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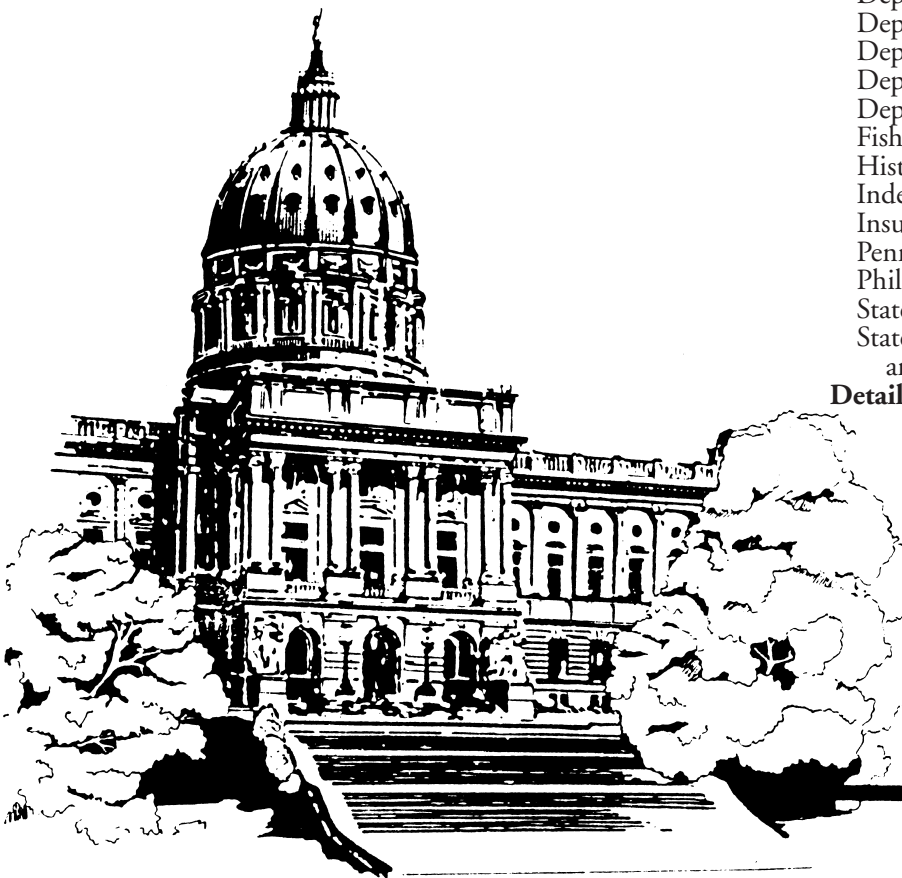
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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylvania Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us.

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Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Proposed Rule 405

TITLE 237. JUVENILE RULES

PART I. RULES

Subpart A. DELINQUENCY MATTERS

CHAPTER 4. ADJUDICATORY HEARING

Rule 405. Forensic Laboratory Report Certification.

A. Certification in lieu of expert testimony.

1) If the requirements of this rule have been met, the attorney for the Commonwealth may seek to offer a forensic laboratory report into evidence in lieu of testimony in any adjudicatory hearing.

2) The report shall be supported by a certification, as provided in paragraph (E), from the expert who drafted the report and performed the analysis or examination.

B. Notice.

1) The attorney for the Commonwealth shall file and serve written notice upon the juvenile's attorney.

2) The notice shall include a statement informing the juvenile that:

a) if no written demand for testimony as provided in paragraph (C)(3) is made, the forensic laboratory report and certification are admissible in evidence; and

b) the expert who drafted the report does not have to testify.

3) Service shall occur no later than 20 days prior to the adjudicatory hearing.

4) Once entered into evidence, the report and certification shall qualify as if the expert had testified personally.

C. Demand.

1) Within 10 days of service of the notice, the juvenile's attorney may file and serve a written demand upon the attorney for the Commonwealth requiring the expert to testify at the adjudicatory hearing.

2) If a written demand is filed and served, the expert must testify.

3) If no demand is filed and served as required by paragraph (C)(1), the report and certification are admissible in evidence without the expert's testimony.

D. *Extension.* For cause shown, the judge may:

1) extend the time requirements of this rule; and/or

2) grant a continuance of the adjudicatory hearing.

E. *Certification.* The expert shall complete a certification providing:

1) the education, training, and experience that qualify the expert to perform the analysis or examination;

2) the entity by which the expert is employed and a description of the expert's regular duties;

3) the name and location of the laboratory where the analysis or examination was performed;

4) any state, national, or international accreditations of the laboratory at which the analysis or examination was performed;

5) that the analysis or examination was performed under industry-approved procedures or standards; and

6) the report accurately reflects the findings and opinions of the expert.

Comment

This rule was adopted in 201- to create a uniform procedure for delinquency proceedings similar to Pa.R.Crim.P. 574, which was adopted to address the issues raised by the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Melendez-Diaz v. Massachusetts*, 129 U.S. 2527 (2009). Its decision held that the 6th Amendment's confrontation right precluded presentation of laboratory reports without a live witness testifying at trial. In *Melendez-Diaz*, the U.S. Supreme Court noted with approval the use of "notice and demand" procedures. These procedures allow routine reports to be admitted without the expense of live expert testimony while protecting a defendant's confrontation rights.

Under the Pennsylvania Constitution, Art. 1, § 9, juveniles are to be afforded the same due process rights as adult defendants, including the right to confront witnesses. See *In re Davis*, 546 A.2d 1149 (Pa. Super. Ct.

1988); *Com. v. McNaughton*, 381 A.2d 929 (Pa. Super. Ct. 1977). See also *In re Winship*, 397 U.S. 358 (1970) and *In re Gault*, 387 U.S. 1 (1967).

This rule provides a “notice and demand” procedure for delinquency proceedings. Under this rule, the attorney for the Commonwealth may seek to admit a forensic laboratory report as evidence without expert testimony if the notice requirements are met and no demand for the presence of the expert is made. If the juvenile makes such a demand, the expert is required to testify before the report can be admitted into evidence.

Nothing in this rule is intended to: 1) preclude a stipulation agreed to by the parties for the admission of the report without the expert’s presence; 2) prevent further stipulation by the parties in light of the admission of the report and certification; or 3) change the discovery requirements pursuant to Rule 340.

Pursuant to paragraph (D), the court may permit filing of the notice or demand after the time period required in the rule if the party seeking the late filing shows cause for the delay. In the situation where the judge permits the late filing of the notice, the juvenile still has ten days to make the demand for the live testimony of the expert. This may necessitate a continuance of the adjudicatory hearing.

The certification in paragraph (E) does not require a description of the actual tests performed for the analysis. This information more properly belongs in the report itself. Because one of the goals of this rule is to permit the juvenile to make an informed decision regarding whether to demand the live testimony of the expert, the report should provide information sufficient to describe the methodology by which the results were determined.

For purposes of this rule, a laboratory is “accredited” when its management, personnel, quality system, operational and technical procedures, equipment, and physical facilities meet standards established by a recognized state, national, or international accrediting organization such as the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accrediting Board (ASCLD/LAB) or Forensic Quality Services—International (FQS-I).

See Rule 345 for filing and service requirements.

EXPLANATORY REPORT

The Juvenile Court Procedural Rules Committee (Committee) is seeking public comment on an entirely new proposed Rule 405 regarding the notice and demand requirements in presentation of a forensic lab report at an adjudicatory hearing without the presence of a live witness.

This rule is being proposed to create a uniform procedure for delinquency proceedings similar to Pa.R.Crim.P. 574, which was adopted to address the issues raised by the U.S. Supreme Court’s decision in *Melendez-Diaz v. Massachusetts*, 129 U.S. 2527 (2009). Its decision held that the 6th Amendment’s confrontation right precluded presentation of laboratory reports without a live witness testifying at trial. In *Melendez-Diaz*, the U.S. Supreme Court noted with approval the use of “notice and demand” procedures. See paragraph (B) for notice requirements and paragraph (C) for demand requirements.

An adjudicatory hearing may have to be continued if the court permits the filing of the notice or demand after the time period required if the party shows cause for the delay pursuant to paragraph (D). The demand period will run ten days from the date on the late filing of the notice.

Paragraph (E) provides for the requirements of the certification.

CHAPTER 13. PRE-ADJUDICATORY PROCEDURES

PART A. VENUE

Rule 1302. Inter-County Transfer.

A. *Transfer.* A court may transfer a case to another county at any [time] stage of the dependency proceedings.

1) Prior to the transfer of the case, the transferring court and receiving court shall communicate regarding jurisdiction of the case.

2) If there is an agreement to transfer the case:

a) the transferring court shall enter an order transferring the case; and

b) the receiving court shall enter an order accepting jurisdiction and scheduling the next court proceeding in accordance with these Rules.

B. *Transmission of official court record.* If the case is transferred pursuant to paragraph (A):

1) the transferring court shall transfer certified copies of all documents, reports, and summaries in the child's official court record to the receiving court; and

2) the county agency of the transferring court shall transfer all its records to the county agency where jurisdiction has been transferred.

Comment

Prior to the transferring of a case to another judicial district, the judge of the transferring court is to communicate with the judge of the receiving court. See paragraph (A)(1). Communication is essential to ensure all the details of the case are conveyed and any issues are resolved. If there is an agreement between the judges to transfer, each judge is to issue an order. The transferring court is to enter an order: 1) transferring the case to the receiving court; and 2) ordering the official court record and county agency records to be transferred with the case. See paragraphs (A)(2)(a) & (B). Pursuant to paragraph (A)(2)(b), the receiving court shall: 1) enter an order accepting jurisdiction of the case; and 2) schedule the next court proceeding.

To ensure there is no interruption in services to the child, the transferring county is to continue services until the case has been transferred officially by the entrance of court orders pursuant to paragraphs (A)(2)(a) & (b).

See 42 Pa.C.S. § 6321.

CHAPTER 15. DISPOSITIONAL HEARING

PART B. DISPOSITIONAL HEARING AND AIDS

Rule 1515. Dispositional Order.

* * * * *

Comment

See 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 6310, 6351.

If the dispositional order changes custody of the child, the order should be filed and docketed in

Juvenile Court and in any existing custody case in Civil Court under the Domestic Relations docket.

When issuing a dispositional order, the court should issue an order that is "best suited to the safety, protection, and physical, mental, and moral welfare of the child." 42 Pa.C.S. § 6351(a). See *In re S.J.*, 906 A.2d 547, 551 (Pa. Super. Ct. 2006) (citing *In re Tameka M.*, 525 Pa. 348, 580 A.2d 750 (1990)), for issues addressing a child's mental and moral welfare.

* * * * *

CHAPTER 16. POST-DISPOSITIONAL PROCEDURES

PART B(2). PERMANENCY HEARING

Rule 1608. Permanency Hearing.

* * * * *

D. *Court's findings.*

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2) *Additional findings for fifteen of last twenty-two months.* If the child has been in placement for fifteen of the last twenty-two months, the court may direct the county agency to file a petition to terminate parental rights.

3) *Transition plan for children eighteen years of age or older.*

a) A hearing shall be held at least ninety days prior to the child turning eighteen years of age for the purpose of approving a transition plan.

b) Prior to the hearing, the child shall have the opportunity to make decisions about the transition plan and confer with the county agency about the details of the plan. The county agency shall provide the transition plan to the court and the plan shall, at a minimum, include:

- i) the specific plans for housing;
- ii) a description of the child's source of income;
- iii) the specific plans for pursuing educational or vocational training goals;
- iv) the child's employment goals and whether the child is employed;
- v) a description of the health insurance plan that the child is expected to obtain and any continued health or behavioral health needs of the child;
- vi) a description of any available programs that would provide mentors or assistance in establishing positive adult connections;
- vii) verification that all vital identification documents and records have been provided to the child;
- viii) a description of any other needed support services; and
- ix) notice to the child that the child can request resumption of juvenile court jurisdiction until the child turns twenty-one years of age if specific conditions are met.

c) At the hearing, the court shall review the transition plan for the child. If the court is not satisfied that the requirements of paragraph (D)(3)(b) have been met, a subsequent hearing shall be scheduled.

E. *Advanced communication technology.* Upon good cause shown, a court may utilize advanced communication technology pursuant to Rule 1129.

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Comment

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The court is to move expeditiously towards permanency. A goal change motion may be filed at any time.

Pursuant to paragraph (D)(3)(b), the county agency is to assist the child and provide all the support necessary in developing a transition plan. See 42 U.S.C. § 675(5)(A)—(H).

Pursuant to paragraph (D)(3)(c), the court is to approve a transition plan that is suitable for the child and that has been personalized at the direction of the child.

In addition to the permanency hearing contemplated by this rule, courts may also conduct additional and/or more frequent intermittent review hearings or status conferences, which address specific issues based on the circumstances of the case, and which assist the court in ensuring timely permanency.

* * * * *

Rule 1610. Permanency Hearing for Children over Eighteen.

A. *Purpose and timing of hearing.* For every case for children over the age of eighteen, the court shall conduct a permanency hearing at least every six months for purposes of determining:

2) whether the transition plan of the child is consistent with Rule [1631(E)(2)] 1608(D)(3);

PART D. CESSATION OR RESUMPTION OF COURT SUPERVISION OR JURISDICTION

Rule 1631. Termination of Court Supervision.

* * * * *

E. *Children eighteen years of age or older.*

[1) Before the court can terminate its supervision of a child who is eighteen years of age or older, a hearing shall be held at least ninety days prior to the child turning eighteen years of age.

2) Prior to the hearing, the child shall have the opportunity to make decisions about the transition plan and confer with the county agency about the details of the plan. The county agency shall provide the transition plan to the court and the plan shall, at a minimum, include:

- a) the specific plans for housing;
- b) a description of the child’s source of income;
- c) the specific plans for pursuing educational or vocational training goals;
- d) the child’s employment goals and whether the child is employed;
- e) a description of the health insurance plan that the child is expected to obtain and any continued health or behavioral health needs of the child;
- f) a description of any available programs that would provide mentors or assistance in establishing positive adult connections;

g) verification that all vital identification documents and records have been provided to the child;

h) a description of any other needed support services; and

i) notice to the child that the child can request resumption of juvenile court jurisdiction until the child turns twenty-one years of age if specific conditions are met.

3) At the hearing, the court shall review the transition plan for the child. If the court is not satisfied that the requirements of paragraph (E)(2) have been met, a subsequent hearing shall be scheduled.

4)] The court shall not terminate its supervision of the child without approving an appropriate transition plan pursuant to Rule 1608, unless the child, after an appropriate transition plan has been offered, is unwilling to consent to the supervision and the court determines termination is warranted.

* * * * *

Comment

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Pursuant to 42 Pa.C.S. § 6351(a)(2.1), a court may transfer permanent legal custody to a person found by the court to be qualified to receive and care for the child. 42 Pa.C.S. § 6351(a)(2.1). See also *Justin S.*, 375 Pa.Super. 88, 543 A.2d 1192 (1988).

[Pursuant to paragraph (E)(2), the county agency is to assist the child and provide all the support necessary in developing a transition plan. See 42 U.S.C. § 675(5)(A)—(H).

Pursuant to paragraph (E)(3), the court is to approve a transition plan that is suitable for the child and that has been personalized at the direction of the child.]

If the court has resumed jurisdiction pursuant to Rule 1635, a new transition plan is to be developed for the child. Before the court can terminate supervision, the requirements of paragraph (E) are to be followed. In no case is a juvenile over twenty-one to remain under juvenile court supervision. See Rule 1635(E). See also Rule 1635(E) for termination of juvenile court jurisdiction if the court denies the motion for resumption of jurisdiction.

EXPLANATORY REPORT

The Juvenile Court Procedural Rules Committee (Committee) is seeking public comment on modifications to Rules 1302, 1515, 1608, 1610, and 1631. These proposed modifications address inter-county transfer, docketing a change in custody, and clarifying the timing of a transition plan hearing.

Rule 1302

There have been questions regarding the methodology of transferring a case. These modifications seek to clarify the procedure.

Judges should be communicating informally with each other (e.g. telephone, email) to decide whether a case should be transferred and whether the receiving court is willing to agree to the transfer of the case. There is a multitude of issues that may arise in transfer cases, including where jurisdiction lies if a party has moved, custody has changed to an outside county person, or

another similar situation. There are also frequently many issues in the case and a better understanding of those issues can be relayed by a simple conversation.

After this communication, the judges decide together whether a case will be transferred. If transfer will occur, each judge must issue an order. The transferring court will enter an order: 1) transferring the case to the receiving court; and 2) ordering the official court record and county agency records to be transferred to the receiving court. At the same time, the receiving court will issue an order: 1) accepting jurisdiction of the case; and 2) scheduling the next court event.

At no time should a child be without services while transfer of a case is being discussed. The transferring county must continue to provide services until both orders have been issued.

Rule 1515

There are times when the judge in juvenile court issues an order changing the custody of the child that could affect an existing custody case. To ensure all parties are notified properly, the order changing custody must be docketed on both dockets: Juvenile Court and Civil Court.

Rule 1608, 1610, and 1631

Under the current Rules, the transition plan hearing is in the Termination of Court Supervision rule. After thoughtful consideration, the Committee believes it is more appropriately placed in the permanency hearing rule. The entire content of this procedure has been lifted from Rule 1631 and placed into Rule 1608.

The purpose of this move is to ensure hearings occur prior to the child's eighteenth birthday and that the county agency is prepared with achieving these requirements prior to that timeframe. In many instances, a transition plan takes time for thoughtful discussion of the available services with the child. Planning, making decisions, and providing services must occur. If a county agency waits until time of termination of a case, many plans would fail for lack of ample time to complete the plan. It is essential to consider thoughtfully all the details necessary to achieve independence while giving the child the time needed.

And Now, this 19th day of May, 2014, upon the recommendation of the Minor Court Rules Committee; the proposal having been published for public comment at 43 Pa.B. 5701 (September 28, 2013):

It Is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania that Rule 320 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure Governing Actions and Proceedings before Magisterial District Judges is adopted in the following form.

This *Order* shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. No. 103(b), and shall be effective July 20, 2014.

Annex A

TITLE 246. MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES

PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 300. CIVIL ACTION

Rule 320. Request to Withdraw Complaint; Settlement.

A(1) A plaintiff may withdraw the complaint prior to the commencement of the hearing by filing a written notice of withdrawal with the magisterial district court. Upon receipt of such notice, the magisterial district court shall note the withdrawal of the complaint on the docket, cancel any scheduled hearing (except for a consolidated hearing on a cross-complaint pursuant to Rule 315B), and notify the parties in writing that the complaint has been withdrawn.

(2) A withdrawal of the complaint filed prior to the commencement of the hearing shall be deemed to be without prejudice. The plaintiff may file a new complaint on the same cause of action upon payment of all applicable fees and costs.

