

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Title 210—APPELLATE PROCEDURE

[210 PA. CODE CH. 21]

Order Adopting Amendments to Pa.R.A.P. 2111; No. 188 Appellate Procedural Rules; Doc. No. 1

Per Curiam:

And Now, this 5th day of June, 2008, upon the recommendation of the Appellate Court Procedural Rules Committee, it having been determined that the proposed amendment does not need to be published as it is perfunctory in nature and immediate action is otherwise required in the interest of justice pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(a)(3):

It Is Ordered, pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, that Pennsylvania Rule of Appellate Procedure 2111 is amended in the following form.

This *Order* shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b), shall be effective 30 days after adoption, and shall be applicable to briefs filed after the effective date.

TITLE 210. APPELLATE PROCEDURE PART I. RULES OF APPELLATE PROCEDURE CHAPTER 21. BRIEFS AND REPRODUCED RECORD

CONTENT OF BRIEFS

Rule 2111. Brief of the Appellant.

(a) *General rule.*—The brief of the appellant, except as otherwise prescribed by these rules, shall consist of the following matters, separately and distinctly entitled and in the following order:

(7) Statement of the reasons to allow an appeal to challenge the discretionary aspects of a sentence, if applicable.

[(7)] (8) Argument for appellant.

 $\[$ (8) $\]$ (9) A short conclusion stating the precise relief sought.

[(9)] (10) The opinions and pleadings specified in Subdivisions (b) and (c) of this rule.

[(10)] (11) In the Superior Court, a copy of the statement of errors complained of on appeal, filed with the trial court pursuant to Rule 1925(b), or an averment that no order requiring a statement of errors complained of on appeal pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 1925(b) was entered.

Official Note: The 1999 amendment requires a statement of the scope and standard of review. "'Scope of review' refers to 'the confines within which an appellate court must conduct its examination.' (Citation omitted.) In other words, it refers to the matters (or 'what') the appellate court is permitted to examine. In contrast,

'standard of review' refers to the manner in which (or 'how') that examination is conducted." *Morrison v. Commonwealth, Dept. of Public Welfare,* 538 Pa. 122, 131, 646 A.2d 565, 570 (1994). This amendment incorporates the prior practice of the Superior Court pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 3518 which required such statements. Accordingly, Rule 3518 has been rescinded as its requirement is now subsumed under paragraph (a)(2) of this Rule.

Pa.R.A.P. 2119(f) requires a separate statement of reasons that an appellate court should allow an appeal to challenge the discretionary aspects of a sentence. The 2008 amendments recognize that, while Pa.R.A.P. 2119(f) does not apply to all appeals, an appellant must include the reasons for allowance of appeal as a separate enumerated section immediately before the Argument section if he or she desires to challenge the discretionary aspects of a sentence.

TITLE 246. MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 500. ACTIONS FOR THE RECOVERY OF POSSESSION OF REAL PROPERTY

Rule 509. Amendments to Complaint.

Official Note: This rule is the same as Rule 316 of the **[trespass and assumpsit] civil** rules.

Adopted Oct. 15, 1969, effective Jan. 1, 1970. Amended June 30, 1982, effective 30 days after July 17, 1982. **Adopted June 9, 2008, immediately effective**.

FINAL REPORT¹

Amendment to the Note to Rule 509 of the Rules of Conduct, Office Standards and Civil Procedure for Magisterial District

On June 9, 2008, effective immediately, upon recommendation of the Minor Court Rules Committee, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania approved an amendment to the Note to Rule 509 of the Rules of Conduct, Office Standards and Civil Procedure for Magisterial District Judges.

I. Background

On its own initiative, the Minor Court Rules Committee (the Committee) recommended a change to the Note to Rule 509. The current language provides: "This rule is the same as Rule 316 of the *trespass and assumpsit* rules." (emphasis added).

The Note to Rule 301 explains that the outdated terms "trespass" and "assumpsit" were replaced by a more universal and modern phrase—"civil action." ("Civil action includes actions formerly denominated 'assumpsit' or 'tresspass.'") Since "civil action" replaced "assumpsit" and "trespass," the Committee has routinely recommended that the Court replace the older terms wherever they appear and substitute the more modern phrase.

II. Approved Rule Change

Accordingly, the Committee proposed that the Note to Rule 509 be amended to delete the words "trespass" and "assumpsit" and replace them with "civil."

The Committee believes this amendment to be of a perfunctory nature. Therefore, the Committee respectfully recommended that the Court adopt this recommendation in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. No. 103(a)(3), without prior publication for public comment.

TITLE 246. MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES

PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 400. ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS RENDERED BY MAGISTERIAL DISTRICT JUDGES FOR THE PAYMENT OF MONEY

Rule 410. [Bond for] Stay of Execution Generally.

- (A) Execution shall be stayed as to the property of the defendant upon the occurrence of any of the following:
- (1) Upon written request of the plaintiff to the magisterial district court.
- (2) Upon the entry of [If the defendant, or any **person or party in interest, enters**] a bond with the magisterial district **[judge]** court by any person or party in interest, with security approved by | him | the magisterial district judge, in the amount of the plaintiff's judgment, including probable interest and costs, or in such lesser amount as the magisterial district judge may direct, [the magisterial district judge shall stay execution as to the property of the defendant. The **bond shall name naming** the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as the obligee, and [shall be] conditioned to pay the amount due within [ninety (90)] 90 days of the entry of the bond, unless the time for payment is extended by the magisterial district judge. [This rule does not apply to judgments obtained for wages for manual labor.
- (B) When execution is stayed pursuant to this rule, the stay may not be lifted without written order of the magisterial district judge.
- (C) After a stay is lifted, execution may proceed without reissuance of the order of execution.

Rule 412. Notice of Sale.

