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

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva*nia Code sections may be found at www.legis.state. pa.us.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1910. ACTIONS FOR SUPPORT

Rule 1910.16-6. Support Guidelines. Adjustments to the Basic Support Obligation. Allocation of Additional Expenses.

Additional expenses permitted pursuant to this Rule 1910.16-6 may be allocated between the parties even if the parties' incomes do not justify an order of basic support.

* * * * *

(c) Unreimbursed Medical Expenses. Unreimbursed medical expenses of the obligee or the children shall be allocated between the parties in proportion to their respective net incomes. Notwithstanding the prior sentence, there shall be no apportionment of unreimbursed medical expenses incurred by a party who is not owed a statutory duty of support by the other party. The court may direct that the obligor's share be added to his or her basic support obligation, or paid directly to the obligee or to the health care provider.

(1) For purposes of this subdivision, medical expenses are annual unreimbursed medical expenses in excess of \$250 per person. Medical expenses include insurance co-payments and deductibles and all expenses incurred for reasonably necessary medical services and supplies, including but not limited to surgical, dental and optical services, and orthodontia. Medical expenses do not include cosmetic, chiropractic, psychiatric, psychological or other services unless specifically directed in the order of court.

Official Note: While cosmetic, chiropractic, psychiatric, psychological or other expenses are not required to be apportioned between the parties, the court may apportion such expenses that it determines to be reasonable and appropriate under the circumstances.

- (2) An annual limitation may be imposed when the burden on the obligor would otherwise be excessive.
- (3) Annual expenses pursuant to this subdivision (c), shall be calculated on a calendar year basis. In the year in which the initial support order is entered, or in any period in which support is being paid that is less than a full year, the \$250 threshold shall be pro-rated. Documentation of unreimbursed medical expenses that either party seeks to have allocated between the parties shall be provided to the other party not later than March 31 of the year following the calendar year in which the final bill was received by the party seeking allocation. For purposes of subsequent enforcement, unreimbursed medical bills need not be submitted to the domestic relations section prior to March 31. Allocation of unreimbursed medical expenses for which documentation is not timely provided to the other party shall be within the discretion of the court.
- (4) In cases involving only spousal support or alimony pendente lite, the parties' respective net incomes for purposes of allocating unreimbursed medical expenses shall be calculated after the amount of spousal support or alimony pendente lite is deducted from the obligor's income and added to the obligee's income.

Official Note: If the trier of fact determines that the obligee acted reasonably in obtaining services which were not specifically set forth in the order of support, payment for such services may be ordered retroactively.

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY BOARD [25 PA. CODE CH. 250]

Corrective Amendments to 25 Pa. Code Chapter 250, Appendix A, Table 7

The Department of Environmental Protection has discovered discrepancies between the agency text of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 250, Appendix A, Table 7, as deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau, published at 27 Pa.B. 4181 (August 16, 1997), and the official text published in the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter* (Master Transmittal Sheet No. 327, February 2002). When amendments to 25 Pa. Code Chapter 250, Appendix A adopted at 31 Pa.B. 6395 (November 24, 2001) were codified, Table 7 was inadvertently omitted.

Therefore, under 45 Pa.C.S. § 901: The Department of Environmental Protection has deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau a corrective amendment to 25 Pa. Code Chapter 250, Appendix A, Table 7. The corrective amendment to 25 Pa. Code Chapter 250, Appendix A, Table 7 is effective as of February 2, 2002, the date the defective official text was announced in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The correct version of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 250, Appendix A, Table 7 appears in Annex A.





Summary Notice for the Draft 2014-2018 Consolidated Plan and 2014 Action Plan

The Department of Community and Economic Development (Department) proposes to adopt the Commonwealth's Consolidated Plan for Federal Fiscal Years (FFY) 2014-2018 as well as the Action Plan for FFY 2014. The Consolidated Plan (Plan) is a document submitted to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The document is both a plan identifying the needs of the nonentitlement areas of this Commonwealth and an annual application to HUD for Federal funds administered by the Commonwealth. The HUD funding programs covered by the Plan and administered by the Department are the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), the HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) and the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) programs. The Department of Health administers the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) pro-

This summary is designed to provide an opportunity for citizens, local governmental officials and interested organizations of this Commonwealth to comment about the Plan. Purpose

The Plan contains a Needs Assessment and Market Analysis for the Commonwealth in the areas of housing, homelessness, community and economic development. From this information a Strategic Plan including goals and objectives is developed and outlined in the Plan determining the use of the Federal funding for Fiscal Years 2014-2018. The Action Plan takes that strategy developed in the Plan and applies it to the administration of the CDBG, HOME, ESG and HOPWA programs for 2014. HUD must approve both plans for the Commonwealth to receive funding under the identified HUD programs.