B(1) The parties may file a written notice of settlement of the complaint with the magisterial district court at any time prior to the entry of judgment. Upon receipt of such notice, the magisterial district court shall note the case settled on the docket, cancel any scheduled hearing (except for a consolidated hearing on a cross-complaint pursuant to Rule 315B), and notify the parties in writing that the complaint has been marked settled.

(2) Where the parties have filed a notice of settlement with the magisterial district court and a subsequent breach of the settlement agreement occurs, a party may file a new complaint citing breach of the settlement agreement as the cause of action.

C(1) The withdrawal or settlement of the plaintiff's complaint shall not affect the right of the defendant to proceed with a cross-complaint filed pursuant to Rule 315A.

(2) The defendant may file a written notice of withdrawal of the cross-complaint in the manner set forth in subdivision A.

(3) The parties may file a written notice of settlement of the cross-complaint in the manner set forth in subdivision B.

Official Note: A complaint filed pursuant to subparagraph A(2) or B(2) shall not be treated as a "reinstatement" of the underlying action, and is subject to all prescribed fees and costs for filing and service of a complaint. Compare with Rule 314E, which provides for reinstatement of the complaint under the limited circumstance of failure to make timely service.

This rule also applies to the withdrawal or settlement of a cross-complaint. Moreover, a cross-complaint will survive the withdrawal or settlement of the corresponding complaint.

Prior Rule 320, addressing continuances, was rescinded by Order of December 16, 2004, effective July 1, 2005, and its provisions were added to Rule 209.

Procedures for Withdrawing the Complaint or
Settling An Action

On May 19, 2014, effective July 20, 2014, upon recommendation of the Minor Court Rules Committee², the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania adopted new Rule 320³ of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure before Magisterial District Judges.

I. Background and Discussion

The Minor Court Rules Committee (“Committee”) recommended adoption of new Rule 320 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure before Magisterial District Judges (“Rules”). The goal of this new rule is to establish procedures for the withdrawal of complaints by plaintiffs, for recording the settlement of actions by the parties, and to clarify the effect of withdrawals and settlements on the action and any cross-complaint filed pursuant to Rule 315A.

The Committee was advised of inconsistencies in statewide practice and uncertainty for litigants resulting from the absence of a rule based practice in the magisterial district courts for withdrawal of the complaint and recording of a settlement of the action. The Committee agreed that there should be a rule or rules providing for the withdrawal of complaints and settlement of actions. Additionally, the Committee thought it would be helpful to clarify that civil actions ended by withdrawal of the complaint or settlement by the parties are not eligible for “reinstatement”, as that term is used in Rule 314E.⁴ The Committee published a proposal at Volume 43, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, p. 5701 (43 Pa.B. 5701, September 28, 2013) that included such procedures.

II. Approved Rule Changes

New Rule 320 establishes procedures for the withdrawal of complaints by plaintiffs, and settlement of actions by the parties. Rule 320A permits a plaintiff to withdraw a complaint prior to the start of the hearing upon written notice to the magisterial district court. Upon receipt of such notice, the magisterial district court notes the withdrawal on the docket, cancels the scheduled hearing (if the defendant has not filed a cross-complaint), and notifies the parties in writing. With respect to the future rights of the parties, the withdrawal of a complaint is deemed to be without prejudice, and a plaintiff may file a new complaint upon payment of all applicable fees and costs. Under no circumstances should a new complaint filed pursuant to this rule be treated as a “reinstatement”, as that term is used in Rule 314E (*i.e.*, the limited circumstance of failure to make timely service of the complaint).

¹ The Committee’s Final Report should not be confused with the Official Notes to the Rules. Also, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania does not adopt the Committee’s Official Notes or the contents of the explanatory Final Reports.

² Minor Court Rules Committee Recommendation 1-2014.

³ A prior Rule 320, addressing continuances, was rescinded by Order of December 16, 2004, effective July 1, 2005. The provisions of prior Rule 320 were added to Rule 209 in order to have one rule containing all provisions related to continuances. The Committee recommended using number 320 for this new rule because it places the new rule in the logical procedural sequence.

⁴ Rule 314E provides that “a complaint that has been dismissed without prejudice for failure to make service pursuant to subdivision D of this rule may be reinstated at any time and any number of times.”

Similarly, Rule 320B permits the parties to file a notice of settlement with the magisterial district court at any time prior to the entry of judgment. Upon receipt of such notice, the magisterial district court notes the case settled on the docket, cancels the scheduled hearing (if the defendant has not filed a cross-complaint), and notifies the parties in writing. If a subsequent breach of the settlement agreement occurs, the party should file a new complaint citing breach of the settlement agreement as the cause of action, subject to all applicable fees and costs. Under Rule 320B(2), the original complaint may not be “reinstated.”

Finally, Rule 320C addresses the effect of a withdrawal or settlement of the complaint on a cross-complaint filed by the defendant, and provides instruction on the method of having a cross-complaint marked withdrawn or settled. A cross-complaint filed pursuant to Rule 315A may be “any claim against the plaintiff that is within the jurisdiction of a magisterial district judge.” Further, “[s]uch a claim need not arise from the same transaction or occurrence from which the plaintiff’s claim arose, nor need it be the same type of claim.” See Rule 315A. Therefore, the withdrawal or settlement of the underlying complaint does not automatically terminate the cross-complaint. Any scheduled hearing on a cross-complaint should proceed, unless the defendant takes affirmative action to withdraw the cross-complaint, or the court is notified that the cross-complaint has been settled.

Rule No. *204.1. Pleadings and other Legal Papers. Format.

(a) In order to accommodate the filing of documents in an electronic format as authorized by Philadelphia Civil Rule *205.4, all "legal papers," as defined in Pa.R.C.P. No. 205.4(a)(2), must conform to the following requirements:

- (1) All files must be no larger than 5MB each. . . .

* * * * *

Rule No. *206.1(a). Designation of Petitions.

(1) In addition to petitions to open default judgment and petitions to open judgment of non pros, the following applications are designated "petitions" and are governed by the procedures set forth in Pa.R.C.P. 206.1 et seq.:

- (i) Petition to Appoint Arbitrator;
- (ii) Petition to Appoint A Receiver;
- (iii) Petition to Compel Arbitration;
- (iv) Petition to Confirm Arbitration Award;
- (v) Petition to Confirm Settlement;
- (vi) Petition for Contempt;
- (vii) Petition to Set Aside Arbitration Award;
- (viii) Statutory Petitions; and
- (ix) Petition to Appoint a Sequestrator.

Rule *1302. Appointment of Arbitrators.

(a) The Director of the Arbitration Center shall maintain an Arbitrator List of attorneys who have been deemed to be qualified to sit as Arbitrators in the Compulsory Arbitration Program of the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County.

(b) Minimum criteria for qualification includes membership of the Bar of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, active practice of law for a minimum of one year subsequent to admission to the Bar of the Supreme Court of

Pennsylvania for panelists and five years for Chairpersons, maintenance of a principal office in Philadelphia County, attendance of a court-approved arbitration seminar and trial of a civil case in any forum in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Director of the Arbitration Program shall make available an Application for Initial Certification as Arbitration Panelist form, substantially in the form set forth hereunder, requiring the necessary information for determination of qualifications.

(c) Attorneys not currently enrolled on the Arbitration List may request to be included thereon by completing the Court supplied Application Form.

(d) The Director of the Arbitration Center from the Court-approved Arbitration List panelists and chairperson for assignment.

(e) Arbitrators no longer maintaining their principal office in Philadelphia County are required to promptly advise the Director of the Arbitration Center in writing.

(f) The Director of the Arbitration Center may, from time to time, strike the name of an attorney from the Arbitrator List in accordance with this rule.

(g) An issue concerning disqualification of an Arbitrator from a particular case shall first be raised with the Arbitration Panel and, if appropriate, with the Director of the Arbitration Center.

Rule *1303. Scheduling of Arbitration Hearings. Relistings. Consolidations.

* * * * *

(b) *Deferred Status.*

- (1) *To Obtain Deferred Status.*

* * * * *

(ii) *Other Than Initial Filing.* Any party may seek deferral of a case by filing a Miscellaneous Arbitration Application substantially in the form set forth hereunder, setting forth the reasons for the Deferral. Before filing the Miscellaneous Arbitration Application with the Arbitration Center, counsel shall comply with the instructions set forth on said Form.

* * * * *

- (2) *Compulsory Arbitration Hearing Order*

* * * * *

(ii) *Other Deferred Cases.* When any party advises the Director of the Arbitration Center that the reasons for the deferral are no longer applicable, or upon Order of Court, the case shall be removed from Deferred Status and appropriate action shall be taken.

(c) *Continuances.* All requests for continuances shall be made as provided herein.

* * * * *

(2) *Written Request.* All requests for continuance of Arbitration Hearings shall be in writing on a Continuance & Deferral Application substantially in the form set forth hereunder and shall be filed in accordance with President Judge Administrative Order No. 2009-02. The Continuance & Deferral Application shall set forth the specific reasons for the continuance and the legal basis for the continuance, as provided in Pa.R.C.P. 216 and this rule, the position of all other counsel or unrepresented parties and the date and time mutually convenient to all parties, for the relisting of the Arbitration Hearing.

(3) *Procedure for Obtaining Continuance.* A Continuance & Deferral Application shall be filed with the Arbitration Center and as may otherwise be provided in the Application. A copy of the Continuance & Deferral Application must be served, as required, on opposing counsel and unrepresented parties contemporaneously with its filing with the Arbitration Center. Upon receipt of the Continuance & Deferral Application, the Director of the Arbitration Center, or his/her designee, shall rule on the request, and, in appropriate cases, may consult with the Administrative Judge of the Trial Division or his/her designee. There shall be no hearing or oral argument on the request for continuance or a ruling thereon, and the ruling is not subject to judicial scrutiny at the request of any party.

* * * * *

(d) *Advancement.* A hearing date may be advanced by filing a Continuance & Deferral Application with the Director of the Arbitration Program which shall allege that all parties agree to the advancement to a specific date.

* * * * *

(i) *Settlement Prior to Hearing Date.* Counsel shall give written notification to the Director of the Arbitration Center of any settlement prior to the Arbitration Hearing date and an appropriate Order will be issued. Failure to provide written notice prior to the Arbitration Hearing date will result in the entry of a judgment of non pros if the parties fail to appear for the Call of the List and hearing.

* * * * *

Rule *1304. Arbitration Facilities. Call of the List.

* * * * *

(b) *Call of the List.* There shall be a call of the list of all cases scheduled for the same time. If all parties fail to appear, without having previously obtained a continuance or advised the Director of the Arbitration Center in writing that the case has settled, the case shall be non-crossed.

Rule *1305. Conduct of Arbitration Hearings.

(a) *Rules of Evidence. Supervisory Authority.* Hearings shall be conducted in accordance with the established rules of evidence, liberally construed to promote justice. The Arbitration panel, which may seek the assistance of the Director of the Arbitration Center, shall have the general powers of a court including the power to determine the admissibility of evidence, to permit testimony to be offered by depositions and to decide the law and the facts of the case submitted to them. Provided, however, that the Arbitration panel may not continue any case assigned to it.

* * * * *

Rule *1308. Compensation of Arbitrators.

All arbitrators, whether panel members or chairpersons, shall be compensated at a rate of \$225.00 per day or \$125.00 for one-half day of service, or as may otherwise be established by the Administrative Judge of the Trial Division.

**Proposed Philadelphia County Local Rules
Pursuant to the Protection From Abuse Act**

Rule 1901.1. Scope.

The rules of this chapter shall govern all civil actions or proceedings brought in the Court of Common Pleas for Philadelphia County under the Protection from Abuse Act. 23 Pa.C.S. § 6101 et seq., and shall be cited as "Phila.DR.R."

Rule 1901.2. Scheduling. Continuances.

Cases shall be scheduled consistent with Pa.R.C.P. 1901.2. Upon application of any party or by agreement of the parties, the Court may grant a continuance for good cause shown. Upon the granting of a continuance, the temporary order shall remain in effect unless otherwise ordered.

Rule 1901.3. Emergency Orders. Master for Emergency Relief.

(a) A party may seek emergency relief pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. § 6110 by filing a petition with the Emergency Hearing Master presiding at the Justice Juanita Kidd Stout Center for Criminal Justice, 1301 Filbert Street, Philadelphia, PA whenever the Court of Common Pleas is unavailable.

(b) For the purposes of this Rule, the Court of Common Pleas is unavailable from the close of business at the end

of each day to the resumption of business the next morning or from the end of the business week to the beginning of the next business week.

(c) Emergency Protection from Abuse Unit staff shall assist the plaintiff in filling out the necessary forms.

(d) The Emergency Hearing Master on duty shall review the petition for emergency relief and, when appropriate, grant an emergency order.

(e) The Emergency Hearing Master shall advise the plaintiff that the emergency order will automatically be certified to the Family Division of the Court of Common Pleas for a hearing before the assigned Court of Common Pleas Judge.

(f) When an emergency order is certified, the case shall be scheduled for hearing before the assigned Court of Common Pleas Judge within ten business days from the date on which the petition was filed.

(g) All certified emergency orders shall continue in effect until review by the assigned Court of Common Pleas Judge on the next business day.

(h) At the beginning of the next business day, all certified emergency orders and accompanying petitions shall be delivered to the Domestic Violence Unit, Family Division, which shall arrange for docketing and delivery to the assigned Court of Common Pleas Judge for prompt review. After review, the Judge shall enter temporary orders where necessary to protect the plaintiff and/or minor children until the scheduled hearing.

(i) The Philadelphia Police Department shall assist the plaintiff or any other competent adult in serving the petition and emergency order on the defendant. The notice to defend which shall accompany the petition for an emergency order shall advise the parties of how they may learn whether a temporary order has been issued and if so how they may obtain a copy of that order.

Rule 1901.9. Presence of Domestic Violence Counselor/Advocate in Proceedings.

(a) Upon request of a plaintiff, the Court shall allow a domestic violence counselor/advocate who has accompanied the plaintiff to Court to be present in the courtroom throughout the proceedings.

(b) Where a plaintiff is unrepresented by counsel, the domestic violence counselor/advocate may provide assistance to the plaintiff in his or her presentation of the facts relevant to the action.

(c) A domestic violence counselor/advocate is an individual who is engaged in a domestic violence program, who provides services to victims of domestic violence, who has undergone 40 hours of training and who is under the control of a direct services supervisor of a domestic violence program, the primary purpose of which is the rendering of counseling or assistance to victims of domestic violence.

Rule 1901.10. Evidence. Medical Records, Affidavits of Repair, Statements of Lost Earnings.

The Court shall receive into evidence without further proof copies of bills, hospital and physician reports, and all other records of licensed health care providers which are offered to substantiate claims of personal injury stemming from domestic abuse. The Court shall also receive into evidence without further proof copies of bills, records, reports, affidavits of repair, estimates of value, statements of lost earnings and similar documentation offered to substantiate any other reasonable losses suffered as a result of the abuse. Upon a proper showing, the

Court may continue the hearing to allow any other party to subpoena the person whose testimony is waived by this rule to appear at a later hearing at which time any adverse party may cross-examine him/her as to the document as if he/she were a witness for the party offering the document.

Rule 1901.11. Order by Consent. Consent Agreement.

(a) The parties may agree to the entry of a final order by consent.

(b) The consent agreement shall contain only those terms directly related to Protection From Abuse Act issues which are properly before the Court of Common Pleas.

(c) A consent agreement shall be signed by both parties. If the parties are represented, counsel shall witness their signatures.

(d) The signed consent agreement may be submitted to the Court at the hearing.

Rule 1901.12. Order by Default. Bench Warrant.

If a defendant who was properly served fails to appear in Court at the time of the hearing, the Court, in its discretion, may issue a bench warrant for the arrest of the defendant, or it may enter a final order by default, granting the plaintiff such relief as is proper under the Act.

Rule 1905.1. Bilingual Forms.

Bilingual forms shall be made available to litigants with limited English proficiency in the Spanish language, and in other languages, as the need arises.

**Proposed Philadelphia County Local Rules
Actions for Divorce and Annulment of Marriage**

Rule 1920.1. Scope.

The rules of this chapter shall govern all civil actions or proceedings brought in the Court of Common Pleas for Philadelphia County under the Divorce Code 23 Pa.C.S. § 3101 et seq., and shall be cited as "Phila.DR.R."

Rule 1920.4. Service.

(a) Upon good cause shown, the Court may enter a special order directing service by ordinary mail directed to defendant's last known residence or other address.

(b) The requirements of good cause shall be satisfied upon the filing of an affidavit by plaintiff setting forth the extent of unsuccessful efforts to make service if the address is known, or the nature and extent of a good faith investigation made to ascertain the present residence and whereabouts of a defendant whose whereabouts are unknown.

(1) Such affidavit shall set forth the following information:

(i) the time and place at which the parties last resided together as spouses;

(ii) the last time the parties were in contact with each other, and the defendant's address and telephone number at that time;

(iii) the name and address of the last employer of the defendant either during the time the parties resided together or at a later time, if known to the plaintiff;

(iv) the names and addresses and relationship to defendant of those relatives known to be close to the defendant;

(v) proof that inquiry has been made of applicable voter registration records in an effort to ascertain the address of the defendant;

(vi) any other information which could furnish a fruitful basis for one truly bent on learning the present whereabouts of the defendant;

(vii) such affidavit should detail the particular efforts made to ascertain the defendant's present address and to effect service.

(2) A petition seeking such relief shall be filed with the Court requesting entry of a special order for service. The proposed order accompanying such Petition shall set forth the specific address at which counsel or unrepresented party will serve process on the defendant by regular mail. No hearing shall be held on such Petition unless the Court directs otherwise.

(c) When service of the Complaint in Divorce is made by registered mail, or by Acceptance of Service pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 402(b), service shall not be deemed complete unless (1) the signature on the return receipt or on the Acceptance of Service form is identified to be that of the defendant by affidavit or verification of the plaintiff or other person familiar with said signature, or (2) where service is accepted by an unauthorized agent of the defendant, an affidavit or verification as to the identity of the agent and his or her relationship to the defendant.

**Rule 1920.42. Documents required to be filed in
Divorce Actions under Section 3301(c) and Section 3301(d) of the Divorce Code.**

(a) Unless previously filed of record, the following documents shall be filed along with the Praeceptum to Transmit Record after all economic claims of record have been resolved or withdrawn:

(1) if the action is brought under Section 3301(c), the Affidavits required under Pa.R.C.P. 1920.42(a)(1);

(2) if the action is brought under Section 3301(d), the Affidavit required under Pa.R.C.P. 1920.42(a)(2);

(3) an Affidavit of Service as to the Complaint;

(4) in the case of actions brought under Section 3301(d), an Affidavit of Service as to the Affidavit required under Pa.R.C.P. 1920.42(a)(2);

(5) a proposed Final Decree in Divorce;

(6) if the proposed Final Decree in Divorce purports to incorporate a written agreement between the parties, a true and correct copy of the fully executed agreement;

(7) a stamped pre-addressed envelope addressed to the counsel of each represented party or, if unrepresented, to each unrepresented party;

(8) if the Defendant has failed to appear or has not filed an Affidavit of Consent in the action, an Affidavit of Non-Military Service;

(9) a copy of the Notice of Intent to File Praeceptum that was earlier sent to the opposing party or to his or her counsel of record; and

(10) current docket entries.

