to exhaust the assets utilized in, and the proceeds obtained by the offender from, the illegal possession, manufacture, or distribution of controlled substances. Such fine shall not include assets concerning which the attorney for the Commonwealth has filed a forfeiture petition or concerning which he has given notice to the court of his intent to file a forfeiture petition.

(3) Fines **[and restitution]** may be utilized as part of an intermediate punishment sentence or as a non-confinement sentencing alternative (see restorative sanction 303.9(f)).

(b) Costs and fees.

(1) Costs and fees may be added to any guideline sentence, as authorized by law. Relevant statutes include but are not limited to:

(i) 18 Pa.C.S. § 1109 (relating to costs of any reward)

(ii) 18 P. S. § 11.1101 (relating to Crime Victim's Compensation Fund costs)

(iii) 18 P. S. § 11.1102 (relating to costs of offender supervision programs)

(iv) 42 Pa.C.S. § 1725 (relating to fees and charges)

(v) 42 Pa.C.S. § 1725.1 (relating to costs)

(vi) 42 Pa.C.S. § 1725.2 (relating to costs of summary convictions)

(vii) 42 Pa.C.S. § 1725.3 (relating to criminal laboratory user fees)

(viii) 42 Pa.C.S. § 1726.1 (relating to forensic exam)

(ix) 42 Pa.C.S. § 1726.2 (relating to criminal prosecution involving domestic violence)

(x) 42 Pa.C.S. § 9728(c) (relating to costs, etc.)

(c) Restitution

(1) Restitution shall be added to any guideline sentence, as authorized by law. Relevant statutes include but are not limited to:

(i) 18 Pa.C.S. § 1106 (relating to injuries to person or property)

(ii) 18 Pa.C.S. § 1107 (relating to theft of timber)

(iii) 18 P.S. § 11.1302 (relating to restitution to the Office of Victim Services)

(iv) 42 Pa.C.S. § 9720.1 (relating to identity theft)

(v) 42 Pa.C.S. § 9721(c) (relating to mandatory restitution)

(2) Restitution may be imposed as a direct sentence or as a condition of probation or intermediate punishment, and is considered a nonconfinement sentencing alternative (see restorative sanction § 303.9(f)).

Technical Amendments Concerning Execution of Judgments for Money

The Minor Court Rules Committee is planning to recommend that the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania amend Rules 410 and 412 of the Rules of Conduct, Office Standards and Civil Procedure for District Justices to make technical amendments concerning the execution of judgments for money. The Committee has not submitted this proposal for review by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

The following explanatory Report highlights the Committee's considerations in formulating this proposal. The Committee's Report should not be confused with the Committee's Official Notes to the rules. The Supreme Court does not adopt the Committee's Official Notes or the contents of the explanatory reports.

The text of the proposed changes precedes the Report. Additions are shown in bold; deletions are in bold and brackets.

TITLE 246. MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 400. EXECUTION OF JUDGMENTS FOR THE PAYMENT OF MONEY

Rule 410. **[Bond for]** Stay of Execution Generally.

Execution shall be stayed as to the property of the defendant upon the occurrence of any of the following:

(1) Upon written direction of the plaintiff to the executing officer.

(2) Upon the entry of [If the defendant, or any person or party in interest, enters] a bond with the district justice by any person or party in interest, with security approved by [him] the district justice, in the amount of the plaintiff's judgment, including probable interest and costs, or in such lesser amount as

the district justice may direct, **[the district justice shall stay execution as to the property of the defendant. The bond shall name] naming the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as the obligee, and [shall be]** conditioned to pay the amount due within **[ninety (90)] 90** days of the entry of the bond, unless the time for payment is extended by the district justice. **[This rule does not apply to judgments obtained for wages for manual labor.]**

Official Note: Compare Pa.R.C.P. No. 3121(a) [(2)]. Other rules in this chapter may also provide for a stay in specific circumstances covered by those rules.

Rule 412. Notice of Sale.

A. (1) The executing officer shall give notice of the sale of personal property at least six days prior to the sale [by handbills posted in the office of the district justice from which the order of execution issued, at the place of sale and, if different from the place of sale, at the place of levy and by mailing a copy of the handbill to the defendant at his last known address and to the plaintiff].

(2) The executing officer shall give notice of the sale in the following manner:

(a) By handbill posted in the office of the district justice from which the order of execution issued and, if different from the office from which the order issued, in the office of the district justice in whose magisterial district the place of the sale is located.

(b) By handbill posted at the place of sale and, if different from the place of sale, at the place of levy.

(c) By mailing a copy of the handbill to the plaintiff and to the defendant at his or her last known address.

B. The notice of sale shall include a notice that all claims to the property must be filed before sale in the office of the district justice from which the order of execution issued and that all claims to the proceeds must be filed in that office before distribution; that a **proposed** schedule of distribution will be filed in that office on a date specified not later than five **[(5)]** days after the sale; and that distribution will be made in accordance with the **proposed** schedule unless exceptions are filed within ten **[(10)]** days thereafter. No further notice of the filing of the schedule of distribution need be given.

REPORT

Proposed Amendments to Pa.R.C.P.D.J. Nos. 410 and 412

Technical Amendments Concerning Execution of Judgments for Money

The Minor Court Rules Committee (hereinafter the Committee) is proposing technical amendments to Rules 410 and 412 of the Rules of Conduct, Office Standards, and Civil Procedure for District Justices to address two separate issues concerning the execution of judgments for money.

The Committee reviewed Pa.R.C.P.D.J. No. 410 in response to an inquiry from a constable who asked if execution of a money judgment could be stayed upon request of the plaintiff. The Committee noted that the district justice rules governing execution of money judgments do make provision for a stay of execution in certain circumstances,¹ but not specifically at the direction of the plaintiff. The Committee further noted that the Rules of Civil Procedure governing actions in the courts of record do provide for a stay of execution "upon written direction of the plaintiff."2

The Committee believed it advisable to incorporate a provision into the district justice rules to allow for stay upon written direction of the plaintiff. The Committee reasoned that post-judgment settlement negotiations may affect a plaintiff's desire to move forward with execution once commenced, and believed that a plaintiff should have the ability to stay execution by contacting the executing officer directly.

Accordingly, the Committee proposes that Rule 410 be amended to provide for the stay of execution upon written direction of the plaintiff to the executing officer. To accomplish this, the Committee proposes that Rule 410 be tabulated into an introductory clause and two subparagraphs containing the provisions as to when execution shall be stayed, including the new provision regarding a stay at the direction of the plaintiff. In addition, the Committee proposes that the current provision regarding the inapplicability of the rule to judgments obtained for wages for manual labor be deleted. This provision was based on a prior law³ that was repealed by the Judiciary Act Repealer Act,⁴ and was not expressly codified in the Judicial Code (Title 42, Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes).

The Committee reviewed Pa.R.C.P.D.J. No. 412 in response to an inquiry from a constable who suggested that executing officers be required to post notice of a sale in the office of the district justice in whose magisterial district the place of sale is located if different from the office from which the order of execution issued.⁵ It was suggested that this requirement would aid in informing an executing officer of other levies that may have been made upon the same property that is the subject of his or her levy and sale. This information is needed so that an executing officer will know if there is an existing levy by another executing officer that has priority over his or her levy.

The Committee agreed that the proposed notice requirement would be helpful. Accordingly, the Committee proposes that Rule 412A be divided into two subparagraphs. Subparagraph (1) would contain the existing provision that notice of the sale be given at least six days prior to the sale. Subparagraph (2) would contain the requirements as to how notice is to be given, including the new provision discussed above.

In addition, the Committee proposes other minor revisions to the rules and notes to address gender neutrality issues and to enhance clarity.

Local Rule 205.2(a)-Filing Legal Papers with the Prothonotary

No pleading or other legal paper that complies with the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure shall be refused for filing by the prothonotary based on a requirement of a local rule of civil procedure or judicial administration, including Local Rules 205.2(a) and 205.2(b). All documents filed in any office of the Court shall be endorsed with the day and exact time of filing, which endorsement,

in the absence of fraud, accident or mistake shall be conclusive evidence of such date and time of filing.

(a)(1) No pleading, papers, affidavits or other documents may be filed in any office of the Court on paper other than 8 $1/2'' \times 11''$ in size.

(a)(2) No paper shall be filed in any office of the Court unless it is written in ink, clearly legible, printed, or typewritten with lines not closer than typewriting double spacing (except quotations); contains the caption of the proceeding, including the name and division of the Court, identifying case number, the names of the parties, the title of the proceeding and the name of the paper. All papers filed shall be endorsed with the name, address, telephone number and I.D. number of the attorney filing it or the name, address and telephone number of the party if there is no attorney. The caption of any paper filed subsequent to the initial pleading need only state the name of the first party on each side with an appropriate indication of the other parties.

