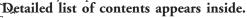

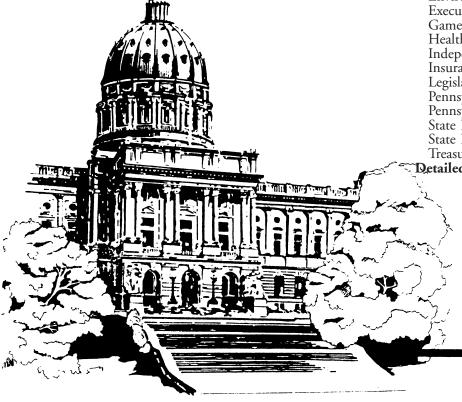

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva*nia Code sections may be found at www.legis.state. pa.us.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Annex A

TITLE 201. RULES OF JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION

CHAPTER 2. POLICY ON NONDISCRIMINATION AND EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

REASONABLE ACCOMMODATIONS UNDER TITLE II OF THE AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT

Rule 250. Policy.

It is the policy of the Unified Judicial System to prohibit discrimination against any individual with a disability, as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA"), 42 U.S.C. § 12131 *et seq.*, in accessing or participating in judicial proceedings or other services, programs, or activities of the Unified Judicial System.

Rule 251. Scope.

These rules shall apply to each UJS entity which includes, but is not limited to, all appellate courts, judicial districts, boards, committees and agencies under the administrative authority of the Supreme Court. These rules relating to reasonable accommodations under Title II of the ADA do not supersede either the requirements of 42 Pa.C.S.A. § 4401 et seq., relating to Court Interpreters for Persons who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing, or the Administrative Regulations Governing Court Interpreters for Persons who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing.

Official Note: The Administrative Regulations Governing Court Interpreters for Persons who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing (204 Pa. Code § 101 et seq.) and 42 Pa.C.S.A. § 4401 et seq. provide standards for court interpreters in judicial proceedings. "Judicial proceeding" is defined as "an action, appeal or proceeding in any court of this Commonwealth." 2 Pa.C.S. § 101. Title II of the ADA requires an interpreter for the deaf or hard of hearing for all programs, services or activities of the UJS. 42 U.S.C.A. § 12132; 28 C.F.R. § 35.160.

Rule 252. Reasonable accommodations.

- A. Each UJS entity shall develop a written policy to receive and process requests for reasonable accommodations from individuals with disabilities. The policy shall be posted on each UJS entity's respective website and in each facility.
- B. All policies developed must be substantially similar to the policy appended to this Rule (Appendix A) and shall contain, at a minimum, the following elements:
- 1. Appointment of an ADA coordinator—the coordinator must be identified on all court or program materials and the following information shall be provided: the coordinator's name, work address, work fax number or e-mail address and work telephone number.
 - 2. Notice of the right to request free accommodation(s).
- 3. Explanation of the process for requesting accommodation(s).
 - 4. Time line for request and response.
- C. Each UJS entity shall develop a form substantially similar to the one appended to this rule (Appendix A) for processing requests for reasonable accommodations.
- D. Each UJS entity shall adopt and publish a grievance procedure, substantially similar to the procedure appended to this rule (Appendix B), for requests that have been denied in whole or in part. Any denial of an accommodation request based upon undue burden or fundamental alteration to services and programs shall be put in writing by the head of the entity or his or her designee and shall provide specific reasons for the denial.
- E. Within six (6) months of the adoption of this rule, each UJS entity shall provide the Administrative Office with a copy of their ADA policy and form and their grievance procedure and form as outlined in sections A—D above.

Appendix A

AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (TITLE II) POLICY

The Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania (UJS) complies with Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) which provides that "no qualified individual with a disability shall, by reason of such disability, be excluded from participation in or be denied the benefits of the services, programs, or activities of a public entity, or be subjected to discrimination by any such entity". 42 U.S.C.A. § 12132. Pursuant to that requirement, if you are an individual with a disability who needs an accommodation in order to participate in any judicial proceeding or any other service, program, or activity of the UJS, you are entitled, at no cost to you, to the provision of certain assistance. The ADA does not require the (UJS entity name here) to take any action that would fundamentally alter the nature of its programs or services, or impose an undue financial or administrative burden.

If you require an accommodation under the ADA, it is recommended that you make your request as soon as possible or at least three (3) business days before your scheduled participation in any court proceeding or UJS program or activity. All requests for accommodation, regardless of timeliness, will be given due consideration

and if necessary, may require an interactive process between the requestor and the (name of UJS entity) to determine the best course of action.

To request a reasonable accommodation, please complete the *Request for Reasonable Accommodation Form* (Appendix B) and return it to:

If you need assistance completing this form, contact the ADA Coordinator. Complaints alleging violations of Title II under the ADA may be filed pursuant to the UJS Grievance Procedure with (name and contact information of individual who handles grievance procedures). A response will be sent to you after careful review of the facts.

Appendix B

Americans with Disabilities Act (Title II) Grievance Procedure

This grievance procedure is established for the prompt resolution of complaints alleging any violation of Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in the provision of services, programs, or activities by the Unified Judicial System (UJS). If you require a reasonable accommodation to complete this form, or need this form in an alternate format, please contact [ADA coordinator information].

To file a complaint under the Grievance Procedure please take the following steps:

- 1. Complete the complaint form and return to [ADA Coordinator or designated individual]. Alternative means of filing complaints will be made available for persons with disabilities upon request. The complaint should be submitted as soon as possible but no later than sixty (60) calendar days after the alleged violation.
- 2. Within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of the complaint, the [ADA Coordinator or designated individual] will investigate the complaint, including, meeting with the individual seeking an accommodation, either in person or via telephone, to discuss the complaint and the possible resolutions. Within fifteen (15) calendar days of the meeting, the [ADA Coordinator or designated indi-

vidual] will respond in writing, and where appropriate, in a format accessible to the complainant, such as large print, Braille, or audio. The response will explain the position of the [name of UJS entity] and offer options for substantive resolution of the complaint.

3. If the response to the complaint does not satisfactorily resolve the issue, the complainant may appeal the decision within fifteen (15) calendar days after receipt of the response to [designated individual]. Within fifteen (15) calendar days after receipt of the appeal, the [designated individual] will meet with the complainant to discuss the complaint and possible resolutions. Within fifteen (15) calendar days after the meeting, the [designated individual] will respond in writing, and, where appropriate, in a format accessible to the complainant, with a final resolution of the complaint.

This grievance procedure is informal. An individual's participation in this informal process is completely voluntary. Use of this grievance procedure is not a prerequisite to and does not preclude a complainant from pursuing other remedies available under law.

The UJS Policy on Non-Discrimination and Equal Employment Opportunity also encompasses disability-related issues and provides complaint procedures for UJS court users. Any employment-related disability discrimination complaints will be governed by the UJS Policy on Nondiscrimination and Equal Employment Opportunity.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 58—RECREATION

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 133]

Wildlife Classification; Classification of Birds

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 28, 2014, meeting, amended § 133.21 (relating to classification of birds) to remove the bald eagle from the endangered and threatened species list entirely.

The final-form rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the final-form rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 43 Pa.B. 7444 (December 21, 2013).

1. Purpose and Authority

The Commission formerly listed the bald eagle (Haliaeetus leucocephalus) as a threatened species within this Commonwealth. The Commission has recently determined that the bald eagle has achieved a population level and geographical distribution that no longer meets the definition of a threatened species. As of the 2013 nesting season, bald eagle populations have reached all criteria in the Pennsylvania Bald Eagle Management Plan, 2010-2019 (Plan) to be removed from the Commonwealth endangered and threatened species list since they are now sustaining a minimum of 150 nesting pairs, including successful pairs in at least 40 counties, with 60% of known nests successful and productivity of 1.2 eaglets fledged per successful nest, based on a 5-year running period. As a result, the Commission amends § 133.21 to remove the bald eagle from the endangered and threatened species list entirely. Upon delisting, bald eagles will continue to be a protected species under applicable Commonwealth statutes and will continue to be afforded added protection under the Federal Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (16 U.S.C.A. §§ 668—668d) and Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C.A. §§ 703-712). Commission staff will continue to implement the plan and monitor bald eagle nests to ensure that this species does not regress toward endangerment.

Section 322(c)(8) of the code (relating to powers and duties of commission) specifically empowers the Commission to "Add to or change the classification of any wild bird or wild animal." Section 2167(a) of the code (relating to endangered or threatened species) states that "The commission may, by regulation, add or remove any wild bird or wild animal native to this Commonwealth to or from the Pennsylvania native list of endangered or threatened species." The amendments to § 133.21 are adopted under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking amends § 133.21 to remove the bald eagle from the endangered and threatened species list entirely.

3. Persons Affected

Persons having an interest in the protected status of bald eagles within this Commonwealth may be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

4. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

6. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 135]

Lands and Buildings; State Game Lands

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 28, 2014, meeting, amended § 135.41 (relating to State game lands) to limit the availability of the fire exception to only licensed hunters, trappers or fishermen and through hikers within the corridor of the Appalachian Trail.

The final-form rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the final-form rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 43 Pa.B. 7443 (December 21, 2013).

1. Purpose and Authority

The Commission has historically permitted the use of small open fires on State game lands for cooking or warming purposes by licensed hunters, trappers or fishermen and through hikers within the corridor of the Appalachian Trail. Continued support for the use of small open fires by these users has not diminished. However, the Commission has identified an increasing number of fires being set and maintained by persons using the State game lands for other than their intended uses. In an effort to discourage and reduce the occurrence of these unintended uses, the Commission is specifically limiting the availability of the fire exception in § 135.41(a) to only licensed hunters, trappers or fishermen and through hikers within the corridor of the Appalachian Trail.

Section 721(a) of the code (relating to control of property) provides "The administration of all lands or waters owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the commission shall be under the sole control of the director, and the commission shall promulgate regulations... for its use and protection as necessary to properly manage these lands or waters." Section 741(b) of the code (relating to commission actions for damage to buildings or property) provides "The commission shall promulgate regulations to protect users, improvements, lands and buildings under its control. These regulations shall cover, but need not be limited to: (1) Removal of any material[;] (2) Damage of any kind[; and] (3) Any other regulations required to properly protect and preserve these lands for their intended use." The amendment to § 135.41 is adopted under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking amends § 135.41 to limit the availability of the fire exception to only licensed hunters, trappers or fishermen and through hikers within the corridor of the Appalachian Trail.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to use small open fires for cooking or warming purposes on State game lands may be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

4. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

The final-form rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 143]

Hunting and Furtaker Licenses; Agents

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 28, 2014, meeting amended Chapter 143, Subchapter B (relating to appointment of agents) to eliminate the late fees for late agent applications and also to make housekeeping amendments to related text.

The final-form rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the final-form rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 43 Pa.B. 4741 (August 17, 2013).

1. Purpose and Authority

Section 143.29 formerly required applicants who submitted their agent applications from April 1 through October 31 to pay a \$100 late fee. In the past, timely agent applications were needed to create agent accounts and expedite shipment of pre-printed paper license materials before the start of the new licensing year. Since the implementation of the automated license system, the time constraints that previously necessitated timely applications no longer apply. The Commission has determined that the late fee is no longer necessary. The Commission amends Chapter 143, Subchapter B to eliminate the late fees for late agent applications and also to make house-keeping amendments to related text.

Section 2722(g) of the code (relating to authorized license-issuing agents) directs the Commission to adopt regulations for the administration, control and performance of license issuing activities. Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." The amendments to Chapter 143, Subchapter B are adopted under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking amends Chapter 143, Subchapter B to eliminate the late fees for late agent applications and also to make housekeeping amendments to related text.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to make application to become a hunting/furtaking license issuing agent within this Commonwealth may be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

4. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking may result in the appearance of a nominal increase in additional cost and paperwork due to the loss of the late application fees. However, the loss of the late application fees has previously been offset by programmatic savings achieved by the efficiencies of the Commission's automated licensing system. To the extent there was any increase in cost in paperwork, an increase would be nominal and would be absorbed by the Commission's current budget or staffing, or both.

TITLE 58. RECREATION

PART III. GAME COMMISSION

CHAPTER 143. HUNTING AND FURTAKER LICENSES

Subchapter B. APPOINTMENT OF AGENTS

§ 143.22. Rebate for first year agents.

- (a) An agent shall be entitled to a rebate based upon his first license year only sales as follows:
 - (1) Rebate \$100 if 250 licenses are sold.
 - (2) Rebate \$200 if 500 licenses are sold.
 - (3) Rebate \$300 if 750 licenses are sold.
 - (4) Rebate \$400 if 1,000 licenses are sold.
- (b) A rebate will not be given after the first license year of sales.

§ 143.23. Minimum sales requirement.

To continue as an agent, a minimum of 50 hunting licenses shall be sold each license year. Qualifying licenses, for the purpose of calculating 50 hunting licenses, will be the regular resident, nonresident hunting and furtakers licenses. Archery, muzzleloader, bear, special wild turkey, migratory game bird and replacement licenses are not included as qualifying licenses. In addition, an agent shall continue to meet the requirements in § 143.27 (relating to conditions for appointment).

§ 143.24. Fee for reapplication.

If an agent sells less than the required 50 qualifying licenses in a given license year, and is removed by the Commission, or if an agent voluntarily withdraws, a subsequent reapplication requires payment of the application fee.

§ 143.25. Rebate restrictions.

A rebate will not be granted if the agent is delinquent in remitting moneys as required.

§ 143.28. Application period.

(a) A person requesting appointment as an agent shall submit the appropriate completed application form to the Commission in Harrisburg during the period November 1 through March 31 of the following year to be eligible for appointment as an issuing agent for the license year beginning the following July 1.

(b) An application received outside of the application period is not guaranteed to be processed by the Commission before the start of the license year beginning July 1.

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 147] Special Permits; Deer Control

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 28, 2014, meeting, amended § 147.673 (relating to eligibility and application for DMAP) by advancing the Deer Management Assistance Permit (DMAP) application deadline to May 1.

The final-form rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the final-form rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 43 Pa.B. 7444 (December 21, 2013).

1. Purpose and Authority

Hunters in this Commonwealth have the opportunity to purchase their new hunting licenses from license issuing agents and the Pennsylvania Automated License System in early June each year. Ideally, every hunter interested in also redeeming a DMAP coupon for a harvest permit would be able to do so at the time of their general hunting license purchase. Unfortunately, due to the current DMAP application deadline and accompanying processing time, most DMAP landowner applications are not available until late June or early July. To accommodate hunting license buyers and permit one-stop purchases for licenses and permits in early June, the Commission amended § 147.673 to advance the DMAP application deadline to May 1. With this deadline date change, DMAP applications would be made available to prospective landowner applicants no later than February 15 each year.

Section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits) provides "the commission may, as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources, promulgate regulations for the issuance of any permit and promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." The amendment to § 147.673 is adopted under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking amends § 147.673 to advance the DMAP application deadline to May 1.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to submit a DMAP landowner application or redeem a DMAP coupon for a harvest permit may be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

4. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

The final-form rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

Title 61—REVENUE

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE TREASURY DEPARTMENT [61 PA. CODE CH. 5]

Payments by Electronic Funds Transfer

The Department of Revenue (Department) and the Treasury Department (Treasury), under the authority of section 9 of The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. § 9), amend Chapter 5 (relating to payments by electronic funds transfer) to read as set forth in Annex A.

The act of July 18, 2013 (P. L. 574, No. 71) (Act 71) mandates the Secretary of Revenue and the State Treasurer to jointly promulgate a regulation revising electronic funds transfer (EFT) payments for payments equal to or greater than \$1,000. Accordingly, the Department and the Treasury, under section 204 of the act of July 31,

1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. § 1204), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL), and the regulation thereunder, 1 Pa. Code § 7.4, find that notice of proposed rulemaking is under the circumstances impracticable and, therefore, may be omitted.

Act 71 mandated these changes as part of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2013-2014 budget package. A balanced operating budget for the Commonwealth is required under Pa.Const. Art. VIII, § 12. The only way to timely implement this change, a necessary component of the FY 2013-2014 budget, is through a final-omitted rulemaking. These savings form part of the FY 2013-2014 budget passed by the General Assembly. Failure to timely adopt the regulations will create a deficit in the current year's budget as enacted.

Utilizing the shorter regulatory process enables the Department and the Treasury to quickly amend the regulations and provide the public with the revised EFT requirement enacted under Act 71. Even though time constraints make the formal comment period impossible, the Department reached out to the tax community to give them the opportunity to provide informal comments through the public outreach process. A copy of the draft regulation was sent to the Pennsylvania Bar Association, the Philadelphia Bar Association, the Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants, the Pennsylvania Society of Public Accountants and the Pennsylvania Chamber of Business and Industry with a 14-day comment period. The draft regulation was also delivered to the Chairpersons of the Appropriations and Finance legislative committees. Comments or objections were not received on the EFT threshold revision. The regulation is listed on the Department's Quarterly Regulatory Report posted on the Department's web site. The Department continues to inform taxpayers of the lower EFT requirement through many avenues, such as the Revenue Tax Update publication, notification in the electronic E-TIDES system and on the Department's web site.

As a result, the Department for good cause finds that the procedures specified in sections 201 and 202 of the CDL (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) are in these circumstances impractical, unnecessary or impose an impossible burden on the Department.

Purpose of the Final-Omitted Rulemaking

The purpose of this final-omitted rulemaking is to implement regulations to reflect a statutory change made by the General Assembly that revised payments required under § 5.3 (relating to payments required to be paid by EFT) from "\$10,000 or more" to "\$1,000 or more." Electronic payments offer several advantages over check payments. Payments are received faster and errors in handling and posting of tax payments are reduced.

Explanation of Regulatory Requirements

The Department is amending § 5.3 to add language in subsection (e) that explains the lower EFT threshold requirement of \$1,000 beginning January 1, 2014. The remaining subsections are renumbered.

Section 5.7(i) (relating to miscellaneous provisions) is amended to reflect a new amount of "\$1,000 or more," as well as update a reference to the renumbered section. *Fiscal Impact*

The Department estimated that the regulations will have a fiscal impact of \$39,000 savings to the Commonwealth. It can be expected that the costs to the regulated community and small businesses, after an initial setup expense of staff time or other resources if the business is not already set up to make EFT payments, are minimal.

Added expense to convert to electronic payments should be offset by savings on checks, stamps and envelopes.

Paperwork

This final-omitted rulemaking will not generate substantial paperwork for the public or the Commonwealth.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

This final-omitted rulemaking will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The regulations are scheduled for review within 5 years of publication. A sunset date has not been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(c)), on December 20, 2013, the Department and Treasury submitted a copy of the final-omitted rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Finance and the Senate Committee on Finance. On the same date, the regulations were submitted to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. §§ 732-101—732-506).

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, on February 26, 2014, the final-omitted rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on February 27, 2014, and approved the final-omitted rulemaking.

Findings

The Department and the Treasury find that:

- (1) The proposed rulemaking procedures in sections 201 and 202 of the CDL are unnecessary because it is in the public interest to expedite final-omitted rulemaking.
- (2) The adoption of this final-omitted rulemaking in the manner provided by this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute.

Order

The Department and the Treasury, acting under the authorizing statute, order that:

- (a) The regulations of the Department, 61 Pa. Code Chapter 5, are amended by amending §§ 5.3 and 5.7 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Secretary of the Department and the State Treasurer shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.
- (c) The Secretary of the Department and the State Treasurer shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

PART I. DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE Subpart A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

CHAPTER 5. PAYMENTS BY ELECTRONIC FUNDS TRANSFER

§ 5.3. Payments required to be paid by EFT.

- (a) Beginning July 1, 1992, a payment in the amount of \$40,000 or more shall be remitted using a method of EFT selected by the taxpayer. A taxpayer may choose the ACH debit method or the ACH credit method.
- (b) Beginning January 1, 1993, a payment in the amount of \$30,000 or more shall be remitted using a method of EFT selected by the taxpayer. A taxpayer may choose the ACH debit method or the ACH credit method.
- (c) Beginning January 1, 1994, a payment in the amount of \$20,000 or more shall be remitted using a method of EFT selected by the taxpayer. The taxpayer may choose the ACH debit method or the ACH credit method.
- (d) Beginning January 1, 2013, a payment in the amount of \$10,000 or more shall be remitted using a method of EFT selected by the taxpayer. The taxpayer may choose the ACH debit method or the ACH credit method.
- (e) Beginning January 1, 2014, a payment in the amount of \$1,000 or more shall be remitted using a method of EFT selected by the taxpayer. The taxpayer may choose the ACH debit method or the ACH credit method.
- (f) This requirement applies to payment of only the following taxes:

(g) A taxpayer may satisfy the obligation to remit a payment by EFT by delivering a certified or cashier's check, in person or by courier with the appropriate return or deposit statement, to the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue, Bureau of Business Trust Fund Taxes, EFT Unit, Ninth Floor, Strawberry Square, Fourth and Walnut Streets, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17128 on or before the due date of the obligation. Payments will not be accepted at other Department locations.

Gross Receipts

(h) Separate transfers shall be made for each payment.

§ 5.7. Miscellaneous provisions.