(b) The aforesaid procedure is only applicable in all cases under Section 3301(c) and Section 3301(d) where all issues between the parties have been resolved. The party filing the Praeceptum may withdraw a claim by so noting on the Praeceptum to Transmit Record. Any outstanding claims by the opposing party may only be withdrawn by a separate Praeceptum signed by that party or his attorney of record. If any claims are not specifically withdrawn or

resolved by attached written agreement, the case must be referred to a Master for disposition (unless bifurcated by Order of Court).

(c) If a Praeceptum to Transmit is defective, the Clerk of the Family Court may require that a corrected Praeceptum be filed, preceded by notification to the opposing party. No additional filing fee need be paid when the corrected Praeceptum is filed.

(d) In a case proceeding under Section 3301(c), if any objection is filed to the Praeceptum to Transmit Record, the following procedure shall be followed:

(1) The Clerk of the Family Court shall place any case wherein an objection has been filed on the next available list for the Family Court Motions Judge. All parties or their counsel shall be given at least ten (10) days notice prior to the listing date for the Court to determine whether the objection should be sustained or dismissed.

(2) If the Family Court Motions Judge determines that an objection should be sustained, an Order shall be entered which shall provide one of the following:

- (i) require the filing of additional pleadings;
- (ii) refer the case to the Permanent Master in Divorce, subject to the requirements set forth in Rule 1920.51;
- (iii) enter a Decree in Divorce with jurisdiction reserved over certain claims;
- (iv) grant such other relief as the Court deems necessary.

(3) If the Family Court Motion Judge determines that an objection should be dismissed, that Judge shall enter a Final Decree in Divorce.

(e) In any case where a Section 3301(d) Counter-affidavit is filed, the matter will be promptly listed before the Permanent Master in Divorce for purposes of a hearing on all non-economic issues raised therein. The written notice of said hearing shall clearly state that failure of the non-moving party to appear at the scheduled time will result in the dismissal of all objections and claims raised in the Counter-affidavit and the entry of a Final Decree in Divorce without additional notice to that party.

(1) If the non-moving party fails to appear for the scheduled listing of the case, the Master shall thereupon file a summary Report or Proposed Order recommending dismissal of the Counter-affidavit. If no exceptions are filed to the Report or Proposed Order within twenty days, then the Report or Proposed Order shall forthwith be presented to a Judge for approval and entry of an Order dismissing the Counter-affidavit. A Final Decree pursuant to Section 3301(d) or Order approving grounds for Divorce may then be entered following judicial review of the file.

(2) If both parties appear for the listing of the case, the Permanent Master in Divorce shall then conduct a conference to ascertain what issues are actually in dispute. Following conclusion of the conference, the Master may immediately proceed with a record hearing to dispose of any contest as to grounds, or he may defer the matter to another listing, for which notice shall be given while the parties are in attendance.

(i) After the completion of testimony relating to Grounds under Section 3301(d), the Permanent Master shall expeditiously prepare and file a Report which contains his or her findings as to whether the prerequi-

sites under that Section have been met. Copies of said Report shall be served on counsel and any unrepresented parties.

(ii) Within twenty (20) days after the date of the Report by the Permanent Master, any party may file written exceptions thereto. Any such exceptions shall thereafter be listed for argument before a Judge of the Family Court who shall dispose of the same on the basis of the record compiled before the Permanent Master. In the absence of exceptions within said twenty (20) day period, the Report shall be transmitted to a Judge for approval and entry of an Order consistent with the Master's recommendation as to Grounds for a Section 3301(d) Divorce. If no economic issues remain outstanding in the case, a Final Decree pursuant to Section 3301(d) may then be entered following judicial review of the file.

(iii) If economic issues are raised in a case for the first time through a Counter-affidavit, the Permanent Master shall submit a proposed Order to the Court whereby a deadline is set for the defendant to perfect his/her claims for economic relief through the filing of a Counterclaim or petition pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 1920.15. If the defendant subsequently fails to comply with such Order, the Clerk of the Family Court, upon praecipe of the plaintiff, shall submit the file to a Judge for entry of a Final Decree.

(iv) If economic issues were raised in a case prior to the filing of a Counter-affidavit, or if the defendant perfects his/her claims for economic relief under the preceding paragraph, it shall be the responsibility of the parties to dispose of such issues through the filing of a Certification for Hearing pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 1920.51.

Rule 1920.51. Proceedings before Master in Divorce.

(a) As used in this section, "Master" means a Permanent Master in Divorce who has been authorized by the Court to hear:

(1) matters relating to grounds for Divorce under Sections 3301(a), 3301(b), and 3301(d)(1)(ii), and for Annulment under Sections 3303, 3304 and 3305 of the Divorce Code;

(2) economic issues, including claims for equitable distribution of property, alimony, counsel fees, costs and expenses.

(b) Procedure for Divorce under Sections 3301(a) and 3301(b), and for Annulment:

(1) When a party wishes to proceed under fault grounds for Divorce or an Annulment, said party shall file a "Motion for Divorce Hearing on Fault Grounds or for Annulment" accompanied by a certification of service and a proposed Order of assignment setting forth the issues to be referred by the Court to the Master.

(2) Within ten (10) days following service of a Motion for Divorce Hearing on Fault Grounds or for Annulment, a party may file an Answer thereto for purposes of objecting to the proposed assignment of the case to a Master. It shall not constitute grounds for objection that discovery on economic issues has not been completed.

(3) The Motion for Divorce Hearing on Fault Grounds or for Annulment may be filed by either party as soon as twenty (20) days have elapsed following service of the complaint.

(4) Thirty (30) days advance notice of the hearing shall be given to the attorneys of record and any unrepresented parties. All parties shall be prepared to proceed at that time on the case,

(5) Unless otherwise ordered by the Court, an official Court interpreter of the Court of Common Pleas shall be utilized where a party or witness is unable to communicate in the English language.

(6) In uncontested proceedings, the moving party shall be prepared to present the following to the Master on the day of the hearing:

- (i) an Affidavit setting forth jurisdictional facts;
- (ii) a separate narrative Affidavit setting forth the specific facts relied upon as the basis for the fault allegations in the case, or where an Annulment is requested, the facts establishing grounds for such relief under Sections 3304 or 3305;
- (iii) in cases where no appearance of record has been entered for the defendant, an Affidavit of Non-Military Service as required by the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act; and
- (iv) in actions for Indignities under Section 3301(a)(6), a Certification of Counseling Notice.

(7) In contested cases, all testimony before the Master shall be recorded. Upon request of a party or on the Master's own motion, the attendance of witnesses before the Master may be secured through the issuance of a subpoena from the Clerk of Family Court.

(8) Copies of the Master's Report in Fault Grounds or Annulment cases shall be mailed to counsel of record and to any unrepresented parties. Such copies shall be accompanied by a proposed Decree and notice informing the parties that either side may file exceptions to the Report within twenty (20) days of the date said Report is filed.

(c) *Procedure on Economic Issues.*

(1) No hearing shall be scheduled before the Permanent Master to dispose of economic issues in a case unless one of the following has occurred:

(i) a Master's Report has been filed recommending a divorce under Section 3301(a), 3301(b) or 3301(d)(1)(ii) in a case where economic issues have been raised by a pleading. If no exceptions have been filed to said Report, or after exceptions thereto have been dismissed, the Court shall enter an Order in the following form:

ORDER APPROVING GROUNDS FOR DIVORCE

AND NOW, this ____ day of _____, 20____, pursuant to the Report of the Master in Divorce, it is hereby Ordered that a Decree in Divorce shall hereafter be entered following resolution by the Permanent Master of all claims of record relating to equitable distribution of marital property, alimony, counsel fees, costs and expenses, and related claims under Divorce Code of 1980, as amended;

(ii) A Praecipe to Transmit Record has been filed pursuant to Section 3301(c) or Section 3301(d)(i) in a case where economic claims have been raised of record. Said Praecipe to Transmit Record and the Notice of Intent that shall precede it shall be accompanied by all other documents required by Rule 1920.42. After any objection to said Praecipe has been dismissed, the Court shall enter an Order in the following form:

ORDER APPROVING GROUNDS FOR DIVORCE

AND NOW, this ____ day of _____, 20____, upon receipt of the record setting forth a cause of action under Section 3301(c) or Section 3301(d), a Decree in Divorce shall hereafter be entered following

resolution by the Master of all claims of record relating to equitable distribution of marital property, alimony, counsel fees, costs and expenses, and related claims under Divorce Code of 1980, as amended;

(iii) A bifurcated Decree In Divorce has been entered by the Court.

(2) A Master's hearing may only be scheduled on economic issues after one of the parties or their attorney of record has certified that:

- (i) an Order Approving Grounds for Divorce or a Bifurcated Decree has been entered;
- (ii) all discovery has been completed; and
- (iii) there are no motions or petitions outstanding in the case.

(3) All such Certifications for Hearing before the Master in Divorce shall be filed in the Office of the Clerk of the Family Court following payment of the required fee; provided, however, that no additional fee shall be required where fault grounds have been established pursuant to a hearing before the Permanent Master. At the time of filing the Certification, the attorney for the moving party shall also file with the Clerk of Family Court a verification that a copy of said Certification was served on the opposing attorney of record, or on the opposing party, if unrepresented.

(4) Within ten (10) days following the date of filing a Certification for Hearing before the Permanent Master, opposing counsel or the unrepresented party may file objections to the same in the Office of the Clerk of the Family Court. Any such objections shall state with particularity the basis for denying the representations in the Certification. All objections to Certifications for Hearing before the Permanent Master will be promptly listed for hearing before the Family Court Motions Judge.

(5) If no objections are filed to the Certification for Hearing pursuant to subsection (4) hereof, the case shall be scheduled for a hearing before a Permanent Master. Thirty (30) days advance notice of any such hearing shall be given to counsel and any unrepresented party, unless otherwise ordered by the Court.

(6) At least ten (10) days prior to the scheduled hearing before the Permanent Master, each party shall file a mandatory pre-trial memorandum in accordance with Pa.R.C.P. 1920.33(b). The pre-trial memorandum shall be filed with the Clerk of Family Court and a copy of the same shall be mailed or personally served on the same day to opposing counsel or any unrepresented party.

(7) The Master shall take non-record testimony from the parties only, unless, at the sole discretion of the Master, additional non-record testimony is required. The parties may offer into evidence, without formal proof, documentary evidence in the nature of appraisals, pension evaluations, statements from financial institutions, official or certified records of any governmental or judicial body, and other reports, bills and records relating to real estate, personal property, counsel fees and costs, provided that true and correct copies of all such evidence is provided to all parties or counsel of record at least ten (10) days prior to the hearing.

(8) Within thirty (30) days after conclusion of the final hearing on economic issues, the Permanent Master shall file with the Court a report containing findings of fact and conclusions of law along with a recommendation and proposed Decree and/or Order disposing of all issues of record. Copies of said findings and order shall be mailed

to the counsel of record, or unrepresented parties, together with a notice explaining the procedure for requesting a trial de novo by the Court.

(9) Within twenty (20) days after the mailing date of the Master's Report and proposed Decree, either party may file with the Clerk of Family Court a Praecipe for a trial de novo before a Judge. Time stamped copies of any such Praecipe shall forthwith be served on the opposing counsel of record or unrepresented party, and on the Master who heard the matter. The case thereafter shall be listed before a Judge for a full evidentiary hearing.

(10) In the event there is no demand for a trial filed within twenty (20) days following mailing of the Report and proposed Decree, such Report and proposed Decree shall be submitted to the Court for approval and entry of a Decree.

(11) Any willful violation of this Rule including a failure to comply with filing requirements, failing to provide the required pre-trial memorandum, not providing all parties or counsel copies of documentary evidence to be introduced at the hearing before the Master, or not attending a hearing, shall be grounds for contempt of Court and imposition of sanctions. The Master is empowered to recommend that anyone not complying with this Rule be cited for contempt of Court.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

CUMBERLAND COUNTY

Administrative Order; CP-21-MD-559-2014

Administrative Order

And Now, this 21st day of May, 2014, the creation of a Constable Review Board is hereby authorized in accordance with the following standards and procedures:

I. *Definitions*

a. “Constable.” Any elected or appointed constable or deputy constable performing judicial duties for the Cumberland County Court of Common Pleas or any magisterial district court within the Ninth Judicial District.

b. “Judicial Duties.” Services performed pursuant to 44 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 7161—7161.1 and further defined by the Pennsylvania Unified Judicial System’s Constable Policies, Procedures and Standards of Conduct published by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.

II. *Scope*

a. Constables are elected and perform numerous functions at the municipal level, apart from the services performed as independent contractors for the judiciary. The Constable Review Board’s jurisdiction extends only to constables in the performance of judicial duties.

b. Consistent with the Pennsylvania Unified Judicial System’s Constable Policies, Procedures and Standards of Conduct, the Constable Review Board may receive complaints by or against constables regarding:

1. the performance of judicial duties;
2. financial/payment disputes; or
3. other matters relevant to a constable’s judicial duties.

c. The Constable Review Board does not have the authority to revise the Constable Policies, Procedures and Standards of Conduct issued by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.

d. Nothing herein shall preclude any person or surety of a constable from filing a verified petition in accordance with 44 Pa.C.S. § 7172 alleging that a constable is incompetent to discharge official duties.

III. *Authority*

a. The Constable Review Board may make recommendations to the President Judge with respect to practices and procedures as they relate to constables generally and make recommendation regarding the judiciary’s continued use of a constable’s services.

b. If a matter involves a financial dispute or other matter within Cumberland County’s control, the Constable Review Board may make recommendations to the Cumberland County Controller regarding payment for services.

c. The Constable Review Board shall forward any findings of suspected criminal activity to the Cumberland County District Attorney.

d. The President Judge remains the ultimate authority with regard to a constable’s performance of judicial duties within the Ninth Judicial District. In that respect, the President Judge may, at any time, temporarily place a moratorium on the use of a particular constable pending review and recommendation of the Constable Review Board on any pending complaint.

IV. *Membership of the Constable Review Board*

- a. A judge of the Court of Common Pleas;
- b. A Magisterial District Judge;
- c. The Court Administrator or her designee;
- d. A Constable and an alternate; and
- e. The County Controller or his designee.

V. *Filing a Complaint*

a. The complaint shall be in writing, signed by the complainant, and contain a statement of the alleged misconduct, financial dispute, or other matter related to the performance of judicial duties.

b. The complaint may be submitted by mail, e-mail, fax, or any other electronic means by which a paper copy may be generated. The contact information for filing the complaint is as follows:

c. The written complaint shall substantially conform to the form set forth at VIII herein.

d. The complaint shall initially be forwarded to the Court Administrator. Upon receipt of a complaint, the Court Administrator shall:

1. Note the date of receipt on the complaint.
2. Create a file to contain the complaint and all subsequent communications regarding the complaint.

3. Within three (3) business days, the Court Administrator shall forward a copy of the complaint to the respondent constable, if the complaint is against a constable or to any other respondent if the complaint is by a constable.

4. At the same time as the transmission of the copy of the complaint to the constable/or respondent, the Court Administrator shall provide written notice to the constable/respondent that he or she must provide to the Court Administrator a written response to the complaint within twenty (20) days, or less if the President Judge so orders, from the date of such notice. The notice shall further provide that if a constable/respondent fails to respond, such failure may result in a decision by the judiciary based on the information available for review.

VI. *Constable Review Board Action*

a. Upon receipt of a respondent's written response, or expiration of the response period, whichever comes first, the Court Administrator shall, within three (3) business days forward a copy of the complaint, response, and all corroborating documentation to each Constable Review Board member for review.

b. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the file information, the Constable Review Board shall:

1. in matters falling outside the Constable Review Board's authority, forward the complaint file to the President Judge with written notification to the President Judge, and the complainant, that the complaint falls outside the scope of the Board's authority and list the reason(s) for that finding.

2. in matters involving payment and/or possible termination or suspension of the Court's use of a constable, interview the complainant, the constable and all other relevant witnesses. If scheduling conflicts prevent the Board from meeting to conduct interviews before the Board as a whole, the Board may request the President Judge to select two Board members to conduct interviews who shall prepare and submit a report to the Board.

Unless the President Judge grants an extension of time, interviews shall be completed and a recommendation to the President Judge shall be made within the thirty (30)-day time period.

3. in all other matters, the Constable Review Board may conduct interviews or make a recommendation to the President Judge based exclusively upon the complaint, response, and all other written documentation submitted.

VII. *Notice by President Judge*

a. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the Constable Review Board's recommendation, the President Judge shall issue a written notice to the complainant and any constable of the Court's decision.

Rule 1920.73(c). Notice of Intention to Request Entry of Divorce Decree. Praecepte to Transmit Record. Motion for Entry of Grounds Order and Appointment of Equitable Distribution Master. Forms.

(1) A Praecepte to Transmit the Record to request a final Decree in Divorce shall be filed where:

(a) there have been no claims for equitable distribution of marital property, alimony or counsel fees, costs, and expenses raised in the pleadings, or

(b) all claims have been withdrawn and grounds for divorce have been established, and the Moving party is seeking a final decree in divorce, or

(c) the parties have reached a written agreement, which resolves all issues of equitable distribution of marital property, alimony and counsel fees, costs, and expenses, and grounds for divorce have been established, and the Moving party is seeking a final decree in divorce which incorporates the written agreement.

See Form Praecepte to Transmit the Record

(2) A Motion for Entry of Grounds Order and Appointment of Equitable Distribution Master shall be filed where:

(a) there are pending claims for equitable distribution of marital property, alimony or counsel fees raised in the pleadings, and

(b) no written agreement has been reached by the parties; and

(c) grounds for divorce exist and can be established.

See Form Motion for Entry of Grounds Order and Appointment of Equitable Distribution Master

(3) The Moving party, filing the Motion for Entry of Grounds Order and Appointment of Equitable Distribution Master, upon filing said Motion shall:

(a) pay a required fee to the Prothonotary at the time of filing the Motion; and

(b) certify in the Motion that discovery is complete by including a listing of all assets and liabilities, including values as of the date of filing of the Motion; and

(c) attach to the Motion the Moving party's Initial Hearing Statement, which shall include a completed Inventory and Appraisal, pursuant to Local Rule 1920.33(f); and

(d) the Motion and Initial Hearing/Inventory Statement, pursuant to Local Rule 1920.33(f), shall be filed with the Court and served upon the Non-Moving party, and a Certificate of Service of same shall be filed with the Court.

