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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva-nia Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.


Whereas, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is committed to quality early learning opportunities that intentionally engage and support parents and families in their children's development and strengthen the parent-child bond:

Whereas, the Federal Government, in the reauthorization of Head Start in Public Law 110-134 (Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act of 2007), has required states to have Advisory Councils dedicated to early education and care issues; and

Whereas, Pennsylvania is a national leader in addressing early childhood program governance issues, through the creation of the Office of Child Development and Early Learning (hereafter referred to as "OCDEL"); and

Whereas, OCDEL has established numerous Advisory Committees to aid its work and to provide opportunities for stakeholders to engage in the process of policy development.

Now, Therefore, I, Edward G. Rendell, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by the virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws of the Commonwealth, do hereby establish the Pennsylvania Early Learning Council (hereafter referred to as the "Council") and order and direct as follows.

TITLE 4. ADMINISTRATION

PART I. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

CHAPTER 6. ADDITIONAL COUNCILS AND COMMITTEES Subchapter CC. PENNSYLVANIA EARLY LEARNING COUNCIL

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§ 6.361. Purpose.

The purpose of the Pennsylvania Early Learning Council (Council) is to plan for the expansion of effective early learning and development services for young children and their families, and make recommendations to ensure the plans are implemented successfully. The Council will be responsible for coordinating the delivery of these Federal and Commonwealth programs designed to serve young children from birth through their entry into school, and to ensure a smooth transition for those children into K-12 education and other programs serving older children.

§ 6.362. Powers and duties.

The Pennsylvania Early Learning Council (Council) will have the following powers and duties, consistent with Federal law:

- (1) Conducting periodic needs assessments concerning the quality and availability of early childhood learning and development programs and services for children from birth to school entry.
- (2) Identifying opportunities for, and barriers to, collaboration and coordination among Federally-funded and Commonwealth-funded child learning, development, and education services, and early childhood programs and services.
- (3) Developing recommendations for increasing the overall participation of children in existing Federal, Commonwealth and local child care and early childhood learning, education and development programs.
- (4) Developing recommendations regarding the establishment of a unified data collection system for public early childhood learning, education, and development programs and services throughout this Commonwealth.
- (5) Developing recommendations regarding Commonwealth-wide professional development and career advancement plans for early childhood educators.
- (6) Assessing the capacity and effectiveness of 2-year and 4-year public and private institutions of higher education in this Commonwealth toward supporting the development of early childhood educators.
- (7) Making recommendations for improvements in Commonwealth early learning standards.
- (8) Developing and recommending updates to a multiyear plan for the expansion of effective early learning, education and development services.
- (9) Recommending policies and procedures that assure the integration of the early intervention system as part of the Commonwealth's approach to early childhood learning, education and development.
- (10) Assuring the development of a sound continuum from and between early childhood programs and traditional public education, starting with kindergarten.
- (11) Ensuring the development of early childhood programs that identify and meet the needs of infants and toddlers and their families.
- (12) Assuring an integrated approach to the design and delivery of early childhood mental health services across this Commonwealth.
- (13) Providing ongoing input and advice to the Office of Child Development and Early Learning (OCDEL) about programs under its jurisdiction, including without limitation the development of Early Intervention, Full-Day Kindergarten, Keystone STARS, Nurse-Family Partnership, PA Pre-K Counts and the Child Care Works Subsidized Child Care Program.
- (14) Engaging parents to provide input and make recommendations to strengthen the work of OCDEL, and develop improved communication strategies with families across this Commonwealth regarding the importance of and their role in quality early learning, education, and child development, and the programs of the Commonwealth in support of quality early learning.

- (15) Providing input to assure an adequate supply of, and quality for, the early childhood workforce needed to implement OCDEL's programs.
- (16) Advising OCDEL in the creation of a comprehensive professional development system that applies to practitioners in all early learning settings, with the goal of increasing the number of highly qualified early childhood professionals.
- (17) Providing ongoing input to the development of the Early Learning Network (Network), focusing on discussion of technical as well as communication and outreach needs, to support the sound development of the Network across OCDEL programs.
- (18) Ensuring that children with special needs are properly supported by the State's early learning programs.
- (19) Considering the overall early learning needs of young children, and evaluating how those needs are or are not met by OCDEL's services.
- (20) Advocating for services that fulfill the early learning needs of young children, particularly services provided through OCDEL.

§ 6.363. Composition.

The Pennsylvania Early Learning Council (Council) will consist of the following members appointed by the Governor, who collectively will be diverse and representative of this Commonwealth's population:

- (1) Deputy Secretary for the Office of Child Development and Early Learning.
 - (2) A representative of local educational agencies.
- (3) A representative of institutions of higher education in this Commonwealth.
- (4) A representative of local providers of early childhood education and development services.
- (5) A representative from Head Start agencies located in this Commonwealth, including migrant and seasonal Head Start Programs and Indian Head Start Programs.
 - (6) The Commonwealth Director of Head Start collaboration.
- (7) A representative of the Commonwealth agency responsible for health or mental health care.
- (8) A Co-Chairperson of the Early Learning Investment Commission, or the Co-Chairperson's designee.
- (9) The Chairperson of the Commonwealth's State Interagency Coordinating Council.
 - (10) The Director of the Pennsylvania Key.
 - (11) The Director of Early Intervention Technical Assistance.
 - (12) Individuals representing families.
 - (13) Individuals representing advocacy organizations.
 - (14) Individuals representing business and industry.
 - (15) Individuals representing intermediate units.
 - (16) Individuals representing local governments.
 - (17) Individuals representing public school community.
 - (18) Individuals representing research institutions.
 - (19) Individuals representing State corrections or law enforcement.
 - (20) Individuals representing the child care community.
 - (21) Individuals representing the child welfare community.
 - (22) Individuals representing the children's health community.
- (23) Individuals representing the early childhood mental health community.
 - (24) Individuals representing media.
 - (25) Individuals representing the philanthropic community.

- (26) Individuals representing the professional development community that services early learning programs and practitioners.
 - (27) Individuals representing the United Way.
- (28) Other individuals who can assist the Council with the purposes outlined in this subchapter including, but not limited to, a representative from all of the committees of the Council.

§ 6.364. Chairperson, Co-Chairperson and terms.

- (a) The Deputy Secretary for the Office of Child Development and Early Learning (OCDEL) shall serve as Co-Chairperson of the Pennsylvania Early Learning Council (Council). In addition, the Governor will appoint a member to serve as Co-Chairperson of the Council, who serves at the pleasure of the Governor.
- (b) Council members appointed by the Governor and not serving by virtue of their official position with the Commonwealth will serve for a term of 3 years and continue to serve until their successor is appointed.
- (c) Members serve without compensation except for payment of necessary and actual expenses incurred in attending meetings and in performing their duties and responsibilities as Council members.

§ 6.365. Operations.

Pennsylvania Early Learning Council (Council) operations will include the following:

- (1) The Council will hold public hearings and provide opportunities for public comment.
 - (2) The Council will meet at least twice a year.
- (3) The Council will submit an annual report of its activities to the Governor, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, within 30 days of the close of each fiscal year. The report will make reference to the Council's activities in furtherance of the specific powers and duties assigned to it by this subchapter.
- (4) The Council will invite the Governor and members of the Legislature to at least one briefing in each fiscal year, where legislators will have the opportunity to ask questions of the Council's leadership about its recommendations and activities.
- (5) The Council will invite the Governor's Cabinet on Children and Families, the Pennsylvania Commission for Women, and other relevant commissions with an interest in this Commonwealth's role in early child-hood development to at least one briefing in each fiscal year, when members of these commissions have the opportunity to discuss with the Council its recommendations and activities, and to engage in work of mutual interest.

§ 6.366. Relationship with other agencies.

The Office of Child Development and Early Learning (OCDEL) will provide staff or data support, or both, to the Pennsylvania Early Learing Council (Council). Commonwealth agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction will cooperate with, provide assistance to, and review the recommendations of the Council with respect to its purpose, powers and duties, as set forth in this subchapter.

§ 6.367. Effective date.

This subchapter will take effect immediately.

§ 6.368. Termination date.

This subchapter will remain in effect unless revised or rescinded by the Governor.

§ 6.371. Purpose.

The purpose of the Early Learning Investment Commission is to secure support for public investment in early learning by focusing on practices that are educationally, economically and scientifically sound.

§ 6.372. Powers and duties.

The Early Learning Investment Commission will meet at least twice a year and will have the following powers and duties:

- (1) Recommending strategies for the Commonwealth to engage business and civic leaders and organizations in early learning planning and advocacy at the State and local level.
- (2) Increasing business, civic and public awareness of the importance of early childhood education.

- (3) Planning, implementing and hosting an Annual Economic Summit on Early Childhood Investment. The Annual Economic Summit will include outreach to business, civic, educational and governmental leaders.
- (4) Planning and implementing an annual meeting for legislators and legislative staff to understand the economic, educational and social impact of investing in quality early childhood education.
- (5) Developing and recommending updates to a multiyear plan for the expansion of effective early childhood services.

§ 6.373. Composition.

- (a) The Early Learning Investment Commission will consist of the following members, who collectively will be diverse and representative of this Commonwealth's population:
 - (1) Secretary of the Budget.
 - (2) Secretary of Planning and Policy.
 - (3) Secretary of Community and Economic Development.
 - (4) Secretary of Education
 - (5) Secretary of Public Welfare.
- (6) Deputy Secretary of the Office of Child Development and Early Learning.
- (7) Business leaders and business executives from this Commonwealth appointed by the Governor.
- (8) The Chairperson and Co-Chairperson of the Early Learning Council (Council).
 - (9) The Director of the Pennsylvania Key.
- (b) The Governor will designate a Chairperson and a Vice-Chairperson or may designate two persons as Co-Chairpersons from among the Council members. The Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

§ 6.374. Term.

The Early Learning Investment Commission (Commission) members appointed by the Governor and not serving by virtue of their official position with the Commonwealth, will serve for a term of 3 years and continue to serve until their successor is appointed. Members serve without compensation except for payment of necessary and actual expenses incurred in attending meetings and in performing their duties and responsibilities as Pennsylvania Early Learning Council members.

§ 6.375. Relationship with other agencies.

The Office of Child Development and Early Learning will provide staff or data support, or both, to the Early Learning Investment Commission (Commission). Commonwealth agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction will cooperate with, provide assistance to, and review the recommendations of the Commission with respect to its purpose, powers and duties, as set forth in this subchapter.

§ 6.376. Effective date.

This subchapter will take effect immediately.

§ 6.377. Termination date.

This subchapter will remain in effect unless revised or rescinded by the Governor.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified previously for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$20.

Local Rule 212.2 Pre-Trial Statement

- (a) Each party shall file and serve upon all other parties a written pre-trial statement in conformity with the requirements of Pa.R.C.P. 212.2, except as set forth in (b) below.
- (b) For cases which will be tried by jury, each party or group of parties with joint representation by one counsel shall be entitled to make a voir dire statement and to propose no more than five additional voir dire questions which are not duplicative of the voir dire questions already covered in Local Rule 220.1 and the Juror Questionnaire. If the party or group of parties wishes to avail itself of this opportunity, the following shall be included in the pre-trial statement:
 - (i) verbatim text of the voir dire statement of 200 words or fewer, which will be given by counsel at the outset of voir dire; and
 - (ii) not more than five proposed additional voir dire questions, which shall be handled in accordance with Local Rule 220.1(c).
- (c) Disputes as to the propriety of any party's proposed voir dire statement or proposed additional voir dire questions shall be raised with the Calendar Control Judge during the conciliation which is scheduled immediately after the Call of the List. Each party shall bring to the conciliation an extra set of copies of their proposed voir dire statement and proposed additional voir dire questions.

Local Rule 220.1 Voir Dire

In all civil actions to be tried before a jury, the parties shall be provided with the responses to the "Juror Questionnaire" completed by the members of the panel at the time that they report for jury duty (see Form), and the members of the panel shall be asked the questions set forth in this Local Rule (except those which all parties shall agree in advance to strike as inappropriate for the type of case involved). The questions shall be propounded by an Assignment Room Clerk, in the presence of all counsel. The voir dire process is open to the public.

SCHUYLKILL COUNTY LOCAL RULE 1001.0 Mediation

- a. General Applicability. Every civil action, except protection from abuse matters, filed in the Schuylkill County Court of Common Pleas is eligible for mediation. Prior to filing suit and whenever practicable thereafter, parties and their counsel are encouraged to consider and to pursue mediation options. The pursuit of mediation does not toll the running of a Statute of Limitations unless all parties agree in writing to that effect.
- b. Procedure for Mediation in Non-Jury Civil Trials, Civil Jury Trial and Cases Subject to Arbitration. Parties and their attorneys in all civil cases which will result in a non-jury civil trial, civil jury trial or arbitration may mutually elect to pursue mediation at any point before a case is listed for trial or arbitration. All parties and their attorneys who mutually elect to pursue mediation shall prepare a stipulation in writing which shall immediately be filed with the Prothonotary's Office.
- c. Certifications in Non-Jury Civil Trials, Civil Jury Trials and Cases Subject to Arbitration. All certificates of readiness filed with the Court Administrator in accordance with Schuylkill County Rule 212.1 listing a case for a Non-Jury Civil Trial, a Civil Jury Trial or Arbitration shall contain a certification that mediation

was pursued or, if not, was the subject of good faith consideration by counsel and all parties. All pre-trial conference memoranda filed in accordance with Schuylkill County Local Rule 212.2 shall include certification by the attorney submitting the same that mediation has been previously pursued or, if mediation has not been pursued, that the topic of mediation was discussed not only by counsel with their clients but also by all counsel and/or pro se parties and rejected only after good faith consideration.

d. Mediation Programs. Parties and their attorneys are encouraged to use mediation to resolve disputes either through the Alternative Dispute Resolution Program administered by the Schuylkill County Bar Association or any other mediation program acceptable to the parties.

Comment: Parties and their attorneys are encouraged to use mediation as a means to bring disputes to conclusion economically and expeditiously. While mediation is voluntary, the Court may feel strongly that the use of mediation will conclude pending litigation. Parties and their attorneys are urged to accept the advice of the Court when mediation is suggested as a means to resolve the case. The Court may recommend that the parties in any civil case, except protection from abuse matters, utilize mediation or other alternative dispute resolution processes, including, but not necessarily limited to, services offered by the Alternative Dispute Resolution Program as administered through the Schuylkill County Bar Association whenever it appears to the judge presiding in such case that mediation or other alternative dispute resolution processes are likely to resolve the case. An issue may arise regarding insurance policies, and particularly professional negligence policies, wherein ultimate approval of a settlement rests with the insured. The use of mediation may lead parties to evaluate their positions and achieve a mutually acceptable resolution. This rule cannot rewrite an insurance contract, but participation in mediation may educate all interests with respect to the merits of resolving a pending dispute without protracted litigation. All parties should come to the mediation process with appropriate motivations. The process should be used in good faith; for example, it should not be used as an alternative means for discovery. It is anticipated that the Pennsylvania Supreme Court may enact rules directing certain types of cases to use alternative dispute resolution processes, including mediation, as a prerequisite step for certification prior to trial. This rule is adopted in anticipation of such and will be amended to comply with the mandates of any future rules adopted by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court.

Title 22—EDUCATION

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION [22 PA. CODE CH. 16]

Special Education for Gifted Students

The State Board of Education (Board) amends Chapter 16 (relating to special education for gifted students) to read as set forth in Annex A. Notice of proposed rule-making was published at 37 Pa.B. 4872 (September 8, 2007), with an invitation to submit written comments.