The plans will have a major impact on the type, location and number of affordable housing units generated and preserved in this Commonwealth. Also, the plans aid in planning for the use of funding for the homeless and those residents with AIDS to find permanent housing and stability. The plans identify resources for improvement or creation of infrastructure, public facilities, services, and other economic and community development initiatives in communities in this Commonwealth that are essential for growth over the next 5 years.

Contant

The Plan for FFY 2014-2018 will include updated needs data and analysis to determine the best targeting of funding. The significant change in this Plan is that the Commonwealth is now using HUD's electronic submission system, known as the e-Con Planning Suite, for the format of the documents. Once approved by HUD these documents will be linked to the Integrated Distribution Information System reporting system and will create the annual Consolidated Plan Annual Performance and Evaluation Report. Besides the Department's web site, the approved plan will be able to be viewed on HUD's web site at www.HUD.gov.

Public Review

The Consolidated Plan for 2014-2018 and the Action Plan for 2014 are available on the Internet or in hard copy for public comment from May 31, 2014, through June 30, 2014, at the locations listed as follows:

Public Hearings

One public hearing was held to take citizen comments on the needs and possible use of the funds. This meeting was held on May 29, 2014. Another meeting is scheduled for June 17, 2014, from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. The public hearing will be conducted electronically by means of the Internet. The format will be more accessible in that persons who wish to make a comment or discuss policy may participate directly from their personal computer or from any computer location that has Internet access, such as their public library or by telephone.

Individuals or organizations may give testimony or comments by means of the Internet. Comments will be accepted about topics related to community development, housing, homelessness and economic development and the content of the Commonwealth's draft Consolidated Plan or Action Plan for FFY 2014, or both, and the process by which the public input is gathered. The Commonwealth encourages public participation in this process.

FDC-016-6636.1—Structure Replacement, Bridge No. 16-0023, Landrus Road over Lick Creek Forest District 16, Tioga State Forest, Bloss Township, Tioga County. Work included under this contract includes demolition of existing structure #58-7935-5116-0023, consisting of an existing steel I-beam bridge on stone masonry abutments with a 15'-2" clear span. It will be replaced with a precast reinforced concrete box culvert and precast concrete end sections with an 18' clear roadway width. The box culvert will have a 17' span, a 9' rise and a 7' under clearance. Replacement also includes driving surface aggregate, rock lining and architectural surface treatment, construction of

approximately 137.5 linear feet of guiderail, 42 linear feet of structure mounted guiderail, three Type 2 Strong Post End Treatments and one permanent tangent impact attenuator and relocation of two gravity fed water pipes.

FDC-010-3852.1—Superstructure Replacement, Bridge No. 10-0040, Birch Island Road over Amos Branch, Forest District 10, Sproul State Forest, West Keating Township, Clinton County. Work included under this contract consists of rehabilitation of Bridge No. 18-7935-5110-0040. The existing structure which is approximately 11' wide and 12'-6" long will be removed and replaced with a new superstructure that will be 14'-1-1/2" wide and 12'-3" long and will be a reinforced concrete slab bridge with structure mounted guiderail. The existing stone masonry abutments and wingwalls will be rehabilitated. New reinforced concrete caps will be installed on the abutments. Also included are construction of 170 feet of approach roadway work and 40 linear feet of approach guiderail and construction of rock lining along both existing substructure units and along the banks on the south side of the structure.

FDC-133-7561.1—Replace Main Waterline, Bald Eagle State Park, Liberty Township, Centre County. MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

In addition, the Department imposes a technology-based aluminum limit of 2.0 mg/l (30 day average) to protect stream uses.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 362-0600-001, NPDES Program Implementation—Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Concerning Water Quality Management, NPDES Program Implementation, and Related Matters. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

Cervid Parts Importation Ban No. 6

Order

Whereas, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is an infectious and progressive neurological disease that is found in, and always proves fatal to, members of the Family Cervidae (deer, elk or moose, collectively called cervids); and

Whereas, The specific cause of CWD is believed to be prions (abnormal infectious protein particles) that are known to be concentrated in the nervous system and lymphoid tissues of infected cervids; and