(a)(3) The use of bluebacks or other backing is not required.

(a)(4) All papers and other documents shall be securely affixed at the top left corner.

(a)(5) A proposed order shall accompany all petitions, motions or other requests for relief.

(2) a petition may also be used to bring before the Court any proper matter for which no other specific procedure is authorized or in which only a petition is prescribed as the authorized procedure for bringing such matter before the Court for disposition.

Note: A petition for relief from a judgment by confession is governed by Pa.R.C.P. Rule 2959. Motions are governed by Local Rule 208.1 et seq.

(b) A petition shall specify the relief sought and state the material facts which constitute the grounds therefor.

(c) A petition shall be divided into paragraphs numbered consecutively. Each paragraph shall contain as far as practicable only one material allegation.

(d) A petition shall be verified in accordance with Pa.R.C.P. 206.3.

(e) Except for emergency matters, no petition seeking ex parte action shall be considered by the Court unless the petition contains a certification by counsel for the moving party that concurrence in the petition has been sought from all opposing counsel and that such concurrence has been granted or denied. Where concurrence has been granted, the written concurrence of opposing counsel shall be attached to the petition. In the event a party is not represented, except in emergency matters, no petition seeking ex parte action shall be considered by the Court unless the petition contains a certification by counsel that prior notice of the contents of the petition and order and that counsel intends to present the petition and order to the Court for action has been given to the opposing party.

(f) All petitions, except those made in the course of trial or hearing, shall be in writing. All written petitions shall be signed by counsel and may be filed at any time during regular business hours with the prothonotary. Counsel's signature upon a petition shall constitute a certification that counsel has read the petition and that, to the best of counsel's knowledge, information and belief, it is supported by sufficient legal or factual grounds and that it is not interposed merely for delay. Except where counsel has presented the petition to the Court to secure an order, the prothonotary shall deliver daily a petitions list with accompanying petitions to the Court Administrator to monitor and assign to a judge.

(g) All petitions shall have affixed to the front of the petition a proposed order in accordance with Local Rule 206.6(a) or (b).

(h) All petitions and answers thereto, shall comply with these provisions.

(i) Failure to comply with any provision of this rule may constitute sufficient grounds for the Court to dismiss the petition and/or deny any requested relief.

Local Rule 206.4

The procedure for issuing a rule to show cause shall be the procedure set forth in Pa.R.C.P. 206.6 and Local Rule 206.6.

Local Rule 206.6

Upon filing of a petition, the prothonotary shall issue a rule to show cause where petitioner seeks only to direct respondent to file an answer in accordance with Pa.R.C.P. 206.6(c)(2). In such cases, the order shall only include sections c(1), (2), (3), and (6) as set forth in Pa.R.C.P. 206.6(1).

Where concurrence has been granted, the written concurrence of opposing counsel shall be attached to the motion. Failure to comply with this provision shall constitute sufficient grounds for the Court to deny the motion.

(e) All motions relating to discovery shall include a certification signed by counsel for the moving party certifying that counsel has conferred or attempted to confer with all interested parties in order to resolve the matter without Court action.

(f) All motions shall include a proposed order in the form set forth in 208.4(b)(2).

(g)(1) For cause shown, any moving party may request expedited disposition of any motion filed with the prothonotary. If expedited disposition is requested, a praecipe shall be filed with the motion explaining the grounds for requesting such expedited disposition. (d) The Court, in its discretion, may permit forms of discovery other than depositions.

(e) The party obtaining the issuance of a rule to show cause shall forthwith serve a true and correct copy of the Court order entering the rule along with a copy of the underlying petition, upon each attorney of record and pro se parties in the manner prescribed by Pa.R.C.P. 440. An affidavit of service shall be filed within five (5) days from the date of the service of the motion and the order setting the rule with the prothonotary.

Local Rule 210 Submission and Form of Briefs.

(a) All briefs shall be lodged with the Court Administrator and a copy thereof served upon every other party.

Note: Briefs are not to be filed in the prothonotary's office or delivered directly to the Court.

(b) Briefs shall be typewritten or printed and doublespaced (except for quotations) on paper approximately 8-1/2 inches by 11 inches in size, and shall contain:

(1) A history of the case.

(2) A statement of the question or questions involved.

(3) A copy of, or reference to, the pertinent parts of any relevant document, report, recommendation, and order, portions of the relevant testimony involved with a reference to the transcript and page where it may be found.

(4) An argument with citations of the authority relied upon divided into as many sections as there are questions involved.

(5) A conclusion.

(6) Opinions of Court or Agency involved.

(c) Briefs shall be submitted to the Court in accordance with a schedule set by the Court upon request of either party. The moving party shall deliver a copy of the brief to the adverse party and file a copy with the Court Administrator in accordance with the schedule. The respondent shall deliver the brief to the moving party and file a copy with the Court Administrator in accordance with the schedule. No supplemental brief shall be filed except upon special allowance by the Court and within such time as the Court may direct.

(d) All counsel appearing in any other proceeding scheduled for hearing before the Court shall provide the Court with a brief or memorandum of law setting forth legal authorities relied upon. Such brief or memorandum of law shall be provided to the Court at the time of the hearing unless otherwise specified by these Local Rules or by Order of the Court.

(e) *Informal Letter Briefs*. Notwithstanding this Rule, the Court may in any case allow the parties to file an informal letter brief.

Local Rule 211

Either party may file a praecipe with the prothonotary to direct the Court Administrator to establish a briefing schedule for petitions, motions, and special motions; arguments for preliminary objections and motions for judgment on pleadings; assign a case to a judge for further action; and to set dates for special hearings and pretrial matters generally. Upon receipt of the praecipe, the Prothonotary shall transmit the praecipe to the Court Administrator. The Court Administrator, after consultation with the president judge or where a judge has acted in a case after consultation with that judge, shall assign the matter to a judge and establish such schedule or date. (2) In the event there are factual disputes arising from the preliminary objections and answers thereto, the procedure to be followed shall be as set forth in Local Rule 208.4.

(3) Disposition of a motion for preliminary objections shall be made after oral argument.

(4) In the event the Court determines that briefs shall be filed following argument on the preliminary objections, then it shall enter an order establishing a briefing schedule.

(5) The judge to whom the preliminary objections have been assigned for disposition may in the exercise of judicial discretion grant additional time to file briefs, require additional briefs to be filed, or make such other order as shall be appropriate for the disposition of the matter.

Local Rule 1034 Motion for Judgment on the Pleadings

(c)(1) A motion for judgment on the pleadings shall be filed with the prothonotary. At the time of filing such motions with the prothonotary, the moving party shall also file a praecipe, pursuant to Local Rule 211, requesting the Court Administrator to assign the matter to a judge to schedule an argument date for consideration of the motion for judgment on the pleadings.

(2) Disposition of a motion for judgment on the pleadings shall be made after oral argument.

(3) In the event the Court determines that briefs shall be filed following argument on the motion for judgment on the pleadings, then it shall enter an order establishing a briefing schedule.

(4) The judge to whom the motion for judgment on the pleadings has been assigned for disposition may in the exercise of judicial discretion grant additional time to file briefs, require additional briefs to be filed, or make such other order as shall be appropriate for the disposition of the matter.

Local 1035.2 Motion for Summary Judgment

(c)(1) A motion for summary judgment shall be filed with the prothonotary. At the time of filing such motions with the prothonotary, the moving party shall serve a copy of the motion on the other party or parties to the case who shall file a response and such affidavits or exhibits in accordance with Pa.R.C.P. 1035.3.

(2) Upon the filing of the response or in the event no response is filed within thirty (30) days of the service of the motion, either party may file a praecipe pursuant to Local Rule 211 requesting the Court Administrator to

assign the matter to a judge to establish a briefing schedule and argument for consideration of the motion.

(3) Upon filing a motion for summary judgment, the moving party shall file a brief, pursuant to Local Rule 210, in accordance with the schedule established by the Court Administrator and shall serve a copy thereof upon all opposing counsel and any pro se party at their respective addresses of record. When filed, the brief shall be accompanied by a certificate indicating that such has been served upon the moving party.

(4) All parties who wish to contest a motion for summary judgment shall file a reply brief and a certificate such has been served on the moving party in accordance with the schedule established by the Court Administrator.