Statutory Authority

The Board acts under the authority of sections 1372 and 2603-B of the Public School Code of 1949 (code) (24 P. S. §§ 13-1372—26-2603-B).

Background

These final-form regulations set forth requirements for gifted education programs and services in the public schools of this Commonwealth. They address the screening and evaluation process, gifted individualized education program, educational placement and procedural safeguards for students identified as gifted. As provided in section 1749-A of the code (24 P. S. § 17-1749), these final-form regulations do not apply to charter schools and cyber charter schools.

A committee of the Board held five regional public roundtable meetings during December 2006 and January 2007 where stakeholders were provided the opportunity to share their concerns about gifted education. The committee then circulated draft regulations and conducted three regional public hearings to solicit public input on the draft regulations in March 2007. Notices of the meetings were distributed to those on the Board's stakeholder list, school district superintendents, intermediate unit executive directors, area vocational technical school directors and others through the Department's PennLINK email system. Legal notices of the hearings were published in regional newspapers, public notice was posted on the Board web site and Sunshine Act notices were posted at the meeting sites. State education groups alerted their members and others about the meetings through e-mail distribution lists, web sites and publications.

Throughout the process of drafting the proposed and final-form regulations, the Board prepared and posted updated drafts on the Board's web site. The Chapter 16 Committee met in public meetings during 2007 on September 19, November 1 and November 14, and during 2008 on January 16, February 25 and March 19. Drafts of both the proposed and final-form regulations were reviewed and discussed at the meeting. Members of the public were provided opportunities to provide comments at these meetings.

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 37 Pa.B. 4872. The Board received comments from 47 individuals and organizations during the 30-day public comment period. Additionally, the Board received 21 letters and e-mails after the 30-day public comment period.

Summary of Public Comments and Responses to Proposed Rulemaking

The proposed rulemaking was published at 37 Pa.B. 4872 and was available on the Department of Education's

(Department) web site at www.pde.state.pa.us. The Board accepted formal written comments during a 30-day public comment period that began upon publication of the proposed rulemaking. The House Education Committee held a hearing on October 4, 2007. The Board also discussed the proposed amendments with numerous individuals, education groups and individual members of the General Assembly.

The Board received written comments directly from 47 individuals and organizations during the 30-day public comment period. An additional 21 comments were received after the comment period. Rather than provide a lengthy listing of the organizations and comments and responses in the Preamble, the Board has prepared a separate document that outlines the comments and the Board's response. This document was sent to each commentator and is posted on the Board web page of the Department's web site.

Summary of the Final-Form Regulations

A summary of substantive changes is provided as follows:

§ 16.1. Definitions.

The definition of "GIEP" is changed to "Gifted Individualized Education Plan."

§ 16.4. Strategic plans.

A requirement is added stipulating that the gifted education portion of each school district's strategic plan address the process for identifying children who are gifted and in need of specially designed instruction. It also is to outline the gifted special education programs offered by the school district and to provide the Department with reports of students, personnel and program elements.

§ 16.6. General supervision.

The final-form regulations add a requirement that the Department conduct onsite monitoring of school entities to ensure compliance with this chapter, as well as an obligation to establish a complaint procedure for parents to file complaints and school districts to respond. The Department is directed to outline the process and schedule for monitoring in a Basic Education Circular (BEC), which would become available on the Department's web site with other BECs. The Department also must report to the Board, by October 1 of each year, the number and disposition of complaints filed and the schedule and results of monitoring activities.

§ 16.7. Special education.

A new requirement is added stipulating the development of a single Individualized Education Program for students who are both gifted and have a disability under Chapter 14 (relating to special education services and programs).

§ 16.21. General.

The final-form regulations add new language outlining the types of awareness activities that school districts are to conduct each year to inform parents about gifted education. Additional new language clarifies the criteria each school district shall use to determine whether a student is mentally gifted. Also, new language is added stipulating that deficits in memory or processing cannot be the sole basis for determining that a student is ineligible for gifted education services. Finally, new lan-

guage was added referring to the Federal definition of disabilities in 34 CFR 300.8 (relating to child with a disability).

§ 16.22. Gifted multidisciplinary evaluation.

The final-form regulations require school districts to have readily available an evaluation request form that professional staff and administrators can provide to parents who request an evaluation of their child. The final-form regulations require the parent be provided the evaluation request form within 10 calendar days of an oral request. Additionally, this section adds a requirement that the Gifted Multidisciplinary Team include, in its written report, its recommendations for each student's educational programming. This section also revises the number of days in which the initial student evaluation must be completed from 45 school days to 60 calendar days after the school receives written parental consent for the evaluation or an order of a court or hearing officer. The calendar days from the day after the last day of the spring school term up to and including the day before the first day of the subsequent fall school term will not be counted. This aligns the time frame with the requirements of Chapter 14 so that school districts have just one standard to follow.

§ 16.23. Gifted multidisciplinary reevaluation.

New language provides that the reevaluation be completed and presented to parents no later than 60 calendar days after the school district receives written permission to reevaluate. The calendar days from the day after the last day of the spring school term up to and including the day before the first day of the subsequent fall school term will not be counted.

§ 16.31. General.

The final-form regulations revise this section to "grand-father" students already receiving gifted education services at the time these final-form regulations become effective.

§ 16.32. GIEP.

The final-form regulations require present education levels to be included in both the initial and all revisions to the GIEP. Additionally, this section adds a requirement that a teacher of the gifted be included on the GIEP team. The final-form regulations also require that the GIEP be based on the gifted multidisciplinary team's written report. New language is also added to require the GIEP to include accommodations and modifications as required by Federal regulation in 34 CFR 300.320(a)(4) (relating to definition of individualized education program) for students with a disability identified as eligible under the Federal regulation in 34 CFR 300.8. Additional language is added requiring the GIEP to include the anticipated frequency, and location of gifted education. New language is also added to require the school to notify teachers of their responsibilities to each of their students who are identified as gifted as provided in the students' GIEP. Finally, the final-form regulations add language requiring a GIEP meeting to be convened at the request of a GIEP team member, the parent, the student or the school district.

§ 16.41. General.

The final-form regulations revise the total number of gifted students on an individual gifted teacher's caseload from 75 to 65 and stipulate that this change occur beginning July 1, 2010. They require the total number of gifted students on an individual teacher's class roster to remain at the current level of 20 students. These changes

reflect feedback provided from schools regarding the current caseload and class roster limitations.

§ 16.63. Impartial due process hearing.

The final-form regulations require a student involved in a due process hearing to remain in his current educational placement until the outcome of the hearing, unless the school district and the parent of the student agree otherwise. It also adds language allowing a school district to request a hearing to proceed with an initial evaluation or reevaluation when a parent fails to respond to the district's proposed evaluation or reevaluation. Additionally, these regulations permit a school district to request an impartial due process hearing when a parent rejects the district's proposed educational placement that is different from the initial placement. The final-form rulemaking further stipulates that if the parent fails to respond or refuses to consent to the initial provision of gifted services, neither due process nor mediation may be used to obtain agreement or a ruling that the services may be provided.

The final-form regulations provide for the compensation of hearing officers for hearings related to a child who is gifted or thought to be gifted. Additional language is added stating that the compensation of hearing officers does not cause them to become employees of the Department.

Additionally, the final-form regulations require the Department to provide an annual report to the Board as to the number and summarized results of the due process hearings. The report must also include actions taken by the Department as well as future plans to strengthen the due process hearings.

Finally, the final-form regulations require the school district, upon receipt of a final decision from the hearing officer or court, to provide to the Department an assurance of its implementation of an order within 30 school days of the date of the final decision.

Effective Date

The final-form regulations are effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Sunset Date

In accordance with its policy and practice regarding regulations, the Board will review the effectiveness of this chapter after 4 years. Therefore, no sunset date is necessary.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on August 23, 2007, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 37 Pa.B. 4872, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Committees on Education (Committees) for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC and the Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form regulations, the Department has considered all comments from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on September 17, 2008, the final-form regulations were deemed approved by the Committees. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on September 18, 2008, and approved the final-form regulations.

Affected Parties

The final-form regulations will affect the students and professional employees of public schools in this Commonwealth.

Findings

The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of the intention to adopt these final-form regulations was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202), and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law, and all comments were considered.
- (3) The final-form regulations are necessary and appropriate for the administration of the code.

Order

The Board, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Board, 22 Pa. Code Chapter 16, are amended by amending §§ 16.1, 16.4, 16.6, 16.7, 16.21—16.23, 16.31, 16.32, 16.41 and 16.63 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Executive Director will submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for review and approval as to legality and form as required by law.
- (c) The Executive Director of the Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order is effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Annex A

TITLE 22. EDUCATION

PART I. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION Subpart A. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

CHAPTER 16. SPECIAL EDUCATION FOR GIFTED STUDENTS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 16.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Agency—An intermediate unit, school district, area vocational technical school, State-operated program or

facility, or other public or private organization providing educational services to gifted students or students thought to be gifted.

Chapter 4—The State Board of Education regulations as adopted under statutory authority in the School Code.

Educational placement—The overall educational environment in which gifted education is provided to a gifted student.

GIEP—Gifted Individualized Education Plan.

GMDT—Gifted Multidisciplinary Team.

Gifted education—Specially designed instruction to meet the needs of a gifted student that is:

- (i) Conducted in an instructional setting.
- (ii) Provided in an instructional or skill area.
- (iii) Provided at no cost to the parents.
- (iv) Provided under the authority of a school district, directly, by referral or by contract.
 - (v) Provided by an agency.
- (vi) Individualized to meet the educational needs of the student.
- (vii) Reasonably calculated to yield meaningful educational benefit and student progress.
 - (viii) Provided in conformity with a GIEP.

Gifted Multidisciplinary Evaluation—A systematic process of testing, assessment, and other evaluative processes used by a team to develop a recommendation about whether or not a student is gifted or needs gifted education.

Gifted student-

- (i) A student who is exceptional under section 1371 of the School Code (24 P. S. § 13-1371) because the student meets the definition of "mentally gifted" in this section, and needs specially designed instruction beyond that required in Chapter 4 (relating to academic standards and assessment).
- (ii) The term applies only to students who are of "school age" as defined under § 11.12 (relating to school age).

Instructional setting—A classroom or other setting in which gifted students are receiving gifted education.

Mentally gifted—Outstanding intellectual and creative ability the development of which requires specially designed programs or support services, or both, not ordinarily provided in the regular education program.

Parents—A natural or adoptive parent or parents, a guardian or guardians, one or more persons acting as the parent or parents of a student.

Party-Parent or school district.

Regular classroom—A specific instructional grouping within the regular education environment.

Regular education environment—The regular classroom and other instructional settings in which students without a need for gifted education receive instructional programs and the full range of supportive services normally provided to these children.

School Code—The Public School Code of 1949 (24 P. S. §§ 1-101—27-2702).

School day—A day in which school is in session.

Screening and evaluation process—The systematic determination of whether or not a student is gifted or needs gifted education.

Specially designed instruction—Adaptations or modifications to the general curriculum, instruction, instructional environments, methods, materials or a specialized curriculum for students who are gifted.

Support services—Services as required under § 16.33 (relating to support services) to assist a gifted student to benefit from gifted education. Examples of the term include:

- (i) Psychological services.
- (ii) Parent counseling and education.
- (iii) Counseling services.
- (iv) Transportation to and from gifted programs to classrooms in buildings operated by the school district.

§ 16.4. Strategic plans.

- (a) Each school district's strategic plan developed under Chapter 4 (relating to academic standards and assessments) must include procedures for the education of all gifted students enrolled in the district. The strategic plan shall be developed to ensure the implementation of gifted education plans.
- (b) Each school district shall address the following in its gifted education plan:
- (1) The process for identifying children who are gifted and in need of specially designed instruction.
 - (2) The gifted special education programs offered.
- (c) Each school district shall provide, as the Department may require, reports of students, personnel and program elements, including the costs of the elements, which are relevant to the delivery of gifted education.

§ 16.6. General supervision.

- (a) Educational programs for gifted students administered within this Commonwealth are considered to be under the general supervision of the Department and must meet the provisions of this chapter.
- (b) The Department will ensure that appropriate and responsible fiscal oversight and control is maintained over the development and provision of gifted education in accordance with this chapter providing for fiscal accountability and prudent management.
- (c) The Board will review this chapter at least every 4 years to ensure consistent interpretation and application of this chapter.
- (d) The Department will conduct onsite monitoring of school districts on a cyclical basis, or more frequently when necessary, to ensure school district implementation of this chapter. The Department will outline the process and schedule for monitoring in a Basic Education Circular (BEC). The BEC will include:
- (1) A description of the elements to be reviewed and the criteria for determining compliance with each element.
- (2) A process and procedure to present the monitoring findings to school districts.
- (3) A process for school districts to respond to monitoring findings.
- (4) A process for resolution of findings, which may include a requirement that school districts develop corrective action plans.

- (e) The Department will establish a complaint process that includes:
- (1) A process for parents or guardians to file complaints and for school districts to respond.
- (2) An opportunity for the district and parent to reach amicable resolution of the issue or, if necessary, a process for the Department to determine the validity of complaints.
- (3) Development of an individual corrective action plan, if necessary, to address and correct findings of a valid complaint against a school district.
- (4) Enumeration of enforcement steps to be employed by the Department if the district does not implement the corrective action.
- (f) The Department will report to the Board, by October 1 of each year, the number and disposition of complaints filed and the schedule and results of monitoring activities.

§ 16.7. Special education.

- (a) Nothing in this chapter is intended to reduce the protections afforded to students who are eligible for special education as provided under Chapter 14 (relating to special education services and programs) and sections 601—619 of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C.A. §§ 1400—1419).
- (b) If a student is determined to be both gifted and eligible for special education, the procedures in Chapter 14 take precedence. For these students identified with dual exceptionalities, the needs established under gifted status in this chapter shall be fully addressed in the procedures required in Chapter 14.
- (c) For students who are gifted and eligible for special education, it is not necessary for school districts to conduct separate screening and evaluations or use separate procedural safeguards processes to provide for a student's needs as both a gifted and an eligible student.
- (d) A single IEP shall be developed and implemented, revised and modified in accordance with this chapter and Chapter 14, for students who are identified as eligible under this chapter and Chapter 14.

SCREENING AND EVALUATION PROCESS

§ 16.21. General.

- (a) Each school district shall adopt and use a system to locate and identify all students within that district who are thought to be gifted and in need of specially designed instruction.
- (b) Each school district shall conduct awareness activities to inform the public of gifted education services and programs and the manner by which to request these services and programs. These awareness activities shall be designed to reach parents of students enrolled in the public schools and the parents of school age children not enrolled in the public schools. Awareness activities shall be conducted annually and include providing information in local newspapers, other media, student handbooks and on the school district web site.
- (c) Each school district shall determine the student's needs through a screening and evaluation process which meets the requirements of this chapter.
- (d) Each school district shall establish procedures to determine whether a student is mentally gifted. This term includes a person who has an IQ of 130 or higher or when multiple criteria as set forth in this chapter and in

Department Guidelines indicate gifted ability. Determination of gifted ability will not be based on IQ score alone. Deficits in memory or processing speed, as indicated by testing, cannot be the sole basis upon which a student is determined to be ineligible for gifted special education. A person with an IQ score lower than 130 may be admitted to gifted programs when other educational criteria in the profile of the person strongly indicate gifted ability. Determination of mentally gifted must include an assessment by a certified school psychologist.

