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

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### READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

#### Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

## Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

#### Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

#### Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

#### **How to Find Documents**

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state. pa.us.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

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#### **Printing Format**

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [ ] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

#### **Fiscal Notes**

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

#### Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

TITLE 201. RULES OF JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION

CHAPTER 19. MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

#### **CONSTABLES**

#### Rule 1907.1. Definitions.

"Constable." Includes any elected or appointed constable or deputy constable engaged to perform services for any court of the unified judicial system.

*Official Note:* For the statutorily prescribed services constables perform for the unified judicial system, *see*, *e.g.*, 44 Pa.C.S. §§ 7161 and 7161.1.

## Rule 1907.2. Policies, procedures and standards of conduct.

- (a) The Court Administrator shall establish uniform policies, procedures and standards of conduct for constables who perform services for the courts. These policies, procedures and standards of conduct shall be mandatory for all judicial districts and constables engaged to perform services for any court of the unified judicial system.
- (b) The president judge of a judicial district is authorized to enact policies and procedures consistent with those established by the Court Administrator in section (a) as local rules pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. No. 103(c). Any policies and procedures enacted by the president judge of a judicial district that may deviate from the uniform policies, procedures and standards of conduct for constables established by the Court Administrator must be approved by the Court Administrator before promulgation. See Pa.R.J.A. No. 505(1).
- (c) President Judges are responsible for implementing the provisions set forth in this rule within their respective judicial districts.

#### Comment

Constables are independent contractors, belonging analytically to the executive branch of government. *In re Act* 147 of 1990, 528 Pa. 460, 598 A.2d 985 (1991). Constables

are defined as "related staff" under the Judicial Code. Rosenwald v. Barbieri, 501 Pa. 563, 462 A.2d 644 (1983). While these Rules are established pursuant to Pa. Const. Art. V, § 10(c), nothing herein, or in any document created under these Rules, shall be construed to alter the status of constables as independent contractors and related staff.

CHAPTER 11. APPEALS FROM COMMONWEALTH COURT AND SUPERIOR COURT

#### PETITION FOR ALLOWANCE OF APPEAL

Rule 1114. [Considerations] Standards Governing Allowance of Appeal.

- (a) General Rule. Except as prescribed in [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 1101 (appeals as of right from the Commonwealth Court), review of a final order of the Superior Court or the Commonwealth Court is not a matter of right, but of sound judicial discretion, and an appeal will be allowed only when there are special and important reasons therefor.
- (b) Standards. A petition for allowance of appeal may be granted for any of the following reasons:

- (1) the holding of the intermediate appellate court conflicts with another intermediate appellate court opinion;
- (2) the holding of the intermediate appellate court conflicts with a holding of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court or the United States Supreme Court on the same legal question;
- (3) the question presented is one of first impression;
- (4) the question presented is one of such substantial public importance as to require prompt and definitive resolution by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court:
- (5) the issue involves the constitutionality of a statute of the Commonwealth;
- (6) the intermediate appellate court has so far departed from accepted judicial practices or so abused its discretion as to call for the exercise of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court's supervisory authority; or
- (7) the intermediate appellate court has erroneously entered an order quashing or dismissing an appeal.

Official Note: [Based in part on U.S. Supreme Court Rule 10. The following, while neither controlling nor fully measuring the discretion of the Supreme Court, indicate the character of the reasons which will be considered:

- (1) the holding of the intermediate appellate court conflicts with another intermediate appellate court opinion;
- (2) the holding of the intermediate appellate court conflicts with a holding of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court or the United States Supreme Court on the same legal question;
- (3) the question presented is one of first impression;
- (4) the question presented is of such substantial public importance as to require prompt and definitive resolution by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court;
- (5) the issue involves the constitutionality of a statute of this Commonwealth;
- (6) the intermediate appellate court has so far departed from accepted judicial practices or so abused its discretion as to call for the exercise of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court's supervisory authority; or
- (7) an intermediate appellate court has erroneously entered an order quashing or dismissing an appeal.

Prior to the 2011 amendment to the Official Note to this Rule, the procedural mechanism to seek the Pennsylvania Supreme Court's review of an intermediate appellate court order quashing or dismissing an appeal was by petition for review. See Vaccone v. Syken, 587 Pa. 380, 382 n.2, 899 A.2d 1103, 1104 n.2 (2006). The current amendments now provide that such appeals should be pursued by the petition for allowance of appeal process. The 2011 amendment adds Reason (7) to the Official Note,

which provides a basis for seeking review of intermediate appellate court quashals and dismissals through the Chapter 11 petition for allowance of appeal procedure, rather than the Chapter 15 petition for review procedure.

The petition for allowance of appeal is synonymous with a petition for allocatur.

Pa.R.A.P. 1114(b)(7) supersedes the practice described in *Vaccone v. Syken*, 587 Pa. 380, 384 n.2, 899 A.2d 1103, 1106 n.2 (2006).

#### CHAPTER 17. EFFECT OF APPEALS; SUPERSEDEAS AND STAYS

#### IN GENERAL

Rule 1702. Stay Ancillary to Appeal.

\* \* \* \* \*

- (c) Supreme Court review of appellate court supersedeas and stay determinations.—No appeal, petition for allowance of appeal or petition for review need be filed in the Supreme Court in connection with a reapplication under Rule 3315 (review of stay orders of appellate courts).
- [ (d) Stay of execution.—When a trial court enters an order granting or denying a stay of execution in a capital case, such order may be reviewed by the Supreme Court upon application pursuant to Rule 123. No appeal or petition for review need be filed in connection with an application for review of a stay order in a capital case.]

Official Note: Based on former Superior Court Rule 53 and Commonwealth Court Rule 112A, which required the taking of an appeal prior to an application for supersedeas or other interlocutory order. Subdivision (b) is new and is added in recognition of the fact that the drafting of a petition for allowance of appeal or a petition for permission to appeal in the form required by these rules may not be possible prior to the time when an application for supersedeas may have to be made in the appellate court in order to avoid substantial harm.

(*Editor's Note*: The following rule is new and printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

## Rule 1704. Application in a Capital Case for a Stay of Execution or for Review of an Order Granting or Denying a Stay of Execution.

Prior notice of the intent to file an application in a capital case for a stay or review of an order granting or denying a stay of execution shall be provided to the Prothonotary of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, if prior notice is practicable.

The application for stay or review shall set forth the following:

- 1. The date the warrant issued; the date and nature of the order that prompted the issuance of the warrant; and the date the execution is scheduled, if a date has been set:
- 2. Whether any direct or collateral challenges to the underlying conviction are pending, and, if so, in what court(s) or tribunal(s);
- 3. Whether any other applications for a stay of the pending execution have been filed, and, if so, in what court(s) or tribunal(s), when, and the status of the application(s);

- 4. The grounds for relief and the showing made to the trial court of entitlement to a stay under 42 Pa.C.S. § 9545(c), if applicable;
- 5. A statement certifying that emergency action is required and setting forth a description of the emergency.

All dockets, pleadings, and orders that are referred to in 1—5 above must be attached to the application. If any of the information provided in the application changes while the motion is pending, the party seeking the stay or review must file with the Pennsylvania Supreme Court written notice of the change within 24 hours.

No notice of appeal or petition for review needs to be filed in order to file an application under this rule.

#### ARTICLE III. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS CHAPTER 33. BUSINESS OF THE SUPREME COURT

#### SUPERSEDEAS AND STAYS

## Rule 3316. Review of Stay of Execution Orders in Capital Cases.

[ Wen ] When a trial court has entered an order granting or denying a stay of execution in a capital case, such order may be reviewed by the Supreme Court in the manner prescribed in [ Rule 1702(d) ] Pa.R.A.P. 1704.