- (a) A taxpayer who is required to remit payments by EFT shall initiate the transfer so that the tax due is deposited to the Commonwealth's depository account on or before the day that the tax is due. If a tax due date falls on a day other than a business day, the deposit by EFT is due on the first business day thereafter.
- (b) The EFT method of payment does not change current filing requirements for tax returns. If the EFT payment is not timely made or the tax return required is not filed by the due date, the provisions for late filing penalties, interest and loss of collection allowance apply as provided by law.
- (c) A taxpayer who is required to remit payments by EFT and who is unable to make a timely payment because of system failures within the banking system/ACH interface which are beyond the taxpayer's control will not be subject to penalty or interest for late payment or loss of collection allowance.
- (d) Errors made by the Treasury, the Department or their agents will not subject the taxpayer to loss of collection allowance or assessment of penalty or interest for late payment.
- (e) A taxpayer who is required to remit payment by EFT and who elects to remit the payment by courier as described in § 5.6(d) (relating to EFT payments) will not be subject to penalty or interest for late payment or loss of collection allowance if the courier fails to make timely delivery due to a force majeure.
- (f) For the first 6 months that a taxpayer is required to remit tax by EFT, the Department will extend a reasonable grace period to the taxpayer to resolve problems which arise with new administrative procedures, data systems changes and taxpayer operating procedures. To qualify for a grace period, the taxpayer shall demonstrate that a good faith effort to comply was made, or that circumstances beyond the taxpayer's reasonable control prevented compliance by the required date.
- (g) A taxpayer who remits taxes by EFT shall indicate that fact on the return when it is filed. For the purpose of this chapter, "return" means the form designated for filing the report of taxes due for a period, including forms for making installments of estimated tax and tentative tax returns.
- (h) The Department and the Treasurer will provide one or more methods for taxpayers who remit taxes by EFT to verify and acknowledge that the payments have been received by the Department.
- (i) The Treasurer, the Department and the Secretary of the Budget will provide one or more methods for tax refunds of \$1,000 or more. The refunds will be available for the taxes listed in \$5.3(f) (relating to payments required to be paid by EFT). The taxpayer shall file a written request for the electronic transfer of a refund.

Hunting and Trapping; Beaver Trapping

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) proposed at its January 28, 2014, meeting to amend § 141.62 (relating to beaver trapping) to expand the trap authorization to 10 inches in height to 12 inches in width and additionally require a single offset trigger positioned in parallel not more than 1 1/2 inches from either vertical section of a set trap.

The proposed rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the January 28, 2014, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until April 4, 2014, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797.

1. Purpose and Authority

Current regulations prohibit a person from trapping beaver using a body gripping trap larger than 10 inches by 10 inches. The Commission recently received a request to expand the trap authorization to 10 inches in height to 12 inches in width to accommodate certain commercially available products. The Commission reviewed applicable safety and wildlife management concerns and determined that this nominal expansion of authorized body gripping traps will not have a negative impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth. The Commission is proposing to amend § 141.62 to expand the trap authorization to 10 inches in height to 12 inches in width and additionally require a single offset trigger positioned in parallel not more than 1 1/2 inches from either vertical section of a set trap.

Section 2102(d) of the code (relating to regulations) authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations stipulating the size and type of traps, the type of firearms and ammunition and other devices which may be used, the manner in which and the location where the devices may be used, the species the devices may be used for and the season when the devices may be used." The amendments to § 141.62 are proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will amend § 141.62 to expand the trap authorization to 10 inches in height to 12 inches in width and additionally require a single offset trigger positioned in parallel not more than 1 1/2 inches from either vertical section of a set trap.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to trap beaver through the use of body gripping traps within this Commonwealth will be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

4. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

5. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking will be effective upon finalform publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) proposed at its January 28, 2014, meeting to amend § 141.47 (relating to elk) to eliminate the Route 555 corridor safety zone.

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

1. Purpose and Authority

In 2004, the Board of Commissioners adopted regulations creating a 150-yard safety zone for elk along the Route 555 corridor from Weedville to Hicks Run in an effort to address existing problems with road hunting and the killing of highly visible elk in yards and public places found within this area. The Commission determined that this safety zone is no longer necessary and that existing laws and regulations can adequately protect the public and wildlife from unsafe or unethical behavior. Furthermore, the Commission also determined that harvest of some of the elk within this corridor is necessary to maintain elk populations in more appropriate habitats. The Commission is proposing to amend § 141.47 to eliminate the Route 555 corridor safety zone.

Section 322(c)(4) of the code (relating to powers and duties of commission) specifically authorizes the Commission to "Define geographic limitations or restrictions." Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." The amendments to § 141.47 are proposed under this authority.

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the January 28, 2014, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until April 4, 2014, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797.

1. Purpose and Authority

On March 31, 2010, the Commission's 3-year evaluation of the effectiveness of a broad scale and widely accessible authorization permitting the baiting of white-tailed deer across the southeast special regulations areas expired. The Commission's final review of the baiting authorization generally concluded that broad scale and widely accessible baiting did not establish viable increases in harvest rates to justify an extension of the experimental program. On February 1, 2011, the Commission amended §§ 147.552 and 147.556 (relating to application; and lawful devices and methods) to create a focused, limited authorization permitting the baiting of white-tailed deer in wildlife management units (WMU) 5C and 5D on approved properties enrolled in the "Red Tag" program. See 41 Pa.B. 1767 (April 2, 2011). The Commission is proposing to amend § 141.1 and add §§ 147.681—147.687 to create and implement a deer attractant permit to authorize limited baiting activities on private property in the southeast special regulations area.

Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate con-

cerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." Sections 147.681—147.687 and the amendments to § 141.1 are proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will amend § 141.1 and add §§ 147.681—147.687 to create and implement a deer attractant permit to authorize limited baiting activities on private property in the southeast special regulations area.

Subchapter A. GENERAL

§ 141.1. Special regulations areas.

* * * * *

(c) Prohibitions.

* * * * :

- (2) It is unlawful to use buckshot in Allegheny or Philadelphia Counties without specific authorization of the Director.
- (3) It is unlawful to, except for normal or accepted farming, habitat management practices, oil and gas drilling, mining, forest management activities, or other legitimate commercial or industrial practices, intentionally lay or place food, fruit, hay, grain, chemical, salt or other minerals anywhere in the southeast special regulations area for the purpose of feeding white-tailed deer, or to intentionally lay or place food, fruit, hay, grain, chemical, salt or other minerals that may cause white-tailed deer to other minerals that may cause white-tailed deer to congregate or habituate an area. If otherwise lawful feeding is attracting white-tailed deer, the Commission may provide written notice prohibiting this activity.
 - (d) Permitted acts. It is lawful to:

* * * * *

- (6) Hunt or take deer during any deer season through the use of or by taking advantage of bait on private property currently operating under a valid deer control permit where approval for limited baiting activities has previously been obtained under § 147.552 (relating to application). This limited authorization is valid only to the extent that persons comply with the standards and conditions in § 147.556 (relating to lawful devices and methods).
- (7) Hunt or take deer in the southeast special regulations area during regular open hunting seasons for white-tailed deer through the use of or by taking advantage of bait on private property only under a deer attractant permit issued under Chapter 147, Subchapter R (relating to deer control).

CHAPTER 147. SPECIAL PERMITS Subchapter R. DEER CONTROL DEER ATTRACTANT PERMIT

(Editor's Note: Sections 147.681—147.687 are new and printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

§ 147.681. Purpose.

The purpose of §§ 147.682—147.687 is to authorize eligible persons to hunt through the use of or otherwise take advantage of approved bait to enhance the harvest rate of white-tailed deer on private property within the southeast special regulations area where traditional hunting and deer control methods have proven ineffective in controlling local deer populations.

§ 147.682. Permit eligibility and use.

- (a) Application. Deer attractant permits may be issued to landowners or their agents who have suffered material damage to their real property in the southeast special regulations area by white-tailed deer. Permits will be made available through a system established by the Director.
- (b) *Hunting*. Deer attractant permits may be utilized by landowners or persons they permit to hunt on their property, or both, who:
- (1) Possess a valid hunting license or qualify for applicable license and fee exemptions under section 2706 of the act (relating to resident license and fee exemptions) for the geographical area including the proposed bait site.
- (2) Have no prior record of violations of the act or this title, or related license revocations within the 5 years preceding the date of application.

§ 147.683. Operation.

A deer attractant permit issued under this subchapter authorizes landowners or persons they permit to hunt on their property, or both, to hunt through the use of or otherwise take advantage of approved bait for the purpose of enhancing the harvest rate of white-tailed deer. This authorization is subject to the following conditions:

- (1) This authorization only applies during regular open hunting seasons for white-tailed deer in the affected portion of each wildlife management unit located within the southeast special regulations area.
- (2) A proposed bait site may not be located less than 250 yards from any previously established bait site authorized under this subchapter.
- (3) Approved bait may be distributed at each bait site by approved feeders from 2 weeks prior to the opening of the first white-tailed deer season through the close of the last white-tailed deer season within the applicable wildlife management unit.
- (4) Approved feeders are limited to sealed, waterproof, automatic, mechanical feeders that are set to distribute bait up to a maximum of three times per day during legal hunting hours only. The feeder must be visibly tagged or labeled with the landowner's permit number or the full name and address of the landowner.
- (5) Bait accumulation at any one bait site may not exceed 5 gallons total volume at any given time.
- (6) Approved bait is limited to shelled corn and protein pellet supplements.
- (7) A person engaging in privileges authorized by a deer attractant permit shall possess a copy of the permit on their person at all times while exercising the permit privileges and while maintaining the bait site and shall produce the permit upon demand of an officer whose duty it is to enforce this title.
- (8) It is the sole responsibility of the landowner or his agent and persons they permit to hunt on their property to ensure that the area bait site is in compliance with this section prior to hunting in that area.
- (9) The landowner and persons they permit to hunt on their property may not, under any circumstances, hunt, take, kill or harvest any game or wildlife other than white-tailed deer at the bait site or coming to and from the bait site. Persons not authorized by the landowner to

hunt on their property may not, under any circumstances, hunt, take, kill or harvest any game or wildlife at the bait site or coming to and from the bait site.

§ 147.684. Records and reports.

- (a) A report of deer harvested at or near a bait station shall be submitted by the hunter in accordance with the requirements of section 2323 of the act (relating to tagging and reporting big game kills).
- (b) An annual report of deer harvested under the authority of the permit shall be submitted by the land-owner or his agent in the manner specified by the Commission within 30 days of the close of the last open season within the applicable wildlife management unit.
- (c) Failure to submit a timely and complete annual report required under this section will automatically render the permittee ineligible to reapply for the permit for the subsequent permit year.

§ 147.685. Suspension of baiting sites.

- (a) The Commission may suspend the operation of any bait site if one or more of the following is determined: (i) The baiting activity is causing conflict with other lawful hunting. (2) The baiting activity is causing public safety hazards. (3) The operation of the baiting site is not in compliance with the requirements of §§ 147.682—147.684 (relating to permit eligibility and use; operation; records and reports). (4) The operation if the baiting site is detrimental to the health and welfare of any wildlife, including white-tailed deer.
- (b) The Commission may suspend the operation of bait sites authorized under this subchapter upon the detection of Chronic Wasting Disease within the southeast special regulations area. This suspension may remain indefinitely until the Commission determines that resumption of baiting activities will not create an unreasonable future risk of spreading of the disease on the landscape.

§ 147.686. Violations.

Violations of this subchapter will be prosecuted under section 2308 of the act (relating to unlawful devices and methods). Furthermore, the Director may deny, revoke or suspend a permit for violation requirements, standards or limitations of this subchapter upon written notice to the permittee.

§ 147.687. Sunset clause.

Sections 147.681—147.686 and this section become effective July 1, 2014, and expire and are rendered void on June 30, 2017, unless the Commission further authorizes their legal effectiveness prior to this termination date.

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 131 AND 141] Preliminary Provisions; Hunting and Trapping

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) proposed at its January 28, 2014, meeting to amend

§§ 131.2, 141.43—141.45 and 141.47 to lengthen the broadhead length limitation from 3 inches to 3.25 inches.

The proposed rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the January 28, 2014, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until April 4, 2014, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797

1. Purpose and Authority

Current regulations prohibit a person from hunting big game using an arrow or bolt equipped with a broadhead exceeding 3 inches in length. The Commission recently received a request to lengthen the broadhead length limitation to 3.25 inches to authorize certain handmade and commercially sold products. The Commission reviewed applicable safety and wildlife management concerns and determined that this nominal expansion of authorized broadheads will not have a negative impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth. The Commission is proposing to amend §§ 131.2, 141.43—141.45 and 141.47 to lengthen the broadhead length limitation from 3 inches to 3.25 inches.

Section 2102(d) of the code (relating to regulations) authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations stipulating the size and type of traps, the type of firearms and ammunition and other devices which may be used, the manner in which and the location where the devices may be used, the species the devices may be used for and the season when the devices may be used." The amendments to §§ 131.2, 141.43—141.45 and 141.47 are proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will amend §§ 131.2, 141.43—141.45 and 141.47 to lengthen the broadhead length limitation from 3 inches to 3.25 inches.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt or take game using a bow and arrow or crossbow and bolt may be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

4. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

5. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking will be effective upon finalform publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Annex A TITLE 58. RECREATION PART III. GAME COMMISSION CHAPTER 131. PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS

§ 131.2. Definitions.

In addition to the definitions contained in section 102 of the act (relating to definitions), the following words and terms, when used in this part or in the act, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* * * * *

Broadhead—[Shall have an outside diameter or width of at least 7/8 inch with no less than two cutting edges. Cutting edges shall be in the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface. Broadheads may not exceed 3 inches in length measured from the tip of the broadhead to the point that fits against the arrow shaft.] A fixed or mechanical tip affixed to the fore end of an arrow or bolt having sharpened cutting edges consisting of metal or naturally occurring stone.

CHAPTER 141. HUNTING AND TRAPPING Subchapter C. BIG GAME

§ 141.43. Deer.

- (a) Archery deer season.
- (1) Permitted devices. It is lawful to hunt deer during the archery deer season with any of the following devices:
- (i) A bow and arrow. A bow must have a peak draw weight of at least 35 pounds. An arrow must be equipped with a broadhead that has an outside diameter or width of at least 7/8 inch [with at least two cutting edges located on the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface,] and may not exceed [3] 3.25 inches in length.
- (ii) A crossbow and bolt. A crossbow must have a peak draw weight of at least 125 pounds. A bolt must be equipped with a broadhead that has an outside diameter or width of at least 7/8 inch [with at least two cutting edges located on the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface,] and may not exceed [3] 3.25 inches in length.

* * * * *

§ 141.44. Bear.

- (a) Archery bear season.
- (1) Permitted devices. It is lawful to hunt bear during the archery bear season with any of the following devices:
- (i) A bow and arrow. A bow must have a peak draw weight of at least 35 pounds. An arrow must be equipped with a broadhead that has an outside diameter or width of at least 7/8 inch [with at least two cutting edges

located on the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface,] and may not exceed [3] 3.25 inches in length.

(ii) A crossbow and bolt. A crossbow must have a peak draw weight of at least 125 pounds. A bolt must be equipped with a broadhead that has an outside diameter or width of at least 7/8 inch [with at least two cutting edges located on the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface,] and may not exceed [3] 3.25 inches in length.

* * * * *

§ 141.45. Turkey.

- (a) Fall turkey season.
- (1) Permitted devices. It is lawful to hunt turkey during the fall turkey season with any of the following devices:

* * * * *

- (iii) A bow and arrow. A bow must have a peak draw weight of at least 35 pounds. An arrow must be equipped with a broadhead that has an outside diameter or width of at least 7/8 inch [with at least two cutting edges located on the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface,] and may not exceed [3] 3.25 inches in length.
- (iv) A crossbow and bolt. A crossbow must have a peak draw weight of at least 125 pounds. A bolt must be equipped with a broadhead that has an outside diameter or width of at least 7/8 inch [with at least two cutting edges located on the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface,] and may not exceed [3] 3.25 inches in length.

* * * * *

§ 141.47. Elk.

(a) Permitted devices. It is lawful to hunt elk during the elk season with any of the following devices:

* * * * *

- (4) A bow and arrow. A bow must have a peak draw weight of at least 45 pounds. An arrow must be equipped with a broadhead that has an outside diameter or width of at least 1 inch [with at least two cutting edges located on the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface,] and may not exceed [3] 3.25 inches in length.
- (5) A crossbow and bolt. A crossbow must have a peak draw weight of at least 125 pounds. A bolt must be equipped with a broadhead that has an outside diameter or width of at least 1 inch [with at least two cutting edges located on the same plane throughout the length of the cutting surface,] and may not exceed [3] 3.25 inches in length.

[58 PA. CODE CH. 139] Seasons and Bag Limits

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) proposed at its January 28, 2014, meeting to amend § 139.4 (relating to seasons and bag limits for the license year) to provide updated seasons and bag limits for the 2014-2015 hunting/trapping license year.

The proposed rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the January 28, 2014, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until April 4, 2014, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797.

1. Purpose and Authority

To effectively manage the wildlife resources and provide hunting and trapping opportunities in this Commonwealth during the upcoming license year, the Commission is proposing to amend § 139.4 to provide updated seasons and bag limits for the 2014-2015 license year. The 2014-2015 seasons and bag limits have been amended to reflect current available scientific data, population and harvest records, field surveys and professional staff observations, as well as recommendations received from staff, organized sporting groups, members of the agricultural community and others interested in the management of the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

Several changes in hunting seasons and bag limits, when compared with the 2013-2014 regulations, are being proposed. First, it is proposed that small game field possession limits be increased to three times the daily bag. Migratory game bird possession limits were increased to three times the daily bag limit for the 2013-2014 hunting season. This proposed change will make small game possession limits consistent with those for migratory game birds and provide increased hunting opportunity, particularly for nonresident hunters.

Staff have proposed to reduce the 2014 fall turkey seasons in wildlife management units (WMU) 3A, 3B and 3C from 3 weeks to 2 weeks, while retaining the 3-day Thanksgiving hunt segment. Population indices have been showing decreasing trends in each of these WMUs over the last 4 to 5 years. Low spring harvest densities, decreases in poult recruitment and summer sighting survey data also reflect declines warranting this action, which is consistent with guidelines in the Wild Turkey Management Plan. In all cases, a 1-week reduction in the first fall segment of the season is advised over elimination of the 3-day Thanksgiving season segment because it is likely to achieve a greater reduction in harvest.

Also in regard to fall turkey seasons, it is proposed that the WMU 5A season be maintained at 3 days but shifted from midweek to a Thursday-Saturday framework. The turkey population in this WMU remains low, but is higher than prior to the season closure and flocks are well distributed. Including a Saturday in the 3-day season is expected to increase hunter opportunity and satisfaction and was recommended by the WMU 5A Wild Turkey Task Force.

Staff has suggested adding WMUs 2C and 4B to the Wednesday through Saturday extended bear season that runs concurrent with deer season. WMU 2C has had a slightly increasing bear population trend, highway mortalities of bears also have been slowly increasing and there has been a noticeable increase in human-bear conflicts. WMU 4B also has had an increasing trend in human-bear conflicts with several incidents in recent years involving home entry or injury to pets and people. Vehicle mortalities of bears also has generally increased. Furthermore, harvest, which typically correlates well with annual population monitoring, has steadily increased by approximately 20% annually since 2003.

Concerning furbearers, staff has proposed adding WMUs 1B and 3C to the fisher trapping season based on increased numbers of incidental captures and sightings during the past 3 years. Finally, it is proposed that all references to regulated harvest of skunks should specify the "striped skunk." Spotted skunks, a species of conservation concern, have a very limited distribution and low abundance in southwestern counties in this Commonwealth and should be excluded from any regulated harvest.

Section 322(c)(1) of the code (relating to powers and duties of commission) specifically empowers the Commission to "fix seasons, daily shooting or taking hours, and any modification thereof, and daily, season and possession limits for any species of game or wildlife." Section 2102(b)(1) of the code (relating to regulations) authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations relating to seasons and bag limits for hunting or furtaking..." The amendments to § 139.4 are proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will amend § 139.4 by establishing when and where it is lawful to hunt and trap various game species and also place limits on the numbers that can be legally taken during the 2014-2015 hunting/trapping license year.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt or trap game or wildlife within this Commonwealth during the 2014-2015 hunting/ trapping license year will be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

4. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

5. Effective Date

The effective dates of the proposed rulemaking are July 1, 2014, to June 30, 2015.

Special Permits; Mentored Hunting Program Permit

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) proposed at its January 28, 2014, meeting to amend Chapter 147, Subchapter X (relating to Mentored Hunting Program Permit) to create and implement a Mentored Adult Hunting Program in this Commonwealth.

The proposed rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the January 28, 2014, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until April 4, 2014, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797.

1. Purpose and Authority

Since the successful implementation of the Mentored Youth Hunting Program in fall 2006, the Commission has been striving to find a way to apply the successes of this mentor-based program to nonhunting adults in this Commonwealth. The Commission determined that a program could entice increased adult participation in this Commonwealth's great hunting heritage by streamlining their introduction to the sport of hunting. The act of May 15, 2013 (P. L. 26, No. 7) authorizes the Commission to implement a Mentored Hunting Program in this Commonwealth. The Commission is proposing to amend Chapter 147, Subchapter X to create and implement a Mentored Adult Hunting Program. The Mentored Adult Hunting Program will maintain the mentor-based structure of the Mentored Youth Hunting Program, but will have different species allowances, costs and safety features. Adult participants will now be able to apply for and receive a Mentored Adult Hunting Permit through the Pennsylvania Automated License System at any of the Commission's issuing agent locations across this Commonwealth prior to participating in the Mentored Adult Hunting Program. Permit application will require participants to supply the required identification information and pay a fee of \$19 for residents and \$100 for nonresidents, plus any applicable transactional and issuing agent

Section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits) provides "the commission may, as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources, promulgate regulations for the issuance of any permit and promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." The amendments to Chapter 147, Subchapter X are proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will amend Chapter 147, Subchapter X to create and implement a deer attractant permit to create and implement a Mentored Adult Hunting Program.

3. Persons Affected

Persons of majority age wishing to hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth may be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

4. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking may result in some additional cost and paperwork associated with the implementation

of these changes in Pennsylvania Automated License System. However, the Commission has determined that if there is additional expense associated with this effort, it will not be substantial and would be absorbed by the current budget.

5. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking will be effective upon finalform publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Annex A

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART III. GAME COMMISSION CHAPTER 147. SPECIAL PERMITS

Subchapter X. MENTORED [YOUTH] HUNTING PROGRAM PERMIT

§ 147.801. Purpose and scope.

- (a) The purpose of this subchapter is to define and implement the Mentored [Youth] Hunting Program within this Commonwealth and provide for the issuance of hunting permits to eligible [youths] individuals.
- (b) The Mentored [Youth] Hunting Program is intended to provide mentors who are dedicated to promoting and sharing this Commonwealth's hunting heritage with [interested youths] others, the opportunity to provide these [younger] unlicensed [youths] individuals with one-on-one, hands-on experience and infield training on the mechanical, ethical, safety, responsibility and enjoyment aspects of the hunting experience.

§ 147.802. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* * * * *

Mentor—A licensed person, 21 years of age or older who is serving as a guide to a mentored youth **or mentored adult** while engaged in hunting or related activities.

Mentored adult—An unlicensed person, 18 years of age or older, who is accompanied by a mentor while engaged in hunting or related activities.

Mentored youth—An unlicensed person, under 12 years of age who is accompanied by a mentor while engaged in hunting or related activities.

§ 147.803. Application.

(a) **Form and content.** Applications for mentored **[youth]** hunting permits issued under this subchapter shall be made through the Commission or any of its authorized license-issuing agents on the appropriate form designated by the Commission for this purpose. Each

application must include the name, address, telephone number, date of birth [and], Social Security number of the applicant and any other information required by the Commission.

- (b) Eligibility.
- (1) Mentored youth hunting permits are available to youth applicants under 12 years of age. Mentored youth hunting permits are available to eligible youth applicants until they reach 12 years of age, after which a junior hunting license is required.
- (2) Mentored adult hunting permits are available to adult applicants 18 years of age or older who have never held a prior hunting license within this Commonwealth or another state or nation. Mentored adult hunting permits are available to eligible adult applicants for a total of 3 consecutive, unbroken license years, after which an applicable adult hunting license is required.
- [(b)] (c) *Minors*. Applications may be submitted on behalf of an eligible mentored youth upon presentation of a written request executed by a parent or legally constituted guardian.

[(c)] (d) Fee.

- (1) The fee for a mentored youth hunting permit will be \$1, plus any applicable transactional and issuing agent fees.
- (2) The fee for a mentored adult hunting permit will be:
- (i) For residents, \$19, plus any applicable transactional and issuing agent fees.
- (ii) For nonresidents, \$100, plus any applicable transactional and issuing agent fees.

§ 147.804. General.

- (a) *License required.* A mentor shall possess a valid Pennsylvania hunting license or qualify for license and fee exemptions under section 2706 of the act (relating to resident license and fee exemptions) prior to engaging in any mentored [youth] hunting activities.
- (b) **Permit required.** A mentored youth **or mentored adult** shall possess a valid **applicable** mentored [youth] hunting permit prior to engaging in any mentored [youth] hunting activities.

(c) Species limitation.

- (1) A mentored youth's hunting eligibility is restricted to the following species: squirrel, woodchuck, coyote, deer and wild turkey.
- (2) A mentored adult's hunting eligibility is restricted to the following species: squirrel, ruffed grouse, rabbit, pheasant, bobwhite quail, hares, porcupine, woodchuck, crow, coyote, antlerless deer and wild turkey.
- (d) **Seasons and bag limits.** A mentored youth's **and mentored adult's** hunting eligibility is further constrained by applicable hunting seasons, daily limits, field possession limits and season limits provided in § 139.4 (relating to seasons and bag limits for the license year).
- (e) Applicability of junior seasons and antler restrictions. A mentored youth is eligible to hunt during any special youth hunting seasons that apply to any species specified in subsection (c) and are subject to the

same antler restrictions that apply to junior license holders in § 131.2 (relating to definitions).

- (f) [A mentored youth] Tagging requirements. Mentored youth and mentored adults shall tag and report all big game harvested in the manner provided in section 2323 of the act (relating to tagging and reporting big game kills).
- (g) Transfer of an antlerless license. Notwithstanding the prohibitions in section 2711(3) and (5) of the act (relating to unlawful acts concerning licenses), mentors are authorized to transfer [an] antlerless licenses issued to them to an eligible mentored youth or mentored adult. The antlerless license shall be valid and in the possession of the mentor at all times while hunting antlerless deer. The transfer of the antlerless license may not occur until after the mentored youth or mentored adult has harvested the antlerless deer, but before tagging the carcass. A mentored youth or mentored adult may receive by transfer no more than one antlerless deer license each license year. [A mentored youth is] Mentored youth and mentored adults are ineligible to make direct application for an antlerless license.
- (h) Transfer of a fall turkey tag. Notwithstanding the prohibitions in section 2711(a)(3) and (5) of the act, mentors are authorized to transfer fall turkey tags issued to them to an eligible mentored youth or mentored adult. The fall turkey tag shall be valid and in the possession of the mentor at all times while hunting fall turkey. The transfer of the fall turkey tag may not occur until after the mentored youth or mentored adult has harvested the fall turkey, but before tagging the carcass. A mentored youth or mentored adult may not receive by transfer more than one fall turkey tag each license year.
- (i) Transfer of a Deer Management Assistance Program harvest permit. Notwithstanding the prohibitions in § 147.676(2) and (3) (relating to unlawful acts), mentors are authorized to transfer Deer Management Assistance Program (DMAP) harvest permits issued to them to an eligible mentored youth or mentored adult. The DMAP harvest permit must be valid and in the possession of the mentor at all times while hunting anter**less**] antlerless deer. The transfer of the DMAP harvest permit may not occur until after the mentored youth or mentored adult has harvested the [anterless] antlerless deer, but before tagging the carcass. A mentored youth or mentored adult may not receive by transfer more than one DMAP harvest permit each license year. [A mentored youth is] Mentored youth and mentored adults are ineligible to make direct application for a DMAP harvest permit.

§ 147.805. Safety.

While engaged in mentored [youth] hunting activities:

(1) A mentored youth shall be stationary, within arms reach and subject to the immediate control of the mentor at all times while in possession of any lawful hunting device. This limitation may not be construed to apply to mentored adults. Mentored adults shall be accompanied by the mentor within eyesight and in close proximity so that verbal instruction and guidance can easily be understood without the aid of electronic communication devices or sound amplification devices.

- (2) A mentor may not accompany more than one mentored youth[, including junior hunters,] or mentored adult at any given time. A mentor may not accompany a junior hunter in addition to accompanying a mentored youth or mentored adult.
- (3) A mentor and mentored youth may not collectively possess more than one lawful hunting device at any given time. This limitation may not be construed to apply to mentors and mentored adults participating in the mentored adult hunting program.
- (4) A mentor and mentored youth **or mentored adult** shall **[both] each** comply with section 2524 of the act (relating to protective material required) and with any regulations promulgated by the Commission relating to protective material.

§ 147.806. Liability.

A mentor is responsible and accountable for all actions of the mentored youth or mentored adult occurring

while engaged in mentored [youth] hunting activities. A mentor who causes or allows a mentored youth or mentored adult to engage in an unlawful act shall be punishable as the principal offender as provided in section 924 of the act (relating to liability for actions of others).

§ 147.807. Violations.

It is unlawful for a mentor [or], mentored youth or mentored adult to fail to comply with any of the requirements, standards or limitations of this subchapter. A person violating this subchapter shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay the fine prescribed in the act. The Director may additionally deny, revoke or suspend any permit for any violation of this subchapter upon written notice to the permittee.

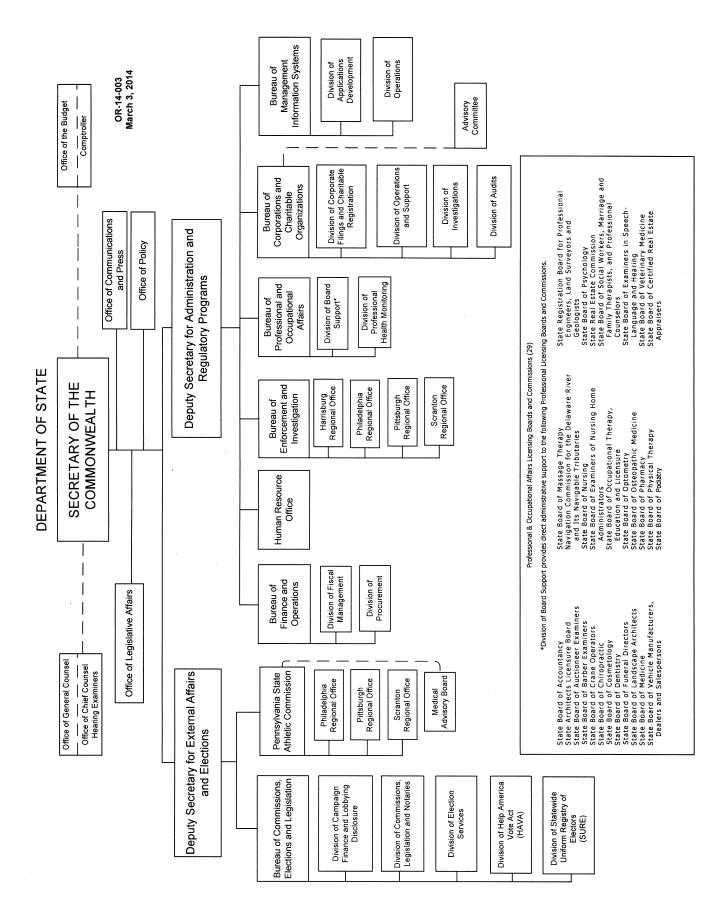
Reorganization of the Department of State

Referendum on Continuation of the Pennsylvania Peach and Nectarine Research Program; Referendum Order

- I. The Pennsylvania Peach and Nectarine Research Program was established under the provisions of the Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act. The Act requires that the Secretary of Agriculture call a referendum of affected producers every five years to determine whether or not a majority of those voting still desire the program. The program was last subjected to a review referendum conducted in 2009. It is now time for another review referendum to determine whether a majority of the peach and nectarine producers desire the program to continue.
- II. Referendum Period: The referendum period shall be from March 17, 2014 until 4 p.m. on March 31, 2014. Completed ballots shall be mailed or hand-delivered to the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Market Development, Room 310, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17110-9408. Hand-delivered ballots must be received by 4 p.m. on March 31, 2014. Ballots that are mailed must be postmarked no later than March 31, 2014, and received no later than April 4, 2014.
- III. Notice of Referendum: This referendum order and an official ballot shall be mailed no later than March 10, 2014, to all affected producers whose names appear on the list of Pennsylvania peach and nectarine producers maintained in the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture. Additional copies of the same materials shall be made available at the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture.
- IV. Eligible Voters: The rules governing the eligibility of a producer for voting are as follows: The record date for determination of whether a producer is eligible to vote is March 10, 2014. All peach and nectarine producers who produced, grew, or caused to be grown 500 or more peach and/or nectarine trees, of all ages, for the production of peaches and/or nectarines for sale or marketing in the Commonwealth in calendar year 2013 and intend to produce, grow, or cause to be grown 500 or more peach and/or nectarine trees, of all ages, for the production of peaches and/or nectarines for sale or marketing in the Commonwealth in calendar year 2014.
- V. Counting of Ballots: The ballots will be canvassed and counted by a Teller Committee appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture. The counting of the ballots will begin at 12 p.m., Thursday, April 10, 2014 at the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17110. The Secretary will announce the results of the referendum within 30 days following the completion of the referendum period. The results will be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and the Harrisburg Patriot-News, and disseminated to the news media.
- VI. Reporting Irregularities: Any irregularities or disputes concerning the referendum procedures must be

reported in written form to the Secretary of Agriculture not later than seven (7) calendar days from the end of the referendum period.

VII. *Publication*: This referendum order shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and the Harrisburg *Patriot-News*.

VIII. *Effective Date*: The foregoing order shall be effective immediately.

Referendum Order on Recommended Changes to the Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program

A referendum will be held to vote on recommended changes to the Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program. In summary, the proposed amendments would: (1) revise the definition of producer to exclude those who neither produce grapes nor wine in Pennsylvania in light of a legal ruling that permits such operations to obtain limited winery licenses; (2) revise producer charges payment options to expressly reflect the monthly payment option currently being offered; (3) provide that sales volume reporting be legally verified by the producer subject to 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 4904; (4) revise the producer charge amount from \$.15 to \$.20 per gallon. In accordance with the requirements of the Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act, a public hearing was held on December 2, 2013, to hear testimony and consider evidence on the proposed amendments and related matters. By Order of March 3, 2014, this office determined that the proposed amendments tend to effectuate the purposes of the Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act.

- I. The Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program was established under the provisions of the Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act. The Act requires that the Secretary of Agriculture call a referendum of affected producers any time there is a proposed change to the program order. The referendum to be held for the Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program will determine whether a majority of those voting desire the requested changes.
- II. Referendum Period: The referendum period shall be from March 17, 2014, until 4 p.m. on March 31, 2014. Completed ballots shall be mailed or hand-delivered to the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Market Development, Room 310, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17110-9408. Hand-delivered ballots must be received by 4 p.m. on March 31, 2014. Ballots that are mailed must be postmarked no later than March 31, 2014, and received no later than April 4, 2014.

III. Notice of Referendum: This referendum order and an official ballot shall be mailed no later than March 10, 2014, to all affected producers whose names appear on the list of Pennsylvania wine producers maintained in the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture. Additional copies of the same materials shall be made available at the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture.

IV. Eligible Voters: The rules governing the eligibility of a producer for voting are as follows: The record date for determination of whether a producer is eligible to vote is March 10, 2014. Names of affected eligible producers shall be taken from the commodity wine list of producers/sellers maintained in the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture. These names are supplied to the Secretary from the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board. Voting producers must have a Limited Winery License. Producers who hold a Limited Winery License but do not produce grapes or wine in Pennsylvania are not eligible to vote.

V. Counting of Ballots: The ballots will be canvassed and counted by a Teller Committee appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture. The counting of the ballots will begin at 10 a.m., Thursday, April 10, 2014, at the

Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17110. The Secretary will announce the results of the referendum within 30 days following the completion of the referendum period. The results will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and the Harrisburg *Patriot-News*, and disseminated to the news media.

VI. Reporting Irregularities: Any irregularities or disputes concerning the referendum procedures must be reported in written form to the Secretary of Agriculture not later than seven (7) calendar days from the end of the referendum period.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of April 2014

The Department of Banking and Securities (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of April, 2014, is 5 3/4%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. No. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 3.25 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 5.75 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at $5 \frac{3}{4}$ %.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

In addition, the Department imposes a technology-based aluminum limit of 2.0 mg/l (30 day average) to protect stream uses.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 362-0600-001, NPDES Program Implementation—Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Concerning Water Quality Management, NPDES Program Implementation, and Related Matters. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests or petitions for a public hearing on NPDES permit applications, as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92a.82(d). The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30 days of this public notice and contain the name, address, telephone number and the interest of the party filing the request, and state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. A public hearing may be held if the Department considers the public interest significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing on the NPDES permit application will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. When a public hearing is held, the Department will consider comments from the public hearing in the final determination on the NPDES permit application.

This response is proposed pursuant to Sections 501(a) and 505(b) of the HSCA (35 P. S. §§ 6020.501(a) and 505(b)). The site is located in Ridgway Township, Elk County, approximately two miles north of the town of Ridgway, off of Montmorenci Road (State Route 948), at the east end of Jakes Hollow Road. The site consists of an approximately 15 acre facility that operated as a mixed waste landfill between the early 1960s and June of 1975. During an earlier environmental investigation that the Department conducted in 2004, lead-containing industrial wastes and 55-gallon drums, containing trichloroethylene ("TCE"), were encountered in several trenches throughout the landfill. The drums were re-buried and their location marked for future access. The highest potential risks to human health and the environment are the high levels of lead found in surface soils and the known buried 55 gallon TCE drums. The lead poses a significant threat to human health through direct contact and inhalation risks. The drums of TCE represent a potential significant future release into the environment if not removed, which release could further contaminate

site groundwater and soils, allowing transport off site via the groundwater and surface water.

The Department proposes to implement an interim response to reduce or eliminate the threats to human health and the environment from the above-referenced hazardous substances found at the site by targeting the known drums of TCE and high levels of lead in the surface soils. This proposed interim response is designed to adequately protect public health and the environment and will not hinder the implementation of any future response actions that may be needed to achieve a complete and final cleanup of the site.

The three alternatives evaluated as possible interim responses included:

Alternative 1: No Action: The "No Action" alternative provides a baseline for comparison to other alternatives. Because no action would be implemented, any present or future risks to human health or the environment would remain unchanged.

Alternative 2: Perimeter Fence of the Landfill Area: This alternative would be an access deterrent involving the placement of steel fencing around the landfill area of the site. This alternative could reduce the likelihood of dermal contact and inhalation exposure by the public.

Alternative 3: Cover Lead-Contaminated Areas & the Excavation and Off-Site Disposal of Buried Drums: This alternative would involve the excavation of the 55 gallon drums and lead-contaminated wastes, above certain risk-based levels, for off-site disposal. Interim soil cover will significantly reduce the potential for dermal and inhalation exposure from remaining industrial wastes.

Each alternative was evaluated under the following four criteria: (1) the extent to which each alternative protects the public health and the environment; (2) the extent to which each alternative complies with or otherwise addresses Applicable or Relevant and Appropriate Requirements; (3) the extent to which each alternative is feasible, effective, implementable and permanent; and (4) the relative cost of each alternative. Furthermore, the comparative analysis evaluated the relative performance of each alternative in relation to each specific comparison criterion. The comparative evaluation identified the relative advantages and disadvantages of each alternative.

Based on the results of the comparative analysis, the Department proposes to implement Alternative 3 as the interim response for the site. Of the three alternative responses considered, Alternative 3 was selected because it would, in a cost-effective manner, protect the public and environmental receptors from direct contact with the site-related hazardous substances of greatest concern, and is designed to mitigate the ongoing release and threat of release of those hazardous substances into the environment.

This notice is being provided pursuant to Section 506(b) of HSCA. Interstate Pollution Transport Reduction; Proposed 2014 Ozone Season Nitrogen Oxide Emission Limits for Nonelectric Generating Units

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is providing notice and an opportunity for comment concerning the proposed Nonelectric Generating Unit (non-EGU) 2014 Ozone Season Nitrogen Oxide (NO $_{\rm x}$) emission limitations established in accordance with 25 Pa. Code \S 145.8(d) (relating to transition to CAIR NO $_{\rm x}$ trading programs). The 15-day public comment period will end on March 30, 2014.

At 38 Pa.B. 1705 (April 12, 2008), the Commonwealth's Clean Air Interstate Rule (CAIR), adopted by the Environmental Quality Board, included $\mathrm{NO_x}$ Budget Trading Program amendments to allow the owners and operators of non-EGUs in this Commonwealth to transition to the CAIR $\mathrm{NO_x}$ Trading Program.

Specifically, 25 Pa. Code § 145.8(d) establishes a non-EGU NO, Trading Program budget of 3,619 tons of NO, less a specified adjustment amount, to serve as a Statewide Ozone Season NOx emissions cap for new and existing non-EGUs. This NO_x emissions cap also applies to CAIR-exempt EGUs that were subject to the NOx Budget Trading Program. If total emissions from all of the units exceed the Statewide NO_x emissions cap of 3,438 tons, the owners and operators of non-EGUs must comply with the NO_x emission limitations established under 25 Pa. Code § 145.8(d). The owners and operators of units exceeding their individual NO_x limits would need to purchase and then surrender one CAIR NO_{x} Ozone Season allowance and one CAIR NO_x allowance for each ton of excess emissions. The proposed NO_x emissions limitations for individual units ensure that non-EGUs in this Commonwealth continue to meet the emission limits of the NO_x Budget Trading Program, as required under the United States Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) CAIR.

The Statewide cap for 2013 was not exceeded. Therefore, non-EGUs do not need to purchase allowances to meet their 2013 Ozone Season $NO_{\rm x}$ emission limitations established under 25 Pa. Code § 145.8(d). The preliminary $NO_{\rm x}$ emissions for the 2013 Ozone Season (May through September) reported to the EPA by the owners and operators of the affected non-EGUs are 1,456.312 tons. The Department's permanent retirement of 3,438 allowances under 25 Pa. Code § 145.8(b) covers all the $NO_{\rm x}$ emissions from the affected non-EGUs in 2013.

The $\mathrm{NO_x}$ emissions cap provides 181 tons of $\mathrm{NO_x}$ emissions for non-EGUs and the other units that need to address their emissions through accounting adjustments, including units that previously participated in the $\mathrm{NO_x}$ Budget Trading Program; emissions from these units were below the 25-ton exemption threshold. Adjustments were also made for the permanent retirement of $\mathrm{NO_x}$ allowances due to generation of emission reduction credits. The Department will also use a portion of the 181 tons of the budgeted $\mathrm{NO_x}$ emissions, if necessary, to address mistakes or miscalculations. This year, the Department is proposing to use 96 tons of the 181 tons of $\mathrm{NO_x}$ for account adjustments, leaving 85 tons available for any additional adjustments at the end of the control period.

The Department made accounting adjustments for the following facilities:

Retired Units: Naval Surface Warfare Division Unit 98; Shenango Units Nos. 6 and 9 (the generation of emission offsets for small non-NO $_{\rm x}$ Budget Trading Program units resulted in a permanent NO $_{\rm x}$ accounting adjustment of 45 tons).

Exempt Units: Each of the following units has a 25-ton NO_{x} permit limit: Armagh Compressor Station (Unit 31301) and the Naval Surface Warfare Division (Unit 100). The Naval Surface Warfare Division (Unit 99) has a 1-ton NO_{x} permit limit. All of these exempt status units account for a total adjustment of 51 tons of NO_{x} emissions. Entriken Compressor Station (Unit 31601) had previously operated under a 25-ton exemption, but was authorized by a plan approval (35-05019A) issued December 30, 2013, to remove the exemption. Since the

Entriken unit did not have any input for the 2013 ozone season, the company's calculated 2014 limit is zero; however, the facility will not need to surrender any allowances as long as the Statewide cap is met.