(5) Disposition of a motion for summary judgment shall be made after oral argument. The parties may agree to submit the matter on briefs only with appropriate notice to the Court Administrator of such agreement.

(6) The judge to whom a motion for summary judgment has been assigned for disposition may in the exercise of judicial discretion grant additional time to file briefs, require additional briefs to be filed, or make such other order as shall be appropriate for the disposition of the matter.

(7) Failure to comply with these provisions may be sufficient basis for the Court to deny the motion or deem such motion uncontested.

Local Rule 1005—Appellate Procedure from District Justices

Service of Notice of Appeal and Other Documents from Appeal from a District Justice Decision

(1) The Prothonotary shall require that in regard to any appeal from a District Justice civil decision that the appellant provide with the Notice of Appeal a stamped envelope, pre-addressed to the appellee, at the appellee's address as listed on the Complaint form filed in the office of the District Justice or as otherwise appearing in the records from that office, or the attorney of record, if any, of the appellee, as well as a stamped envelope, preaddressed, to the District Justice in whose office the judgment was rendered. Copies of the Notice of Appeal, and Rule to File a Complaint pursuant to Rule of District Justice Procedure 1004B, if applicable, shall thereupon be mailed by the Prothonotary by first class mail to the appellee and District Justice.

(2) The Prothonotary shall note such service and any return thereof on the Court's docket.

(3) The Prothonotary shall not be required to file a Notice of Appeal to a District Justice judgment or verdict without the appellant providing the above described stamped and addressed envelopes for service purposes.

(4) At the conclusion of any District Justice civil case, upon rendering of the decision, the District Justice shall provide a copy of this Rule to the party against whom the judgment or verdict is rendered, with the same either being made when applicable by personal service or through the mail along with the notice of entry of judgment or verdict.

(5) Upon the Court of Common Pleas disposing of the appeal from a District Justice decision, the Prothonotary shall in all cases utilize the Common Pleas notification request form, prepared by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts (being AOPC Form 729B-98 or any future revision of the same) in order to notify the District Justice of the result of the appeal. The Prothonotary shall

also provide the District Justice a copy of the Court Order or document which is dispositive of the case.

Adoption of Local Rule 1042.21 Medical Professional Liability Actions; Motions for Mediation; 00-3708

Order

And Now, to wit, this 20th day of December, 2004, it is hereby *Ordered* that Delaware County Local Rule 1042.21 is *Adopted* and shall read as follows:

(A) The ADR Committee of the Delaware County Bar Association shall prepare a list of available co-mediators it deems appropriate for mediation in medical professional liability actions subject to approval by the Court. The list shall be updated annually by the Committee and resubmitted to the Court for approval.

(B) The Court Administrator shall designate the assigned co-mediators upon request by the Court.

(C) In the event the Court approves a motion for mediation and only if the parties have not agreed to a private mediator(s), the Court shall request the Civil Court Administrator to designate co-mediators. The Court shall thereafter order mediation, including in its Order the name, address, and telephone number of the comediators. A copy of the Court order shall be forwarded to the Civil Court Administrator, and to the selected comediators. If a co-mediator has a conflict of interest, or is unable to serve for any reason, then the co-mediator shall immediately notify the Civil Court Administrator for purposes of further assignment.

(D) The co-mediators shall confer with each other and all counsel to establish the date, time, and place of the mediation session pursuant to the Court's Order. Unless specifically requested by the co-mediators, the parties shall not contact or forward documents to the comediators. Counsel who are primarily responsible for the case and any unrepresented party shall attend the mediation session. All parties, insurers and principals of parties of decision-making authority must attend the mediation session in person, unless their attendance is excused by the co-mediators for good cause shown; in such an event, they must be available by telephone during all mediation sessions. All parties, insurers, principals, and counsel must be prepared to fully discuss all liability and damage issues and to participate in meaningful settlement negotiations.

(E) The co-mediators, (generally comprised of an experienced member of the Plaintiff's Bar and an experienced member of the Defense Bar), will jointly conference the case, attempting to facilitate settlement (utilizing standard mediation practices, including shuttle diplomacy, caucusing, etc.), or they may give a neutral evaluation. The co-mediators cannot be called as a witness as to the mediation of any issue arising therefrom. All communications among the co-mediators, the parties, and/or their counsel shall remain confidential. Any comments and/or opinions expressed by the co-mediators are advisory only. All counsel, parties, their agents and/or representatives shall comply with these directives, including the foregoing terms and conditions contained in this local Rule. (F) No mediation proceedings, including any statement made or writing submitted by a participant, shall be disclosed to any person who is not directly involved with the mediation session. The parties' settlement positions and/or statements shall not be disclosed to the trial Judge unless mutually agreed to by the parties; and, in the event the case involves a non jury trial, under no circumstances shall the parties' settlement positions and statements be disclosed to the assigned Judge. No transcript or other recording may be made of the mediation session, and the mediation proceeding shall not be used by any adverse party for any reason including the litigation at issue.

(G) The moving party who sought mediation shall notify the Court and the Civil Court Administrator in writing at the conclusion of the mediation process indicating whether or not a settlement has been reached.

(H) The moving party shall pay the cost of the comediators and shall pay each co-mediator directly. The rate of compensation for each co-mediator is \$150.00 per hour. The party who initially filed the motion for mediation shall also pay a \$50.00 non-refundable administrative fee paid to the Delaware County Bar Association upon assignment of the co-mediators by the Court.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 37—LAW

STATE POLICE [37 PA. CODE CH. 42] Use of Unmarked Vehicles

The State Police adopts Chapter 42 (relating to use of unmarked vehicles) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Section 5 of the act of June 26, 2001 (P. L. 374, No. 75) (Act 75) requires the State Police, in consultation with the Department of Transportation, to promulgate regulations for the use of unmarked vehicles by police officers. The effective date of the act was August 25, 2001. This final-form rulemaking requires officers using unmarked vehicles to carry identification and display it upon request unless it would jeopardize officer's safety. Officers using unmarked vehicles for patrol duties must be in uniform; officers using unmarked cars for duties that are likely to involve vehicle stops must wear clothing bearing the specific name of the law enforcement agency or task force. When making a stop in an unmarked vehicle, the officer must choose the safest location possible. In a vehicle pursuit, officers in an unmarked vehicle must have audible and visual signals that comply with 75 Pa.C.S. § 4571 (relating to visual and audible signals on emergency vehicles). Unmarked vehicles must relinquish the lead in pursuit as soon as marked vehicles are available.

Statutory Authority

This final-form rulemaking is authorized by section 5 of Act 75.

Effect

The final-form proposed rulemaking will affect all Commonwealth police agencies that use unmarked vehicles.

Effective Date/Sunset Date

This rulemaking will go into effect upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. No sunset date has been assigned; however, every facet of this proposed rulemaking will be continuously reviewed for effectiveness, clarity and whether they are serving the greater interests of citizens of this Commonwealth.

Comments and Responses

The State Police received the following comments:

§ 42.1. (relating to purpose)

The Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) questioned whether the section applies to stops or pursuits relating to traffic violations or all stops and pursuits that involve unmarked cars. IRRC also commented on the fact that § 42.1 refers to the use of unmarked vehicles for law enforcement whereas 75 Pa.C.S. § 3328 (relating to unmarked vehicles) directs the State Police to promulgate regulations for the use of unmarked vehicles by police officers. The State Police has amended § 42.1 to more closely parallel the statute by explaining that it is necessary to establish uniformity in the use of unmarked cars by police officers.

§ 42.2. (relating to policy and effect).

IRRC noted that the phrase "permit the use of unmarked vehicles for law enforcement" also appears in

§ 42.2. The State Police has replaced the words "for law enforcement" with "by police officers" to more closely conform to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3328. IRRC also questioned whether there is a statutory or constitutional basis for stating in the regulation that failure to comply with Chapter 42 will not affect the legality of any arrest or citation nor be grounds for the suppression of evidence. The United States Supreme Court has ruled that violation of a regulation does not mandate suppression of evidence. See United States v. Caceres, 440 U.S. 741 (1979); see also, United States v. Hinton, 222 F.3d 666, 674-75 (2000). In Commonwealth v. Thill, 612 A.2d 1043 (Pa. Super. 1992), the State Superior Court determined that suppression of a breath test result was the proper remedy for violating regulatory requirements because statutory requirement in the Vehicle Code made compliance with the regulation mandatory for admissibility. In stark contrast, nothing in 75 Pa.C.S. § 3328 indicates that the General Assembly intended to remedy a violation of these unmarked vehicle regulations by suppressing evidence or dismissing criminal charges. IRRC has opined that the remedy to be imposed is a policy decision of such a substantial nature that it requires legislative review. The State Police agrees that this is a substantial policy question and has amended § 42.2 to provide that failure to comply with the regulations will not affect the legality of the arrest or citation nor be grounds for suppression of evidence except as provided by statutory or constitutional law.