- (2) The executing officer shall give notice of the sale in the following manner:

- (a) By handbill posted in the magisterial district court from which the order of execution issued and, if different from the court from which the order issued, in the magisterial district court in the magisterial district in which the place of the sale is located.
- (b) By handbill posted at the place of sale and, if different from the place of sale, at the place of levy.
- (c) By mailing a copy of the handbill to the plaintiff and to the defendant at his or her last known address.
- **B.** (B) The notice of sale shall include a notice that all claims to the property must be filed before sale in the office of the magisterial district [judge] court from which the order of execution issued and that all claims to the proceeds must be filed in that [office] court before distribution; that a proposed schedule of distribution will be filed in that office court on a date specified not later than five [(5)] days after the sale; and that distribution will be made in accordance with the **proposed** schedule unless exceptions are filed in that court within ten [(10)] days thereafter. - [C.] (C) If a new date for sale is set, new notice shall be given as prescribed in [subdivisions A and B] paragraphs (A) and (B) of this rule.

Rule 418. Abandonment of Levy for Inability to Hold Sale.

- [The] (A) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (B), the officer executing the order shall abandon the levy if sale of the property levied upon is not held within **[six (6)] three** months after the levy.
- (B) Periods during which sale is stayed under any provision of these rules shall be excluded in computing [such six months] the three month period provided in paragraph (A), but in all cases the officer executing the order shall abandon the levy if sale of the property levied upon is not held within six months.

TECHNICAL AMENDMENTS CONCERNING EXECUTION OF JUDGMENTS FOR MONEY; STAY OF EXECUTION; ABANDONMENT OF LEVY

I. Introduction

On June 9, 2008, effective January 1, 2009, upon recommendation of the Minor Court Rules Committee, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania approved amendments to Rules 410, 412 and 418 of the Rules of Conduct, Office Standards and Civil Procedure for Magisterial District Judges.3

II. Discussion and Rule Changes

The Minor Court Rules Committee ("the Committee") proposed technical amendments to Rules 410, 412, and 418 of the Rules of Conduct, Office Standards, and Civil Procedure for Magisterial District Judges to address three separate issues concerning the execution of judgments for money.

A. Rules 410 and 418

The Committee reviewed Pa.R.C.P.M.D.J. No. 410 in response to an inquiry from a constable who asked if execution of a money judgment could be stayed upon request of the plaintiff. The Committee noted that the magisterial district court rules governing execution of money judgments do make provision for a stay of execution in certain circumstances,4 but not specifically at the request of the plaintiff. The Committee further noted that the Rules of Civil Procedure governing actions in the courts of record do provide for a stay of execution "upon written direction of the plaintiff." 5

The Committee believed it advisable to incorporate a provision into the magisterial district court rules to allow for stay upon request of the plaintiff. The Committee reasoned that post-judgment settlement negotiations may affect a plaintiff's desire to move forward with execution once commenced, and believed that a plaintiff should have the ability to request a stay of execution. This proposed rule would differ from Pa.R.C.P. No. 3121(a)(1) in that it would provide for a stay of execution upon written request of the plaintiff to the magisterial district judge. The requirement that the plaintiff make the request to the court would enable the magisterial district judge to make a judicial determination as to whether the stay should be granted and provide more certainty as to when the stay takes effect.

Accordingly, the Committee proposed that Rule 410 be amended to provide for the stay of execution upon written request of the plaintiff to the magisterial district court. To accomplish this, the Committee proposed that Rule 410 be tabulated into three paragraphs. Paragraph (A) contains the provisions as to when execution shall be stayed, including the new provision regarding a stay at the request of the plaintiff. Within paragraph (A), the Committee proposed that the provision regarding the inappli-cability of the rule to judgments obtained for wages for

manual labor be deleted. This provision was based on a prior law⁶ that was repealed by the Judiciary Act Repealer Act,⁷ and was not expressly codified in the Judicial Code (Title 42, Pennsylvania Consolidated Stat-

New paragraphs (B) and (C) have been added to Rule 410 to provide that when execution is stayed under the rule the stay may not be lifted without written order of the magisterial district judge, and that when a stay is lifted execution may proceed without reissuance of the order of execution.

In the course of reviewing the Rule 410 stay provisions, the Committee reviewed the provisions in Rule 418 regarding the abandonment of a levy for inability to hold a sale. The existing rule provides that the levy shall be abandoned if a sale is not held within six months. The Committee was concerned, however, with the existing provision in the rule that periods during which the sale is stayed are excluded from the six month period. Specifically, the Committee was concerned that under the current provisions of the rule property could be subject to levy ad infinitum so long as a stay was issued and not lifted. This, of course, could impose a tremendous burden on the judgment debtor whose property is subject to the levy. The Committee noted that this situation could arise more easily if execution could be stayed simply by a request of the plaintiff as was proposed under Rule 410.

To address this problem, the Committee proposed that Rule 418 be divided into two paragraphs. New paragraph (A) provides that as a general rule the levy shall be abandoned if a sale is not held within three months. New paragraph (B) still excludes from the three-month period time during which the sale is stayed, but in all cases the executing officer would be required to abandon a levy if a sale is not held within six months. This new provision is intended put limits on the amount of time property can be subject to levy, and to enable the magisterial district judge to have more control over the length of time a stay is in effect.

B. Rule 412

The Committee reviewed Pa.R.C.P.M.D.J. No. 412 in response to an inquiry from a constable who suggested that an executing officer be required to post notice of a sale in the magisterial district court in the magisterial district in which the place of sale is located if different from the court from which the order of execution issued.8 It was suggested that this requirement would aid in informing an executing officer of other levies that may have been made upon the same property that is the subject of his or her levy and sale. This information is needed so that an executing officer will know if there is an existing levy by another executing officer that has priority over his or her levy.

The Committee agreed that such a notice requirement would be helpful. Accordingly, the Committee divided Rule 412A into two paragraphs. Paragraph (A)(1) contains the existing provision that notice of the sale be given at least six days prior to the sale. Paragraph (A)(2) contains the requirements as to how notice is to be given, including the new provision discussed above.