(4) The Non-Moving party shall have forty-five (45) days from the date of service of the Moving party's Motion and Initial Hearing/Inventory Statement in which to complete all discovery, and provide the same certification to the Court and the Moving party, that the Non-Moving party's discovery is complete and includes a listing of all assets and liabilities, including values as of the date of filing of the certification by the Non-Moving party:

(a) the listing of all assets and liabilities shall be in the form of an Initial Hearing/Inventory Statement, pursuant to Local Rule 1920.33(f), and shall be filed with the Court and served upon the Moving party, and a Certificate of Service of same shall be filed with the Court.

(5) The failure of either party to comply with any provisions of this Rule may result in Sanctions to that non-compliant party and/or the barring of the non-compliant party's testimony or introduction/admission of evidence at the time of the equitable distribution proceedings.

Title 55—PUBLIC WELFARE

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

[55 PA. CODE CH. 1187]

Payment for Nursing Facility Services Provided by Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities

The Department of Public Welfare (Department), under the authority of sections 201(2), 206(2), 403(b) and 443.1 of the Public Welfare Code (62 P.S. §§ 201(2), 206(2), 403(b) and 443.1), amends § 1187.94 (relating to peer grouping for price setting).

Purpose of the Final-Form Rulemaking

The purpose of this final-form rulemaking is to amend § 1187.94 to provide for a distinct method of calculating peer group medians and prices between the initial four special rehabilitation facilities (SRF) and the facilities classified as SRFs after 2000.

The final-form rulemaking is needed to amend the manner in which the peer group medians and peer group prices are set for facilities classified as SRFs as defined in § 1187.2 (relating to definitions).

Summary

A complete description of the amendment was included in the proposed rulemaking published at 43 Pa.B. 4599 (August 10, 2013).

Affected Individuals and Organizations

This final-form rulemaking primarily affects the initial SRFs enrolled in the Medical Assistance Program. This change in rate methodology provides three of the four initial SRFs an estimated additional \$0.736 million in revenue for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012. For Fiscal Year (FY) 2012-2013 and beyond, this change in rate methodology provides an estimated decrease of \$1.191 million in revenue for the initial four SRFs. Other nonpublic nursing facilities may see a minimal positive impact estimated to be an average of 7¢ per bed day or \$2,006 per nonpublic nursing facility. This change does not adversely impact the facilities classified as SRFs after July 1, 2000.

Accomplishments and Benefits

This final-form rulemaking provides a distinct method of calculating peer group medians and prices between the initial four SRFs and the facilities classified as SRFs after 2000. In addition, this change ensures that residents with chronic impairments continue to have access to medically necessary nursing facility services.

Fiscal Impact

The estimated fiscal impact to the Commonwealth for the change in payment rates related to the initial four special rehabilitation nursing facilities for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, is \$0.331 million in State funds. There is no fiscal impact associated with this final-form rulemaking for FY 2012-2013 and beyond. Adjustments to peer groups do not have a fiscal impact because of the Budget Adjustment Factor.

Paperwork Requirements

There are no new or additional paperwork requirements needed to comply with the final-form rulemaking.

Public Comment

Written comments, suggestions and objections regarding the proposed rulemaking were requested within a

30-day period following publication of the proposed rulemaking. No public comments were received within the 30-day time frame. The Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) did not comment on the proposed rulemaking.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on July 31, 2013, the Department submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 43 Pa.B. 4599, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Human Services and the Senate Committee on Public Health and Welfare for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC and the House and Senate Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Department has considered all comments from IRRC, the House and Senate Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on April 9, 2014, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by IRRC effective April 9, 2014.

Findings

The Department finds that:

(1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The adoption of this final-form rulemaking in the manner provided by this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the Public Welfare Code.

Order

The Department, acting under sections 201(2), 206(2), 403(b) and 443.1 of the Public Welfare Code, orders that:

(1) The regulations of the Department, 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187, are amended by amending § 1187.94 to read as set forth at 43 Pa.B. 4599.

(2) The Secretary of the Department shall submit this order and 43 Pa.B. 4599 to the Offices of General Counsel and Attorney General for approval as to legality and form as required by law.

(3) The Secretary of the Department shall certify and deposit this order and 43 Pa.B. 4599 with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(4) This order shall take effect November 1, 2011.

Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order

By the Commission:

In order to fully recover the cost of providing service, public utilities are permitted to utilize automatic adjustment clauses to increase or decrease rates to reflect changes in certain costs. Traditional methods of reconciliation accounting could, however, cause a great deal of volatility in utility service rates associated with the recovery of revenue and cost imbalances created by the use of these automatic adjustment clauses. The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission's (Commission) objective is to ensure that: (1) utilities' rates reflect projected costs as accurately as is feasible, (2) utilities are able to fully recover their just and reasonable costs and (3) customers pay the full cost of service. The Commission also desires to establish a uniform policy regarding whether interest is recoverable when reconciling costs through automatic adjustment clauses and the rate of interest that is paid or collected.

To accomplish these objectives, the Commission proposes to establish a symmetrical rate of interest which will be applicable to both over and under collections resulting from the reconciliation of utilities' actual costs and revenue collected through automatic adjustment clauses regarding electric default service. If the Commission finds that establishing this uniform interest to electric default service does not adequately accomplish the Commission's objectives stated above, the Commission will consider establishing a modified interest rate applicable to "excessive" portions of over and under collections. By way of this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order, the Commission seeks comments from all interested parties on its proposal to apply a symmetrical rate of interest to the over and under collections resulting from reconciliation of automatic adjustment clause costs and revenues regarding electric default service.

Background

Section 1307(a) of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 1307(a), generally provides that public utilities may establish automatic adjustment clauses. Automatic adjustment clauses allow utilities to increase or decrease rates to reflect changes in specific costs without the extensive filing requirements and review process of a traditional base rate case. 66 Pa.C.S. § 1307(a). Some

examples of costs that are recovered through automatic adjustment clauses include, but are not limited to: Electric Default Service, Act 129 Energy Efficiency and Conservation Programs, Smart Meter, Universal Service, Distribution System Improvement Charges and the Alternative Energy Portfolio.

Before implementing an automatic adjustment clause, public utilities must file a tariff, or tariff rider, for the Commission's approval. Id. The tariff or tariff rider will outline the specifics of each automatic adjustment clause, including: to which customers the rate applies, how often the rate is adjusted (i.e. monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually), which costs are recoverable and the reconciliation period.

Within thirty days following the end of the reconciliation period set forth in the tariff, each public utility using an automatic adjustment clause must file with the Commission a statement specifying the total revenues received pursuant to the adjustment clause, the total amount of expenses incurred pursuant to the adjustment clause and the difference between the total revenues received and the total expenses incurred. 66 Pa.C.S. § 1307(e). The difference between the total revenues received and the total expenses incurred is referred to as the over or under collection. After reconciling their actual costs with what was recovered from consumers, utilities then make adjustments to their rates to either refund over-collected amounts to customers or collect under-collected amounts from customers.

Ideally, utilities would reasonably forecast and match expenses to sales, resulting in only minor over or under collections. Unfortunately, this may not always be the case going forward. Traditional methods of reconciliation accounting and of allocating costs to rate classes could cause a great deal of volatility, especially in the electric default service market. In addition, the rules vary as to whether interest is paid or collected on over and under collections and also as to the rate of interest that is paid or collected. Further, these interest rates are often not reflective of current market conditions. As a result, utilities may have little or no incentive to accurately forecast expenses and sales and the amount of costs that are over-collected or under-collected could potentially be significant.

The Commission believes that many of the utilities' costs are currently being forecasted accurately. However, in order to specifically meet the Commission's objective that utilities' current prices reflect current costs as accurately as is feasible, the Commission desires to set forth uniform rules regarding default service related automatic adjustment clauses. Specifically, the Commission desires to create uniformity as to whether interest is to be paid or collected on over or under collections and the rate of interest that is paid or collected.

Discussion

A. Current Varying Interest Rate Structure

By way of background, the Public Utility Code (Code) and the Commission's Regulations expressly permit reconciliation for default service costs through automatic adjustment clauses. 66 Pa.C.S. § 2807(e)(3.9); 52 Pa. Code § 54.187(b). Section 2807(e)(3.9) of the Code specifically provides that electric default service providers may recover all costs incurred under a Commission-approved competitive procurement plan pursuant to a

reconcilable automatic adjustment clause under 66 Pa.C.S. § 1307 (relating to sliding scale of rates; adjustments). 66 Pa.C.S. § 2807(e)(3.9). As previously stated, however, the rules vary as to whether interest is paid or collected on over and under collections and also as to the rate of interest that is paid or collected.

The guiding principal of any adjustable rate approved under Section 1307 of the Code, in addition to its being in the public interest, is that it comply with the just and reasonable mandate of 66 Pa.C.S. § 1301 (relating to just and reasonable rates). Section 1307 specifically seeks to ensure that qualifying rates provide utilities with the opportunity to achieve a just and reasonable return. Thus, a primary purpose of Section 1307 is to provide qualified adjustable rate relief to utilities that may be subject to significant expense swings.

The adjustable expense recovery permitted under Section 1307 of the Code is limited to those expenses expressly authorized, or those easily identifiable, variable and beyond a utility's control. In the wake of electric restructuring, the Commission has approved a host of automatic adjustment clauses for EDCs to recover, including electric default service expenses. Costs recoverable through automatic adjustment clauses related to electric default service include, but are not limited to, the costs to procure energy, capacity, ancillary services, Federal Energy Regulatory Commission approved transmission charges and administrative costs associated with portfolio procurements for the default services supply.

This Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order focuses only on those automatic adjustment clauses related to electric default service as bulleted below. The Commission has limited the proposed application of a uniform interest rate paid or collected on over or under collections resulting from reconciliation of automatic adjustment clauses to electric default service for several reasons. First, all electric distribution companies (EDCs) use automatic adjustment clauses related to electric default service. Second, default service represents the largest dollar amount on most consumer electric bills and invoices (other than distribution). Third, default service is still the electric service used by a majority of customers in Pennsylvania. Accordingly, the proposals set forth herein for comment regarding the uniform interest rates applicable to over and under collections are limited to the following automatic adjustment clauses related to electric default service:

- Price-to-Compare (PTC)
- Hourly Pricing Default Service Rider (HPDSR)
- Transmission Service Charge (TSC)
- Generation Supply Charges 1 & 2 (GSC-1 & GSC-2)
- Generation Supply Adjustment 1, 2, 3, 4 (GSA 1, 2, 3, 4)
- Generation Supply Service Rate (GSSR)
- Default Service (DS)
- Default Service Supply (DSS)

To provide an example of varying interest rates set forth in these automatic adjustment clauses, PPL Electric Utilities Corporation (PPL), an EDC, utilizes the following automatic adjustment clauses related to electric default service: a Transmission Service Charge (TSC), a Generation Supply Charge-1 (GSC-1) and a Generation Supply Charge-2 (GSC-2). PPL's TSC is computed separately for each of the following four customer classes: (1) residential, (2) small commercial and industrial, (3) large

commercial and industrial-primary and (4) large commercial and industrial-transmission. PPL's GSC-1 applies to residential and small commercial and industrial customers. PPL's GSC-2 applies to large commercial and industrial customers.

For the TSC, interest is calculated at an "appropriate rate" under Section 1308(d) of the Code. 66 Pa.C.S. § 1308(d). Section 1308(d) defines interest as "the average rate of interest specified for residential mortgage lending by the Secretary of Banking in accordance with the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6), referred to as the Loan Interest and Protection Law." 66 Pa.C.S. § 1308(d). This Residential Mortgage Interest Rate is based on the monthly index of long term United States Government Bond Yields. Loan Interest and Protection Law, Act of Jan. 30, 1974, P. L. 13, No. 6. (Loan Interest Act). The Pennsylvania Residential Mortgage Interest Rate changes monthly. In 2013, the Residential Mortgage Interest Rate ranged from a low of 4.5% to a high of 6.0%.

For the Generation Supply Charges, interest on under collections is calculated at the legal rate of interest, and interest on over collections is calculated at the legal rate of interest plus two percent annual interest. The legal rate of interest was also defined by the Loan Interest Act and codified at 41 P. S. § 202. Section 202 reads, in pertinent part, "[r]eference in any law or document...to 'legal rate of interest' . . . shall be construed to refer to the rate of interest of six per cent per annum." 41 P. S. § 202. Under this statutory definition of legal interest, PPL recovers under collections of its Generation Supply Charges with six percent (6%) interest. PPL refunds over collections of its Generation Supply Charges with eight percent (8%) interest. 52 Pa. Code § 54.187(g).

In addition to the residential mortgage interest rate and the legal interest rate, there is also the prime interest rate. The prime interest rate is the interest rate charged by banks to their most creditworthy customers. The prime interest rate is almost always the same amongst major banks, and adjustments to the prime interest rate are made by banks at the same time. The prime interest rate is usually adjusted at the same time and in correlation to the adjustments of the Federal Funds Rate (the interest rate that banks charge each other for overnight loans made to fulfill reserve funding requirements). As of May 2014, the prime interest rate is 3.25% in the United States.¹

As exemplified by PPL's Generation Supply Charges, interest rates on under and over collections are often asymmetrical. Asymmetrical interest rates create an incentive for the utilities to under project or under collect in order to avoid over collection penalties and to receive an interest rate higher than that which can be found in the market. This practice can lead to an understated price-to-compare (PTC). An understated PTC undermines the competitive market because electric generation suppliers (EGSs) cannot under collect and then make-up that under collection later as can the utilities. This Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order will recommend for comment the use of symmetrical interest rates for both under and over collections.

The Commission's current use of the legal rate of interest for under collections and the legal rate of interest plus 2% for over collections, used for most electric default service automatic adjustment clauses, results in interest rates that are well above current market-based rates. This Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order will

recommend for comment the use of the prime interest rate for the calculation of interest on both over and under collections resulting from automatic adjustment clauses related to electric default service. The Commission believes that using the prime interest rate is most appropriate here as this rate is most commensurate with market rates. Additionally, the prime interest rate is publicly known and available, and transparent. Further, the prime interest rate also reflects the terms and risks inherent in the utility reconciliation process.

The proposals set forth herein for comment are supported by the comments filed in response to the Commission's Default Service Reconciliation Interim Guidelines at Docket No. M-2012-2314313 (Order entered August 14, 2012). In that Order, the Commission sought comments on several questions, including: "Should the Commission alter how interest is charged/credited on under/over collections? Is the current statutory rate of interest reflective of market rates of interest? How can these interest provisions be improved?" Commission Order at 4.

Citizens' Electric Company of Lewisburg, PA and Wellsboro Electric Company (Citizens'/Wellsboro) are two of the smallest EDCs in Pennsylvania. In response to the above-referenced questions, they stated that "[t]he Commission should alter the method for charging/crediting interest on under and overcollections by eliminating asymmetrical interest rates and, instead, applying an equal interest rate reflective of market conditions." Citizens'/Wellsboro Comments at 7. Citizens'/Wellsboro further responded that the "[a]pplication of asymmetrical interest rates serves no purpose" because "today's competitive retail and wholesale market structure greatly marginalizes any threat of EDC price manipulation," and "the Commission has developed far more effective means of ensuring least cost procurement." Citizens'/Wellsboro Comments at 7-9.

Citizens'/Wellsboro also discussed how "the Commission adopted the legal rate of interest for default service supply reconciliations from the reconciliation provisions in the Gas Choice Act. 66 Pa.C.S. § 1307(f)(5)." Citizens'/Wellsboro Comments at 10. Instead of the legal rate of interest, Citizens'/Wellsboro put forth that "the Commission should apply an interest rate tied to some indicator of market conditions." Citizens'/Wellsboro Comments at 10-11. Citizens'/Wellsboro offered the residential mortgage interest rate or the prime interest rate as alternatives to the legal rate of interest. Citizens'/Wellsboro Comments at 11.

In agreement with comments provided by Citizens'/Wellsboro, Constellation Energy Commodities Group, Inc., Constellation NewEnergy, Inc., Exelon Generation Company, LLC, and Exelon Energy Company (collectively, Exelon), similarly provided that the Commission should apply the same interest rate to both over and under collections "to further reduce the potential that an EDC would favor under estimates of the C-factor as a general practice." Exelon Comments at 6. Exelon also agreed that "the Commission should choose a transparent, market-based interest rate index as the basis for the interest charged and collected for collection variances." Exelon Comments at p. 6. Exelon explained that this market-based interest rate index would replace above-market rates which can create an incentive for an EDC to under-collect. Exelon pointed out that in relation to certain automatic adjustment clauses, if a utility over-collects, the utility must refund the money with interest at a rate of 8%. Under the same automatic adjustment clause, if a utility under-collects, the utility receives

interest at a rate of 6% from its customers. Exelon noted that structure can create an incentive for an EDC to intentionally underestimate its C-factor in an attempt to avoid the 8% penalty and benefit from the 6% return. Exelon Comments at 6.

Metropolitan Edison Company, Pennsylvania Electric Company, Pennsylvania Power Company and West Penn Power Company (collectively, FirstEnergy Companies) shared the concerns of Exelon. They stated, "[s]ince the asymmetrical interest provisions in the Commission's regulations require an EDC to pay interest at a higher rate on over-collections than it recovers on under-collections, there may be a perception that default service rates are understated..." FirstEnergy Companies Comments at 8. The FirstEnergy Companies argued that "[t]he several concerns attendant with the asymmetrical application of interest rates could be fully resolved by modifying or waiving the Commission's regulations to remove the asymmetrical interest provision." FirstEnergy Companies Comments at 8. The FirstEnergy Companies also noted that the legal rate of interest may be higher or lower than a market-based interest rate "depending upon the point in time, or over what period, an evaluation is to occur." FirstEnergy Companies Comments at 8.

Similarly, the National Energy Marketers Association (NEM) also recognized that asymmetrical interest rates provide the utility with an incentive to under collect and to understate the PTC. NEM Comments at 7. This then "provides consumers with an erroneous benchmark price for evaluating competitive offers." NEM Comments at 8. NEM characterized the interest rate on under collections (i.e. the legal rate of interest or 6%) as "well in excess of the current market rate of interest." As utility costs are fully recoverable and the utility is at no risk of loss, this above market rate is a "regulatory windfall." NEM Comments at 7. NEM encouraged the Commission to base the interest rate on market indicia. NEM Comments at 7.

The Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA) identified the same concerns as the aforementioned stakeholders. As the legal rate of interest is greater than short term interest rates, there may be an improper incentive to under collect in order to take advantage of the 6% rate. Also, the 8% rate on over collections is a heavy penalty for over collections which adds to the incentive to "underestimate costs and 'err on the side of caution.'" OCA Comments at 5. The OCA submitted that "[i]t would be appropriate to adjust the interest rate to more closely align with current short term interest rates." OCA Comments at 5.

The Office of Small Business Advocate (OSBA) offered similar comments. The above-market interest rate on under collections "creates a strong incentive for the DSP [default service provider] to 'low-ball' its cost forecast." OSBA Comments at 17. The above-market interest rate on over collections "creates an even greater disincentive for DSPs to over-forecast costs." OSBA Comments at 18 (emphasis in original). These incentives add to EGSs' fears that their prices are uncompetitive because the DSPs have under-estimated costs. OSBA Comments at 18. The OSBA suggested that the Commission use "a reasonable market parameter for short-term interest rates" to set interest on over and under collections. Id. The OSBA argued in favor of symmetrical interest rates, as any differential between the interest rate applied to over and under collections would continue the incentive to under collect. Id.

