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# READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

### Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

### Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

### Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

### Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

### **How to Find Rules and Regulations**

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde\_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [ ] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

#### **Fiscal Notes**

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

It is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania that Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure Governing Actions and Proceedings Before Magisterial District Judges 301, 302, 321, and 350 are amended and Rule 351 is rescinded in the attached form.

This Order shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b), and shall be effective August 1, 2024.

Deletions from the rule are shown in bold and brackets.

### TITLE 246. MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES PART I. GENERAL

**CHAPTER 300. CIVIL ACTION** 

Rule 301. Definition; Scope.

\* \* \* \* \* \*

Comment:

Except as otherwise provided in [Rules 350 and 351] Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 350, the rules in this chapter apply to [: (1)] de novo appeals filed pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4), relating to automated work zone speed enforcement violations [;], and [(2) actions filed pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1)] 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.4), relating to civil violations for passing a stopped school bus with flashing red signal lights and an activated side stop signal arm.

Statutes authorizing a civil fine or penalty include 53 P.S. §§ 10617.1 and 10817-A relating to violations of zoning and joint municipal zoning ordinances.

### **Historical Commentary**

The following commentary is historical in nature and represents statements of the Committee at the time of rulemaking:

### EXPLANATORY COMMENT—1992

As a result of the computerization of the District Justice offices throughout the Unified Judicial System, the Civil Action Hearing Notice form has been promulgated by Judicial Computer Services (Statewide Automation). Rule 301 recognizes the adoption of the Civil Action Hearing Notice form.

Rule 302. Venue.

\* \* \* \*

### Comment:

This rule combines, with some minor changes, the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure relating to venue. See:

- (1) Individuals: Pa.R.Civ.P. 1006(a).
- (2) Partnerships: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2130(a).
- (3) Corporations: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2179(a).
- (4) Insurance Policies: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2179(b).
- (5) Unincorporated Associations: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2156(a).
- (6) Political Subdivisions: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2103(b).

This rule is not intended to repeal special statutory venue provisions, such as the: (1) venue provisions for actions involving installment sales of goods and services, 12 Pa.C.S. § 6307; (2) venue provisions of the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1692i, pertaining to actions brought by debt collectors against consumers; and (3) venue provisions for appeals from automated work zone speed enforcement violations, 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4)[;] and [ (4) venue provisions for actions filed pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1), relating to ] from civil violations for passing a stopped school bus with flashing red signal lights and an activated side stop signal arm, 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.4). See Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 382(1) (pertaining to Acts of Assembly providing for special venue provisions that are not suspended).

### Rule 321. Hearings and Evidence.

The magisterial district judge shall be bound by the rules of evidence, except that a bill, estimate, receipt, or statement of account that appears to have been made in the regular course of business may be introduced in evidence by any party without affidavit or other evidence of its truth, accuracy, or authenticity.

### Comment:

The exception to the rules of evidence provided by this rule was inserted because the Pennsylvania statutes making certain business entries admissible in evidence apparently do not apply to bills, receipts, and the like that are made in the regular course of business but are not made as "records." See 42 Pa.C.S. § 6108. The fact that this exception permits the introduction of these items of evidence without affidavit or other evidence of their truth, accuracy, or authenticity does not, of course, preclude the introduction of evidence contradicting them. The exception was deemed necessary because the items of evidence made admissible thereby are probably the proofs most commonly used in minor judiciary proceedings. See [ Rules 350D(2) and 351(d) ] Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. **350(d)(2)** for additional exceptions applicable to appeals from automated work zone speed enforcement violations and [actions filed pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1), relating to ] from civil violations for passing a stopped school bus with flashing red signal lights and an activated side stop signal arm.

#### SATISFACTION OF MONEY JUDGMENTS

Rule 350. [Automated Work Zone Speed Enforcement Violation] Appeals from Civil Traffic Violations.

### [A.] (a) As used in this rule:

- (1) "Appellant" means the owner of a vehicle who has requested the appeal of a determination by a hearing officer pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4), pertaining to automated work zone speed enforcement violations, or 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.4)(4), pertaining to civil violations for passing a stopped school bus with flashing red signal lights and an activated side stop signal arm.
  - (2) "Appellee" means:
- (i) in matters brought pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4), the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, or the system administrator designated by those agencies pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(h)(3)(i)[.]; or
- (ii) in matters brought pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.4)(4), a school entity, as defined in 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(m), or a system administrator that has entered into an agreement with the school entity pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(g).
- [B.] (b) Venue. An appeal filed pursuant to this rule shall only be filed in the magisterial district court in the magisterial district where the violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(c) or 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(a.1)(1) occurred.