Units subject to the requirements in 25 Pa. Code \S 145.8 are required to meet the monitoring and reporting requirements of the EPA's CAIR, found in 40 CFR Part 96, Subpart HHHH (relating to monitoring and reporting) and maintain general accounts and account representatives under 40 CFR Part 96, Subparts BBB and FFFF (relating to CAIR designated representative for CAIR NO_x ozone season sources; and CAIR NO_x ozone season allowance tracking system). The "Proposed NonseGU 2014 Ozone Season NO_x Emission Limits" table as follows lists the following: the facility name, ORIS code, the unit ID for each non-EGU unit, the operating year, the heat input for the 2013 Ozone Season, the calculated 2014 rate and the 2014 Ozone Season limit.

Standard Statewide 2011 inpatient discharge and ambulatory/outpatient procedure datasets. The data will be used for an ongoing project to assess the delivery of

services in terms of access, cost, quality and impact of delivery of services in multiple settings. The data will be used to try to understand the sources of variation in these four aspects of health care provision to ensure beneficiaries receive the right care, at the right time, in the right setting, which will reduce unwanted variation in health care delivery and ultimately lead to cost savings through the elimination of underuse of effective care and the over-utilization of supply-sensitive care.

SG-2, LLC—Tracy Pfeiffer

A standard Statewide 2010 and second quarter 2012 through first quarter 2013 inpatient discharge dataset. The data will be used to support their client hospitals' short- and long-term operational and strategic planning efforts. Specifically, the data will be used to develop 10-year health care services demand forecasts by clinical area and geography, allowing SG-2's hospital clients to do the following on a web-based portal: project and meet future demands by determining the appropriate allocation of resources and improve the availability and quality of health care in the communities served.

Stevens & Lee—Harriet Franklin

A custom second quarter 2012 through first quarter 2013 inpatient discharge data report of patient records from hospitals located in Philadelphia, Montgomery, Bucks, Chester and Delaware Counties. The data will be used to analyze certain service areas for hospitals in and around the Philadelphia area in connection with certain joint venture opportunities.

Summit Health—Barbara Constable

A custom 2012 ambulatory/outpatient procedure dataset of specific patient zip codes to be used internally for strategic planning purposes.

Three custom 2012 inpatient discharge data reports of patient records from specified zip codes with percent of the market by hospital and service area for: 1) all services lines; 2) all service lines except rehabilitation; and 3) by service lines defined by diagnosis-related group (DRG). The market share reports will be used internally for strategic planning purposes.

Susquehanna Health System—Brian Engel

Susquehanna Health System—Susan Browning

A standard Statewide 2011 and 2012 inpatient discharge dataset to be used as part of Susquehanna Health System's ongoing Community Health Needs Assessment process and reporting. The data will be analyzed by Healthy Communities Institute to produce a web based platform report focused on asthma, alcohol abuse, CHF, COPD, dehydration, diabetes, hepatitis, urinary tract infection and pneumonia cases. The analysis will be used by Susquehanna Health and Laurel Health System as part of their Community Health Needs Assessment,

which is a Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) mandate for nonprofit hospitals. As part of the PPACA, the data results will be reported in aggregate form on the hospitals web sites. The information will help determine what populations need help and/or the diseases that the facilities treated at a higher rate than the State or National average.

The Erie Community Foundation—Michael Batchelor

Custom 2011 and 2012 inpatient discharge and ambulatory/outpatient procedure datasets for patients from specified zip codes in Erie County with an emergency room visit indicator. The data will be used for a primary care capacity and demand study, which may be used to guide future primary care access and quality initiatives. Erie Community Foundation has contracted with John Snow, Inc. to analyze the data to evaluate the extent to which inadequate primary care capacity had resulted in admissions for ambulatory care sensitivity conditions. This includes inappropriate use of the emergency department for primary care treatable conditions and inpatient admissions for potentially preventable conditions that could have been averted with appropriate and adequate primary care. The results will be presented at zip code and county level in PowerPoint slides and a final report given to the Foundation and will be shared with a group of community providers and stakeholders at a community forum.

The Trustees of the University of Pennsylvania—Hansie Mathelier, MD

A custom 2005 through third quarter 2012 inpatient discharge dataset of patients with heart failure admissions at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania, Penn Presbyterian Medical Center or Pennsylvania Hospital and their associated pre- and post-records from any hospital with derived data fields (number of days between admissions and number of records per individual). These data will be used to develop models to categorize patients who are at risk for readmission post-discharge for a retrospective study to identify patient factors associated with hospital readmission among patients who had a heart failure admission during July 2005 and July 2012 at one of the Pennsylvania Health System hospitals. This study is to explore predictors of readmission, time to rehospitalization and etiology.

A third quarter 2001 through second quarter 2012 standard Statewide inpatient revenue code detail dataset and custom inpatient discharge dataset of hip and knee replacement cases with readmission records and derived data fields (number of days to date of death, number of days to date of primary procedure, number of days to date of discharge, number of days between admissions, number of days to knee revision and number of days to hip revision) and indicators (a hip or knee replacement, a knee replacement and a knee revision were performed during the same hospitalization, both a hip replacement and a hip revision were performed during the same hospitalization, type of match performed between hospitalization data and mortality data, death was within 30 days, death was within 1-year, readmission was within 7 days and readmission was within 30 days) linked with Department mortality data. The data will be used to investigate racial variations in the receipt of post-acute care and rehabilitation services following elective total knee and/or hip replacement for a study, Race and Rehabilitation Services After Joint Replacement: Access and Outcomes.

A custom fourth quarter 2011 through 2012 inpatient discharge dataset of patients enrolled in the Patient-Centered Transition (PaCT) project with 90-day readmission records through first quarter 2013 with a derived data field (number of days between admissions). The data will be used to evaluate the program that is designed to help uninsured and Medicaid patients with the challenges of being discharged from a hospital. The PaCT Project is a randomized controlled trial of an intervention in which community health workers provide social support, advocacy and navigation to low-income patients during the transition from hospital to primary care.

A custom second quarter 2009 through first quarter 2010 inpatient discharge dataset sample of records with record identification fields provided to each participating hospital (original data source) in the Pennsylvania Inpatient Psychiatry Patient Safety study. Patient, provider and unit/hospital characteristics will be collected to identify, assess and understand the mechanisms contributing to the association with patient safety events: medical errors and adverse events resulting from clinical care.

The data will be used for a study, ICU Staffing and Short-term Outcomes in Cardiothoracic Surgery Critical Care Patients. The data will be linked with survey response data from Commonwealth cardiac surgery ICUs about nurse and physician staffing to analyze the relationship between ICU staffing models and patient outcomes.

University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing—Jill Marie Vanak, PhD

Following the hearing and receipt of the stenographic transcript, the Insurance Commissioner (Commissioner) will issue a written order resolving the factual issues presented at the hearing and stating what remedial action, if any, is required. The Commissioner's Order will be sent to those persons participating in the hearing or their designated representatives. The Order of the Commissioner may be subject to judicial review by the Commonwealth Court.

We have audited the accompanying statement of net assets of the Commonwealth Financing Authority ("Authority") as of June 30, 2006, and the related statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets and cash flows for the period April 1, 2004 (date of formation) through June 30, 2006. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Authority's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States of America. The Commonwealth Financing Authority, hereafter referred to as the "Authority," is pleased to present its financial statements developed in compliance with Statement of Governmental Accounting Standard No. 34, entitled "Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments" (hereafter "GASB 34"), and related standards. GASB 34 enhances information provided to the users of its financial statements. This section of the financial reporting package presents our discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance during the period April 1, 2004 (date of formation) through June 30, 2006. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements that follow this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The period ended June 30, 2006 was the initial period of the Authority's operation.
- During the period ended June 30, 2006 the Authority received bond proceeds of \$375.5 million to fund its operations and to provide grants, loans and loan guarantees under established financing programs.
- During the period ended June 30, 2006, the Authority approved \$245,817,102 in loans, \$28,500,000 in venture capital, \$6,750,000 in loan guarantees, and \$151,291,788 in grants. The Authority's programs support economic development and expansion within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to, and should be read in conjunction with, the basic audited financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Authority's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The financial statements report information about the Authority using the full accrual method of accounting, as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. The financial statements include a statement of net assets; a statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in fund net assets; a statement of cash flows; and notes to the financial statements.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the financial position of the Authority on a full accrual historical cost basis. The Statement of Net Assets presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Over time, increases and decreases in net assets are one indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

While the Statement of Net Assets provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets presents the results of the business-type activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net assets changed during the year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the

timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Authority's recovery of its costs.

The Statement of Cash Flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operational, financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipts and cash disbursement information without consideration of the earnings event when an obligation arises, or depreciation of capital assets.

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Authority's accounting policies, significant account balances and activities, long-term debt and subsequent events, if any.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

This is the first year that the Authority is presenting its financial statements; it has no prior years to provide comparative data. In future years when prior year information is available, a comparative analysis of financial data will be included. Financial statements and other selected information serve as the key financial data and indicators for management, monitoring and planning.

As shown in the table above, operating revenues consist mostly of interest earnings. Nonoperating revenues and expenses consist mainly of a Transfer to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program (\$15 million).

Long-Term Debt

During the current audit period, the Authority issued two revenue bonds totaling \$375 million to provide funds for loan disbursements, investments in venture capital and grant expenditures. This is the first indebtness incurred by the Authority. In addition, the Authority entered into a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the payment of the annual debt service through an annual appropriation by the Commonwealth. However, there is no assurance that there will be sufficient funds appropriated annually by the Commonwealth.

COMMONWEALTH FINANCING AUTHORITY (COMPONENT UNIT OF COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES June 30, 2006

The Commonwealth Financing Authority ("Authority") is a body corporate and politic duly organized by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania ("Commonwealth") incorporated under the Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations Act of 2004 ("Act"), being the Act of April 1, 2004, P.L. 163, as amended by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Authority, by virtue of the Act and its articles of incorporation, has all powers as set forth in the Act including those for creation and retention of jobs. The purpose of the Authority is to engage in financial assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, grants and private equity participating loans to promote activities which lead to the creation and retention of jobs within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the establishment of economically viable Pennsylvania communities, the development of a stable tax base within Pennsylvania Communities, the reuse of abandoned industrial, commercial and other previously utilized sites, the promotion and commercialization of Pennsylvania products and services and investment of private capital in Pennsylvania communities to promote the health, safety, employment, business opportunities, economic activity and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The legislation creating the Authority as well as program specific guidelines establish certain activities to be carried out by the Authority as follows:

- Business in Our Sites Program: provides financial assistance for preparation of sites for future development.
- First Industries Program: provides financial assistance for projects related to tourism and agriculture.
- Second Stage Loan Program: provides loan guarantees to commercial lending institutions that make loans to life sciences, advanced technology or manufacturing businesses.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Guarantee Program: provides guarantees to venture capital
 partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies which are in early-stage or
 mid-stage development.
- Building Pennsylvania Program: provides loans to fund managers for investment in real estate projects in Pennsylvania.
- TIF Guarantee Program: provides guarantees for TIF bonds or other indebtness in accordance with the TIF Act of 1990.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Capital Investments Program: provides loans to Venture Capital partnerships for investment in Pennsylvania Companies.
- Penn Works Program: provides grants and loans for water supply and wastewater infrastructure within Pennsylvania.

REPORTING ENTITY

The Authority has adopted the provisions of Section 2100 of the Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards for the criteria used to evaluate organizations, activities and functions that should be included in the Authority's financial statements. The basic criteria is the exercise of oversight responsibility over such organizations, activities and functions. The Authority has not identified any entities which should be subject to evaluation for inclusion in the Authority's reporting entity.

The Commonwealth appoints the members of the Authority's governing board. The Commonwealth maintains the accounts and records of the Authority. In addition, the Commonwealth employs and supervises personnel to provide administrative services. Therefore, the Authority is considered a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

MEASUREMENT FOCUS, BASIS OF ACCOUNTING AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT PRESENTATION

The Authority's financial statements are presented on the full accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Under this basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. The Authority applies Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements as well as Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations, and the Accounting Principles Board (APB) of the Committee of Accounting Procedures issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.

All activities of the Authority are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. A proprietary fund is used to account for operations that are (a) financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the cost (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to the Authority is determined by its measurement focus. The transactions of the Authority are accounted for on a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities associated with the operations are included on the balance sheet. Net assets represent total assets net of total liabilities.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents, for the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, include cash on hand or on deposit with a maturity of three months or less.

ALLOWANCE FOR LOAN LOSSES

The allowance for loan losses is a reserve account for possible future loan losses. Loan losses and recoveries of previously charged-off loans are charged or credited directly to the allowance account. The provision for loan losses is adjusted monthly at the rate of 2% of outstanding loan balances at the respective month end. The provision for loan losses was based on comparison with other Authorities of the Commonwealth with similar operations and loan portfolio.

USE OF ESTIMATES IN PREPARING FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

BOND PREMIUM AND DISCOUNT

The difference between the cash received from bondholders at issuance and the amount due to bondholders at maturity is recognized as bond premium or discount. Bond premium or discount is amortized using the straight-line method over the lives of the bonds issued. Due to the recent issuance of the bonds, no amortization was taken in the current period.

This information is an integral part of the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 1 - FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Authority has a net asset deficit of \$20,151,293 as of June 30, 2006. The Authority's business purpose will result in continued losses from operation due to the disbursement of grant awards to help promote economic growth in the Commonwealth. In addition, the Authority is committed to providing part of their bond proceeds to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program, which contributes to the deficit in net assets.

Through a service agreement with the Authority, the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations. Therefore, these factors listed above, do not raise doubt as to the Authority's ability to meet obligations when due.

NOTE 2 – DEPOSITS

Custodial Credit Risk - Deposits

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Authority's deposits may not be returned to it. The Authority does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2006, the Authority's bank balance was exposed to custodial credit risk as follows:

NOTE 3 – LOANS RECEIVABLE

The Authority provides loans, in accordance with its enabling legislation and statutory requirements to spur economic development activity within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The loans have amortization periods not to exceed 20 years and bear interest at rates ranging from 1% to 8% depending on the nature of the loan and the Authority program from which the loan was funded.

The Authority, through the New Venture Capital Investment Program, provides loans to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies.

NOTE 4 - BONDS PAYABLE (CONTINUED)

The Authority, with the Commonwealth approval, issued the above noted revenue bonds to fund the activities of the Authority. Repayments with respect to the revenue bonds are derived solely from project revenues which are defined as annual appropriations by the Commonwealth per the Official Statement. The Revenue Bonds described above are limited obligations of the Authority and are considered non-recourse, as the Authority is not obligated to bondholders beyond amounts received by the Authority from annual appropriations to the Authority by the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has not pledged its full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the payment of the Authority's Revenue Bonds and the payments by the Commonwealth to the Authority are subject to annual appropriation of funds for such purposes by the General Assembly and there is no assurance that such funds will be appropriated in any fiscal year. Repayments of loans do not constitute project revenues.

NOTE 5 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Authority entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, through the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) to provide administrative and operational support services for the Authority. The Authority employs no personnel and owns no capital assets; all employees performing services for the Authority are DCED employees. As such under the memorandum of understanding, the Authority reimburses DCED for services rendered by DCED employees to the Authority. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 the services provided by DCED to Authority and recorded as Administrative/Operating expenses totaled \$1,756,126.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, the Authority received \$5,064,189 in transfers from the Commonwealth to pay debt service with respect to the Revenue Bond. See Note 3 for details with respect to the Revenue Bonds.

NOTE 6 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Authority, through various economic development programs, provided loan guarantees as follows:

The Authority has not been called upon, with respect to any loan guarantees, to make principal or interest payments on behalf of the ultimate borrowers. Accordingly, no liability has been reflected in the Authority's financial statements for loan guarantees.

Through the various Authority loan and grant programs to promote economic development within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Authority has approved loans, investments in venture capital and grants of \$212,905,804 and \$21,000,000 and \$143,226,246, respectively, which have not been disbursed as of June 30, 2006.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, we noted other matters involving the internal control over financial reporting that we have reported to management in a separate letter dated September 21, 2006.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Authority's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The Commonwealth Financing Authority, hereafter referred to as the "Authority," is pleased to present its financial statements developed in compliance with Statement of Governmental Accounting Standard No. 34, entitled "Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments" (hereafter "GASB 34"), and related standards. GASB 34 enhances information provided to the users of its financial statements. This section of the financial reporting package presents our discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance during the years ended June 30, 2007 and 2006. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements that follow this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007, the Authority executed its third \$187.5 million bond issue to fund projects approved for grants, loans, and venture capital investments under established financing programs. Since inception, the Authority has awarded \$891 million to assist 598 economic development projects across the Commonwealth. This investment will leverage more than \$2.7 billion in private investment.
- The Authority board approved an investment strategy to guide the investment of bond proceeds and payments received from approved loan and venture capital investment projects.
- The Authority opened for business the final two of eight programs under its jurisdiction, the Building PA Program and the Venture Guarantee Program and approved investments and guarantees for fund managers.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to, and should be read in conjunction with, the basic audited financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Authority's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The financial statements report information about the Authority using the full accrual method of accounting, as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. The financial statements include a statement of net assets; a statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets; a statement of cash flows; and notes to the financial statements.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the financial position of the Authority on a full accrual historical cost basis. The Statement of Net Assets also presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Over time, increases and decreases in net assets are one indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

While the Statement of Net Assets provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets presents the results of the business-type activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net assets changed during the year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Authority's recovery of its costs.

The Statement of Cash Flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operational, financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipts and cash disbursement information without consideration of the earnings event when an obligation arises, or depreciation of capital assets.

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Authority's accounting policies, significant account balances and activities, long-term debt and subsequent events, if any.

As shown in the table above, operating revenues consist mostly of interest earnings. Nonoperating revenues and expenses consist mainly of a Transfer to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program in the amount of \$60 million and \$15 million for 2007 and 2006, respectively.

Long-Term Debt

During the current audit period, the Authority issued one revenue bond totaling \$187,500,000 to provide funds for loan disbursements, investments in venture capital and grant expenditures. In the prior year, the Authority issued two revenue bonds totaling \$375 million. In addition, the Authority entered into a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the payment of the annual debt service through an annual appropriation by the Commonwealth. However, there is no assurance that there will be sufficient funds appropriated annually by the Commonwealth.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Commonwealth Financing Authority ("Authority") is a body corporate and politic duly organized by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania ("Commonwealth") incorporated under the Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations Act of 2004 ("Act"), being the Act of April 1, 2004, P.L. 163, as amended by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Authority, by virtue of the Act and its articles of incorporation, has all powers as set forth in the Act including those for creation and retention of jobs. The purpose of the Authority is to engage in financial assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, grants and private equity participating loans to promote activities which lead to the creation and retention of jobs within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the establishment of economically viable Pennsylvania Communities, the development of a stable tax base within Pennsylvania Communities, the reuse of abandoned industrial, commercial and other previously utilized sites, the promotion and commercialization of Pennsylvania products and services and investment of private capital in Pennsylvania communities to promote the health, safety, employment, business opportunities, economic activity and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The legislation creating the Authority as well as program specific guidelines establish certain activities to be carried out by the Authority as follows:

- Business in Our Sites Program: provides financial assistance for preparation of sites for future development.
- First Industries Program: provides financial assistance for projects related to tourism and agriculture.
- Second Stage Loan Program: provides loan guarantees to commercial lending institutions that make loans to life sciences, advanced technology or manufacturing businesses.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Guarantee Program: provides guarantees to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies which are in early-stage or mid-stage development.
- Building Pennsylvania Program: provides loans to fund managers for investment in real estate projects in Pennsylvania.
- TIF Guarantee Program: provides guarantees for TIF bonds or other indebtness in accordance with the TIF Act of 1990.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Capital Investments Program: provides loans to Venture Capital partnerships for investment in Pennsylvania Companies.
- Penn Works Program: provides grants and loans for water supply and wastewater infrastructure within Pennsylvania.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Reporting Entity

The Authority has adopted the provisions of Section 2100 of the Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards for the criteria used to evaluate organizations, activities and functions that should be included in the Authority's financial statements. The basic criteria is the exercise of oversight responsibility over such organizations, activities and functions. The Authority has not identified any entities which should be subject to evaluation for inclusion in the Authority's reporting entity.

The Commonwealth appoints the members of the Authority's governing board. The Commonwealth maintains the accounts and records of the Authority. In addition, the Commonwealth employs and supervises personnel to provide administrative services. Therefore, the Authority is considered a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The Authority's financial statements are presented on the full accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Under this basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. The Authority applies Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements as well as Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations, and the Accounting Principles Board (APB) of the Committee of Accounting Procedures issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.

All activities of the Authority are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. A proprietary fund is used to account for operations that are (a) financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the cost (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to the Authority is determined by its measurement focus. The transactions of the Authority are accounted for on a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities associated with the operations are included on the balance sheet. Net assets represent total assets net of total liabilities.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, include cash on hand or on deposit with a maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Allowance for Loan Losses

The allowance for loan losses is a reserve account for possible future loan losses. Loan losses and recoveries of previously charged-off loans are charged or credited directly to the allowance account. The provision for loan losses is adjusted monthly at the rate of 2% of outstanding loan balances at the respective month-end. The provision for loan losses was based on comparison with other Authorities of the Commonwealth with similar operations and loan portfolio.