- (e) Multiple criteria indicating gifted ability include:
- (1) A year or more above grade achievement level for the normal age group in one or more subjects as measured by Nationally normed and validated achievement tests able to accurately reflect gifted performance. Subject results shall yield academic instruction levels in all academic subject areas.
- (2) An observed or measured rate of acquisition/ retention of new academic content or skills that reflect gifted ability.
- (3) Demonstrated achievement, performance or expertise in one or more academic areas as evidenced by excellence of products, portfolio or research, as well as criterion-referenced team judgment.
- (4) Early and measured use of high level thinking skills, academic creativity, leadership skills, intense academic interest areas, communications skills, foreign language aptitude or technology expertise.
- (5) Documented, observed, validated or assessed evidence that intervening factors such as English as a second language, disabilities defined in 34 CFR 300.8 (relating to child with a disability), gender or race bias, or socio/cultural deprivation are masking gifted abilities.

§ 16.22. Gifted multidisciplinary evaluation.

- (a) Prior to conducting an initial gifted multidisciplinary evaluation, the school district shall comply with the notice and consent requirements under §§ 16.61 and 16.62 (relating to notice; and consent).
- (b) Referral for gifted multidisciplinary evaluation shall be made when the student is suspected by teachers or parents of being gifted and not receiving an appropriate education under Chapter 4 (relating to academic standards and assessment) and one or more of the following apply:
- (1) A request for evaluation has been made by the student's parents under subsection (c).
- (2) The student is thought to be gifted because the school district's screening of the student indicates high potential consistent with the definition of mentally gifted or a performance level which exceeds that of other students in the regular classroom.
- (3) A hearing officer or judicial decision orders a gifted multidisciplinary evaluation.
- (c) Parents who suspect that their child is gifted may request a gifted multidisciplinary evaluation of their child at any time, with a limit of one request per school term. The request must be in writing. The school district shall make the permission to evaluate form readily available for that purpose. If a request is made orally to any professional employee or administrator of the school district, that individual shall provide a copy of the permission to evaluate form to the parents within 10 calendar days of the oral request.

- (d) Multidisciplinary evaluations shall be conducted by GMDTs. The GMDT shall be formed on the basis of the student's needs and shall be comprised of the student's parents, a certified school psychologist, persons familiar with the student's educational experience and performance, one or more of the student's current teachers, persons trained in the appropriate evaluation techniques and, when possible, persons familiar with the student's cultural background. A single member of the GMDT may meet two or more of the qualifications specified in this subsection.
- (e) Gifted multidisciplinary evaluations must be sufficient in scope and depth to investigate information relevant to the student's suspected giftedness, including academic functioning, learning strengths and educational needs.
- (f) The multidisciplinary evaluation process must include information from the parents or others who interact with the student on a regular basis, and may include information from the student if appropriate.
- (g) The following protection-in-evaluation measures shall be considered when performing an evaluation of students suspected of being gifted:
- (1) No one test or type of test may be used as the sole criterion for determining that a student is or is not gifted.
- (2) Intelligence tests yielding an IQ score may not be used as the only measure of aptitude for students of limited English proficiency, or for students of racial, linguistic- or ethnic-minority background.
- (3) Tests and similar evaluation materials used in the determination of giftedness shall be:
- (i) Selected and administered in a manner that is free from racial and cultural bias and bias based on disability.
- (ii) Selected and administered so that the test results accurately reflect the student's aptitude, achievement level or whatever other factor the test purports to measure.
- (iii) Professionally validated for the specific purpose for which they are used.
- (iv) Administered by certified school psychologists under instructions provided by the producer of the tests and sound professional practice.
- (v) Selected and administered to assess specific areas of educational need and ability and not merely a single general IQ.
- (h) The GMDT shall prepare a written report that brings together the information and findings from the evaluation or reevaluation concerning the student's educational needs and strengths. The report must make recommendations as to whether the student is gifted and in need of specially designed instruction, indicate the basis for those recommendations, include recommendations for the student's programming and indicate the names and positions of the members of the GMDT.
- (i) The GMDT shall determine eligibility as defined in §§ 16.1 and 16.21 (relating to definitions; and general).
- (j) The initial evaluation shall be completed and a copy of the evaluation report presented to the parents no later than 60 calendar days after the agency receives written parental consent for evaluation or receives an order of a court or hearing officer to conduct a multidisciplinary evaluation, except that the calendar days from the day after the last day of the spring school term up to and

including the day before the first day of the subsequent fall school term may not be counted.

§ 16.23. Gifted multidisciplinary reevaluation.

- (a) Gifted students shall be reevaluated before a change in educational placement is recommended for the student. In addition, gifted students may be reevaluated at any time under recommendation by the GIEP team.
- (b) Reevaluations shall be developed in accordance with the requirements concerning evaluation in this chapter.
- (c) Reevaluations must include a review of the student's GIEP, a determination of which instructional activities have been successful, and recommendations for the revision of the GIEP.
- (d) The reevaluation timeline for gifted students will be 60 calendar days, except that the calendar days from the day after the last day of the spring school term up to and including the day before the first day of the subsequent fall school term may not be counted.

GIEP

§ 16.31. General.

- (a) A GIEP is a written plan describing the education to be provided to a gifted student. The initial GIEP must be based on and be responsive to the results of the evaluation and be developed and implemented in accordance with this chapter.
- (b) If a gifted student moves from one school district in this Commonwealth to another, the new district shall implement the existing GIEP to the extent possible or provide the services and programs specified in an interim GIEP agreed to by the parents until a new GIEP is developed and implemented in accordance with this section and §§ 16.32 and 16.33 (relating to GIEP; and support services) or until the completion of due process proceedings under §§ 16.61—16.65 (relating to procedural safeguards).
- (c) Every student receiving gifted education prior to July 1, 2008, shall continue to receive gifted education until the student meets one of the following conditions:
 - (1) The student graduates from high school.
 - (2) The student is no longer of school age.
- (3) A GIEP team determines that the student no longer needs gifted education.

§ 16.32. GIEP.

- (a) The GIEP team, in accordance with the requirements of this chapter shall, based upon the evaluation report, develop an initial GIEP and arrive at a determination of educational placement. Revisions to GIEPs, changes in educational placement, or continuation of educational placement for a student determined to be a gifted student shall be made by the GIEP team based upon a review of the student's GIEP and instructional activities, present levels of educational performance, as well as on information in the most recent evaluation.
- (b) Each GIEP team must include persons who meet the following qualifications:
 - (1) One or both of the student's parents.
- (2) The student if the parents choose to have the student participate.
- (3) A representative of the district, who will serve as the chairperson of the GIEP team, who is knowledgeable about the availability of resources of the district, and who is authorized by the district to commit those resources.

- (4) One or more of the student's current teachers.
- (5) Other individuals at the discretion of either the parents or the district.
 - (6) A teacher of the gifted.
- (c) The school district shall establish and implement procedures designed to ensure that the parents of the gifted student are offered the opportunity to be present at each GIEP team meeting. These procedures must include any one or a combination of the following: documented phone calls, letters and certified letters with return receipts. Agencies shall maintain documentation of their efforts to encourage parents to attend. By including them in the invitation, the following shall be considered reasonable efforts to ensure parent participation in the GIEP meeting:
 - (1) The purpose, time and location of the meeting.
 - (2) The names of the persons expected to attend.
- (3) The procedural rights available to protect the student and parent, in language which is clear and fully explains all rights.
- (4) That a determination will be made at the meeting as to whether or not the student is gifted.
- (5) That if the student is determined to be gifted, a GIEP will be developed.
- (6) Notifying the parent and other persons who will be attending at least 10 calendar days in advance to ensure that the parent will have an opportunity to attend.
- (d) The GIEP of each gifted student shall be based on the GMDT's written report and contain the following:
- (1) A statement of the student's present levels of educational performance.
- (2) A statement of annual goals and short-term learning outcomes which are responsive to the learning needs identified in the evaluation report.
- (3) A statement of the specially designed instruction and support services to be provided to the student. For a student with disability identified as eligible under 34 CFR 300.8 (relating to child with a disability), this would include accommodations and modifications in accordance with 34 CFR 300.320(a)(4) (relating to definitions of individualized education program).
- (4) Projected dates for initiation anticipated frequency, location and anticipated duration of gifted education.
- (5) Appropriate objective criteria, assessment procedures and timelines for determining, on at least an annual basis, whether the goals and learning outcomes are being achieved.
- (6) The names and positions of GIEP team participants and the date of the meeting.
- (e) A copy of the GIEP shall be provided to the parents, along with a notice of parental rights under §§ 16.61—16.65 (relating to procedural safeguards).
- (f) The school district shall notify teachers who work with a student who has been identified as gifted and in need of specially designed instruction of their responsibilities under the student's GIEP.
- (g) The following timeline governs the preparation and implementation of GIEPs:
- (1) A GIEP shall be developed within 30 calendar days after issuance of a GMDT's written report.

- (2) The GIEP of each student shall be implemented no more than 10 school days after it is signed or at the start of the following school year if completed less than 30 days before the last day of scheduled classes in accordance with § 16.62(5) (relating to consent).
- (3) GIEP team meetings shall be convened at least annually, or more frequently if conditions warrant.
- (4) A GIEP team meeting shall also be convened at the request of a GIEP team member, the parent, the student or the school district.

EDUCATIONAL PLACEMENT

§ 16.41. General.

- (a) The GIEP team shall base educational placement decisions on the gifted student's needs.
- (b) Districts may use administrative and instructional strategies and techniques in the provision of gifted education for gifted students which do not require, but which may include, categorical grouping of students. The placement must:
- (1) Enable the provision of appropriate specially designed instruction based on the student's need and ability.
- (2) Ensure that the student is able to benefit meaningfully from the rate, level and manner of instruction.
- (3) Provide opportunities to participate in acceleration or enrichment, or both, as appropriate for the student's needs. These opportunities must go beyond the program that the student would receive as part of a general education.
- (c) Districts shall adopt board policies relating to caseloads and class sizes for gifted students which:
- (1) Ensure the ability of assigned staff to provide the services required in each gifted student's GIEP.
- (2) Address all the educational placements for gifted students used by the district.
- (3) Limit the total number of gifted students that can be on an individual gifted teacher's caseload to a maximum of 75 students. Beginning July 1, 2010, the total number of gifted students that can be on an individual gifted teacher's caseload is limited to a maximum of 65 students.
- (4) Limit the total number of gifted students that can be on an individual gifted teacher's class roster to a maximum of 20 students.
- (d) Caseload and class size maximums may be waived by the Secretary upon written request by the district for extenuating circumstances.
- (e) Gifted educational placement may not be based on one or more of the following:
 - (1) Lack of availability of placement alternatives.
- (2) Lack of availability or efforts to make educational or support services available.
- (3) Lack of staff qualified to provide the services set forth in the GIEP.
 - (4) Lack of availability of space or of a specific facility.
 - (5) Administrative convenience.

PROCEDURAL SAFEGUARDS

§ 16.63. Impartial due process hearing.

(a) Parents may request in writing an impartial due process hearing concerning the identification, evaluation or educational placement of, or the provision of a gifted

- education to, a student who is gifted or who is thought to be gifted if the parents disagree with the school district's identification, evaluation or placement of, or the provision of a gifted education to the student. Unless the school district and the parent of the child agree otherwise, the child involved in the hearing shall remain in the child's current educational placement pending the outcome of the hearing.
- (b) A school district may request a hearing to proceed with an initial evaluation or a reevaluation when a parent fails to respond to the district's proposed evaluation or reevaluation. When a parent rejects the district's proposed educational placement, other than the initial placement, the school district may request an impartial due process hearing. If the parent fails to respond or refuses to consent to the initial provision of gifted services, neither due process nor mediation may be used to obtain agreement or a ruling that the services may be provided.
- (c) The hearing shall be conducted by and held in the local school district at a place reasonably convenient to the parents. At the request of the parents, the hearing may be held in the evening. These options must be set forth in the form provided for requesting a hearing.
- (d) The hearing must be an oral, personal hearing and be open to the public unless the parents request a closed hearing 5 days in advance of the hearing. If the hearing is open, the decision issued in the case, and only the decision, shall be available to the public. If the hearing is closed, the decision shall be treated as a record of the student and may not be available to the public.
- (e) The decision of the hearing officer must include findings of fact, a discussion and conclusions of law. Although technical rules of evidence will not be followed, the decision must be based solely upon the substantial evidence presented during the course of the hearing.
- (f) The hearing officer shall have the authority to order that additional evidence be presented.
- (g) A written transcript of the hearing shall, upon request, be made and provided to parents at no cost.
- (h) Parents may be represented by legal counsel and accompanied and advised by individuals with special knowledge or training with respect to students who are gifted.
- (i) A parent or a parent's representative shall be given access to educational records, including any tests or reports upon which the proposed action is based.
- (j) A party may prohibit the introduction of evidence at the hearing that has not been disclosed to that party at least 5-calendar days before the hearing.
- (k) A party has the right to present evidence and testimony, including expert medical, psychological or educational testimony.
- (l) The decision of the impartial hearing officer may be appealed to a court of competent jurisdiction. In notifying the parties of the decision, the hearing officer shall indicate the courts to which an appeal may be taken.
- (m) The following applies to coordination services for hearings and to hearing officers:
- (1) The Secretary may contract for coordination services for hearings related to a child who is gifted or thought to be gifted. The coordination services may

include arrangements for stenographic services, arrangements for hearing officer services (including the compensation of hearing officers), scheduling of hearings and other functions in support of procedural consistency and the rights of the parties to hearings.

- (2) A hearing officer may not be an employee or agent of a school district in which the parents or student resides, or of an agency which is responsible for the education or care of the student. A hearing officer shall promptly inform the parties of a personal or professional relationship the officer has or has had with any of the parties. The compensation of hearing officers does not cause them to become employees of the Department.
- (n) The following timeline applies to due process hearings:
- (1) A hearing shall be held within 30-calendar days after a parent's or school district's initial request for a hearing.
- (2) The hearing officer's decision shall be issued within 45-calendar days after the parent's or school district's request for a hearing.
- (o) Each school district shall keep a list of the persons who serve as hearing officers. The list must include the qualifications of each hearing officer. School districts shall provide parents with information as to the availability of the list and make copies of it available upon request.
- (p) The Department will report to the Board by October 1 each year on the number of impartial due process hearings held during the previous school year. The report will also provide a Statewide summary of the results of the hearings in a manner that will not violate the confidentiality of children and families. The report will also address actions taken during the previous school year and future plans to strengthen the activities of due process hearings.
- (q) Upon receipt of a final decision from a hearing officer or a court, the school district shall provide to the Department an assurance of its implementation of the order. The assurance shall be filed within 30 school days of the date of the final decision.

Title 34—LABOR AND INDUSTRY

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRY [34 PA. CODE CH. 33]

Mines and Other Excavations

In accordance with sections 2(f) and 12 of the act of May 18, 1937 (P. L. 654, No. 174) (43 P. S. §§ 25-2(f) and 25-12), the Department of Labor and Industry (Department) rescinds Chapter 33 (relating to mines and other excavations).

The regulations in Chapter 33 are unnecessary and redundant. The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is now the administrative agency responsible for implementing section 2(f) of the act. The Environmental Quality Board (EQB) has promulgated regulations implementing section 2(f) of the act. See 25 Pa. Code Chapter 207 (relating to noncoal underground mines).

Proposed Rulemaking Omitted

The Department finds that notice of proposed rule-making is unnecessary, under section 4 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. § 1204). The regulations being rescinded are unnecessary, redundant and no longer enforceable. These regulations were superseded by new regulations enacted by the EQB and therefore are no longer in use or enforced. The Department no longer has the authority to enforce the existing regulations.

Statutory Authority

This rulemaking is issued under the authority provided by sections 2(f) and 12 of the act. Section 2(f) of the act requires all pits, quarries, mines other than coal mines, trenches and other excavations to be operated and conducted to provide adequate protection to workers. Section 12 of the act gives the Department the authority to promulgate implementing regulations.