## PETITIONS FOR CERTIFICATION OF QUESTIONS OF PENNSYLVANIA LAW

## Rule 3341. Petitions for Certification of Questions of Pennsylvania Law.

- (a) General Rule.—On the motion of a party or sua sponte, any of the following courts may file a petition for certification with the Prothonotary of the Supreme Court:
  - (1) The United States Supreme Court; or
  - (2) Any United States Court of Appeals.
- (b) Content of the Petition for Certification.—A petition for certification need not be set forth in numbered paragraphs in the manner of a pleading, and shall contain the following (which shall, insofar as practicable, be set forth in the order stated):
- (1) A brief statement of the nature and stage of the proceedings in the petitioning court;
  - (2) A brief statement of the material facts of the case;
- (3) A statement of the question or questions of Pennsylvania law to be determined;
- (4) A statement of the particular reasons why the Supreme Court should accept certification; and
- (5) A recommendation about which party should be designated Appellant and which Appellee in subsequent pleadings filed with the Supreme Court.

There shall be appended to the petition for certification copies of any papers filed by the parties regarding certification, e.g., a motion for certification, a response thereto, a stipulation of facts, etc.

(c) Standards.—The Supreme Court shall not accept certification unless all facts material to the question of law to be determined are undisputed, and the question of

law is one that the petitioning court has not previously decided. The Supreme Court may accept certification of a question of Pennsylvania law only where there are special and important reasons therefor, including, but not limited to, any of the following:

- (1) The question of law is one of first impression and is of such substantial public importance as to require prompt and definitive resolution by the Supreme Court;
- (2) The question of law is one with respect to which there are conflicting decisions in other courts; or
- (3) The question of law concerns an unsettled issue of the constitutionality, construction, or application of a statute of this Commonwealth.

### CHAPTER 37. BUSINESS OF THE COMMONWEALTH COURT

#### THE COMMONWEALTH COURT

#### Rule 3702. Office of the Prothonotary.

All business of the Commonwealth Court, except as otherwise provided by law, by these rules or by order of court, shall be administered through the [principal] Office of the [Prothonotary] Chief Clerk maintained by the court at the seat of government in the City of Harrisburg. All matters within the jurisdiction of the court may be filed in the [principal] Office of the [Prothonotary or in the filing office of the court maintained in the City of Philadelphia for transmission to the principal Office of the Prothonotary] Chief Clerk. Writs or other process issuing out of the court shall exit [only from the principal Office of the Prothonotary] from the Office of the Chief Clerk and shall be returnable there.

#### ORIGINAL MATTERS

#### Rule 3709. Designation of Legal Aid Sources.

Whenever a matter not subject to Chapter 15 (judicial review of governmental determinations) is brought before the Commonwealth Court within its original jurisdiction, the following names and related information shall be included in the notice to defend set forth in the complaint pursuant to **[ Pa.R.Civ.P. ] Pa.R.C.P.** No. 1018.1:

#### LISTING OF CASES FOR ARGUMENT

Rule 3712. [ Manner ] Method of Listing of Cases.

Subject to the time limitations and conditions of **[Rule] Pa.R.A.P.** 3713 (argument *en banc* or before a panel) where applicable:

- (1) Each appeal from a court of common pleas, each other matter which under the applicable law is required to be determined by the court upon the record before the government unit below, and each matter subject to [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 1542 (oral argument and evidentiary hearing) in which no order for an evidentiary hearing has been entered, shall be listed for argument by the [Prothonotary] Chief Clerk on a specified date, of which notice shall be given by the [Prothonotary] Chief Clerk to the parties.
- (2) An election case shall be argued before the **[judge] judges** to whom it is assigned immediately after the record is closed and briefs shall be submitted to the court at or before argument as directed.
- (3) An appeal or petition for review (except a matter subject to Paragraphs (1) or (2) of this rule) which under the applicable law may be determined in whole or in part upon the record made before the court, shall be listed for argument by the [Prothonotary] Chief Clerk on a specified date upon order of the judge to whom the case was assigned or upon praecipe of either party certifying that it is at issue for argument, and notice shall be given by the [Prothonotary] Chief Clerk to the parties of the date fixed.
- (4) A matter, except a matter subject to **[Rule] Pa.R.A.P.** 1542, commenced in the court within its original jurisdiction when at issue for argument on preliminary matters or after the record has been made shall be listed by the **[Prothonotary] Chief Clerk** for argument upon the order of the President Judge or the judge before whom the record has been made.

#### Rule 3714. Listing of Cases and Briefing Schedules.

(a) Matters heard solely on certified record. An appeal from a court of common pleas and each other matter which under the applicable law is required to be determined by the court upon the record before the government unit below shall be eligible for listing for argument after the record has been filed. When all briefs and reproduced records have been filed, the [ Prothonotary ] Chief Clerk shall list the case for oral argument on a specified date and shall give at least ten days written

notice by first class mail to all parties of the date scheduled for the argument. The Court may direct any matter to be submitted on briefs without oral argument.

(b) Original jurisdiction matters. A matter commenced in whole or in part within the original jurisdiction of the court including matters under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 1571 (determinations of the Board of Finance and Revenue) when at issue for argument on preliminary matters or after the record has been made shall be listed for oral argument [ on a specified date with at least 70 days written notice of that date to all parties. In every such case, not more than 30 days after the date of such notice, the moving party shall file 15 copies of his brief with the Prothonotary, and shall concurrently serve upon the responding party one copy of his brief. The responding party, not more than 60 days after the date of such notice, shall file 15 copies of his brief with the Prothonotary, and shall concurrently serve upon the moving party one copy of his brief] after the court establishes a briefing schedule.

#### Rule 3715. Distribution of Briefs.

The [Prothonotary] Chief Clerk shall distribute to each judge who is to hear an argument, whether *en banc* or before a panel, at least five days before the argument date, copies of all briefs and reproduced records [which] that have been filed by the parties.

### COSTS

#### Rule 3751. Taxation of Costs.

A party who desires costs to be taxed under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 2762(b) (procedure for collection of costs on appeal) shall state them in an itemized and verified bill of costs which such party shall file with the [Prothonotary] Chief Clerk within 14 days after entry of the judgment or other final order.

#### ENFORCEMENT PROCEEDINGS

Rule 3761. Enforcement Proceedings.

\* \* \* \* \*

(c) Hearing and Notice. Upon the filing of a petition to enforce, the court will issue an order setting a date for a hearing and a date by which the respondent must answer the petition. The petitioner shall serve the court's order upon the respondent in the manner prescribed by [Rules] Pa.R.A.P. 121 and 122.

\* \* \* \* \*

Official Note: [Rule 3761 (relating to enforcement proceedings) has been promulgated by the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania pursuant to authority granted to it by Pa.R.A.P. 104. The rule was made necessary by the opinion issued by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania in Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission v. School District of Philadelphia, 732 A.2d 578 (Pa. 1999), in which the Court held that the "rules of appellate procedure, rather than the rules of civil procedure, govern enforcement proceedings in Commonwealth Court.

Prior to the Supreme Court ruling in PHRC, Commonwealth Court had treated enforcement proTHE COURTS 3227

ceedings as matters resting within the Court's original jurisdiction and thereby governed in part by the rules of Appellate Procedure and in part by the Rules of Civil Procedure. In *PHRC*, the Supreme Court made clear that enforcement proceedings are within Commonwealth Court's appellate jurisdiction and that only the Rules of Appellate Procedure apply. The Supreme Court's ruling left a void, however, because the Rules of Appellate Procedure did not prescribe specific procedures governing enforcement proceedings.