Loan Origination Fees and Costs

The Authority recognizes loan origination fees and costs in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 91 ("SFAS No. 91"), Accounting for Nonrefundable Fees and Costs Associated with Originating or Acquiring Loans and Initial Direct Costs of Leases. For the years ended June 30, 2007 and 2006, \$774,024 and \$0, respectively, of net deferred fees are included in loans receivable.

Use of Estimates in Preparing Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Bond Premium and Discount

The difference between the cash received from bondholders at issuance and the amount due to bondholders at maturity is recognized as bond premium or discount. Bond premium or discount is amortized using the straight-line method over the lives of the bonds issued.

NOTE 2 - FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Authority has a net asset deficit of \$91,966,254 and \$23,134,033 as of June 30, 2007 and 2006, respectively. The Authority's business purpose will result in continued losses from operation due to the disbursement of grant awards to help promote economic growth in the Commonwealth. In addition, the Authority transferred part of their bond proceeds to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program, which contributes to the deficit in net assets.

Through a service agreement with the Authority, the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations. Therefore, these factors listed above, do not raise doubt as to the Authority's ability to meet obligations when due.

NOTE 3 - DEPOSITS

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Authority's deposits may not be returned to it. The Authority does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2007 and 2006, the Authority's bank balance was exposed to custodial credit risk as follows:

NOTE 4 – LOANS RECEIVABLE

The Authority provides loans, in accordance with its enabling legislation and statutory requirements to spur economic development activity within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The loans have amortization periods not to exceed 20 years and bear interest at rates ranging from 1% to 8% depending on the nature of the loan and the Authority program from which the loan was funded.

The Authority, through the New Venture Capital Investment Program, provides loans to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies.

NOTE 5 - BONDS PAYABLE (CONTINUED)

The Authority, with the Commonwealth approval, issued the above noted revenue bonds to fund the activities of the Authority. Repayments with respect to the revenue bonds are derived solely from project revenues which are defined as annual appropriations by the Commonwealth per the Official Statement. The Revenue Bonds described above are limited obligations of the Authority and are considered non-recourse, as the Authority is not obligated to bondholders beyond amounts received by the Authority from annual appropriations to the Authority by the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has not pledged its full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the payment of the Authority's Revenue Bonds and the payments by the Commonwealth to the Authority are subject to annual appropriation of funds for such purposes by the General Assembly and there is no assurance that such funds will be appropriated in any fiscal year. Repayments of loans do not constitute project revenues.

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Authority entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, through the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) to provide administrative and operational support services for the Authority. The Authority employs one personnel and owns no capital assets; the remaining employees performing services for the Authority are DCED employees. As such under the memorandum of understanding, the Authority reimburses DCED for services rendered by DCED employees to the Authority. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007 and 2006, the services provided by DCED to the Authority and recorded as Administrative/Operating expenses totaled \$2,426,663 and \$1,756,126, respectively.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007 and 2006, the Authority received \$35,468,689 and \$5,064,189, respectively, in transfers from the Commonwealth to pay debt service with respect to Revenue Bonds. See Note 5 for details with respect to the Revenue Bonds.

NOTE 7 – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Authority, through various economic development programs, provided loan guarantees as follows:

The Authority has not been called upon, with respect to any loan guarantees, to make principal or interest payments on behalf of the ultimate borrowers. Accordingly, no liability has been reflected in the Authority's financial statements for loan guarantees.

Through the various Authority loan and grant programs to promote economic development within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Authority has approved loans, investments in venture capital and grants of \$300,107,152, \$27,750,000 and \$176,374,715, respectively, which have not been disbursed as of June 30, 2007.

We have audited the basic financial statements of the Commonwealth Financing Authority ("Authority") as of and for the years ended June 30, 2007 and 2006, and have issued our report thereon dated September 12, 2007. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Authority's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Authority's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management and federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

We have audited the accompanying statements of net assets of the Commonwealth Financing Authority ("Authority") as of June 30, 2008 and 2007, and the related statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets and cash flows for the years ended June 30, 2008 and 2007. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Authority's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The financial position and results of operations of the Authority may not be indicative of that which would have been obtained had the Authority operated independently.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Authority, and the results of its operations and cash flows in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated August 29, 2008 on our consideration of the Authority's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. The Commonwealth Financing Authority, hereafter referred to as the "Authority," is pleased to present its financial statements developed in compliance with Statement of Governmental Accounting Standard No. 34, entitled "Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments" (hereafter "GASB 34"), and related standards. GASB 34 enhances information provided to the users of its financial statements. This section of the financial reporting package presents our discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance during the years ended June 30, 2008 and 2007. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements that follow this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2008, the Authority executed its fourth bond issue in the amount of \$187.5 million to fund projects approved for grants, loans, and venture capital investments under established financing programs. Since inception, the Authority has awarded over \$1 billion to assist 729 economic development projects across the Commonwealth. This investment will leverage more than \$3.2 billion in private investment.
- The economic impact of these economic development projects, many of which are still in planning and early construction phases, already has created more than 7,200 new jobs and almost \$1 billion in private investment.
- The Authority entered into a \$50 million revolving credit agreement with Dexia Bank to ensure sufficient funds are available for demands made on the loan guarantee programs.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to, and should be read in conjunction with, the basic audited financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Authority's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The financial statements report information about the Authority using the full accrual method of accounting, as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. The financial statements include a Statement of Net Assets; a Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets; a Statement of Cash Flows; and notes to the Financial Statements.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the financial position of the Authority on a full accrual historical cost basis. The Statements of Net Assets also presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Over time, increases and decreases in net assets are one indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

COMMONWEALTH FINANCING AUTHORITY (COMPONENT UNIT OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA) MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS June 30, 2008 and 2007

While the Statement of Net Assets provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets presents the results of the business-type activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net assets changed during the year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Authority's recovery of its costs.

The Statement of Cash Flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operational, financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipts and cash disbursement information without consideration of the earnings event when an obligation arises, or depreciation of capital assets.

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Authority's accounting policies, significant account balances and activities, long-term debt and subsequent events, if any.

The Authority issued bonds totaling \$187.5 million for both 2008 and 2007, which caused an increase in total liabilities of \$172.0 and \$176.4 at June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. Due to the issuance of bonds, the Authority has been able to increase the amount of loan originations over the past two years, causing an increase in total assets of \$167.0 and \$106.8 as of June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. Due to the nature of the loans, some of which require drawdowns, funding not immediately disbursed upon Board approval is held as cash and cash equivalents.

The Authority continues to operate with a net asset deficit, partly due to its economic development mission, which includes granting money to applicants for planning and construction projects. In the prior year, the Authority incurred significant non-operating expenses due to the transfer to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program in the amount of \$60 million for 2007. There were no transfers to the Commonwealth under this program for 2008.

Long-Term Debt

During the current audit period, the Authority issued one revenue bond totaling \$187.5 million to provide funds for loan disbursements, investments in venture capital and grant expenditures. Since inception, the Authority has issued four revenue bonds totaling \$750 million. The Authority has a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the payment of the annual debt service through an annual appropriation by the Commonwealth. However, there is no assurance that there will be sufficient funds appropriated annually by the Commonwealth.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Commonwealth Financing Authority ("Authority") is a body corporate and politic duly organized by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania ("Commonwealth") incorporated under the Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations Act of 2004 ("Act"), being the Act of April 1, 2004, P.L. 163, as amended by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Authority, by virtue of the Act and its articles of incorporation, has all powers as set forth in the Act including those for creation and retention of jobs. The purpose of the Authority is to engage in financial assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, grants and private equity participating loans to promote activities which lead to the creation and retention of jobs within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the establishment of economically viable Pennsylvania Communities, the reuse of abandoned industrial, commercial and other previously utilized sites, the promotion and commercialization of Pennsylvania products and services and investment of private capital in Pennsylvania communities to promote the health, safety, employment, business opportunities, economic activity and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The legislation creating the Authority as well as program specific guidelines establish certain activities to be carried out by the Authority as follows:

- Business in Our Sites Program: provides financial assistance for preparation of sites for future development.
- First Industries Program: provides financial assistance for projects related to tourism and agriculture.
- Second Stage Loan Program: provides loan guarantees to commercial lending institutions that make loans to life sciences, advanced technology or manufacturing businesses.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Guarantee Program: provides guarantees to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies which are in early-stage or mid-stage development.
- Building Pennsylvania Program: provides loans to fund managers for investment in real estate projects in Pennsylvania.
- TIF Guarantee Program: provides guarantees for TIF bonds or other indebtedness in accordance with the TIF Act of 1990.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Capital Investments Program: provides loans to Venture Capital partnerships for investment in Pennsylvania Companies.
- Penn Works Program: provides grants and loans for water supply and wastewater infrastructure within Pennsylvania.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Reporting Entity

The Authority has adopted the provisions of Section 2100 of the Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards for the criteria used to evaluate organizations, activities and functions that should be included in the Authority's financial statements. The basic criteria is the exercise of oversight responsibility over such organizations, activities and functions. The Authority has not identified any entities which should be subject to evaluation for inclusion in the Authority's reporting entity.

The Commonwealth appoints the members of the Authority's governing board. The Commonwealth maintains the accounts and records of the Authority. In addition, the Commonwealth employs and supervises personnel to provide administrative services. Therefore, the Authority is considered a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The Authority's financial statements are presented on the full accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Under this basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. The Authority applies Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements as well as Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations, and the Accounting Principles Board (APB) of the Committee of Accounting Procedures issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.

All activities of the Authority are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. A proprietary fund is used to account for operations that are (a) financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the cost (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to the Authority is determined by its measurement focus. The transactions of the Authority are accounted for on a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities associated with the operations are included on the balance sheet. Net assets represent total assets net of total liabilities.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, include cash on hand or on deposit with a maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Allowance for Loan Losses

The allowance for loan losses is a reserve account for possible future loan losses. Loan losses and recoveries of previously charged-off loans are charged or credited directly to the allowance account. The provision for loan losses is adjusted monthly at the rate of 2% of outstanding loan balances at the respective month-end. The provision for loan losses was based on comparison with other Authorities of the Commonwealth with similar operations and loan portfolio.

Loan Origination Fees and Costs

The Authority recognizes loan origination fees and costs in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 91 ("SFAS No. 91"), Accounting for Nonrefundable Fees and Costs Associated with Originating or Acquiring Loans and Initial Direct Costs of Leases. For the years ended June 30, 2008 and 2007, \$536,991 and \$774,024, respectively, of net deferred fees are included in loans receivable.

Use of Estimates in Preparing Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

For comparative purposes, prior year's financial statements have been reclassified to conform to report classifications of the current year. The reclassifications had no effect on net assets.

Bond Premium and Discount

The difference between the cash received from bondholders at issuance and the amount due to bondholders at maturity is recognized as bond premium or discount. Bond premium or discount is amortized using the straight-line method over the lives of the bonds issued.

NOTE 2 - FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Authority has a net asset deficit of \$97,748,515 and \$92,768,838 as of June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. The Authority's business purpose will result in continued losses from operation due to the disbursement of grant awards to help promote economic growth in the Commonwealth. In addition, the Authority transferred part of their bond proceeds in prior years to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program, which contributes to the deficit in net assets.

Through a service agreement with the Authority, the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations. Therefore, these factors listed above, do not raise doubt as to the Authority's ability to meet obligations when due.

NOTE 3 - DEPOSITS

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Authority's deposits may not be returned to it. The Authority does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2008 and 2007, the Authority's bank balance was exposed to custodial credit risk as follows:

Additionally, due to the short-term maturity and types of investments, there is limited interest rate risk.

NOTE 4 - LOANS RECEIVABLE

The Authority provides loans, in accordance with its enabling legislation and statutory requirements to spur economic development activity within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The loans have amortization periods not to exceed 20 years and bear interest at rates ranging from 1% to 8% depending on the nature of the loan and the Authority program from which the loan was funded.

The Authority, through the New Venture Capital Investment Program, provides loans to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies.

The Authority, with the Commonwealth approval, issued the above noted revenue bonds to fund the activities of the Authority. Repayments with respect to the revenue bonds are derived solely from project revenues which are defined as annual appropriations by the Commonwealth per the Official Statement. The Revenue Bonds described above are limited obligations of the Authority and are considered non-recourse, as the Authority is not obligated to bondholders beyond amounts received by the Authority from annual appropriations to the Authority by the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has not pledged its full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the payment of the Authority's Revenue Bonds and the payments by the Commonwealth to the Authority are subject to annual appropriation of funds for such purposes by the General Assembly and there is no assurance that such funds will be appropriated in any fiscal year. Repayments of loans do not constitute project revenues.

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Authority entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, through the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) to provide administrative and operational support services for the Authority. The Authority employs one personnel and owns no capital assets; the remaining employees performing services for the Authority are DCED employees. As such under the Memorandum of Understanding, the Authority reimburses DCED for services rendered by DCED employees to the Authority. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008 and 2007, the services provided by DCED to the Authority and recorded as Administrative/Operating expenses totaled \$2,178,895 and \$2,426,663, respectively.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008 and 2007, the Authority received \$47,037,935 and \$35,468,689, respectively, in transfers from the Commonwealth to pay debt service with respect to Revenue Bonds. See Note 5 for details with respect to the Revenue Bonds.

NOTE 7 - LINE OF CREDIT

The Authority has available a secured line of credit with a bank, which, under a revolving credit agreement, is limited to borrowings of \$50,000,000. Under the revolving credit agreement, interest shall accrue on the aggregate unpaid principal amount outstanding on the draws. As of June 30, 2008 and 2007, no funds were drawn under the revolving credit agreement.

NOTE 8 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Authority has not been called upon, with respect to any loan guarantees, to make principal or interest payments on behalf of the ultimate borrowers. Accordingly, no liability has been reflected in the Authority's financial statements for loan guarantees.

Through the various Authority loan and grant programs to promote economic development within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Authority has approved loans, investments in venture capital and grants of \$181,973,899, \$27,500,000 and \$39,398,626, respectively, which have not been disbursed as of June 30, 2008.

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Independent Auditor's Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with Government Auditing Standards

We have audited the basic financial statements of the Commonwealth Financing Authority ("Authority") as of and for the years ended June 30, 2008, and have issued our report thereon dated August 29, 2008. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Authority's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be significant deficiencies.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. We consider the deficiency described below to be a significant deficiency in internal control over financial reporting.

During the course of the audit, we discovered several misstatements, that combined had a material effect on the Authority's financial statements. Specifically, adjustments were made to properly record issuance costs and bond premium for the 2008 bond issuance and to correct errors made in recording the accrued interest income for loans and accrued interest expense for bonds payable at year-end. We recommend that management establish procedures for review and approval of journal entries for accuracy and completeness in the recording of month-end accruals and all components of a bond issuance.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control that might be significant deficiencies and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, we believe that the significant deficiency described above is not a material weakness.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Authority's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the audit committee, management and federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

We have audited the accompanying statements of net assets of the Commonwealth Financing Authority (Authority), a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as of June 30, 2009 and 2008, and the related statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets and cash flows for the years then ended, which collectively comprise the Authority's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Authority's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

As discussed in the Notes, the financial statements present only financial information about the Commonwealth Financing Authority and are not intended to present fairly the financial position of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the results of its operations and cash flows of its proprietary and similar trust fund types in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The Authority is a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (Commonwealth). As disclosed in Note 1 of the financial statements, the Authority has extensive transactions and relationships with certain Commonwealth affiliated agencies. The financial position and results of operations of the Authority may not be indicative of that which would have been obtained had the Authority operated independently.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Authority, and the results of its operations and cash flows in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 8, 2009 on our consideration of the Authority's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis as referenced in the Table of Contents is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

COMMONWEALTH FINANCING AUTHORITY (COMPONENT UNIT OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA) MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS June 30, 2009 and 2008

The Commonwealth Financing Authority, hereafter referred to as the "Authority," is pleased to present its financial statements developed in compliance with Statement of Governmental Accounting Standard No. 34, entitled "Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments" (hereafter GASB 34), and related standards. GASB 34 enhances information provided to the users of its financial statements. This section of the financial reporting package presents our discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance during the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements that follow this section.

OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Authority implemented two major legislative initiatives approved by the General Assembly in July 2008. Three new grant programs to repair high hazard unsafe dams, construct flood control projects, and repair water and sewer systems began accepting applications in December 2008. 774 applications requesting over \$3 billion were received for consideration under the \$800 million H20 PA programs. The Authority also began accepting applications under four new programs to promote alternative energy production, energy conservation, and manufacturing of alternative energy equipment in the Commonwealth. The Authority will raise \$500 million through bond sales to fund the new energy programs.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to, and should be read in conjunction with, the basic audited financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Authority's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The financial statements report information about the Authority using the full accrual method of accounting, as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. The financial statements include a Statement of Net Assets; a Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets; a Statement of Cash Flows; and Notes to the Financial Statements.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the financial position of the Authority on a full accrual historical cost basis. The Statement of Net Assets also presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Over time, increases and decreases in net assets are one indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

While the Statement of Net Assets provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets presents the results of the business-type activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net assets changed during the year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Authority's recovery of its costs.

The Statement of Cash Flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operational, financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipt and cash disbursement information without consideration of the earnings event when an obligation arises, or depreciation of capital assets.

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Authority's accounting policies, significant account balances and activities, long-term debt and subsequent events, if any.

The Authority issued bonds totaling \$100 million and \$187.5 million in 2009 and 2008, respectively, which caused an increase in total liabilities of \$73 million and \$172 million at June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively. Due to the issuance of bonds, the Authority has been able to increase the amount of loan originations over the past two years, causing an increase in total assets of \$90 million and \$167 million as of June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively. Due to the nature of the loans, some of which require drawdowns, funding not immediately disbursed upon Board approval is held as cash and cash equivalents.

Long-Term Debt

During 2009, the Authority issued one revenue bond totaling \$100 million to provide funds for loan disbursements and grant expenditures under Alternative Energy programs. Since inception, the Authority has issued five revenue bonds totaling \$850 million. The Authority has a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the payment of the annual debt service through an annual appropriation by the Commonwealth. However, there is no assurance that there will be sufficient funds appropriated annually by the Commonwealth.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Commonwealth Financing Authority (Authority) is a body corporate and politic duly organized by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (Commonwealth) incorporated under the Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations Act of 2004 (Act), being the Act of April 1, 2004, P.L. 163, as amended by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Authority, by virtue of the Act and its articles of incorporation, has all powers as set forth in the Act including those for creation and retention of jobs. The purpose of the Authority is to engage in financial assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, grants and private equity participating loans to promote activities which lead to the use of alternative and clean energy, the creation and retention of jobs within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the establishment of economically viable Pennsylvania communities, the development of a stable tax base within Pennsylvania communities, the reuse of abandoned industrial, commercial and other previously utilized sites, the promotion and commercialization of Pennsylvania products and services and investment of private capital in Pennsylvania communities to promote the health, safety, employment, business opportunities, economic activity and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth.

The legislation creating the Authority as well as program specific guidelines establishes certain activities to be carried out by the Authority as follows:

- Business in Our Sites Program: provides financial assistance for preparation of sites for future development.
- First Industries Program: provides financial assistance for projects related to tourism and agriculture.
- Second Stage Loan Program: provides loan guarantees to commercial lending institutions that make loans to life sciences, advanced technology or manufacturing businesses.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Guarantee Program: provides guarantees to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies which are in early-stage or mid-stage development.
- Building Pennsylvania Program: provides loans to fund managers for investment in real estate projects in Pennsylvania.
- TIF Guarantee Program: provides guarantees for TIF bonds or other indebtedness in accordance with the TIF Act of 1990.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Capital Investments Program: provides loans to Venture Capital partnerships for investment in Pennsylvania companies.
- Penn Works Program: provides grants and loans for water supply and wastewater infrastructure within Pennsylvania.
- H₂O PA Program: provides for single-year or multi-year grants to municipalities or municipal
 authorities to assist with the construction of flood control projects, drinking water, sanitary
 sewer and storm sewer projects, and the repair of high hazard unsafe dams.
- Solar Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the generation and use of solar energy and the manufacture or assembly of solar equipment.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

- Renewable Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the use of wind and geothermal energy.
- Alternative and Clean Energy Program: provides grant and loan funds to encourage the implementation of alternative energy production projects and clean energy projects.
- High performance Buildings: provides grants and loans for the construction of energy efficient buildings.

Reporting Entity

The Authority has adopted the provisions of Section 2100 of the Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards for the criteria used to evaluate organizations, activities and functions that should be included in the Authority's financial statements. The basic criteria are the exercise of oversight responsibility over such organizations, activities and functions. The Authority has not identified any entities which should be subject to evaluation for inclusion in the Authority's reporting entity.

The Commonwealth appoints the members of the Authority's governing board. The Commonwealth maintains the accounts and records of the Authority. In addition, the Commonwealth employs and supervises personnel to provide administrative services. Therefore, the Authority is considered a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The Authority's financial statements are presented on the full accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Under this basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. The Authority applies Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements as well as Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations, and the Accounting Principles Board (APB) of the Committee of Accounting Procedures issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.

All activities of the Authority are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. A proprietary fund is used to account for operations that are (a) financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the cost (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

NOTE 1 -- SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation (Continued)

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to the Authority is determined by its measurement focus. The transactions of the Authority are accounted for on a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities associated with the operations are included on the balance sheet. Net assets represent total assets net of total liabilities.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, include cash on hand or on deposit with a maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

Allowance for Loan Losses

The allowance for loan losses is a reserve account for possible future loan losses. Loan losses and recoveries of previously charged-off loans are charged or credited directly to the allowance account. The provision for loan losses is adjusted monthly at the rate of 2% of outstanding loan balances at the respective month-end. The provision for loan losses was based on comparison with other Authorities of the Commonwealth with similar operations and loan portfolio.

Interest Income

Interest income on investment securities and loans are recorded when earned.