Whereas, There are no known treatments for CWD infection, no vaccines to protect against CWD infection, and no approved tests that can detect the presence of CWD in live cervids; and

Whereas, CWD has been designated a "dangerous transmissible disease" of animals by order of the Secretary of Agriculture under the provisions of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2301 et seq.), at 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d); and

Whereas, CWD is known to be transmissible from infected to uninfected cervids by contact with or ingestion of CWD-infected or contaminated cervid parts or materials; and

Whereas, CWD is of particular concern to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania because, it has the potential to have a severe, detrimental impact on both Pennsylvania's wild and captive cervid populations; and

Whereas, the Pennsylvania Game Commission (PGC) has determined that importation of potentially infectious parts or materials from cervids harvested in CWD-endemic States or Canadian Provinces into the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania poses an unacceptable risk of continued introduction of CWD into the state; and

Whereas, The Game and Wildlife Code (Code) (34 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 et seq.) and regulations promulgated thereunder (58 Pa. Code §§ 131.1 et seq.) collectively provide broad authority to the PGC to regulate activities relating to the protection, preservation, and management of game and wildlife, including cervids; and

Whereas, 58 Pa. Code § 137.34 provides specific emergency authority to the Executive Director of the PGC to ban the importation of certain cervid parts from other states or nations to prevent the introduction or spread of CWD into the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Now Therefore, I, R. Matthew Hough, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Code and regulations promulgated thereunder, do hereby order and direct the following:

- 1. The previous executive order concerning cervid parts importation restrictions issued on October 16, 2012 is hereby rescinded in its entirety and replaced by this Order.
- 2. The importation of any high-risk parts or materials from cervids harvested in any CWD-endemic States or Canadian Provinces into the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is hereby strictly prohibited.
- 3. For the purposes of this Order, CWD-endemic States or Canadian Provinces shall be defined as any States or Canadian Provinces where CWD has been detected in wild or captive cervid populations. At present, this includes the following specific States and Canadian Provinces: Alberta, Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Maryland (only designated CWD Management Area), Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York (only Madison and Oneida counties), North Dakota, Oklahoma, Saskatchewan, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Virginia (only CWD Designated Containment Area), West Virginia (only CWD Designated Containment Area), Wisconsin, and Wyoming.
- 4. For the purposes of this Order, the term cervid shall include any member of the family Cervidae (deer), specifically including the following species: black-tailed deer, caribou, elk, fallow deer, moose, mule deer, red deer, sika deer, white-tailed deer, and any hybrids thereof.
- 5. For the purposes of this Order, high-risk parts or materials shall be defined as any parts or materials, derived from cervids, which are known to accumulate abnormal prions. This includes any of the following:
- a. Head (including brain, tonsils, eyes, and lymph nodes);
 - b. Spinal Cord / Backbone (vertebra);
 - c. Spleen;

- d. Skull plate with attached antlers, if visible brain or spinal cord material is present;
- e. Cape, if visible brain or spinal cord material is present;
- f. Upper canine teeth, if root structure or other soft material is present;
- g. Any object or article containing visible brain or spinal cord material;
 - h. Brain-tanned hide.
- 6. This Order shall not be construed to limit the importation of the following cervid parts or materials into the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:
 - a. Meat, without the backbone;
- b. Skull plate with attached antlers, if no visible brain or spinal cord material is present;
- c. Tanned hide or rawhide with no visible brain or spinal cord material present;
- d. Cape, if no visible brain or spinal cord material is present;
- e. Upper canine teeth, if no root structure or other soft material is present; and
- f. Taxidermy mounts, if no visible brain or spinal cord material is present.
- 7. This Order shall not be construed in any manner to limit the PGC's authority to establish additional importation or testing requirements on imported cervid parts or materials.
- 8. This Order is effective immediately and shall remain in effect until rescinded or modified by subsequent order.

Whereas, PDA and the PGC are signatories on the Commonwealth's CWD Response Plan; and

Whereas, The Game and Wildlife Code (Code) (34 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 et seq.) and regulations promulgated thereunder (58 Pa. Code §§ 131.1 et seq.) collectively provide broad authority to the PGC to regulate activities relating to the protection, preservation, and management of game and wildlife, including cervids; and

Whereas, 58 Pa. Code § 137.34 provides specific emergency authority to the Executive Director of the PGC to take actions to mitigate risk factors and to determine the prevalence and geographic distribution of CWD.