Consistent with *PHRC*, therefore, Rule 3761 was adopted to establish a Rule of Appellate Procedure to codify the practice which the Commonwealth Court had theretofore followed in enforcement proceedings when those proceedings were regarded as matters within the Court's original jurisdiction. This special rule governing Commonwealth Court practice adheres to the Supreme Court's opinion in *PHRC* and should prove to be of benefit to both the bench and bar. I

Pa.R.A.P. 3761 implements Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission v. School District of Philadelphia, 557 Pa. 126, 132, 732 A.2d 578, 581 (1999), in which the Court held that "just as enforcement proceedings are not originally commenced in Commonwealth Court, they are also in the appellate, rather than the original, jurisdiction of the court. It then follows that the rules of appellate procedure, rather than the rules of civil procedure, govern enforcement proceedings in Commonwealth Court." This analysis was confirmed in Department of Environmental Protection v. Township of Cromwell, 613 Pa. 1, 32 A.3d 639 (2012). Petitions for enforcement are not within any other provisions of the Rules of Appellate Procedure. Thus absent Pa.R.A.P., 3761, there would be no clear method of presenting enforcement actions to the Commonwealth Court.

## TITLE 210. APPELLATE PROCEDURE PART II. INTERNAL OPERATING PROCEDURES

CHAPTER 63. INTERNAL OPERATING PROCEDURES OF THE SUPREME COURT

§ 63.6. [ Allocaturs ] Allowance of Appeal.

A. [Standards. Petitions for allowance of appeal ("allocaturs") may be granted for any of the following reasons:

1. the holding of the intermediate appellate court conflicts with another intermediate appellate court opinion;

- 2. the holding of the intermediate appellate court conflicts with a holding of this Court or the United States Supreme Court on the same legal question;
- 3. the question presented is one of first impression:
- 4. the question presented is one of such substantial public importance as to require prompt and definitive resolution by this Court;
- 5. the issue involves the constitutionality of a statute of this Commonwealth;
- 6. the intermediate appellate court has so far departed from accepted judicial practices or so abused its discretion as to call for the exercise of this Court's supervisory authority; or
- 7. the intermediate appellate court has erroneously entered an order quashing or dismissing an appeal.
- **B.**] Assignment. The Prothonotary shall initially screen [allocatur] petitions for allowance of appeal for compliance with the applicable appellate rules. Untimely petitions may be refused for filing by the Prothonotary without further action of the Court.

Petitions for allowance of appeal shall be assigned to individual Justices by the Prothonotary on a rotating basis by seniority for preparation of an [allocatur] allowance of appeal report. Petitions from the same district presenting the same question shall be consolidated; petitions from different districts that present the same question may be consolidated at the discretion of the Court.

[C.] B. Circulation and Disposition. [Allocatur] Allowance of appeal reports shall be circulated within ninety (90) days of the receipt of such an assignment. The proposed disposition date shall not be greater than sixty (60) days from the date of circulation. Holds may be placed on [allocatur] petitions for allowance of appeal only upon written notice to the members of the Court as to the reasons for the hold, e.g., the existence of another petition from another district presenting the same question. No hold may be placed on a petition without the existence of a terminus, e.g., the issuance of an opinion on a petition presenting the same question. Where a hold results from the existence of another petition presenting the same issue, the parties shall be notified of the hold and the case that will determine the issue. A hold for the purpose of preparing a counter-report shall not exceed thirty (30) days; only by vote of the majority may a hold be extended beyond thirty (30) days, but in no event shall a hold for such purpose exceed ninety (90) days.

Notwithstanding any contrary procedures set forth above, [allocatur] allowance of appeal reports in Children's Fast Track appeals are to be circulated within thirty (30) days of the receipt of the assignment, and the proposed disposition date shall not be greater than thirty (30) days from the date of circulation. A hold for purposes of preparing a counter-report in a Children's Fast Track appeal shall not exceed fifteen (15) days; only by vote of the majority may a hold be extended beyond fifteen (15) days, but in no event shall a hold exceed forty-five (45) days.

Upon the affirmative vote of three or more Justices, [allocatur] allowance of appeal will be granted and the case will be listed for oral argument, unless the order indicates that the matter will be submitted on the briefs. An order granting an [allocatur] petition for allowance of appeal shall specify the issues upon which [allocatur] allowance of appeal was granted.

A per curiam order granting [ allocatur ] allowance of appeal and reversing an order of the lower court must cite to controlling legal authority or provide a full explanation of the reasons for reversal.

A Justice may request that the order resolving the [allocatur] petition for allowance of appeal record that he or she voted for a different disposition. All orders shall indicate if a Justice did not participate in the consideration or decision of the matter.

#### [ D. ] C. Reconsideration Applications.

- 1. Assignment. The Prothonotary shall direct applications for reconsideration to the Justice who authored the allocatur allowance of appeal report.
- 2. Circulation and Disposition. The assigned Justice shall circulate to the Court a recommended disposition within fourteen (14) days of the date of the assignment, or within seven (7) days of the date of assignment in Children's Fast Track appeals. A Justice who disagrees with the recommended disposition shall circulate a counter-recommendation within fourteen (14) days of the

original recommendation, or within seven (7) days of the date of the original recommendation in Children's Fast Track appeals. A vote of the majority is required to grant reconsideration. In any case in which reconsideration has been denied, a Justice may request that the order record that he or she voted to grant reconsideration. All orders shall indicate if a Justice did not participate in the consideration or decision of the matter.

### § 63.7. Motions, Miscellaneous Petitions, and Applications for Relief.

A. Duties of Prothonotary. All assignments of motions, miscellaneous petitions and applications for relief, including emergency motions and those requesting the exercise of King's Bench powers, extraordinary jurisdiction and original jurisdiction, shall originate in the Prothonotary's office. No motions, petitions or applications will be considered which were not first filed in the Prothonotary's office and thence assigned. Documents may be filed in paper format, or by electronic or facsimile transmission. Once received, motions, petitions and applications will be monitored by the Prothonotary's office for compliance with applicable appellate rules. Proposed filings that are not in compliance will not be docketed. Proposed filings that are in compliance will be docketed and a response will be allowed. At the expiration of the response period the documents will be forwarded to the Court.

Procedural motions (e.g., requests for extension of time, requests to exceed page limits, and requests to proceed in forma pauperis) may be resolved by the Prothonotary without further action of the Court.

- E. Applications for Stay of Execution in a Capital Case or for Review of an Order Granting or Denying a Stay of Execution.
- 1. [Contents of application. The applicant shall set forth the procedural history of the case, certify that the matter involves an emergency, and specify any other applications for stay of execution that have been or will be filed, including those in federal courts. The application shall include any

relevant orders and trial court docket entries. Whenever possible, applicants shall give the Prothonotary advance notice of the anticipated filing of an application for a stay of execution.

- **2.** ] *Assignment*. The application [ for stay of execution ] will be assigned to the duty Justice.
- [3.] 2. Circulation and Disposition. The assigned Justice shall promptly circulate a proposed disposition and the application shall be resolved according to the vote of the majority.

#### § 63.8. Certification of Questions of Law.

- A. Court Limitation. This Court will accept Certification Petitions from the United States Supreme Court or any United States Court of Appeals.
- B. [Contents of Certification Petition. A court may file a Certification Petition either on the motion of a party or sua sponte. A Certification Petition shall contain the following:
- 1. A brief statement of the nature and stage of the proceedings in the petitioning court;
- 2. A brief statement of the material facts of the case:
- 3. A statement of the question or questions of Pennsylvania law to be determined;
- 4. A statement of the particular reasons why this Court should accept certification; and
- 5. A recommendation as to which party should be designated as the appellant and which should be designated as the appellee in subsequent pleadings filed with this Court.

