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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Title 246—MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES

PART I. GENERAL [246 PA. CODE CH. 300]

Proposed Amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 301, 302 and 321 and Proposed Adoption of Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 351

The Minor Court Rules Committee is considering proposing to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania the amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 301, 302, and 321 and the adoption of Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 351. This proposal provides procedural rules for actions initiated pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1), relating to civil violations for failing to stop for a school bus, for the reasons set forth in the accompanying Publication Report. Pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(a)(1), the proposal is being published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* for comments, suggestions, or objections prior to submission to the Supreme Court.

Any report accompanying this proposal was prepared by the Committee to include the rationale for the proposed rulemaking. It will neither constitute a part of the rules nor be officially adopted by the Supreme Court.

Additions to the text of the proposal are bolded and underlined; deletions to the text are bolded and bracketed.

Annex A

TITLE 246. MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES PART I. GENERAL CHAPTER 300. CIVIL ACTION

Rule 301. Definition[.]; Scope.

[A.] (a) As used in this chapter, "action" means a civil action brought before a magisterial district judge.

[B.] (b) Civil action includes any action within the jurisdiction of a magisterial district judge except an action by a landlord against a tenant for the recovery of the possession of real property.

[C.] (c) As used in this chapter, "complaint" or civil action shall include, where applicable, the attached and completed Civil Action Hearing Notice form.

(Editor's Note: Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 301 as printed in 246 Pa. Code reads "Official Note" rather than "Comment.")

Comment: Civil action includes actions formerly denominated "assumpsit" or "trespass" (commonly called contract and tort cases, respectively) and civil claims for fines and penalties. See 42 Pa.C.S. § 1515(a)(3) prescribing the jurisdiction of magisterial district judges.

The rules in this chapter apply to all civil actions before magisterial district judges except an action by a landlord against a tenant for the recovery of possession of real property, which is governed by Chapter 500 of these rules

Except as otherwise provided in [Rule 350] Rules 350 and 351, the rules in this chapter apply to de novo appeals filed pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4), relating to automated work zone speed enforcement violations and actions initiated pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1), relating to failure to stop for a school bus, respectively.

Statutes authorizing a civil fine or penalty include 53 P.S. §§ 10617.1[,] and 10817-A relating to violations of zoning and joint municipal zoning ordinances.

Rule 302. Venue.

(Editor's Note: Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 302 as printed in 246 Pa. Code reads "Official Note" rather than "Comment.")

Comment: This rule combines, with some minor changes, the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure relating to venue. See:

- (1) Individuals: Pa.R.Civ.P. 1006(a).
- (2) Partnerships: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2130(a).
- (3) Corporations: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2179(a).
- (4) Insurance Policies: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2179(b).
- (5) Unincorporated Associations: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2156(a).
- (6) Political Subdivisions: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2103(b).

This rule is not intended to repeal special statutory venue provisions, such as the: (1) venue provisions for actions involving installment sales of goods and services, 12 Pa.C.S. § 6307; (2) venue provisions of the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1692i, pertaining to actions brought by debt collectors against consumers; [and] (3) venue provisions for appeals from automated work zone speed enforcement violations, 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4); and (4) venue provisions for actions relating to failure to stop for a school bus, 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1). See Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 382(1) (pertaining to Acts of Assembly providing for special venue provisions that are not suspended).

For a definition of "transaction or occurrence," see Craig v. W.J. Thiele & Sons, Inc., 149 A.2d 35 (Pa. 1959).

Subdivision G is intended to take care of indistinct, "center line" or other confusing boundaries in the respects mentioned. When a complaint is transferred under subdivision H, it is treated as if originally filed in the transferee court on the date first filed in a court. If service of the complaint has already been made, no new

service may be necessary, but the transferee court must set a new date, time and place for the new hearing and notify the parties thereof. It is the intent of this rule that cases may be transferred to any Pennsylvania court with appropriate jurisdiction and venue, including the Philadelphia Municipal Court. Likewise, nothing in this rule prohibits a court other than a magisterial district court from transferring a case to a magisterial district court with proper jurisdiction and venue, in accordance with the procedural rules of the transferring court. The jurisdictional limits of the magisterial district courts and the Philadelphia Municipal Court are governed by 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 1515 and 1123, respectively.

There are no costs for transfer of the complaint and no additional filing costs when a case is transferred from one magisterial district court to another magisterial district court. There are no additional filing costs when a case is transferred from the Philadelphia Municipal Court to a magisterial district court.

There may be additional service costs when a case is transferred.

Rule 321. Hearings and Evidence.

The magisterial district judge shall be bound by the rules of evidence, except that a bill, estimate, receipt, or statement of account that appears to have been made in the regular course of business may be introduced in evidence by any party without affidavit or other evidence of its truth, accuracy, or authenticity.

(Editor's Note: Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 321 as printed in 246 Pa. Code reads "Official Note" rather than "Comment.")

Comment: The exception to the rules of evidence provided by this rule was inserted because the Pennsylvania statutes making certain business entries admissible in evidence apparently do not apply to bills, receipts, and the like that are made in the regular course of business but are not made as "records." See 42 Pa.C.S. § 6108. The fact that this exception permits the introduction of these items of evidence without affidavit or other evidence of their truth, accuracy, or authenticity does not, of course, preclude the introduction of evidence contradicting them. The exception was deemed necessary because the items of evidence made admissible thereby are probably the proofs most commonly used in minor judiciary proceedings. See [Rule 350D(2)] Rules 350(d)(2) and 351(d) for additional exceptions applicable to appeals from automated work zone speed enforcement violations and actions initiated for failure to stop for a school bus, respectively.

The following rule text is entirely new.

(Editor's Note: The following rule is proposed to be added and printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

SATISFACTION OF MONEY JUDGMENTS

Rule 351. Action to Contest Civil Liability for Passing a School Bus; Failure to Respond to a Notice of Violation.

- (a) As used in this rule:
- (1) "Vehicle owner" means the owner of a vehicle alleged to have violated 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345, relating to enforcement of failure to stop for a school bus, in an action brought pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1.
- (2) "Police department" means the police department issuing the notice of violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345, relating to enforcement of failure to stop for a school bus, in an action brought pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1.

(b) *Venue*. An action filed pursuant to this rule shall only be filed in the magisterial district court in the magisterial district where the alleged violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345 occurred.

- (c) Proceedings.
- (1) Vehicle Owner Request to Contest Liability.
- (i) A vehicle owner may contest the liability alleged in the notice of violation by filing a hearing request form prescribed by the State Court Administrator together with a copy of the notice of violation with the magisterial district court within 30 days of the mailing of the notice.
- (ii) The vehicle owner shall pay all costs for filing and service of the hearing request form at the time of filing or, if without the financial resources to pay the costs of litigation, the vehicle owner shall file a petition to proceed *in forma pauperis* pursuant to Rule 206E.
- (iii) After setting the hearing date pursuant to Rule 305, the magisterial district judge shall serve the hearing request on the police department by mailing a copy to the police department at the address listed on the notice of violation by certified mail or comparable delivery method resulting in a return receipt in paper or electronic form. The return receipt shall show that the notice of appeal was received by the police department.
- (2) Vehicle Owner Fails to Respond to Notice of Violation.
- (i) The police department may file a civil complaint against the vehicle owner pursuant to Rule 303 if the vehicle owner fails to respond to the notice of violation within 30 days of the original notice by either paying the fine as indicated on the notice of violation or contesting liability as provided in subdivision (c)(1). The police department shall pay all costs for filing and service of the complaint at the time of filing.
- (ii) In a complaint filed pursuant to this subdivision, the police department shall aver that the vehicle owner did not timely respond to the notice of violation by paying the civil fine or contesting liability.
- (iii) The sole issue for determination by the magisterial district judge at a hearing on a complaint filed pursuant to subdivision (c)(2) is whether the vehicle owner timely responded to the notice of violation by paying the civil fine or contesting liability.
- (iv) Except as otherwise provided by this rule, an action commenced pursuant to subdivision (c)(2)(i) shall proceed in the same manner as any other civil action.
- (d) Evidence. The hearing is subject to the standards of evidence set forth in Rule 321, except that photographs, videos, vehicle titles, police reports, and records of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation may also be entered as evidence by any party without affidavit or other evidence of their truth, accuracy, or authenticity.

Comment: 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1 provides for automated side stop signal arm enforcement systems to identify and civil fines for the owners of vehicles failing to stop for a school bus. This rule was adopted to address the provisions of the statute that (1) allow a vehicle owner to contest liability for a notice of violation and (2) establishes a mechanism for a police department to file a civil complaint when a vehicle owner has failed to respond timely to a notice of violation.

Insofar as other procedures under these rules may be applicable, the vehicle owner shall be deemed the "defendant" and the police department shall be deemed the "plaintiff."

A vehicle owner issued a notice of violation under 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1 may contest liability by requesting a hearing with the magisterial district judge in the magisterial district where the violation occurred. The initiating document in an action filed by a vehicle owner to contest liability is the hearing request form, which shall be used in lieu of a complaint.

If the vehicle owner fails to respond to the notice of violation within 30 days of the original notice by either paying the fine as indicated on the notice of violation or contesting liability as provided in subdivision (c)(1), the police department may file a civil complaint against the vehicle owner in the magisterial district where the violation occurred. See 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1)(2)(iii). An action brought pursuant to subdivision (c)(2) is limited to the issue of whether the vehicle owner timely responded to the notice of violation by paying the civil fine or contesting liability. A complaint filed by a police department when the vehicle owner failed to respond will proceed as any other civil action filed pursuant to Rule 303 except as otherwise provided in this rule. See also Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 206 (pertaining to costs) and Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 401 et seq. (pertaining to enforcement of judgments).

If the prevailing party has paid the filing and service costs, that party is entitled to recover taxable costs from the unsuccessful party. See Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 206B ("the prevailing party in magisterial district court proceedings shall be entitled to recover taxable costs from the unsuccessful party. Such costs shall consist of all filing, personal service, witness, and execution costs authorized by Act of Assembly or general rule and paid by the prevailing party"). Procedures for enforcement of judgments are set forth in Rules 401 et seq.

Judgments are payable to the prevailing party and not the magisterial district court. See Rule 3.10(A)(2) of the Rules Governing Standards of Conduct of Magisterial District Judges (prohibiting a magisterial district judge from engaging in any activity related to the collection of a claim or judgment for money); see also Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 323, Comment ("The payments are to be made to the plaintiff and not to the magisterial district judge").

Photographs, videos, vehicle titles, police reports, and records of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation were added to the existing business record exceptions in Rule 321 because they are the proofs most likely to be used to support the permitted defenses to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(c).

See Rules 1001 et seq. for procedures to appeal a judgment rendered by a magisterial district judge or to file a praecipe for a writ of certiorari in civil actions, including actions brought pursuant to this rule.

SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA

Minor Court Rules Committee

PUBLICATION REPORT

Proposed Amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 301, 302, and 321 and Proposed Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 351

The Minor Court Rules Committee ("Committee") is considering proposing to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania the amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 301, 302, and 321 and the adoption of Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 351. This proposal would establish procedures for actions initiated pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1), relating to civil violations for failing to stop for a school bus.

Background

Act 38 of 2020 authorizes the use of side stop signal arm enforcement systems to identify and issue civil violations to the owners of vehicles failing to stop for a school bus. A system vendor will provide violation data to the police department with coverage responsibility for the school district or the Pennsylvania State Police. See 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(h). The police department will review the violation evidence from the vendor and authorize the issuance of a notice of violation to the vehicle owner. Id. § 3345(h.2)(1). The notice of violation will instruct the vehicle owner to either return the notice with payment or "request a hearing with the magisterial district judge for the purpose of contesting liability." Id. § 3345.1(i.1)(1)(iv). If the owner does not pay the fine or contest liability within 30 days of the original notice, the police department may "turn the matter over to the magisterial district judge where the violation occurred. The magisterial district judge may assess liability upon the owner for failure to pay the fine or contest liability." Id. § 3345.1(i.1)(2)(iii).

Proposal

First, the Committee proposes amending the Comment to Rule 301 (Definition; Scope) to add a provision that the Rules apply generally to these actions, except as otherwise provided by new Rule 351. Second, the Committee proposes amending the Comment to Rule 302 (Venue) to update the list of actions with special venue provisions. Finally, in the Comment to Rule 321 (Hearings and Evidence), the Committee proposes adding a cross-reference to proposed new Rule 351(c), providing exceptions to the evidentiary requirements in hearings on these new actions. The amendments mirror those recently adopted by the Court to implement procedures for appeals from automated work zone speed enforcement violations. See Order of April 12, 2022, No. 466, Magisterial Rules Docket.