§ 42.3. (relating to definitions)

Light bar assembly

IRRC pointed out that the definition of "light bar assembly" differs from that found in 67 Pa. Code § 173.2 (relating to definitions) and recommends amending the definition to be consistent with 67 Pa. Code § 173.2. The State Police has changed the definition to more closely parallel the language in 67 Pa. Code § 173.2 except that the State Police has retained the requirement that the beams of light have 360° visibility. The 360° requirement is necessary to ensure the safety of officers and the public, and it reflects the current, state-of-the art standards for light bar assembly.

Marked police vehicle and unmarked police vehicle

IRRC noted that this section defines "marked police vehicle" and "unmarked police vehicle" whereas the body of the chapter uses the terms "marked unit" and "unmarked vehicle." The State Police has amended §§ 42.21 and 42.22 to use the defined terms.

IRRC commented that the term "unmarked police vehicle" is defined as, "a police vehicle not equipped with a roof mounted light-bar assembly. The vehicle may display graphics, markings or decals identifying the agency or department." IRRC believes the second sentence makes the definition ambiguous and recommends deleting it. The State Police disagrees. The State Police believes the second sentence is necessary to make it clear that a vehicle is considered unmarked even if it displays graphic markings that are commonly associated with marked police vehicles.

The Pennsylvania Sheriffs' Association recommended replacing the terms "marked police vehicle" and "unmarked police vehicle" with "marked law enforcement vehicle" and "unmarked law enforcement vehicle." As IRRC pointed out, however, the authorizing statute tasks the State Police with the responsibility for regulating the use of unmarked vehicles by police officers. Accordingly, the State Police has rejected the recommendation of the Sheriffs' Association.

Police Officer

IRRC commented that 75 Pa.C.S. § 3328 uses the term "police officer" whereas the rulemaking uses the term "officer." IRRC recommended that the preamble to the final-form rulemaking explain the reason for the use of the term "officer" instead of "police officer" and then define the term "officer" in the chapter. The State Police has chosen to remedy this inconsistency by replacing the term "officer" in the final-form rulemaking with the term "police officer."

§ 42.21 (relating to identification and uniform requirements)

IRRC commented on the requirement in subsection (a) that police officers without identification should not attempt to stop traffic law violators absent an immediate threat to public safety. At IRRC's suggestion, this requirement has been changed to provide that officers without identification may not attempt to stop traffic law violators unless there is immediate threat to public safety. Likewise, IRRC commented on the requirement in subsection (b) that markings on alternative attire should be visible from the front and back. IRRC recommended replacing the word "should" with the word "shall." Although the State Police believes markings should be visible from the front and back, this may not always be practical. Consequently, the provision has been eliminated from the final-form rulemaking.

§ 42.22 (relating to vehicle stops and pursuits)

IRRC pointed out that subsection (b) inaccurately cited 67 Pa. Code Chapter 173 (relating to flashing or evolving lights on emergency and authorized vehicles) as containing the requirements related to audible and visual signals. The reference to 67 Pa. Code Chapter 173 has been replaced with a reference to 75 Pa.C.S. § 4571 (relating to visual and audible signals and emergency vehicles).

Fiscal Impact

This final-form rulemaking will have a minimal fiscal impact.

Paperwork Requirements

This final-form rulemaking will not require the completion of additional forms, reports or other paperwork.

Regulatory Review

On February 4, 2004, copies of this final-form rulemaking were delivered to IRRC and the Majority and Minority Chairpersons of the House Judiciary Committee and the Senate Law and Justice Committee. Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 34 Pa.B. 853 (February 14, 2004) and provided for a 30-day public comment period. In compliance with section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(c)), the State Police provided IRRC and the Committees with copies of all comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents if requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the State Police has considered all comments received from IRRC, the House and Senate Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(j.2)), this final-form rulemaking was

deemed approved by the Senate Committee on Law and Justice. The House Judiciary Committee disapproved the rulemaking on October 19, 2004. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC approved the final-form rulemaking on November 4, 2004. Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, on November 4, 2004, IRRC notified the House Judiciary Committee that it had approved the final-form rulemaking. More than 14 days have passed since the House Judiciary Committee received notice of IRRC's approval order, and the Committee has not taken further action on the final-form rulemaking. Accordingly, under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, the State Police are entitled to promulgate this final-form rulemaking.

Findings

The State Police finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt this final-form rulemaking has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. \S 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code \S 7.1 and 7.2.2003.

(2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered and forwarded to IRRC, the Senate Committee on Law and Justice and the House Judiciary Committee.

(3) The adoption of this final-form rulemaking in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute.

Order

The State Police, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the State Police, 37 Pa. Code, are amended by adding §§ 42.1-42.3, 42.21 and 42.22 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The State Police will submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General as required by law for approval as to form and legality.

(c) The State Police shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

CHAPTER 42. USE OF UNMARKED VEHICLES

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sec. 42.1. Purpose. 42.2. Policy and effect. 42.3. Definitions. PROCEDURES

42.21. Identification and uniform requirements. 42.22. Vehicle stops and pursuits.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 42.1. Purpose.

This chapter governs the use of unmarked vehicles. It is necessary to establish uniformity in the use of unmarked vehicles by police officers.

§ 42.2. Policy and effect.

The policy of the Commonwealth is to permit the use of unmarked vehicles by police officers. Failure to comply with this chapter does not affect the legality of any arrest or citation, nor will it be grounds for the suppression of evidence except as provided by statutory or constitutional law.

§ 42.3. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless otherwise indicated:

Light bar assembly—A device designed and constructed to display more than one steady burning, flashing or revolving beam of light with 360° visibility.

Marked police vehicle—A police vehicle that is equipped with at least one light-bar assembly and displays graphics, markings or decals identifying the agency or department on a minimum of three sides (front, rear, left or right).

Official identification—Identification issued, designated or approved by the individual law enforcement agency or municipality.

Official uniform—Any attire designated or approved by the individual law enforcement agency or municipality.

Unmarked police vehicle—A police vehicle not equipped with a roof mounted light-bar assembly. The vehicle may display graphics, markings or decals, identifying the agency or department.

PROCEDURES

§ 42.21. Identification and uniform requirements.

(a) *Identification*. Police officers using an unmarked police vehicle shall ensure they are carrying official identification, other than their uniform, to verify their identity, unless it would jeopardize the police officers' safety due to their work assignment. Police officers shall be prepared to display their official identification upon request. Police officers shall honor these requests when the request is reasonable and the police officer's safety has been ensured. If the police officer does not carry official identification, the police officer may not attempt to stop traffic law violators, unless there is immediate threat to public safety.

(b) *Uniforms.* Police officers assigned to use an unmarked police vehicle to perform patrol duties shall be

attired in an official uniform. Police officers assigned other duties that are likely to include or require traffic stops shall wear an official uniform or alternative attire, such as a police raid jacket, that bears the name of a specific law enforcement agency or task force.

§ 42.22. Vehicle stops and pursuits

(a) Stopping suspected violators while operating an unmarked police vehicle. Police officers stopping suspected violators shall attempt to ascertain the safest available location for the police officer and the motorist, consistent with the need for prompt action. Police officers shall take into consideration the road and weather conditions, terrain, lighting, traffic and the nature of the violation. The police officer shall also attempt to choose a location that will afford both the driver and the police officer a sense of safety.

(b) Use of audible and visual signals required while operating an unmarked police vehicle. Audible and visual signals meeting the requirements of 75 Pa.C.S. § 4571 (relating to visual and audible signals on emergency vehicles) shall be utilized when police officers stop suspected violators.

(c) Unmarked police vehicle pursuits. Police officers engaged in a pursuit using an unmarked police vehicle, shall relinquish their role as the primary pursuit vehicle and permit police officers in marked police vehicles to assume the role of the primary pursuit vehicle when that assistance is available.

Title 61—REVENUE

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE [61 PA. CODE CH. 32]

Corrective Amendment to 61 Pa. Code § 32.34(a) (3)(iii)(G)

The Department of Revenue has discovered a discrepancy between the agency text of 61 Pa. Code § 32.34(a)(3)(iii)(G) (relating to public utilities) originally the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter* (MTS 109) (December 1983) and the official text of 61 Pa. Code § 32.34(a)(3)(iii)(G) codified in the December 1990 *Pennsylvania Code Reporter* (Master Transmittal Sheet No. 193), and as currently appearing in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The word "not" was inadvertently deleted from the last sentence of subsection (a)(3)(iii)(G).