The petitioning court shall attach to the Certification Petition copies of any papers filed by the parties regarding certification, e.g., a Motion for Certification, a response thereto and a Stipulation of Facts.

- C. Standards for Acceptance. Acceptance of certification is a matter of judicial discretion. The Court may accept certification of a question of Pennsylvania law only when there are special and important reasons therefore, including, but not limited to, any of the following:
- 1. The question of law is one of first impression and is of such substantial public importance as to require prompt and definitive resolution by this Court;
- 2. The question of law is one with respect to which there are conflicting decisions in other courts; or
- 3. The question of law concerns an unsettled issue of the constitutionality, construction, or application of a statute of this Commonwealth.

The Court shall not accept certification unless all facts material to the question of law to be determined are undisputed, and the question of law is one that the petitioning court has not previously decided.

The Court shall decide whether to accept or decline certification without hearing oral argument.

D.] Assignment, Circulation and Disposition. The Prothonotary shall refer Certification Petitions to the Chief Justice, who will prepare a memorandum setting forth the positions of the parties and a recommended disposition. Acceptance of certification is a matter of judicial discretion. The Court shall decide whether to accept or decline certification without hearing oral argument. The recommendation should be circulated within thirty (30) days from the date of assignment, and should contain a proposed disposition date no greater than thirty (30) days from the date of circulation. Every Certification Petition should be decided within sixty (60) days. A vote of the majority is required to implement the proposed disposition. A Justice may request that the order

record that he or she voted for a different disposition. Orders disposing of Certification Petitions shall indicate if a Justice did not participate in the consideration or decision of the matter.

Upon acceptance of certification by the Court, the Prothonotary shall (1) issue an order accepting certification, which shall specify the questions of law for which certification was accepted, and whether the case is to be submitted on the briefs or heard at an argument session; (2) establish a briefing schedule; (3) list the matter for oral argument if oral argument has been granted; and (4) take such further action as the Court directs.

[E.] C. Amicus curiae briefs. After the Court accepts certification, amicus curiae briefs may be submitted without prior leave of Court. Such briefs shall be filed and served in the manner and within the time directed by the Prothonotary.

#### Local Rule 1301. Scope.

- (1) The following civil actions shall first be submitted to and heard by a Board of Arbitrators:
- (a) Civil actions, proceedings and appeals or issues therein where the demand is for \$35,000 or less (exclusive of interest and costs);
- (b) Replevin without bond and replevin with bond once bond has been set by the Court;

- (c) Appeals from final judgments of Magisterial District Judges; and
- (d) Matters transferred to Compulsory Arbitration by the Court even though the original demand may have exceeded \$35,000.
- (2) The following civil actions are not subject to Compulsory Arbitration as set forth, above:
  - (a) Actions seeking only an accounting;

*Note*: In an action seeking both money damages and an accounting, a Board of Arbitrators may award money damages but may not order an accounting.

(b) Actions seeking only equitable relief; and

*Note*: In an action seeking both money damages and equitable relief, a Board of Arbitrators may award money damages but may not order equitable relief.

- (c) Actions in which the Commonwealth is a party defendant or an employee of the Commonwealth is a party defendant under the provisions of 42 Pa.C.S., Chapter 85B (relating to actions against Commonwealth parties).
- (3) A Board of Arbitrators may not enter an award in favor of any party in excess of \$35,000 (exclusive of interest and costs).

Note: While a Board of Arbitrators may hear a lawsuit in which any party claims an amount in excess of \$35,000, the award of the Board of Arbitrators to any party may not exceed \$35,000 (exclusive of interest and costs). However, with the agreement of all parties, a Board of Arbitrators may award up to the amount agreed upon in excess of \$35,000 if all parties also agree that the arbitration award is final and cannot be appealed to Court.

(4) If a party files a counterclaim or a cross-claim seeking an award in excess of \$35,000 (exclusive of interests and costs), any party may file a petition to transfer the entire case to the General Docket. At the discretion of a judge, such a counterclaim or cross-claim may be severed and transferred to the General Docket.

#### **Title 58—RECREATION**

## FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION [ 58 PA. CODE CH. 65 ]

Fishing; Special Fishing Regulations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65 (relating to special fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this final-form rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). This final-form rulemaking modifies and updates the Commission's fishing regulations.

#### A. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

#### B. Contact Person

#### C. Statutory Authority

The rescission of § 65.10 is published under the statutory authority of section 2102(a) of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

#### D. Purpose and Background

The final-form rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the final-form rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of change.

#### E. Summary of Change

As implemented for the 1995 season, the Early Season Trout Stocked Waters Program (Program) was intended to expand angling opportunities through March on a select group of trout stocked lakes and two tail water areas. Under the Program, approximately 30% of the preseason trout allocation is stocked during the late winter (January or February). During March, fishing is allowed under extended season regulations, which permit the harvest of three trout per day. The season closes at midnight on March 31 and the remainder of the preseason allocation is stocked between April 1 and opening day.

Before the implementation of the Program, most of the waters received preseason stocking in early March. These waters required over 40 truck trips to provide a preseason stocking in the short time period between April 1 and opening day. By eliminating the Program, the distribution trips used to stock these waters in April will be better used to stock other waters that require stocking closer to opening day due to trout residency or water quality issues. Furthermore, trout regulations will be simplified by eliminating one special regulation program. The Com-

mission rescinds § 65.10 to read as set forth in the proposed rulemaking published at 42 Pa.B. 7693 (December 22, 2012).

#### F. Paperwork

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

#### G. Fiscal Impact

The final-form rulemaking will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The final-form rulemaking will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public.

#### H. Public Involvement

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 42 Pa.B. 7693. During the public comment period, the Commission received a total of four comments concerning the proposed rescission, two in favor and two opposed. The Commission received two comments opposing the proposed rescission and one comment supporting it after the formal comment period. Copies of the public comments were provided to the Commissioners.

#### Findings

The Commission finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) A public comment period was provided and the public comments received were considered.
- (3) The adoption of the final-form rulemaking of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

#### Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65, are amended by deleting § 65.10 to read as set forth at 42 Pa.B. 7693.
- (b) The Executive Director will submit this order and 42 Pa.B. 7693 to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality and form as required by law.
- (c) The Executive Director shall certify this order and 42 Pa.B. 7693 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

## FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[ 58 PA. CODE CH. 75 ]

Fishing; Endangered Species

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 75 (relating to endangered species). The Commission is publishing this proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendments modify and update the Commission's endangered and threatened species regulations.

#### A. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

#### C. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments to §§ 75.1 and 75.2 (relating to endangered species; and threatened species) are published under the statutory authority of section 2305 of the code (relating to threatened and endangered species).

#### D. Purpose and Background

The specific purpose and background of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

#### E. Summary of Proposal

The Eastern Spadefoot (Scaphiopus holbrookii) is a small to medium-sized stout-bodied toad (1.7 to 2.2 inches). It is mostly a fossorial (burrowing) creature that comes to the surface to feed during warm, humid conditions. It is known as a sporadic breeder and breeds during major rain storms associated with steep barometric drops. It typically inhabits loose, friable soils where it can use its hind feet for burrowing. In the northeast, Eastern Spadefoot tend to be associated with sandy or loamy soils along the floodplains of streams and rivers and in depressions in agricultural fields (Hulse et al., 2001). These depressions, sometimes quite shallow, may be temporary or permanent and often form ephemeral pools following rains.