As noted above, the statute provides for two types of proceedings in magisterial district court: (1) a vehicle owner may contest liability for an alleged violation; and (2) a police department may file an action if a vehicle owner fails to respond timely to a notice of violation. In the first instance, the vehicle owner may contest liability for the alleged violation by filing a hearing request with the magisterial district court in the magisterial district were the alleged violation occurred. The hearing request must be accompanied by a copy of the notice of violation and must be filed within 30 days from the mailing of the notice of violation. The vehicle owner must pay all filing and service costs at the time of filing or file a petition to proceed *in forma pauperis* pursuant to Rule 206E. The hearing notice is served on the police department by certified mail or comparable delivery method.

In the latter instance, a police department may file a civil complaint with the magisterial district court when a vehicle owner has failed to respond timely to a notice of violation by paying the fine indicated on the notice or by requesting a hearing to contest liability. The police may file the civil complaint no earlier than 30 days from the date of the original notice. Except as otherwise provided by proposed Rule 351, a complaint filed pursuant to subdivision (c)(2)(1) will proceed in the same manner as any other civil complaint. It should be noted that 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1)(2)(iii) provides:

If payment is not received or the owner has not contested liability within 30 days of the original notice, the police department may turn the matter

over to the Magisterial District Judge where the violation occurred. The Magisterial District Judge may assess liability upon the owner for failure to pay the fine or contest liability.

Id. In these actions, the only issue for the magisterial district judge to determine is if the vehicle owner timely responded to the notice of violation by paying the civil fine or contesting liability. The underlying violation for passing a school bus is not the subject of a hearing on a complaint brought pursuant to subdivision (c)(2)(i) and the defenses in 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(f) are not applicable.

This scheme is similar to that established in zoning enforcement proceedings brought pursuant to the Municipalities Planning Code ("MPC"), 53 P.S. §§ 10101 et seq. Under the MPC, once an alleged violator has been given notice of a zoning violation pursuant to 53 P.S. § 10616.1, the alleged violator can seek an appeal with the municipality's zoning hearing board and cannot defend the underlying charges before the magisterial district judge after failing to appeal. See e.g., City of Erie v. Freitus, 681 A.2d 840, 842 (Pa. Cmwlth., 1996). In these cases, the vehicle owner's opportunity to challenge the underlying violation is by contesting the liability alleged in the notice of violation and requesting a hearing with the magisterial district judge as provided in subdivision (c)(1)(i).

The Committee observes the statute does not address the scenario when the vehicle owner initially pays the violation but later decides to request a hearing within 30 days of the mailing of the notice of violation. Accordingly, the Committee did not develop a provision to accommodate this likely rare occurrence.

In both proceedings under subdivision (c), if the prevailing party has paid the filing and service costs, that party is entitled to recover taxable costs from the unsuccessful party. While it may be unusual for a police department to be a party in a civil matter in magisterial district court, the statute has prescribed these violations for passing a school bus as civil actions, not criminal. There are no provisions in the legislation exempting the parties from filing fee requirements pursuant to 42 Pa.C.S. § 1725.1(a) or from the awarding of costs to a prevailing party pursuant to 42 Pa.C.S. § 1726. See also Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 206B. Procedures for a prevailing litigant to enforce a judgment are set forth at Rules 401 et seq.

Because these are civil actions, the unsuccessful party must pay the judgment amount directly to the prevailing party. See Rule 3.10(A)(2) of the Rules Governing Standards of Conduct of Magisterial District Judges (prohibiting a magisterial district judge from engaging in any activity related to the collection of a claim or judgment for money); see also Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 323, Comment ("The payments are to be made to the plaintiff and not to the magisterial district judge").

The courts of common pleas have jurisdiction of appeals from the magisterial district courts. "Except as otherwise prescribed by any general rule adopted pursuant to section 503 (relating to reassignment of matters), each court of common pleas shall have exclusive jurisdiction of appeals from final orders of the minor judiciary established within the judicial district." See 42 Pa.C.S. § 932. An appeal from a judgment rendered by a magisterial district court should be made to the court of common pleas for the judicial district. See Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 1001 et seq.

The Committee invites all comments, concerns, and suggestions regarding this proposal.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY [49 PA. CODE CH. 27]

Administration of Injectable Medications, Biologicals and Immunizations

The State Board of Pharmacy (Board) amends §§ 27.12, 27.401—27.407 and adds § 27.408 (relating to professional liability insurance) to read as set forth in Annex A. $\it Effective\ Date$

This final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 4(j) of the Pharmacy Act (act) (63 P.S. § 390-4(j)), authorizes the Board "to promulgate rules and regulations governing standards of practice and operation of pharmacies including, but not limited to, rules and regulations governing the method of advertising, promotion and standards for dispensing prescriptions, such regulations to be designed to insure methods of operation and conduct which protect the public health, safety and welfare and prevent practices or operations which may tend to lower professional standards of conduct, so as to endanger the public health and welfare." Section 6(k)(1) and (9) of the act (63 P.S. §§ 390-6(k)(1) and (9)), also authorizes the Board "to regulate the practice of pharmacy" and "to promulgate rules and regulations to effectuate the purposes of this act and to regulate the distribution of drugs and devices and the practice of pharmacy for the protection and promotion of the public health, safety and welfare." Section 9.2(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 390-9.2(a)), states that the Board "shall by regulation establish education and training standards and practice guidelines to which pharmacists shall be authorized to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations...

Background and Need for the Amendment

Section 9.2 of the act permits the Board to regulate a pharmacist's ability to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. This final-form rulemaking amends Chapter 27 (relating to State Board of Pharmacy) to conform to amendments made by the act of June 26, 2015 (P.L. 29, No. 8) (Act 8 of 2015). Act 8 of 2015 amended section 9.2 of the act to allow a pharmacist to administer influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery methods to children 9 years of age or older. Additionally, section 9.2 now allows a qualified and authorized pharmacy intern to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to persons 18 years of age or older and administer influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery methods to children ages 9 years of age or older. Section 9.2 also requires pharmacists authorized to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to maintain professional liability insurance a minimum of \$1 million per occurrence or claims made.

Summary and Responses to Comments and Description of Amendments to the Final-Form Regulation

Notice of the proposed rulemaking was published at 50 Pa.B. 5844 (October 24, 2020). Publication was followed

by a 30-day public comment period during which the Board received comments from the Pennsylvania Medical Society (PAMED), the National Association of Chain Drug Stores (NACDS)/Pennsylvania Association of Chain Drug Stores (PACDS), the Pennsylvania Society of Physician Assistants, the Pennsylvania Pharmacists Association and the Pennsylvania Osteopathic Medical Association (POMA). The Board also received comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) as part of its review under the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. §§ 745.1—745.14). The Board received no comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) or the Senate Consumer Protection and Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC).

Comments from the PAMED

PAMED and IRRC commented regarding the notification requirement to the primary care provider. Both PAMED and IRRC question how the identity of the primary care provider is to become known to the pharmacist. While neither the act nor the regulations indicate how the identity of the primary care provider is to be discerned, it is usually accomplished by the pharmacist requesting the information from the patient. Pharmacists are only authorized to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations by either order or under a written protocol. If the pharmacist is administering under an order, the order must have the minimum information that is required under § 27.404(b) (relating to authority and requirements). One of the requirements is that the name of the prescriber needs to be listed. Under § 27.406(a)(1) (relating to notification requirements), the ordering prescriber must be notified, and if known, the primary care provider. If the pharmacist is administering under a written protocol, the written protocol must have the record keeping requirements and procedures for notification of administration, which may include notification requirements to primary care providers. See § 27.404(c). While pharmacists will know the ordering prescriber or the participating/protocol provider, the Board is aware that not every patient will have or identify a primary care provider.

In reviewing the concerns raised by PAMED and IRRC, the Board has determined that additional clarification is needed. In this final-form rulemaking, the Board amends the notification requirements to clarify that pharmacists and pharmacy interns administering injectable medications, biologicals or immunizations must request primary care provider information. To implement this requirement, the Board adds § 27.406(b), which requires a pharmacist or pharmacy intern to request and document the name and address of the patient's primary care provider. The Board does not see a need to specify how this request occurs; it could occur verbally, on an intake form or in another manner. The Board acknowledges that not all patients have primary care providers or will provide information; however, this provision clarifies the obligation to ask for the primary care provider information and to document it for recordkeeping purposes. Adding this provision helps ensure that pharmacists have available primary care provider information for notification purposes. This requirement is consistent with the Board's current record keeping requirements at § 27.405(a)(4) (relating to recordkeeping), which requires a pharmacist to maintain the name and address of the patient's primary health care provider if that information is identified by the patient. Moreover, this final-form

amendment facilitates and ensures appropriate communication between pharmacists and primary care providers regarding the administration of injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations, which as PAMED noted, is crucial to assisting in the management of possible adverse reactions and ensuring continuity of care.

Second, PAMED and IRRC requested clarification as to the role of the supervising pharmacist regarding notification requirements. Specifically, PAMED asked three questions:

- What is the supervising pharmacist's role regarding notification requirements when a pharmacy intern has been involved in an administration of an injectable medication, biological or immunization?
- Should the supervising pharmacist be the only party to fulfill notification requirements to the primary care provider and other specified individuals?
- If the pharmacy intern may fulfill notification requirements, what is the supervising pharmacist's role in ensuring proper notification occurs?

Under the act and the regulations, the supervising pharmacist has the ultimate responsibility to ensure that the administration of the injectable is being done correctly, which includes the record keeping and notification requirements. See sections 9.2(a)(7) and (b) of the act and § 27.403 (relating to conditions for administration). The pharmacy intern, however, is authorized under the regulations in § 27.406 to notify the ordering prescriber, the participating/protocol physician and the primary care provider, if known. Section 27.406(a)(3) allows for either the supervising pharmacist or the pharmacy intern to make the proper notification. As to which one makes the notification, that should be decided between the supervising pharmacist and the pharmacy intern. Notably, however, the supervising pharmacist has the duty to ensure that the notification is done correctly.

Comments from the NACDS/PACDS

NACDS/PACDS supported the proposed rulemaking and noted the importance of this final-form rulemaking given the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The comment indicates that pharmacy interns would be an untapped source of vaccinators that could help assist with administering the flu vaccine and the COVID-19 vaccine. Since the publication of the proposed rulemaking, pharmacy interns have been authorized to administer vaccines. The act gave the pharmacy interns the authority to administer injectables. Originally, the Board was waiting to have the regulations in place to start issuing authorizations, however, due to the COVID-19 pandemic and noting that the statutory authority to issue the authorizations to pharmacy interns existed, the Board decided to issue the authorizations before the regulations were finalized. Therefore, since the Board has been issuing authorizations, NACDS/PACDS concern relating to losing students is no longer an issue. NACDS/PACDS also mentions amendments to the Federal Public Readiness and Emergency Preparedness (PREP) Act. The amendments to the PREP Act are in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and are outside the scope of this final-form rulemaking. Pharmacy interns have been administering vaccines, including the COVID-19 vaccine since it became available to administer. Also, the Board is not accepting pharmacy intern certificates as a substitute for an authorization to administer because the pharmacy intern certificate does not ensure that the pharmacy intern meets the Board's qualifications to administer injectables.

Comments from POMA

POMA applauds the Board for the strengthening clarification to include notification to the patient's primary care provider and for shortening the timeframe for the notification and supports the Board's efforts in this regard. POMA also notes that the notification is not always occurring and that some osteopathic physicians have expressed frustration when they do not have the knowledge that their patients have been vaccinated at a pharmacy. To address this concern, as explained in response to PAMED's comment, the Board amends the notification requirements to clarify that pharmacists and pharmacy interns administering injectable medications, biologicals or immunizations must request primary care provider information. This amendment ensures that pharmacists request primary care provider information. The Board understands that having the information is only the first step in the notification process. The existing and final-form regulations contain the notification requirements; however, enforcement of the notification requirements is currently handled by and will continue to be handled by the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation and the Department of State Prosecution Division through the complaint process. If a physician or other individual knows of a pharmacist who has not or is not properly communicating with or notifying physicians, a complaint should be filed with the Bureau's Professional Compliance Office. Pharmacists who fail to notify, under the requirements of the regulations, of the administration of the injectable, or the supervising pharmacist in the case of a pharmacy intern performing the administration, could be subject to disciplinary action under the act and the regulations.