Background

The Department was originally responsible for administering and enforcing section 2(f) of the act. To implement this section, the Department promulgated Chapter 33. Authority to administer and enforce these provisions and the rulemaking authority under section 2(f) of the act was transferred to DEP (formerly the Department of Environmental Resources) in 1975. Reorganization Plan No. 2 of 1975 (71 P. S. § 751-22). DEP continued to enforce regulations found in Chapter 33 to apply section 2(f) of the act to underground noncoal mines and mined-out underground noncoal mines used to house other businesses. The EQB promulgated regulations that would implement section 2(f) of the act under sections 2(f) and 12 of the act, Reorganization Plan No. 2 of 1975 (71 P. S. § 751-22) and sections 1917-A and 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 510-17 and 510-20). DEP and the EQB have promulgated regulations in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 207. Accordingly, the provisions of Chapter 33 are unnecessary and redundant.

Affected Persons

Owners and operators are now required to comply with the regulations issued by the EQB at 34 Pa.B. 2041 (April 10, 2004). DEP had jurisdiction over pits, quarries and mines since 1975. There is no impact to the Department or persons regulated by it.

Fiscal Impact

Owners and operators would have to comply with the costs of the regulations issued by DEP and the EQB. There is no impact on the Department or persons regulated by it.

Reporting, Recordkeeping and Paperwork Requirements

Owners and operators are required to comply with DEP's requirements. There is no impact on the Department or persons regulated by it.

Executive Order 1996-1, Regulatory Review and Promulgation

DEP engaged in public outreach in developing the amendments to its regulations, implementing section 2(f) of the act. The Department determined that it was unnecessary to duplicate DEP's outreach efforts. The Department coordinated this rulemaking with DEP.

Purpose and Summary

This rulemaking would rescind Chapter 33.

Sunset Date

A sunset date is not appropriate. The Department is rescinding Chapter 33.

Effective Date

The rescission of Chapter 33 becomes effective upon publication of this order in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. *Contact Person*

Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(c)), on September 10, 2008, the Department submitted a copy of the final-form regulations, proposed rulemaking omitted, to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the Senate Committee on Labor and Industry and the House Labor Relations Committee (Committees). In addition to submitting the final-form regulations, the Department also provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Department.

Under section 5.1(j.1)—(j.3) of the Regulatory Review Act, these final-form regulations were deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees on October 15, 2008. IRRC met on October 16, 2008 and approved the rescission in accordance with section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act.

Findings

The Department finds that:

- (1) Good cause exists for rescission of these regulations through omission of notice of proposed rulemaking under section 204 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code § 7.4.
- (2) The rescission of the regulations in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute.

Order

The Department, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Department, 34 Pa. Code Chapter 33, are amending by deleting §§ 33.1-33.7, 33.11-33.15, 33.21-33.27, 33.31-33.38, 33.41-33.43, 33.51-33.58, 33.61-33.65, 33.71, 33.72, 33.81-33.84, 33.91-33.94, 33.111-33.117, 33.121-33.130, 33.141-33.148, 33.151, 33.161-33.165, 33.171-33.178, 33.181-33.187, 33.191-33.193, 33.201, 33.202, 33.211-33.214, 33.221-33.225, 33.231-33.238, 33.241, 33.242, 33.251-33.255, 33.261-33.263, 33.271-33.276, 33.281-33.289, 33.291-33.297, 33.301 and 33.311-33.319 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Secretary of the Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as to legality and form as required by law.

- (c) The Secretary of the Department shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall become effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Title 58—RECREATION

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 65] Fishing

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends Chapter 65 (relating to special fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this final-form regulation under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. Effective Date

The final-form regulation will go into effect on January 1, 2009.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The addition of § 65.19 (relating to approved trout waters open to year-round fishing) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102(a) of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. Purpose and Background

The final-form regulation is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the regulation is described in more detail under the summary of changes.

E. Summary of Changes

Currently, there are a number of waters listed in the *Pennsylvania Fishing Summary* as approved trout waters open to year-round fishing. These waters are regulated the same as approved trout waters except that they are open to fishing from March 1 through the opening day of trout season. Fishing for trout is permitted during this period, but no trout may be taken or possessed. In a recent review of the Commission's regulations, staff discovered that this special regulation program was never formally adopted by the Commission. To correct this oversight, the Commission proposed that a new section in Chapter 65 be adopted, thereby formally establishing this regulatory program.

Under the proposed rulemaking, it is unlawful to fish in waters designated as approved trout waters open to year-round fishing except in compliance with the prescribed seasons and size and creel limits. It is not a violation of the proposed rulemaking if a trout is immediately returned unharmed to the waters from which it is taken. The proposed rulemaking further provided that it is unlawful to fish in waters designated as approved trout waters open to year-round fishing without a current trout/salmon permit.

Based upon the public comments that were received and upon further consideration of the trout/salmon permit requirement, the Commission adopted the final-form regulation to limit the trout/salmon permit requirement to designated rivers and streams and chose not to require a permit to fish in designated lakes and ponds unless a person takes, kills or possesses, while in the act of fishing, a trout or salmon on or in these waters. As recognized by several of the individuals who submitted public comments, there will be anglers who will fish these

waters for species other than trout. In addition, limiting the permit requirement to designated rivers and streams is consistent with the current regulation (§ 63.20(e) (relating to permits for the protection and management of trout and salmon)) that provides that a person fishes for trout or salmon and therefore is required to have a permit when the person fishes in streams or rivers that are approved trout waters or their tributaries during the period 12:01 a.m. on March 1 until midnight May 31.

The Commission adopted the regulation to read as set forth in Annex \boldsymbol{A} .

F. Paperwork

The final-form regulation will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The final-form regulation will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The final-form regulation will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Comments

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 38 Pa.B. 1588 (April 5, 2008). Prior to the formal public comment period, the Commission received two comments opposing the trout/salmon permit requirement because there are anglers who will fish these waters for species other than trout. The Commission received a total of four comments during the formal comment period—three generally support the program and one opposed the permit requirement. After the public comment period, the Commission received one comment opposing the permit requirement. Copies of all public comments were provided to the commissioners.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the regulation adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) A public comment period was provided, and the comments that were received were considered.
- (3) The adoption of the regulation of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Ordei

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65, are amended by adding § 65.19 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Executive Director will submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality as required by law.
- (c) The Executive Director shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
 - (d) This order shall take effect on January 1, 2009.

CHAPTER 65. SPECIAL FISHING REGULATIONS § 65.19. Approved trout waters open to year-round fishing.

(a) The Executive Director, with the approval of the Commission, may designate waters as approved trout

waters open to year-round fishing. The designation of waters as approved trout waters open to year-round fishing shall be effective upon publication of a notice of designation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

(b) It is unlawful to fish in waters designated as approved trout waters open to year-round fishing except in compliance with the following seasons and size and creel limits. It is not a violation of this section if a trout is immediately returned unharmed to the waters from which it is taken.

(c) It is unlawful to fish in rivers and streams designated as approved trout waters open to year-round fishing without a current trout/salmon permit. A trout/salmon permit is not required to fish in lakes and ponds that have been designated as approved trout waters open to year-round fishing unless the person takes, kills or possesses, while in the act of fishing, a trout or salmon on or in these waters.

Title 55—PUBLIC WELFARE

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE [55 PA. CODE CH. 259]

Implementation of Third-Party Liability Provisions of Act 2008-44

Scope

This statement of policy applies to claims by the Department of Public Welfare (Department) for reimbursement of Medical Assistance (MA) from moneys owed by third parties on tort claims brought by MA recipients.

Purpose

The purpose of this statement of policy is to state how the Department will interpret and apply sections 1409 and 1409.1 of the Public Welfare Code (code) (62 P. S. §§ 1409 and 1409.1) to tort claims involving MA recipients.

Background

The Commonwealth participates in the Federal Medicaid Program established under Title XIX of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 1396—1396v). The Commonwealth's Medicaid program is called Medical Assistance (MA). Section 1902(a)(25) of the Social Security Act requires the Department to operate a program to recover the costs of MA expenditures from liable third parties. Section 1409 of the code (42 U.S.C.A. § 1396a(a)(25)), implements these provisions by giving the Department the option of suing tortfeasors separately or asserting a claim against money owed by third parties in tort claims brought by MA recipients. Section 1912 of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.A. § 1396k), requires MA recipients to assign to the state the right to payment for medical care from any third party. Section 1404(b) of the code (62 P.S. § 1404(b)) implements the assignment under State law.

In Arkansas Department of Health and Human Services v. Ahlborn, 547 U.S. 268, 126 S.Ct. 1752 (2006) (Ahlborn), the United States Supreme Court held that states could only assert claims on that portion of a tort recovery that represents the assigned right to payment for medical care from third parties. States are prohibited from asserting Medicaid claims against that portion of a tort recovery that represents other types of damages such as lost wages, pain and suffering, and other nonmedical damages when proceeding under the assignment.

On July 4, 2008, Governor Rendell signed Act 2008-44 (Act 44) into law. Act 44 makes significant changes in MA third-party liability procedures. The new law enacts section 1409.1 of the code to implement the *Ahlborn* decision by statute and it amends section 1409 of the code to establish procedures under which MA recipients can exclude recovery of medical expenses paid by MA from their tort claims. The legislation also extends the statute of limitations for the recovery of medical expenses paid by MA on behalf of minors, thus allowing parents to recover the medical expenses after the statute of limitations on other parental claims has expired. This change effectively overrules the Superior Court's decision in *Bowmaster v. Clair*, 933 A.2d 86 (Pa. Super. 2007). Finally, the law extends the statute of limitations for the Department to pursue third parties and insurers, and gives the Department civil money penalty authority to enforce the law.

Discussion

This statement of policy explains how the Department will interpret and apply certain changes in the law made by Act 44. This statement of policy also explains the duty of MA beneficiaries to cooperate with the Department's efforts to obtain reimbursement from third parties. The term "beneficiary" includes both adult and minor recipients of MA.

Section 259.2 (relating to claims against moneys for which third parties are liable as a result of a tort claim allocation of tort proceeds in actions filed before September 2, 2008-statement of policy) will now apply only to lawsuits filed prior to September 2, 2008. As required by Federal law, the Department will continue to apply the Ahlborn decision to lawsuits filed prior to September 2, 2008, even though the statutory requirement implementing Ahlborn in section 1409.1 of the code does not apply to those cases. In addition, a technical change was made to § 259.2 to add subsection (d) to clarify that the Department's Bureau of Hearings and Appeals has jurisdiction to determine the amount of the Department's claim against settlements under the existing regulation in 55 Pa. Code § 275.1(a)(4)(ii)(F) (relating to policy) when a court does not adjudicate the claim.

Section 259.3 (relating to claims against moneys for which third parties are liable as a result of a tort claim—allocation of tort proceeds in actions filed on or after September 2, 2008—statement of policy) explains how the Department will apply the amendments made by Act 44. This section applies to lawsuits filed on or after September 2, 2008. In accordance with section 1409.1 of the code and *Ahlborn*, the Department will only recover from that portion of a tort recovery which represents payment for medical care by the third party. The beneficiary is in exclusive possession of information as to whether a tort recovery included all damages. Accordingly, the beneficiary has the burden of informing the Department that a claim must be limited under *Ahlborn* and showing that not all medical expenses paid by MA were recovered.

Act 44 establishes a procedure for MA recipients to exclude medical expenses paid by MA from the damages claimed in a court case. Section 259.3(b) explains the consequences of the decision. If a beneficiary decides not to pursue medical expenses paid by MA, then the Department will intervene in the case or sue separately if it is cost-effective to do so. Ahlborn does not limit the Department's recovery when it sues a third party directly using its independent statutory authority to recover MA under section 1409(b)(1) of the code. Beneficiaries who elect not to recover medical expenses paid by MA as part of their claim forfeit the right to have the Department's claim reduced on account of their attorneys' fees and costs, even if the Department benefits indirectly from their efforts. The beneficiary may not attempt to recover medical expenses paid by MA in the past, or those medical expenses that will be paid by MA in the future. Notice of settlement must still be provided to the Department under section 1409(b)(5)(iv) of the code notwithstanding the election. An election not to recover medical expenses paid by MA can be revoked by the beneficiary only with the express written consent of the Department since it is expected that the Department will incur costs to retain counsel and intervene following the election. The beneficiary cannot settle or release the Department's claims against third parties or insurers.

Act 44 places new obligations upon insurers and third parties. These obligations are similar to those imposed by

Congress upon insurers and third parties with respect to the Medicare program in the Medicare, Medicaid and SCHIP Extension Act of 2007, Pub. L. No.110-173. Liability insurance companies must now establish a direct relationship with the Department's Division of Third-Party Liability and provide the Department with both notice of suit and notice of settlement in any case when they have information indicating that the claimant received MA. This information will often come from plaintiff's counsel and may also be present in medical and provider records that are reviewed as part of the insurer's claim adjudication process. Section 1409(c) of the code authorizes the Department to impose civil money penalties upon insurers that do not comply with these requirements or who make distributions to beneficiaries in cases when the Department has an interest without insuring payment of the Department's claim. The Department has established a safe harbor provision in § 259.3(e) and has specified those actions that can be taken by third parties and insurers to shield themselves from potential liability to the Department.

Section 259.3(f) and (g) specify what identifying information must be included in notices that are provided to the Department. Subsection (f) is similar to existing requirements in \S 259.2(c)(6).

Act 44 requires that a notice of election to not recover MA be given so that the Department has sufficient time to intervene and prosecute the claim itself. Section 259.3(h) specifies when notice of an election to not recover MA will be considered unreasonable. Notice is not reasonable if it is given after the close of discovery. Notice of a settlement that occurs prior to the close of discovery is not reasonable if the Department is not given 30 days to intervene in the case before the settlement agreement is executed.

Section 259.3(h) provides that the Bureau of Hearings and Appeals has jurisdiction to determine the amount of the Department's claim against a settlement under the existing regulation in § 275.1(a)(4)(ii)(F), when a court does not adjudicate the claim.

Act 44 does not expressly provide procedures for cases that are settled without litigation. Section 259.4 (relating to settlements without litigation—statement of policy) explains how the Department will apply *Ahlborn* to settlements that occur without litigation. The Department will assume that a settlement includes medical expenses paid by MA unless certain circumstances apply. In a case involving a minor or incapacitated individual, the court order approving the settlement may adjudicate the Department's claim. If agreement cannot be reached with the Department regarding the amount of its claim against a settlement, then the beneficiary can obtain an *Ahlborn* allocation determination by filing an appeal to the Bureau of Hearings and Appeals.

Section 259.4(b) specifies the circumstances when the Department will not assert a claim against a settlement that is settled without litigation. The Department will not assert a claim in a settlement involving a minor or incapacitated person, when the court order approving the settlement expressly adjudicates the Department's claim after reasonable notice and an opportunity to be heard. The Department will not assert a claim when the beneficiary is legally incapable of recovering the medical expenses paid by MA. Finally, the Department will not assert a claim against a settlement when both the Department and the settling party have been provided advance notice that the beneficiary's claim does not include medical expenses paid by MA. The Department

will consider a failure to provide it with reasonable notice that a claim does not include medical expenses paid by MA to be a violation of section 1408(a)(1) of the code, and may impose a civil money penalty or establish an overpayment of MA. Notice is not reasonable if it is given less than 30 days prior to execution of a settlement agreement. Section 259.4 applies to all pending claims.