The species range from southern New England to the Florida Keys and west to eastern Louisiana, but this Commonwealth forms a break between the New England populations and Maryland (NatureServe, 2010). In this Commonwealth, populations are in the Susquehanna, Delaware and Cumberland Valleys, including occurrences in Adams, Berks, Bucks, Centre, Chester, Clinton, Cumberland, Franklin, Lehigh, Lycoming, Montgomery, Northampton, Northumberland, Union and York Counties.

The Eastern Spadefoot is listed as endangered in Ohio, Connecticut and Rhode Island, threatened in Massachusetts and Species of Concern in Illinois, Indiana and Missouri (Nanjappa and Conrad, 2011). Additionally, NatureServe State rankings list the Eastern Spadefoot as considered "critically imperiled" in Connecticut, Ohio, Rhode Island and West Virginia and "imperiled" in Indiana, Missouri, New York and Massachusetts.

The Eastern Spadefoot was historically distributed in disjunct populations in south-central and central Pennsylvania. Counties of historical occurrence in this Commonwealth include the following (with collection dates): Cumberland (1954); Franklin (1933 and 1937); Northumberland (1938, 1943, and 1985); and Union (1941). The records considered historical were initially documented prior to 1988. Historically documented sites were not considered extirpated until indicated by evidence. Anecdotal observations for the Eastern Spadefoot were recorded in the Delaware Valley from the Philadelphia region north to Monroe County.

More recently, the Eastern Spadefoot was collected in York County in 1989, Berks County in 2003 and Lehigh County in 2003. The Eastern Spadefoot was listed as endangered by the Commission in 2005 due to the absence of observations during the first Pennsylvania Herp Atlas (1995-2001) and only two known breeding areas occur in this Commonwealth. In an attempt to understand the species, a major study investigating the distribution of the Eastern Spadefoot was conducted by East Stroudsburg University and funded by the Commission from 2008-2011. The Eastern Spadefoot was recorded in a total of 15 counties by the study in highly fragmented population centers. The following recent occurrence summary is derived from this work. It is important to note that these sites have been inhabited by the Eastern Spadefoot for an unknown period of time and do not constitute an active expansion of the range of this species but rather an expansion of the knowledge of the distribution. The current distribution of the Eastern Spadefoot in this Commonwealth is likely a relic of what was formerly a much wider range in this Commonwealth evidenced by the highly fragmented manner in which clusters or known sites occur. The following table relates the estimated area of occupancy (actual occupied habitats) in the 15-county Pennsylvania range.

The Eastern Spadefoot occurs in broad valleys and the Atlantic Coastal Plain and is threatened by habitat destruction from residential and industrial development. Many known locations exist in areas that receive substantial pressure from these development practices. Habitat alteration and changes in water chemistry from agricultural practices can also impact breeding habitat (Jansen et al., 2001; Wildlife in Connecticut, 1999). The water in which they breed can be temporary pools, which are not necessarily delineated wetlands; thus, wetland regulations cannot be relied upon to provide sufficient protection for the breeding habitat of this species. The level of fragmentation of Eastern Spadefoot habitats is significant both on an individual population level and on a metapopulation level.

Only 12 known breeding sites (8% of 148) have some level of protection: Centre County, 2; Cumberland County, 4; Franklin County, 4; and Berks County, 2. It is important to note that only 2 of 12 (±17%) of protected sites have adequate upland buffers receiving protection. Only 1% of Eastern Spadefoot sites in this Commonwealth can be considered secure from a direct development threat, though other threats (such as drought, disease, poaching or isolation due to fragmentation) may leave these sites vulnerable. Pennsylvania Eastern Spadefoot occur in landscapes heavily disturbed by either urbanization or some types of intensive agriculture (row crops are seemingly compatible as long as breeding pools are not drained). Unfortunately, agricultural easements, a potentially important tool in Eastern Spadefoot conservation, do not factor biological resources.

The Amphibian and Reptile Technical Committee of the Pennsylvania Biological Survey (PABS) reviewed the Heritage rank of the Eastern Spadefoot and recommended it be changed from "critically imperiled" (S1) to "imperiled" (S2) status, rare in this Commonwealth. (State Rank Definitions, 1996). The PABS committee additionally recommended changing the Pennsylvania status to "threatened" based on the supporting data and conclusions of the recent status assessment of the species in this Commonwealth. The PABS definition of a threatened species is a species which was once listed but now cited for delisting (Pennsylvania Biological Survey Suggested Status Definitions, 2005).

After a thorough status assessment was conducted from 2008 to 2011, this species was run through the Commission's amphibian and reptile species documentation and objective listing/delisting criteria and met Threatened Criteria B.1 (Extent of Occurrence is less than 2000

square miles) and B.2 (Area of Occupancy is less than 200 square miles) and three subcriteria under B.2: a) severely fragmented; b) continued decline; and c) extreme in fluctuations.

Enough information is available to make the determination that the Eastern Spadefoot no longer meets Endangered criteria; however, it clearly meets two Threatened species criteria. The Eastern Spadefoot faces considerable threats and is relatively rare in this Commonwealth; therefore, it continues to warrant protection. As two Threatened species criteria have been met, the Commission believes that this justifies removing the Eastern Spadefoot from the Commonwealth's list of Endangered species and adding the Eastern Spadefoot to the list of Threatened species. The Commission therefore proposes to amend §§ 75.1 and 75.2 to read as set forth in Annex A.

#### [ 58 PA. CODE CH. 63 ] Fishing; General Fishing Regulations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 63 (relating to general fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendments modify and update the Commission's fishing regulations.

#### A. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon final-form publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

The proposed amendment to § 63.50 (relating to importation of tautog) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102(c) of the code (relating to rules and regulations). Proposed § 63.56 (relating to replacement costs for fish killed) is published under the statutory authority of section 923(c.1) of the code (relating to classification of offenses and penalties).

#### D. Purpose and Background

The proposed rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposals.

#### E. Summary of Proposals

At its July 2007 meeting, the Commission approved a 14-inch minimum size limit on tautog (Tautoga onitis) imported into this Commonwealth. Tautog is a marine fish common on hard bottom from Cape Cod, Massachusetts to Delaware. The Commission promulgated the regulation in 2007 because tautog were being harvested illegally on the Atlantic Coast and being sold in the live fish markets in Philadelphia. The New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife asked the Commission to implement a 14-inch minimum size limit on tautog that are imported into the Commonwealth to address the black market sale of sublegal fish.

Recently, the New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife raised its size limit to 15 inches. Accordingly, that New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife requested that the Commission raise its importation size limit to 15 inches. Coastwide, commercial and recreational size limits are currently either 15 or 16 inches. By raising the Commission's importation size limit to 15 inches rather than 16 inches, the Commission maintains consistency with New Jersey, its closest neighbor to the Atlantic Ocean. A size limit of 16 inches would render it illegal for tautog legally caught in New Jersey with a 15-inch size limit to be imported to the Commonwealth. The Commission therefore proposes that § 63.50 be amended to read as set forth in Annex A.

The act of October 24, 2012 (P. L. 1323, No. 167) amended section 923 of the code to add subsection (c.1). This subsection provides that in addition to other penalties in section 923 of the code, a person convicted of or acknowledging guilt of violating section 2109 or 2110 of the code (relating to serious unlawful take; and taking or possessing by illegal methods) will be assessed the costs incurred by the Commission for the replacement of the species involved in the violation in an amount determined by Commission regulation consistent with the values established by the American Fisheries Society (AFS) or other recognized professional fisheries organization. Replacement costs may only be assessed for violations relating to Federally listed threatened or endangered species and other species of fish designated by the Commission.