Supportive Comments

Comments from the Pennsylvania Society of Physician Assistants

The Pennsylvania Society of Physician Assistants is in favor of this final-form rulemaking and noted that the supervision of the pharmacy intern adds a layer of safety in the administration of injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. The commentor also stated that the regulations add clarity to the notification process in the event of an adverse reaction.

Comments from the Pennsylvania Pharmacists Association

The Pennsylvania Pharmacists Association submitted a comment to IRRC and stated that it "wholeheartedly supports and agrees with these proposed regulations and urges for their finalization."

Comments from IRRC

IRRC had four comments regarding this final-form rulemaking. First, IRRC questioned whether the proposed regulations in § 27.402(b)(2) (relating to application and renewal procedures) were adequate to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of this Commonwealth. IRRC expressed concern that pharmacy interns may be administering injectables without current training or education on the topic and also asked how the Board would ensure that pharmacy interns are current with cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) certification. Under section 9.2(b) of the act, a pharmacy intern who has completed the required course of education and training may administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to persons who are more than 18 years of age and influenza immunizations by injectable or needlefree delivery methods to persons 9 years of age and older only under the direct, immediate and personal supervision of a pharmacist holding the authority to administer

injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. As a part of the education and training for pharmacy interns, section 9.2(b) of the act requires completion of an academic and practical curriculum and maintenance of a current CPR certificate; it does not require supplemental training and education or completion of continuing education. Thus, the General Assembly determined that the initial training and education and maintenance of CPR is sufficient to ensure public safety. In addition to obtaining the initial education and training, which includes the CPR certificate, the Board notes that pharmacy interns are under the direct supervision of a supervising pharmacist, who must maintain a current authorization to administer injectables. The supervising pharmacist is responsible for ensuring that the pharmacy intern is aware of any changes to the practice of pharmacy which includes administering injectables. To make it clear that a current CPR certification is necessary, the Board adds § 27.402(b)(3) to clearly state that a pharmacist and a pharmacy intern must maintain current CPR certification when administering injectables.

Second, IRRC recommended amending § 27.403(e) to accurately reflect the language in the act. The Board agrees with this suggestion and amends the section to reflect the act.

Third, IRRC commented regarding the notification requirements under § 27.406 and asked for clarification regarding notification requirements for pharmacists when an injectable was administered by an intern under their supervision. The Board addressed these questions in its response to PAMED's questions. IRRC also asked for a definition of a "participating/protocol physician" or a reference to the Board's regulation that addresses protocol agreements between physicians and pharmacists. In response, the Board adds a definition for a "participating/ protocol physician" in this final-form rulemaking in § 27.406(c). A "participating/protocol physician" is the physician or institution that has entered into a written protocol with a pharmacist under § 27.404(c)(1). The definition references § 27.404(c), which relates to written protocols for administering injectables.

Fourth, IRRC requested clarity on § 27.408 concerning professional liability insurance. Specifically, IRRC asked if the insurance covers negligent supervision by a pharmacist that is supervising a pharmacist intern that has the authorization to inject. IRRC also asked whether there is any insurance coverage if the pharmacist's supervision is proper, but the pharmacy intern is negligent in administering the injection. Professional liability insurance requirements set forth in § 27.408 provide protection to patients. The supervising pharmacist is responsible for the pharmacy intern's overall actions in the pharmacy. Significantly, a pharmacist cannot delegate the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations, but rather, may only allow a pharmacy intern to administer the injectables under direct, immediate and personal supervision. See section 3(f) of the act (63 P.S. § 390-3(f)) and section 9.2(b) of the act and § 27.12 (relating to practice of pharmacy and delegation of duties). If a supervising pharmacist fails to properly supervise a pharmacy intern where the pharmacy intern has committed some type of negligence, the Board would view the pharmacist as being incompetent, grossly negligent, or departing from, or failing to conform to, the standards of acceptable and prevailing pharmacy practice. See section 5(a)(12) of the act (63 P.S. § 390-5(a)(12)). This degree of supervision provides for accountability. Additionally, most pharmacies and health care institutions have liability insurance that covers the actions of its employees. Pharmacy interns who are employees of the pharmacy or institution would be covered under this type of policy. Thus, the professional liability insurance and supervision requirements protect the public regardless of whether a pharmacist or pharmacy intern administer the injection.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This final-form rulemaking will have minimal fiscal impact on the Commonwealth and no fiscal impact on its political subdivisions. This final-form rulemaking will impose additional paperwork requirements upon the Board in the form of creating and processing applications for pharmacy interns; however, costs for processing applications would not adversely impact the Board because costs associated with processing applications are borne by the licensees through application fees. To implement Act 8 of 2015 and the proposed regulations, the Board created new forms and revised some existing forms, which had minimal fiscal impact to the Board.

This final-form rulemaking will have some financial impact in the form of fees and education for pharmacy interns who elect to apply for the authorization to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. The Board has no way of knowing how many pharmacy interns will apply for authorization to administer injectables but using the same percentage of pharmacists that applied for the authorization to administer injectables (44%), the total costs incurred for applications in Fiscal Year 2020-2021 would be approximately \$65,160. Since most pharmacy schools have incorporated the required education into the curriculum, most pharmacy interns should not incur additional costs in education. Even assuming all applying pharmacy interns would either be required to take the initial education or would be required to repeat the training, the cost of education for the 44% of pharmacy interns would be \$868,800. For subsequent years, the Board estimates an average annual cost to new pharmacy interns of \$36,000 (the cost associated with the fee).

For pharmacists, because Act 8 of 2015 expanded the ability of pharmacists to perform immunizations to minors, pharmacists engaging in this activity already have the required training and equipment and no additional costs will be incurred by pharmacists. The Board estimates the total cost per pharmacist to be as follows: \$400 for the approved Pharmacy-Based Immunization Delivery course, an application fee of \$30 and the cost to obtain professional liability insurance in the amount of \$1 million (\$415). The only new cost associated with Act of 2015 and this final-form regulation is the cost of professional liability insurance. Assuming the Board continues to receive 1,100 new applications from pharmacists seeking the authority to administer injectables each year, the fiscal impact to pharmacists would be \$456,500 annually.

This final-form rulemaking will impose additional paperwork requirements for licensees, including submission of forms to the Board (applications for authority to administer injectables and reactivation forms), recordkeeping (documentation of the pharmacy intern and supervising pharmacist for each administration), parental consent documentation, notification requirements to primary care providers and professional liability insurance coverage record disclosure requirements.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on October 8, 2020, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 50 Pa.B. 5844, to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the SCP/PLC and the HPLC for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board shall submit to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing this final-form rulemaking, the Board has considered all comments from IRRC and the public. The Board received no comments from the HPLC or the SCP/PLC.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on May 18, 2022, this final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on May 19, 2022, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 2540), (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202), referred to as the Commonwealth Documents Law and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2 (relating to notice of proposed rulemaking required; and adoption of regulations).
- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered in drafting this final-form regulation.
- (3) This final-form regulation does not include any amendments that would change the scope of the proposed rulemaking published at 50 Pa.B. 5844.
- (4) This final-form rulemaking adopted by this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration of the act.

Order

The Board therefore orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Board at 49 Pa. Code Chapter 27, are amended by amending §§ 27.12, 27.401—27.407, and adding § 27.408 to read as set forth in Annex A with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.
- (b) The Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for approval as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to the IRRC, the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee and the House Professional Licensure Committee for approval as required by law.
- (d) The Board shall certify this final-form rulemaking and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (e) This final-form rulemaking shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Annex A

TITLE 49. PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

PART I. DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Subpart A. PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

CHAPTER 27. STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY STANDARDS

§ 27.12. Practice of pharmacy and delegation of duties.

* * * * :

- (c) Pharmacy interns.
- (1) A pharmacy intern may work only under the direct, immediate, personal supervision of a pharmacist in accordance with subsection (b)(2).
- (2) A pharmacy intern may neither enter nor be in a pharmacy if a pharmacist is not on duty.
- (3) A pharmacy intern working under the direct, immediate, personal supervision of a pharmacist may perform procedures which require professional skill and training. Examples of these procedures include: verifying ingredients, weighing ingredients, compounding ingredients and other similar processing of ingredients.
- (4) A pharmacy intern working under the direct, immediate and personal supervision of a pharmacist may administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations if the pharmacist and the pharmacy intern each hold an active authorization to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations issued by the Board, in accordance with §§ 27.401—27.408.
 - (d) Pharmacy technicians.
- (1) A pharmacy technician may work only under the direct, immediate, personal supervision of a pharmacist in accordance with subsection (b)(2).

ADMINISTRATION OF INJECTABLE MEDICATIONS, BIOLOGICALS AND IMMUNIZATIONS

§ 27.401. Qualifications for authority.

A pharmacist or pharmacy intern may apply to the Board for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. A candidate for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall meet the following requirements:

- (1) The pharmacist holds an active license to practice pharmacy or the pharmacy intern holds an active intern registration in this Commonwealth.
- (2) The pharmacist or pharmacy intern has completed a course of education and training which meets the requirements of § 27.407 (relating to education requirements).
- (3) The pharmacist or pharmacy intern holds a current basic cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) certificate issued by the American Heart Association, American Red Cross or a similar health authority or professional body approved by the Board.

§ 27.402. Application, renewal and reactivation procedures.

- (a) *Application*. An applicant for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall submit the following to the Board:
- (1) An application obtained from the Board along with the fee required by § 27.91 (relating to schedule of fees).
- (2) Certification that the applicant has completed the required education and training in § 27.407 (relating to education requirements).
- (3) Certification that the applicant holds an acceptable, current CPR certificate.
 - (b) Renewal.
- (1) A pharmacist who is the holder of the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall renew the authority every 2 years along with the pharmacist's license to practice pharmacy. Renewal requires completion of a form provided to the pharmacist by the Board in advance of the renewal period, payment of the fee specified by § 27.91, certification of completion of 2 hours of continuing education required by section 9.2 of the act (63 P.S. § 390-9.2) and § 27.32 (relating to continuing education), and proof of a current CPR certificate.
- (2) A pharmacy intern's authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations is valid so long as the intern remains registered under § 27.26 (relating to pharmacy internship) and may not be renewed.
- (3) A pharmacist and a pharmacy intern must maintain a current CPR certificate at all times when administering injectable medications, biologicals or immunizations.
- (c) Lapse. A pharmacist who intends to allow the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to lapse shall notify the Board on the pharmacist's biennial license renewal form.
 - (d) Reactivation.
- (1) A pharmacist who has had a lapsed authority for less than 2 years and seeks reactivation of the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall complete a form provided to the pharmacist by the Board, pay the renewal fee specified by § 27.91, complete 2 hours of continuing education required by section 9.2 of the act and § 27.32 and provide proof of a current CPR certificate.
- (2) A pharmacist who has had a lapsed authority for 2 years or more and seeks reactivation of the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall complete a form provided to the pharmacist by the Board, retake and successfully complete the required education set forth in § 27.407, pay the renewal fee specified by § 27.91 and provide proof of a current CPR certificate.

§ 27.403. Conditions for administration.

- (a) A pharmacist or pharmacy intern who is granted authority may administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to persons who are more than 18 years of age. A person is more than 18 years of age on the day following the person's 18th birthday.
- (b) A pharmacist or pharmacy intern who is granted authority may administer influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery methods to persons 9 years of age or older.

- (c) A pharmacist may not delegate the administration of injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to another person.
- (d) A pharmacy intern who has been authorized by the Board to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to persons who are more than 18 years of age and influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery methods to persons 9 years of age or older under § 27.401 (relating to qualifications for authority) may do so only under the direct, immediate and personal supervision of a pharmacist who holds an active authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations.
- (e) A pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall administer injectable immunizations in accordance with treatment guidelines established by a physician and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices Guidelines or another competent authority approved by the Board.

§ 27.404. Authority and requirements.

(a) A pharmacist or pharmacy intern authorized by the Board to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations may only do so under either an order or written protocol.

* * * * *

§ 27.405. Recordkeeping.