### [C.] (c) Notice of Appeal.

- (1) An appellant may appeal a determination of a hearing officer pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4) or 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.4)(4) by filing a notice of appeal on a form prescribed by the State Court Administrator together with a copy of the hearing officer's determination within 45 days after the date of its issuance.
- (2) The appellant shall pay all costs for filing and service of the notice of appeal at the time of filing or, if without the financial resources to pay the costs of litigation, the appellant shall file a petition to proceed *in forma pauperis* pursuant to [Rule 206E] Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 206E.
- (3) After setting the hearing date pursuant to [Rule 305] Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 305, the magisterial district judge shall serve the notice of appeal on the appellee by mailing a copy to the appellee at the address listed on the hearing officer's determination by certified mail or comparable delivery method resulting in a return receipt in paper or electronic form. The return receipt shall show that the notice of appeal was received by the appellee.

### [ D. ] (d) Hearing; Evidence.

- (1) The proceeding shall be conducted *de novo* in accordance with these rules as if the action was initially commenced in a magisterial district court with the appellee having the burden of proof.
- (2) The hearing is subject to the standards of evidence set forth in [Rule 321] Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 321, except that photographs, videos, vehicle titles, police reports, and records of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation may also be entered as evidence by any party without affidavit or other evidence of their truth, accuracy, or authenticity.

### Comment:

75 Pa.C.S. § 3369 established a program to provide for automated speed enforcement systems in active work zones on certain highways under the jurisdiction of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation and the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission. Similarly, 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1 provides for automated side stop signal arm enforcement systems to identify the owners of vehicles failing to stop for a school bus with flashing red lights and an activated side stop signal arm, as well as for the imposition of civil fines upon those found in violation. This rule was adopted to address the **statutory** provisions **l of the** statute ] that [ permits ] permitting a de novo appeal to a magisterial district court from a determination of a hearing officer following an administrative hearing to contest an alleged violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(c) or **75 Pa.C.S.** § **3345.1(a.1)(1)**. Because these actions are  $\overline{de}$ *novo* appeals, they shall proceed as any other civil action commenced in a magisterial district court except as provided by this rule.

Insofar as other procedures under these rules may be applicable, the appellant shall be deemed the "defendant" and the appellee shall be deemed the "plaintiff."

The initiating document in an appeal filed pursuant to [Rule 350] Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 350 is the notice of appeal, which shall be used in lieu of a complaint.

Photographs, videos, vehicle titles, police reports, and records of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation were added to the existing business record exceptions in [ Rule 321 ] Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 321 because they are the proofs most likely to be used to support the permitted defenses to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(c) and 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(a.1)(1).

The appellant shall pay civil fines incurred pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(e) or 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(c) to the appellee and not to the magisterial district court. See Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 323, cmt. (clarifying that payments are made to the prevailing party and not the magisterial district court). If the magisterial district judge enters judgment in favor of the appellant, i.e., the vehicle owner, the appellant is entitled to recover taxable costs from the appellee. See Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 206B ("[T]he prevailing party in magisterial district court proceedings shall be entitled to recover taxable costs from the unsuccessful party. Such costs shall consist of all filing, personal service, witness, and execution costs authorized by Act of Assembly or general rule and paid by the prevailing party.") Procedures for enforcement of judgments, including judgments in favor of the appellant for taxable costs from the appellee, are set forth in **Rules 401** et seq. Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 401 et seq. See 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 3345.1(i.4)(4) and 3369(j)(4) for limits on the judgment.

See [Rules 1001 et seq.] Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 1001 et seq. for procedures to appeal a judgment rendered by a magisterial district judge or to file a praecipe for a writ of certiorari in civil actions, including actions brought pursuant to this rule.

Rule 351. [Action to Contest Civil Liability for Passing a School Bus with Flashing Red Lights and an Activated Side Stop Signal Arm; Failure to Respond to a Notice of Violation.] [Rescinded].