In addition, the Committee made other minor revisions to the rules and Notes to address gender neutrality issues and to enhance clarity.







Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before an application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on a WQM permit application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for a public hearing on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

LAND RECYCLING AND **ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION**

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101-6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under $\S\S 304(n)(1)(ii)$ and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard,

in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. Based on these findings, the Department intends to issue a plan approval for the construction of 1,120 Bhp, diesel-fired, compression ignited internal combustion engine. Additionally, if the Department determines that the respective engine is operating in compliance with all plan approval conditions, the conditions established in the plan approval will be incorporated into Title V operating permit 14-00003 by means of an administrative amendment under 25 Pa. Code § 127.450.

The following is a summary of the conditions that the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the CO emissions from the exhaust of Source ID P116 shall not exceed 1.19 grams per brake horsepower, 2.94 pounds per hour and 0.15 ton in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 3. (Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provisions in 25 Pa. Code § 123.21) Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the SOx, expressed as SO_2 emissions from the exhaust of Source ID P116 shall not exceed 0.14 gram per brake horsepower, 0.36 pound per hour and 0.02 ton in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 4. (Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provisions in 25 Pa. Code § 123.13 and 40 CFR 60.4205(b)) Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the total PM emissions from the exhaust of Source ID P116 shall not exceed 0.12 gram per brake horsepower, 0.29 pound per hour and 0.01 ton in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 5. (Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the provisions in 40 CFR 60.4205(b)) Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the VOCs, expressed as NMHC emissions from the exhaust of Source ID P116 shall not exceed 0.17 gram per brake horsepower, 0.42 pound per hour and 0.02 ton in any 12-consecutive month period.
- (Compliance with the requirement specified in this streamlined permit condition assures compliance with the

provisions in 25 Pa. Code § 123.41 and 40 CFR 60.4205(b)) Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, no person shall permit the emissions into the outdoor atmosphere of visible air contaminants in such a manner that the opacity of the emissions from Source ID P116 is equal to or greater than 15% at any time.

- 7. Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, Source ID P116 shall not operate for more than 100 hours in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 8. (Additional authority for this permit condition is derived from 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12) Until October 10, 2010, the permittee shall only use diesel fuel that meets the following parameters as fuel for Source ID P116:

- 9. (Additional authority for this permit condition is derived from 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12) Source ID P116 shall be equipped with a nonresettable hour meter prior to initial start-up of Source ID P116 and the nonresettable hour meter shall continuously monitor the hours of operation of Source ID P116.
- $10. \ \,$ The permittee shall keep records of the following information:
- a) The monthly calculations of air contaminant emissions from Source ID P116 used to verify compliance with NOx, CO, SOx, PM and VOC emissions limitations in any 12-consecutive month period.
- b) The number of hours through the nonresettable hour meter that Source ID P116 is operated on a monthly basis and reason of operation.
- c) For each delivery of diesel for this engine, a copy of the fuel certification report that verifies compliance with diesel fuel requirements for Source ID P116.
- d) Maintenance records for Source ID P116 that verifies the engine is operated and maintained according to the manufacturer's written instructions and recommendations.

These records shall be kept for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.

- 11. The permittee shall submit the following report on a annual basis:
- a) The monthly calculations of air contaminant emissions from Source ID P116 used to verify compliance with NOx, CO, SOx, PM and VOC emissions limitations in any 12-consecutive month period.
- b) The number of hours through the nonresettable hour meter that Source ID P116 is operated on a monthly basis and reason of operation.

- c) For each delivery of diesel for this engine, a copy of the fuel certification report that verifies compliance with diesel fuel requirements for Source ID P116.
- d) Maintenance records for Source ID P116 that verifies the engine is operated and maintained according to the manufacturer's written instructions and recommendations.

Annual reports shall be submitted to the Department and EPA by March 1 for the previous calendar year (January 1 through December 31).

12. Under 40 CFR 63.6645(f), within 120 days from initial start-up of Source ID P116, the permittee shall submit initial notification that contains all information specified in 40 CFR 63.9(b)(2)(i)—(v) including a statement that Source ID P116 has no additional applicable requirements of 40 CFR Part 63, Subpart ZZZZ and explain the basis for exclusion.

Initial notification shall be submitted to the Department and EPA prior to initial startup of Source ID P116.

- 13. (Additional authority for this permit condition is derived from 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12) Source ID P116 shall operate only for purposes of readiness testing, maintenance checks and emergency situations. Source ID P116 shall not operate for purposes of peak shaving or to supply electricity to an electric grid or otherwise supply power as part of a financial arrangement with another entity.

(139 South First Street, Catawissa, PA 17820) has submitted to the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) a plan approval application for the construction of a new fish food pellet dryer to replace the existing fish food pellet dryer (Belt-O-Matic model No. 205 B), the installation of a sodium hypochlorite (NaOCl) solution injection system for the dryer exhaust and existing extruder

exhaust (tied into the dryer stack) and for the installation of a building ventilation system at the facility located in Catawissa Borough, **Columbia County**. The respective facility is a nonmajor facility for which a State-only operating permit application (19-00027) has been submitted. The new proposed dryer has double the throughput capacity of the existing dryer (2.5 tph to 5.0 tph). Malodorous air contaminants (primarily trimethylamine), from the new dryer, after sodium hypochlorite injection, are expected to be between 2 and 3 tpy, however, total VOC emissions could be as high as 22 tpy. Potential PM emissions, from the proposed dryer, after cyclone control, are estimated to be 6.57 tpy. No HAP emissions are expected to be emitted from the proposed dryer.

The Department's review of the information contained in the application indicates that the proposed dryer will comply with all applicable requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants including the BACT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, and 25 Pa. Code §§ 123.13, 123.21, 123.31 and 123.41. Based on this finding, the Department intends to issue a plan approval for the proposed construction and installations. Additionally, if the Department determines that the source and the air cleaning devices are operating in compliance with the plan approval conditions, the conditions established in the plan approval will be incorporated into an operating permit by means of an administrative amendment under 25 Pa. Code § 127.450.