- (a) A pharmacist who administers an injectable medication, biological or immunization or who supervises the administration by a pharmacy intern shall maintain the following records regarding each administration for a minimum of 2 years:
 - (1) The name, address and date of birth of the patient.
- (2) The date of the administration and site of the injection.
- (3) The name, dose, manufacturer, lot number and expiration date of the medication, biological or immunization.
- (4) The name and address of the patient's primary health care provider, as identified by the patient.
- (5) The name or identifiable initials of the administering pharmacist. If the administration was performed by a pharmacy intern, the name or identifiable initials of the pharmacy intern and the supervising pharmacist.
- (6) Documentation of informed consent for administration of injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations, and in the case of influenza immunizations administered to patients under 18 years of age, documentation of written parental consent.
- (7) The nature of an adverse reaction and who was notified.
- (b) A pharmacist who administers an immunization or supervises the administration by a pharmacy intern shall also maintain the following records regarding each administration for a minimum of 2 years:
- (1) An identification of the Vaccine Information Statement (VIS) that was provided.
 - (2) The date of publication of the VIS.
- (3) The date and to whom the VIS was provided.
- (c) In an institution, the information required to be maintained in subsections (a) and (b) may be maintained in the patients' medical records.

§ 27.406. Notification requirements.

- (a) A pharmacist or pharmacy intern administering injectable medications, biologicals or immunizations shall meet the following notification requirements:
- (1) When administration has occurred under an order, the pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall notify the ordering prescriber and the patient's primary care provider, if known, as soon as practicable, but no longer than 48 hours after administration of the following:
 - (i) The identity of the patient.
- (ii) The identity of the medication, biological or immunization administered.
 - (iii) The route of administration.
 - (iv) The site of the administration.
 - (v) The dose administered.
 - (vi) The date of administration.
- (2) When the administration has occurred under a written protocol, the pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall notify the patient's primary care provider, if known, and the participating/protocol physician, as soon as practicable, but no longer than 48 hours after administration of the following:
 - (i) The identity of the patient.
- (ii) The identity of the medication, biological or immunization administered.
 - (iii) The site of the administration.
 - (iv) The dose administered.
 - (v) The date of administration.
- (3) In the event of any adverse event or reaction experienced by the patient either under an order or a written protocol, the pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall notify the ordering prescriber, the patient's primary care provider, if known, and the participating/protocol physician, if applicable, as soon as practicable, but no longer than 24 hours after learning of the adverse event or reaction.
- (b) A pharmacist or pharmacy intern administering injectable medications, biologicals or immunizations shall request and document, if identified by the patient, the name and address of the patient's primary care provider.
- (c) For purposes of this section, the term "participating/protocol physician" means the physician or institution that has entered into a written protocol with an authorized pharmacist, which governs the administration of injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations for a specific period of time or purpose as specified in § 27.404(c) (relating to authority and requirements).

§ 27.407. Education requirements.

(a) To apply for the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations, a pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall meet the following education requirements:

- (1) Complete within the 3-year period prior to application an evidence-based course that meets the following criteria:
 - (i) Includes study material.
- (ii) Includes hands-on training and techniques for administration.
 - (iii) Requires testing with a passing score.
- (iv) Provides a minimum of 10 hours of instruction and experiential training.
- (v) Complies with current guidelines and recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, ACPE or a similar health authority or professional body.
- (2) The course must provide instruction on the following topics:
- ${\rm (i)}$ Basic immunology and the human immune response.
- (ii) Mechanics of immunity, adverse effects, dose and administration schedule of available vaccines.
- (iii) Response to an emergency situation as a result of the administration of an injectable medication, biological or immunization.
- (iv) Administration of subcutaneous, intradermal and intramuscular injections.
 - (v) Disease epidemiology.
 - (vi) Standards for immunization practices.
 - (vii) Vaccine-preventable diseases.
 - (viii) Recommended immunization schedules.
 - (ix) Vaccine storage and management.
 - (x) Biohazard waste disposal and sterile techniques.
 - (xi) Informed consent.
- (b) The Board approves courses offered by ACPE-accredited providers and educational institutions that meet the criteria and provide instruction on the topics listed in subsection (a).

§ 27.408. Professional liability insurance.

- (a) To qualify for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations, a pharmacist must certify the maintenance of professional liability insurance coverage in the minimum amount of \$1 million per occurrence or claims made.
- (b) A pharmacist who does not maintain the required professional liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$1 million may not engage in the practice of administering injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations and may not supervise the administration by a pharmacy intern.
- (c) A pharmacist shall, upon request, make available to the Board or its agents all records relating to the pharmacist's maintenance of professional liability insurance, including policies, cancelled checks, receipts or other proofs of premium payment.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

[55 PA. CODE CH. 5230]
Psychiatric Rehabilitation Services

Statutory Authority

Notice is hereby given that the Department of Human Services (Department), under the authority of sections 911 and 1021 and Articles IX and X of the Human Services Code (62 P.S. §§ 911, 1021, 901—922 and 1001—1088), proposes to amend Chapter 5230 (relating to psychiatric rehabilitation services) as set forth in Annex A.

Purpose of Rulemaking

The purpose of this proposed rulemaking is to amend Chapter 5230 to allow individuals who are 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age who meet the admission requirements to access psychiatric rehabilitation services (PRS) and to amend the diagnoses that allow an individual to access PRS without use of the exception process. Through the exception process, individuals without one of the specified diagnoses for admission to PRS can still receive PRS if they have a serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance with a diagnosis of a mental, behavioral or emotional disorder that results in a moderate to severe functional impairment. In addition, the amendment clarifies the documentation that will be reviewed through the exception process to determine if an individual is eligible for PRS. It also revises outdated language and adds definitions of "serious mental illness" and "serious emotional disturbance" that align with the definitions currently used by the Federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. This proposed rulemaking supports the principles of recovery, resiliency and self-determination by permitting additional individuals who are experiencing a serious mental illness or a serious emotional disturbance to receive PRS.

Background

In 2013, the Department promulgated a regulation that provided for the minimum standards for the issuance of licenses for PRS facilities. PRS is an evidence-based service that uses an integrated therapeutic approach to assist individuals with serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance to develop the skills needed to live, learn, socialize, and work in their community and improve or maintain their physical and mental health. PRS promotes recovery and resiliency, full community integration and improved quality of life for individuals who have been diagnosed with a serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance that results in a moderate to severe functional impairment that interferes with or limits the individual's performance in one or more of the following domains: living, learning, working, socializing or wellness. Additionally, PRS may decrease the need for or shorten the length of stay in inpatient, partial hospitalization or outpatient treatment. PRS helps individuals reach age-appropriate functioning that has either been lost or never achieved because development was interrupted by a serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance. This proposed rulemaking will result in more individuals being eligible for PRS because it allows youth

14 years of age or older to receive PRS. It will also allow individuals to access PRS through telehealth by removing barriers to providing PRS through telehealth. In addition, it identifies additional diagnoses that will enable individuals to receive PRS without requiring use of the exception process for receiving PRS.

The regulation as promulgated in 2013 limited PRS to individuals 18 years of age or older. Stakeholders have expressed that there is a need for additional supports for individuals 14 years of age or older that will engage them and will help them transition to the adult service system. Research has shown that the transition from adolescence to adulthood is especially challenging for youth diagnosed with a serious mental illness or a serious emotional disturbance. Many traditional adult mental health services do not focus on skill development to improve the individual's ability to be successful in the community, but rather focus on alleviating symptoms and psychological distress. Access to PRS, which focuses on helping individuals develop skills needed to be successful in the living, learning, working, social and wellness environments, will assist youth in transitioning to adulthood and maintaining independence in the community.

Requirements

The following is a summary of the specific provisions in this proposed rulemaking.

General Provisions

Definitions (§ 5230.3)

This proposed rulemaking adds definitions of the following terms: "Associate's degree" and "Bachelor's degree" to ensure that staff providing PRS have obtained degrees from properly accredited educational institutions; "Child and family resiliency practitioner (CFRP)" to identify the certification required for staff who provide PRS to individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age; and "Serious emotional disturbance" and "Serious mental illness" to define the conditions required for use of the exception process for admission to PRS and to align the definitions used in Chapter 5230 with the definitions currently used by the Federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration.

In addition, this proposed rulemaking deletes the definition of "Axis I" to be consistent with the current version of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Psychiatric Disorders (DSM). Prior versions of the DSM used a multiaxial documentation process for diagnosis. The current version of the DSM uses monoaxial documentation for diagnosis by combining the first three axes into one axis that includes all mental or other medical diagnoses to remove artificial distinctions among conditions. The definitions of "DSM-IV-TR" and "ICD-9" are also being deleted and replaced with definitions of "DSM" and "ICD" respectively to delete the reference to outdated versions of the DSM and the International Classification of Diseases (ICD) and to allow for the use of successor versions of the DSM and ICD.

This proposed rulemaking also deletes the definition of "Face-to-face" because the term is no longer used in the regulation and deletes outdated names of organizations. "International Center for Clubhouse Development (ICCD)" and "The United States Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association (USPRA)" are replaced with "Clubhouse International" and "The Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association" respectively. It also clarifies the definition of

"Full-time equivalent" by deleting references to "calendar." This proposed rulemaking amends the term "Coordination of care" to "Coordination of services" at the request of stakeholders to reduce the perceived stigma associated with individuals receiving PRS. It amends the definition of "Functional impairment" to be more specific to the admission requirements for PRS. It also adds a definition of "Wellness" to the regulation due to adding wellness as a domain at the request of the members of the workgroup that reviewed and provided input on this proposed rulemaking.

Finally, this proposed rulemaking amends the definition of "Individual" to clarify that individuals 14 years of age or older may receive PRS. In addition, it deletes the term "individual" from the definition of "Licensed practitioner of the healing arts (LPHA)" to clarify the definition. It revises the definition of LPHA to include licensed clinical social workers, licensed professional counselors and licensed marriage and family therapists because the Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors Act (63 P.S. §§ 1901—1922) has been amended to allow licensed clinical social workers, licensed professional counselors and licensed marriage and family therapists to diagnose and treat mental and emotional disorders as part of the scope of their practice.

Psychiatric rehabilitation processes and practices (§ 5230.4)

This proposed rulemaking adds wellness to the list of domains in which PRS agencies must assist an individual to develop or maintain skills. This domain addition will make PRS more comprehensive and consistent with current recovery-oriented practices.

This proposed rulemaking also adds the individual's home as a location where PRS can be delivered to clarify that PRS can be delivered in an individual's place of residence.

General Requirements

Agency records (§ 5230.13)

This proposed rulemaking adds the requirement that a PRS agency maintain records that contain copies of the criminal history background checks from both the Pennsylvania State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and child abuse certifications required under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6388 (relating to Child Protective Services Law) for staff working in PRS programs serving individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age and a requirement that human resources policies and procedures be consistent with a PRS agency's service description and address child abuse certification requirements.

Agency service description (§ 5230.15)

This proposed rulemaking adds a requirement that PRS agencies include in their service descriptions outreach and engagement strategies and how they will engage and involve family members when the individual consents to the involvement because family involvement is an important component of services for individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age. It also adds the following requirements: a requirement that PRS agencies deliver PRS consistent with the approved service description, a requirement that PRS agencies include in the service description the age groupings and age range of the individuals the agency serves and an explanation of how the agency will maintain the separation of age groups. The Department is adding these requirements to ensure the health, safety and welfare of individuals receiving

PRS. The Department also updated the name of the organization that is responsible for accreditation if the PRS facility is identified as a clubhouse and clarified that PRS agencies that are identified as a clubhouse must maintain clubhouse accreditation. Finally, an individual's home was added as a location that could be designated in the PRS agency's service description to clarify that PRS may be provided in an individual's home as well as in the PRS facility or the community.

Coordination of services (§ 5230.16)

This proposed rulemaking amends the term "Coordination of care" to "Coordination of services" to reduce the perceived stigma associated with receiving PRS. Additionally, this proposed rulemaking amends the outdated language of "drug and alcohol programs" to "substance use disorder programs."

This proposed rulemaking adds peer support services agencies to the list of providers with which PRS agencies must have an agreement to coordinate services because individuals who receive PRS may also receive peer support services. This proposed rulemaking also adds agencies and systems that serve individuals 14 years of age or older to the list of providers with which PRS agencies may have agreements to coordinate services to ensure all appropriate services that affect the youth population are included.

Individual Record

Content of individual record (§ 5230.21)

This proposed rulemaking provides for parental or caregiver consent to receive PRS if the individual is under 18 years of age and allows for the release of records with the individual's consent or parent's or caregiver's consent if the individual is under 18 years of age to family members and other supports, as appropriate, because their input is important when individuals under 18 years of age receive PRS. It also adds a requirement that staff documentation of coordination with other services and supports includes a description of outreach and engagement efforts with natural supports, which are individuals or organizations chosen by the individual to provide assistance and resources, and a description of ongoing contacts and involvement with formal supports.