Duquesne Light Company (Duquesne) agreed that "[r]ates should be symmetric, uniform and market-based." Duquesne Comments at 10. PECO Energy Company

(PECO) similarly suggested that the current methodology could be improved by establishing market-based symmetrical interest rates. PECO Comments at 4. In addition to symmetrical interest rates, PPL advanced “that the interest rate used should be a publicly known and available rate that is consistent with the terms and risks associated with utility reconciliation processes.” PPL Comments at 8.

As additional support for the proposals contained in this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order, the Commission analyzed House Bill 1188, H.R. 1188, Printer’s No. 1484 (Pa. 2013). House Bill 1188, currently under consideration by the General Assembly,² would amend the Gas Choice Act, 66 Pa.C.S. § 1307(f), to change the interest rate from the legal rate of interest to the prime interest rate for both over and under collections. The proposed language specifically states that “[r]efunds to customers shall be made with and recoveries from customers shall include interest at the prime rate for commercial borrowing in effect 60 days prior to the tariff filing made under paragraph (1) [relating to the filing of tariffs by natural gas distribution companies] and as reported in a publicly available source identified by the commission or at an interest rate which may be established by the commission by regulation.” Id.

At this time the Commission is not aware of any intentional over or under collecting being done by EDCs in order to earn more interest. However, in addition to the volatility of rates caused by unpredictable weather and shopping patterns of customers, there is the widely-recognized possibility that an EDC could attempt to use the automatic adjustment clause methodology related to electric default service to increase interest earnings. In general, EDCs have a 50/50 split in over collections versus under collections relating to electric default service. Additionally, the over and under collections by month are well within a reasonable percentage of allowable costs in the associated months. However, in order to ensure accurate projections and to create uniformity, the Commission proposes to apply a symmetrical interest rate, reflective of market conditions, to under and over collections as set forth below.

B. Proposed Uniform Interest Rate Structure

By way of this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order, the Commission seeks comments on its proposal to establish a symmetrical rate of interest which will be applicable to over and under collections resulting from the reconciliation of utilities’ costs and revenues resulting from automatic adjustment clauses related to electric default service. The proposed applicable rate of interest on over and under collections would be interest at the prime rate for commercial borrowing in effect on the last day of the month the over or under collection occurred, as reported in the Wall Street Journal or other publically available source identified by the Commission. For example, the interest rate applied to over or under collections in the month of March would be the prime rate that was in effect on March 31. This rate of interest will be computed monthly from the month the over collection or under collection occurs to the effective month that the over collection is refunded to customers or the under collection is collected from customers. Additionally, this rate of interest will apply universally to all over and under collections reconciled through the automatic adjust-

ment clauses related to electric default service, as bulleted in Part A of this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order.

In the event the Commission finds that the application of the symmetrical rate of interest set forth above does not adequately prevent EDCs from using automatic adjustment clause methodology related to electric default service to increase interest earnings, the Commission may consider the application of a modified interest rate applicable to “excessive” portions³ of over and under collections. In addition to the prime rate of interest applicable to the “non-excessive” portion of all over and under collections, the Commission may consider applying a modified interest rate of prime rate plus 100 basis points on the “excessive” portion of all over collections and a modified interest rate of prime rate minus 100 basis points on the “excessive” portion of all under collections. This modified interest rate, adjusted up or down by 100 basis points, would only apply to the “excessive portion” of the over or under collection. This modified rate of interest would not apply to the “non-excessive” portion of the over or under collection.

The Commission recognizes that the interest rate structure proposed herein does not currently comply with the Commission’s regulations, 52 Pa. Code §§ 1.1—111.14, and/or public utilities’ current tariffs regarding electric default service. As such, after reviewing the comments provided in response to this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order, the Commission intends to initiate a rulemaking to amend our regulations, as necessary, to implement this new interest rate structure. Additionally, the Commission’s Final Rulemaking Order may direct EDCs to revise their tariffs and tariff riders to reflect this proposed interest rate structure. To execute this proposal, the Commission envisions using the following language to amend our regulations and to revise the EDCs tariffs and tariff riders:

Interest collectible on over collections and under collections. If revenues exceed costs, the over collections shall be refunded with interest. If costs exceed revenues, the under collections shall be collected from customers with interest. Interest on over collections and under collections shall be computed at the prime rate of interest for commercial banking in effect on the last day of the month the over or under collection occurred, as reported in the Wall Street Journal or other publically acceptable source identified by the Commission. Interest shall be computed monthly from the month the over collection or under collection occurs to the effective month that the over collection is refunded or the under collection is collected.

C. Anticipated Effects of the Proposed Uniform Interest Rate Structure

Although the Commission cannot completely eradicate all imbalances in the amount of costs that are overcollected and undercollected, the proposed symmetrical interest rate structure set forth herein will deter utilities from inaccurately forecasting costs and sales to improperly increase interest earnings. This symmetrical application of interest to over and under collections uses the prime rate of interest which is not only commensurate with market rates, but is also publicly known, available and transparent. Overall, application of the symmetrical

³ When determining whether a portion of an over or under collection is “excessive,” the Commission would use a threshold equal to a percentage of certain costs of the EDC related to the relevant automatic adjustment clause.

rate of interest, at prime rate, to over and under collections reflects the terms and risks inherent in the utility reconciliation process.

In addition to the proposed interest rate structure set forth herein for comment, the Commission reminds EDCs to consider filing an interim rate adjustment and/or cost reconciliation when the EDC anticipates substantial over or under collections. In fact, the Commission recognizes that such interim rate adjustments and cost reconciliations are in the public interest as they provide utilities with a mechanism to reduce significant imbalances in over and under collections. For example, Section 69.1809(c) of the Commission's regulations regarding default service provide in relevant part that:

It may be in the public interest to reconcile default service costs more frequently than at each PTC [price-to-compare] adjustment interval. The DSP [default service provider] should propose interim reconciliation prior to the next subsequent PTC adjustment interval when current monthly revenues have diverged from current monthly costs, plus any cumulative over/under recoveries, by greater than 4% since the last rate adjustment. . . . Interim reconciliation proposals should result in a PTC adjustment that will resolve cumulative under or over recoveries by the time of the next PTC adjustment interval.

52 Pa. Code § 69.1809(c).

Conclusion

Establishing a symmetrical rate of interest applicable to over and under collections resulting from reconciliation of automatic adjustment clause costs and revenues will better ensure that utilities' current prices reflect current costs as accurately as is feasible. By way of this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order, the Commission seeks comments from all interested parties on its proposal to apply a symmetrical rate of interest to over and under collections resulting from reconciliation of automatic adjustment clause costs and revenues related to electric default service.

Accordingly, pursuant to its authority under Sections 501, 1301, 1307 and 2804 of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 501, 1301, 1307 and 2804, the Commission issues this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order for comment; *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

1. This Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order be issued to solicit comments regarding revisions to the Commission's existing regulations regarding automatic adjustment clauses related to electric default service.

2. The Secretary shall certify this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

3. Interested persons may submit an original of written comments to the Office of the Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, P. O. Box 3265, Harrisburg, PA, 17105-3265, within 60 days from the date this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order is published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

4. A copy of this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order shall be served on the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate and the Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement, and will be posted on the Commission's website at www.puc.state.pa.us.

5. A copy of this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order shall be served on all Electric Distribution Companies.

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.907)

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) (35 P. S. §§ 6026.302—6026.305) require the Department to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment

noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

In addition, the Department imposes a technology-based aluminum limit of 2.0 mg/l (30 day average) to protect stream uses.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 362-0600-001, NPDES Program Implementation-Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Concerning Water Quality Management, NPDES Program Implementation, and Related Matters. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

3. Additional Class of Disproportionate Share Payments

The Department of Public Welfare (Department) is providing final notice of the establishment of a new class

of disproportionate share hospital (DSH) payments to certain Medical Assistance (MA) acute care general hospitals (hospitals) which, in partnership with an independent facility listed as a Cleft and Craniofacial Team by the American Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Association, provide surgical services to patients with cleft palate and craniofacial abnormalities. This payment promotes access to inpatient hospital services for MA eligible and uninsured persons in this Commonwealth with cleft palate and craniofacial abnormalities. The Department is allocating funding for this additional class of DSH payment to qualifying hospitals for Fiscal Year (FY) 2013-2014.

The Department determines a hospital eligible for this additional class of DSH payment if the hospital meets all of the criteria listed as follows. Unless otherwise stated, the source of the information is the State FY 2010-2011 MA cost report (MA-336).

1. The hospital is enrolled in the MA Program as a general acute care hospital and is licensed to provide obstetrical and neonatal services as reported by the Department of Health for the period July 1, 2010, through June 30, 2011.

2. The hospital has a partnership with a facility listed as of January 2013, as both a cleft palate team and a craniofacial team by the American Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Association and Cleft Palate Foundation.

3. As of March 2013, the hospital is accredited as an Adult Level I Trauma Center and a Pediatric Level I Trauma Center by the Pennsylvania Trauma System Foundation.

4. The hospital provided more than 135,000 total acute inpatient days of care.

5. The hospital ranked at or above the 92nd percentile of all acute care general hospitals enrolled in the Commonwealth MA Program based on the total number of MA inpatient days of care.

6. The hospital's ratio of uncompensated care to net patient revenue is at least 3.30%, based on the Health Care Cost Containment Council's Financial Analysis 2012, Volume One.

The Department will divide the total payment proportionately among all qualifying hospitals based on each hospital's total MA inpatient days to total MA inpatient days for all qualified hospitals.

The Department published notice of its intent to allocate funding for this DSH payment at 43 Pa.B. 7510 (December 21, 2013). The Department received no public comments during the 30-day comment period and will implement the changes as described in its notice of intent.

Fiscal Impact

The FY 2013-2014 impact as a result of the funding allocation for this payment is \$0.323 million (\$0.150 million in State general funds and \$0.173 million in Federal funds upon approval by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services).

Disproportionate Share and Supplemental Hospital Payments

The Department of Public Welfare (Department) is providing final notice of its continuation of the additional class of disproportionate share hospital (DSH) payments and the additional classes of supplemental payments for inpatient hospitals that were initiated in conjunction with the act of July 9, 2010 (P. L. 336, No. 49) (Act 49). The Department is also providing final notice of its continued use of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2012-2013 payment methodologies for inpatient DSH, outpatient supplemental and direct medical education payments and of its DSH and Supplemental Reconciliation process.

In addition, the Department is providing final notice of the process and data used to determine the eligibility of new hospitals for certain DSH and supplemental payments effective July 1, 2013.

Background

Among other things, Act 49 added Article VIII-G to the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. §§ 801-G—816-G) authorizing the Department to impose a monetary assessment on the net operating revenue of all Commonwealth licensed hospitals, other than exempt hospitals.

Under Act 49, funds generated by the hospital assessment must be deposited into a restricted account called the Quality Care Assessment Fund (see 62 P. S. § 805-G(a)) and were to be used to update the Medical Assistance (MA) fee-for-service (FFS) payment system for inpatient services for acute care general hospitals, modify some existing DSH and supplemental payments, create several new DSH and supplemental payments for MA hospital providers and generally support the MA Program. In compliance with Act 49, the Department imposed a monetary assessment, updated the MA FFS payment system for inpatient acute care services, modified some existing DSH and supplemental payments and created new DSH and supplemental payments for hospital providers after receiving the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services' approval for the assessment and the payment changes.

The assessment under Act 49 was effective for a 3-year period ending June 30, 2013. The assessment and continuation of the hospital payments from the Quality Care Assessment Fund were reauthorized under the act of July 9, 2013 (P. L. 369, No. 55), effective for a 3-year period ending June 30, 2016.

Continuation of DSH and Supplemental Payments from the Quality Care Assessment Fund

The Department is continuing the following payments utilizing the FY 2012-2013 eligibility criteria and payment distribution methodologies: MA Stability Payments; MA Dependency Payments; Enhanced Payments to Certain Disproportionate Share Hospitals; and MA Rehabilitation Adjustment Payments. The Department is also continuing Community Access Fund, Inpatient DSH, Outpatient Supplemental and Medical Education payments as modified under the Quality Care Assessment program. The methodology used to determine hospitals that qualify

for these payments and the calculation of the payment amounts for each payment program have not been changed.

The Department modified the eligibility criteria for the Small and Sole Community Hospital DSH payment to include hospitals which provide verification to the Department as being designated as a sole community hospital by Medicare. Newly-designated sole community hospitals qualify for the payment program beginning with FY 2013-2014. The payment distribution methodology for this payment program remains the same as the FY 2012-2013 payment distribution methodology.

Finally, the Department is continuing its existing payment reconciliation process as described in the approved State Plan.

FFS All Patient Refined-Diagnosis Related Group (APR-DRG) Base Rate, DSH and Supplemental Payments for New Hospitals

The current State Plan methodologies for determining a hospital's eligibility for certain adjustments to its FFS APR-DRG Base Rate and for the DSH and supplemental payments initiated in conjunction with Act 49 use historical MA data from FY 2007-2008. Accordingly, hospitals that were not required to file an FY 2007-2008 MA 336 hospital cost report (new hospitals) do not qualify for these FFS APR-DRG Base Rate adjustments and DSH and supplemental payments due to the lack of required historical data.

Beginning in FY 2013-2014, the Department is instituting a process to collect data from new hospitals and newly designated sole community hospitals using forms designated by the Department. Beginning with a new hospital's first full State fiscal year of MA enrollment, the Department will use this data in lieu of the FY 2007-2008 MA hospital cost report data to determine whether a new hospital qualifies for the MA dependency and teaching adjustments to its APR-DRG Base Rate as well as the hospital's eligibility for the DSH and supplemental payments created in conjunction with Act 49 and, if eligible, the payment amounts. The payments for which a new hospital may qualify through this process are the MA Stability Payments, MA Dependency Payments, Enhanced Payments to Certain Disproportionate Share Hospitals, MA Rehabilitation Adjustment Payments and Small and Sole Community Hospital DSH Payments.

A detailed description of the eligibility criteria, excluding the new criteria provisions for sole community hospitals and payment methodologies for each of these payments was described in the public notice published at 42 Pa.B. 6048 (September 22, 2012). For the first full State fiscal year of MA enrollment of a new hospital or newly designated sole community hospital that qualifies for one or more of these supplemental or DSH payments, the payment amounts will be prorated in accordance with the period of time the hospital was in operation. The Department considers the rates and payments established for new hospitals as a result of this process to be interim rates and payments. The Department will reconcile the rates and payments once MA 336 hospital cost report data and other necessary Medicare data is available for the new hospital's and newly designated sole community hospital's first full State fiscal year of MA enrollment.

The eligibility criteria, payment distribution methodology and the source of data for all other DSH and supplemental programs in existence prior to the enactment of Act 49 remain unchanged.

The Department published notice of its intent to allocate funding for these DSH and supplemental payments at 43 Pa.B. 4034 (July 13, 2013). The Department received no public comments during the 30-day comment period, and will implement the changes as described in its notice of intent with the modification to the eligibility criteria for the Small and Sole Community Hospital Payment Program.

Fiscal Impact

The FY 2013-2014 impact is \$566.426 million (\$263.805 million in State general funds).

Federal Poverty Income Guidelines for 2014

The Department of Public Welfare (Department) announces the implementation in this Commonwealth of the 2014 Federal Poverty Income Guidelines (FPIG) which were issued by the Department of Health and Human Services and published at 79 FR 3593 (January 22, 2014).

The FPIGs are the basis for the income eligibility limits for several categories of Medicaid whose regulations are published in 55 Pa. Code (relating to public welfare) and administered by the Department. These categories include Healthy Beginnings for Pregnant Women and

Qualified Children (55 Pa. Code Chapter 140, Subchapter A), Healthy Horizons for the Elderly and Disabled (55 Pa. Code Chapter 140, Subchapter B) and Extended Medical Coverage under Categorically Needy TANF-Related Categories (55 Pa. Code Chapter 140, Subchapter C). Categories also include the Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) based eligibility categories for pregnant women, children and parent/caretakers. The MAGI categories were established by the Department's implementation of the Affordable Care Act at 43 Pa.B. 4035 (July 13, 2013).

The percentages for the Medicaid categories of Healthy Beginnings, MAGI and Healthy Horizons are set forth as follows:

Healthy Beginnings:

- a. 185% for pregnant women and infants up to 1 year of age.
- b. 133% for children 1 year of age through 5 years of age.
- c. 100% for children 6 years of age and older.

* Healthy Beginnings FPIGs will discontinue once the categories are converted to a MAGI category in 2014.

MAGI:

- a. 215% for pregnant women and infants up to 1 year of age.
- b. 157% for children 1 year of age through 5 years of age.
- c. 33% for parents/caretakers and children 0 years of age through 18 years of age.

* MAGI FPIGs represent the MAGI converted standards which will be valid until September 2019

Healthy Horizons:

- a. 100% for persons eligible for the categorically needy, Medicare Buy-In and Medicare cost-sharing benefits.
- b. 120% for persons eligible for the Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries.
- c. 135% for persons eligible for the Qualifying Individuals Beneficiaries benefits.

There are different resource limits for each of the Healthy Horizons programs.

Payments to Nonpublic and County Nursing Facilities; Final Rates for State Fiscal Year 2012-2013

This notice announces the Department of Public Welfare's (Department) final annual case-mix per diem payment rates for State Fiscal Year (FY) 2012-2013 for nonpublic and county nursing facilities that participate in the Medical Assistance (MA) Program.

Nonpublic Nursing Facility Per Diem Rates

As required by the case-mix payment methodology in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187, Subchapter G (relating to rate setting), the Department annually sets an annual MA per diem rate for each nonpublic nursing facility provider. Each facility's annual per diem rate is comprised of four

components: resident care; other resident related; administrative; and capital. For each quarter of FY 2012-2013, the Department adjusted the resident care component of each facility's rate by multiplying the resident care component by the facility's MA case-mix index for the appropriate picture date.

In calculating the final rates, the peer group prices for FY 2012-2013 were set as specified in 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(1)(v) (relating to peer grouping for price setting) which includes provisions that county nursing facility MA allowable costs have been phased-out of the rate-setting process for nonpublic nursing facilities. Further, for facilities classified as special rehabilitation facilities on or before July 1, 2000, peer group medians and prices were determined in accordance with the methodology described in the final-form rulemaking Payment for Nursing Facility Services Provided by Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities published at 44 Pa.B. 3322 (June 7, 2014). See § 1187.94(2)(i) and (ii).