The Department proposes to place in the plan approval the following conditions to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

- 1. Source ID P101A is a model no. 430 B fish food pellet dryer/cooler manufactured by Belt-o-matic with a maximum capacity of 5.0 tons of fish food per hour. The dryer is equipped with one propane fired burner with a rated heat input capacity of 2.0 mmBtu/hr. Under the BAT provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the air contaminant emissions from the dryer shall be controlled by an Aircon Corporation model No. 1HE-43 high efficiency cyclone. The cyclone shall be insulated.
- 2. Under the malodor provisions of 25 Pa. Code § 123.31, the malodorous air contaminants from the pellet dryer and extruder shall be treated with a sodium hypochlorite solution applied using a sodium hypochlorite injection system. The sodium hypochlorite injection system shall consist of a minimum of four BETE Microwhirl nozzles installed in the dryer exhaust ductwork after the cyclone and before the exhaust fan, a Jesco America Corporation model No. 5701 solution metering pump and a minimum 250 gallon solution feed tank. Within 60 days of issuance of this plan approval, the hypochlorite injection system shall be made capable of operating the entire year, and shall be operated whenever the extruder and/or pellet dryer are operating.
- 3. Under the malodor provisions of 25 Pa. Code § 123.31, the permittee shall install a facility-wide ventilation system (as specified in plan approval application 19-317-022D) within 180 days of issuance of this plan approval. The ventilation system shall consist of five 12" by 30" hoods installed at the locations indicated in the plan approval application (that is, extruder, pellet mill, pellet cooler room and two at discharge points of screw feeds in feed batch preparation area), one 6,500 cfm exhaust blower and an 87' stack. Each hood shall be placed above and as close to the source of fugitive malodors as possible.

4. Under the BAT provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the PM concentration from the exhaust of the pellet dryer and extruder (that is, final exhaust stack after the dryer cyclone and extruder tie-in) shall not exceed 0.02 gr/dscf.

- 5. Under the malodor provisions of 25 Pa. Code § 123.31, the concentration of methylamine compounds from the exhaust of the pellet dryer and extruder (that is, final exhaust stack after the sodium hypochlorite injection system and extruder tie-in) shall not exceed 5.0 ppmv.
- 6. Within 180 days of the start of operation of the fish food pellet dryer (Source ID P101A), the permittee shall perform stack testing to determine compliance with the PM emission limit of 0.02 gr/dscf. Stack testing shall be performed in accordance with the applicable provisions of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139 (relating to sampling and testing) using test methods and procedures approved by the Department. Testing shall be performed when the dryer and extruder are operating at maximum routine operating conditions.

At least 60 days prior to all stack testing required in this plan approval, the permittee shall submit two copies of a test protocol to the Department's Northcentral Region for review and approval. This protocol shall describe the test methods and procedures to be used in the performance of testing, and shall include dimensioned sketches of the exhaust systems showing the locations of all proposed sampling ports. The protocol shall also identify all process parameters, which will be monitored and recorded during testing to verify maximum routine operating conditions during testing, and to verify that all associated air cleaning devices are operating normally during testing.

At least 14 days prior to stack testing, the permittee shall notify the Department (Northcentral Regional Office and Central Office, Source Testing Section) of the actual dates and times that testing will occur so that Department personnel can arrange to be present during testing. The Department is under no obligation to accept the results of the testing without having been given proper notification.

Within 60 days following the completion of the stack testing, the permittee shall submit two copies of a test report to the Department's Northcentral Region for review and approval. The test report shall contain the results of the testing, a description of the test methods and procedures actually used, copies of all raw test data with sample calculations and copies of all process data recorded during testing. Since the testing is required for the purpose of demonstrating compliance with emission limitation identified in this plan approval, the results of the testing shall be expressed in units identical to the units of the limitation identified in this plan approval.

- 7. The permittee shall install an exhaust stack sampling system and take accurate draeger tube concentration measurements (ppmv) for methylamine compounds at least once each day when the extruder and dryer are operating at normal capacity. The methylamine measurements shall be taken at least two stack diameters downstream of the extruder tie-in.
- 8. The permittee shall install a rotameter that shall accurately and continuously measure the flow rate of sodium hypochlorite solution injected into the extruder and pellet dryer exhaust stack. The permittee shall also accurately measure the concentration (by weight) of sodium hypochlorite being injected into the stack by accu-

rately measuring and recording the amount of 15% sodium hypochlorite solution and dilution water added to the 250 gallon tank. The sodium hypochlorite solution injection rate shall, at a minimum, be 7 gph, and the concentration of sodium hypochlorite in the injection solution shall be at least 2.8%, by weight (the Department reserves the right to raise these amounts should information gathered during the dryer shakedown period suggest that a higher solution flow rate and/or concentration is required to meet the methylamines concentration limit or to reduce malodors).