Now Therefore, I, R. Matthew Hough, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Code and regulations promulgated thereunder, do hereby order and direct the following:

- 1. Disease Management Areas (DMAs) are designated as set forth below. These DMAs are more graphically illustrated on the maps titled "DMA 1," "DMA 2" and "DMA 3" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundaries and maps of DMA 1, DMA 2 and DMA 3, the written descriptions shall prevail.
- a. DMA 1: Adams and York Counties, Pennsylvania, bounded and described as follows: Starting at the intersection of I-76 and the west bank of the Susquehanna River heading south along the River (21.8 miles) to US Highway 30. Westbound on US Highway 30 (18.3 miles) to Highway 116. Highway 116 towards Hanover (13.7 miles). In Hanover southwest on State Highway 194 (7 miles) to Littlestown, then northwest on State Highway 97 (9.7 miles) to Gettysburg. In Gettysburg, north on State Highway 34 (14.3 miles) to the Idaville road. East on Idaville road (4.8 miles) to the intersection of State Highway 94. North State Highway 94 (2 miles) to Latimore road. East on Latimore Road (1.6 miles) to Mountain road. North on Mountain road (6.9 miles) to Dillsburg and the intersection of US Highway 15. North on US Highway 15 (3.2 miles) to the Yellow Breaches Creek (County Line). Northeast along the banks of the Yellow Breaches Creek (12.1 miles) to the intersection of I-76. East along I-76 (6.4 miles) to the intersection of Susquehanna River and the starting point.
- b. DMA 2: Bedford, Blair, Cambria and Huntingdon Counties, Pennsylvania, bounded and described as follows: The southern boundary of the DMA is the

Pennsylvania-Maryland state line. From the Maryland state line and State Highway 96 intersection in southwestern Bedford County continue east along the Maryland border to the intersection of the State line and Interstate 70 (I-70). Then continue north on I-70 approximately 19 1/4 miles to its intersection with State Highway 915. Continue north on State Highway 915 for 12 1/2 miles, continuing through the segment where it overlaps US Highway 30, to the intersection of State Highway 915 and Wells Valley Road (State Route 4013). Continue northeast along Wells Valley Road (SR 4013) approximately 5 miles to the intersection with State Highway 913, then proceed east on State Highway 913 (New Grenada Highway) for about 1 1/2 miles to its intersection with State Highway 655. Continue northeast along State Highway 655 for 7 3/4 miles to the State Highway 829 intersection in Saltillo, then north along the entire 19 1/2 mile length of State Highway 829 to the intersection with US Highway 22. The DMA boundary follows US Highway 22 northwest for approximately 14 1/2 miles to State Highway 453, then northwest along State Highway 453 for 9 miles to Tyrone. In Tyrone, the boundary follows the western, southbound lane of Interstate 99 6 1/2 miles to State Highway 865 at Bellwood. Follow State Highway 865 west 2 3/4 miles to Grandview Road (State Route 4015). Follow Grandview Road south 6.4 miles to Juniata Gap Road in Altoona. Follow Juniata Gap Road northwest 4 miles to Skyline Drive. Follow Skyline Drive approximately 2 miles southwest to State Highway 36 (Colonel Drake Highway). Follow State Highway 36 west 1 1/2 miles to Coupon-Gallitzin Road (State Route 1015). Follow Coupon-Gallitzin Road southwest 5 1/4 miles to US Highway 22. Follow US Highway 22 southwest for approximately 4 miles to State Highway 53. Follow State Highway 53 southwest 6 1/2 miles State Highway 164 in Portage. Follow State Highway 164 (Puritan Road) 6 3/4 miles to Diamond Lane (SR 3001). Follow Diamond Lane (SR 3001) southeast 2 3/4 miles to State Route 4035. Follow State Route 4035 south 1 1/2 miles to where it becomes Blue Knob Road. Continue following Blue Knob Road south 3 3/4 miles to State Highway 869 (Burnt House Road). Follow State Highway 869 1 mile south to Burkett Hill Road (State Route 4023). Follow Burkett Hill Road 2.1 miles west to Lovely Road. Follow Lovely Road 2.3 miles south to Pleasant Hollow Road (State Route 4030). Follow Pleasant Hollow Road 3 1/2 miles northwest to Calvary Hollow Road. Follow Calvary Hollow Road 2 3/4 miles south to State Highway 56. Follow State Highway 56 east 2 miles to State Highway 96 in Pleasantville. Follow State Highway 96 south 10 miles to US Highway 30. Continue south on State Highway 96 for 3 miles to its intersection with State Highway 31, then follow State Highway 96's overlap with State Highway 31 for about 1 3/4 miles to the next intersection of State Highways 31 and 96. Continue south on State Highway 96 for approximately 22 1/2 miles to the Maryland state