When determining the replacement costs for game fish, the Commission consulted guidelines established by AFS, specifically, Southwick, R. I. and A. J. Loftus, ed. (2003). "Investigation and monetary values of fish and freshwater mussel kills." American Fisheries Society Special Publication 30. The Commission updated AFS's 2003 values to 2012 values using the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics CPI Inflation Calculator at http://www.bls.gov/data/inflation\_calculator.htm. Costs were averaged for the various size groups. The Commission has been relying on AFS values for establishing replacement costs in pollution cases for over 20 years.

AFS has not established values for herptiles and, to the Commission's knowledge, no other recognized professional fisheries organization has done so. However, it is standard practice for state resource agencies, including the Commission, to look to the commercial market when determining replacement costs for reptiles and amphibians in pollution and poaching cases. The Commission last updated its list of commercial values for herptiles in 2010 and therefore relied on those market values when establishing their replacement costs. Specifically, the median cost of each species from commercial vendors was identified on the Internet using values for adults to simplify the process. The herptiles selected represent the animals that are most targeted in poaching cases and that have relatively high commercial values. The Commission has been relying on commercial values to establish replacement costs for reptiles and amphibians for the last 15 years.

With regard to Federally listed species, the Commission determined that the bog turtle is the species most targeted in poaching cases. Its replacement cost was determined in the same manner as the other herptiles, that is, by determining its commercial value on the Internet

The Commission proposes that § 63.56 be added to read as set forth in Annex A.

#### F. Paperwork

The proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

#### G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed rulemaking will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. #### D. Purpose and Background

The proposed rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

#### E. Summary of Proposal

In 2007, the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission's Shad and River Herring Technical Committee and American Shad Stock Assessment Subcommittee developed a coastwide stock assessment that indicated that adult American shad stocks in the Delaware River have been declining since 1994. In response, in January 2010, the Commission reduced the daily creel limit of American shad from six to three fish in cooperation and coordination with the other boundary states (New Jersey, New York and Delaware).

The freshwater and marine bureaus of the New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife have jurisdiction over different parts of the river. The Bureau of Freshwater Fisheries has jurisdiction over the waters of the Delaware River upstream of the Commodore Barry Bridge. The Bureau of Marine Fisheries has jurisdiction over waters downstream of this bridge. The Bureau of Freshwater Fisheries adopted the three fish limit in 2010. Although the Bureau of Marine Fisheries also had been working on a three fish creel limit for 2010, marine regulations in New Jersey are approved by both the New Jersey Marine Council and the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection. This prolongs the process for regulatory changes in the marine waters of New Jersey.

To be consistent with New Jersey, the Commission adopted the three fish limit for the Delaware River from the New York/Pennsylvania state line downstream to the Commodore Barry Bridge in 2010. The creel limit remained at six fish in the 2.9-mile section of the river between the bridge and the Pennsylvania/Delaware state line. When the three fish limit was approved by the Commission, the Commission acknowledged that the daily limit would remain at six fish in this section until the

New Jersey Marine Council effectuated a change to three fish. The Commission indicated that it would then seek public comment on an amendment that would reduce the creel limit of the lower section to three fish.

In December 2012, the New Jersey Marine Council and the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection acted to reduce the creel limit of American shad in the marine waters of New Jersey (including the portion of the Delaware River downstream of the Commodore Barry Bridge) from six to three fish. To coordinate the Commonwealth's regulation with New Jersey, the Commission proposes to extend the three fish limit to the entire river, including the 2.9-mile section from the Commodore Barry Bridge downstream to the Pennsylvania/Delaware state line. The Commission therefore proposes that § 61.2 be amended to read as set forth in Annex A.

#### D. Purpose and Background

The proposed rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's property and boating regulations. The specific purpose of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposal. On February 7, 2013, the Boating Advisory Board considered these proposals and recommended that the Commission approve the publication of this proposed rulemaking.

#### E. Summary of Proposals

(1) Effective January 1, 2007, the Commission established a Regional Opening Day of Trout Season Program which allows the Executive Director, with approval of the Commission, to designate waters in certain regions of this

Commonwealth to open for trout fishing beginning the first Saturday after March 28. In 2013, the regional opening day for trout season was March 30 for designated waters in the 18-county southeastern region while the rest of this Commonwealth opened April 13. Recently, the Commission proposed eliminating its Early Season Trout Stocked Waters Program and moved waters in that program to the Approved Trout Waters Open to Year-Round Fishing Program to allow angling to occur from March 1 through the opening day of trout season and increase recreational angling opportunities on these wa-

Section 53.8 permits the overnight mooring of boats at designated mooring areas from April 1 to November 30. This regulation prohibits trout anglers and others using boats from mooring their boats on Commission property for the early regional opening day of trout season or to take advantage of the year-round fishing designation during winter and early spring.

The Commission proposes that § 53.8 be amended to allow for mooring of boats on Commission property at the beginning of March to increase fishing and boating opportunities and encourage greater participation in the two regulatory fishing programs. The Commission proposes that § 53.8 be amended to read as set forth in Annex A.

(2) In accordance with § 101.6(a), Commission officers conduct an investigation when a recreational boating accident occurs involving loss of life, disappearance, medical treatment given beyond first aid or in other circumstances the Commission deems appropriate. A boating accident investigation report is completed for each boating accident investigated and is submitted by the Bureau of Law Enforcement to the Boating Accident Review Officer within the Bureau of Boating and Outreach.

Written reports are required to be submitted by operators or owners involved in recreational boating accidents when one or more of the following conditions exist: a person dies; a person is injured and requires medical treatment beyond first aid; damage to the vessels and other property totals \$2,000 or more or there is complete loss of a vessel; or a person disappears from the boat under circumstances that indicate death or injury is likely. Owner/operator-submitted accident reports are submitted on Form PFBC 260 directly to the Boating Accident Review Officer and are for statistical purposes only. These reports are for the information of the Commission, maintained as confidential and not releasable to the Section 101.6(b) currently states that Commission personnel will complete a boating accident investigation report without referring to the boating accident report (PFBC 260) submitted by the owner or operator of the boat. However, there are limited occasions when an investigating officer may need to reference information in the operator-submitted form (PFBC 260). These limited references by the officer are meant to assist with the completion of the investigation, not to supplant a step in the investigation process or supplement information gained in the investigative process. The Commission proposes to delete § 101.6(b) to read as set forth in Annex A.

(3) The act of November 1, 2012 (P. L. 1716, No. 211) (Act 211) updated the code. In particular, section 5507 of the code (relating to duties of operators involved in boating accidents) was added to be consistent with requirements and penalties for operators involved in motor vehicle accidents in 75 Pa.C.S. (relating to Vehicle Code).

Section 101.8 currently details the duties of operators involved in boating accidents. A violation of this section is a summary of the second degree. Act 211 increased the grading of the violation to a misdemeanor of the first degree and if a victim of an accident dies the violator commits a felony of the third degree. Since the duties detailed in § 101.8 are now law, and to bring the penalties in the Commission's regulations into conformance, the Commission proposes that § 101.8 be deleted in its entirety.

(4) In 2009, the Commission amended its regulations to prohibit passengers from riding outside the normal passenger carrying area of pontoon boats when the boat is travelling at any speed. Tragic boat accidents proved that riding outside of the passenger carrying area on a pontoon boat at any speed was an unsafe practice because the passenger can very easily fall overboard and will most likely be struck by the boat's propeller.