Therefore, under 45 Pa.C.S. § 901: The Department of Revenue has deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau a corrective amendment to 61 Pa. Code § 32.34(a)(3)(iii)(G). The corrective amendment to 61 Pa. Code § 32.34(a)(3)(iii)(G) is effective as of December 1, 1990, the date the defective official text was announced in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The correct version of 61 Pa. Code § 32.34(a)(3)(iii)(G) appears in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulation.

Annex A

TITLE 61. REVENUE PART I. DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE Subpart B. GENERAL FUND REVENUES ARTICLE II. SALES AND USE TAX CHAPTER 32. EXEMPTIONS BUSINESS EXEMPTIONS

§ 32.34. Public utilities.

(a) Equipment, machinery, parts and foundations therefor, and supplies used directly in rendering public utility service. The purchase or use by a public utility of tangible personal property or services performed thereon to be predominantly used directly by it in producing, delivering or rendering of a public utility service or constructing. reconstructing, remodeling, repairing or maintaining facilities directly used in the service is exempt from tax, whether or not the facilities constitute real estate. However, for purposes of this exemption, real estate does not include buildings, roads or similar facilities. Effective March 4, 1971, foundations for exempt machinery or equipment became subject to tax and remained taxable until February 9, 1981. Effective February 7, 1981, foundations used to support equipment, machinery and parts used directly in rendering a public utility service are exempt from tax. The term "foundations" includes sand, gravel, crushed rock, concrete or similar material used as bedding or surrounding pipe used directly in rendering a public utility sanitary sewer or water service. Purchases of any vehicles required to be registered under 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 101-9909 (relating to Vehicle Code), except those vehicles used directly by a public utility engaged in business as a common carrier as well as supplies and repair parts for the vehicles, is subject to tax.

* * * * *

(3) *Property not directly used.* Property in the following categories is not directly used in public utility operations and the purchase or use of the property is subject to tax:

* * * * *

(iii) *Managerial, sales or other nonoperational activities.* Property used in managerial, sales or other nonoperational activities is not directly used in the production, delivery or rendition of a public utility service and is therefore subject to tax. This category includes, but is not limited to, property used in any of the following activities:

* * * * *

(G) Activities prior to production, delivery or rendition of services. Property used to transport personnel or to collect, convey or transport other property, and storage facilities or devices used to store or hold property prior to its use in the production, delivery or rendition of a public utility service is subject to tax. Property used to transport, store or hold the actual product which is delivered as a public utility service is directly used and therefore is not subject to tax.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

STATE REGISTRATION BOARD FOR PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERS, LAND SURVEYORS AND GEOLOGISTS

[49 PA. CODE CH. 37]

Biennial Renewal Fees and Examination Fees

The State Registration Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors and Geologists (Board) proposes to amend § 37.17 (relating to fees) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Description of Proposed Rulemaking

Section 37.17 sets forth a schedule of fees charged by the Board. The proposed rulemaking would raise the biennial renewal fees for professional engineers, professional land surveyors and professional geologists from \$25 to \$50; delete the examination fees for all three license classes; and make minor editorial changes.

Background and Need for Proposed Rulemaking

a. New Biennial Renewal Fees

Section 9 of the Engineer, Land Surveyor and Geologist Registration Law (Registration Law) (63 P. S. § 156)

To close the gap between the Board's revenues and expenses, the BFO recommended that the Board increase the biennial renewal fees for all three licensure classes from \$25 to \$50, effective with the biennial renewal period that begins October 1, 2005. The higher biennial renewal fees would raise biennial renewal revenues from the current to \$960,125.00 to \$1,920,250. The BFO estimates that these additional biennial revenues would enable the Board to have positive balances for the foreseeable future, including approximately \$815,861.32 at the end of FY08-09.

b. Deletion of Examination Fees

The examinations for certification as an engineer-intraining and surveyor-in-training and for licensure as a provides that the Board's biennial revenues from fees, fines and civil penalties shall meet or exceed the Board's biennial expenditures. Because fines and civil penalties have historically accounted for a small percentage of the Board's total revenues, the Board must generate most of its revenues from fees.

The Board's principal sources of fee revenues are the fees charged to licensees for biennial renewal of their registrations. The biennial renewal fees account for approximately 77% of the Board's fee revenues during each biennial renewal period. The biennial renewal fees defray general operating expenses and overhead —primarily in the areas of investigation, prosecution and enforcement—that are not susceptible of being apportioned to a specific segment of persons and entities regulated by the Board and, therefore, are borne equally by the entire regulated community.

The current \$25 biennial renewal fees for professional engineers and professional land surveyors were established in 1978 by section 101 of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs Fee Act (63 P. S. § 1401-101). The current \$25 biennial renewal fee for professional geologists was adopted in 1994.

A recent analysis prepared by the Department of State's Bureau of Finance and Operations (BFO) determined that the Board's current biennial renewal fee structure is inadequate to meet the Board's revenue needs. As reflected by the following revenue and expense data and projections provided by the BFO, the Board will continue to run large deficits unless the biennial renewal fees are increased:

professional engineer, professional land surveyor and professional geologist are developed, administered and graded by independent testing organizations under contract with the Commonwealth. The Board has no role in establishing examination fees. Examination fees are established by contract between the independent testing organizations and the Commonwealth and are remitted by examination candidates directly to those organizations. The Board proposes to discontinue the practice of periodically amending its regulations to publish updated schedules of examination fees. Accordingly, the proposed rulemaking would delete all references to examination fees. The Board would continue to provide current examination fee information to examination candidates on its website.

c. Editorial Changes

The proposed rulemaking would make minor editorial changes to descriptions of the fees for consistency of usage in the fee schedule.

Fiscal Impact

The proposed rulemaking would generate approximately \$960,125 in additional biennial renewal fee revenues, broken down as follows:

Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking would require the Board to change its biennial renewal form to reflect the new fees. The proposed rulemaking would not create additional paperwork requirements for the regulated community.

Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking would become effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The new biennial renewal fees would apply to licensees who renew their registrations for the biennial renewal period beginning October 1, 2005.

Statutory Authority

Section 9 of the Registration Law requires the Board to establish fees by regulation and to ensure that revenues derived from fees, fines and civil penalties are adequate to cover the Board's expenditures over a biennial period. Section 4(e) of the Registration Law (63 P. S. § 151(e)) contemplates that the Board may assess biennial renewal fees by regulation.

The Board considers the proposed rulemaking to be both required by law and the least restrictive means of covering the cost of activities that the Board is required to perform.

Regulatory Review

On December 22, 2004, under authority of section 5(a) and (f) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a) and (f)), the Board submitted copies of this proposed rulemaking, a Regulatory Analysis Form and a Fee Report Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). Copies of the Regulatory Analysis and Fee Report Forms are available to the public upon request.

In accordance with section 5(a) and (f) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board will deliver copies of this proposed rulemaking and the Regulatory Analysis and Fee Report Forms to the Chairpersons of the Senate Standing Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure and the House Standing Committee on Professional Licensure by the second Monday after the date on which committee designations for the 2005-2006 session of the General Assembly are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin.*

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days after the close of

the public comment period, specifying the regulatory review criteria that have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act sets forth procedures that permit the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor to review IRRC's comments, recommendations or objections prior to final adoption of the proposed rulemaking.

DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION

Meeting and Public Hearing

The Delaware River Basin Commission (Commission) will hold an informal conference followed by a public hearing on Wednesday, January 19, 2005. The hearing will be part of the Commission's regular business meeting. Both the conference session and business meeting are open to the public and will be held at the Commission's offices, 25 State Police Drive, West Trenton, NJ.

The conference among the Commissioners and staff will begin at 9:30 a.m. Topics of discussion will include: response to the Athos I oil spill; staff recommendations on a proposal to amend the *Water Quality Regulations, Water Code* and *Comprehensive Plan* to classify the Lower Delaware River as Special Protection Waters; progress report on Stage 2 TMDLs for PCBs in the Delaware Estuary; report on the Delaware Estuary Science Conference of January 10—12, 2005; report on the Flow Management Technical Advisory Committee Work Group Meetings of November 9—10 and December 3, 2004, and January 6 and 18, 2005; and a proposed resolution to adopt the Commission's annual budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2005, and to apportion among the signatory parties the amounts required for support of the Commission's annual and operating budgets.