(a) As used in this rule:

- (1) "Vehicle owner" means the owner of a vehicle alleged to have violated 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345, relating to enforcement of failure to stop for a school bus with flashing red lights and an activated side stop signal arm, brought pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1.
- (2) "Police department" means the police department issuing the notice of violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345, relating to enforcement of failure to stop for a school bus with flashing red lights and an activated side stop signal arm, brought pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1.
- (b) Venue. An action filed pursuant to this rule shall only be filed in the magisterial district court in the magisterial district where the alleged violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345 occurred.
  - (c) Proceedings.
  - (1) Vehicle Owner Request to Contest Liability.
- (i) A vehicle owner may contest the liability alleged in the notice of violation within 30 days of the mailing of the notice of violation by filing a hearing request form prescribed by the State Court Administrator together with a copy of the notice of violation.
- (ii) The vehicle owner shall pay all costs for filing and service of the hearing request form at the time of filing or, if without the financial resources to pay the costs of litigation, the vehicle owner shall file a petition to proceed *in forma pauperis* pursuant to Rule 206E.
- (iii) After setting the hearing date pursuant to Rule 305, the magisterial district judge shall serve the hearing request on the police department by mailing a copy to the police department at the address listed on the notice of violation by certified mail or comparable delivery method resulting in a return receipt in paper or electronic form. The return receipt shall show that the hearing request was received by the police department.
- (2) Vehicle Owner Fails to Respond to Notice of Violation. If the vehicle owner fails to respond to the notice of violation within 30 days of the original notice by either paying the fine as indicated on the notice of violation or contesting liability as provided in subdivision (c)(1), the police department may file a civil complaint against the vehicle owner pursuant to Rule 303.
- (d) Evidence. The hearing is subject to the standards of evidence set forth in Rule 321, except that photographs, videos, vehicle titles, police reports, and records of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation may also be entered as evidence by any party without affidavit or other evidence of their truth, accuracy, or authenticity.

#### Comment

75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1 provides for automated side stop signal arm enforcement systems to identify and civilly fine the owners of vehicles failing to stop for a school bus with flashing red lights and an activated side stop signal arm. This rule was adopted to address the provisions of the statute that (1) allow a vehicle owner to contest liability for a notice of violation and (2) establishes a mechanism for a police department to file a complaint when a vehicle owner has failed to respond to a notice of violation.

Insofar as other procedures under these rules may be applicable, the vehicle owner shall be deemed the "defendant" and the police department shall be deemed the "plaintiff."

A vehicle owner issued a notice of violation under 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1 may contest liability by requesting a hearing with the magisterial district judge in the magisterial district where the violation occurred. The initiating document in an action filed by a vehicle owner to contest liability is the hearing request form, which shall be used in lieu of a complaint.

If the magisterial district judge finds the vehicle owner liable for the violation, the vehicle owner shall pay civil fines incurred pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(c) to the police department and not to the magisterial district court. See Rule 3.10(A)(2) of the Rules Governing Standards of Conduct of Magisterial District Judges (prohibiting a magisterial district judge from engaging in any activity related to the collection of a claim or judgment for money); see also Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 323, Comment ("The payments are to be made to the plaintiff and not to the magisterial district judge").

If the magisterial district judge enters judgment in favor of the vehicle owner, the vehicle owner is entitled to recover taxable costs from the police department. See Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 206B ("The prevailing party in magisterial district court proceedings shall be entitled to recover taxable costs from the unsuccessful party. Such costs shall consist of all filing, personal service, witness, and execution costs authorized by Act of Assembly or general rule and paid by the prevailing party."). Procedures for enforcement of judgments, including judgments in favor of the plaintiff for taxable costs from the defendant, are set forth in Rules 401 et seq.

If the vehicle owner fails to respond to the notice of violation within 30 days of the original notice by either paying the fine as indicated on the notice of violation or contesting liability as provided in subdivision (c)(1), the police department may file a civil complaint against the vehicle owner in the magisterial district where the violation occurred pursuant to Rule 303. See 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1)(2)(iii). A complaint filed by a police department to enforce a notice of violation when the vehicle owner failed to respond will proceed as any other civil action filed pursuant to Rule 303 except as otherwise provided in this Rule. See also Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 206 (pertaining to costs).

Photographs, videos, vehicle titles, police reports, and records of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation were added to the existing business record exceptions in Rule 321 because they are the proofs most likely to be used to support the permitted defenses to 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(c).