In addition, 55 Pa. Code 1187.96 (relating to price- and rate-setting computations) authorized a 3-year phase-in period of the use of the Minimum Data Set Resource Utilization Group III version 5.12 44 Grouper (RUG v 5.12) and the most recent classifiable resident assessments beginning July 1, 2010, and ending June 30, 2013. The phase-in provisions only affect the resident care component of a facility's case-mix per diem rate. The resident care rate used to establish a nursing facility's case-mix per diem rate is a blended resident care rate which consists of a portion of the resident care rate calculated using the previous RUG version 5.01 Grouper (RUG v 5.01) and the most recent comprehensive resident assessments and a portion of the resident care rate calculated using RUG v 5.12 and the most recent classifiable resident assessments. For FY 2012-2013, the nursing facility's blended resident care rate equals 25% of the nursing facility's RUG v 5.01 resident care rate from the prior rate quarter adjusted by the percent increase or decrease in the RUG v 5.12 resident care rate and 75% of the nursing facility's RUG v 5.12 resident care rate.

The Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved State Plan Amendment (SPA) 12-020 on November 23, 2012. SPA 12-020 states that the

budget adjustment factor (BAF) will limit the estimated Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for MA nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities so that the average payment rate in effect for the fiscal year is limited to the amount permitted by the funds appropriated by the General Appropriations Act for the fiscal year. For FY 2012-2013, the Department calculated a base BAF for nonpublic nursing facilities for July, October and January rates and the base BAF was adjusted for the April-June 2013 calendar quarter. The formula the Department used to determine a base BAF equals the target rate divided by the acuity-adjusted weighted average rate. For the April BAF, the weighted average April rate was compared to the April target rate. Since the difference between the weighted average April rate and the April target rate was more than \$0.50, a BAF for the April-June 2013 calendar quarter was determined by dividing the April target rate by the weighted average April rate at 100%. For the 2012-2013 rate year, the base BAF is 0.84559 and the April BAF is 0.85606.

County Nursing Facility Per Diem Rates

As required by the rate methodology in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1189, Subchapter D (relating to rate setting), the Department annually sets an annual MA per diem rate for each county nursing facility provider. As stated in 55 Pa. Code § 1189.91(b) (relating to per diem rates for county nursing facilities), for each rate year beginning on or after July 1, 2007, the per diem rate paid to a county nursing facility for a rate year will be the facility's prior rate year per diem rate multiplied by a BAF.

In addition, as required by 55 Pa. Code § 1189.91(d), the Department followed the formula set forth in the Commonwealth's approved State Plan to determine that the BAF for FY 2012-2013 for county nursing facilities is 1.0. CMS approved SPA 12-019 on November 23, 2012.

SPA 12-019 states that for rate setting year 2012-2013, the BAF shall limit the estimated Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for medical assistance nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities so that the average payment rate is limited to the amount permitted by the funds appropriated by the General Appropriations Acts. The BAF as it applies to county nursing facilities is 1.0.

The final annual per diem rates for FY 2012-2013 are available on the Department's web site at www.dpw.state.pa.us/provider/doingbusinesswithdpw/longtermcarecaseinformation/index.htm and at local county assistance offices throughout this Commonwealth or by contacting Marilyn Yocum, Department of Public Welfare, Office of Long-Term Living at (717) 772-2549.

Public Process

The Department published a notice announcing its proposed case-mix per diem payment rates for nonpublic and county nursing facilities for FY 2012-2013 at 42 Pa.B. 3825 (June 30, 2012) and invited interested persons to submit comments. No comments were received by the Department in response to the proposed rate notice.

Appeals

Following publication of this notice, the Department will send rate letters to each MA nursing facility to notify the facilities of their final rates for FY 2012-2013. The rate letter will also advise each facility that it may file an administrative appeal if the facility believes that the Department made any errors or otherwise disagrees with its final rates for FY 2012-2013. A provider's appeal must be in writing and filed with the Department's Bureau of

Hearings and Appeals, 2330 Vartan Way, 2nd Floor, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9721, within 33 days of the date of the Department's letter notifying the facility of its final rates. Facilities should refer to 67 Pa.C.S. Chapter 11 (relating to Medical Assistance hearings and appeals) and to the Department's regulations at 55 Pa. Code Chapter 41 (relating to Medical Assistance provider appeal procedures) for more detail regarding their appeal rights and the requirements related to written appeals.

Fiscal Impact

There is no fiscal impact for the change in final payment rates for FY 2012-2013 per diem rate payments to nonpublic and county nursing facilities compared to the facilities' final FY 2011-2012 per diem rates.

Payments to Nonpublic and County Nursing Facilities; Final Rates for State Fiscal Year 2013-2014

This notice announces the Department of Public Welfare's (Department) final annual case-mix per diem payment rates for State Fiscal Year (FY) 2013-2014 for nonpublic and county nursing facilities that participate in the Medical Assistance (MA) Program.

Nonpublic Nursing Facility Per Diem Rates

As required by the case-mix payment methodology in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187, Subchapter G (relating to rate setting), the Department annually sets an annual MA per diem rate for each nonpublic nursing facility provider. Each facility's annual per diem rate is comprised of four components: resident care; other resident related; administrative; and capital. For each quarter of FY 2013-2014, the Department adjusted the resident care component of each facility's rate by multiplying the resident care component by the facility's MA case-mix index for the appropriate picture date.

In calculating the final rates, peer group medians and prices for facilities classified as special rehabilitation facilities on or before July 1, 2000, were determined in accordance with the methodology described in the final-form rulemaking Payment for Nursing Facility Services Provided by Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities, published at 44 Pa.B. 3322 (June 7, 2014). See 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(2)(i) and (ii) (relating to peer grouping for price setting). Further, the phase-in of the Resource Utilization Group III version 5.12 44 Grouper classifica-

tion system has been fully implemented in the rate setting process as specified in 55 Pa. Code § 1187.96 (relating to price- and rate-setting computations).

The Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved State Plan Amendment (SPA) 13-022 on November 7, 2013. SPA 13-022 states that the budget adjustment factor (BAF) will limit the estimated Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for MA nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities so that the average payment rate in effect for the fiscal year is limited to the amount permitted by the funds appropriated by the General Appropriations Act for the fiscal year. For FY 2013-2014, the Department calculated a base BAF for nonpublic nursing facilities for July, October and January rates and the base BAF was adjusted for the April-June 2014 calendar quarter. The formula the Department used to determine a base BAF equals the target rate divided by the acuity-adjusted weighted average rate. For the April BAF, the weighted average April rate was compared to the April target rate. Since the difference between the weighted average April rate and the April target rate was more than \$0.25, a BAF for the April-June 2014 calendar quarter was determined by dividing the April target rate by the weighted average April rate at 100%. For the 2013-2014 rate year, the base BAF is 0.84801 and the April BAF is 0.86266.

County Nursing Facility Per Diem Rates

As required by the rate methodology in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1189, Subchapter D (relating to rate setting), the Department annually sets an annual MA per diem rate for each county nursing facility provider. As stated in 55 Pa. Code § 1189.91(b) (relating to per diem rates for county nursing facilities), for each rate year beginning on or after July 1, 2007, the per diem rate paid to a county nursing facility for a rate year will be the facility's prior rate year per diem rate multiplied by a BAF.

In addition, as required by 55 Pa. Code § 1189.91(d), the Department followed the formula set forth in the Commonwealth's approved State Plan to determine that the BAF for FY 2013-2014 for county nursing facilities is 1.02. CMS approved SPA 13-021 on November 7, 2013.

SPA 13-021 states that for rate setting year 2013-2014, the BAF shall limit the estimated Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for MA nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities so that the average payment rate is limited to the amount permitted by the funds appropriated by the General Appropriations Acts. The BAF as it applies to county nursing facilities is 1.02.

The final annual per diem rates for FY 2013-2014 are available on the Department's web site at www.dpw.state.pa.us/provider/doingbusinesswithdpw/longtermcarecase/mixinformation/index.htm and at local county assistance offices throughout this Commonwealth or by contacting Marilyn Yocum, Department of Public Welfare, Office of Long-Term Living at (717) 772-2549.

Public Process

The Department published a notice announcing its proposed case-mix per diem payment rates for nonpublic and county nursing facilities for FY 2013-2014 at 43 Pa.B. 3587 (June 29, 2013) and invited interested persons to submit comments. No comments were received by the Department in response to the proposed rate notice.

Appeals

Following publication of this notice, the Department will send rate letters to each MA nursing facility to notify

the facilities of their final rates for FY 2013-2014. The rate letter will also advise each facility that it may file an administrative appeal if the facility believes that the Department made any errors or otherwise disagrees with its final rates for FY 2013-2014. A provider's appeal must be in writing and filed with the Department's Bureau of Hearings and Appeals, 2330 Vartan Way, 2nd Floor, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9721, within 33 days of the date of the Department's letter notifying the facility of its final rates. Facilities should refer to 67 Pa.C.S. Chapter 11 (relating to Medical Assistance hearings and appeals) and to the Department's regulations in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 41 (relating to Medical Assistance provider appeal procedures) for more detail regarding their appeal rights and the requirements related to written appeals.

Fiscal Impact

The change in payment rates will result in an estimated increased cost of \$46.365 million (\$22.142 million in State funds) for per diem rate payments to nonpublic nursing facilities and an estimated increased cost of \$7.245 million (\$3.460 million in State funds) for per diem rate payments for county nursing facilities' FY 2013-2014 rates compared to the facilities' FY 2012-2013 per diem rates. Funding for these changes has been included in the MA Long-Term Care appropriation.

Payments to Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities; Final Rates for November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012

This notice announces the Department of Public Welfare's (Department) final case-mix per diem payment rates for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, for the four nursing facilities classified as special rehabilitation nursing facilities (SRF) on or before July 1, 2000.

As required by the case-mix payment methodology regulations in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187, Subchapter G

(relating to rate setting), the Department annually sets an annual Medical Assistance (MA) per diem rate for each nonpublic nursing facility provider. Each facility's annual per diem rate is comprised of four components: resident care; other resident related; administrative; and capital.

The case-mix rates for SRFs are calculated using the same methodology as all other nonpublic nursing facilities except that, for the purposes of establishing peer group medians and prices, SRFs are classified in one Statewide peer group without regard to their size or geographic location. Retroactive to November 1, 2011, peer group medians and peer group prices were established for facilities classified as SRFs on or before July 1, 2000, separate from any other facilities meeting the definition of an SRF. Peer group medians and prices for facilities classified as SRFs after July 1, 2000, were established using data from all facilities meeting the definition of an SRF. See 44 Pa.B. 3322 (June 7, 2014); 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(2)(i) and (ii) (relating to peer grouping for price setting).

Section 1187.96 of 55 Pa. Code (relating to price- and rate-setting computations) authorized a 3-year phase-in of the use of the Minimum Data Set Resource Utilization Group III version 5.12 44 Grouper (RUG v 5.12) and the most recent classifiable resident assessments beginning July 1, 2010, and ending June 30, 2013. The phase-in provisions only affect the resident care component of a facility's case-mix per diem rate. The resident care rate used to establish a nursing facility's case-mix per diem rate is a blended resident care rate which consists of a portion of the resident care rate calculated using the previous RUG version 5.01 Grouper (RUG v 5.01) and the most recent comprehensive resident assessments and a portion of the resident care rate calculated using RUG v 5.12 and the most recent classifiable resident assessments. For Fiscal Year (FY) 2011-2012, the nursing facility's blended resident care rate will equal 50% of the nursing facility's RUG v 5.01 resident care rate from the prior rate quarter adjusted by the percent increase or decrease in the RUG v 5.12 resident care rate and 50% of the nursing facility's RUG v 5.12 resident care rate.

In addition, the act of June 30, 2011 (P. L. 89, No. 22) amended the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. §§ 101—1503) to authorize the Department to continue to apply a budget adjustment factor (BAF) in calculating rates for MA nonpublic and county nursing facilities for each fiscal year between July 1, 2011, and June 30, 2013. The Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved State Plan Amendment (SPA) 11-015 on November 21, 2011. SPA 11-015 states that the BAF shall limit payment rates for MA nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities so that the Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for FY 2011-2012 is limited to the amount permitted by the funds appropriated by the General Appropriations Act of 2011. For FY 2011-2012, a BAF was calculated each quarter for nonpublic nursing facilities as stated in 42 Pa.B. 2111 (April 14, 2012). SPA 11-028, which specified that the change in rate methodology related to the SRFs not be a factor in the quarterly BAF calculations for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, was submitted to CMS on December 28, 2011. CMS approved SPA 11-028 on March 13, 2012, with an effective date of November 1, 2011.

The final per diem rates for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, for the four nursing facilities classified as SRFs on or before July 1, 2000, (Good

Shepherd Home Raker Center, Inglis House, Margaret E. Moul Home and Good Shepherd Home-Bethlehem) are available on the Department's web site at www.dpw.state.pa.us/provider/doingbusinesswithdpw/longtermcarecaseinformation/index.htm and at local county assistance offices throughout this Commonwealth or by contacting Marilyn Yocum, Department of Public Welfare, Office of Long-Term Living at (717) 772-2549.

Public Process

The Department published a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* announcing its proposed case-mix per diem payment rates for the initial four SRFs that participate in the MA Program for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, at 42 Pa.B. 2111 and invited interested persons to submit comments. No comments were received by the Department in response to the notice. In addition, the Department received one public comment within the 30-day public comment period in response to the notice published at 41 Pa.B. 5826 (October 29, 2011) regarding redistribution of dollars away from the other nonpublic nursing facilities as a result of the change in rate methodology for special rehabilitation nursing facilities. As provided in response to question #14 of the Regulatory Analysis Form related to the proposed rulemaking Payment for Nursing Facility Services Provided by Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities published at 43 Pa.B. 4599 (August 10, 2013), other nonpublic nursing facilities may see a minimal positive impact. No comments were received by the Department in response to the proposed rulemaking.

Appeals

Following publication of this notice, the Department will send rate letters to notify the four SRFs of their final rates for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012. The rate letter will also advise the facility that it may file an administrative appeal if the facility believes that the Department made any errors or otherwise disagrees with its final rates for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012. A provider's appeal must be in writing and filed with the Department's Bureau of Hearings and Appeals, 2330 Vartan Way, 2nd Floor, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9721, within 33 days of the date of the Department's letter notifying the facility of its final rates. Facilities should refer to 67 Pa.C.S. Chapter 11 (relating to Medical Assistance hearings and appeals) and to the Department's regulations in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 41 (relating to Medical Assistance provider appeal procedures) for more detail regarding their appeal rights and the requirements related to written appeals.

Fiscal Impact

The estimated fiscal impact for the change in payment rates for the four SRFs for the period November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, is \$0.331 million in State funds. For FY 2012-2013 and beyond, the fiscal impact will remain budget neutral as long as the BAF continues to be reauthorized; the act of July 9, 2013 (P. L. 369, No. 55) extends use of a BAF through June 30, 2016.

Peer Groups, Peer Group Medians and Peer Group Prices for Nonpublic Nursing Facilities, County Nursing Facilities, Hospital-Based Nursing Facilities and Special Rehabilitation Facilities for Fiscal Year 2011-2012

The purpose of this notice is to announce the Department of Public Welfare's (Department) peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices for nonpublic nursing facilities, county nursing facilities, hospital-based nursing facilities and special rehabilitation facilities (SRF) under 55 Pa. Code § 1187.95(a)(4) (relating to general principles for rate and price setting). The Department used the peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices to determine case-mix rates for nonpublic nursing facilities for State Fiscal Year (FY) July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, as described in the notices Payments to Nonpublic and County Nursing Facilities; Rates for State Fiscal Year 2011-2012 published at 42 Pa.B. 2111 (April 14, 2012) and Payments to Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities; Final Rates for November 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, published at 44 Pa.B. 3393 (June 7, 2014). The Department calculated the peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices announced in this notice in accordance with 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187 (relating to nursing facility services). Retroactive to November 1, 2011, peer group medians and peer group prices were established for facilities classified as SRFs on or before July 1, 2000, separate from any other facilities meeting the definition of a SRF as described in the final-form rulemaking Payment for Nursing Facility Services Provided by Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities published at 44 Pa.B. 3322 (June 7, 2014). See 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(2)(i) and (ii) (relating to peer grouping for price setting). The data that the Department used to determine the peer group medians and prices is available on the web site for the Department at www.dpw.state.pa.us/provider/doingbusinesswithdpw/longtermcarecasemixinformation/index.htm.

To establish the database for the calculation of peer group medians and prices, the Department used each nursing facility's three most recent audited cost reports that were issued by the Department on or before March 31, 2011, and indexed the costs for each report forward to

the common date of December 31, 2011, using the CMS Nursing Home Without Capital Market Basket Index.

The following is a listing, by group, of the number of nursing facilities with a particular year-end, and the inflation factor used to roll the costs of each facility forward to the common date of December 31, 2011.

After the database was inflated using the inflation values, the Department grouped the facilities in the correct geographic and bed size groupings. In accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94, to establish peer groups, the Department used the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) group classification published in the Federal Office of Management and Budget Bulletin No. 99-04, regarding revised statistical definitions of Metropolitan Areas and guidance on uses of Metropolitan Area definitions, to classify each nursing facility into one of three MSA groups or one non-MSA group. The Department then used the bed complement of the nursing facility on the final day of the reporting period of the most recent audited MA-11 used in the Nursing Information System database to classify nursing facilities into one of three bed complement groups. These groups are 3—119 beds, 120—269 beds and 270 beds and over. County costs are being phased out in nonpublic rate setting computations beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2012. The Department will continue to include county nursing facilities in determining peer groups in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(1)(v) for rate years 2009-2010, 2010-2011 and 2011-2012. Peer groups 7 and 10 have been

collapsed in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(1)(iv). Peer group 13 is designated for SRFs only and peer group 14 is designated for hospital-based nursing facilities only, regardless of geographic location or bed-size.

After the database was established and the peer groups determined, the Department calculated the medians and prices for each peer group. For peer group 13, the Department arrayed the SRFs classified on or before July 1, 2000, to set the peer group median and prices for those facilities. The Department arrayed the SRFs classified after July 1, 2000, with all other SRFs to set their peer group median and prices. The Department used phase-out medians, as determined in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.98 (relating to phase-out median determination) to set prices for the net operating cost centers (resident care, other resident related and administrative) for each peer group that contains a county nursing facility for the 3-year phase-out period. The Department calculated an interim median by adding each county nursing facility's costs from the three most recent audited cost reports to a noncollapsed peer group based on bed size and MSA group. For rate year 2011-2012, the phase-out median equaled 25% of the interim median plus 75% of the median calculated in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.98(b)(4).

To calculate the resident care cost medians, the Department divided the inflated audited allowable resident care costs for each cost report by the total facility case-mix index from the available February 1 picture date closest to the midpoint of the cost report period to obtain case-mix neutral total resident care cost for the cost report year. The Department then divided the case-mix neutral total resident care cost for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days for the cost report year to obtain the resident care cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for each nursing facility to obtain the average case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups and determined an interim median, a median and a phase-out median for each peer group.