The subjects of the public hearing to be held during the 1 p.m. business meeting include the dockets listed as follows:

1. *Knoll, Inc. D-74-162-2.* An application to modify a wastewater treatment plant discharge for the Knoll Furniture Manufacturing Facility located off Water Street, approximately 1,000 feet northeast of its intersection with Peevy Road in Upper Hanover Township, Montgomery County, PA. No new treatment facilities are proposed. A junction box at the sewage treatment plant will be repaired, and the facility will be rerated to include an additional 3,000 gallons of wastewater flow. Although the current docket provides for a flow of 0.07 million gallons per day (mgd), the wastewater treatment plant provides advanced treatment of a total flow of 0.073 mgd from sanitary, process and cooling water sources prior to discharge to Perkiomen Creek in the Schuylkill River Watershed.

2. Alcoa Extrusions, Inc. D-82-5-3. An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal project to reduce withdrawal from 21.6 million gallons per 30 days (mg/30 days) to 11.0 mg/30 days to supply the applicant's manufacturing facility from existing Wells Nos. 1 and 2 in the West Branch Schuylkill River Watershed. The project is located in Cressona Borough, Schuylkill County, PA.

3. Occidental Chemical Corporation D-83-9-2. An application to amend the current docket, which provides for a discharge from the 0.3 mgd (design) industrial waste treatment plant (IWTP) to contain and treat mercury contaminated groundwater at the applicant's Delaware City chemical manufacturing plant located off State Route 9 in New Castle County, DE. Barrier walls have been constructed around the perimeter of the Process Area and Waste Lake 1. Contaminated groundwater from within these containments will be pumped at a maximum rate of 30 gallons per minute (43,200 gallons per day) for treatment at an activated carbon treatment system before being discharged to the existing IWTP for mercury removal. The IWTP discharge is to the Delaware River in Water Quality Zone 5.

4. County of Chester D-83-15 CP-2. An application to upgrade the applicant's existing 0.105 mgd sewage treatment plant (STP) from a secondary treatment facility to tertiary treatment with no increase in treatment capacity. The STP will continue to serve only the Pocopson Home and Prison. The STP is located approximately 1/2 mile north of the intersection of Route 52 and Wawaset Road in Pocopson Township, Chester County, PA in the Pocopson Creek Watershed. The existing effluent spray field irrigation system will also be upgraded and no effluent discharge to surface water is proposed. (This docket was NAR'd as D-2004-7 CP.)

5. Waste Management Disposal Services of Pennsylvania, Inc. D-88-54-2. An application to modify a landfill leachate treatment plant discharge to the tidal Delaware River by means of a constructed discharge cove in Water Quality Zone 2. The treatment plant serves the Tullytown and GROWS Landfills and is located off Bordentown Road in Falls Township, Bucks County, PA. The existing 0.1 mgd leachate treatment plant utilizes the Best Available Treatment Technology but cannot consistently meet effluent total dissolved solids and color limits. The docket holder has requested modification of its docket to allow an increase in the average discharge concentration of Total Dissolved Solids to 10,000 mg/l from the current 6,560 mg/l and an increase in the maximum effluent limit for True Color to 1,500 units from the current 750 units on a platinum-cobalt scale. In support of its requested modifications, the docket holder has completed an environmental study that indicates the changes would result in no significant impact to the Delaware Estuary. No increase in treatment plant capacity is proposed. The docket holder also proposes to construct two effluent storage tanks at the GROWS leachate treatment plant to replace an existing tank and seeks approval to haul nonhazardous leachate to a proposed transfer station that will reroute flow to the Morrisville Borough STP, just upstream on the tidal Delaware River within Water Quality Zone 2.

6. *Blue Ridge Real Estate Company D-91-46-2.* An application for the renewal of a surface water withdrawal project to continue withdrawal of 12 mg/30 days to supply the applicant's proposed golf course at the Jack Frost Ski Area from an existing intake in the Tobyhanna Creek. The project is located in Kidder Township, Carbon County, PA.

7. Borough of Sellersville D-92-84 CP RENEWAL. An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal project to continue withdrawal of 20.54 mg/30 days to supply the applicant's distribution system from existing Wells Nos. 1 and 4—6 in the Tohickon Creek and East Branch Perkiomen Creek Watersheds. The project is located in West Rockhill Township and the Borough of Sellersville, Bucks County, PA and is located in the Southeastern Pennsylvania Groundwater Protected Area.

8. *The Premcor Refining Group, Inc. D-93-4-3.* An application to replace the withdrawal of water from Well No. P-9 in the applicant's water supply system, which has become an unreliable source of supply. The applicant requests withdrawal from replacement Well No. P-9A. No

change in the total withdrawal from all wells—currently 180 mg/30 days—is proposed. The project is located in the C & D Canal East, Dragon Run and Red Lion Creek Watersheds in Delaware City, New Castle County, DE.

9. AMETEK U.S. Gauge Division D-93-25(G)-2. An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal project to continue withdrawal of 3.88 mg/30 days to supply the applicant's industrial facility and groundwater remediation project from existing Wells Nos. RW-1 and MW-6S and new Well No. MW-10S in the East Branch Perkiomen Creek Watershed. The project is located in Sellersville Borough, Bucks County, PA within the South-eastern Pennsylvania Groundwater Protected Area.

10. United Water Delaware D-96-50 CP-2. An application for the renewal of a surface water withdrawal project to continue withdrawal of 30 mgd to provide supply to the applicant's public water distribution system, originally docketed under D-91-72 CP, and for a proposed revision to the operating plan of the tidal capture structure (TCS) originally docketed under D-96-50 CP. The applicant requests removal of the Q_{7-10} passby requirement when the natural stream flow is less than 17.2 mgd or chlorides immediately at the outlet of the TCS bypass structure downstream of the TCS are greater than 250 ppm. Surface water is withdrawn from the confluence of the White Clay Creek and Red Clay Creek at the Stanton Intake, and/or from the tidal backflow from the Christina River created by the TCS, by means of an intake at the TCS. The modification of the TCS operating plan is designed to increase water supply reliability during low flow conditions, attenuate brackish water impacts and maintain essential physical habitat at the tidal/ freshwater interface controlled by the TCS. The TCS operating plan revision includes incremental passby flow targets in conjunction with salinity monitoring to protect the applicant's water supply and preserve depth of water downstream of the TCS for aquatic habitat protection. The project is located in New Castle County, DE.

11. Plumstead Township D-97-33 CP-2. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to renew the allocation included in Docket D-94-43 P.A. and consolidate all other docket approvals for Plumstead Township, retaining the existing withdrawal from all wells of 15.31 mg/30 days. Docket D-97-33 CP-2 consolidates allocations approved under D-92-76 P.A., D-94-43 P.A., D-95-18 CP and D-97-33 CP. The project is located in the North Branch Neshaminy Creek, Geddes Run, Cabin Run and Pine Run Watersheds in Plumstead Township, Bucks County, PA, within the Southeastern Groundwater Protected Area.

12. Green-Waltz Water Company, Inc., Nestlé Waters North America Inc., D-98-55-2. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 11.7 mg/30 days of water for bulk water supply to the applicant's bottling plant from replacement Well B-1, screened in the unconsolidated deposits overlying the Martinsburg Formation. Well B-1 will replace Well 1 (also known as W-1). Green-Waltz Water Company, Inc. sold to Nestlé Waters North America Inc. (NWNA) its interests in waters from the spring sources located on the subject property, but remains a co-owner of the site and facilities. The NWNA has assumed the role of operator of the facilities, and as such, has responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the withdrawal from Well B-1. The applicant has not requested a change in the existing allocation of 11.7 mg/30 days. The project is located in the Waltz Creek Watershed in Washington Township, Northampton County, PA.

13. Pennsylvania American Water Company D-99-30 CP 2. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 5.83 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's Glen Alsace public water supply distribution system from replacement Well GL-2A in the Brunswick Formation, and to retain the existing withdrawal from all wells at 50 mg/30 days. Proposed replacement Well No. GL-2A will replace former Well No. GL-2 and is planned to be used as a regular source to the Glen Alsace distribution system. The project also includes two existing interconnections from the Reading Area Water Authority (45 mg/30 days) and the Mount Penn Water Authority (6 mg/30 days). The project is located in the Antietam Creek Watershed in Exeter Township, Berks County, PA.