Uncollectible interest on loans that are contractually past due is charged off, or an allowance is established based on management's periodic evaluations. The allowance is established by a charge-to-interest income equal to all previously accrued, and income is subsequently recognized only to the extent that cash payments are received until, in management's judgment, the borrower's ability to make period interest and principal payments is back to normal.

In addition to fixed interest arrangements, some loans contain provisions which provide lump sum interest payments based upon certain conditions being met. This additional income is recognized when earned.

Loan Origination Fees and Costs

The Authority recognizes loan origination fees and costs in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 91 (SFAS No. 91), Accounting for Nonrefundable Fees and Costs Associated with Originating or Acquiring Loans and Initial Direct Costs of Leases. For the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, \$248,320 and \$536,991, respectively, of net deferred fees are included in loans receivable.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Use of Estimates in Preparing Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

For comparative purposes, the prior year's financial statements have been reclassified to conform to report classifications of the current year. The reclassifications had no effect on net assets.

Bond Premium and Discount

The difference between the cash received from bondholders at issuance and the amount due to bondholders at maturity is recognized as bond premium or discount. Bond premium or discount is amortized using the straight-line method over the lives of the bonds issued.

NOTE 2 - FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Authority has a net asset deficit of \$80,765,372 and \$97,748,515 as of June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively. The Authority's business purpose will result in continued losses from operation due to the disbursement of grant awards to help promote economic growth in the Commonwealth. In addition, the Authority transferred part of their bond proceeds in prior years to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program, which contributed to the deficit in net assets.

Through a service agreement with the Authority, the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations. Therefore, these factors listed above do not raise doubt as to the Authority's ability to meet obligations when due.

NOTE 3 - DEPOSITS

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Authority's deposits may not be returned to it. The Authority does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2009 and 2008, the Authority's bank balance was exposed to custodial credit risk as follows:

NOTE 4 – LOANS RECEIVABLE

The Authority provides loans, in accordance with its enabling legislation and statutory requirements to spur economic development activity within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The loans have amortization periods not to exceed 20 years and bear interest at rates ranging from 1% to 8% depending on the nature of the loan and the Authority program from which the loan was funded.

The Authority, through the New Venture Capital Investment Program, provides loans to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies.

The Authority, with the Commonwealth approval, issued the above noted revenue bonds to fund the activities of the Authority. Repayments with respect to the revenue bonds are derived solely from project revenues which are defined as annual appropriations by the Commonwealth per the Official Statement. The Revenue Bonds described above are limited obligations of the Authority and are considered non-recourse, as the Authority is not obligated to bondholders beyond amounts received by the Authority from annual appropriations to the Authority by the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has not pledged its full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the payment of the Authority's Revenue Bonds and the payments by the Commonwealth to the Authority are subject to annual appropriation of funds for such purposes by the General Assembly and there is no assurance that such funds will be appropriated in any fiscal year. Repayments of loans do not constitute project revenues.

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Authority entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, through the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) to provide administrative and operational support services for the Authority. The Authority owns no capital assets; the employees performing services for the Authority are DCED employees. As such, under the Memorandum of Understanding, the Authority reimburses DCED for services rendered by DCED employees to the Authority. During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, the services provided by DCED to the Authority and recorded as Administrative/Operating expenses totaled \$2,145,097 and \$2,178,895, respectively.

During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, the Authority received \$63,421,755 and \$47,037,935, respectively, in transfers from the Commonwealth to pay debt service with respect to Revenue Bonds. See Note 5 for details with respect to the Revenue Bonds.

NOTE 7 - LINE OF CREDIT

The Authority has available a secured line of credit with a bank, which, under a revolving credit agreement, is limited to borrowings of \$50,000,000. Under the revolving credit agreement, interest shall accrue on the aggregate unpaid principal amount outstanding on the draws. As of June 30, 2009 and 2008, no funds were drawn under the revolving credit agreement. As of June 30, 2009, the line of credit was terminated.

NOTE 8 – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Authority has not been called upon, with respect to any loan guarantees, to make principal or interest payments on behalf of the ultimate borrowers. Accordingly, no liability has been reflected in the Authority's financial statements for loan guarantees.

Through the various Authority loan and grant programs to promote economic development within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Authority has approved loans, investments in venture capital and grants of \$223,206,530, \$2,725,000 and \$83,541,697, respectively, which have not been disbursed as of June 30, 2009.

We have audited the basic financial statements of the Commonwealth Financing Authority (Authority) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, and have issued our report thereon dated September 8, 2009. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Authority's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Authority's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Authority's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We noted certain matters that we reported to management of the Authority in a separate letter dated September 8, 2009.

We have audited the accompanying statements of net assets of the Commonwealth Financing Authority (the Authority), a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as of June 30, 2010 and 2009, and the related statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets and cash flows for the years then ended, which collectively comprise the Authority's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Authority's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. As disclosed in Note 1 of the financial statements, the Authority has extensive transactions and relationships with certain Commonwealth affiliated agencies. The financial position and results of operations of the Authority may not be indicative of that which would have been obtained had the Authority operated independently.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Authority, and the results of its operations and cash flows in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.



In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 8, 2010 on our consideration of the Authority's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. COMMONWEALTH FINANCING AUTHORITY (COMPONENT UNIT OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA) MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS June 30, 2010 and 2009

The Commonwealth Financing Authority, hereafter referred to as the "Authority," is pleased to present its financial statements developed in compliance with Statement of Governmental Accounting Standard No. 34, entitled "Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments" (hereafter GASB 34), and related standards. GASB 34 enhances information provided to the users of its financial statements. This section of the financial reporting package presents our discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance during the years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements that follow this section.

OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Authority deployed investments into two major legislative initiatives this Fiscal Year. By approving a combined \$95.7 million in grant, loan and loan guarantee funding assistance into alternative energy projects, the Authority accelerated the use of alternative and clean energy in the Commonwealth. Applicants received assistance under four energy programs, which include the Solar Energy Program, Renewable Energy Program, Alternative & Clean Energy Program and the High Performance Building Program.

The Authority provided \$551 million in funding, which consists of grants for the construction and upgrading of drinking water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer systems. In raising capital for this H_2O initiative, the Authority issued Build America Bonds which will save over \$46 million in debt service over the life of the bonds.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to, and should be read in conjunction with, the basic audited financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Authority's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The financial statements report information about the Authority using the full accrual method of accounting, as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. The financial statements include a Statement of Net Assets; a Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets; a Statement of Cash Flows; and Notes to the Financial Statements.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the financial position of the Authority on a full accrual historical cost basis. The Statement of Net Assets also presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Over time, increases and decreases in net assets are one indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

While the Statement of Net Assets provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets presents the results of the business-type activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net assets changed during the year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Authority's recovery of its costs.

COMMONWEALTH FINANCING AUTHORITY (COMPONENT UNIT OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA) MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS June 30, 2010 and 2009

The Statement of Cash Flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operational, financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipt and cash disbursement information without consideration of the earnings event when an obligation arises, or depreciation of capital assets.

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Authority's accounting policies, significant account balances and activities, long-term debt and subsequent events, if any.

The Authority issued bonds totaling \$542 million and \$100 million in 2010 and 2009, respectively, which caused an increase in total liabilities of \$520 million and \$73 million at June 30, 2010 and 2009, respectively. Due to the issuance of bonds, the Authority has been able to increase the amount of loan originations over the past two years, causing an increase in total assets of \$314 million and \$90 million as of June 30, 2010 and 2009, respectively. Due to the nature of the loans, some of which require drawdowns, funding not immediately disbursed upon Board approval is held as cash and cash equivalents.

The significant increase in the total net deficit is attributable to \$123 million in Authority assets disbursed as grant proceeds under the H_2O initiative, \$85 million in assets that were transferred to the Department of Environmental Protection and \$13 million in assets transferred to the Ben Franklin Technology Development Partners. The transfer of bond proceeds to these Governmental entities was prescribed by legislation. Management acknowledges but is not concerned with the annual net asset deficit. As an authority under which economic stimulus programs are established, grants and transfers to other governmental entities are essential to achieve its mission. The Authority has a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in which the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations to assist the Authority in funding the deficit.

Operating expenses increased by approximately \$120 million in FY 2010 and decreased by approximately \$17 million in FY 2009 due to the timing of grant payments. The Authority established 7 new programs related to H_20 and Alternative Energy initiatives at the end of FY 2009 that provided grants that were disbursed in FY 2010. Under the H_2O program, the Authority received and reviewed over 800 applications for funding assistance.

For the year ended June 30, 2010, nonoperating income decreased by approximately \$100 million over FY 2009 due to the transfer of \$98 million in bond proceeds to other governmental entities within the Commonwealth and a \$20 million increase in bond interest payments. This was offset by an increase in the Commonwealth appropriation of \$18 million for debt service payments.

Long-Term Debt

During 2010, the Authority issued revenue bonds for \$142 million to provide funds for loan disbursements and grant expenditures under Alternative Energy programs. In addition, the Authority issued \$400 million in Build America Bonds to provide for grant funding for flood control, repairs to dams and water and sewer projects. Since inception, the Authority has issued seven revenue bonds totaling \$1.392 billion. The Authority has a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the payment of the annual debt service through an annual appropriation by the Commonwealth. However, there is no assurance that there will be sufficient funds appropriated annually by the Commonwealth.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Commonwealth Financing Authority (the Authority) is a body corporate and politic duly organized by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (the Commonwealth) incorporated under the Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations Act of 2004 (Act), being the Act of April 1, 2004, P.L. 163, as amended by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Authority, by virtue of the Act and its articles of incorporation, has all powers as set forth in the Act including those for creation and retention of jobs. The purpose of the Authority is to engage in financial assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, grants and private equity participating loans to promote activities which lead to the use of alternative and clean energy, the creation and retention of jobs within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the establishment of economically viable Pennsylvania communities, the development of a stable tax base within Pennsylvania communities, the reuse of abandoned industrial, commercial and other previously utilized sites, the promotion and commercialization of Pennsylvania products and services and investment of private capital in Pennsylvania communities to promote the health, safety, employment, business opportunities, economic activity and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth.

The legislation creating the Authority as well as program specific guidelines establishes certain activities to be carried out by the Authority as follows:

- Business in Our Sites Program: provides financial assistance for preparation of sites for future development.
- First Industries Program: provides financial assistance for projects related to tourism and agriculture.
- Second Stage Loan Program: provides loan guarantees to commercial lending institutions that make loans to life sciences, advanced technology or manufacturing businesses.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Guarantee Program: provides guarantees to venture capital
 partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies which are in early-stage or
 mid-stage development.
- Building Pennsylvania Program: provides loans to fund managers for investment in real estate projects in Pennsylvania.
- TIF Guarantee Program: provides guarantees for TIF bonds or other indebtedness in accordance with the TIF Act of 1990.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Capital Investments Program: provides loans to Venture Capital partnerships for investment in Pennsylvania companies.
- Penn Works Program: provides grants and loans for water supply and wastewater infrastructure within Pennsylvania.
- H₂O PA Program (Water and Sewer): provides for single-year or multi-year grants to municipalities or municipal authorities to assist with the construction of flood control projects, drinking water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer projects, and the repair of high hazard unsafe dams.

- Solar Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the generation and use of solar energy and the manufacture or assembly of solar equipment.
- Renewable Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the use of wind and geothermal energy.
- Alternative and Clean Energy Program: provides grant and loan funds to encourage the implementation of alternative energy production projects and clean energy projects.
- High performance Buildings: provides grants and loans for the construction of energy efficient buildings.

Reporting Entity

The Authority has adopted the provisions of Section 2100 of the Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards for the criteria used to evaluate organizations, activities and functions that should be included in the Authority's financial statements. The basic criteria are the exercise of oversight responsibility over such organizations, activities and functions. The Authority has not identified any entities which should be subject to evaluation for inclusion in the Authority's reporting entity.

The Commonwealth appoints the members of the Authority's governing board. The Commonwealth maintains the accounts and records of the Authority. In addition, the Commonwealth employs and supervises personnel to provide administrative services. Therefore, the Authority is considered a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The Authority's financial statements are presented on the full accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Under this basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. The Authority applies Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements as well as

Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) statements and interpretations, and the Accounting Principles Board (APB) of the Committee of Accounting Procedures issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.

All activities of the Authority are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. A proprietary fund is used to account for operations that are (a) financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the cost (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination of revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation (Continued)

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to the Authority is determined by its measurement focus. The transactions of the Authority are accounted for on a flow of economic resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities associated with the operations are included on the balance sheet. Net assets represent total assets net of total liabilities.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, include cash on hand or on deposit in highly liquid financial debt instruments with a maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

Allowance for Loan Losses

The allowance for loan losses is a reserve account for possible future loan losses. Loan losses and recoveries of previously charged-off loans are charged or credited directly to the allowance account. The provision for loan losses is adjusted monthly at the rate of 2% of outstanding loan balances at the respective month-end. The provision for loan losses was based on comparison with other Authorities of the Commonwealth with similar operations and loan portfolio.

Interest Income

Interest income on investment securities and loans are recorded when earned.

Uncollectible interest on loans that are contractually past due is charged off, or an allowance is established based on management's periodic evaluations. The allowance is established by a charge-to-interest income equal to all previously accrued, and income is subsequently recognized only to the extent that cash payments are received until, in management's judgment, the borrower's ability to make periodic interest and principal payments is back to normal.

In addition to fixed interest arrangements, some loans contain provisions which provide lump sum interest payments based upon certain conditions being met. This additional income is recognized when earned.

Loan Origination Fees and Costs

The Authority recognizes loan origination fees and costs in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 91 (SFAS No. 91), Accounting for Nonrefundable Fees and Costs Associated with Originating or Acquiring Loans and Initial Direct Costs of Leases.

For the years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009, \$259,258 and \$248,320, respectively, of net deferred fees are included in loans receivable.

Use of Estimates in Preparing Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

For comparative purposes, the prior year's financial statements have been reclassified to conform to report classifications of the current year. The reclassifications had no effect on net assets.

Bond Premium and Discount

The difference between the cash received from bondholders at issuance and the amount due to bondholders at maturity is recognized as bond premium or discount. Bond premium or discount is amortized using the straight-line method over the lives of the bonds issued, which approximates the interest method.

Bond Issuance Costs

Bond issuance costs consist of legal, underwriting and other fees charged in connection with the issuance of bond debt. The costs are amortized over the lives of the bonds, which range from 20 to 30 years. The bonds mature serially through 2039. Amortization was \$545,267 and \$443,797 for the years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

NOTE 2 - FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Authority has a net asset deficit of \$287,047,426 and \$80,765,372 as of June 30, 2010 and 2009, respectively. The Authority's business purpose will result in continued losses from operation due to the disbursement of grant awards to help promote economic growth in the Commonwealth. In addition, the Authority transferred part of their bond proceeds to the Commonwealth Department of Environmental Protection and the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority in the current year and in prior years to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program, which contributed to the deficit in net assets.

Through a service agreement with the Authority, the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations. Therefore, these factors listed above do not raise doubt as to the Authority's ability to meet obligations when due.

NOTE 3 - DEPOSITS

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Authority's deposits may not be returned to it. The Authority does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2010 and 2009, the Authority's bank balance was exposed to custodial credit risk as follows:

Additionally, due to the short-term maturity and types of investments, there is limited interest rate risk.

NOTE 4 – LOANS RECEIVABLE

The Authority provides loans, in accordance with its enabling legislation and statutory requirements to spur economic development activity within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The loans have amortization periods not to exceed 20 years and bear interest at rates ranging from 1% to 8% depending on the nature of the loan and the Authority program from which the loan was funded.

The Authority, through the New Venture Capital Investment Program, provides loans to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies.

The Authority, with the Commonwealth approval, issued the above noted revenue bonds to fund the activities of the Authority. Repayments with respect to the revenue bonds are derived solely from project revenues which are defined as annual appropriations by the Commonwealth per the Official Statement. The Revenue Bonds described above are limited obligations of the Authority and are considered non-recourse, as the Authority is not obligated to bondholders beyond amounts received by the Authority from annual appropriations to the Authority by the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has not pledged its full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the payment of the Authority's Revenue Bonds and the payments by the Commonwealth to the Authority are subject to annual appropriation of funds for such purposes by the General Assembly and there is no assurance that such funds will be appropriated in any fiscal year. Repayments of loans do not constitute project revenues.

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Authority entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, through the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) and the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to provide administrative and operational support services for the Authority. The Authority owns no capital assets; the employees performing services for the Authority are DCED employees. As such, under the Memorandum of Understanding, the Authority reimburses DCED for services rendered by DCED employees to the Authority. During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009, the services provided by DCED to the Authority and recorded as Administrative/Operating expenses totaled \$2,650,469 and \$2,145,097, respectively.

During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009, the Authority received \$81,654,535 and \$63,421,755, respectively, in transfers from the Commonwealth to pay debt service with respect to Revenue Bonds. See Note 5 for details with respect to the Revenue Bonds.

The Authority transferred part of their bond proceeds to the Commonwealth Department of Environment Protection and the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority totaling \$98,000,000 and \$0 for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2010 and 2009 respectively.

NOTE 7 – LINE OF CREDIT

In December 2009, the Authority entered into a secured line of credit with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Treasury Department, which, under a revolving credit agreement, is limited to borrowings of \$50,000,000. Under the revolving credit agreement, interest shall accrue on the aggregate unpaid principal amount outstanding on the draws. The interest rate is the greater of the rate of the United States Federal Funds Target Rate plus 75 basis points or the rate set by the British Bankers Association for London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR) for a six month term in United States dollars plus 45 basis points. The interest rate is reset as of the 20th of each month. As of June 30, 2010, the interest rate was 1.20%; however, no funds were drawn under the revolving credit agreement.

The Authority has been called upon, with respect to one loan guarantee, to make principal or interest payments on behalf of the ultimate borrowers. Accordingly, a liability totaling \$112,074 has been reflected in the Authority's financial statements for loan guarantees as of June 30, 2010. There were no liabilities recorded for loan guarantees as of June 30, 2009.

Through the various Authority loan and grant programs to promote economic development within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Authority has approved loans, investments in venture capital and grants of \$35,632,203, \$2,725,000 and \$168,573,323, respectively, which have not been disbursed as of June 30, 2010.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Authority's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Authority's internal control over financial reporting.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Authority's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the basic financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the business-type activities of the AUTHORITY as of June 30, 2011, and the changes in financial position and cash flows thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated September 30, 2011, on our consideration of the AUTHORITY's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters as of and for the year ended June 30, 2011. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

As discussed in Note 1 to the financial statements, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011 the AUTHORITY adopted the provisions of Governmental Accounting Standards Board's Statement No. 59, "Financial Instruments Omnibus".

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the managements discussion and analysis on pages 2 through 3 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquires of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquires, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

The Commonwealth Financing Authority, hereafter referred to as the "Authority," is pleased to present its financial statements developed in compliance with Statement of Governmental Accounting Standard No. 34, entitled "Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments" (hereafter GASB 34), and related standards. GASB 34 enhances information provided to the users of its financial statements. This section of the financial reporting package presents our discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance during the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements that follow this section.

OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Over the past two fiscal years, the Authority has approved 463 projects totaling \$728 million in funding under the H2O initiative. This program provides funding for the construction and upgrading of drinking water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer systems. In raising capital for this H2O initiative, the Authority issued Build America Bonds which will save over \$61 million in debt service over the life of the bonds.

The Authority deployed investments into another major legislative initiative this Fiscal Year. By approving 97 projects totaling \$44 million in grant funding assistance, the Authority helped to support and enhance community and economic well-being and mitigate the impact of gaming and related activity. The program is capitalized by revenue generated from gaming operations in Luzerne and Monroe Counties. Projects are located in Carbon, Lackawanna, Luzerne, Monroe, Northampton, Pike, and Wayne Counties.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to, and should be read in conjunction with, the basic audited financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Authority's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The financial statements report information about the Authority using the full accrual method of accounting, as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. The financial statements include a Statement of Net Assets; a Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets; a Statement of Cash Flows; and Notes to the Financial Statements.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the financial position of the Authority on a full accrual historical cost basis. The Statement of Net Assets also presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Over time, increases and decreases in net assets are one indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

While the Statement of Net Assets provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets presents the results of the business-type activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net assets changed during the year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Authority's recovery of its costs.

The Statement of Cash Flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operational, financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipt and cash disbursement information without consideration of the earnings event when an obligation arises, or depreciation of capital assets.

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Authority's accounting policies, significant account balances and activities, long-term debt and subsequent events, if any.

The Authority issued bonds totaling \$150 million and \$542 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively, which were the primary causes of the increase in total liabilities of \$117 million and \$520 million at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. In 2011, the Authority's total assets declined by \$52 million due to the transfer of \$38 million to other Commonwealth agencies for initiatives prescribed under legislation and also due to grant disbursements, particularly H2O program grants. As a result of the issuance of bonds in 2010, the Authority was able to increase the amount of loan originations during the year, causing an increase in total assets of \$314 million as of June 30, 2010. Due to the nature of the loans, some of which require drawdowns, funding not immediately disbursed upon Board approval is held as cash and cash equivalents. Operating expenses declined as compared to the previous year by \$0.4 million. The reduction corresponds to the reduced staff time necessary to review and process application for funding during 2011. In 2010, staffing requirements associated with the H2O and Alternative Energy initiatives resulted in higher administrative expenses. In 2010, the Authority received and reviewed over 800 applications for funding assistance under the H2O program.

The significant increase in the total net deficit is attributable to the \$217 million in Authority assets disbursed as grant proceeds, the \$25 million in assets that were transferred to the Department of Environmental Protection and the \$13 million in assets transferred to the Ben Franklin Technology Development Partners. The transfer of bond proceeds to these Governmental entities was prescribed by legislation. Management acknowledges but is not concerned with the annual net asset deficit. As an authority under which economic stimulus programs are established, grants and transfers to other governmental entities are essential to achieve its mission.