See Rules 1001 *et seq.* for procedures to appeal a judgment rendered by a magisterial district judge or to file a *praecipe* for a writ of *certiorari* in civil actions, including actions brought pursuant to this rule.

#### **Comment:**

Provisions of former Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 351 were incorporated in Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 350.

### SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA MINOR COURT RULES COMMITTEE ADOPTION REPORT

Amendment of Rules 301, 302, 321, and 350 and Rescission of Rule 351 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure Governing Actions and Proceedings Before Magisterial District Judges

On May 22, 2024, the Supreme Court amended Rules 301, 302, 321, and 350 and rescinded Rule 351 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure Governing Actions and Proceedings Before Magisterial District Judges, pertaining to civil enforcement of traffic violations. The Minor Court Rules Committee has prepared this Adoption Report describing the rulemaking process. An Adoption Report should not be confused with Comments to the rules. See Pa.R.J.A. 103, cmt. The statements contained herein are those of the Committee, not the Court.

Two legislative enactments created civil enforcement mechanisms for certain traffic violations. Act 86 of 2018 authorized the use of automated work zone speed enforcement systems in active work zones along the Pennsylvania Turnpike and "[f]ederal aid highways only under the jurisdiction of [PennDOT]." See 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(a). Act 38 of 2020 authorized the use of automated enforcement systems on school buses to identify and issue violations to the owners of vehicles passing a stopped school bus when the red signal lights on the school bus are flashing and the side stop signal arms are activated. See 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(a), (c). Both Acts included appeals of violations to magisterial district courts, which necessitated rule-making to accommodate these new civil appeals.

Variations in the Acts necessitated the promulgation of distinct procedural rules relating to appeal procedures. See Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 350-351 (rules pertaining to automated work zone violation appeals and school bus violation appeals, respectively). For example, challenges to work zone violations are initiated by a filing a request for an administrative hearing before a hearing officer with a subsequent de novo appeal available before a magisterial district judge. See 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j). In contrast, appeals from school bus violations could be filed directly with the magisterial district court. See 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1)(3)(i) (effective through December 21, 2023). Section 3345.1 also contained a unique provision permitting the "the police department [to] turn the matter over to the magisterial district judge where the violation occurred" when the vehicle owner did not pay the fine or contest liability. 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.1)(2)(iii).

Act 19 of 2023, adopted on October 23, 2023, reconciled differences in the appeal processes of the two enforcement schemes. It amended § 3345.1 to require a vehicle owner appeal a school bus violation to an administrative hearing officer before filing a *de novo* appeal with the magisterial district court. *See* 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.4). It also eliminated the action before the magisterial district judge to collect unpaid fines.

With § 3369 and § 3345.1 nearly identical, the Committee drafted a proposal to rescind Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 351 and incorporate its provisions relating to school bus violation appeals into Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 350. It was the Committee's intent to create a single rule addressing appeal procedures in civil traffic enforcement matters that can accommodate new programs in the future.

One topic where § 3369 and § 3345.1 did not align initially was the time for appealing a case to a magisterial district judge. Section 3369 was silent on the appeal period, while § 3345.1(i.4)(4) provided for a 45-day appeal

period. The Committee believed appeals from hearing officer determinations in both work zone and school bus violation cases should be uniform and proposed a 30-day appeal period for both actions.

The Committee published the proposed amendments at 53 Pa.B. 7725 (December 16, 2023). As published, the proposal included an amendment to Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 381 to suspend 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.4)(4), which provides for a 45-day appeal period from the issuance of the hearing officer determination in a school bus violation appeal, in favor of a 30-day appeal period applicable to both work zone and school bus violations. However, post-publication, the General Assembly further amended the work zone statute, 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4), to allow a vehicle owner 45 days to appeal from a determination of a hearing officer to the magisterial district court. See Act of December 14, 2023, P.L. 344, No. 38, § 2. This eliminated the conflict between the work zone and school bus statutes with respect to the time for appeal.

The Committee considered whether it should recommend suspension of the 45-day appeal period to the Court. While 45 days is beyond the range of most other appeal periods, the Committee could not identify a compelling reason to recommend suspension of the 45-day period and instead require a 30-day appeal period. The Committee was further guided by the Court's recent adoption of amendments to the Rules of Appellate Procedure establishing a 45-day period for a petition for review of a determination by "a criminal justice agency with statewide jurisdiction denying a request for dissemination of criminal history investigative information, in accordance with 18 Pa.C.S. § 9158.4, shall be filed within 45 days after service of the denial." Pa.R.A.P. 1512(b)(4).