14. Lower Perkiomen Valley Regional Sewer Authority D-2001-42 CP-2. An application to expand the Oaks STP from 9.5 mgd to 14.25 mgd. The plant will continue to provide advanced secondary treatment by means of an anoxic/oxic biological process. The Oaks STP is located at the confluence of Perkiomen Creek and the Schuylkill River in Upper Providence Township, Montgomery County, PA. The project will continue to serve portions of Upper Providence, Perkiomen and Skippack Townships, plus Collegeville and Trappe Boroughs, all in Montgomery County, PA. STP effluent will continue to be discharged to the Schuylkill River through the existing outfall. (This docket was NAR'd as D-2004-20 CP.)

15. Little Washington Wastewater Company D-2001-54-2. An application to expand a 0.12 mgd STP to process 0.155 mgd on a maximum monthly basis, while maintaining tertiary level of treatment. The plant is located just south of Little Washington-Lyndell Road in East Brandywine Township, Chester County, PA. Currently, up to 53,100 gpd of STP effluent is discharged to Culbertson Run in the Brandywine Creek Watershed and up to 66,133 gpd to effluent disposal beds that recharge the groundwater table. The additional effluent from the proposed expansion will be routed back to the proposed Hideaway Farm subdivision for application to new disposal beds. The proposed expansion will enable the applicant to serve additional residential development in East Brandywine Township.

16. Pennsylvania-American Water Company D-2003-6 CP-1. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 5.616 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's Country Club of the Poconos at Big Ridge distribution system from new Wells Nos. 3 and 5 in the Mahatango Formation, and to increase the existing withdrawal from all wells to 9.316 mg/30 days. The project is located in the Pond Creek Watershed in Middle Smithfield Township, Monroe County, PA in the drainage area of the Special Protection Waters. (This docket was NAR'd as D-2003-6 CP.)

17. Air Products and Chemicals, Inc. D-2004-27-1. An application for an existing industrial wastewater treatment plant to process up to 0.135 mgd and to continue to discharge to the Lehigh River through an existing outfall. No modification of the existing plant or increase in flow is proposed. The applicant is a manufacturing facility located in the Borough of Glendon, Northampton County, PA, in the area covered by the Lower Delaware River Management Plan.

18. *The Glass Group, Inc. D-2004-29-1*. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 30 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's manufacturing facility from Wells Nos. 13—16 in the

Cohansey Formation. The project is located in the Maurice River Watershed in the City of Millville, Cumberland County, NJ.

19. Warren Investments, LLC D-2004-31-1. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 6.91 mg/30 days of water for supplemental irrigation of the applicant's proposed Shetland Crossing Golf Club from new Wells WIA, WIB, WIC and WID, all in the Lockatong Formation. In conjunction with the groundwater withdrawal, the golf course will utilize supplemental irrigation from stormwater collected in four onsite storage ponds. The project is located in the Wickecheoke Creek Watershed in Franklin Township, Hunterdon County, NJ.

20. Bear Creek Management Company, LLC D-2004-35-1. An application for approval of a groundwater and surface water withdrawal project to supply up to 11 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's ski resort from new Wells Nos. 1—6 and up to 36 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's snowmaking operations from four ponds and one detention basin and to limit the withdrawal from all sources to 36.6 mg/30 days. The project is located in the Swabia Creek Watershed in Longswamp Township, Berks County, PA.

21. Borough of Portland D-2003-9 CP. An application to construct a 0.105 mgd wastewater treatment plant to provide tertiary treatment of flow from the proposed Portland Industrial Park and from local onlot septic systems located in Portland Borough, Northampton County, PA. The plant will be constructed in the southeast corner of Portland Borough and the project outfall will discharge to the Delaware River. This location is in DRBC Water Quality Zone 1D and in the drainage area of the Lower Delaware Management Plan.

In addition to the public hearing on the dockets listed previously, the Commission's 1 p.m. business meeting will include a public hearing and possible action on a resolution to amend Resolution No. 2002-33 relating to the operation of Lake Wallenpaupack during drought watch, drought warning and drought operations; a resolution to amend the Commission's administrative procedure and fee schedule for renewal of project approvals under Section 3.8 and Article 10 of the Delaware River Basin Compact; a resolution to amend the Water Quality Regulations, Water Code and Comprehensive Plan to designate the Lower Delaware River as Special Protection Waters; a resolution authorizing the Executive Director to extend the Commission's contract with Axys Analytical Laboratories, Inc. for analytical services in connection with the control of toxic substances in the Delaware Estuary; a resolution authorizing the Executive Director to engage a contractor to assist the Commission staff with tasks to be completed under Pennsylvania Act 220; and a resolution to adopt the Commission's annual budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2005, and to apportion among the signatory parties the amounts required for support of the Commission's annual and operating budgets.

In addition, the meeting will include: adoption of the Minutes of the October 27, 2004, business meeting; announcements; a report on Basin hydrologic conditions; a report by the Executive Director; a report by the Commission's General Counsel; and an opportunity for public dialogue. Draft dockets and the resolutions scheduled for public hearing on January 19, 2005, will be posted on the Commission's website, www.drbc.net, where they can be accessed through Next DRBC Meeting. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Federal Even Start Grants

The Federal Even Start Family Literacy Program, renamed the "William F. Goodling Even Start Family Literacy Programs," is authorized by Title I, Part B, Subpart 3 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), reauthorized as the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (NCLB Act). This program is administered by the Department of Education for family literacy programs that will:

1) Target families living in areas of high concentration of poverty who are receiving welfare benefits and who have educational needs.

2) Enable communities to foster cooperative partnerships that build on existing community resources to create a new range of services. 3) Provide services that are of sufficient intensity in terms of hours, and of sufficient duration, to make sustainable changes in a family, and that integrate all of the following:

a. Interactive literacy activities between parents and their children.

b. Training for parents regarding how to be the primary teacher for their children and full partners in the education of their children.

c. Parent literacy training that leads to economic self-sufficiency.

d. An age-appropriate education to prepare children for success in school and life experiences.

Eligibility

Organizations eligible to apply for an Even Start grant are a Local Educational Agency (LEA) or Communitybased Organization (CBO). Eligible entities are required to establish a formal partnership between one or more LEAs and one or more CBOs. A private nonprofit entity,

including a faith-based organization, as part of a partnership may serve as the fiscal agent, since school-age children who are enrolled in private elementary and secondary schools are eligible for Even Start services under the equitable participation provisions of the NCLB Act. Under these circumstances, a public agency, particularly an LEA, is required to control and administer program funds used to provide equitable services to private school students.

Selection Process

Consideration will be given to applications that meet the following conditions:

1) Reflect the family focus of Even Start.

2) Locate new sites in areas designated by the Federal government as empowerment zones or enterprise communities.

3) Provide early childhood services for a 3-year age range.

4) Submit a total budget which contains a local match beyond the required Even Start statutory percentages.

5) Target services to families most in need (that is, educationally disadvantaged adults who are receiving public assistance; do not have high school diplomas; are members of minority groups; are single parents; are victims of domestic violence; have children with developmental delays; reside in a Title I school attendance area; and (if in primary grades) are receiving Title I services).

6) Coordinate with adult education and literacy programs; county assistance offices; social service agencies; public libraries; Team PA CareerLink One-Stop Centers; Workforce Investment Act programs; elementary schools; family centers; preschool programs such as Head Start; licensed child care centers; and other community groups or agencies that provide services and assistance to persons in need of basic literacy skills and/or support services.

Funding Priorities for Grant Applications

1) Renewal of grants to currently-funded Even Start Family Literacy Programs, providing sufficient progress is made toward meeting program objectives in relation to the Pennsylvania Family Literacy Program Performance Standards and the Pennsylvania Family Literacy Summer Reading Program policy. (Note: Even Start projects applying for their 4th or 8th year of operation should consult the Application Guidelines for special provisions pertaining to the duration of projects.)

2) New Even Start Family Literacy Programs by school districts or charter schools receiving Title I, Part A, ESEA funds in areas of counties not served by a current Even Start or State Act 143 Family Literacy grant.

3) New Even Start Family Literacy Programs by community-based organizations, in partnership with school districts and/or charter schools receiving Title I, Part A, ESEA funds in areas of counties not served by a current Even Start or State Act 143 Family Literacy grant.

Grant Period

The "Grant Period" (or duration of an Even Start grant) will be for a term of 4 years provided that sufficient progress is made towards meeting program objectives in relation to the Pennsylvania Family Literacy Program Performance Standards and the Pennsylvania Family Literacy Summer Reading Program policy. The Commonwealth will not, however, issue a 4-year grant. Each year, or "Grant Year," grantees will be required to apply for continuation funding. At the end of the grant period, grantees will be authorized to reapply and compete with other applicants for another 4-year term. Upon the completion of eight years, special provisions apply to the continuation of program operations. Refer to the Application Guidelines for details.