During 2011, the Authority issued revenue bonds for \$150 million to provide funds for grant expenditures under the H2O program. This bond issuance consisted of a \$97 million Build America Bond component. Since inception, the Authority has issued eight revenue bonds totaling \$1.542 billion. The Authority has a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the payment of the annual debt service through an annual appropriation by the Commonwealth, and transfers from the Gaming Economic Development Tourism Fund. However, there is no assurance that there will be sufficient funds appropriated annually by the Commonwealth.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Organization

The Commonwealth Financing Authority ("the Authority") is a body corporate and politic duly organized by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania ("the Commonwealth") incorporated under the Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations Act of 2004 (Act), being the Act of April 1, 2004, P.L. 163, as amended by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Authority, by virtue of the Act and its articles of incorporation, has all powers as set forth in the Act including those for creation and retention of jobs. The purpose of the Authority is to engage in financial assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, grants and private equity participating loans to promote activities which lead to the use of alternative and clean energy, the creation and retention of jobs within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the establishment of economically viable Pennsylvania communities, the development of a stable tax base within Pennsylvania communities, the reuse of abandoned industrial, commercial and other previously utilized sites, the promotion and commercialization of Pennsylvania products and services and investment of private capital in Pennsylvania communities to promote the health, safety, employment, business opportunities, economic activity and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth.

The Commonwealth appoints the members of the Authority's governing board. The Commonwealth maintains the accounts and records of the Authority. In addition the Commonwealth employs and supervises personnel to provide administrative services. Therefore, the Authority is considered a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The legislation creating the Authority as well as program specific guidelines establishes certain activities to be carried out by the Authority as follows:

- Business in Our Sites Program: provides financial assistance for preparation of sites for future development.
- First Industries Program: provides financial assistance for projects related to tourism and agriculture.
- Second Stage Loan Program: provides loan guarantees to commercial lending institutions that make loans to life sciences, advanced technology or manufacturing businesses.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Guarantee Program: provides guarantees to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies which are in early-stage or mid-stage development.
- Building Pennsylvania Program: provides loans to fund managers for investment in real estate projects in Pennsylvania.
- Tax Increment Financing "TIF" Guarantee Program: provides guarantees for TIF bonds or other indebtedness in accordance with the TIF Act of 1990.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Capital Investments Program: provides loans to Venture Capital partnerships for investment in Pennsylvania companies.
- Penn Works Program: provides grants and loans for water supply and wastewater infrastructure within Pennsylvania.
- H₂O PA Program (Water and Sewer): provides for single-year or multi-year grants to municipalities or municipal authorities to assist with the construction of flood control projects, drinking water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer projects, and the repair of high hazard unsafe dams.

- Solar Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the generation and use of solar energy and the manufacture or assembly of solar equipment.
- Renewable Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the use of wind and geothermal energy.
- Alternative and Clean Energy Program: provides grant and loan funds to encourage the implementation of alternative energy production projects and clean energy projects.
- High Performance Buildings: provides grants and loans for the construction of energy efficient buildings.
- Local Share Account: provides grants to support and enhance community and economic well-being and mitigate the impact of gaming and related activities..

B. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The Authority follows Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). GAAP allows specialized accounting for government entities, which is governed by pronouncements set by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). Pronouncements set by the GASB may differ from pronouncements set by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB).

The Authority is considered a special-purpose government since it is engaged solely in business-type activities under GASB Statement No. 34. The Authority's financial statements are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when they have been incurred. The statements are intended to report the Authority as an economic unit that includes all measurable assets and liabilities, financial and capital, of the Authority.

All activities of the Authority are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. A proprietary fund is used to account for operations that are (a) financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination or revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

The Authority follows the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis. Within the Statements of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets, Statement No. 34 requires operating income and expenses to be separated from non-operating income in order to report net operating income. Operating income and expenses are defined as those activities directly related to the Authority's primary business of providing employment through economic development lending. Non-operating revenues and expenses consist of those revenues and expenses that are related to financing and investing types of activities and result from non-exchange transactions, such as investment income/loss.

The Authority follows Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 20, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Proprietary Funds and Other Governmental Entities That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting for reporting and disclosure purposes. As permitted by Statement No. 20, the Authority has elected not to apply Financial Accounting Standards Board pronouncements issued after November 30, 1989 unless GASB specifically adopts the FASB Statement or Interpretation.

C. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, include cash on hand or on deposit in highly liquid financial debt instruments with a maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

D. Allowance for Loan Losses

The allowance for loan losses is a reserve account for possible future loan losses. Provision for loan losses is credited to the allowance account. Loan losses which are charged-off and recoveries of previously charged-off loans are charged or credited directly to the allowance account. The provision for loan losses is adjusted monthly at the rate of 2% of outstanding loan balances at the respective month-end.

E. Interest Income

Interest income on cash equivalents and loans are recorded when earned.

Uncollectible interest on loans that are contractually past due is charged off, or an allowance established based on management's periodic evaluations. The allowance is established by a charge-to-interest income equal to all previously accrued, and income is subsequently recognized only to the extent that cash payments are received until, in management's judgment, the borrower's ability to make periodic interest and principal payments is back to normal.

In addition to fixed interest arrangements, some loans contain provisions which provide lump sum interest payments based upon certain conditions being met. The additional income is recognized when earned.

F. Loan Origination Fees and Costs

The Authority recognizes loan origination fees and costs in accordance with FASB Accounting Standards Codification 310-20, Receivables – Nonrefundable Fees and Other Costs (formerly Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 91, Accounting for Nonrefundable Fees and Costs Associated with Originating or Acquiring Loans and Initial Direct Costs of Leases).

For the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, \$310,570 and \$259,258, respectively, of net deferred fees are included in loans receivable.

G. Bond Issuance Costs

Bond issuance costs consist of legal, underwriting and other fees charged in connection with the issuance of bond debt. The costs are amortized over the lives of the bonds, which range from 20 to 30 years. The bonds mature through 2040. Amortization was \$609,045 and \$545,267 for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

H. Utilization of Resources

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Authority's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as needed.

I. Bond Premium and Discount

The difference between the cash received from bondholders at issuance and the amount due to bondholders at maturity is recognized as bond premium or discount. Bond premium or discount is amortized using the straight-line method over the lives of the bonds issued, which approximates the interest method.

J. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

K. Reclassifications

For comparative purposes, the prior year's financial statements have been reclassified to conform to report classifications of the current year. The reclassifications had no effect on net assets.

L. Adoption of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statements

The Authority adopted the provisions of GASB Statement No. 59, "Financial Instruments Omnibus". The adoption of this statement had no effect on the financial statements.

M. Pending Changes in Accounting Principles

In December 2009, the GASB issued Statement No. 57, "OPEB Measurements by Agent Employers and Agent Multiple-Employer Plans". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 57 for its fiscal year 2012 financial statements.

In November 2010, the GASB issued Statement No. 60, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Service Concession Arrangements". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 60 for its fiscal year 2013 financial statements.

In November 2010, the GASB issued Statement No. 61, "The Financial Reporting Entity: Omnibus-an amendment of GASB Statements No. 14 and No. 34". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 61 for its fiscal year 2013 financial statements.

In December 2010, the GASB issued Statement No. 62, "Codification of Accounting and Financial Reporting Guidance Contained in Pre-November 30, 1989 FASB and AICPA Pronouncements". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 62 for its fiscal year 2013 financial statements.

In June 2011, the GASB issued Statement No. 63 "Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 63 for its fiscal year 2013 financial statements.

In June 2011, the GASB issued Statement No. 64 "Derivative Instruments: Application of Hedge Accounting Termination Provisions – an amendment of GASB Statement No. 53". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 64 for its fiscal year 2012 financial statements.

The Authority has not yet completed the various analyses required to estimate the financial statement impact of these new pronouncements.

NOTE 2: FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Authority reported a net deficit of \$455,695,432 and \$287,047,426 as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Authority's business purpose will result in continued losses from operation due to the disbursement of grant awards to help promote economic growth in the Commonwealth. In addition, the Authority transferred part of its bond proceeds to the Commonwealth Department of Environmental Protection and the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority in the current year and in prior years to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program, which contributed to the deficit in net assets.

Through a service agreement with the Authority, the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations. Therefore, factors listed above do not raise doubt as to the Authority's ability to meet obligations when due.

NOTE 3: CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Authority's deposits may not be returned to it. The Authority does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2011, due to the nature of the cash and cash equivalents balances, there is no custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2010, the Authority's bank balance was exposed to custodial credit risk as \$250,000 was FDIC insured and \$721,721,132 were uninsured and collateral was held by the pledging bank's trust department not in the Authority's name.

Additionally, due to the short-term maturity of the cash equivalents, there is limited interest rate risk.

NOTE 4: LOANS RECEIVABLE

The Authority provides loans, in accordance with its enabling legislation and statutory requirements to spur economic development activity within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The loans have amortization periods not to exceed 20 years and bear interest at rates ranging from 1% to 8% depending on the nature of the loan and the Authority program from which the loan was funded.

The Authority, through the New Venture Capital Investment Program, provides loans to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies.

The Authority, with Commonwealth approval, issued the above noted revenue bonds to fund the activities of the Authority. Repayments with respect to the revenue bonds are derived solely from project revenues which are defined as annual appropriations and transfers by the Commonwealth per the Official Statement. The Revenue Bonds described above are limited obligations of the Authority and are considered non-recourse, as the Authority is not obligated to bondholders beyond amounts received by the Authority from annual appropriations and transfers to the Authority by the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has not pledged its full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the payment of the Authority's Revenue Bonds and the payments by the Commonwealth to the Authority are subject to annual appropriation and transfers of funds for such purposes by the General Assembly and there is no assurance that such funds will be appropriated in any fiscal year. Repayments of loans do not constitute project revenues.

NOTE 6:

RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Authority entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, through the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) and the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to provide administrative and operational support services for the Authority. The Authority owns no capital assets; the employees performing services for the Authority are DCED employees. As such, under the Memorandum of Understanding, the Authority reimburses DCED for services rendered by DCED employees to the Authority. During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, the services provided by DCED and DEP to the Authority and recorded as Administrative/Operating expenses totaled \$1,864,263 and \$2,650,469, respectively.

During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, the Authority received \$109,039,921 and \$81,654,535, respectively, in transfers from the Commonwealth to pay debt services with respect to Revenue Bonds. See Note 5 for details with respect to the Revenue Bonds.

The Authority also received \$47,904,591 and \$0 in gaming monies from the Commonwealth to fund approved projects in select areas of the state in the fiscal years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

The Authority transferred part of its bond proceeds to the Commonwealth Department of Environment Protection and the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority totaling \$38,000,000 and \$98,000,000 for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

NOTE 7:

LINE OF CREDIT

In December 2009, the Authority entered into a secured line of credit with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Treasury Department, which, under a revolving credit agreement, is limited to borrowings of \$50,000,000. Under the revolving credit agreement, interest accrues on the aggregate unpaid principle amount outstanding on the draws. The interest rate is the greater of the rate of the United States Federal Funds Target Rate plus 75 basis points or the rate set by the British Bankers Association for London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR) for a six month term in United States dollars plus 45 basis points. The interest rate is reset as of the 20th of each month. As of June 30, 2011 and 2010, no funds were drawn under the revolving credit agreement.

The , hereafter referred to as the "Authority," is pleased to present its financial statements developed in compliance with Statement of Governmental Accounting Standard No. 34, entitled "Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments" (hereafter GASB 34), and related standards. GASB 34 enhances information provided to the users of its financial statements. This section of the financial reporting package presents our discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance during the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements that follow this section.

OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Over the past fiscal year, the Authority has approved 38 projects totaling \$38,106,862 in funding under the Alternative and Clean Energy Program, the Renewable Energy Program and the Solar Energy Program. In total, the projects will generate 699,201 megawatt hours annually and save 1,189,508 kBTU's. These programs provide funding to promote the utilization, development and construction of alternative energy projects in the Commonwealth.

Over the past fiscal year, the Authority has approved 13 projects totaling \$33,421,954 in funding under the Business in Our Sites program which funds will assist in the development of 1,260 acres, 4,116,954 sq. ft of leasable space and will create 3,672 jobs. This program provides funding to support the development of strategic economic development sites throughout the Commonwealth.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to, and should be read in conjunction with, the basic audited financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Authority's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The financial statements report information about the Authority using the full accrual method of accounting, as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. The financial statements include a Statement of Net Deficits; a Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Deficits; a Statement of Cash Flows; and Notes to the Financial Statements.

The Statement of Net Deficits presents the financial position of the Authority on a full accrual historical cost basis. The Statement of Net Deficits also presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net deficits. Over time, increases and decreases in net deficits are one indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

While the Statement of Net Deficits provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Deficits presents the results of the business-type activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net deficits changed during the year. All changes in net deficits are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Authority's recovery of its costs.

The Statement of Cash Flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operational, financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipt and cash disbursement information without consideration of the earnings event when an obligation arises, or depreciation of capital assets.

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Authority's accounting policies, significant account balances and activities, long-term debt and subsequent events, if any.

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The Authority did not issue any new bonds in 2012 after issuing bonds totaling \$150 million in 2011. The bond issuance was the primary cause for the increase in total liabilities of \$117 million in 2011. In 2012, total liabilities decreased by \$40 million as a result of no new debt issuances and principal payments made on existing debt. In 2012, the Authority's total assets declined by \$228 million due to the transfer of \$9 million to other Commonwealth agencies for initiatives prescribed under legislation and also due to \$249 million in grant disbursements, particularly H2O program grants. Due to the nature of economic development grants and loans, some of which require drawdowns, funding not immediately disbursed upon Board approval is held as cash and cash equivalents. Administrative operating expenses increased as compared to the previous year by \$0.7 million. The increase corresponds to the increased staff time necessary to review and process application for funding during 2012. Loan Guarantee expense increased by \$0.7 million in 2012 as the Authority was called on to pay demand notices.

The significant increase in the total net deficit is attributable to the \$249 million in Authority assets disbursed as grant proceeds, and the \$8 million in assets transferred to the Ben Franklin Technology Development Partners. The transfer of bond proceeds to these Governmental entities was prescribed by legislation. Management acknowledges but is not concerned with the annual net asset deficit. As an authority under which economic stimulus programs are established, grants and transfers to other governmental entities are essential to achieve its mission.

Since inception, the Authority has issued eight revenue bonds totaling \$1.542 billion. The Authority has a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the payment of the annual debt service through an annual appropriation by the Commonwealth, and transfers from the Gaming Economic Development Tourism Fund. However, there is no assurance that there will be sufficient funds appropriated annually by the Commonwealth.

In 2012, operating income increased by \$2.1 million as compared to 2011. The increase is attributed to increased interest on loans and venture capital investments. The Authority adjusts the loan loss reserve to account for at-risk loans. As a result, the provision for loan losses increased by \$4.6 million.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Organization

The Commonwealth Financing Authority ("the Authority") is a body corporate and politic duly organized by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania ("the Commonwealth") incorporated under the Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations Act of 2004 (Act), being the Act of April 1, 2004, P.L. 163, as amended by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Authority, by virtue of the Act and its articles of incorporation, has all powers as set forth in the Act including those for creation and retention of jobs. The purpose of the Authority is to engage in financial assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, grants and private equity participating loans to promote activities which lead to the use of alternative and clean energy, the creation and retention of jobs within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the establishment of economically viable Pennsylvania communities, the development of a stable tax base within Pennsylvania communities, the reuse of abandoned industrial, commercial and other previously utilized sites, the promotion and commercialization of Pennsylvania products and services and investment of private capital in Pennsylvania communities to promote the health, safety, employment, business opportunities, economic activity and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth.

The Commonwealth appoints the members of the Authority's governing board. The Commonwealth maintains the accounts and records of the Authority. In addition the Commonwealth employs and supervises personnel to provide administrative services. Therefore, the Authority is considered a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The legislation creating the Authority as well as program specific guidelines establishes certain activities to be carried out by the Authority as follows:

- Business in Our Sites Program: provides financial assistance for preparation of sites for future development.
- First Industries Program: provides financial assistance for projects related to tourism and agriculture.
- Second Stage Loan Program: provides loan guarantees to commercial lending institutions that make loans to life sciences, advanced technology or manufacturing businesses.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Guarantee Program: provides guarantees to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies which are in early-stage or mid-stage development.
- Building Pennsylvania Program: provides loans to fund managers for investment in real estate projects in Pennsylvania.
- Tax Increment Financing "TIF" Guarantee Program: provides guarantees for TIF bonds or other indebtedness in accordance with the TIF Act of 1990.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Capital Investments Program: provides loans to Venture Capital partnerships for investment in Pennsylvania companies.
- Penn Works Program: provides grants and loans for water supply and wastewater infrastructure within Pennsylvania.
- H₂O PA Program (Water and Sewer): provides for single-year or multi-year grants to municipalities or municipal authorities to assist with the construction of flood control projects, drinking water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer projects, and the repair of high hazard unsafe dams.

- Solar Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the generation and use of solar energy and the manufacture or assembly of solar equipment.
- Renewable Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the use of wind and geothermal energy.
- Alternative and Clean Energy Program: provides grant and loan funds to encourage the implementation of alternative energy production projects and clean energy projects.
- High Performance Buildings: provides grants and loans for the construction of energy efficient buildings.
- Local Share Account: provides grants to support and enhance community and economic well-being and mitigate the impact of gaming and related activities.

B. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The Authority follows Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). GAAP allows specialized accounting for government entities, which is governed by pronouncements set by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). Pronouncements set by the GASB may differ from pronouncements set by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB).

The Authority is considered a special-purpose government since it is engaged solely in business-type activities under GASB Statement No. 34. The Authority's financial statements are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when they have been incurred. The statements are intended to report the Authority as an economic unit that includes all measurable assets and liabilities, financial and capital, of the Authority.

All activities of the Authority are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. A proprietary fund is used to account for operations that are (a) financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination or revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

The Authority follows the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis. Within the Statements of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Deficits, Statement No. 34 requires operating income and expenses to be separated from non-operating income in order to report net operating income or loss. Operating income and expenses are defined as those activities directly related to the Authority's primary business of providing employment through economic development lending. Non-operating revenues and expenses consist of those revenues and expenses that are related to financing and investing types of activities and result from non-exchange transactions, such as investment income/loss.

The Authority follows Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 20, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Proprietary Funds and Other Governmental Entities That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting for reporting and disclosure purposes. As permitted by Statement No. 20, the Authority has elected not to apply Financial Accounting Standards Board pronouncements issued after November 30, 1989 unless GASB specifically adopts the FASB Statement or Interpretation.

C. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, include cash on hand or on deposit in highly liquid financial debt instruments with a maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

D. Allowance for Loan Losses

The allowance for loan losses is a reserve account for possible future loan losses. Provision for loan losses is credited to the allowance account. Loan losses which are charged-off and recoveries of previously charged-off loans are charged or credited directly to the allowance account. The provision for loan losses is adjusted monthly at the rate of 2% of outstanding loan balances at the respective month-end.

E. Interest Income

Interest income on cash equivalents and loans are recorded when earned.

Uncollectible interest on loans that are contractually past due is charged off, or an allowance established based on management's periodic evaluations. The allowance is established by a charge-to-interest income equal to all previously accrued, and income is subsequently recognized only to the extent that cash payments are received until, in management's judgment, the borrower's ability to make periodic interest and principal payments is back to normal.

In addition to fixed interest arrangements, some loans contain provisions which provide lump sum interest payments based upon certain conditions being met. The additional income is recognized when earned.

F. Loan Origination Fees and Costs

The Authority recognizes loan origination fees and costs in accordance with FASB Accounting Standards Codification 310-20, Receivables – Nonrefundable Fees and Other Costs (formerly Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 91, Accounting for Nonrefundable Fees and Costs Associated with Originating or Acquiring Loans and Initial Direct Costs of Leases).

For the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, (\$42,565) and \$310,570, respectively, of net deferred fees are included in loans receivable.

G. Bond Issuance Costs

Bond issuance costs consist of legal, underwriting and other fees charged in connection with the issuance of bond debt. The costs are amortized over the lives of the bonds, which range from 20 to 30 years. The bonds mature through 2040. Amortization was \$642,017 and \$609,045 for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

H. <u>Utilization of Resources</u>

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Authority's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as needed.

I. Bond Premium and Discount

The difference between the cash received from bondholders at issuance and the amount due to bondholders at maturity is recognized as bond premium or discount. Bond premium or discount is amortized using the straight-line method over the lives of the bonds issued, which approximates the interest method.

J. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

K. Reclassifications

For comparative purposes, the prior year's financial statements have been reclassified to conform to report classifications of the current year. The reclassifications had no effect on net assets.

L. Adoption of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statements

The Authority adopted the requirements of GASB Statement No. 57, "OPEB Measurements by Agent Employers and Agent Multiple-Employer Plans". The adoption of this statement had no effect on previously reported amounts.

The Authority adopted the requirements of GASB Statement No. 64 "Derivative Instruments: Application of Hedge Accounting Termination Provisions – an amendment of GASB Statement No. 53". The adoption of this statement had no effect on previously reported amounts.

M. Pending Changes in Accounting Principles

In November 2010, the GASB issued Statement No. 60, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Service Concession Arrangements". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 60 for its fiscal year 2013 financial statements.

In November 2010, the GASB issued Statement No. 61, "The Financial Reporting Entity: Omnibus-an amendment of GASB Statements No. 14 and No. 34". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 61 for its fiscal year 2013 financial statements.

In December 2010, the GASB issued Statement No. 62, "Codification of Accounting and Financial Reporting Guidance Contained in Pre-November 30, 1989 FASB and AICPA Pronouncements". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 62 for its fiscal year 2013 financial statements.