- 9. The high efficiency cyclone (Control Device ID C101) shall be equipped with instrumentation to accurately and continuously measure the pressure differential across the cyclone.
- 10. The permittee shall perform weekly maintenance checks on the sodium hypochlorite injection system's feed tank, pump, piping and injection nozzles.
- 11. The permittee shall perform weekly maintenance checks on the facility-wide ventilation system's hoods, duct work and exhaust blower.
- 12. The permittee shall keep accurate records of the daily methylamine compounds concentration measurements from the extruder and pellet dryer exhaust and shall record the material throughput of the extruder and pellet dryer and shall certify that the recorded throughputs are at normal production levels. The records shall also include date and time of measurement and any other pertinent comments. The records shall be retained for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.
- 13. The permittee shall keep accurate records of the flow rate of sodium hypochlorite solution into the extruder and pellet dryer exhaust stack at least once each working shift. In addition, the permittee shall keep accurate records of the concentration of sodium hypochlorite (by weight) in each batch of sodium hypochlorite solution prepared and shall keep records of the dates, procedures, measurements and calculations used to determined the sodium hypochlorite concentration. The records shall be retained for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.
- 14. The permittee shall keep records of the pressure differential across the high efficiency cyclone (Control Device ID C101) at least once each day when the pellet dryer is operating. The records shall be retained for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.
- 15. The permittee shall keep records of the weekly maintenance checks performed on the sodium hypochlorite injection system and the facility-wide ventilation system; the records shall include, date and time of maintenance check, equipment inspected and maintenance performed. The records shall be retained for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.
- 16. Under the BAT provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, all raw material storage containers shall be kept closed when not in use. In addition, the permittee shall clean up spills of all raw materials and/or products as expeditiously as possible.
- 17. (a) The permittee shall report malfunctions which occur at this facility to the Department. A malfunction is any sudden, infrequent, and not reasonably preventable failure of air pollution control equipment, process equip-

- ment, or a process to operate in a normal or usual manner that may result in an increase in the emissions of air contaminants. Failures that are caused in part by poor maintenance or careless operation are not malfunctions.
- (b) Failures that are caused in part by poor maintenance or careless operation shall be reported as excess emissions or deviations from this permit's requirements.
- (c) When the malfunction, excess emissions or deviation from this permit's requirements poses an imminent and substantial danger to the public health and safety or the environment, the permittee shall notify the Department by telephone no later than 1 hour after the incident.
- (d) Unless otherwise required by the specific reporting requirements, any malfunction, excess emissions or deviation from this permit's requirements that is not subject to the notice requirements of subsection (c) of this permit condition shall be reported to the Department within 1 working day of discovery. In notifying the Department, the permittee shall describe the following:
 - (i) Name and location of the facility.
 - (ii) Nature and cause of the malfunction or breakdown.
- (iii) Time when the malfunction or breakdown was first observed.
 - (iv) Expected duration of excess emissions.
 - (v) Estimated rate of emissions.
 - (vi) Corrective actions or preventative measures taken.
- (e) The permittee shall notify the Department immediately when corrective measures have been accomplished.
- (f) Upon the request of the Department, the permittee shall submit a full written report to the Regional Air Program Manager within 15 days of the malfunction, excess emissions or deviations from this permit's requirements.
- 18. Issuance of an operating permit for Source ID P101A is contingent upon all sources being constructed, all air cleaning devices being installed and all sources and air cleaning devices being maintained and operated as described in the plan approval application and supplemental materials submitted with the application, and in accordance with all conditions contained herein, and upon satisfactory demonstration that any air contaminant emissions are in compliance with all emission limitations specified herein, as well as in compliance with the requirements specified in §§ 123.21, 123.31 and 123.41 of Chapter 123 of Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection, as well as in compliance with the requirements specified in, or established under, any other applicable rules and regulations contained in Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection.

The PM emissions from the surface coating operation are controlled by panel filters and the PM emissions from the MG burning machine and the shot blaster are controlled by two cartridge collectors.

The facility has the potential to emit up to 50 tons of VOCs, 10 tons of any individual HAP, 25 tons of all HAPs combined, 15.37 tons of NOx, 12.84 tons of CO, 4.74 tons of PM/PM10 and .09 ton of SOx per year.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) proposes to incorporate into the operating permit to be issued conditions requiring compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants as well as conditions previously contained in Operating Permit 41-318-045C, issued on April 4, 2001 (and subsequently amended on March 19, 2007, and June 2, 2008).

The conditions previously contained in Operating Permit 41-318-045 include:

- 1. A condition limiting the total combined emissions from the facility to less than 50 tons of VOCs, 10 tons of any single HAP, 25 tons of all HAPs combined and 20 tons of acetone in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 2. A condition requiring the cartridge collectors used to control the PM emissions from the facility's MG burning machine and shot blaster to be vented indoors at all times.
- 3. A condition requiring all exhausts from the paint bay incorporated in the facility's surface coating operation to be equipped with a full set of panel filters during any time the application of surface coating materials is occurring.
- 4. A condition limiting the coatings applied in the paint bay to primers, epoxies, urethanes, mastics, acrylics, alkyds or waterborne coatings.
- 5. A condition requiring all primers applied in the paint bay to be applied with air-assisted airless or electrostatic spray guns and all intermediate coatings and topcoats to be applied with electrostatic spray guns.
- 6. A condition limiting the VOC content of any primer used to 6.48 pounds per gallon of coating solids, on an as-applied basis, the VOC content of any intermediate coating used to 6.03 pounds per gallon of coating solids, on an as—applied basis, and the VOC content of any topcoat used to 6.08 pounds per gallon of coating solids, on an as-applied basis.
- 7. A condition limiting the VOC and VHAP contents of any primer used to 3.33 and 3.33 pounds per gallon, respectively, as received from the vendor or supplier, the VOC and VHAP contents of any intermediate coating