To calculate the other resident related cost medians, the Department first divided the inflated audited allowable other resident related costs for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days for the cost report year to obtain the other resident related cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the other resident related cost for each nursing facility to obtain the average other resident related cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average other resident related cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups and determined an interim median, a median and a phase-out median for each peer group.

To calculate the administrative cost medians, the Department adjusted, as appropriate, the total audited actual resident days for each cost report to a minimum 90% occupancy in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.23 (relating to nursing facility incentives and adjustments). The Department then divided the inflated audited allow-

able administrative cost for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days, adjusted to 90% occupancy, if applicable, to obtain the administrative cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the administrative cost for each nursing facility to obtain the average administrative cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average administrative cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups to determine an interim median, a median and a phase-out median for each peer group.

After the medians were determined for each peer group in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.98, the Department set prices using the medians. To set peer group prices, the Department multiplied the resident care cost median of each peer group by 1.17 to obtain the resident care cost peer group price; multiplied the other resident related cost median of each peer group by 1.12 to obtain the other resident related peer group price; and multiplied the administrative cost median of each peer group by 1.04 to obtain the administrative cost peer group price.

The peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices of nonpublic and county nursing facilities, hospital-based and SRFs for Year 17 are in the list of Medians and Prices for 2011-2012.

A Medical Assistance nursing facility provider may file an administrative appeal if the facility believes that the Department made any errors or the provider otherwise disagrees with the Year 17 peer group prices that the Department established for its peer group. A provider's appeal must be in writing and filed with the Department's Bureau of Hearings and Appeals (BHA), 2330 Vartan Way, Second Floor, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9721, within 30 days of the date of this notice. If a provider chooses to appeal, the provider will be afforded the opportunity for a de novo hearing before the BHA. The peer group prices applied in setting the facility's rates may be changed as a result of the final adjudication of the facility's peer group price appeal. Facilities should refer to 67 Pa.C.S. Chapter 11 (relating to Medical Assistance hearings and appeals), and to the Department's regulations in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 41 (relating to Medical Assistance provider appeal procedures), for more detail regarding their appeal rights and the requirements related to their written appeals.

Peer Groups, Peer Group Medians and Peer Group Prices for Nonpublic Nursing Facilities Including Hospital-Based Nursing Facilities and Special Rehabilitation Facilities for Fiscal Year 2012-2013

The purpose of this notice is to announce the Department of Public Welfare’s (Department) peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices for nonpublic nursing facilities including hospital-based nursing facilities and special rehabilitation facilities (SRF) under 55 Pa. Code § 1187.95(a)(4) (relating to general principles for rate and price setting). The Department used the peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices to determine case-mix rates for nonpublic nursing facilities for State Fiscal Year (FY) July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013. The Department calculated the peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices announced in this notice in accordance with 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187 (relating to nursing facility services). Peer group medians and peer group prices for SRFs are determined in accordance with the methodology described in the final-form rulemaking Payment for Nursing Facility Services provided by Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities published at 44 Pa.B. 3322 (June 7, 2014). See 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(2)(i) and (ii) (relating to peer grouping for price setting). The data that the Department used to determine the peer group medians and prices is available on the web site for the Department at www.dpw.state.pa.us/provider/doingbusinesswithdpw/longtermcarecasemixinformation/index.htm.

To establish the database for the calculation of peer group medians and prices, the Department used each nursing facility’s three most recent audited cost reports that were issued by the Department on or before March 31, 2012, and indexed the costs for each report forward to the common date of December 31, 2012, using the CMS Nursing Home Without Capital Market Basket Index. Beginning FY 2012-2013 and thereafter, county nursing facility MA allowable costs are phased-out in nonpublic rate setting computations and county nursing facilities are no longer included in determining peer groups.

The following is a listing, by group, of the number of nursing facilities with a particular year-end, and the inflation factor used to roll the costs of each facility forward to the common date of December 31, 2012.

* As a result of using the three most recent audited cost reports, the “Number of Facilities” column reflects a number in excess of actual enrolled nursing facilities.

After the database was inflated using the inflation values, the Department grouped the facilities in the correct geographic and bed size groupings. In accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94, to establish peer groups, the Department used the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) group classification published in the Federal Office of Management and Budget Bulletin No. 99-04, regarding revised statistical definitions of Metropolitan Areas and guidance on uses of Metropolitan Area definitions, to classify each nursing facility into one of three MSA groups or one non-MSA group. The Department then used the bed complement of the nursing facility on the final day of the reporting period of the most recent audited MA-11 used in the Nursing Information System database to classify nursing facilities into one of three bed complement groups. These groups are 3—119 beds, 120—269 beds and 270 beds and over. Peer groups 7 and 10 have been collapsed in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(1)(iv). Peer group 13 is designated for SRFs only and peer group 14 is designated for hospital-based nursing facilities only, regardless of geographic location or bed-size.

After the database was established and the peer groups determined, the Department calculated the medians and prices for each peer group. For peer group 13, the Department arrayed the SRFs classified on or before July 1, 2000, to set the peer group median and prices for those

facilities. The Department arrayed any SRFs classified after July 1, 2000, with all other SRFs to set their peer group medians and prices.

To calculate the resident care cost medians, the Department divided the inflated audited allowable resident care costs for each cost report by the total facility case-mix index from the available February 1 picture date closest to the midpoint of the cost report period to obtain case-mix neutral total resident care cost for the cost report year. The Department then divided the case-mix neutral total resident care cost for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days for the cost report year to obtain the case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for each nursing facility to obtain the average case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups and determined a median for each peer group.

To calculate the other resident related cost medians, the Department first divided the inflated audited allowable other resident related costs for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days for the cost report year to obtain the other resident related cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the other resident related cost for each nursing facility to obtain the average other resident related cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average other resident related cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups and determined a median for each peer group.

To calculate the administrative cost medians, the Department adjusted, as appropriate, the total audited actual resident days for each cost report to a minimum 90% occupancy in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.23 (relating to nursing facility incentives and adjustments). The Department then divided the inflated audited allowable administrative cost for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days, adjusted to 90% occupancy, if applicable, to obtain the administrative cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the administrative cost for each nursing facility to obtain the average administrative cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average administrative cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups to determine a median for each peer group.

After the medians were determined for each peer group, the Department set prices using the medians. To set peer group prices, the Department multiplied the resident care cost median of each peer group by 1.17 to obtain the resident care cost peer group price; multiplied the other resident related cost median of each peer group by 1.12 to obtain the other resident related peer group price; and multiplied the administrative cost median of each peer group by 1.04 to obtain the administrative cost peer group price.

The peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices of nonpublic nursing facilities including hospital-based and SRFs for Year 18 are in the list of Medians and Prices for 2012-2013.

A Medical Assistance nursing facility provider may file an administrative appeal if the facility believes that the Department made any errors or the provider otherwise disagrees with the Year 18 peer group prices that the Department established for its peer group. A provider's appeal must be in writing and filed with the Department's Bureau of Hearings and Appeals (BHA), 2330 Vartan Way, Second Floor, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9721, within 30 days of the date of this notice. If a provider chooses to appeal, the provider will be afforded the opportunity for a de novo hearing before the BHA. The peer group prices applied in setting the facility's rates may be changed as a result of the final adjudication of the facility's peer group price appeal. Facilities should refer to 67 Pa.C.S. Chapter 11 (relating to Medical Assistance hearings and appeals), and to the Department's regulations in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 41 (relating to Medical Assistance provider appeal procedures), for more detail regarding their appeal rights and the requirements related to their written appeals.

Fiscal Impact

There is no fiscal impact associated with this change in FY 2012-2013.

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Peer Groups, Peer Group Medians and Peer Group Prices for Nonpublic Nursing Facilities Including Hospital-Based Nursing Facilities and Special Rehabilitation Facilities for Fiscal Year 2013-2014

The purpose of this notice is to announce the Department of Public Welfare’s (Department) peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices for nonpublic nursing facilities including hospital-based nursing facilities and special rehabilitation facilities (SRF) codified at 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187, Appendix B (relating to medians and prices) under 55 Pa. Code § 1187.95(a)(4) (relating to general principles for rate and price setting). The Department used the peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices to determine case-mix rates for nonpublic nursing facilities for State Fiscal Year (FY) July 1, 2013, through June 30, 2014. The Department calculated the peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices announced in this notice in accordance with 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187 (relating to nursing facility services). Peer group medians and peer group prices for SRFs are determined in accordance with the methodology described in the final-form rulemaking Payment for Nursing Facility Services Provided by Special Rehabilitation Nursing Facilities published at 44 Pa.B. 3322 (June 7, 2014). The data that the Department used to determine the peer group medians and prices is available on the web site for the Department at www.dpw.state.pa.us/provider/doingbusinesswithdpw/longtermcarecasemixinformation/index.htm.

To establish the database for the calculation of peer group medians and prices, the Department used each nursing facility’s three most recent audited cost reports that were issued by the Department on or before March 31, 2013, and indexed the costs for each report forward to the common date of December 31, 2013, using the CMS Nursing Home Without Capital Market Basket Index. The following is a listing, by group, of the number of nursing facilities with a particular year-end, and the inflation factor used to roll the costs of each facility forward to the common date of December 31, 2013.

* As a result of using the three most recent audited cost reports, the “Number of Facilities” column reflects a number in excess of actual enrolled nursing facilities.

After the database was inflated using the inflation values, the Department grouped the facilities in the correct geographic and bed size groupings. In accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94 (relating to peer grouping for price setting), to establish peer groups, the Department used the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) group classification published in the Federal Office of Management and Budget Bulletin No. 99-04, regarding revised statistical definitions of Metropolitan Areas and guidance on uses of Metropolitan Area definitions, to classify each nursing facility into one of three MSA groups or one non-MSA group. The Department then used the bed complement of the nursing facility on the final day of the reporting period of the most recent audited MA-11 used in the Nursing Information System database to classify nursing facilities into one of three bed complement groups. These groups are 3—119 beds, 120—269 beds and 270 beds and over. Peer groups 7 and 10 have been collapsed in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94(1)(iv). Peer group 13 is designated for SRFs only and peer group 14 is designated for hospital-based nursing facilities only, regardless of geographic location or bed-size.

After the database was established and the peer groups determined, the Department calculated the medians and prices for each peer group. For peer group 13, the Department arrayed the SRFs classified on or before July 1, 2000, to set the peer group median and prices for those facilities. The Department arrayed any SRFs classified after July 1, 2000, with all other SRFs to set their peer group medians and prices.

To calculate the resident care cost medians, the Department divided the inflated audited allowable resident care

costs for each cost report by the total facility case-mix index from the available February 1 picture date closest to the midpoint of the cost report period to obtain case-mix neutral total resident care cost for the cost report year. The Department then divided the case-mix neutral total resident care cost for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days for the cost report year to obtain the case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for each nursing facility to obtain the average case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups and determined a median for each peer group.

To calculate the other resident related cost medians, the Department first divided the inflated audited allowable other resident related costs for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days for the cost report year to obtain the other resident related cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the other resident related cost for each nursing facility to obtain the average other resident related cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average other resident related cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups and determined a median for each peer group.

To calculate the administrative cost medians, the Department adjusted, as appropriate, the total audited actual resident days for each cost report to a minimum 90% occupancy in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.23 (relating to nursing facility incentives and adjustments). The Department then divided the inflated audited allowable administrative cost for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days, adjusted to 90% occupancy, if applicable, to obtain the administrative cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the administrative cost for each nursing facility to obtain the average administrative cost per diem of each facility. The Department arrayed the average administrative cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups to determine a median for each peer group.

After the medians were determined for each peer group, the Department set prices using the medians. To set peer group prices, the Department multiplied the resident care

cost median of each peer group by 1.17 to obtain the resident care cost peer group price; multiplied the other resident related cost median of each peer group by 1.12 to obtain the other resident related peer group price; and multiplied the administrative cost median of each peer group by 1.04 to obtain the administrative cost peer group price.

The peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices for nonpublic nursing facilities including hospital-based and SRFs for Year 19 are in the list of Medians and Prices for 2013-2014.

A Medical Assistance nursing facility provider may file an administrative appeal if the facility believes that the Department made any errors or the provider otherwise disagrees with the Year 19 peer group prices that the Department established for its peer group. A provider's appeal must be in writing and filed with the Department's Bureau of Hearings and Appeals (BHA), 2330 Vartan Way, Second Floor, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9721, within 30 days of the date of this notice. If a provider chooses to appeal, the provider will be afforded the opportunity for a de novo hearing before the BHA. The peer group prices applied in setting the facility's rates may be changed as a result of the final adjudication of the facility's peer group price appeal. Facilities should refer to 67 Pa.C.S. Chapter 11 (relating to Medical Assistance hearings and appeals), and to the Department's regulations in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 41 (relating to Medical Assistance provider appeal procedures), for more detail regarding their appeal rights and the requirements related to their written appeals.

Fiscal Impact

There is no fiscal impact associated with this change in FY 2013-2014.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Proposed Special Regulation Designations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) has approved guidelines with regard to encouraging public participation on possible changes to the designation of streams, stream sections or lakes for special regulation programs. Under 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65 (relating to special fishing regulations), the Commission designates certain streams, stream sections and lakes as being subject to special fishing regulations. These designations are effective after Commission approval when they are posted at the site and a notice is published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Under the Commission's guidelines, a notice concerning the proposed designation or redesignation of a stream, stream section or lake under special regulations ordinarily will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the matter is reviewed by the Commissioners.

At the next Commission meeting on July 14 and 15, 2014, the Commission will consider taking the following actions with respect to waters subject to special fishing regulations under 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65, effective on January 1, 2015:

Code § 65.6 on Pine Creek, Lycoming County, from the current downstream limit located 164 yards upstream of the confluence of Naval Run downstream 1.6 miles to Bonnell Run. If approved, the revised limits will be from the confluence of Slate Run downstream to the confluence of Bonnell Run, a distance of 2.8 miles.

The City plans to utilize the 311 abbreviated dialing code to provide information on nonemergency police services and other government services to its residents. No responses to the City's Petition were filed. Accordingly, the Commission grants the City's Petition.

Background

In 1997, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) released the N11 First Report and Order and FNPRM¹ in which it assigned the 311 abbreviated dialing code on a nationwide basis for nonemergency police services. The FCC, acting on a petition filed by the Department of Justice, concluded that assigning the 311 abbreviated dialing code as the universal telephone number for nonemergency police services was in the public interest.² The FCC determined that use of an N11 code for access to nonemergency police services could alleviate congestion on 911 circuits, which could permit more effective operation of 911 emergency services. Additionally, the FCC left it to the discretion of local jurisdictions to determine whether 311 should also be used for the dual purpose of accessing other government services. Accordingly, the FCC reserved the 311 abbreviated dialing code for the purpose of providing nonemergency police services and access to other government services.³ Further, the FCC stated that when a provider of telecommunications services receives a request from an entity to use 311 for

access to nonemergency police and other government services in a particular jurisdiction, it must ensure that, within six months of the request: (1) entities that were assigned 311 at the local level prior to the effective date of this First Report and Order relinquish non-compliant uses; and (2) it takes any steps necessary to complete 311 calls from its subscribers to a requesting 311 entity in its service area.⁴ Furthermore, the FCC stated that since 311 calls, like 911 calls, are typically intrastate, states would regulate cost recovery in most instances.⁵ The FCC concluded that funding of 311 was a local issue.⁶

On March 19, 2014, the City filed the instant petition requesting that it be assigned as the proper administrator of the 311 abbreviated dialing code for the purpose of providing nonemergency police services and access to other government services to its residents of the City of Harrisburg. In accordance with 52 Pa. Code § 5.41, the City served copies of its petition on the Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA), the Office of Small Business Advocate (OSBA) and the Commission's Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement (BI&E). Additionally, a notice regarding the City's Petition was published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on April 5, 2014. See 44 Pa.B. 2145. However, no responses to the City's Petition were filed.

Discussion

The City is seeking to be assigned as the administrator of, and only party authorized to utilize, the 311 abbreviated dialing code within the City of Harrisburg. The City explains that its 311 system will be a scalable city-wide information service to provide quality, timely, reliable and relevant information on government services. Additionally, when fully implemented, a call to 311 will route to a toll-free number and will be available to the public 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The information that will be available includes, but is not limited to: city government services, including sanitation routes, street closures, amber alerts, public safety advisories; weather conditions; construction and maintenance activities and access to information for Harrisburg citizens and visitors. The City is currently in the process of implementing a plan to establish, host and operate the telephone and web service.

The City asserts in its petition that the 311 number is currently being used with success in Baltimore, Philadelphia, Chicago, New York and other municipalities to reduce the calls to the emergency 911 number and to simplify the process of securing information on local government services. The Commission takes note of this fact. Additionally, as mentioned above, a notice of the Petition was published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. However, no comments were received by the Commission.

The Commission believes that the City has demonstrated it will have the requisite knowledge, skills and technical expertise to serve as the administrator for the 311 abbreviated dialing code. We believe that the City has an adequate business plan for the administration of the 311 abbreviated dialing code. Accordingly, we find that the City has shown good cause to grant its request that it be assigned to be the administrator of the 311 abbreviated dialing code in order to provide nonemergency police services and access to other government services to its residents.

The Commission does not believe that it is necessary to designate Commission staff to assist and coordinate on an ongoing basis with any arrangements between affected

carriers and the City to implement 311. We simply direct that all affected carriers expeditiously perform all analyses required to quantify its costs for the necessary translations and/or facilities work if it plans to seek recovery of internal costs associated with enabling 311 call completion and estimate the time required to perform the necessary translations and/or facilities work to allow 311 call completion from its subscribers. Additionally, we will not direct any technical specifications or protocols at this time. Rather, we encourage the City to provide detailed information regarding its network and feature requirements so that the telephone carriers can commence implementation of the 311 abbreviated dialing code. We also recognize that wireless and other alternate service providers will need to provide access to 311. Therefore, we encourage all affected wireless and other alternate service providers to coordinate and work with the City in an expeditious manner as well regarding any implementation issues.

In conclusion, we find that the use of the 311 abbreviated dialing code to provide nonemergency services and access to other government services will benefit the residents of the City of Harrisburg, by providing a simple, universal, easy-to-remember number to access this pertinent information. Moreover, no party presented any opposition to the assignment of 311 to the City; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

1. The Petition of the City of Harrisburg to be designated as the proper administrator of the 311 Abbreviated Dialing Code for the Provision of Nonemergency Police Services and Access to other Government Services to the residents of the City of Harrisburg is hereby granted.

2. Within six months of the entry date of this Order, any carrier or provider possessing numbering resources within the exchanges of Harrisburg Zone 1 and Harrisburg Zone 2, if they have not done so already, shall discontinue using the 311 abbreviated dialing code for purposes other than access to nonemergency services and access to other government services.

3. Within 30 days of the entry date of this Order, the City of Harrisburg shall provide any carrier or provider holding numbering resources within the exchanges of Harrisburg Zone 1 and Harrisburg Zone 2 with access to a copy of its implementation plan for 311 dialing.