In June 2011, the GASB issued Statement No. 63, "Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position". The Authority is required to adopt Statement No. 63 for its fiscal year 2013 financial statements.

In March 2012, the GASB issued a Statement No. 65, "Items Previously Reported as Assets and Liabilities". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 65 for its fiscal year 2014 financial statements.

In March 2012, the GASB issued a Statement No. 66, "Technical Corrections – 2012 – An Amendment of GASB Statements No. 10 and No. 62". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 65 for its fiscal year 2014 financial statements.

In June 2012, the GASB issued a Statement No. 67, "Financial Reporting for Pension Plans – an amendment of GASB Statement No. 25". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 67 for its fiscal year 2014 financial statements.

In June 2012, the GASB issued a Statement No. 68, "Accounting and Financial Reporting – an amendment of GASB Statement No. 27". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 68 for its fiscal year 2015 financial statements.

The Authority has not yet completed the various analyses required to estimate the financial statement impact of these new pronouncements.

NOTE 2: FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Authority reported a net deficit of \$643,386,717 and \$455,695,432 as of June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The Authority's business purpose will result in continued losses from operation due to the disbursement of grant awards to help promote economic growth in the Commonwealth. In addition, the Authority transferred part of its bond proceeds to the Commonwealth Department of Environmental Protection and the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority in the current year and in prior years to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program, which contributed to the deficit in net assets.

Through a service agreement with the Authority, the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations. Therefore, factors listed above do not raise doubt as to the Authority's ability to meet obligations when due.

NOTE 3: CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Authority's deposits may not be returned to it. The Authority does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2012 and 2011, due to the nature of the cash and cash equivalents balances, there is no custodial credit risk.

Additionally, due to the short-term maturity of the cash equivalents, there is limited interest rate risk.

NOTE 4: LOANS RECEIVABLE

The Authority provides loans, in accordance with its enabling legislation and statutory requirements to spur economic development activity within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The loans have amortization periods not to exceed 20 years and bear interest at rates ranging from 1% to 8% depending on the nature of the loan and the Authority program from which the loan was funded.

The Authority, through the New Venture Capital Investment Program, provides loans to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies.

The Authority, with Commonwealth approval, issued the above noted revenue bonds to fund the activities of the Authority. Repayments with respect to the revenue bonds are derived solely from project revenues which are defined as annual appropriations and transfers by the Commonwealth per the Official Statement. The Revenue Bonds described above are limited obligations of the Authority and are considered non-recourse, as the Authority is not obligated to bondholders beyond amounts received by the Authority from annual appropriations and transfers to the Authority by the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has not pledged its full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the payment of the Authority's Revenue Bonds and the payments by the Commonwealth to the Authority are subject to annual appropriation and transfers of funds for such purposes by the General Assembly and there is no assurance that such funds will be appropriated in any fiscal year. Repayments of loans do not constitute project revenues.

NOTE 6: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Authority entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, through the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) and the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to provide administrative and operational support services for the Authority. The Authority owns no capital assets; the employees performing services for the Authority are DCED employees. As such, under the Memorandum of Understanding, the Authority reimburses DCED for services rendered by DCED employees to the Authority. During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, the services provided by DCED and DEP to the Authority and recorded as Administrative/Operating expenses totaled \$2,742,647 and \$1,864,263, respectively.

During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, the Authority received \$115,816,425 and \$109,039,921, respectively, in transfers from the Commonwealth to pay debt services with respect to Revenue Bonds. See Note 5 for details with respect to the Revenue Bonds.

The Authority also received \$29,353,879 and \$47,904,591 in gaming monies from the Commonwealth to fund approved projects in select areas of the state in the fiscal years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

The Authority transferred part of its bond proceeds to the Commonwealth Department of Environment Protection and the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority totaling \$9,000,000 and \$38,000,000 for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

NOTE 7: LINE OF CREDIT

In December 2009, the Authority entered into a secured line of credit with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Treasury Department, which, under a revolving credit agreement, is limited to borrowings of \$50,000,000. Under the revolving credit agreement, interest accrues on the aggregate unpaid principle amount outstanding on the draws. The interest rate is the greater of the rate of the United States Federal Funds Target Rate plus 75 basis points or the rate set by the British Bankers Association for London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR) for a six month term in United States dollars plus 45 basis points. The interest rate is reset as of the 20th of each month. The line of credit expired as of December 28, 2011, the Authority did not extend or obtain a new line of credit. As of June 30, 2012 and 2011, no funds were drawn under the revolving credit agreement.

Accordingly, expenses totaling \$1,191,529 and \$482,335, have been reported in the Authority's financial statements for loan guarantees as of June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

Through various Authority loan and grant programs to promote economic development within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Authority has approved loans, and grants of \$53,855,635 and \$334,044,359, respectively, which have not been disbursed as of June 30, 2012.

The Commonwealth Financing Authority, hereafter referred to as the "Authority," is pleased to present its financial statements developed in compliance with Statement of Governmental Accounting Standard No. 34, entitled "Basic Financial Statements – Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments" (hereafter GASB 34), and related standards. GASB 34 enhances information provided to the users of its financial statements. This section of the financial reporting package presents our discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements that follow this section.

OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Over the past fiscal year, the Authority adopted guidelines for six new grant programs created through Act 13 of 2012. Over 300 applications were received requesting more than \$60 million for flood mitigation, orphaned and abandoned well plugging, greenways trails and recreation, watershed restoration and protection, abandoned mine drainage abatement and treatment, and baseline water quality projects.

The Authority also solicited applications for the PennWorks Program. The Authority received 104 applications requesting over \$262 million for water and sewer projects that directly support job creation and private investment in the Commonwealth.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) serves as an introduction to, and should be read in conjunction with, the basic audited financial statements. The MD&A represents management's examination and analysis of the Authority's financial condition and performance. Summary financial statement data and other management tools were used for this analysis.

The financial statements report information about the Authority using the accrual method of accounting, as utilized by similar business activities in the private sector. The financial statements include a Statement of Net Position; a Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position; a Statement of Cash Flows; and Notes to the Financial Statements.

The Statement of Net Position presents the financial position of the Authority on an accrual cost basis. The Statement of Net Position also presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases and decreases in net position are one indicator of whether the financial position of the Authority is improving or deteriorating.

While the Statement of Net Position provides information about the nature and amount of resources and obligations at year-end, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position presents the results of the business-type activities over the course of the fiscal year and information as to how the net position changed during the year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. This statement also provides certain information about the Authority's recovery of its costs.

The Statement of Cash Flows presents changes in cash and cash equivalents, resulting from operational, financing, and investing activities. This statement presents cash receipt and cash disbursement information without consideration of the earnings event when an obligation arises or depreciation of capital assets.

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide required disclosures and other information that are essential to a full understanding of material data provided in the statements. The notes present information about the Authority's accounting policies, significant account balances and activities, long-term debt and subsequent events, if any.

The Authority issued new bonds in 2013, totaling \$330 million. The bond issuance was the primary cause for the increase in total liabilities of \$325 million in 2013, net of the principal payments made during the year on the Authority's long-term debt liabilities. The issuance of the 2013 bonds is also the primary reason for the increase of \$208 million in total assets, net of grant disbursements, and transfers to the Commonwealth, and other Commonwealth component units. Due to the nature of economic development grants and loans, some of which require drawdowns, funding not immediately disbursed upon Board approval is held as cash, cash equivalents, or authorized investments.

In 2012, total liabilities decreased by \$40 million as a result of no new debt issuances and principal payments made on existing debt. The decrease in total assets of \$228 million in 2012 can be attributed to transfers of \$9 million to other Commonwealth agencies, as well as disbursements of \$249 in the form of grants during 2012.

The significant decrease in the total net position in 2013 is attributable to the \$168 million in Authority assets disbursed in the form of grants, \$20 million in assets transferred to the Commonwealth, and other Commonwealth component units, and interest expense of \$81 million on the Authority's outstanding bonds; offset by transfers of \$27 million of gaming monies from the Commonwealth to fund approved projects, and transfers of \$120 million from the Commonwealth for debt service payments related to the Authority's outstanding bonds. The transfer of bond proceeds to these Governmental entities was prescribed by legislation. As an authority under which economic stimulus programs are established, grants and transfers to other governmental entities are essential to achieve its mission.

Since inception, the Authority has issued ten revenue bonds totaling \$1.872 billion. The Authority has a service agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the payment of the annual debt service through an annual appropriation by the Commonwealth, and transfers from the Gaming Economic Development Tourism Fund. However, there is no assurance that there will be sufficient funds appropriated annually by the Commonwealth.

In 2013, operating expenses decreased by \$79 million due to a decrease of \$81 million in grant disbursements and offset slightly by \$2 million increase in loan guarantee expense. The decrease in net nonoperating revenues can be attributed to additional interest expense of \$4 million related to the 2013 bond issuances, as well as an increase of \$9 million in net transfers to the Commonwealth and related component units.

In 2012, operating income increased by \$2 million as compared to 2011. The increase is attributed to increased interest on loans and venture capital investments.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Organization

The Commonwealth Financing Authority ("the Authority") is a body corporate and politic duly organized by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania ("the Commonwealth") incorporated under the Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations Act of 2004 (Act), being the Act of April 1, 2004, P.L. 163, as amended by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Authority, by virtue of the Act and its articles of incorporation, has all powers as set forth in the Act including those for creation and retention of jobs. The purpose of the Authority is to engage in financial assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, grants and private equity participating loans to promote activities which lead to the use of alternative and clean energy, the creation and retention of jobs within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the establishment of economically viable Pennsylvania communities, the development of a stable tax base within Pennsylvania communities, the reuse of abandoned industrial, commercial and other previously utilized sites, the promotion and commercialization of Pennsylvania products and services and investment of private capital in Pennsylvania communities to promote the health, safety, employment, business opportunities, economic activity and general welfare of the people of the Commonwealth.

The Commonwealth appoints the members of the Authority's governing board. The Commonwealth maintains the accounts and records of the Authority. In addition the Commonwealth employs and supervises personnel to provide administrative services. Therefore, the Authority is considered a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The legislation creating the Authority as well as program specific guidelines establishes certain activities to be carried out by the Authority as follows:

- Business in Our Sites Program: provides financial assistance for preparation of sites for future development.
- First Industries Program: provides financial assistance for projects related to tourism and agriculture.
- Second Stage Loan Program: provides loan guarantees to commercial lending institutions that make loans to life sciences, advanced technology or manufacturing businesses.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Guarantee Program: provides guarantees to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies which are in early-stage or mid-stage development.
- Building Pennsylvania Program: provides loans to fund managers for investment in real estate projects in Pennsylvania.
- Tax Increment Financing "TIF" Guarantee Program: provides guarantees for TIF bonds or other indebtedness in accordance with the TIF Act of 1990.
- New Pennsylvania Venture Capital Investments Program: provides loans to Venture Capital partnerships for investment in Pennsylvania companies.
- Penn Works Program: provides grants and loans for water supply and wastewater infrastructure within Pennsylvania.
- H₂O PA Program (Water and Sewer): provides for single-year or multi-year grants to municipalities or municipal authorities to assist with the construction of flood control projects, drinking water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer projects, and the repair of high hazard unsafe dams.

- Solar Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the generation and use of solar energy and the manufacture or assembly of solar equipment.
- Renewable Energy Program: provides financial assistance in the form of grant and loan funds to promote the use of wind and geothermal energy.
- Alternative and Clean Energy Program: provides grant and loan funds to encourage the implementation of alternative energy production projects and clean energy projects.
- High Performance Buildings: provides grants and loans for the construction of energy efficient buildings.
- Local Share Account: provides grants to support and enhance community and economic well-being and mitigate the impact of gaming and related activities.
- Act 13 Program: provides grants for flood mitigation, orphaned and abandoned well plugging, greenways trails and recreation, watershed restoration and protection, abandoned mine drainage abatement and treatment, and baseline water quality projects.

B. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The Authority follows Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). GAAP allows specialized accounting for government entities, which is governed by pronouncements set by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). Pronouncements set by the GASB may differ from pronouncements set by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB).

The Authority is considered a special-purpose government since it is engaged solely in business-type activities under GASB Statement No. 34. The Authority's financial statements are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when they have been incurred. The statements are intended to report the Authority as an economic unit that includes all measurable assets and liabilities, financial and capital, of the Authority.

All activities of the Authority are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. A proprietary fund is used to account for operations that are (a) financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination or revenues earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

The Authority follows the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis. Within the Statements of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Position, Statement No. 34 requires operating income and expenses to be separated from non-operating income in order to report net operating income or loss. Operating income and expenses are defined as those activities directly related to the Authority's primary business of providing employment through economic development lending. Non-operating revenues and expenses consist of those revenues and expenses that are related to financing and investing types of activities and result from non-exchange transactions, such as investment income/loss.

C. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, include cash on hand or on deposit in highly liquid financial debt instruments with a maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

D. Allowance for Loan Losses

The allowance for loan losses is a reserve account for possible future loan losses. Provision for loan losses is credited to the allowance account. Loan losses which are charged-off and recoveries of previously charged-off loans are charged or credited directly to the allowance account. The provision for loan losses is adjusted monthly at the rate of 2% of outstanding loan balances at the respective month-end.

E. Interest Income

Interest income on cash equivalents and loans are recorded when earned.

Uncollectible interest on loans that are contractually past due is charged off, or an allowance established based on management's periodic evaluations. The allowance is established by a charge-to-interest income equal to all previously accrued, and income is subsequently recognized only to the extent that cash payments are received until, in management's judgment, the borrower's ability to make periodic interest and principal payments is back to normal.

In addition to fixed interest arrangements, some loans contain provisions which provide lump sum interest payments based upon certain conditions being met. The additional income is recognized when earned.

F. Loan Origination Fees and Costs

The Authority recognizes loan origination fees and costs in accordance with GASB Statement No. 62 "Codification of Accounting and Financial Reporting Guidance Contained in Pre-November 30, 1989 FASB and AICPA Pronouncements".

For the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, (\$160,706) and (\$42,565), respectively, of net deferred fees are included in loans receivable.

G. Bond Issuance Costs

Bond issuance costs consist of legal, underwriting and other fees charged in connection with the issuance of bond debt. The costs are amortized over the lives of the bonds, which range from 20 to 30 years. The bonds mature through 2042. Amortization was \$678,700 and \$642,017 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

H. <u>Utilization of Resources</u>

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Authority's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as needed.

I. Bond Premium and Discount

The difference between the cash received from bondholders at issuance and the principal amount due to bondholders at maturity is recognized as bond premium or discount. Bond premium or discount is amortized using the straight-line method over the lives of the bonds issued, which approximates the interest method.

J. <u>Use of Estimates</u>

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

K. Reclassifications

For comparative purposes, certain prior year financial statement amounts have been reclassified to conform to the current year presentation.

L. Adoption of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statements

The Authority adopted the requirements of GASB Statement No. 60, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Service Concession Arrangements". The adoption of this statement had no effect on previously reported amounts.

The Authority adopted the requirements of GASB Statement No. 61 "The Financial Reporting Entity Omnibus-an amendment of GASB Statements No. 14 and No. 34". The adoption of this statement had no effect on previously reported amounts.

The Authority adopted the requirements of GASB Statement No. 62, "Codification of Accounting and Financial Reporting Guidance Contained in Pre-November 30, 1989 FASB and AICPA Pronouncements". The adoption of this statement had no effect on previously reported amounts.

The Authority adopted the requirements of GASB Statement No. 63, "Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position". The adoption of this statement resulted in replacing the term "net assets" with the term "net position".

M. Pending Changes in Accounting Principles

In March 2012, the GASB issued a Statement No. 65, "Items Previously Reported as Assets and Liabilities". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 65 for its fiscal year 2014 financial statements.

In March 2012, the GASB issued a Statement No. 66, "Technical Corrections – 2012 – An Amendment of GASB Statements No. 10 and No. 62". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 66 for its fiscal year 2014 financial statements.

In June 2012, the GASB issued a Statement No. 67, "Financial Reporting for Pension Plans – an amendment of GASB Statement No. 25". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 67 for its fiscal year 2014 financial statements.

In June 2012, the GASB issued a Statement No. 68, "Accounting and Financial Reporting – an amendment of GASB Statement No. 27". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 68 for its fiscal year 2015 financial statements.

In January 2013, the GASB issued a Statement No. 69, "Government Combinations and Disposals of Government Operations". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 69 for its fiscal year 2015 financial statements.

In April 2013, the GASB issued a Statement No. 70, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Nonexchange Financial Guarantees". The Authority is required to adopt statement No. 70 for its fiscal year 2014 financial statements.

The Authority has not yet completed the various analyses required to estimate the financial statement impact of these new pronouncements.

NOTE 2: FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Authority reported a deficit net position of \$760,493,339 and \$643,386,717 as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The Authority's business purpose will result in continued losses from operation due to the disbursement of grant awards to help promote economic growth in the Commonwealth. In addition, the Authority transferred part of its bond proceeds to the Commonwealth Department of Environmental Protection and the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority in the current year and in prior years to the Commonwealth for the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) program, which contributed to the deficit in net position.

Through a service agreement with the Authority, the Commonwealth has pledged to seek annual appropriations to pay the Authority's annual debt service obligations. Therefore, factors listed above do not raise doubt as to the Authority's ability to meet obligations when due.

NOTE 3: CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Authority's deposits or investments may not be returned to it. The Authority does not have a deposit or investment policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2013 and 2012, due to the nature of the cash and cash equivalents balances, there is no custodial credit risk.

Additionally, due to the short-term maturity of the cash equivalents, there is limited interest rate risk.

NOTE 4: LOANS RECEIVABLE

The Authority provides loans, in accordance with its enabling legislation and statutory requirements to spur economic development activity within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The loans have amortization periods not to exceed 20 years and bear interest at rates ranging from 1% to 8% depending on the nature of the loan and the Authority program from which the loan was funded.

The Authority, through the New Venture Capital Investment Program, provides loans to venture capital partnerships for investments in Pennsylvania-related companies.

The 2013A Bonds were issued to provide additional funding for the Alternative Energy Development Program established under the Alternative Energy Investment Act, and other Project Costs for program-related administration, and to pay the costs of issuing the 2013A Bonds. The bonds were issued at a premium of \$7,900,243 and had issuance costs of \$807,407. Specific terms of the Bonds can be found in the previous tables.

The 2013B Bonds were issued to provide additional funds for grants to be used to fund water and sewer projects, storm water projects, flood control projects and high hazard unsafe dam projects (the "H2O Grant Program") pursuant to the H2O PA Act, and other Project Costs for program-related administration, and to pay the costs of issuing the 2013B Bonds. The bonds were issued at a premium of \$32,476,035 and had issuance costs of \$1,250,134. Specific terms of the Bonds can be found in the previous tables.

The Authority, with Commonwealth approval, issued the above noted revenue bonds to fund the activities of the Authority. Repayments with respect to the revenue bonds are derived solely from project revenues which are defined as annual appropriations and transfers by the Commonwealth per the Official Statement. The Revenue Bonds described above are limited obligations of the Authority and are considered non-recourse, as the Authority is not obligated to bondholders beyond amounts received by the Authority from annual appropriations and transfers to the Authority by the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth has not pledged its full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision for the payment of the Authority's Revenue Bonds and the payments by the Commonwealth to the Authority are subject to annual appropriation and transfers of funds for such purposes by the General Assembly and there is no assurance that such funds will be appropriated in any fiscal year. Repayments of loans do not constitute project revenues.

NOTE 6: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Authority entered into an agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, through the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) and the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to provide administrative and operational support services for the Authority. The Authority owns no capital assets; the employees performing services for the Authority are DCED employees. As such, under the Memorandum of Understanding, the Authority reimburses DCED for services rendered by DCED employees to the Authority. During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the services provided by DCED and DEP to the Authority and recorded as Administrative/Operating expenses totaled \$2,604,614 and \$2,902,175, respectively.

During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Authority received \$119,534,974 and \$115,816,425, respectively, in transfers from the Commonwealth to pay debt services with respect to Revenue Bonds. See Note 5 for details with respect to the Revenue Bonds.

The Authority also received \$27,486,806 and \$29,353,879 in gaming monies from the Commonwealth to fund approved projects in select areas of the state in the fiscal years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The Authority transferred part of its bond proceeds to the Commonwealth Department of Environment Protection and the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority totaling \$20,000,000 and \$9,000,000 for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

NOTE 7: LINE OF CREDIT

In December 2009, the Authority entered into a secured line of credit with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Treasury Department, which, under a revolving credit agreement, is limited to borrowings of \$50,000,000. Under the revolving credit agreement, interest accrues on the aggregate unpaid principle amount outstanding on the draws. The interest rate is the greater of the rate of the United States Federal Funds Target Rate plus 75 basis points or the rate set by the British Bankers Association for London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR) for a six month term in United States dollars plus 45 basis points. The interest rate is reset as of the 20th of each month. The line of credit expired as of December 28, 2011, the Authority did not extend or obtain a new line of credit.

NOTE 8: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Authority, through various economic development programs, provided loan guarantees as follows:

The Authority has been called upon, from time to time with respect to loan guarantees, to make principal or interest payments on behalf of the ultimate borrowers. Accordingly, expenses totaling \$2,734,748 and \$1,191,529, have been reported in the Authority's financial statements for loan guarantees as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Through various Authority loan and grant programs to promote economic development within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Authority has approved loans, and grants of \$83,161,378 and \$229,487,944, respectively, which have not been disbursed as of June 30, 2013.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the business-type activities of the COMMONWEALTH FINANCING AUTHORITY ("the AUTHORITY"), a component unit of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2013, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the AUTHORITY's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated October 2, 2013.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Authority's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Authority's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Authority's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the AUTHORITY's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.