Documentation standards and record security, retention and disposal (§ 5230.22)

This proposed rulemaking amends the word "is" to "shall be" to require that individual records are kept in a permanent, secure location.

Admission, Continued Stay and Discharge Requirements Admission requirements (§ 5230.31)

This proposed rulemaking revises the admission requirements for PRS. Individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age with serious emotional disturbance or serious mental illness will now be eligible for admission to PRS. This proposed rulemaking also updates the names of diagnoses that have been changed as a result of revisions to the DSM and expands the diagnoses for which an individual may receive PRS without going through the exception process for receiving PRS. The new diagnoses an individual may have that do not require review through the exception process include post-traumatic stress disorder, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, major depressive disorder, bipolar disorder and anxiety disorders.

Additionally, this proposed rulemaking clarifies that for an individual to be eligible for PRS without having to go through the exception process, the LPHA's written recommendation for PRS must include documentation of one of the specified diagnoses that is required to be eligible for PRS and documentation of a moderate to severe functional impairment that interferes with or limits the individual's performance in one or more of the following domains: living, learning, working, socializing or wellness.

This proposed rulemaking also revises the exception process. If an individual does not have one of the specified diagnoses, the individual can still receive PRS if the LPHA's written recommendation for PRS includes documentation of serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance with a diagnosis of a mental, behavioral or emotional disorder that is listed in the current DSM or ICD and a description of the resulting moderate to severe functional impairment in at least one of the following domains: living, learning, working, socializing or wellness. The LPHA's written recommendation for PRS must also include documentation of the anticipated benefit that PRS will provide for the individual. Serious emotional disturbance has been added to the admission requirements because individuals under 18 years of age will be eligible for PRS.

This proposed rulemaking also clarifies that the PRS agency must complete an initial functional impairment screening to confirm the individual's moderate to severe functional impairment in at least one domain identified in the LPHA's written recommendation. Finally, this proposed rulemaking adds wellness as one of the domains in which an individual can have a moderate to severe functional impairment resulting from serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance and receive PRS.

Continued stay requirements (§ 5230.32)

Because individuals who are under 18 years of age will now be eligible to receive PRS, the Department proposes to amend the continued stay requirements for PRS to add that an individual with a serious emotional disturbance that results in a functional impairment that is addressed in the individual rehabilitation plan can continue to receive PRS.

Rights

Nondiscrimination (§ 5230.42)

To conform with other regulations recently promulgated by the Department, this proposed rulemaking amends the prohibition against discrimination by a PRS agency by deleting the terms "sex," "religion," "ethnic origin," "economic status" and "sexual orientation or gender identity or expression" and adding the terms "color," "creed," "religious affiliation," "ancestry," "gender," "gender identity or expression," "sexual orientation" and "National origin." This proposed rulemaking also requires PRS agencies to comply with applicable Federal and State statutes and regulations.

Staffing

Staff qualifications (§ 5230.51)

This proposed rulemaking amends "associate of arts" degree to "associate's" degree, which is the defined term. Additionally, to ensure that staff are properly qualified, this proposed rulemaking adds requirements for PRS agencies that serve individuals under 18 years of age. A PRS director of an agency that serves individuals under 18 years of age must meet both the requirements to be a PRS director of an agency that serves individuals 18 years of age or older and have or attain CFRP certification within the later of 2 years of the date of hire as a PRS director or within 2 years of the date the agency

received approval of its service description that includes that it will be serving individuals 14 years of age or older. This proposed rulemaking also requires a psychiatric rehabilitation specialist that is employed by a PRS agency that serves individuals under 18 years of age to be certified as a CFRP or have a bachelor's degree and 2 years of work experience in mental health direct service, 1 year of which must be work experience in PRS. If the psychiatric rehabilitation specialist is not certified as a CFRP, he or she must obtain CFRP certification within the later of 2 years of the date of hire as a psychiatric rehabilitation specialist or within 2 years of the date the agency received approval of its service description that includes that it will be serving individuals 14 years of age or older.

General staffing requirements (§ 5230.52)

This proposed rulemaking adds a requirement that in addition to developing a schedule that includes a plan to maintain staffing requirements during deployment of staff for PRS delivered in the community, the schedule must also include a plan to maintain staffing requirements during deployment of staff for PRS delivered in individuals' homes to ensure that sufficient staff is available at the PRS facility when staff is working with individuals in their homes or in the community. This proposed rulemaking also increases the time by which a minimum of 25% of the PRS agency's full-time equivalent staff must meet the qualifications of a psychiatric rehabilitation specialist that are included in § 5230.51(b) and (f) (relating to staff qualifications) from 1 year to 2 years of initial licensing. It also adds the requirement that if a PRS agency serves individuals under 18 years of age, a minimum of 25% of the PRS agency's full-time equivalent staff complement must have CFRP certification within the later of 2 years of initial licensing or within 2 years of the date the agency received approval of its service description that includes that the PRS agency will be serving individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age. This requirement was added to ensure that staff providing PRS have the right type of training and qualifications to provide services to individuals under 18 years of age.

Individual services (§ 5230.53)

This proposed rulemaking clarifies that in addition to being provided in a PRS facility or in the community, individual services can be provided in an individual's home.

Group services (§ 5230.54)

This proposed rulemaking clarifies that group services can be provided in a PRS facility, in the community or in the home, but limits the provision of group services in the home to services provided only through telehealth. This proposed rulemaking also specifies that group services delivered in the community may include only individuals who receive PRS from the agency. This requirement ensures that only the individuals receiving group services from the PRS agency receive the group services and protects confidentiality. In addition, the Department proposes to amend the requirement to design group services to protect confidentiality to require that confidentiality be protected wherever group services are provided and not just if they are provided in the community.

Supervision (§ 5230.55)

The requirement that the meetings between staff and a PRS director or psychiatric rehabilitation specialist designated as a supervisor be face-to-face is proposed to be deleted from the regulation because the meeting is no longer required to be face-to-face.

Staff training requirements (§ 5230.56)

This proposed rulemaking adds resiliency as an optional training topic for staff serving individuals under 18 years of age because resiliency training is important for helping professionals deal with common challenges relating to skill development or retention that may impact individuals under 18 years of age. In addition, this proposed rulemaking requires a minimum of 6 hours of training be specifically focused on youth services. This proposed rulemaking also requires that staff who serve individuals under 18 years of age receive training in the child abuse mandated reporter requirements found in 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6388. Finally, this proposed rulemaking clarifies that the 6 hours of mentoring new staff must receive prior to delivering services must be completed in person.

Criminal history checks and child abuse certification (§ 5230.57)

This proposed rulemaking adds a requirement that a PRS agency that serves individuals under 18 years of age complete criminal history checks and child abuse certifications for staff as required under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6388 and Chapter 3490 (relating to protective services). This proposed rulemaking requires PRS agencies that serve individuals under 18 years of age to develop and implement written policies and procedures regarding personnel decisions that comply with 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6388 and Chapter 3490.

Service Planning and Delivery

Assessment (§ 5230.61)

This proposed rulemaking requires that an assessment be completed in collaboration with the individual and the individual's natural and formal supports, including family members, as directed by the individual, to identify any other services or resources that may be needed to assist the individual. It proposes to add the requirement that in addition to addressing the multiple dimensions of the individual's living, learning, working and socializing domains, the assessment must also address the wellness domain if identified as a goal by the individual. In addition, the proposed amendment requires that the assessment identify any human services programs or facilities that could support the individual so that the individual is made aware of other programs or benefits that could help meet the individual's health or other needs. Information and referral to additional supports may be necessary for individuals transitioning to adulthood. This proposed rulemaking also adds the requirement that an assessment be updated when the individual's diagnosis and identified needs change and allows for documentation that the assessment was reviewed with the individual to allow for the provision of PRS through telehealth.

Individual rehabilitation plan (§ 5230.62)

This proposed rulemaking allows individuals the option of verbally consenting to their individual rehabilitation plan and any updates to the plan. This change will allow the PRS agency to document the individual's consent to the individual rehabilitation plan when the individual is not available to sign the plan in person. This proposed rulemaking also deletes the requirement that an individual rehabilitation plan update include documentation of the reason the individual did not sign the individual rehabilitation plan because the individual is no longer required to sign the individual rehabilitation plan.

Daily entry (§ 5230.63)

This proposed rulemaking deletes the requirement for the individual to sign the daily entry. This change is being made to remove an unnecessary burden on staff and the individual. Section 5230.23 (relating to access to individual record) allows an individual to review, provide written comments and sign daily entries in their individual record. As a result, individuals still have access to their files, but do not have the burden of signing the daily entry every day.

Quality Improvement

Quality improvement requirements (§ 5230.81)

This proposed rulemaking amends the information to be included in the annual quality improvement plan to align with changes to the admission requirements for PRS. The annual quality improvement plan must include the number of individuals admitted to PRS that do not have one of the diagnoses specified in § 5230.31(a)(2) (relating to admission requirements) and their average length of stay in PRS.

Affected individuals and organizations

This proposed rulemaking affects agencies that provide PRS and individuals who will be eligible for PRS as a result of the proposed amendments.

The Department convened a workgroup to review and provide input on this proposed rulemaking. The workgroup included family members, Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services staff and representatives from the following entities: Pennsylvania Healthy Transitions Partnership; Pennsylvania Council of Children, Youth and Family Services; Drexel University/Behavioral Healthcare Education; Dickinson Center, Inc.; Holcomb Behavioral Health Systems Berks County; Community Services Group; Commerce Park Clubhouse; Philadelphia Department of Behavioral Health; Threshold Rehabilitation Services, Inc.; Family Services of Western Pennsylvania; Child and Family Focus, Inc.; Allied Services; Aurora Social Rehabilitation Services; Office of Vocational Rehabilitation; Transition Age Advisory Group; Rehabilitation and Community Providers Association; Pennsylvania Association of Psychiatric Rehabilitation Services; Mental Health Association in Pennsylvania; and the mental health service system in Allegheny, Beaver, Berks, Bucks and Montgomery Counties.

Accomplishments and benefits

PRS promotes resiliency and recovery, full community integration and improved quality of life for individuals who have been diagnosed with serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance. The proposed amendments to the PRS rulemaking benefit individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age with a serious emotional disturbance by allowing these individuals to access evidence-based PRS as they transition into adulthood, which fosters engagement in PRS into adulthood and may reduce the need for or shorten the length of stay in inpatient, partial hospitalization and outpatient treatment. This proposed rulemaking adds requirements that ensure the health and safety of individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age who receive PRS by requiring that services are provided by qualified and adequately trained staff and that the PRS agency has completed criminal history checks and child abuse certifications for staff. It also proposes to add requirements that promote the engagement of youth and families in the recovery process, which will result in better outcomes for individuals receiving services.

This proposed rulemaking will also benefit individuals diagnosed with posttraumatic stress disorder, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, bipolar disorder, major depressive disorder or anxiety disorders because individuals with these disorders will no longer need to use the exception process to be eligible for PRS. This will assist individuals diagnosed with these disorders to develop skills needed to live, learn, socialize and work in their community and improve or maintain their physical and mental health.

This proposed rulemaking also adds wellness as a domain in which PRS agencies may assist individuals receiving PRS to develop skills. This addition will allow an individual to learn how to manage his or her physical and mental health needs to promote or support his or her recovery and resiliency.

Finally, this proposed rulemaking will benefit all individuals who receive PRS by clarifying that PRS can be provided in the home and by removing barriers to the provision of PRS through telehealth.

Fiscal Impact

It is anticipated that the implementation of this proposed rulemaking may result in a small initial increase in costs for PRS agencies that serve individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age because the director, psychiatric rehabilitation specialist and 25% of the full-time equivalent staff complement will need to obtain CFRP certification, and the PRS agencies will need to obtain child abuse certifications for staff. The cost to obtain the CFRP certification is approximately \$395 (registration and examination fee) per person. The costs to obtain child abuse certifications include a child abuse clearance for \$13 per person and an FBI background check for \$22.60 per person.

The Department is unable to determine the fiscal impact of a PRS agency's decision to provide PRS through telehealth because of the individualized nature of the cost to provide PRS through telehealth. Each agency will need to determine whether it wants to provide PRS through telehealth. If an agency chooses to provide PRS through telehealth, the cost to provide PRS through telehealth will depend on the PRS agency's current technical capabilities, including access to telehealth equipment, and the cost of the telehealth equipment the PRS agency chooses to use. In addition, the cost to provide PRS through telehealth will fluctuate based on the number of individuals served through telehealth.