Waterways conservation officers encounter as many, if not more, boats travelling at high speeds with persons, most frequently children, riding on closed bow decking with ornamental railings or railings intended for use during docking, mooring or rafting. These railings are not intended to protect a passenger from falling overboard; however, there are not regulations to prohibit passengers from riding in this area of the boat at high speeds. Although, fortunately, the Commission has not had to investigate accidents of this nature, the Commission intends to take a proactive approach to prohibiting this activity before a tragedy occurs. In an effort to simplify and clarify unacceptable boating practices, the Commission proposes to amend § 105.3 to read as set forth in Annex A.

#### F. Paperwork

The proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

#### G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed rulemaking will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions and will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public.

#### TITLE 58. RECREATION

#### PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION Subpart A. GENERAL PROVISIONS CHAPTER 53. COMMISSION PROPERTY

§ 53.8. Boats.

\* \* \* \* \*

(b) Overnight mooring of boats is permitted at designated mooring areas from [April 1] March 1 to November 30. A boat utilizing mooring areas shall be registered and display the official registration number and current validation stickers described under Subpart C (relating to boating) and Part III of the code (relating to boats and boating). The mooring is at the sole risk of the owner.

#### Subpart C. BOATING CHAPTER 101. BOATING ACCIDENTS

- § 101.6. Investigation reports by Commission officers.
- (b) [ A boating accident investigation report will be completed without referring to the boating accident report submitted by the owner or operator of the boat.
- (c) I Under section 324 of the code (relating to Commission records), boating accident investigation reports are not considered public records and they will not be released except for the following:

§ 101.8. [ Duties of operators involved in boating accidents ] (Reserved).

- [ (a) General rule. The operator of a watercraft involved in an accident shall immediately stop the watercraft at the scene of the accident or as close thereto as possible. Every stop shall be made without obstructing the safe navigation of other watercraft more than is necessary.
- (b) Duty to give information. The operator of a watercraft involved in an accident resulting in injury to or death of a person or damage to property shall give his name, address and the registration number of his watercraft to:
  - (1) An officer authorized to enforce this title.

- (2) The operator or occupants of any other watercraft involved in the accident.
- (3) A person who owns or is in control of any property damaged in the accident.
- (c) Duty to render aid. The operator of a watercraft involved in an accident involving injury or death shall render reasonable assistance to a person injured in the accident if the operator can reasonably do so without endangering persons or property.
- (d) Duty to remain at or near scene. The operator of a watercraft involved in a watercraft accident involving injury to or death of a person other than the operator or a passenger of the operator's watercraft or damage to property other than the operator's watercraft or other property contained therein shall remain at or near the scene of the accident until he has fulfilled the duties described in subsection (b) if the operator can reasonably do so without obstructing navigation of other watercraft or endangering persons or property. When circumstances make it clearly impractical to remain at or near the scene of the accident on the water, the operator may fulfill the requirements of this subsection by going to shore at a location near the scene of the accident.
- (e) *Purpose*. This section is designated as a regulation for the protection of the health and safety of persons under section 5123(a)(1) of the Code (relating to general boating regulations).

#### CHAPTER 105. OPERATIONAL CONDITIONS

§ 105.3. Unacceptable boating practices.

It is unlawful to:

(1) Operate a motorboat [not equipped with railings or other safeguards] at greater than [a] slow, no wake speed with a person riding outside the passenger carrying area or while a person is riding on bow decking, gunwales, transom or motor cover. It is not a violation of this paragraph to ride on the motor cover of an inboard motorboat while underway at that speed if the motor cover is designed by the manufacturer for the operator or a passenger to ride on it. For the purposes of this paragraph, the passenger carrying area is defined as the space intended by the manufacturer for persons to sit or stand while the boat is underway. This prohibition does not apply when the operator of the boat is docking, mooring, anchoring or rafting the boat.

\* \* \* \* \*

(9) Operate a pontoon boat while a person is riding outside the passenger carrying area. [The] For the purposes of this paragraph, the passenger carrying area is defined by continuous railings or enclosed spaces intended for persons to use while the pontoon boat is underway. This prohibition does not apply when the operator of the boat is docking, mooring, anchoring or rafting the pontoon boat.

#### Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of July 2013

The Department of Banking and Securities (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of July, 2013, is 5%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. No. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and

which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 2.59 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 5.09 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 5%.

## LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995 PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.907)

Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. The appeal should be sent to the Environmental Hearing Board, Second Floor, Rachel Carson State Office Building, 400 Market Street, PO Box 8457, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8457, (717) 787-3483. TDD users may contact the Board through the Pennsylvania Relay Service, (800) 654-5984. Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30 days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. Copies of the appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure may be obtained from the Board. The appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure are also available in Braille or on audiotape from the Secretary to the Board at (717) 787-3483. This paragraph does not, in and of itself, create a right of appeal beyond that permitted by applicable statutes and decisional law.

#### MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

In addition, the Department imposes a technology-based aluminum limit of 2.0 mg/l (30 day average) to protect stream uses.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The BAT limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 40 CFR Part 436 and 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are as follows:

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 362-0600-001, NPDES Program Implementation—Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Concerning Water Quality Management, NPDES Program Implementation, and Related Matters. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests or petitions for a public hearing on NPDES permit applications, as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92a.82(d). The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30 days of this public notice and contain the name, address, telephone number and the interest of the party filing the request, and state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. A public hearing may be held if the Department considers the public interest significant. If a hearing is

## State-Operated Psychiatric Hospitals and Facilities

The Department of Public Welfare (Department) is announcing its intent to provide definition and clarification to the Medical Assistance (MA) cost reimbursement methodology for payments to State-operated psychiatric hospitals and facilities.

## Background

Currently, all State-operated psychiatric hospitals and facilities participating in the MA Program use the direct method of cost finding. Allowable costs and the result of the cost finding process are reported electronically on the Medicaid Cost Apportionment Report (Report) on a yearly basis. The Report is prepared using the cash basis of accounting and provides a detailed listing of direct charge items and, when applicable, distributes shared costs to various levels of care.

In conjunction with the Report, all State-operated psychiatric hospitals and facilities prepare a Building Utilization Report each year. The Building Utilization Report categorizes the use of square footage of each building. The costs related to those areas which are not patient-related are deemed unallowable.

The hospitals and facilities use the Report to calculate the actual per diem for the year as well as the interim settlement. Rate Setting Methodology Clarification

Since the early 1990s, State-operated psychiatric hospitals and facilities calculated their per diem from the Report by dividing total allowable costs by total patient days. To eliminate the possibility of non-Medicaid costs from being included in these per diems, the Department is proposing to better define and clarify the manner in which it calculates the per diem for each hospital.

Specifically, for each hospital and facility, the Department intends to calculate a base per diem rate for the year of the applicable Report by taking all allowable net Medicaid reported facility costs and dividing by total hospital or facility Medicaid patient days. Based on the final submission of the Report, the data available to calculate the rates is 2 years prior, therefore, an inflation factor is applied to this base per diem rate to trend it forward to the payment year. An interim per diem rate is used until the cost report for that year is finalized and a cost settlement can be performed.

MA payments will be made to each State-operated psychiatric hospital and facility based on its interim Medicaid per diem rate multiplied by the number of Medicaid days of care provided to eligible clients. At the close of the fiscal year, payments will be adjusted to reflect allowable costs as established for the State-operated psychiatric hospital or facility and an interim settlement is calculated.