Restrictions

1) The Federal program requires a local contribution/ matching funds in addition to the requested grant amount. The total cost of the program is to be supported by grant funds and a "local share." The Even Start statute requires a graduated increase in the local share, which ranges from 10% (in the first year) to 65% depending upon the year of operation (see Application Guidelines for details).

2) Section 1234 of the Even Start statute prohibits a local program from using grant funds for indirect costs. This restriction includes the project's matching funds (local share).

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted Under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101-6026.908)

Sections 302, 303, 304 and 305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard, or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site, and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under Sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified below, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified below. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified below, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

If required, a risk assessment report describes potential adverse effects caused by the presence of regulated substances. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is re-quired by provisions of the act for compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBIC WELFARE

Inpatient Hospital Services

This notice provides notice of the Department of Public Welfare's (Department) intent to revise its payment method for inpatient hospital services effective on or after January 1, 2005. These revisions will affect acute care general hospitals, private psychiatric hospitals, psychiatric units of general hospitals, rehabilitation hospitals and rehabilitation units of general hospitals.

The Department and representatives of the hospital industry have met extensively to negotiate the terms of a Hospital Rate Agreement. Based on these negotiations, the Department proposes to change its payment methodology for inpatient services as follows:

Base Payment Rates

Effective January 1, 2005, the Department will increase each hospital's or hospital unit's base payment rate for inpatient services provided on a fee-for-service basis by 2.5%.

Inpatient Disproportionate Share; Outpatient Disproportionate Share; and Direct Medical Education Payments Effective January 1, 2005, the Department intends to increase Inpatient Disproportionate Share payments by 3.5%. For Fiscal Year (FY) 2004-2005, the aggregate amount of Inpatient Disproportionate Share payments is to be limited to \$63.211 million in total funds. In addition to the current three qualifying methods for hospitals, a new qualifying method will be added for acute care hospitals effective January 1, 2005. An acute care hospital, including its units, will be eligible for inpatient DSH if its total number of Medical Assistance (MA) inpatient days (including exempt unit days) is equal to or greater than two standard deviations above the mean of all such days for all hospitals in this Commonwealth. Hospitals qualifying under this method will be ranked with all other previously qualified hospitals to determine a payment amount.

Effective January 1, 2005, the Department intends to increase Outpatient Disproportionate Share payments by 3.0%, with no change in the current methodology for determining eligibility for those payments. For FY 2004-2005, the aggregate amount of Outpatient Disproportionate Share payments is to be limited to \$61.405 million in total funds.

Effective January 1, 2005, the Department intends to increase Medical Education payments by 3.0%, with no change in the current methodology for determining eligibility for those payments. For FY 2004-2005, the aggre-

gate amount of Medical Education payments is to be limited to \$76.712 million in total funds.

Hospital Quality Care Incentive Proposal

The Department is proposing a pilot program that would begin July 1, 2005, and would adjust the rate of increase for disproportionate share hospitals' medical education and disproportionate share payments based on individual hospital performance related to certain quality related measures and activities.

In this program, the Department proposes to provide incentives to hospitals that demonstrate commitment to improved management of the healthcare needs of MA consumers by rewarding hospitals for the better management of chronic diseases and drug therapies, better coordination with physicians, Managed Care Organizations and the ACCESS Plus Program and investing in quality related infrastructure.

The Department is proposing a payment system that would adjust the rate of increase for hospitals' disproportionate share and medical education payments by up to 150% based on a scoring system used to measure readmission rates for the most common chronic diseases in the MA population, measures related to left ventricular function assessment and community acquired pneumonia, the reduction of pharmacy errors, the use of a single medical record and quality reporting used to score hospitals.

Changes to Acute Care Hospital Reimbursement Methodology

The Department proposes to convert its current Medicare-based Diagnosis Related Group (DRG) payment methodology to the All Patient Refined DRG methodology in calendar year 2006. The Department intends to publish a separate public notice detailing this new payment methodology.

Medical Short Stay Program

The Department intends to establish a Medical Short Stay Program (Program) to provide for payments for patients seen by hospitals where an inpatient admission is not warranted, but care beyond a typical emergency room visit is required. The Department will publish a separate public notice detailing this Program.

Fiscal Impact

This change will result in a cost of \$6.111 million in total funds (\$3.270 million in Federal funds, \$2.841 million in State funds) for FY 2004-05 and a cost of \$28.557 million in total funds (\$15.476 million in Federal funds, \$13.081 million in State funds) for FY 2005-06.

Public Comment

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments regarding this notice to the Department of Public Welfare, Office of Medical Assistance Programs, c/o Deputy Secretary's Office, Attention: Regulations Coordinator, Room 515, Health and Welfare Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120. Comments received within 30 days will be reviewed and considered in determining the final payment rates and payment methodologies for inpatient hospital services.

4. *Prize Symbols:* The prize symbols and their captions located in the "PRIZE" area of each "GAME" are: $\$1^{.00}$ (ONE DOL), $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$4^{.00}$ (FOR DOL), $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), \$20\$ (TWENTY), \$40\$ (FORTY), \$250 (TWOHUNFTY), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and \$4,000 (FOR THO).

Finding Lawrence County

Under section 2002(b) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 512(b)), the Deputy Secretary for Highway Administration, Department of Transportation (Department), makes the following written finding:

The Department plans to widen and rehabilitate approximately 2.9 km (1.8 miles) of Mercer Road between Mitchell Road to the south and Maitland Road to the north, in Neshannock and Wilmington Townships, Lawrence County. The roadway widening and rehabilitation requires the taking of approximately 0.33 ha (0.8 acre) from Pearson Park and the use of a Pearson Park parcel which qualifies as a Section 2002/Section 4(f) resource.

Mitigation measures to minimize harm to the resource include the following:

1. Access to Pearson Park will be maintained at all times. Signs will be posted during Phase 3 of construction, which requires a detour in front of Pearson Park that allows park users to access the park through the detour or access the park through an alternate entrance.

2. The proposed construction activities will be limited to the minimal area necessary to conduct the required roadway improvements.

3. Storage of construction equipment and materials will be restricted from the park.

4. All disturbed areas will be returned to preconstruction conditions when work is completed. 5. The Department will continue to coordinate with Neshannock Township regarding the project schedule and project impacts.

The Deputy Secretary has considered the environmental, economic, social and other effects of the proposed project as enumerated in section 2002 of The Administrative Code of 1929 and has concluded that there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the project as designed, and all reasonable steps have been taken to minimize the effect.

The Clean Water Act stipulates that states must maintain a Project Priority List of municipal sewage projects from which to develop the annual CWSRF Intended Use Plan (IUP) list of projects to be funded.

The projects added to the List will not replace any project currently on the approved FY 2004/2005 List. Projects were placed in the appropriate ranking slot in relation to other rated and ranked projects on the List. The rank order standing of projects on the List does not dictate the order in which projects are chosen for funding in the CWSRF program. A project may be selected from any numerical rank position on the List for funding. A project's readiness to proceed and the reasonable availability of alternative sources of funds have a bearing on project selection for funding in the program.

Some projects added to the FY 2004/2005 List are expected to proceed to construction in the near future, and others are being added as potential projects for future construction loan consideration. The projects expected to be ready for loan funding in the near future have submitted applications for funding and may be placed on an IUP to (1) replace projects that have not proceeded timely toward initiation of project construction and/or (2) to fill funding gaps that have developed as a result of cost savings. Projects removed from an IUP will remain on the List and be considered for CWSRF loan funds in the future.

STATE CONTRACTS INFORMATION DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL SERVICES

Act 266 of 1982 provides for the payment of interest penalties on certain invoices of "qualified small business concerns". The penalties apply to invoices for goods or services when payments are not made by the required payment date or within a 15 day grace period thereafter.

Act 1984-196 redefined a "qualified small business concern" as any independently owned and operated, for-profit business concern employing 100 or fewer employees. See 4 Pa. Code § 2.32. The business must include the following statement on every invoice submitted to the Commonwealth: "(name of business) is a qualified small business concern as defined in 4 Pa. Code 2.32."

A business is eligible for payments when the required payment is the latest of:

The payment date specified in the contract.


30 days after the later of the receipt of a proper invoice or receipt of goods or services.

The net payment date stated on the business' invoice.

A 15-day grace period after the required payment date is provided to the Commonwealth by the Act.