The Department does not expect that there will be costs to the Department as a result of this proposed rule-making. While more individuals will be eligible for PRS and more individuals may be able to access PRS through telehealth in addition to in person, the Department expects to realize savings from the implementation of this proposed rulemaking. Allowing individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age to receive PRS will allow more individuals access to an evidence-based practice. National research indicates that evidence-based practices and programs result in shorter periods of treatment, reduced need for more expensive higher levels of care, decreased juvenile justice system involvement, improved school attendance and performance and better overall outcomes for children and their families.

The Department also does not anticipate any costs to local governments or individuals who receive PRS as a result of the proposed rulemaking.

Paperwork Requirements

This proposed rulemaking will result in a minimal increase in paperwork for PRS agencies because they will need to submit an updated agency service description. *Effective Date*

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Public Comment

Regulatory Review Act

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on June 23, 2022, the Department submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Human Services Committee and the Senate Health and Human Services Committee. In addition to submitting the proposed rulemaking, the Department has provided the Committees and IRRC with a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Department. A copy of this form is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections must specify the regulatory review criteria in section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review prior to final publication of the rulemaking by the Department, the General Assembly and the Governor.

Annex A

TITLE 55. HUMAN SERVICES PART VII. MENTAL HEALTH MANUAL

Subpart D. NONRESIDENTIAL AGENCIES/FACILITIES/SERVICES

CHAPTER 5230. PSYCHIATRIC REHABILITATION SERVICES

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 5230.3. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Axis I—

- (i) One of five dimensions relating to different aspects of the diagnosis of a psychiatric disorder or disability as organized in the DSM-IV-TR or subsequent revisions.
- (ii) Axis I specifies clinical disorders, including major mental disorders.

BH-MCO—Behavioral health managed care organization—An entity that manages the purchase and provision of mental health and substance abuse services.

Best practice—Service delivery practice based directly on principles and standards that are generally recognized by a profession and are documented in the professional literature.

CFRP—Child and Family Resiliency Practitioner—A person who has satisfied the required education, experience and testing, and who is certified as a Child and Family Resiliency Practitioner by the Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association or its successor.

CPRP—Certified Psychiatric Rehabilitation Practitioner—A person who has [completed] satisfied the required education, experience and testing, and who is [currently] certified as a Certified Psychiatric Rehabilitation Practitioner by the [USPRA] Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association or its successor.

CPS certificate—Certified peer specialist certificate—A certificate awarded to a person who has successfully completed the Department-approved training in peer support services.

Clubhouse—A PRS facility that is accredited by [the ICCD] Clubhouse International or its successor.

Coordination of [care] services—Direct contact by a PRS agency with other mental health, physical health or human services formal and natural supports, to ensure continuity in service planning [between service agencies].

* * * * *

[DSM-IV-TR—Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, Fourth Edition, Text Revision.] DSM—The current version of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders.

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FTE—Full-time equivalent—37.5 hours per [calendar] week of staff time.

[Face-to-face—Contact between two or more people that occurs at the same location, in person.]

Formal support—An agency, organization or person who provides assistance or resources to others within the context of an official role.

Functional impairment—[The loss or abnormality of the ability to complete necessary tasks.] Difficulties that interfere with or limit skill development or functioning in a domain.

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Human services—Programs or facilities designed to meet basic health, welfare and other needs of a society or group.

[ICCD—International Center for Clubhouse Development.

ICD-9—International Classification of Diseases, Ninth Edition.] ICD—The current version of the International Classification of Diseases.

IRP—Individual rehabilitation plan—A document that describes the current service needs based on the assessment of the individual and identifies the individual's goals, interventions to be provided, the location, frequency and duration of services and staff who will provide the service.

Individual—A person[, 18] 14 years of age or older [who has a functional impairment resulting from mental illness, who uses] who receives PRS.

LPHA—Licensed practitioner of the healing arts—

- [(i) An individual] A person who is licensed by the Commonwealth to practice the healing arts.
- [(ii) The] This term is limited to a physician, physician's assistant, certified registered nurse practitioner [and], licensed clinical social worker, licensed marriage and family therapist, licensed professional counselor or psychologist.

* * * * *

PRS—Psychiatric rehabilitation service—A recoveryoriented service offered individually or in groups which is predicated upon the principles, values and practice standards of [the ICCD, USPRA] <u>Clubhouse International, the Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association</u> or other Nationally-recognized professional PRS association.

* * * * *

Psychiatric rehabilitation principles—A list of core values inherent in psychiatric rehabilitation as defined by Nationally-recognized professional associations, including the [USPRA, the ICCD] Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association, Clubhouse International and the Coalition for Community Living.

QI plan—Quality improvement plan—A document outlining the ongoing formal process to ensure optimal care and maximize service benefit as part of the licensing process.

Serious emotional disturbance—A condition experienced by an individual under 18 years of age who currently has, or at any time during the past year has had, a diagnosable mental, behavioral or emotional disorder of sufficient duration to meet the diagnostic criteria for the mental, behavioral or emotional disorder specified in the current DSM.

Serious mental illness—A condition experienced by an individual 18 years of age or older who currently has, or at any time during the past year has had, a diagnosable mental, behavioral or emotional disorder of sufficient duration to meet diagnostic criteria for the mental, behavioral or emotional disorder specified in the current DSM.

[USPRA—The United States Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association.]

Wellness—A domain that helps an individual to develop skills needed to improve or maintain physical and mental health.

§ 5230.4. Psychiatric rehabilitation processes and practices.

(a) A PRS agency shall assist an individual to develop, enhance and retain skills and competencies in living, learning, working [and], socializing and wellness so that an individual can live in the environment of choice and participate in the community.

* * * * *

(f) A PRS agency may offer PRS in a PRS facility [or], in the community[, or both] or in the individual's home, or all three, as is consistent with an approved agency service description.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

§ 5230.13. Agency records.

A PRS agency shall maintain records that contain copies of the following:

* * * * *

- (6) Human resources policies and procedures that <u>are</u> consistent with the PRS agency's service description and address the following:
 - (i) Job descriptions for staff positions.
- (ii) Criminal history background [check] checks and child abuse certification requirements and protocol in accordance with § 5230.57 (relating to criminal history checks and child abuse certification).

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- (10) Quality improvement documents, including the following:
 - (i) QI plan.
 - (ii) Data gathering tools.
 - (iii) Annual review reports.
- (11) Child abuse certifications as required under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6388 (relating to Child Protective Services Law).

§ 5230.15. Agency service description.

- (a) Prior to the initial licensing visit, and when changes occur to the agency service description, a PRS agency shall submit to the Department for prior approval an agency service description that includes the following:
- (1) The governing body, advisory board and an agency table of organization.
- (2) The philosophy of the PRS agency, incorporating psychiatric rehabilitation principles.

(2.1) Strategies for outreach to and engagement of individuals referred for PRS.

- (3) The population to be served, including the following:
 - (i) Anticipated daily attendance.
- (ii) Age range and age groupings, including information on how different age groups will be separated while services are provided through the scheduling of services, providing services in different locations in the PRS facility's physical space and other procedures.
 - (iii) Diagnostic groups.
- (iv) Plans to identify and accommodate special populations.
- (v) Plans to identify and accommodate culturally diverse populations.

- (4) The approach of PRS offered including EBPs and best practices utilized.
- (5) A PRS facility identified as a clubhouse must be accredited by [the ICCD] Clubhouse International within 3 years of licensing and maintain accreditation.
- (6) The location of service, whether in a PRS facility, [or] in the community, or in the individual's home, or a combination of [both] the three locations.
 - (7) Expected service outcomes for individuals.
 - (8) Staffing, including the following:
 - (i) Staffing patterns.
 - (ii) Staff to individual ratios.
 - (iii) Staff qualifications.
 - (iv) Staff supervision plans.
 - (v) Staff training protocols.
- (9) Service delivery patterns, including frequency, duration and method (group or individual) of service delivery.
 - (10) The days and hours of PRS operation.
 - (11) The geographic limits of PRS operation.
- (12) A description of the physical site, including copies of applicable or licenses and certificates.
- (13) A process for development of an IRP with an individual.
 - (14) Admission and discharge policies and procedures.
- (15) The methods by which PRS staff and an individual will collaborate to identify and use the individual's preferred community resources.
- $\left(16\right)$ A process for developing and implementing a QI plan.
 - (17) A procedure for filing and resolving complaints.
- (18) A procedure for engaging and involving the individual's family members and natural supports when the individual consents to the involvement.
- (b) The Department may deny agency service descriptions and approaches that do not meet EBP or best practices standards.
- (c) PRS agencies shall deliver services consistent with the approved service description.
- § 5230.16. Coordination of care services.
- (a) A PRS agency shall have written agreements to coordinate [care] services with other [service] providers, including the following:

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- (5) Case management programs.
- (6) Peer support services agencies.
- (b) A PRS agency may have written agreements to coordinate [care] services with other [service] providers as needed, including the following:
 - (1) Housing and residential programs.
- (2) [Drug and alcohol programs] <u>Substance use</u> disorder programs.
 - (3) Vocational, educational and social programs.
- (4) Other agencies and systems that serve individuals 14 years of age or older.

INDIVIDUAL RECORD

§ 5230.21. Content of individual record.

A PRS agency shall develop and maintain a record for an individual served containing the following:

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- (4) A signed set of documents providing the following:
- (i) [Individual consent to receive services] Documentation of an individual's consent to receive PRS or, if the individual is 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age, documentation of an individual's consent to receive PRS or documentation of consent by the individual's parent or legal guardian for the individual to receive PRS.
- (ii) [Individual] Documentation of an individual's consent to release information to other providers and natural supports, including family members, or, if the individual is 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age, documentation of the individual's consent to release information to other providers and natural supports, including family members, or, if the parent or legal guardian has provided the consent to receive PRS, documentation of consent by the individual's parent or legal guardian to release information to other providers and natural supports, including family members.
- (iii) Verification that the individual received and had an opportunity to discuss the oral and written versions of the PRS statement of rights under § 5230.41 (relating to PRS statement of rights).

* * * * *

- (8) Staff documentation of coordination with other services and supports [.], including:
- (i) A description of outreach and engagement efforts with natural supports, including family members, as directed by the individual.
- (ii) A description of ongoing contacts and involvement with formal supports.
 - (9) Discharge summary.
- § 5230.22. Documentation standards and record security, retention and disposal.

A PRS agency shall ensure that an individual record meets the following standards:

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(6) The record **[is]** shall be kept in a permanent, secure location.

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ADMISSION, CONTINUED STAY AND DISCHARGE REQUIREMENTS

- § 5230.31. Admission requirements.
- (a) [General rule.] To be eligible for PRS, an individual [shall meet] must be 14 years of age or older and have a written recommendation from an LPHA acting within the scope of professional practice that includes the following information:
- (1) [Have a written recommendation for PRS by an LPHA acting within the scope of professional practice] (Reserved).

- (2) [Have the presence or history of a serious mental illness, based upon medical records, which includes] Documentation of one of the following diagnoses [by an LPHA]:
 - (i) Schizophrenia.
- (ii) [Major mood disorder] Schizoaffective disorder.
- (iii) [Psychotic disorder (not otherwise specified)] Other specified schizophrenia spectrum and other psychotic disorder.
- (iv) [Schizoaffective disorder] Major depressive disorder.
- (v) [Borderline personality disorder] $\underline{\text{Bipolar}}$ disorder.
 - (vi) Anxiety disorders.
 - (vii) Posttraumatic stress disorder.
 - (viii) Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder.
 - (ix) Borderline personality disorder.
- (3) [As a result of the mental illness, have] Documentation that as a result of the individual's diagnosis, the individual has a moderate to severe functional impairment that interferes with or limits the individual's performance in at least one of the following domains:
 - (i) Living.
 - (ii) Learning.
 - (iii) Working.
 - (iv) Socializing.
 - (v) Wellness.
 - (4) [Choose to receive PRS] (Reserved).
- (b) [Assessment. A PRS agency shall identify and document the functional impairment of the individual in an assessment as required under § 5230.61(b)(1) (relating to assessment)] (Reserved).
- (c) [Individuals who do not meet the serious mental illness diagnosis requirement under subsection (a) may receive services when the following conditions are met] An individual who does not have a diagnosis listed in subsection (a)(2) is eligible for PRS if the individual has a written recommendation from an LPHA acting within the scope of professional practice that includes the following information:
- (1) [The written recommendation by the LPHA includes a diagnosis of mental illness] Documentation of a serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance with a diagnosis of a mental, behavioral or emotional disorder that is listed [on Axis I in the DSM-IV-TR or ICD-9 or subsequent revisions] in the current DSM or ICD.
- (2) [The written recommendation by the LPHA includes a description of the functional impairment resulting from the mental illness as required under subsection (a)(3).] Documentation that includes a description of a moderate to severe functional impairment in at least one of the following domains

that is a result of the individual's serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance:

- (i) Living.
- (ii) Learning.
- (iii) Working.
- (iv) Socializing.
- (v) Wellness.
- (3) Documentation of the anticipated benefit that PRS will provide for the individual.
- (d) Upon an individual's admission to PRS, the PRS agency shall complete an initial functional impairment screening with the individual to confirm the individual's moderate to severe functional impairment that interferes with or limits performance in at least one domain identified in the LPHA's written recommendation.