Beneficiaries are required to cooperate with the Department's efforts to secure reimbursement as a condition of eligibility for MA. 42 U.S.C.A. § 1396k(a)(1)(B)(ii). The Department's interpretation of the cooperation requirement is explained at § 259.5 (relating to cooperation in obtaining payment from third-party—statement of policy). Cooperation includes identifying liable third parties, providing information to the Department, disclosing that a claim has been filed against an insurer or third party, not opposing the Department's efforts to intervene in the case, consenting to reasonable extensions of time requested by the Department's counsel, supplying litigation documents, and providing testimony in support of the Department's claim. The cooperation requirement also requires beneficiaries to disclose to tort defendants that they are not recovering medical expenses that have been paid by MA or will be paid by MA in the future. The cooperation requirement precludes beneficiaries from interfering with the Department's collection efforts by, for example, signing an indemnification agreement under which the beneficiary will pay the tort defendant if the Department pursues its claim. Finally, the Department may request that a beneficiary include medical expenses paid by MA in his claim under the cooperation requirement. If a beneficiary violates the cooperation requirement, the Department may terminate or deny MA benefits, and may establish an overpayment against the client for MA benefits received after the date of noncooperation. Section 259.5 applies to all pending claims.

Section 259.6 (relating to civil money penalties—statement of policy) describes the civil money penalties that the Department may impose for violations of section 1409 of the code and failing to disclose information regarding third-party liability to the Department as required under section 1408(a)(1) of the code. Section 259.6(c) identifies those persons who are required to disclose information to the Department and § 259.6(d) defines what constitutes a willful violation of the law. The Bureau of Hearings and Appeals has jurisdiction to hear appeals relating to civil money penalties. Section 259.6 applies to pending cases.

Effective Date

This statement of policy is effective immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Annex A

TITLE 55. PUBLIC WELFARE

PART II. PUBLIC ASSISTANCE MANUAL

Subpart G. RESTITUTION AND REIMBURSEMENT CHAPTER 259. THIRD-PARTY LIABILITY

- § 259.2. Claims against moneys for which third parties are liable as a result of a tort claim allocation of tort proceeds in actions filed before September 2, 2008—statement of policy.
- (a) With respect to claims asserted by the MA Program against moneys owed by third parties as a result of tort claims asserted by a beneficiary of MA benefits, the Department will only recover from that portion of a tort recovery which represents payment for medical care by the third party. The term "beneficiary" includes both present and former recipients of MA benefits, and includes individuals receiving benefits through an MA managed care organization.
- (b) In determining the portion of a tort recovery that represents payment for medical care by a third party, the Department will apply the following interpretations:
- (1) Unless the Department intervenes in a lawsuit or sues separately, beneficiaries, including beneficiaries who are minors, are vested with the right to recover injury related medical expenses paid by the MA Program as part of their cause of action for other damages, and absent an express court order to the contrary are deemed to recover medical expenses as part of any tort recovery.
- (2) In the absence of a court order allocating tort proceeds among categories of damages, 1/2 of the net proceeds are allocated by law to be available to repay injury-related MA expenses. The amount of net proceeds is computed by deducting from the gross proceeds the attorney's fees, litigation costs and medical expenses relating to the injury that were paid for by the beneficiary prior to the settlement of the injured beneficary's action or claim.
- (3) If the beneficiary or other party seeks to obtain a court order limiting the portion of the tort recovery from which MA reimbursement may be paid to an amount less than 1/2 of net proceeds, or excluding amounts paid by the MA Program from the recovery, the Department shall be given fair notice and an opportunity to protect its interest.
- (4) Failure to provide the Department with fair notice and an opportunity to protect its interest, prior to obtaining a court order limiting the portion of a tort recovery from which MA reimbursement may be paid, constitutes a violation of section 1408(a)(1) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 1408(a)(1)).
- (5) The Department is not bound by a private agreement between the parties to a tort claim regarding allocation of the proceeds.
- (6) The Department's claims against third parties for reimbursement of MA cannot be released by a beneficiary without the Department's express consent in writing.
- (c) The following procedures provide the Department with fair notice and an opportunity to protect its interest prior to entry of an order subject to subsection (b)(3):
- (1) In a case when the beneficiary seeks to exclude injury-related medical expenses paid by the MA Program from the recovery, the beneficiary shall compy with the notice of suit requirements in section 1409(b)(5) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 1409(b)(5)) and include a

- statement that the beneficiary will seek to exclude moneys paid by the MA Program from any recovery.
- (2) In a case when the beneficiary seeks an allocation of tort proceeds by the court or a trier of fact, the beneficiary shall provide the Department with reasonable advance notice and opportunity to intervene in the case prior to the determination.
- (3) In a case when the beneficary seeks a court order limiting the portion of the tort settlement from which MA reimbursement may be paid to an amount less that 1/2 of the net proceeds of any settlement, the beneficiary shall provide the Department with reasonable advance notice of settlement before it becomes binding.
- (4) In a case when a motion is to eliminate medical expenses paid by MA from the case, the moving party shall provide the Department with reasonable advance notice and an opportunity to intervene in the case prior to adjudication of the motion.
- (5) Thirty days advance notice is considered reasonable advance notice under this subsection.
- (6) Notices must be in writing and sent by certified or registered mail to the Division of Third-Party Liability, Department of Public Welfare, P. O. Box 8486, Harrisburg, PA 17105 and include the following information:
 - (i) The name of the beneficiary.
- (ii) The beneficiary's MA identification number, if known.
 - (iii) The beneficiary's date of birth.
- (iv) The name of the beneficiary's attorney, if applicable.
 - (v) The insurance carriers, if applicable.
- $\mbox{(vi)}$ The date and specific injuries giving rise to the claim.
- (vii) The court and docket number in which the claim is pending, if applicable.
- (d) If a court does not adjudicate the amount of the Department's claim against a settlement, the Bureau of Hearings and Appeals has jurisdiction to hear and determine an appeal by a beneficiary contesting the amount of the Department's claim.
- § 259.3. Claims against moneys for which thirdparties are liable as a result of a tort claim allocation of tort proceeds in actions filed on or after September 2, 2008—statement of policy.
- (a) With respect to claims asserted by the MA Program against moneys owed by third parties as a result of tort claims asserted by a beneficiary of MA benefits, the Department will only recover from that portion of a tort recovery which represents payment for medical care by the third party. The beneficiary has the burden of informing the Department that its claim must be limited under this subsection and showing not all medical expenses paid by MA were recovered. For purposes of this section, the term "beneficiary" includes both present and former adult and minor recipients of MA benefits, and includes individuals receiving benefits through an MA managed care organization.
- (b) If a beneficiary elects not to recover expenses for which medical assistance is provided under section 1409(b)(5) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 1409(b)(5)) then:

- (1) The Department will pursue its claim directly against the liable third-party or insurer if it is cost-effective to do so.
- (2) The Department will not reduce its claim on account of attorney fees or costs incurred by the beneficiary regardless of any indirect benefit that the Department receives from the beneficiary's prosecution of his claim.
- (3) The beneficiary is prohibited from attempting to recover past or future medical expenses that will be paid by MA.
- (4) Notice of settlement under section 1409(b)(5)(iv) of the Public Welfare Code shall be provided to the Department.
- (5) The election not to recover expenses paid by MA may be revoked by the beneficiary only with the consent of the Department in writing.
- (6) The beneficiary shall disclose to the liable third-party or insurer that the beneficiary has elected not to recover expenses paid by MA and that the third-party or insurer will remain liable to the Department on the claim
- (7) The beneficiary shall cooperate with the Department's efforts to obtain payment of medical care from any liable third-party or insurer as a condition of eligibility for MA in accordance with § 259.5 (relating to cooperation in obtaining payment from third-parties—statement of policy)
- (c) A beneficiary may not settle or release the Department's claims against third parties or insurers without the Department's consent.
- (d) The Department may impose a \$5,000 civil money penalty for a violation of the notice requirements of section 1409(b)(5) of the Public Welfare Code or the distribution requirements of section 1409(b)(9) of the Public Welfare Code. A separate penalty may be imposed for each violation of the law. In determining whether to assess a civil money penalty against a third party or insurer for violating the statutory requirements, the Department will deem a third party or insurer to have information indicating that a beneficiary received medical assistance if the beneficiary's MA status is shown in records received by the third party or insurer.
- (e) The Department will not impose or pursue liability under section 1409(b)(9) of the Public Welfare Code against a third-party or insurer for the distribution of settlement proceeds on a claim by a beneficiary if an insurer or third-party has complied with one or more of the following requirements:
- (1) The insurer resolves the Department's claim with the Department and makes direct payment to the Department
- (2) The insurer or third-party requires the beneficiary to satisfy the Department's claim and makes the Department a payee on the settlement draft so that the Department's endorsement is required to negotiate the draft.
- (3) The insurer obtains a statement from the Division of Third-Party Liability that the Department has no claim against the settlement.
- (f) Notices to the Department under sections 1409 and 1409.1 of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. §§ 1409 and 1409.1) must be in writing and sent by certified or registered mail to the Division of Third-Party Liability, Department of Public Welfare, P. O. Box 8486, Harrisburg, PA 17105 and include the following information:

- (1) The name of the beneficiary.
- (2) The beneficiary's MA identification number, if known.
 - (3) The beneficiary's date of birth.
 - (4) The name of the beneficiary's attorney, if applicable.
- (5) The insurance carriers and claim numbers, if applicable.
- (6) The date and specific injuries giving rise to the claim.
- (7) The court and docket number in which the claim is pending.
 - (8) The filing date of the lawsuit or claim.
 - (9) The close of discovery date.
- (g) A notice of election to exclude medical expenses paid by MA from a claim that is made within 30 days of filing the complaint must contain a copy of the complaint. A notice of election to exclude medical expenses paid by MA from a claim that is made more than 30 days after the filing of the complaint must contain a copy of the complaint and the docket entries in the case.
- (h) A notice of election to exclude medical expenses paid by MA is not reasonable if it is given after the close of discovery in a case, or in the event of a settlement prior to the close of discovery, it is given less than 30 days prior to the date the settlement agreement is fully executed.
- (i) If a court does not adjudicate the amount of the Department's claim against a settlement, the Bureau of Hearings and Appeals has jurisdiction to hear and determine an appeal by a beneficiary contesting the amount of the Department's claim.

§ 259.4. Settlements without litigation—statement of policy.

- (a) With respect to claims asserted by the MA Program against moneys owed by third-parties as a result of tort claims asserted by a beneficiary of MA benefits, the Department will only recover from that portion of a tort settlement which represents payment for medical care by the third party. The beneficiary has the burden of informing the Department that its claim must be limited under this subsection and showing not all medical expenses paid by MA were recovered. For purposes of this section, the term "beneficiary" includes both present and former adult and minor recipients of MA benefits, and includes individuals receiving benefits through an MA managed care organization.
- (b) If a beneficiary settles a tort claim without litigation, the settlement includes medical expenses paid by MA unless one of the following applies:
- (1) The case involves a minor or incapacitated individual and a court enters an order expressly adjudicating the Department's claim after the Department has been given notice and an opportunity to be heard.
- (2) The beneficiary is legally incapable of recovering the medical expenses paid by MA.
- (3) The beneficiary notifies both the Department and the third party or insurer that the beneficiary's claim does not include medical expenses paid by MA prior to settling the claim.
- (c) A beneficiary may not settle or release the Department's claims against third parties or insurers without the Department's written consent.

- (d) The failure to provide reasonable notice to the Department that a claim does not include recovery of medical expenses paid by MA constitutes a violation of section 1408(a)(1) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 1408(a)(1)). Notice is not reasonable if it is given less than 30 days prior to the date a settlement agreement is fully executed.
- (e) The Bureau of Hearings and Appeals has jurisdiction to hear and determine an appeal by a beneficiary contesting the amount of the Department's claim against a settlement.

§ 259.5. Cooperation in obtaining payment from third parties—statement of policy.

- (a) A beneficiary has a duty to cooperate with the Department in obtaining payment from third parties and insurers as a condition of eligibility for MA.
- (b) If a beneficiary does not cooperate with the Department's efforts to obtain payment of medical care from any third party or insurer, then the Department will determine the beneficiary to be ineligible for MA and pursue an overpayment of MA received after the date of noncooperation. The Department is not limited to recovering from the medical portion of a tort recovery when an overpayment is established.
- (c) Cooperation with the Department's efforts to obtain payment of medical care from any third party or insurer includes the following:
- (1) Disclosing to the Department that a claim was filed against an insurer or third party.
- (2) Identifying and providing information to assist the Department in pursuing a third party who may be liable to pay for medical care and services.
- (3) Consenting to the Department's intervention into the beneficiary's pending lawsuit.
- (4) Consenting to a reasonable extension of time requested by Department counsel in the case.
- (5) Providing Department counsel copies of discovery documents and legal papers filed in the lawsuit upon request.
- (6) Disclosing to the liable third party or insurer that the beneficiary has elected not to pursue recovery of expenses paid by MA and the third party or insurer will remain liable to the Department on the claim.
- (7) Not agreeing to indemnify or release the liable third party or insurer from the Department's claims.
- (8) Providing testimony and evidence in support of the Department's claim.
- (9) Providing notices required under section 1409(b)(5) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 1409(b)(5) in compliance with this section.
- (10) Including medical expenses paid by MA in a claim or lawsuit if requested to do so by the Department.
- (11) Taking any other action requested by the Department that is necessary to pursue a claim against a third party.

§ 259.6. Civil money penalties—statement of policy.

- (a) The Department may impose a civil money penalty of up to \$5,000 per violation upon a person who willfully fails to comply with the obligations imposed under section 1409 of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 1409).
- (b) The Department may impose a civil money penalty of up to \$1,000 per violation upon a person who willfully

- fails to disclose a material fact regarding third party liability for a beneficiary's injuries.
- (c) Persons who are required to disclose information regarding third-party liability to the Department include the beneficiary, any representative of the beneficiary, and any liable third-party or insurer in possession of that information.
- (d) "Willfully" means that the person acted intentionally in the sense that the person intended to do the act and was aware of what the person was doing. Proof of evil motive or intent or knowledge that the person's conduct violated the law is not required.
- (e) The Bureau of Hearings and Appeals has jurisdiction to hear appeals from the assessment of civil money penalties by the Department.

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[55 PA. CODE CH. 1187] Nursing Facility Services

Statutory Authority

The Department of Public Welfare (Department) under the authority of section 443.1(8) of the Public Welfare Code (code) (62 P. S. § 443.1(8)), intends to revise the statement of policy in 55 Pa. Code § 1187.21a (relating to nursing facility exception requests—statement of policy) as set forth in Annex A.

Scope

This proposed statement of policy applies to county, general, hospital-based and special rehabilitation nursing facilities that are enrolled, or applying for enrollment in the Medical Assistance (MA) Program.

Purpose

The purpose of this proposed statement of policy is to provide nursing facilities and other interested persons with notice of the guidelines that the Department intends to use in exercising its existing statutory and regulatory discretion to manage the enrollment and participation of nursing facilities as providers in the MA program.

Background

The Department is the "Single State Agency" responsible for the administration of the MA Program. See 62 P. S. § 201(1) regarding State participation in cooperative Federal programs. As the Single State Agency, the Department must operate the MA Program in compliance with Federal law. Federal law requires, among other things, that the Department administer the MA Program in a manner that assures that "care and services [are] provided in a manner consistent with simplicity of administration and the best interests of recipients," and in a manner that safeguards against the unnecessary utilization of services and that assures that MA payments are consistent with efficiency, economy and quality of services. See 42 U.S.C.A. § 1396a(a)(23) and (30)(A) (relating to state plans for medical assistance). Additionally, Federal law requires that the Department administer the MA Program so as to avoid the unjustified institutional isolation of persons with disabilities. Olmstead v. L.C., 527 U.S. 581, 597 (1999).