- used to 3.0 and 2.96 pounds per gallon, respectively, as received from the vendor or supplier, and the VOC and VHAP contents of any topcoat used to 3.2 and .81 pounds per gallon, respectively, as received from the vendor or supplier.
- 8. A condition prohibiting the use of any thinner other than Carboline Thinner No. 225E (or alternate material containing only acetone) to thin coatings other than inorganic zinc primers unless the use of Carboline Thinner No. 225E (or alternate material containing only acetone) is demonstrated to the Department's satisfaction to be technically infeasible.
- 9. A condition prohibiting the presence of any VOCs or VHAPs in Carboline Thinner No. 225E.
- 10. A condition prohibiting the use of any thinner other than Carboline Thinner No. 237 (or altherate material determined by the Department to have an equivalent, or lower, air contaminant emission potential) to thin inorganic zinc primers unless the use of Carboline Thinner No. 237 is demonstrated to the Department's satisfaction to be technically infeasible.
- 11. A condition limiting the VOC and VHAP contents of Carboline Thinner No. 237 to 4.93 and zero pounds per gallon, respectively.
- 12. A condition prohibiting the use of any cleaning solvent in the paint bay other than Carboline Thinner No. 225E unless prior Department approval is obtained.
- 13. A condition requiring spray guns and lines to be cleaned by either flushing a solid liquid stream of solvent into a container or by soaking in an enclosed container of solvent, prohibiting solvent to be flushed into a container in the form of an atomized spray, prohibiting solvent from being flushed/sprayed into the atmosphere, requiring all containers of VOC-containing materials, VHAP-containing materials and acetone-containing materials to be closed except when taking material from the container or putting material into the container and requiring all solvent-wet rags to be kept in closed containers when not in actual use.
- 14. A condition requiring the maintenance, and quarterly submission, of records of the identity, type, amount, solids content, VOC content, content of each individual VHAP and acetone content of each material used in the paint bay each month, as received from the vendor or supplier, the mix ratio for each batch of coating used during each month to which an additive has been added or which has been mixed from multiple components, the VOC content of each batch of coating applied each month, on an as-applied basis, expressed as pounds of VOCs per gallon of coating solids, and the amount of VOCs, acetone and each individual HAP emitted each month from the paint bay from the use of each individual material used.
- 15. A condition requiring the maintenance, and quarterly submission, of records of the identity, amount, VOC content, content of each individual VHAP and acetone content of each VOC-containing material, VHAP-containing material and acetone-containing material used each month in facility operations other than the paint bay as well as the amount of VOCs, each individual HAP and acetone emitted each month from the use of each such material.

The Department additionally proposes to incorporate the following new conditions into the operating permit to be issued:

16. A condition stating that the facility is subject to the requirements of Subpart HHHHHHH of the National Emis-

sion Standards for HAPs, 40 CFR 63.11169—63.11180 (Paint Stripping and Miscellaneous Source Coating Operations at Area Sources) unless these requirements are superseded by the requirements of Subpart XXXXXX, 40 CFR 63.11514—63.11523 (Nine Metal Fabrication and Finishing Source Categories).

- 17. Conditions limiting the operation of the facility's three emergency generators to no more than 500 hours each in any 12-consecutive month period and requiring the maintenance of records of the number of hours each generator operates each month.
- 18. Conditions limiting the total combined VOC emissions from the facility's two parts washers to less than 2.7 tons in any 12-consecutive month period, prohibiting the use of solvent in the parts washers to which a VHAP has intentionally been added and requiring the maintenance of records of the identity and amount of solvent added to the parts washers each month.
- 19. Conditions limiting the total combined VOC emissions and the total combined VHAP emissions from the facility's precast concrete production operation to less than 2.7 tons and less than 1.0 ton, respectively, in any 12-consecutive month period and requiring the maintenance of records of the identity, amount, VOC content and VHAP content of all VOC-containing materials and VHAP-containing materials used each month.

If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is required by provisions of the act for compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

Code §§ 1151.51(i), 1163.67(k) and 1163.459(j) (relating to disproportionate share payments), the Department is required to annually publish the names of each inpatient acute care general hospital, rehabilitation hospital and private psychiatric hospital qualifying for a disproportionate share payment and their respective disproportionate share payment percentage.

C. Additional Class of Disproportionate Share Payments

Effective March 1, 1998, the Department established a new class of disproportionate share payments to hospitals which render uncompensated care and which the Department has determined are experiencing significant revenue loss as a result of MA program revisions under the act of May 16, 1996 (P. Effective January 15, 1999, the Department established a new class of disproportionate share payments to include a Charity Care component of the Community Access Fund. A disproportionate share payment will be made to qualifying hospitals based on each hospital's percentage of charity care cost to the total charity care costs of all qualifying hospitals. The Department also established a disproportionate share payment for those hospitals which the Department has determined advanced its goal of enhanced access to multiple types of medical care in economically distressed areas of this Commonwealth.

1. Proposed Procedures.—Consistency with statute; Reasonableness; Need; Feasibility; Economic impact.

Consistency with statute

In its preamble the Commission cites Sections 1102 and 1103(a) of the Public Utility Code (66 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 1102 and 1103(a)) as the statutory authority for this regulation. Section 1103(a) states, in part:

... A certificate of public convenience shall be **granted by order of the commission**, only if the commission shall find or determine that the granting of such certificate is necessary or proper for the service, accommodation, convenience or safety of the public (Emphasis added.)

Under the statute, when the Commission grants a certificate of public convenience, it is required to do it "by order." Section 63.324(k)(1) of the proposed regulation states:

The Commission will issue a **Secretarial letter** or order approving a general rule transaction and issue a certificate of public convenience authorizing the transaction under 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 1102(a) and 1103. (Emphasis added.)

Section 63.325(k)(1) is similar and also allows certificates of public convenience to be granted by secretarial letter. We find both Sections 63.324(k)(1) and 63.325(k)(1) to be inconsistent with the statute, which requires an order to grant a certificate of public convenience. We recommend that the Commission amend these provisions to require an order. Alternatively, the Commission should explain how granting certificates of public convenience by secretarial letter is consistent with the Public Utility Code.

Need for the regulation

The Commission has described the compelling public interest that justifies the regulation as follows: "The proposed regulation addresses the real need for a more predictable and timely review and approval period for Commission disposition of mergers and stock transactions under the Public Utility Code." The material submitted with the proposal does not provide any documentation that supports the statement above. In its comments, the Office of Consumer Advocate provides documentation to support its claim that the proposed rulemaking is not needed. We ask the Commission to provide more detailed information to support the need for the rulemaking and explain how the proposed procedure is an improvement over the existing procedure. The number of transactions reviewed each year, the average length of time it takes to review each transaction and the number of transactions that would have been classified as either pro forma or general rule transactions would help us determine if there is a need for the rulemaking.