§ 5230.32. Continued stay requirements.

- (a) A PRS agency shall determine an individual's eligibility for continued stay during an IRP update required under \S 5230.62(c) (relating to individual rehabilitation plan).
- (b) An individual's eligibility for continued stay shall be determined by documentation of the following:
- (1) An individual chooses continued participation in the PRS.
- (2) A continued need for service based upon one or both of the following:
- (i) As a result of a **serious** mental illness **or serious emotional disturbance**, there is a functional impairment **[or skill deficit]** that is addressed in the IRP.
- (ii) The withdrawal of service could result in loss of rehabilitation gain or goal attained by an individual.

RIGHTS

§ 5230.42. Nondiscrimination.

A PRS agency may not discriminate against an individual or staff on the basis of [age, race, sex, religion, ethnic origin, economic status, sexual orientation or gender identity or expression, or disability] race, color, creed, disability, religious affiliation, ancestry, gender, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, National origin or age and shall comply with applicable Federal and State statutes and regulations.

STAFFING

§ 5230.51. Staff qualifications.

- (a) A [PRS] director of a PRS agency that serves individuals 18 years of age or older shall have one of the following:
 - (1) A bachelor's degree and CPRP certification.
- (2) A bachelor's degree and at least 3 years work experience in mental health direct service, 2 years of which must be work experience in PRS. CPRP certification shall be attained within 2 years of hire as a PRS director.
- (3) An Lassociate of arts Associate's degree and CPRP certification, if employed as the PRS director of a licensed PRS facility for at least 6 months immediately prior to May 11, 2013.

- (b) A psychiatric rehabilitation specialist who works with individuals 18 years of age or older shall have one of the following:
- (1) A bachelor's degree and 2 years work experience in mental health direct service, 1 year of which must be work experience in PRS. CPRP certification shall be attained within 2 years from the date of hire as a psychiatric rehabilitation specialist.
 - (2) CPRP certification.

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- (d) A psychiatric rehabilitation assistant shall have a high school diploma or GED and 6 months experience in human services.
- (e) A director of a PRS agency that serves individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age shall meet the qualifications for a PRS director in subsection (a) and have or attain CFRP certification within either 2 years of the date of hire as a PRS director or within 2 years of the date the PRS agency received approval of its service description that identifies that it will be serving individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age, whichever is later.
- (f) A psychiatric rehabilitation specialist who works with individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age shall have one of the following:
- (1) A bachelor's degree and 2 years work experience in mental health direct service, 1 year of which must be work experience in PRS. CFRP certification shall be attained either within 2 years from the date of hire as a psychiatric rehabilitation specialist or within 2 years of the date the PRS agency received approval of its service description that identifies that it will be serving individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age, whichever is later.

(2) CFRP certification.

(g) An associate's degree or bachelor's degree must be awarded by a college or university accredited by an agency recognized by the United States Department of Education or the Council for Higher Education Accreditation, or an equivalent degree from a foreign college or university that has been evaluated by the Association of International Credential Evaluators, Inc. or the National Association of Credential Evaluation Services. The Department will accept a general equivalency report from the listed evaluator agencies to verify a foreign degree or its equivalency.

§ 5230.52. General staffing requirements.

* * * * *

- (e) A PRS agency shall develop a schedule that includes a plan to maintain staffing requirements during:
 - (1) Staff absence.
- (2) Deployment of staff for PRS delivered in the **home** or community.
- (f) A PRS agency shall document staffing by maintaining work schedules, time records and utilization data.
- (g) When a PRS agency operates more than one PRS facility, the PRS director shall be present at each licensed PRS facility an average of 7.5 hours per week in a calendar month.

- (h) A minimum of 25% of the **[FTE staff complement]** staff based on the number of FTE positions shall meet the qualifications of a psychiatric rehabilitation specialist provided under § 5230.51(b) or (f) (relating to staff qualifications) within **[1 year]** 2 years of initial licensing.
- (i) [A] When a PRS agency serves individuals 18 years of age or older, a minimum of 25% of the [FTE staff complement] staff based on the number of FTE positions shall have CPRP certification within 2 years of initial licensing.
- (i.1) When a PRS agency serves individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age, a minimum of 25% of the staff based on the number of FTE positions shall have CFRP certification within either 2 years of initial licensing or within 2 years of the date the PRS agency received approval of its service description that identifies that it will be serving individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age, whichever is later.
- (j) Trained staff shall be available, or other accommodations made, to address the language needs of an individual, including American Sign Language and Braille.

§ 5230.53. Individual services.

A PRS agency shall provide individual services in a PRS facility [or], in the community or in the home on a one staff to one individual (1:1) ratio.

§ 5230.54. Group services.

- (a) A PRS agency shall provide group services in a PRS facility [or], in the community or in the home.
- (1) When a group service is provided in a PRS facility, group size may vary as long as the requirement under § 5230.52(c) (relating to general staffing requirements) is met.
- (2) When a group service is delivered in the community, one staff shall serve a group of no more than five individuals. Group size in the community may not exceed five individuals.
- (3) When an individual receives a group service in a home, all other individuals receiving the group service must be in another location.
- (b) Group services delivered in the community shall be limited to individuals who have IRP goals that specify the need for services in the community.

* * * * *

- (f) A PRS agency shall design group services [delivered in the community] to protect confidentiality [in a public location].
- (f.1) Only individuals who receive PRS from the PRS agency may be included in group services delivered in the community.
- (g) A PRS agency shall arrange for group discussion of the experience before and after service is conducted in the community. The group discussion shall occur in a setting which assures confidentiality.

§ **5230.55.** Supervision.

* * * * *

(c) A PRS director or psychiatric rehabilitation specialist designated as a supervisor shall meet with staff individually[, face-to-face,] no less than two times per calendar month.

* * * * *

§ 5230.56. Staff training requirements.

- A PRS agency shall implement a staff training plan that ensures initial and ongoing training in PRS practices as specified under § 5230.4 (relating to psychiatric rehabilitation processes and practices).
- (1) Staff providing services in a PRS agency shall complete a Department-approved 12-hour psychiatric rehabilitation orientation course no later than 1 year after hire. This course shall be credited to the annual training requirement listed under paragraph (2) for the calendar year in which it is completed.
- (2) Staff providing services in a PRS agency shall complete 18 hours of training per calendar year [with 12 hours specifically focused on psychiatric rehabilitation or recovery practices, or both.] as follows:
- (i) If the PRS agency serves individuals 18 years of age or older, 12 hours of the required training shall be specifically focused on psychiatric rehabilitation or recovery practices, or both.
- (ii) If the PRS agency serves individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age, 12 hours of the required training shall be specifically focused on psychiatric rehabilitation or resiliency, or both, with a minimum of 6 hours specifically focused on youth services.
- (2.1) If the PRS agency serves individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age, training in the child abuse mandated reporter requirements of 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6388 (relating to Child Protective Services Law) and Chapter 3490 (relating to protective services) shall be completed.
- (3) A PRS agency shall assure competency of new staff by providing an additional PRS service-specific orientation that includes the following:
- (i) Six hours of training in the specific PRS model or approach outlined in the agency service description prior to new staff working independently. This training is required within the first year of employment.
- (ii) Six hours of **[face-to-face]** mentoring for new staff prior to new staff delivering services independently. Mentoring shall be provided by a PRS director or psychiatric rehabilitation specialist designated as a supervisor and **[is required]** must be completed in person within the first year of employment.
- (4) A PRS agency shall assure that training has learning objectives.
- (5) A PRS agency shall maintain documentation of training hours in the PRS agency records under § 5230.13(6)(v) (relating to agency records).
- § 5230.57. Criminal history [background check] checks and child abuse certification.
- (a) A PRS agency that serves individuals 18 years of age or older shall complete a criminal history background check for staff that will have direct contact with [an individual] individuals receiving PRS.
- (b) A PRS agency that serves only individuals 18 years of age or older shall develop and consistently

implement written policies and procedures regarding personnel decisions based on the criminal history background check.

- (c) A PRS agency that serves individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age shall complete criminal history background checks and child abuse certifications for staff as required under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6388 (relating to Child Protective Services Law) and Chapter 3490 (relating to protective services).
- (d) A PRS agency that serves individuals 14 years of age or older but under 18 years of age shall develop and consistently implement written policies and procedures regarding personnel decisions in accordance with 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6388 and Chapter 3490.

SERVICE PLANNING AND DELIVERY

§ 5230.61. Assessment.

- (a) A PRS agency shall complete an assessment of an individual prior to developing the IRP.
- (b) The assessment shall be completed in collaboration with the individual and as directed by the individual, with formal and natural supports, including family members, and must:
- (1) Identify the functioning of the individual in the living, learning, working [and], socializing and wellness domains.
 - (2) Identify the strengths and needs of the individual.
- (3) Identify existing and needed natural and formal supports, including other [health care facilities and social service agencies] human services programs or facilities.
- (4) Identify the specific skills, supports and resources the individual needs and prefers to accomplish stated goals.
- (5) Identify cultural needs and preferences of the individual.
- (6) Be signed by the individual and staff or include documentation that the assessment was reviewed with the individual and the date of review.
- (7) Be updated annually and when one of the following occurs:
 - (i) The individual requests an update.
- (i.1) The individual's diagnosis and identified needs change.
 - (ii) The individual completes a goal.
- (iii) The individual is not progressing on stated goals. § 5230.62. Individual rehabilitation plan.
- (a) A PRS staff and an individual shall jointly develop an IRP that is consistent with the assessment and includes the following:

(7) Dated signatures of the individual, the staff working with the individual and the PRS director or docu-

mentation of consent to the IRP by the individual and the date consent was provided and the dated signatures of the staff working with the individual and the PRS director.

* * * * *

(d) An IRP update must include a comprehensive summary of the individual's progress that includes the following:

* * * * *

- (5) The dated signature of the individual or documentation of consent by the individual and date consent was provided.
- (6) [Documentation of the reason if the individual does not sign] (Reserved).
- (7) The dated signature of the PRS staff working with the individual and the dated signature of the PRS director.

§ 5230.63. Daily entry.

A PRS agency shall include an entry for the day service was provided in the record of an individual as follows:

- (1) Indicates the date, time, duration, location and type of interaction.
- (2) Documents service provided in the context of the goal.
 - (3) Documents the individual response to service.
- (4) [Includes the signature of the individual, or if the individual does not sign, documents the reason] (Reserved).
 - (5) Is signed and dated by staff providing the service.

QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

§ 5230.81. Quality improvement requirements.

- (a) A PRS agency shall establish and implement a written QI plan that meets the following requirements:
- (1) Provides for an annual review of the quality, timeliness and appropriateness of services, including the following:
 - (i) Outcomes for PRS.
 - (ii) Individual record reviews.
 - (iii) Individual satisfaction.
- (iv) [Use of exceptions to admission and continued stay requirements] Number of individuals admitted to PRS that did not have a diagnosis listed in § 5230.31(a)(2) (relating to admission requirements).
- $\begin{array}{c} \hbox{(iv.1) Average length of stay in PRS for individuals who did not have a diagnosis listed in} \\ \$ \ 5230.31(a)(2). \end{array}$
- (v) Evaluation of compliance with the $\underline{\textbf{approved}}$ agency service description.

Revisions to Schedule of Prices for State Parks

A. Summary and Background

Under section 314 of the Conservation and Natural Resources Act (71 P.S. § 1340.314) and 17 Pa. Code § 11.224 (relating to prices), the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, Bureau of State Parks, will revise its price schedule for State Park activities, uses and privileges effective July 17, 2022. The updated schedule, which is in section D as follows, increases the

fee ranges for Presque Isle Marina fees, the Statewide marina transfer and waitlist fees, whitewater launch fees at Ohiopyle State Park, amenity fees for a new "Great Gathering Friends and Family" 2 unit full hookup site type and swimming pool splash pad entrance only fees when the main pool cannot be opened.