c. DMA 3: Clearfield and Jefferson Counties, Pennsylvania, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the Northwest corner of the DMA at the intersection of State Highway 36 and Interstate 80 (I-80), proceed east on I-80 for 27 miles to where Anderson Creek Road intersects I-80. Continue southwest on Anderson Creek Road 1.8 miles to Home Camp Road (State Route 4016). Follow Home Camp Road south 2 1/2 miles to the intersection with US Highway 322 Rockton Mountain Highway). Continue west on US Highway 322 for 4 miles to US Highway 219, then south on along US Highway 219 for 20 1/4 miles to the intersection with State Highway 36. Continue west on the US 219/State Highway 36 overlap

for 2 1/4 miles, then continue north on State Highway 36. Follow State Highway 36 (Colonel Drake Highway) northwest for 32 1/2 miles to its intersection with US Highway 322 (Main Street) in Brookville. Continue west on State Highway 36's overlap with US Highway 322 for approximately 3/4 miles, then continue north on State Highway 36 for 1/2 mile to the intersection with Interstate 80.

- 2. Except as follows, the removal or exportation of high risk cervid parts from the above described DMAs is prohibited. The PGC may designate approved locations outside of the above described DMAs for the receipt of high risk cervid parts.
- 3. For the purposes of this Order, high-risk parts or materials shall be defined as any parts or materials derived from cervids which are know to accumulate abnormal prions. This includes any of the following:
- a. Head (including brain, tonsils, eyes and lymph nodes);
 - b. Spinal Cord/Backbone (vertebra);
 - c. Spleen;
- d. Skull plate with attached antlers, if visible brain or spinal cord material is present;
- e. Cape, if visible brain or spinal cord material is present;
- f. Upper canine teeth, if root structure or other soft material is present;
- g. Any object or article containing visible brain or spinal cord material;
 - h. Brain-tanned hide.
- 4. For the purposes of this Order, high-risk parts or materials shall not include any of the following:
 - i. Meat, without the backbone;
- j. Skull plate with attached antlers, if no visible brain or spinal cord material is present;
- k. Tanned hide or rawhide with no visible brain or spinal cord material present;
- l. Cape, if no visible brain or spinal cord material is present:
- m. Upper canine teeth, if no root structure or other soft material is present; and
- n. Taxidermy mounts, if no visible brain or spinal cord material is present.
- 5. All cervids killed within the DMAs are subject to CWD testing. This testing may require hunters to present cervids, or cervid parts, for checking and sampling at prescribed locations pursuant to conditions set forth in a forthcoming process. The process shall be made known through public announcement, website and other means reasonably intended to reach the widest audience. The cost of such testing and reporting to the hunter to be borne by the PGC.
- 6. The rehabilitation of cervids within the DMAs is prohibited.
- 7. The use or possession of cervid urine-based attractants is prohibited in any outdoor setting within the established DMAs.
- 8. Direct or indirect feeding of wild, free-ranging cervids within the DMAs is prohibited. This prohibition shall not be construed to apply to normal or accepted agricultural, habitat management, oil and gas drilling, mining, forest management or other legitimate commer-


cial or industrial practices. If otherwise lawful feeding is attracting cervids, the PGC may provide written notice prohibiting such activity. Failure to discontinue such activity is a violation of this Order. For the purposes of this Order, feeding shall include the act of placing any artificial or natural substance for the use or consumption of wild, free-ranging cervids on an annual, seasonal or emergency basis.