The hospital or facility will use the Report to determine the actual per diem rate, which will be multiplied by the number of Medicaid days to arrive at a Gross Medicaid Cost. For each hospital or facility, income received from patients and third party insurance carriers, including gross adjustments, will be deducted from Gross Medicaid Cost to arrive at Net Medicaid Cost. The Federal portion of the Net Medicaid cost will be compared to payments received and a settlement will be processed.

### Fiscal Impact

No fiscal impact will result from this clarification of the rate setting methodology for State-operated psychiatric hospitals and facilities.

- (3) All Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune Hollywood Experience second-chance drawing entries, that included the Wheel of Fortune Hollywood Experience Tune-In Bonus information as described in section 10(c), received after 11:59:59 p.m. June 23, 2013, through 11:59:59 p.m. October 3, 2013, will be entered in the Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune Hollywood Experience Tune-In Bonus drawing, which will be held the week of October 7, 2013.
- (4) The odds of an entry being selected in a Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune Hollywood Experience second-chance drawing or the Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune Hollywood Experience Tune-In Bonus drawing depend upon the number of entries received for that drawing.

- (j) If, for any reason, the Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune second-chance drawings or the Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune Tune-In Bonus drawing are not capable of running as planned due to, without limitation, errors in these rules or advertising, tampering, unauthorized intervention, fraud, technical failures, human error or any other cause beyond the control of the Pennsylvania Lottery that, in the sole judgment of the Pennsylvania Lottery, could corrupt or affect the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the drawings, the Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, at its sole discretion, to cancel, terminate, modify or suspend the Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune second-chance drawings and the Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune Tune-In Bonus drawing.
- (k) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Pennsylvania Lottery.
- (1) The Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune Hollywood Experience second-chance drawings and the Pennsylvania Lottery's Wheel of Fortune Hollywood Experience Tune-In Bonus drawing are governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (m) Prizes must be claimed within one year of the drawing date of the drawing in which the prize was won. However, winners of the Hollywood Experience Trip Package that intend to take the trip must make that election according to Section 13(f).

# Continuing Education and Elimination of Registration without Examination

### June 5, 2013

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the April 6, 2013 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the State Board of Landscape Architects (Board) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

## 1. Section 15.56. Registration without examination.—Consistency with statute; Clarity.

In the Preamble, the Board explains the deletion of Paragraph (a)(3) as follows:

... Also included in § 15.56(a)(3) is a provision which provides for individuals who have passed the examination in another state. Although not affected by Act 24, the Board is also proposing to delete this provision because it is already covered in § 15.57(a) (relating to registration by endorsement). . . .

While we agree with the deletion of Section 15.56 in its entirety, the remaining provisions of Section 15.57 differ from the statutory provision at 63 P.S. § 906(c). For example, Subsection 15.57(a) does not explain the statutory provision that the applicant must establish that their qualifications from the other state are "... at least equal to the standards of this Commonwealth existing at that time." We also question whether Subsection 15.57(c) is consistent with 63 P.S. § 906(c), which conditionally allows the Board to register and license an applicant without examination. Therefore, we ask the Board to review all of Section 15.57 with the statutory provision at 63 P.S. § 906(c) and either amend the regulation as necessary to reflect the statute or explain how Section 15.57 is consistent with the Landscape Architects' Registration Law.

# 2. Section 15.72. Requirement for biennial renewal.—Consistency with statute; Implementation procedure; Reasonableness.

The increase of continuing education hours from 10 hours to 24 hours implements Act 24 of 2009 (Act 24), which also gave the Board discretion on when to implement this increase. Also, under 63 P.S. § 909.1(e) the Board must "inform licensees of the continuing education requirement prior to the renewal period when continuing education is required."

The actual biennial period in which licensees must comply is not yet officially established in regulation. As of the date of these comments the biennial period commencing June 1, 2013 has already begun. Subsection (a), which implements the new requirement for 24 clock hours of continuing education, will not become effective until a final regulation is published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Tied to these concerns is the economic impact on licensees

who incur the costs, including time off from work to attend continuing education courses, which may or may not be necessary depending on the publication date of the final regulation. Therefore, we ask the Board to provide an explanation in the final regulation submittal of how the Board has sufficiently informed licensees of the new requirement for 24 hours of continuing education prior to the renewal period that requirement became effective on June 1, 2013.

## 3. Section 15.72. Requirement for biennial renewal.—Statutory authority.

The Landscape Architects' Registration Law states that the Board:

... shall adopt, promulgate and enforce regulations consistent with this act establishing requirements to be met by individuals licensed as landscape architects under this act as a condition for renewal of their licenses... each person licensed under this act shall be required to obtain twenty-four hours of mandatory continuing education during each two-year license period.... 63 P.S. §§ 909.1(a) and (b). (Emphasis added.)

The addition of Subsection (d) to the regulation would state:

If a licensee exceeds the required number of clock hours of continuing education in a renewal period, the licensee may carry forward a maximum of 12 continuing education clock hours into the subsequent renewal period.

By allowing licensees to carry forward credits, Subsection (d) would form the basis to allow the renewal of a license in the subsequent renewal period if the licensee completed less than the statutorily required 24 hours of mandatory continuing education during the subsequent renewal period. The Board should either delete Subsection (d), explain its authority under the Landscape Architects' Registration Law to allow licensees to carry forward continuing education credits, or seek amendments to the Landscape Architects' Registration Law to accommodate the carry forward of continuing education credits prior to adding this provision to its regulation.

S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Navigation Commission for the Delaware River & its Navigable Tributaries (Commission) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

### 1. Section 405.12. Renewal of license.—Clarity.

Subsection (b) includes notice that the continuing education requirements contained in the subsection shall become effective July 6, 2004. The Commission is deleting similar language in Section 405.7(b)(1) because the date has already passed. The Commission should delete this obsolete language, as well, in the final-form regulation.

### 2. Section 405.36. Federal license.—Clarity.

Subsection (b) states that if a pilot's federal license is suspended, revoked or surrendered (i.e., inactive), "the Commission may...revoke, suspend, limit or otherwise restrict the pilot's state license." (Emphasis added.) It is unclear as to how subsection (b) is consistent with new language in Section 405.7(a)(10) which requires an applicant for a pilot's license to "hold and maintain an active Federal first-class pilot's license" (emphasis added) and Section 405.12(a)(1) which requires an applicant renewing a pilot's license to satisfy the requirements in Section 405.7(a)(10).

We recognize the need for the Commission to provide notice and an opportunity for a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Agency Law before taking action against a pilot's state license; however, subsection (b) appears to allow for a circumstance in which a pilot can hold an active state pilot's license without an active Federal pilot's license. We ask the Commission to explain how these provisions are consistent, or to address this circumstance in the final-form regulation.

## INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

Certification as an Independent Review Organization; Long-Term Care Benefit Trigger Determinations; Notice 2013-07

The act of July 9, 2010 (P.L. 362, No. 51) (Act 51) added a provision to the Commonwealth's long-term care insurance laws granting a right to appeal an insurer's determination that a benefit trigger is not met. See section 1111.1 of The Insurance Company Law of 1921 (act) (40 P. S. § 991.1111a). Act 51 also added definitions of "benefit trigger" and "independent review organization" to section 1103 of the act (40 P. S. § 991.1103).

Under this act, an entity must be certified by the Insurance Department (Department) to perform an independent review of benefit trigger determinations. To be certified, an independent review organization (IRO) must:

(a) be certified as an IRO in another state, if the other state requires the IRO to meet substantially similar qualifications as those established by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners; or (b) be certified or approved by the Department. To maintain certification, the IRO shall comply with the requirements of the Act 51 amendments to the long-term care insurance laws and its representations in its application to the Commonwealth or any other state by which it is certified.