To ensure compliance with applicable Federal requirements, and acting under its authority under section

201(2) and (3) of the code and regulations in §§ 1101.42(a) and 1101.77(b)(1) (relating to prerequisites for participation and enforcement actions by the Department), the Department issued a series of statements of policy relating to certain provider participation culminating in a 1998 statement of policy (SOP). See 28 Pa.B. 138 (January 10, 1998), codified in §§ 1101.42b, 1101.77a and 1187.21a (relating to certificate of need requirements for participation—statement of policy; termination for covenience and best interests of the Departmentstatement of policy; and nursing facility exception requests—statement of policy). the SOPs, the Department announced both the general policies relating to the participation of nursing facilities, and the specific guidelines that it intended to consider in future adjudications involving nursing facility participation in the MA Program. In adopting and applying these policies and guidelines, the Department's overarching goal was, and remains, to promote the efficient operation of the MA Program in a manner, consistent with the best interests of recipients, that avoids the unjustified institutional isolation of persons with disabilities. The SOPs provide the means for the Department to manage and control the publiclyfunded long-term living system in this Commonwealth so as to reduce the MA Program's continued reliance on institutional nursing services and encourage the increased access to and use of home and community-based (HCB) services.

Approximately 10 years after the SOPs were issued, Commonwealth Court determined in Eastwood Nursing & Rehabilitation Center v. Department of Public Welfare, 910 A.2d 134, 148 (2006), that the SOPs were invalid because they imposed binding norms but had not been duly promulgated as regulations. The Court also determined that the SOPs reference to the "best interests of the Department" was inconsistent with the Federal requirement that the Department adopt "safeguards to assure that care and services 'will be provided in a manner consistent with... the best interests of the recipient." ¹ Id., at 149.

The General Assembly responded to *Eastwood* by enacting the act of June 30, 2007 (P. L. 33, No. 16) (Act 16). Act 16 amended the Public Welfare Code to require, among other things, private or public nursing facilities to seek and obtain advance written approval from the Department to enroll in the MA Program or to increase their existing certified bed complement if already enrolled in the MA Program. See section 1 of Act 16 (62 P.S. § 443.1(8)). Act 16 also directed the Department to publish proposed regulations by July 1, 2009, setting forth the process and criteria it intends to use to review and act on requests by nursing facilities for approval to enroll in the MA Program or increase their bed capacity. Id. It further specified that, pending the adoption of final regulations or until September 30, 2011, (whichever comes first), the Department must review pending and future requests for enrollment or expansion in accordance with the process and guidelines contained in the statements of policy published at 28 Pa.B. 138 (SOPs). Id.

Act 16 also authorized the Department to "publish amendments to the statement of policy if the department determines that changes to the process and guidelines for reviewing and responding to requests for approval of

increases in MA-certified beds will facilitate access to medically necessary nursing facility services or are required to assure that long-term living care and services under the MA program will be provided in a manner consistent with applicable Federal and State law, including Title XIX of the Social Security Act." See section 1 of Act 16. Before the Department adopts amendments to the SOP, however, Act 16 requires that the Department solicit public comments for 30 days.

This proposed statement of policy announces the Department's intent to amend the existing § 1187.21a published at 28 Pa.B. 138. In proposing these amendments, the Department's intent is to clarify the language of the SOP to address the Federal law concerns identified by the Eastwood court and to streamline the process and guidelines used in conducting reviews thereunder so as to facilitate MA recipients' continued access to medically necessary nursing facility services. The revisions are identified and discussed in greater detail as follows.

Discussion

Best Interests of MA Recipients

Since the SOPs were first issued in 1998, the Department's paramount consideration in reviewing nursing facility enrollment and expansion requests has been the best interests of MA-recipients. As noted previously, the Department issued the SOPs to promote the growth in HCB services, which consumers prefer, while ensuring that MA recipients have adequate access to medically necessary nursing facility services. Consistent with the SOPs intended objective, the Department has reviewed nursing facility requests on a case-by-case basis without any presumption as to whether the requests should be approved or denied. In determining whether to approve the enrollment of a new nursing facility provider or an increase in the MA-certified bed capacity of an existing nursing facility provider, the Department has examined occupancy rates, the availability of HCB services, and specific information relating to the needs of MA recipients, including whether MA recipients had adequate access to care in the service area proposed by the provider seeking expansion or enrollment in the MA Program.

To better reflect how the Department has applied and will continue to apply the SOPs in reviewing requests to enroll and expand, the Department is proposing to revise its guidelines to clarify how the occupancy rates and other information that may be relevant to whether MA recipients have adequate access to care and to explicitly state that it will consider whether a project is necessary to address the special needs of individual MA recipients that may exceed the needs of the general MA nursing facility population. See § 1187.21a(h)(1)(iii).

Obsolete Certificate of Need (CON) Provisions

The issuance of the SOPs were prompted by the sunset of the Commonwealth's CON process on December 19, 1996. See 28 Pa.B. 138, 139. The SOPs, however, were not intended to, nor did they, reinstitute the CON process. Nonetheless, the Department recognized that certain providers might not have completed nursing facilprojects under CONs issued shortly before December of 1996. Therefore, the Department included separate guidelines for CON holders that reasonably relied on a CON and substantially implemented its project within the time frames required by the CON (see 28 Pa.B. 143 and 55 Pa. Code § 1187.21a(f)). The Department also specified that CON holders should submit requests for enrollment or expansion no later than April 13, 1998, to be considered under these separate guidelines. Since more than 10

¹ The statutory provision on which the Eastwood Court relied in making this determination states that A State plan for medical assistance must—

years has elapsed, the Department has determined that separate guidelines for CON holders are no longer required, and is proposing to delete the guideline from the SOP.

Outdated Bed Need Projections

When the Department issued the SOP in 1998, it attached "Appendix C" as one of the many factors it would consider in evaluating nursing facility enrollment and expansion requests. See 28 Pa.B. at 145, Appendix C. Appendix C was developed by the Department of Health, and contained nursing home bed need projections by counties through the year 2000. Since these projections have not been updated since they were issued, the Department has determined they are obsolete. Additionally, because the projections relate to the community at large, and do not adequately take into account either the increasing availability of HCB services or the current occupancy rates in MA-participating nursing facilities, the Department has concluded that they are no longer relevant in assessing the merits of requests made under the SOP. The Department is proposing to delete Appendix C.

New Bed Transfer Provisions

The nursing facility associations have recommended that the Department include guidelines in the SOP that would apply to requests to increase the number of MA-certified beds of a nursing facility simultaneous with a decrease of an equal or greater number of MA-certified beds in another nursing facility. Upon careful consider-ation of this recommendation, the Department agrees that there may be circumstances when allowing owners to adjust the MA-certified beds at their nursing facilities may facilitate access to medically necessary nursing facility services for MA recipients but not impede the Department's ability to administer long-term living care and services under the MA program in an efficient and economic manner that is consistent with applicable Federal and State law. Therefore, the Department is proposing to include new provisions in the SOP that will provide for separate guidelines and expedited reviews of bed transfer requests when certain conditions are present.

Because the Department wants the benefit of additional public input on the subject of bed transfers during the regulatory review process, the Department intends to limit application of these new SOP provisions to requests involving nursing facilities owned or controlled by the same legal entity and located in the same county. Requests that do not meet the conditions for consideration under these new provisions will not be automatically denied. Rather, they will be evaluated under the process and guidelines applicable to other bed requests.

Guideline

The proposed amendments to the statement of policy are contained in Annex A.

Effective Date

The statement of policy will be effective upon publication of the final statement of policy in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments regarding this proposed statement of policy to the Department. PART III. MEDICAL ASSISTANCE MANUAL CHAPTER 1187. NURSING FACILITY SERVICES

Subchapter C. NURSING FACILITY PARTICIPATION

- § 1187.21a. Nursing facility [exception requests] participation review process and guidelines—statement of policy.
- (a) *Scope*. This section applies to applicants **[and providers]** as defined in subsection (i).
- (b) Purpose. The purpose of this section is to [provide nursing facilities and other interested persons with notice of] describe the process and the guidelines that the Department [intends to] will use [in exercising its discretion regarding enrollment and participation of nursing facilities as providers in the MA Program] to review and respond to bed requests under section 443.1(8) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 443.1(8)).
 - (c) Policy regarding enrollment and expansion.
 - (1) **[General.**
- (i) The Department, possessing the authority to regulate nursing facility participation in the MA Program, has discretion to refuse to enter into provider agreements with applicants and to terminate provider agreements with participating providers to protect and advance the best interests of the Department.
- (ii) The Department has determined that, in most instances, the current complement of nursing facilities participating in the MA Program results in an adequate supply of nursing facility beds for persons who qualify for MA nursing facility services, and, therefore, in most instances, increasing the number of MA-certified nursing facility beds through the enrollment of new providers or the expansion of existing providers is not in the Department's best interests.
- (iii) The Department has determined that, because in most instances an increase in the number of MA-certified beds is not in the Department's best interests, if an applicant or a provider desires to cause an increase, it is appropriate to require the applicant or provider to request the Department's prior approval and to bear the burden of demonstrating that, under the circumstances, an increase in the number of MA-certified beds is in the Department's best interests and that the applicant or provider should be allowed to provide those beds.

- (2) Policy regarding enrollment of applicants.
- (i) Except as noted in subparagraph (ii), when the Department receives an exception request from an applicant which, if granted by the Department, would cause a currently unenrolled nursing facility to become an enrolled MA provider of nursing facility services, the Department will, in the exercise of its discretion under § 1101.42(a) (relating to prerequisite for participation), deny that exception request.
- (ii) The Department will make an exception to the policy in subparagraph (i) if, after considering the applicant's exception request in accordance with subsection (f) or (g), the Department determines that the applicant has demonstrated that its enrollment as an MA provider of nursing facility services is in the best interests of the Department.
 - (3) Policy regarding expansion of providers.
- (i) Except as noted in subparagraph (ii), the Department will, in the exercise of its discretion under § 1101.77(b)(1) (relating to nursing facility exception requests—statement of policy), terminate the enrollment of a provider that undertakes to increase the number of licensed and MA-certified beds at its nursing facility and, further, will terminate the direct or indirect participation of that provider in the MA Program, and may suspend payments to that provider.
- (ii) The Department will make an exception to the policy in subparagraph (i) if, after considering the provider's exception request in accordance with subsection (f) or (g), the Department determines that the provider has demonstrated that an increase in the number of the provider's licensed and MA-certified beds is in the Department's best interests.

Before an applicant increases the number of MA-certified beds in an existing MA nursing facility or the number of MA-certified beds in the MA Program, the applicant shall submit a bed request to the Department and obtain the Department's advance written approval.

- (2) The Department will review bed requests on a case-by-case basis in accordance with the guidelines in subsection (g) or (h).
- (d) Submission [and content of exception] of bed requests.
- (1) An applicant [or provider may make an exception request by submitting] shall submit an original and two copies of its bed request to the Department at the following address:

(2) [Except as otherwise provided in subsection (f), an] An applicant [or provider should] shall submit its [exception] bed request to the Department prior to beginning construction of the [new or additional nursing facility beds that will be the subject of its request] applicant's proposed project.

(e) Contents of bed requests.

- [(3)] (1) When an applicant submits [an exception] a bed request [to enroll as an MA provider, or a provider submits an exception request to expand the number of licensed and MA-certified beds at its nursing facility], the Department has no obligation to independently seek out any information on the question of whether the circumstances of that applicant [or provider] are such that [an exception] the applicant's bed request should be [made] approved. To the contrary, [if an applicant or provider believes an exception should be made,] the applicant [or provider] should submit to the Department whatever information that the applicant [or provider believes to be] believes is relevant to or supports its bed request [to enroll or expand].
- (4) If an applicant or provider submits an exception request to the Department, the Department may base its decision solely upon the information supplied by the applicant or provider. The Department may request or consider additional information other than the information provided by the applicant or provider, including any public comments received on the exception request, and the information specified in subsections (f) and (g). (2) The Department recommends that a bed request include the information specified in paragraphs (3) and (4). If a bed request does not include the recommended information, the Department will not automatically deny the bed request, but the Department may independently seek and consider the information in determining how to respond to the bed request.
- [(5) To enable the Department to fully evaluate an exception request, the Department suggests that an exception request include the following information:] (3) An applicant's bed request should include the following information:
- (i) An overview of the applicant's proposed project which [explains how it addresses the Department's goal to develop a fuller array of long-term care supports and services to meet the needs of its MA population and why it meets, or is needed to meet, the nursing facility service needs of the community] includes a description of the population and primary service area the applicant intends to serve.
- (ii) A narrative and supporting documentation, if any, addressing each guideline in subsection [(f) or] (g) or (h) and indexed to identify which guideline is being addressed.
- (iii) [If the applicant or provider possesses a Certificate of Need (CON) and is seeking an exception under subsection (f), copies of the CON application.
- (iv) Copies of any feasibility or market studies and financial projections prepared for the project, including any studies or projections identifying project costs, sources of project funds, projected revenue sources by payor type, including assumptions used and expected occupancy rates by payor type.
- [(v) A list of owners and related parties/entities involved in the project.]

- (iv) A list identifying the names and addresses of the owners of the applicant and the owners of the proposed project and any related parties or entities involved in the project and, for each person included on the list, a description of the person's involvement with the project and the information specified in paragraph (4).
- [(vi)] (v) Independent audited financial statements, if any, of the applicant [and provider,] and owners or parent corporation, if any, of the applicant [or provider] for the most recent year prior to the fiscal year in which the [exception] bed request is filed.
- [(vii)] (vi) Other information that the [provider] applicant believes to be relevant.
- [(6) The Department requests that the] (4) An applicant [or provider] should specify [in its narrative and supporting documentation relating to suitability under subsections (f)(10) and (g)(2),] whether or not any of the following applies, and, if so, [that] the applicant [or provider] should attach copies of all documents relating to the applicable action, including notices, orders[,] or sanction letters, received from the [Health Care Financing Administration] Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services or any state Medicaid, survey or licensing agency:
- (i) Whether the applicant [, provider] or any owner of the applicant or proposed project is currently precluded from participating in the Medicare Program or any state Medicaid Program.
- (ii) Whether the applicant [, provider] or any owner of the applicant or the proposed project owned, operated or managed a nursing facility, at any time during the [period specified in subsection (f)(10) or (g)(2)] 3-year period preceding the date of the bed request and one of the following applies:

[(e)] (f) Consideration of [exception] bed requests.

- (1) [Applicants or providers that possess a CON or letter of nonreviewability for their new or additional beds dated on or before December 18, 1996, may submit an exception request (if they have not already done so) under the guidelines in subsection (f), if the exception request is submitted by April 13, 1998. The Department will process and consider requests involving CONs or letters of nonreviewability as they are received. The Department will consider requests not submitted within this 90-day period under the guidelines in subsections (e)(2)—(5) and (g).
- (2) The] Subject to paragraph (6), the Department will consider [all other exception requests under subsection (g)] bed requests, other than bed transfer requests, submitted on or after July 1, 2008, biannually in two groups as follows:
- (i) Group One will consist of **[exception]** bed requests other than bed transfer requests received January 1 through June 30. The Department will use its best efforts to issue decisions on Group One **[exception requests]** by the following December 31.