Complexity of procedures

The regulation is complex in that it addresses multiple avenues of review for transfer of control and affiliate filings. The regulation includes provisions for:

- Classification of filings into general and pro forma transactions;
 - Reclassification of a general rule transaction;
- Review of a general rule transaction reclassified as a pro forma transaction;
- Review of a general rule transaction reclassified as other than a pro forma transaction;
 - Right of appeal for reclassification of a transaction;
 - Reclassification of a pro forma transaction;
- Review of a pro forma transaction reclassified as a general rule transaction;
- Review of a pro forma transaction reclassified as other than a general rule transaction; and
- Right of appeal for reclassification of a pro forma transaction.

These classifications and reclassifications carry with them different requirements for review, review periods and notification. Given this complexity, important details such as notices and time for review are difficult to determine when actions such as reclassifications and appeals occur. As an example, what notice is required if a reclassification is appealed? How does this impact the 30 and 60-day timeframes?

Commentators provided a wealth of input, including complaints about the complexity of the regulation and suggested changes to the regulation. We agree with commentators and question whether the complexity of these classifications, reclassifications, appeals and differing procedures could compromise the Commission's objective of "streamlining the review and approval process of mergers and stock transactions under sections 1102 and 1103(a) of the Public Utility Code." Commentators also believe some filing requirements should be added and some deleted.

One commentator offered to participate in a stakeholder group to work on simplifying the regulation. We recommend that the Commission consider convening a stakeholder group to take advantage of the experience, expertise and input of the commentators, which include Incumbent Local Exchange Carriers (ILECs), Competitive Local Exchange Carriers (CLECs) and statutory advocates, to develop a simplified final-form regulation that adequately protects the public interest.

Chapter 30

Several commentators cited 66 Pa.C.S.A. Chapter 30 (Chapter 30), titled "Alternative Form of Regulation of Telecommunications Services." ILECs and statutory advocates presented several arguments that the regulation is not consistent with Chapter 30. ILECs argue that the regulation does not properly take into account provisions such as 66 Pa.C.S.A. § 3019(b)(1), which states that affiliated interest and transaction agreements filings are not needed for services declared competitive. A statutory advocate commented that this same statutory provision is not properly reflected in the regulation because the statute requires the Commission to do more detailed reviews. We ask the Commission to explain how the final-form regulation is consistent with Chapter 30.

Standard for review

Recent caselaw has reiterated that substantial evidence must support the Commission's finding "that a merger will affirmatively promote the service, accommodation, convenience, or safety of the public in some substantial way." *Popowsky v. PUC*, 594 Pa. 583, 937 A.2d 1040 (2007); *City of York v. PUC*, 49 Pa. 136, 295 A.2d 825 (1972). A commentator is concerned that the streamlined review process disregards the evidentiary standard demanded by *City of York* and its progeny. The Commission should explain how the *City of York* standard is met by the regulation.

Review periods

A general rule transaction is reviewed for 60 days and a pro forma transaction is reviewed for 30 days. Are these time periods sufficient for interested parties to review the filings? We are concerned that if these periods are too short, formal protests will be filed under Sections 63.324(j)(1) and 63.325(j)(1) simply to allow more time for review. The Commission should explain how the 30 and 60-day review periods are sufficient for parties to review the filings.

ILEC vs. CLEC Responsibilities

Although the regulation treats filings from an ILEC the same as those from a CLEC, their responsibilities are not the same. ILECs are subject to requirements such as network modernization under 66 Pa.C.S. Chapter 30 and provider of last resort obligations. The impact of a transaction on these ILEC obligations is not directly included in the content of notification provisions in Subsections (d) of Sections 63.324 and 63.325. We recommend that the Commission include consideration of the effect of a transaction on an ILEC's responsibilities, such as network modernization and provider of last resort obligations.

2. Section 63.322. Definitions.—Consistency with statute; Clarity.

The definitions of "controlling interest" and "diminution of control" both make reference to 10 percent. According to the Preamble, both definitions are based on an existing Statement of Policy pertaining to utility stock transfers found at 52 Pa. Code § 69.901. That policy statement references 20 percent. Why is the Commission using 10 percent in the proposed regulation?

The term "information service" is used in several of the definitions in this section. A commentator believes it is inappropriate to include this term in the definitions because that term is not used in the corresponding definitions of the Public Utility Code. Why has the Commission included this term in the definitions?

The term "pro forma transaction" is defined in this section. We recommend that the term "general rule transaction" also be defined in this section.

3. Section 63.323. Applicability.—Consistency with statute.

To be consistent with § 1102(a)(3) of the Public Utility Code, the regulation should be amended to include a reference to a telecommunications public utility's "affiliated interest."

4. Section 63.324. Commission approval of a general rule transaction subject to 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 1102(a)(3) and 1103.—Implementation procedures; Clarity.

Subsection (a) General rule transactions.

The terms "assets" and "customer base" are used in this section, but are not defined. To improve clarity, we suggest that both terms be defined. We have the same concern with § 63.325 (a).

Subsection (b) Reclassification of a general rule transaction.

Under this subsection, the Commission can reclassify a general rule transaction as either a pro forma transaction or a transaction other than a pro forma transaction. Any reclassification requires the Commission to notify the telecommunications public utility that the transaction will be reclassified. We recommend that the Commission also notify the statutory advocates of any reclassifications that take place under this subsection. We offer the same recommendation on § 63.325 (b).

Subsection (f) Commission publication of general rule transactions.

Subsection (f)(2)(ii) states that if a formal protest is filed, a general rule transaction "may" be reclassified, "unless the Commission determines otherwise for good cause shown." This provision is vague and does not identify how the Commission will determine if a general rule transaction should be reclassified. We recommend that the final-form regulation provide specific criteria that the Commission will use in determining when a general rule transaction will be reclassified. The same recommendation applies to the reclassification of proforma transactions under Section 36.325(f)(2)(ii).