4. Within 45 days of the entry date of this Order, any carrier or provider holding numbering resources within the exchanges of Harrisburg Zone 1 and Harrisburg Zone 2 that possess switches that would have to undergo re-programming shall perform all analyses required to quantify its costs for the necessary translations and/or facilities work if it plans to seek recovery of internal costs associated with 311 call completion and estimate the time required to perform the necessary translations and/or facilities work to allow 311 call completion from its subscribers and shall forward that information to the City of Harrisburg.

5. All affected carriers shall comply with the implementation schedule established herein unless a petition for waiver is filed with the Commission pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 5.41.

6. A copy of this Order shall be served on the carriers or providers holding numbering resources within the Harrisburg Zone 1 and Harrisburg Zone 2 exchanges, the Pennsylvania Telephone Association, Broadband Cable Association of Pennsylvania, and the CTIA-The Wireless Association®.

7. A copy of this Order shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and on the Commission's website at <http://www.puc.pa.gov/>.

8. The Secretary's Bureau shall mark this matter closed.

Final Order

By the Commission:

On December 21, 2006, this Commission entered a Tentative Order (2006 Tentative Order), initiating a proceeding for the revision of the application form and the related instructions (Application) that are utilized by new entrants seeking to provide telecommunications services

within the Commonwealth. The 2006 Tentative Order solicited comments and reply comments on the suggested Application revisions.¹ We have conducted an in-depth review of the submitted initial and reply comments as well as a reappraisal of whether the Application and the relevant procedures that are currently in force for new telecommunications market entrants in Pennsylvania are in need of material changes. We conclude that the evolving market for telecommunications services and their providers within the Commonwealth do not necessitate at this time a change in the Application and the relevant market entry procedures.

A. Background

In response to the enactment of the Federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 (TA-96), the Commission initiated a generic proceeding in order to facilitate the market entry and wholesale interconnection of competitive telecommunications carriers in Pennsylvania. This generic proceeding resulted in our Implementation of the Telecommunications Act of 1996 Orders (Implementation Orders) that also included the development of the relevant Application.² Since the initial issuance of the Implementation Orders in 1996, certain practices and procedures relating to the market entry and certification Application for telecommunications services providers operating in Pennsylvania have evolved in a way that detailed action at this time is not necessary.

Moreover, the Commission has reviewed certain generic wholesale interconnection matters that were originally addressed in the Implementation Orders.³ Furthermore, certain case adjudications clarified the market entry process for facilities-based competitive carriers seeking operating authority in the service areas of certain rural incumbent local exchange carriers (RLECs).⁴ Also, the concerns over delays in addressing entry and dispute resolution implicated in our initial review decision have abated.

As noted in the 2006 Tentative Order, the November 30, 2004, enactment of the current Chapter 30 law (Act 183), and its impact on the regulation of long-distance interexchange carriers (IXCs) necessitated further revisions of the Application.⁵ The enactment of Pennsylvania's Voice-Over-Internet (VoIP) Freedom Act on July 4, 2008 (P. L. 627, S.B. 1000), codified at 73 Pa.S. § 2251.1 et seq., defined the Commission's jurisdiction over retail communications services that are based on the Internet Protocol (IP) such as VoIP, and also affected the market-entry and certification process for certain providers.⁶ In 2012, this Commission further addressed our telecommunications market entry rules when we issued additional guidance regarding the timeframe within which a tele-

communications carrier should provide service to the public in Pennsylvania following its certification.⁷

The Implementation Orders and resolution of challenges and disputes between incumbents and competitors since then have collectively served both this Commission and the regulated telecommunications industry for a very long period in the introduction and enhancement of competitive telecommunications services within the Commonwealth. However, certain issues relating to the market-entry process of competitive telecommunications services providers, and the potential consequences of associated and lengthy litigation,⁸ were identified even before the issuance of the 2006 Tentative Order, and these issues were addressed at length by the commenting parties.

B. Discussion

The Commission received substantive initial and reply comments to the 2006 Tentative Order from a number of participating parties. Commenters included the U.S. Department of Justice Antitrust Division (U.S. DOJ), the Office of the Consumer Advocate (OCA), the Broadband Cable Association of Pennsylvania (BCPA), the Pennsylvania Telephone Association (PTA), and Sprint Communications Company L.P. (Sprint).

The passage of time, the enactment of legislation by the Pennsylvania General Assembly, regulatory developments both within the Commonwealth and in the federal jurisdiction, and the results of individual administrative adjudication and appellate court proceedings have further clarified and refined the standards and practices that govern the market entry, certification, and wholesale interconnection of telecommunications services providers operating within Pennsylvania.

For example, certain corporate merger and/or change of control proceedings have been adjudicated both within this Commonwealth and the federal jurisdiction. These proceedings have affected the operations of incumbent local exchange carriers (ILECs) that are subsidiaries or affiliates of certain holding companies, and have provided additional guidance on wholesale interconnection obligations that have been applicable for specified time frames.⁹ The Commission subsequently adopted regulations designed to standardize and streamline the process for reviewing merger and change of control proceedings.¹⁰

Since the extensive litigation that occurred with the Sprint and Core Application proceedings and issuance of the regulations governing transfers of control in Section 63.321 of our rules, the Commission has not experienced the same degree of controversy with the market entry of competitive carriers in the Commonwealth, including areas served by rural ILECs, where wholesale interconnection issues under Section 251(c) of TA-96, 47 U.S.C. § 251(c), have not so far been implicated.

This combination of regulatory action and recent historical experience currently resolves most, if not all, of the more serious concerns that were expressed by the interested parties during the comment cycle in this proceeding including those that were put forward by the U.S. DOJ. However, we wish to highlight some of the U.S. DOJ concerns below and explain why further action at this time is not needed in light of subsequent developments.

The first primary U.S. DOJ concern regarding this Commission's market entry certification process centered on the fact "that the filing of any timely protest challenging an application for certification, regardless of the merits, automatically sends the application to the Office of the Administrative Law Judge ("OALJ") for an administrative hearing, which can entail extensive discovery and the presentation of evidence and live witnesses."¹¹ The second U.S. DOJ concern focused on the grant of provisional operating authority for competitive local exchange carriers (CLECs) that wished to enter the service areas of rural ILECs. The U.S. DOJ observed that "in contrast to its rules for non-rural areas, the Commission has not authorized CLECs to enter on a provisional basis in rural areas pending resolution of the certification dispute."¹² The U.S. DOJ commented that these "procedures not only delay entry, but also raise costs for a new entrant, thereby erecting barriers to entry in tension with Section 253(a) of the [federal] Telecommunications Act."¹³

The U.S. DOJ Comments also pointed out that on occasion, competitive carriers seeking market entry into the service areas of certain ILECs have entered into "agreements to limit the territories in which CLECs will compete"¹⁴ and thus avoid costly litigation proceedings associated with protested applications. The U.S. DOJ asserted that "such agreements by competitors or prospective competitors to divide territories or not compete in certain territories are among the most serious anti-trust law problems."¹⁵

The U.S. DOJ recommended "that the Commission extend its non-rural procedures to facilities-based entrants in rural areas by (1) granting provisional operating authority and (2) providing that protests by rural ILECs should be reviewed by Commission staff before the matter is referred to an ALJ, to determine if they raise legitimate issues."¹⁶ The U.S. DOJ suggested that "the Commission adopt time limits to speed the ALJ hearing process," and that "as in non-rural territories, the Commission should permit facilities-based entrants in rural

territories to 'commence the provision of service included in the application' at the time its application 'has been accepted for filing.'¹⁷

The concerns of the U.S. DOJ hold merit, especially since the U.S. DOJ is entrusted with the enforcement of relevant federal law. However, recent history and other regulatory action indicate that the market entry of competitive wireline carriers in both non-rural and rural ILEC service territories has been addressed in much more abbreviated proceedings as a routine matter without the protracted litigation that took place in the Sprint and Core Application proceedings around the 2006/2007 time period.

Also, the Commission has not hesitated to take appropriate action to clarify the scope of relevant issues and provide guidance in application proceedings where substantive litigation was imminent.¹⁸ The Commission has also taken affirmative action in order to facilitate the certification of new entrants in a manner that has prevented future contested wholesale interconnection proceedings.¹⁹

Furthermore, as pointed out earlier, the Commission has been able to substantially revise the regulations governing transfers of control to mesh them with federal law, particularly the coordination of control and/or merger proceedings involving the subsidiary or affiliate ILECs of certain holding companies with corresponding proceedings before the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), and to incorporate appropriate merger conditions in its related decisions. See generally *Embarq-CenturyTel Merger Orders*. Consequently, the application processes that were originally established in our 1996 Implementation Orders, as modified through time, have not recently presented "barrier to entry" issues in potential conflict with the letter and the spirit of Sec. 253(a) of TA-96, 47 U.S.C. § 253(a).

At this point, however, we are hesitant to adopt a uniform mandate suggested by the U.S. DOJ recommendation that facilities-based CLECs seeking market entry in the service areas of rural ILECs be automatically given provisional operational authority pending the adjudication of their respective certification applications. The existing process, the unique federal legislative provisions addressing competitive carrier entry in service areas of rural ILECs, and the recent lack of protests against relevant market entry and certification applications, adequately balances the rights of competitive carriers and those for rural ILECs under Sec. 251(f)(1) of TA-96, 47 U.S.C. § 251(f)(1), and does not produce any extraordinary delays or costs that would constitute an unwarranted "barrier to entry."

The risk of protests against market entry applications of competitive carriers where such protests may lack substantive merit, and are used to delay entry, or support anticompetitive restrictions as a precondition to with-

drawing such protests are matters that can continue to be addressed through the existing process of the Commission's Implementation Orders in conjunction with our procedural rules and due process requirements. To the extent that future developments demonstrate that the working procedures supporting termination of this application revision proceeding raise issues of unreasonable process, timelines, or competitive impact, the Commission could limit those protest proceedings under the Public Utility Code to specific time periods governing market entry in rural areas under federal law. However, we see no reason to take that approach at this time because the process of referring protests to the OALJ has produced timely results in a reasonable period.

In particular, we emphasize that the automatic referral of a protested application to OALJ does not mean that a meritless protest will necessarily survive the process of preliminary and subsequent motions or that the Commission will not be able to constructively intervene by timely addressing relevant petitions for interlocutory review and answers to material questions. See generally 52 Pa. Code §§ 5.302 to 5.305. We acknowledge that this process may entail an expenditure of time and impose potentially unnecessary costs on an applicant. However, this Commission is also legally obliged to afford appropriate due process to all pending proceedings and their participants, including protestants to market entry applications of competitive carriers. Similarly, in matters where an applicant's provisional operating authority is concerned, the preliminary grant of such authority and its potential revocation while an application is pending are decisions first made by Commission Staff. Such action is subject to Commission review and approval. This process already requires notice to a recipient that the action is being taken and that the notice inform the recipient of their right to file a timely appeal from a Staff determination under our regulations. See inter alia 52 Pa. Code 1.75 and 52 Pa. Code § 5.44.

In light of our extensive review of the comments submitted in this proceeding, we will not make, at this time, any substantive modifications to the existing application form and the accompanying processes that govern the market entry of providers of telecommunications services within this Commonwealth. Nevertheless, we will continue to actively monitor the relevant issue areas and actively intervene where and when the conduct of entities that we regulate so requires. *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

Order

By the Commission:

Pursuant to our May 29, 1990 Order, at Docket No. M-00900239 establishing the Pennsylvania Telephone Relay Service (Relay)¹ and surcharge funding mechanism (TRS surcharge) and subsequent Commission orders and legislation,² we have completed the annual recalculation of the TRS surcharge as it will apply to residence and business wireline access lines for July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015. The monthly residential and business monthly access line surcharge will remain set at \$0.08.

Background

The annual TRS recalculation is dependent on data from several sources. Local Exchange Carriers (LECs)³ submit annual wireline access line counts pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 63.37. The traditional relay provider, AT&T Corp., submitted the estimated minutes of use and charges for July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015. Hamilton Telecommunications submitted the estimated minutes-of-use report for the Captioned Telephone Relay Service (CTRS). The Deputy Executive Director of the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR) in the Department of Labor and Industry submitted the 2014-2015 TDDP budget and the 2014-2015 PMASP budget. The surcharge also funds the TRS Advisory Board activities and Fund administration costs. U.S. Bank,⁴ the Fund Administrator, provided a statement of the financial status of the Fund.⁵

Calculation for 2014—2015

Wireline access lines reported by LECs for 2013 and adjusted for Centrex lines are 5,311,603 (3,439,901 Residence and 1,871,702 Business). Based upon the number of access lines, projected program costs (Relay, CTRS, TDDP, and PMASP), anticipated Relay Advisory Board expenses, TRS Fund administration costs, and the financial status of the TRS Fund, the 2014-2015 monthly TRS surcharge rate for both residence and business access lines will continue to be set at \$0.08 per month. All LECs shall continue to remit TRS surcharge revenues to the Fund

Administrator.⁶ Since the 2014-2015 surcharge remains the same as the 2013-2014 rate of \$0.08, the filing of tariff supplements are not required.

Effective July 1, 2014, the monthly surcharge allocation for each fund account is as follows:⁷

Operations for 2014-2015

We shall continue our active oversight of the operations of the Pennsylvania Telecommunications Relay Service. Further, in accordance with 35 P. S. §§ 6701.3a & 4, we shall continue to collaborate with OVR and its TDDP administrator⁸ to ensure adequate funding for distribution of TDDP equipment to low-income persons. Further, we shall continue to assist OVR in its mission to ensure adequate funding for PMASP.

Audits

The Commission's Bureau of Audits (Audits) has issued a TRS related audit report, at Docket No. D-2011-2266114, on the TDDP and PMASP for the twelve-month periods ended June 30, 2011, and June 30, 2010. The audit of the TDDP and PMASP for the twelve-month periods ended June 30, 2013, and June 30, 2012 is currently in progress.

The audit of the TRS Program (collection and disbursement of the TRS funds), at Docket No. D-2012-2308658, for the twelve-month periods ended February 29, 2012, February 28, 2011, and February 28, 2010, was released in February 2014.

Service of Paper Copies

In the past, our practice has been to serve the annual TRS surcharge recalculation order on every LEC in the

Commonwealth, in addition to the service providers, Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, Office of Consumer Advocate, Office of Small Business Advocate, Pennsylvania Telephone Association, and the Fund Administrator. As proposed in the TRS Surcharge Recalculation order at Docket No M-2013-2341301, entered May 23, 2013, service of paper copies of the recalculation orders on the LECs will only henceforth be served if there is a change in the TRS surcharge or other provision in the order requiring that the LECs file a tariff change or take other action. As this order does not change the set surcharge rate or require any other tariff changes in response to this order, paper copies will not be served. Additionally, we will continue to publish the recalculation orders in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and on the Commission's website.

Conclusion

The Commission has completed the annual recalculation of the TRS Surcharge. The surcharge to be applied beginning July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015 will remain at \$0.08 for residential and business access lines. We also note that paper copies of this order will not be served as there is no change in the set surcharge rate or impose new requirements on the LECs requiring tariff changes in response to this Order; *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

1. For the period of July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015, the monthly TRS surcharge rate shall be \$0.08 for residence and business, unless we take further action to revise the TRS surcharge prior to June 30, 2015.
2. All local exchange carriers are directed to use the attached form to remit the monthly TRS surcharge collections to U.S. Bank, Institutional Trust & Custody. The remittance sheet shall be posted to the PUC web site <http://www.puc.pa.gov>. All local exchange carriers are required to collect and remit the TRS surcharge revenue monthly by the 20th of each month.
3. A copy of this Order be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
4. A copy of this Order be posted to the Commission's website.

Tentative Order

By the Commission:

STi Prepaid, LLC, (STi Prepaid), whose utility code is 311443, was authorized by the Commission to provide interexchange reseller services by order entered August 14, 2007, at Docket Nos. A-311443, A-311443F0002, and A-311125F2000.

Commission records reveal that STi Prepaid is delinquent in the amount of \$1,610 for annual assessment for the fiscal year 2011-2012. STi Prepaid is also delinquent in its assessment to the Pennsylvania Universal Service Fund (PA USF), in the amount of \$7,053.45.

On July 18, 2012, the Commission's Bureau of Investigation & Enforcement (I&E) served a complaint alleging that STi Prepaid, LLC violated Section 510 of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 510, for failing to pay the Commission's assessment for the 2011-2012 fiscal year. The complaint alleged that STi Prepaid, LLC owes \$1,610 in unpaid assessments and levied a civil penalty of \$240 for failing to timely pay the assessment.

Thereafter, on September 5, 2012, Vivaro Corporation (Vivaro), the parent company of STi Prepaid, LLC, sought

protection from the Bankruptcy Court and filed a voluntary petition for relief under Chapter 11 of the United States Bankruptcy Code. The petition was filed in the U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of New York, Case No. 12-13810-mg.

As a result of Vivaro's bankruptcy filing, I&E's complaint was subject to the automatic stay provisions of the Bankruptcy Code pursuant to 11 U.S.C. § 362(a). Accordingly, on November 21, 2012, I&E filed a petition for leave to withdraw its complaint against STi Prepaid, pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 5.94.

Then, by letter dated April 4, 2014, STi Prepaid informed the Pa USF that on February 7, 2013, STi Prepaid ceased operations and transferred substantially all of its assets pursuant to a sale under Section 363 of the United States Bankruptcy Code, 11 U.S.C. § 363, and approved by the U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of New York. This letter further stated that since the company no longer exists, it no longer has a need for its certificate of public convenience.

Based upon the information above, STi Prepaid is no longer a public utility. To confirm STi's activity status, Commission staff researched the FCC Form 499 website, which revealed that STi Prepaid is no longer active as of February 7, 2013.

The Commission puts the industry on notice that we will not hesitate to invoke our authority under the Public Utility Code to ensure timely compliance with our regulations and orders including the ordering of such other remedy as the Commission may deem appropriate. 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 504, 505, 506, and 3301. Based on the above facts, we tentatively conclude that it is appropriate to

revoke STi Prepaid's certificate of public convenience without the necessity of a formal complaint as being in the public interest. Where a company does not provide utility service, there is no reason to maintain a certificate of public convenience for that company; *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

1. Revocation of STi Prepaid, LLC's certificate of public convenience is hereby tentatively approved as being in the public interest.

2. The Secretary serve a copy of this Tentative Order upon the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, and the Bureau of Investigation & Enforcement, and also cause a copy of this Tentative Order to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day comment period.

3. Absent the filing of adverse public comment within 30 days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the Bureau of Technical Utility Services shall prepare a Final Order for entry by the Secretary and shall advise the affected Bureaus within the Commission in writing that the certificate of public convenience held by STi Prepaid, LLC, utility code 311443 at Docket Nos. A-311443, A-311443F0002 and A-311125F2000 is cancelled and that the dockets may be closed.