- (ii) Group Two will consist of **[exception]** bed requests other than bed transfer requests received from July 1 through December 31. The Department will use its best efforts to issue decisions on Group Two **[exception requests]** by the following June 30.
- [(3) Applicants or providers that submitted exception requests received by the Department between December 1996 through June 30, 1997 (Group One-1997) will be permitted until February 11, 1998, to submit additional information relating to their exception requests. The Department will use its best efforts to issue decisions on Group One-1997 by March 31, 1998.
- (4) Following the close of each 6-month request period, the Department will publish a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* listing the exception requests included in the Group under consideration. For a 30-day period following publication of the notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the Department will make copies of the requests in that Group available for review by the public during regular business hours, and will accept written comments related to the requests in the Group.
- (5) The Department may expedite its review and act on an individual request before the target date.
- (2) The Department will use its best efforts to issue decisions on any bed requests, other than bed transfer requests, that were submitted prior to and pending with the Department on June 30, 2008, by _____(Editor's Note: The blank refers to a date 120 days following the date of publication of the final statement of policy in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.).
- (3) The Department will use its best efforts to issue decisions on any bed transfer requests that were submitted prior to ______ Editor's Note: The blank refers to the effective date of publication of the final statement of policy in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by ______ (Editor's Note: The blank refers to a date 60 days after the effective date of publication of the final statement of policy in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.).
- (4) The Department will consider bed transfer requests submitted on or after ______(Editor's Note: The blank refers to the effective date of publication of the final statement of policy in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin.*) in the order in which they are received. Subject to paragraph (6), the Department will issue decisions on those requests on an ongoing basis following the expiration of the public comment period set forth in paragraph (5)(ii).

(5) Public process.

(i) Bed requests, other than bed transfer requests. Following the close of each 6-month request period, the Department will make available on the Office of Long Term Living (OLTL) web site a listing of the bed requests, other than bed transfer requests included in the group under consideration. For a 30-day period following the date that the notice is posted on the web site, the Department will make copies of the requests in that group available for review by the public during regular business hours, and will accept written comments related to the requests in the group.

- (A) The Group One listing will be made available on the OLTL web site on or before January 31.
- (B) The Group Two listing will be made available on the OLTL web site on or before July 31.
- (ii) Bed transfer requests. No later than 15 calendar days following the last day of each calendar month, the Department will make available on the OLTL web site a listing of the bed transfer requests received by the Department during that calendar month. For a 15-day period following the date that the notice is posted on the web site, the Department will make copies of the bed transfer requests that are listed in the notice for that calendar month available for review by the public during regular business hours, and will accept written comments related to the bed transfer requests.
- (6) If an applicant demonstrates good cause, the Department may expedite its review and respond to a bed request before the target date; provided that the Department will not respond prior to the close of the applicable public comment period specified in paragraph (5)(i) and (ii).
- (7) In reviewing an applicant's bed request, the Department will consider the information provided by the applicant and any public comments received on the request. In addition, the Department may consider information contained in the Department's books and records or obtained from persons other than the applicant that is relevant to the applicant's bed request including:
- (i) The information specified in subsection (e)(3) and (4).
- (ii) Data relating to the overall occupancy rates of MA nursing facilities in the applicant's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located.
- (iii) Data relating to the admission rates for dayone MA eligible persons and the MA occupancy rates of MA nursing facilities in the applicant's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located.
- (iv) Data relating to the availability of home and community based services in the applicant's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located.
- (v) Data relating to the demographics of the applicant's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located.
- (vi) Data relating to the admission and discharge practices of the applicant and of MA nursing facilities in the applicant's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located.
- (vii) Data relating to the applicant's suitability as a provider of nursing facility services.
- (viii) Data relating to the availability of specialized medical services the applicant is proposing to provide in the applicant's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located.
- [(f) Consideration of exception requests made by applicants and providers possessing CON or letters of nonreviewability dated on or before December 18, 1996. In considering whether an applicant or pro-

- vider has demonstrated that an increase in the number of MA-certified beds is in the Department's best interests, the Department will use the following guidelines and will consider the following information in evaluating the request:
- (1) Whether the applicant or provider possesses a CON or letter of nonreviewability dated on or before December 18, 1996, authorizing the construction of new or additional nursing facility beds.
- (2) Whether the Department of Health has issued a license to the applicant or provider authorizing it to operate the new or additional beds.
- (3) If the applicant's or provider's CON or letter of nonreviewability was issued within 24 months of the date of its written notice to the Department, whether the applicant or provider demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Department that it is implementing its approved project in accordance with the substantial implementation timetable included in its approved CON application or, if not, whether there is good cause for the delay.
- (4) If the applicant's or provider's CON or letter of nonreviewability was issued more than 24 months before the date of its written notice to the Department, whether the applicant or provider demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Department that it has substantially implemented its project as defined in 28 Pa. Code § 401.2 (relating to definitions), as effective December 18, 1996, or, if not, whether there is good cause for the failure.
- (5) Whether the applicant or provider demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Department that, in determining that its project was economically and financially feasible, it presumed that it would participate in the MA Program and render services to MA recipients.
- (6) For an applicant that possesses a CON for the new beds, whether the applicant will agree to provide written assurances to the Department that it will serve at least that percentage of MA recipients specified in its CON application, and that it will admit day-one MA recipients on a first-come/first-served basis as necessary to achieve and maintain that MA percentage on an ongoing basis.
- (7) For a provider that is seeking to expand its number of licensed and certified beds under a CON, whether the provider will agree to provide written assurances to the Department that it will serve at least that percentage of MA recipients specified in its CON application, and that it will admit day-one MA recipients on a first-come/first served basis as necessary to achieve and maintain that MA occupancy percentage.
- (8) For a provider that is seeking to expand its number of licensed and certified beds under a letter of nonreviewability, whether the provider will agree to provide written assurances to the Department that it will serve at least that percentage of MA recipients necessary to achieve an MA occupancy rate equal to its MA occupancy rate percentage in effect during the most recent 12-month fiscal period ending prior to its written request to the Department, and that it will admit day-one MA recipients on a first-come/first served basis as necessary to achieve and maintain that MA occupancy percentage.

- (9) Whether the applicant or provider will agree to provide written assurances to the Department that the construction of its new or additional beds will be economically and financially feasible without the receipt of MA capital component payments and that it is not entitled to MA capital component payments related to the new or additional beds.
- (10) Whether the applicant or provider has demonstrated suitability for enrollment or expansion. In determining whether an applicant or provider is suitable, the Department will consider the record of licensure and Medicaid and Medicare Program participation of the applicant, provider and any owner of the applicant or provider subsequent to the issuance date of the CON or letter of nonreviewability.
- (g) Guidelines for evaluation of [all other exception requests] bed transfer requests. [Except for those exception requests reviewed under subsection (f), the Department will use the following guidelines and will consider the following information in evaluating an exception request. The Department will use the following guidelines to evaluate bed transfer requests:
- (1) Whether the nursing facility that will increase its MA-certified beds (receiving facility) and the nursing facility that will decrease its MA-certified beds (surrendering facility) admit MA day-one recipients.
- (2) Whether the decrease in beds at the surrendering facility will result in access barriers to nursing facility services for MA recipients. For purposes of this determination, the Department will examine, among other things, the MA occupancy rates both at the surrendering facility and at the receiving facility.
- (3) Whether the increase in beds at the receiving facility will improve access to nursing facility services for MA recipients. For purposes of this determination, the Department will examine, among other things, the MA occupancy rates both at the surrendering facility and at the receiving facility.
- (4) Whether the proposed project will result in a change in peer group under Chapter 1187 (relating to nursing facility services) for the surrendering or receiving facility and, if so, whether the change will have a negative or positive effect on the MA Program or on MA recipients.
- (5) Whether the surrendering facility received capital component payments for the closed beds.
- (6) Whether during the 3 year period preceding the date of the bed transfer request, the applicant, the receiving facility, the surrendering facility or any other nursing facility where the applicant is the owner, has been precluded from participation in the MA Program or in the Medicare Program; has been subject to the imposition of licensing or MA or Medicare certification sanctions or remedies; or has operated under a Corporate Integrity Agreement with the Department or the Federal government.
- (h) Guidelines for evaluation of bed requests other than bed transfer requests. The Department will use the following guidelines in evaluating any bed request that is not a bed transfer request:

- (1) MA Program's need for additional nursing facility beds. The Department will determine whether **[the MA Program needs** additional **MA-certified** nursing facility beds are needed in the applicant's or provider's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located to facilitate MA recipients' access to medically necessary nursing facility services or to assure that MA long-term living care and services will be provided in a manner consistent with applicable Federal and State law, including Title XIX of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 1396—1396v) and, if so, whether the applicant [or provider] has demonstrated to the Department's satisfaction that it will meet that MA **Program** need. The In making these determinations, the Department will review and consider [information as may be provided by the applicant or provider to show that a need for additional MAcertified nursing facility beds exists in the applicant's or provider's primary service area. The Department regards] the following [information as relevant to the determination of MA Program need |:
- (i) [The extent to which MA recipients have access to nursing facility services in the applicant's or provider's primary service area] The existing size and utilization of the MA-certified bed capacity in the applicant's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located.
- (ii) The extent to which MA recipients, including day-one MA recipients [and technology-dependent MA recipients] have access to [nursing facility beds] the existing MA-certified bed capacity in the applicant's [or provider's] primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located, and whether there are systemic barriers that prevent MA recipients from accessing that bed capacity.
- (iii) [Whether, and to what extent (expressed as a percentage of MA occupancy), the applicant or provider is willing and able to admit and serve day-one eligible MA recipients.
- (iv) Whether the applicant or provider is willing and able to admit and serve technology-dependent MA recipients.
- (v) Whether there are any alternatives to an increase in the number of MA-certified nursing facility beds, such as an increase in home and community-based services, that would be less costly, more efficient or more appropriate in meeting any MA Program need.
- (vi) Except for those exception requests involving nursing facility beds licensed prior to March 31, 1997, whether there is a need for additional nursing facility beds in the applicant's or provider's primary service area. In determining whether such a bed need exists, the Department will consider whether, and to what extent, the applicant's or provider's primary service area involves a county with bed shortages or surpluses, as set forth in Appendix C. Occupancy rates in the applicant's and provider's primary service area are also relevant to this determination.

Whether the applicant is willing and able to admit and serve MA recipients having specialized medical needs and the extent to which MA recipients needing specialized medical services proposed by the applicant have access to the existing MA-certified bed capacity in the applicant's primary service area and the county in which the applicant's proposed project is located, and whether there are systemic barriers that prevent MA recipients with specialized medical needs from accessing that bed capacity.

- (iv) Whether, and to what extent (expressed as a percentage of MA occupancy), the applicant is willing and able to admit and serve day-one eligible MA recipients.
- (v) Whether there are any alternatives to an increase in the number of MA-certified nursing facility beds, such as an increase in home and community-based services, that would be less costly, more efficient or more appropriate in assuring that long-term living care and services will be provided under the MA Program in a manner consistent with applicable Federal and State law.
- (vi) Whether, and how, the applicant's proposed project would affect the Department's goal to rebalance the Commonwealth's publicly-funded long-term living system in order to create a fuller array of service options for MA recipients.
- (2) Suitability. The Department will determine whether the [applicant or provider has demonstrated suitability for enrollment or expansion. In determining whether an applicant or provider is suitable, the Department will consider the] record of licensure and Medicaid and Medicare Program participation of the applicant[, provider] and any owner of the applicant or [provider beginning 3 years prior to the date of the exception request] the applicant's proposed project during the 3-year period preceding the date of the applicant's bed request demonstrates the applicant's suitability to increase the number of MA-certified nursing facility beds in the MA Program.
- (3) Economic and financial feasibility without MA capital component payments. [If an applicant's new beds or the provider's additional beds will be ineligible for capital cost reimbursement under § 1187.113(a) (relating to capital component payment limitation), the] The Department will consider whether the applicant [or provider] will agree to provide written assurances to the Department that the construction of its new or additional beds will be economically and financially feasible without the receipt of MA capital component payments and that it is not entitled to MA capital component payments related to the new or additional beds.
- (4) Employment of welfare and [Medical Assistance] MA recipients. The Department will consider whether an applicant [or provider] will commit to employ welfare or [medical assistance] MA recipients in its new or expanded facility.
- [(h)] (i) Time lines for completion of approved projects. [Applicants or providers who are granted exceptions] An applicant whose bed request is approved shall provide written assurances to the De-

partment that the [construction of the new or additional beds] applicant's project will be completed in sufficient time so that the beds may be licensed, certified and available for occupancy within 3 years from the date the Department approves the applicant's [or provider's enrollment or expansion, or] bed request, or by another date as may be specified by the applicant [or provider] and agreed to by the Department.

[(i)] (j) *Definitions.* For purposes of this section, the following words and terms, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Applicant—A person who submits a **bed** request to the Department [which, if granted, would cause a nursing facility not presently enrolled in the MA Program to become a participating provider of nursing facility services to MA Program recipients].

Bed request—A request by an applicant for the Department's approval to increase the number of MA-certified beds in a county or nonpublic nursing facility or to increase the number of MA-certified beds in the MA Program either by increasing the number of beds in an existing MA nursing facility or by enrolling a new MA nursing facility.

Bed transfer request—A bed request in which all of the following conditions apply:

- (i) The applicant seeks the Department's approval to increase the number of MA-certified beds in a county or nonpublic nursing facility.
- (ii) The applicant represents that, if the Department approves the applicant's request, the same number of MA-certified nursing facility beds at a different nursing facility will be simultaneously decertified and permanently closed.
- (iii) The same person is an owner of the nursing facilities.
- (iv) The nursing facilities are located in the same county.

[Exception request—A request by an applicant to enroll in the MA Program as a nursing facility provider or, in the case of an MA nursing facility provider, to expand its licensed and MA-certified

bed capacity.

Specialized medical services—Services not routinely provided in a nursing facility. These services may include, services needed by an individual who requires a respirator for survival, has severe dementia or traumatic brain injury.

[Technology-dependent—In need of a respirator for survival.]

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of November 2008

The Department of Banking (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. \S 301), determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of November, 2008, is 6 1/2%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. No. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 4.01 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 6.51 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 6 1/2%.

Notice of Conditional License Issuance under Act 58 of 2008

On November 5, 2008, Act 58 of 2008, 7 Pa.C.S. Chapter 61 (Mortgage Act), will become effective and Chapter 3 of the Mortgage Bankers and Brokers and Consumer Equity Protection Act (MBBCEPA) and the entire Secondary Mortgage Loan Act (SMLA) will be repealed by operation of law. Existing mortgage business licensees under Chapter 3 of the MBBCEPA and the SMLA, and employees of those licensees and licensees under the Consumer Discount Company Act (CDCA), are therefore required to transition into licensees under the Mortgage Act. As part of this transition, beginning on November 5, 2008, Mortgage Act applicants and licensees are required to use the electronic Nationwide Mortgage Licensing System (NMLS) to obtain and manage their new Mortgage Act licenses. The NMLS can be accessed at www.stateregulatoryregistry.org/nmls.

Any mortgage banker, mortgage broker or loan correspondent licensee under Chapter 3 of the MBBCEPA or secondary mortgage lender or secondary mortgage loan broker licensee under the SMLA that holds an existing license granted by the Department of Banking (Department) between July 1 and November 4, 2008 (Existing Licensee), is deemed to have filed a completed license application with the Department, and is therefore granted a corresponding conditional license as a mortgage lender, mortgage broker or mortgage loan correspondent under section 6133(f) of the Mortgage Act effective from 12 a.m. EST November 5, 2008, to 11:59 p.m. EST December 31, 2008 (Transition Period). As such, an Existing Licensee is authorized to conduct the mortgage loan business as a mortgage lender, mortgage broker or mortgage loan correspondent licensee, as applicable, under the Mortgage Act during the Transition Period. During the Transition Period, all Existing Licensees that meet the requirements of the Mortgage Act and have successfully transitioned onto the NMLS will be issued Mortgage Act license certificates, which will expire on December 31, 2009.