- 9. No new PGC permits to possess or transport live cervids in the DMAs may be issued.
- 10. Except as follows, the possession and removal of vehicular killed cervids, or parts therefrom, from areas within the DMAs to locations outside the DMAs is prohibited. The PGC may designate approved locations outside of the above described DMAs for the receipt of high risk cervid parts.
- 11. The requirements and restrictions of this Order are to be construed as separate from and in addition to any


- previous or future Executive Orders concerning the importation of high risk cervid parts from areas outside of this Commonwealth.
- 12. This Order shall not be construed in any manner to limit the PGC's authority to establish additional importation, exportation, possession, transportation or testing requirements on cervid parts or materials.
- 13. Nothing in this Order shall be construed to extend to the regulation of captive cervids held under 3 Pa.C.S. Chapter 27 (relating to the Domestic Animal Law) or the requirements of a lawful quarantine order issued by PDA.
- 14. This Order is effective immediately and shall remain in effect until rescinded or modified by subsequent order



The Order of the Commissioner may be subject to judicial review by the Commonwealth Court.

Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Programs; Public Meeting on Federal Fiscal Year 2014 Intended Use Plans

The Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PENNVEST) and the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) have prepared the Federal Fiscal Year (FY) 2014 Intended Use Plans (IUP). These IUPs include a list of drinking water, wastewater treatment, nonpoint source and pollution abatement projects to be considered for a design and engineering or construction loan or grant from funds the Commonwealth expects to receive from the Federal FY 2014 Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) and Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) programs.

In accordance with United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) guidelines on the development of the IUPs, a public meeting has been scheduled for June 10, 2014, at 1 p.m. in the 2nd Floor Auditorium, Rachel Carson State Office Building, 400 Market Street, Harrisburg, PA. This meeting is scheduled for the purpose of receiving comments from the public regarding the Federal FY 2014 IUPs. Interested persons are invited to express their views on the narrative portion of the IUPs, the DWSRF set-aside work plan or the priority rating or ranking of projects on the IUPs. Persons wishing to offer comments at the public meeting should contact the Division of Technical and Financial Assistance at the address or telephone number listed at the end of this notice or by e-mail to vbkasi@pa.gov by 4 p.m. on June 9, 2014. When written statements are prepared and will be submitted at the meeting, speakers will be asked to restrict the oral portion of the statement to a summary of the written comments.

The projects to be considered for a loan or grant from the DWSRF and CWSRF programs must meet the Federal requirements for funding in accordance with the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act and Clean Water Act. Accordingly, the projects included in the IUPs are expected to meet the requirements applicable to the use of the DWSRF and CWSRF loan or grant funds. Projects listed in the FY 2014 IUPs are on the Commonwealth's Project Priority Lists (PPL) and are expected to proceed with design and engineering or construction within the

next 2 years. A project must appear on a PENNVEST-approved IUP before it can receive a loan or grant from the State Revolving Fund programs. A project's readiness to proceed and the reasonable availability of alternative funds also have a bearing on project selection for the IUPs. Consequently, the rank ordered list of projects on the PPLs does not solely dictate the order in which projects will be chosen for inclusion in an IUP.

The DWSRF will be capitalized with approximately \$28.3 million in Federal funds and approximately \$5.7 million of State funds. Approximately \$4.3 million of these funds will be set aside for technical assistance to small systems, operator training and certification, and source water assessment and protection, as authorized under the Safe Drinking Water Act. The DWSRF IUP also includes a narrative work plan that describes how these set-aside funds will be used. PENNVEST is also allocating an additional \$1.1 million for administrative purposes. Finally, an additional \$5.6 million must be setaside for additional subsidization to disadvantaged communities. The FY 2014 DWSRF grant does not have a requirement to set-aside funding for green infrastructure projects. However, the Commonwealth will continue to promote them. These projects can fall into one of four categories: (1) water efficiency; (2) energy efficiency; (3) environmentally innovative; or (4) green stormwater infrastructure and meet the EPA criteria for green infrastructure.

The CWSRF will be capitalized with approximately \$55.1 million of Federal funds and approximately \$11.1 million of State funds. Approximately \$2.2 million will be set aside for program administration costs. Finally, an additional \$3 million must be set-aside for additional subsidization to disadvantaged communities and \$5.5 million must be set-aside for green infrastructure projects that fall into one or more of the following categories: (1) water efficiency; (2) energy efficiency; (3) environmentally innovative; or (4) green stormwater infrastructure and meet the EPA criteria for green infrastructure.

It is not necessary to appear at the public meeting to present comments on the narrative portion of the IUPs, the set-aside work plan or the PPLs. Interested persons may also submit written comments to the Department at the address that follows. Written comments will be considered equivalent to oral statements presented at the meeting. To be considered by the Department and PENN-VEST, the written comments must be received by the Division of Technical and Financial Assistance by 5 p.m. on June 30, 2014.