Subsection (g) Telecommunications public utility notice to customers.

Subsection (g)(1) requires a telecommunications public utility to provide notice to customers of a general rule transaction involving a change in conditions of services or rates with the approval of the Commission's Bureau of Consumer Service (Bureau). Subsection (g)(2)(i) requires additional notice when the transaction involves the transfer of a customer base. This additional notice also requires approval of the Bureau. We have four questions. First, how will these provisions work with the requirement for a telecommunications public utility to provide a verified statement affirming that customers received notice of the transaction found at § 63.324(c)(13)? Second, would a telecommunications public utility have to secure the approval of the Bureau before it provided notice of the transaction to the Commission? Third, what procedures are involved with securing approval of the Bureau for the notices? Finally, how will disagreements between the utility and the Bureau be resolved?

Subsection (g)(2)(iv) pertains to a formal protest to a general rule transaction filed by a statutory advocate. Subsection 63.324(f)(2)(iii) also pertains to formal protests filed by a statutory advocate and concludes with the phrase "... unless the Commission determines otherwise for good cause shown." Why doesn't Subsection (g)(2)(iv) include similar language? We have a similar concern with § 63.325(g)(2)(iii).

Subsection (j) Reclassification of a transaction from the general rule.

Subsection (j)(1) states:

The filing of a formal protest by a statutory advocate or the filing of a formal protest warranting reclassification for good cause shown, including competitive impact.

By the wording of this provision, it is not clear whether a reclassification occurs automatically upon a formal protest by a statutory advocate or whether the statutory advocate must demonstrate good cause. As a matter of equity, we see no reason why the burden for a protest would differ between the public and a statutory advocate. It would appear that both would need to demonstrate good cause for reclassification. The Commission should review and explain this provision. We have the same concern with § 63.325(j)(1).

 Subsection 63.325. Commission approval of a pro forma transaction subject to 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 1102(a)(3) and 1103.—Protection of the public health, safety and welfare; Implementation procedures; Clarity.

Subsection (d) Content of notification for pro forma transactions.

Subsection (d)(13) requires a telecommunications public utility to provide a statement affirming that customers received *or will receive notice*. Under the section pertaining to general rule transactions, § 63.324(d)(13) requires a statement affirming that customers *received* notice. We recommend that the phrase "or will receive" be deleted from this subsection. This will provide customers of the telecommunications public utility notice of the transaction before it is completed.

Subsection (f) Commission publication of pro forma transactions.

As a general comment on this subsection, we believe the public interest would be best protected if the publication requirements for pro forma transactions mirrored the publication requirements of general rule transactions. Other concerns on this subsection are addressed below.

Subsection (f)(1) states the following:

The Secretary may publish notice of the pro forma transaction in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The Secretary may post notice of the pro forma transaction on the Commission's web site, unless the Commission determines otherwise for good cause shown.

We have three concerns. First, the use of the word "may" makes this provision optional. However, the factors that would lead to publication or posting of the notice are not included in the rulemaking. In order to provide proper notice to all consumers, we recommend that word "may" be changed to "will."

Making the change suggested above would alleviate our second concern, which pertains to how the Commission and the regulated community will know when the 30-day time period for review of a pro forma transaction will expire. As indicated in Subsection (k), pertaining to Commission approval for a pro forma transaction, the 30-day period ends after the filing of a pro forma transaction with the Commission or posting on the Commission's web site, whichever is longer. How would the regulated community, including the statutory advocates, know when the Commission received an initial filing or when it was posted to the Commission's web site? If the Commission decides to retain the language noted in the

concern above, it must establish a clearer standard for determining the expiration of the 30-day period.

Third, we believe posting notice on the Commission's web site will provide greater notice to the regulated community and encourage the Commission to consider the same approach for general rule transactions.

Under Subsections (f)(2) and (f)(3), a notice posted on the Commission's web site may or may not contain a general comment period and there will be no formal protest period. We do not believe it is in the public interest to exclude interested parties from commenting or filing formal protests of pro forma transactions and recommend that these provisions be deleted.

To be consistent with § 63.324(f)(2) we recommend that the phrase "general comment period" found under Subsection (f)(4) be changed to "15-day general comment period."

We raise two points of clarity pertaining to Subsection (f)(4)(iii). First, the first reference to "general rule transaction" should be changed to "pro forma transaction." A similar concern exists with § 63.325(i). Second, we question why this subsection does not include the following concluding statement that is found under § 63.324(f)(2) (iii): "... unless the Commission determines otherwise for good cause."

Subsection (g) Telecommunications public utility notice to customers.

Subsection (g)(2) pertains to notice of pro forma transfers of a customer base. It differs from similar provisions pertaining to the transfers of a customer base subject to general rule transactions found at § 63.324(g)(2) in three ways. First, it does not require additional notice to the customer base. Second, a formal protest filed under this subsection will not reclassify a pro forma transaction, but a formal protest filed under § 63.324(g)(2) may reclassify a general rule transaction. Third, § 63.324(g)(2) addresses the filing of a protest by a statutory advocate, but this subsection does not. We question why there are differences and how these differences adequately protect the public. As noted in our first comment on Subsection (f) of this section, we believe the public interest would be best protected if the requirements for pro forma transactions mirrored the requirements of general rule transac-

Subsection (g)(2)(iii) references "§ 5.14 of the Commission rules of practice and procedure." 52 Pa. Code § 5.14 is titled "Applications requiring notice." The Commission should review the cross reference to § 5.14.

Subsection (1) Limitations on pro forma transactions.

Subsection (l)(2) begins with the following sentence: "A pro forma transaction may not operate to permit a telecommunications public utility to abandon a condition of service or rate." We note that this sentence is not included in the corresponding section pertaining to general rule transactions found at § 63.324(l)(2). Is there a reason for this difference?