Any person who is employed by an Existing Licensee or a licensee under the CDCA as of November 4, 2008, and who is required to be licensed as a mortgage originator under the Mortgage Act (Existing Employee), is deemed to have filed a license application with the Department, and is therefore granted a conditional mortgage originator license under section 6133(f) of the Mortgage Act effective for the Transition Period. As such, an Existing Employee is authorized to conduct the mortgage loan business as a mortgage originator under the Mortgage Act during the Transition Period. During the Transition Period, Existing Employees that have successfully transitioned onto the NMLS, completed a background check satisfactory to the Department and otherwise meet the requirements of the Mortgage Act will be issued conditional license certificates that will expire on December 31, 2009, which licenses will be subject to the condition that the prequalification education and testing requirements of the Mortgage Act are fulfilled by December 31, 2009.

Actual license certificates will not be provided to Existing Licensees or Existing Employees for the Transition Period. Existing Licensees should use their licenses issued under the prior statutes as well as a copy of this Notice to verify their license status until they receive their new Mortgage Act license.

Note that Existing Licensees and Existing Employees that have not successfully transitioned onto the NMLS by December 31, 2008, and completed any applicable background check satisfactory to the Department will lose their authority to conduct the mortgage loan business as conditional licensees under the Mortgage Act after December 31, 2008. Because of this, the Department strongly recommends that all Existing Licensees and Existing Employees complete this transition process by December 15, 2008, in order to avoid any interruption in licensed status.

- Purchase and rehabilitation of residential properties that have been abandoned or foreclosed upon.
- Establishment of land banks for homes that have been foreclosed upon.
- · Demolition of blighted structures.
- Redevelopment of demolished or vacant properties.

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

The plant operations include the construction and operation of polishing and grinding equipment that are controlled by wet scrubbers and an open top vapor degreaser controlled by a refrigerated chiller. The degreaser is subject to 40 CFR Part 63, Subpart T-National Emission Standards for Halogenated Solvent Cleaning. The facility has the potential to emit less than 1 tpy of PM and less than 10 tpy of combined HAPs. The metal parts grinding and polishing plant is a non-Title V (State-only) facility. The plan approval will also contain additional work practice and emission standards, as well as testing, monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements designed to keep the source operating within all applicable air quality requirements.

67-05107A: Crown Cork & Seal, Inc. (1650 Broadway, Hanover, PA 17331) for construction of a can assembly line with a bake oven at the plant in Penn Township, York County. The facility's annual emissions of VOCs and HAPs are expected to increase by 10.92 tons and 2.6 tons, respectively. The plan approval and State-only operating permit will include emission limits along with monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements to ensure the facility complies with the applicable air quality regulations.

08-310-005: E. A. Ward Excavating, Inc. (R. R. 3, Box 244, Troy, PA 16947) for construction of a nonmetallic mineral processing plant (stone crushing plant) in West Burlington Township, **Bradford County**.

The plant will incorporate a crusher, three screens, seven conveyors, a 238 horsepower diesel fuel-fired engine and a 90 kW diesel fuel-fired generator. Fugitive PM (dust) emissions will be controlled by wetting the material fed to the crusher, as needed.

The air contaminant emissions from the plant are not expected to exceed 5.86 tons of NOx, 3.18 tons of PM/ PM10, 1.27 tons of CO and .41 ton of SOx per year.

The plant will not be a major (Title V) facility for any air contaminant.

The Department of Environmental Protection's (Department) review of the information submitted by E. A. Ward Excavating, Inc. indicates that the plant should be capable of complying with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants including the fugitive air contaminant emission requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 123.1 and 123.2 and the BAT requirement of 25 Pa. Code §§ 121 and 127.12. Based on this finding, the Department proposes to issue plan approval for the respective plant.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to be issued to ensure compliance with all applicable requirements:

1. Neither the plant nor the associated engine or associated generator shall be operated more than 1,000 hours in any 12-consecutive month period.

2. Records shall be maintained of the number of hours the plant operates each month.

- 3. The diesel fuel used in the engine and generator shall be virgin diesel fuel to which no reprocessed/reclaimed oil, waste oil or other waste materials have been added. Additionally, its sulfur content shall not exceed .3%.
- 4. An operable water truck shall be kept onsite and shall be used, as needed, to prevent the emission of fugitive PM from plant roadways as well as to wet the material fed to the plant, as needed, to prevent the emission of fugitive PM from the plant.
- 5. If the Department determines that the use of the water truck is not providing adequate control of the fugitive PM emissions from the plant, the permittee shall install an appropriately-designed water spray dust suppression system on the plant. Prior Department approval must be obtained prior to installing this system.

The Plan Approval will subsequently be incorporated into the Title V Operating Permit through an administrative amendment in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.450.

Plan Approval No. 37-003E is for the modification of the existing baghouse associated with the No. 16 finish mill circuit (Source ID C612) to control additional emissions from the No. 16 mill sweep. Based on the information provided by the applicant and Department's own analysis, the source will emit a total of 38 tons of PM per year, 32 tons of which will be PM10, and 0.01 ton of Chromium.

The Plan Approval will contain additional testing and work practice requirements designed to keep the facility operating within all applicable air quality requirements. This proposed installation will additionally be subject to 40 CFR 63, Subpart LLL, the applicable requirements of which are contained in the facility's Title V Operating Permit.

Approval of an amendment of a Reasonably Available Control Technology (RACT) plan for CraftMaster Manufacturing, Inc. located in Wysox Township, Bradford County.

In accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 129.91—129.95, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a preliminary determination to approve an amendment of a RACT plan and an amendment to the State Implementation Plan (SIP) for the hardboard manufacturing facility owned and operated by CraftMaster Manufacturing, Inc. in Wysox Township, Bradford County.

The proposed SIP revision does not adopt any new regulations. It incorporates the provisions and requirements contained in the amended RACT approval for the facility, which are intended to comply with current regulations.

The proposed amendments to the RACT determination, if finally approved, will be incorporated into a revised operating permit (OP-08-0004) for the facility and will be submitted to the United States Environmental Protection Agency as a revision to Pennsylvania's SIP.

- Revise the VOC emission limit from 33.3 tons (total molecular weight basis) in any 12-consecutive month period to 28.1 tons (as propane by Method 25A) in any 12-consecutive month period.
- Revise the VOC emission limit from 178.1 tons in any 12-consecutive month period to 160.4 tons in any 12-consecutive month period.
- Record keeping is clarified to be for the combined usage of material in the application stations.
- The source is no longer de minimis (that is, minor) and has undergone a RACT determination resulting in a limit of 6.8 tons in any 12-consecutive month period and monitoring of dissolved oxygen uptake rate every weekday (Monday through Friday).
- Delete phrase "equally distributed between 2 venturi sections."

Code §§ 77.121—77.123 and 86.31—34.

Written comments or objections related to a mining permit application should contain the name, address and telephone number of persons submitting comments or objections; application number; and a statement of sufficient detail to inform the Department on the basis of comment or objection and relevant facts upon which it is based

Requests for an informal conference, or a public hearing, as applicable, on a mining permit application, as provided by 25 Pa. Code §§ 77.123 or 86.34, must contain the name, address and telephone number of the requestor; the application number; a brief summary of the issues to be raised by the requestor at the conference; and a statement whether the requestor desires to have the conference conducted in the locality of the proposed mining activities.

Where a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) number is listed, the mining activity permit application was accompanied by an application for an individual NPDES permit. The Department has made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the mining activity permit, but the issuance of the NPDES permit is contingent upon the approval of the associated mining activity permit.

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that do not exceed the technology-based effluent limitations. The proposed limits are listed in Table 1.

For noncoal mining activities, the proposed limits are found in Table 2. Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description below specifies the parameters. The limits will be in the ranges specified in Table 1.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume, or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur, will be incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 362-0600-001, NPDES Program Implementation—Memorandum of Understanding Concerning Water Quality Management, NPDES Program Implementation and Related Matters. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs).

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES permit application should submit a statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated previously each application within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests or petitions for a public hearing on NPDES permit applications, as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92.61. The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30 days of this public notice and shall contain the name, address, telephone number and the interest of the party filing the request, and shall state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30 days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. Request for Comment and Notice of Public Meeting for the Proposed Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) for the Duck Run Watershed in Lawrence County

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is holding a public meeting to discuss and accept comments on a proposed TMDL for the Duck Run Watershed in Lawrence County. The meeting will be held on November 10, 2008, beginning at 11 a.m. at the Knox District Office in Knox, PA. The proposed TMDL was developed in accordance with the requirements of The Clean Water Act, section 303(d). One stream segment in the Duck Run Watershed has been identified as impaired on the 1996, 1998, 2002, 2004, 2006 and 2008, Pennsylvania section 303(d) lists due to high concentrations of metals. The listed segment and miles degraded are shown in the following table:

Stream Code Stream Name Miles Degraded 34028 Duck Run 4.5 The proposed plan provides calculations of the stream's total capacity to accept metals (aluminum, iron, manganese and acidity), pH and maintain levels below water quality criteria. The applicable water quality criteria are as follows:

The primary pollutant source for the watershed is abandoned mine workings. This watershed was heavily mined for coal in the late 19th century and mining continues on a smaller scale today. The effects of this are still present. The TMDL consists of load allocations, which are made to nonpoint sources of pollution and waste load allocations which are established for permitted point sources.

The TMDL was developed using Monte Carlo Simulation to determine long-term average concentrations that each stream segment could accept and still meet water quality criteria 99% of the time. Monte Carlo Simulation allows for the expansion of a data set based on its statistical makeup. Since there was no critical flow condition where criteria were exceeded, the Department used the average flow to express the loading values in the TMDI

The TMDL sets allowable loading rates for metals and acidity at specified points in the watershed. The basis of information used in the establishment of this TMDL is field data collected over a 10 year period.

The data and all supporting information used to develop the proposed TMDL are available from the Department. Written comments will be accepted at the previous address and must be postmarked by December 31, 2008. Persons who plan to make a presentation at the public meeting should notify the Department no later than 4 p.m., Friday, November 7, 2008. The Department will consider all comments in developing the final TMDL, which will be submitted to the Environmental Protection Agency for approval.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEARING BOARD

Orion Power Midwest, LP v. DEP; EHB Doc. No. 2007-214-R

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) and Orion Power Midwest, LP (Orion) have agreed to a settlement.

The major provisions of which provide for the publication of a draft of Amendment No. 1 to National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permit PA 001627 (NPDES Permit). As set forth in the settlement, Orion has agreed not to appeal from the final issuance of Amendment No. 1 to the NPDES Permit.

Orion operates a coal-fired steam electric generating plant located in Springdale Borough, Allegheny County, commonly known as the "Cheswick Power Station." On August 9, 2007, the Department issued an NPDES Permit to Orion authorizing the company to discharge stormwater and wastewater from several outfalls into the Allegheny River, Little Deer Creek and an unnamed tributary to Little Deer Creek. Specifically, Outfall 002 is the designation for the treated discharge from the Monarch Mine Dewatering Plan to Little Deer Creek. Outfall 003 is the designation for the treated discharge of wastewater from the Cheswick Power Station to the Allegheny River. Outfalls 203-603 are the designations for various discharges from internal processes and sources for eventual discharge from Outfall 003. Outfall 005 is the designation of the discharge of uncontaminated stormwater runoff from around the Monarch Mine Dewatering Plant to Little Deer Creek.

The draft of Amendment No. 1 to the NPDES Permit deletes and modifies certain effluent limitations at Outfalls 002, 003 and 005 where additional data has been supplied to the Department and evaluated. Effluent limitations for certain parameters at Outfall 503, the internal monitoring point for the discharge from the flue gas desulphurization treatment plant, have been modified. Additional monitoring requirements were imposed at Outfall 503. Also, measurement frequencies were modified for certain parameters at Outfalls 002, 203, 303 and 603.

Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board Regulation #54-65 (IRRC #2714)

Promotion of Sale of Liquor by Vendors

October 22, 2008

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the August 23, 2008 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board (Board) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. General Comments.—Implementation procedures; Clarity.

The type of product to which the regulation applies

The Preamble states that the purpose of this proposed regulation is to facilitate the Board's access to *fine wines* that a vendor might otherwise reserve for special orders only. However, the regulation applies to "*liquor*," which includes wine but is a substantially broader category. The Board should clarify the category to which the regulation applies: fine wines, liquor, or both.

The process for sale and purchase of luxury items

While the proposed regulation defines "luxury items," it does not explain the process for their sale. For example, in the Preamble, the Board says that individual consumers will benefit from being able to purchase luxury items from a state store. However, Chapter 13, Subchapter B applies to "promotion of sale *by vendors.*" (Emphasis added.) Section 13.73 (d) allows vendors to "obtain" orders of luxury goods from licensees and "other persons," but it does not specify how private citizens will be able to access luxury items. Section 13.79(e) states that "licensed vendors and their agents shall place luxury item orders for liquor at State Liquor Stores." How does this sentence reflect the statement in the Preamble that vendors can process orders from *both the Board and from licensees or other persons*? (Emphasis added.)

A public commentator even questioned whether luxury items can still be ordered and shipped directly from the vendor/agent or whether they must be ordered at the state store.

Given these clarity concerns, the final-form regulation needs to clearly specify who is permitted to sell and buy luxury items and the sale and purchase process.

2. Section 13.71. Definitions.—Clarity.

Stock merchandise

The proposed regulation defines this term as liquors available from a liquor store without placing a special liquor orders (SLO) "and which have not been designated as luxury items." (Emphasis added.) Are SLOs and luxury items two completely different things or are luxury items a sub-category of SLOs? Can a luxury item also be stock merchandise? If a luxury item can be stock merchandise as well as a sub-category of SLOs, then how does this reflect the existing language in Section 13.76(a) which states that "[i]t is the intent of this section that vendors shall not compete on special order with items sold to the Board as stock merchandise?"

The final-form regulation should clarify the difference between stock merchandise, SLOs and luxury items.

3. Section 13.73. Privileges of vendors' agents.—Clarity.

Subsection (d) refers to "other persons" from whom agents may solicit orders. While the term "other persons" is used throughout the existing regulation, it is not defined. To improve clarity, the final-form regulation should include a definition for this term.

4. Section 13.79. Special orders and luxury item orders; restrictions.—Implementation procedures.

Subsection (g) refers to the release of "liquor sold to licensees." However, this subsection does not mention how liquor sold to "other persons," as mentioned in Section 13.73(d), would be released. The final-form regulation should clarify this issue.

Department of State Regulation #16-42 (IRRC #2716)

Alteration of Local Election Districts

October 22, 2008

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the August 23, 2008 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Department of State (Department) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

Section 191.1 Definitions.—Clarity.

We have two concerns with the definition of "Report."

First, this definition contains the term "report." However, Section 1.7(e) of the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin Style Manual* (*Style Manual*) states "The term being defined may not be included as part of the definition." Therefore, the Department should remove the term "report" from the definition.

Second, Subsections (1) through (4) under this definition contain requirements for the content of the report. Section 1.7(c) of the *Style Manual* does not permit the inclusion of substantive language in a definition. To give the regulated community clear direction, these provisions should be moved to another section of the regulation.

Section 191.2. Procedures for implementing alteration of local election districts.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) requires the county board of elections to submit a report to the bureau. The final-form regulation should clarify if written or electronic, or both formats, are acceptable to the bureau.

Subsection (b) contains the following phrase: "... may not be implemented until the *next following* primary or election." (Emphasis added). The bolded phrase is not clear. It appears that the word "following" could be deleted. We recommend the Department clarify this provision in the final-form regulation.