The updated price schedule is needed to adjust existing rates to the market. The resulting fees are comparable to those of state parks in neighboring states and will narrow the gap between State Parks in this Commonwealth and private facilities, resulting in a more favorable competitive climate for the private sector.

AIR QUALITY

PLAN APPROVAL AND OPERATING PERMIT APPLICATIONS

The Department has developed an "integrated" plan approval, State Operating Permit and Title V Operating Permit program. This integrated approach is designed to make the permitting process more efficient for the Department, the regulated community and the general public. This approach allows the owner or operator of a facility to submit permitting documents relevant to its application for all sources related to a facility or a proposed project, affords an opportunity for public input, and provides for a decision on the issuance of the necessary permits.

The Department received applications for Plan Approvals or Operating Permits from the following facilities. Copies of the application, the Department's analysis, all pertinent documents used in the evaluation of the application and subsequently prepared proposed plan approvals/operating permits are available for public review during normal business hours at the appropriate Department Regional Office. Appointments for scheduling a review must be made by calling the appropriate Department Regional Office. The address and phone number of the Regional Office is listed before the application notices.

Persons wishing to file a written protest or provide comments or additional information, which they believe should be considered prior to the issuance of a permit, may submit the information to the Department's Regional Office. A 30-day comment period from the date of this publication will exist for the submission of comments, protests and information. Each submission must contain the name, address and telephone number of the person submitting the comments, identification of the proposed Plan Approval/Operating Permit including the permit number and a concise statement regarding the relevancy of the information or objections to issuance of the permit.

A person wishing to request a hearing may do so during the 30-day comment period. A public hearing may be held, if the Department, in its discretion, decides that a hearing is warranted based on the information received. Persons submitting comments or requesting a hearing will be notified of the decision to hold a hearing by publication in the newspaper, the Pennsylvania Bulletin or by telephone, when the Department determines this type of notification is sufficient. Requests for a public hearing and any relevant information should be directed to the appropriate Department Regional Office.

The emergency generator sets were previously exempted from Plan Approval requirements under the following Requests for Determination (RFDs) with the respective Source ID in the current Title V Operating Permit (TVOP) No. 46-00027, but are now proposed to be permitted under Plan Approval to remove their exempt status:

• RFD No. 790 (approved April 7, 2009): 1,000-ekW emergency generator set equipped with a diesel fuel/No. 2 fuel oil-fired engine (Source ID 113).

- RFD No. 3783 (approved July 15, 2013): 750-ekW emergency generator set equipped with a diesel fuel/No. 2 fuel oil-fired engine (Source ID 119).
- RFD No. 6354 (approved June 1, 2017): 1,000-ekW emergency generator set equipped with a natural gasfired engine (Source ID 122).
- RFD No. 8716 (approved September 25, 2020): two temporary (rental) 2,000-ekW emergency generator sets, each equipped with a diesel fuel/No. 2 fuel oil-fired engine.

Currently, the engines of the emergency generator sets, as well as two existing fire pumps (Source ID 121), are subject to combined nitrogen oxides (NO $_{\rm x}$) emission rate restrictions of 100 lbs/hr, 1,000 lbs/day, 2.75 tons/ozone season, and 6.6 tons/yr, calculated monthly as a 12-month rolling sum. Under the Plan Approval, the engines of the emergency generator sets will be subject to the following NO $_{\rm x}$ emission rate restrictions based on total operating times of 500 hrs/yr for the existing units and 150 hrs/yr for the temporary (rental) units:

- Source ID 113: 12.91 lbs/hr and 3.23 tons/yr, calculated monthly as a 12-month rolling sum.
- Source ID 119: 9.65 lbs/hr and 2.41 tons/yr, calculated monthly as a 12-month rolling sum.
- Source ID 122: 6.47 lbs/hr and 1.62 tons/yr, calculated monthly as a 12-month rolling sum.
- Temporary (rental) units: 41.987/83.974 lbs/hr (each/total) and 3.149/6.298 tons/yr, calculated monthly as a 12-month rolling sum (each/total).

Since the engines of the existing emergency generator sets are currently subject to total operating time restrictions of 500 hrs/yr each, DEP does not consider them to have undergone a modification, as defined in 25 Pa. Code § 121.1 (i.e., "a change in the method of operation of a source which would increase the amount of an air contaminant emitted by the source.") However, since the temporary emergency generator sets are no longer onsite, will only be brought onsite only if an existing cogeneration unit (Source ID 118 in TVOP No. 46-00027) is down for maintenance or otherwise not operational, and may not be the same units as previously onsite, DEP will permit the temporary emergency generator sets as new sources. (The fire pumps are not included in the Plan Approval.)

Based on the $\mathrm{NO_x}$ and volatile organic compounds (VOCs) from the engines of the temporary emergency generator sets, as well as the other historical emissions increases and decreases of $\mathrm{NO_x}$ and VOCs at the facility, including the aforementioned combined (exempt) annual $\mathrm{NO_x}$ emission rate restriction, the project is not subject to New Source Review (NSR) requirements.

Each of the engines of the emergency generator sets is/will be EPA-certified and rated at greater than 1,000 bhp power output. Therefore, the engine is subject to the Standards of Performance for New Stationary Sources (NSPS) for Stationary Compression or Spark Ignition Internal Combustion Engines [40 CFR Part 60, Subparts IIII and JJJJ, respectively], as applicable, and the additional NO_x requirements specified in 25 Pa. Code §§ 129.203 and 129.204.

The Plan Approval will include monitoring, recordkeeping, reporting, and work practice requirements designed to keep the facility operating within all applicable air quality requirements.

In accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 129.91—129.100, the Department of Environmental Protection has made a preliminary determination to approve the RACT 2 site-

wide NO_x emission averaging plan to be submitted as part of the PA State Implementation Plan (SIP) for the Brunner Island facility.

The proposed SIP revision does not adopt any new regulations. It incorporates the provisions and requirements contained in the RACT 2 approval, which are intended to satisfy the requirements for the 1997 National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS) and the 2008 NAAQS for ozone.

The proposed RACT 2 plan, if approved by DEP, will be issued as a modification of the facility's Title V operating permit (67-05005). The relevant RACT 2 requirements will also be submitted to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for approval and incorporation into Pennsylvania's State Implementation Plan. Requirements that are not part of the RACT 2 approval will be excluded from the SIP submittal.

The proposed RACT 2 requirements for this facility that are proposed to be submitted to the EPA as part of the SIP, are found in Group 012 of the draft permit, and require that Sources 031A, 032, and 033A shall comply with the facility-wide averaging plan requirements of 25 Pa. Code § 129.98 in order to comply with presumptive RACT requirements of 25 Pa. Code § 129.97. Facility-specific details will be included in the condition to ensure compliance with the RACT 2 requirements.

Additionally, the permit modification will incorporate the following requirements:

All terms in this condition are as defined in Consent Decree # 1:18-CV-01042-CCC dated May 17, 2018.

- 1. By the end of the Ozone Season of 2022, the permittee shall cease combustion of coal at Brunner Island during the Ozone Season (May 1 through September 30 of any calendar year), except that such combustion shall be allowed during each Ozone Season in the interim period from January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2028 (Interim Period), as long as the following conditions are met:
- a. The 30-Day Rolling Average $\mathrm{NO_x}$ Emission Rate (for Brunner Island Units 1—3) is at or below 0.12 lb/MMBtu, calculated at the end of each operating day during each Interim Period Ozone Season when coal has been burned, with the first compliance demonstration made at the end of the 30th operating day in each Ozone Season during which coal has been burned. The permittee shall notify DEP of each operating day when coal was burned during the Ozone Season, within thirty (30) days after the end of any Ozone Season during which coal was burned.
- b. Brunner Island shall emit less than 6,800,000 tons of carbon dioxide("CO₂") from Brunner Island Units 1—3 per calendar year during which coal has been burned during the Ozone Season during the Interim Period.
- 2. By December 31, 2028, the permittee shall cease combustion of coal at Brunner Island, other than during periods of time (including time required for startup and shutdown) when PJM has declared an Emergency Action as defined in PJM Manual 13 (Emergency Operations) or an equivalent standard, and when gas is not available or the supply of gas to Brunner Island is interrupted.
- 3. The 30-Day Rolling Average NO_x Emission Rate (for Brunner Island Units 1—3) during the Ozone Season shall be determined using the methodology found in 25 Pa. Code § 129.100(a)(1)(i)—(iii) (for units measuring emissions with continuous emissions monitors (CEMs)), with total NO_x emissions and total heat input from

Brunner Island Units 1—3 used in the calculation. Furthermore, an operating day shall be defined as one with emissions reported from any one of the three units. For the purposes of this permit condition, Day shall mean, unless otherwise specified, calendar day.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

Alkalinity must always be greater than acidity.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse

disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 77.522 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

Additional criteria

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan, and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters of this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume, or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Submittal of comments

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit notice within 30-days of this notice. The appeal should be sent to the Environmental Hearing Board, Second Floor, Rachel Carson State Office Building, 400 Market Street, P.O. Box 8457, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8457, (717) 787-3483. TDD users may contact the Board through the Pennsylvania Hamilton Relay Service, (800) 654-5984. Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30-days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. The request for planning exception for the Goss Subdivision (DEP Code No. A3-44907-201-1; APS ID No. 1065477) has been disapproved. The proposed development—located on Vira Road in Derry Township, Mifflin County, PA—consists of sewage planning for two new residential lots utilizing an on-lot disposal systems with total project flows of 800 gallons per day. The submission does not qualify as an Exception to the Requirement to revise the Official Plan because the subdivision is in an area of the municipality where the Official Plan requires preliminary hydrogeologic studies.

Order

By the Authority:

The Authority is the sole regulator of all taxicab, limousine and transportation network company services in Philadelphia. The Authority is empowered to conduct rate investigations and determine the rates that shall be charged by all taxicabs authorized to provide call or demand service in Philadelphia.2

Additionally, Authority regulations require that a request for flexible pricing model must include a proposed framework for consumer protections that involve upfront disclosure of the fare in a way that is not contingent upon consumer request and the flexible pricing model will be computed to not violate the Price Gouging Act (73 P.S. §§ 232.1—232.5). See 52 Pa. Code § 1030.2 (relating to taxicab rates and tariffs).

On March 30, 2021, the Authority authorized the Taxicab and Limousine Division ("TLD") to reopen a rate investigation to gather information and comment concerning the petition that was filed with the TLD seeking "to allow for up-front pricing or to allow approved PPA smartphone app-based providers and Philadelphia medallion taxicabs to calculate their own fare outside of the taxicab meter but must provide passengers with binding

up-front fare quote to offer passengers with the same price certainty as transportation network companies (TNCs)".³ Specifically, the petition sought to allow an upfront pricing model to be offered to all customers using the Curb smartphone application⁴ to be accepted by any available medallion taxicab operating through the approved meter system.⁵

The TLD sought written comments from the industry members and the general public. However, no comments were submitted. The TLD began its investigation of the upfront pricing model that was being tested with only a limited number of Curb app users. Based upon the TLD's recommendation from its investigative findings, on December 14, 2021, the Authority authorized the implementation of a pilot program to allow for the upfront pricing model to be available for testing to all Curb users to be accepted by any available medallion taxicab operating through the approved meter system. The TLD was directed by the Authority to continue to investigate and gather information concerning the pilot program and report its findings to the Authority within six months.⁶

Based upon review of all information received and recommendation of TLD staff, *Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved and Ordered* by the Board of the Authority as follows:

Section 1. Upfront Pricing.

- (a) Effective July 1, 2022, the taxicab tariff is to be amended to allow for an upfront flex fare pricing model, outside of the current taxicab tariff and meter system, for medallion taxicab trips in Philadelphia that are initiated through the Authority approved taxicab Curb smartphone application, and such fares are calculated based upon an algorithm of both live and historical trip data, including metered fares, traffic and wait times;
- (b) All other rates as outlined in the current taxicab tariff shall remain unchanged.

Section 2. Action by Taxicab and Limousine Division.

(a) The TLD staff shall broadcast this Order to all members of the taxicab industry by email as well as posting it on the Authority's website and within TLD Headquarters along with depositing this Order with the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* for publishing.