Act 38 of 2023 also eliminated a second conflict between the work zone and school bus statutes relating to damage awards to a vehicle owner. There were reports that some of the early school bus appeal cases resulted in monetary judgments for vehicle owners in excess of cost recovery as permitted by Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 206B. In response, the General Assembly added a provision to the school bus statute and, more recently, to the work zone statute limiting the magisterial district judge to finding an owner liable or not liable for violating this section. 75 Pa.C.S. § 3345.1(i.4), 75 Pa.C.S. § 3369(j)(4). As published, the comment to proposed Pa.R.Civ.P.M.D.J. 350 included a cross-reference to § 3345.1(i.4)(4), pertaining to limits on the judgment. Post-publication, a similar cross-reference to § 3369(j)(4) was added to the comment.

These rule changes become effective on August 1, 2024. [Pa.B. Doc. No. 24-787. Filed for public inspection June 7, 2024, 9:00 a.m.]

It Is Ordered that, in accordance with Section 203-F(i)(3) of Act 34 of 2023, and in response to the submission of the Indigent Defense Advisory Committee

(IDAC) as approved by the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD), preliminary standards for the delivery of effective indigent defense services in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania are adopted in the attached form.

These preliminary standards are adopted solely for the purpose of providing guidance to IDAC and PCCD regarding Indigent Defense Grant Program applications submitted in fiscal year 2023-24.

These preliminary standards are aspirational in nature. Adoption of these preliminary standards is not a determination of the constitutionality of Act 34, or any of its provisions, under the Pennsylvania Constitution or the Constitution of the United States, and does not create or determine any legal rights.

This *Order* shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b), and shall be effective immediately.

### TITLE 37. LAW

### PART VI. COMMISSION ON CRIME AND DELINQUENCY

### **CHAPTER 481. INDIGENT DEFENSE**

Subchapter A. Indigent Defense Advisory Committee

### Preliminary Standards for Delivery of Effective Indigent Defense Services

### § 481.21. Standard 1: Funding, structure and oversight.

Where county case volume allows, indigent defense should be a mixed system: primarily dedicated public defender offices, augmented by additional court appointed/conflict counsel to handle overflow and conflict of interest cases. The compensation for lawyers working for public defender offices should be appropriate for and comparable to other publicly funded lawyers. Court appointed/conflict counsel should be paid a reasonable fee, in a timely manner, that reflects the cost of overhead and other office expenses, as well as payment for work. Investigators, social workers, experts and other staff and service providers necessary to indigent defense for all indigent defense providers should also be compensated in a manner consistent with this principle.

### § 481.22. Standard 2: Essential Components of Effective Representation.

Indigent defense providers should adopt a client-centered approach to representation based around a client's needs and working with them to achieve their goals. Indigent defense providers should have the assistance of investigators, social workers, mitigation specialists, experts and other specialized professionals necessary to meet indigent defense needs. Funding for such services should be provided to and controlled by indigent defense providers. Indigent defense providers should address collateral issues that are relevant to their clients' cases. Indigent defense providers can offer direct assistance with such issues or establish collaborations with, or provide referrals to civil legal services organizations, social services providers and other lawyers and non-lawyer professionals.

# Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF CHIROPRACTIC [ 49 PA. CODE CH. 5 ] Fees

The State Board of Chiropractic (Board) and the Acting Commissioner of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Commissioner) amend Chapter 5 (relating to State Board of Chiropractic) by amending §§ 5.6, 5.15 and 5.16 (relating to fees; licensure examinations; and failure on examination; reexamination) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The first graduated increases for application fees will be implemented on the date of publication of this final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, and then subsequently increased a second time on July 1, 2026, and a third time on July 1, 2028.

The increased biennial registration fees will be effective upon publication of this final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, enabling the Board to implement the first increase for the September 2, 2024—September 1, 2026, biennial registration period. This first increase will impact licenses that expire on September 1, 2024. The fee will subsequently increase a second time for the September 2, 2026—September 1, 2028, biennial registration, impacting licenses that expire on September 1, 2026, and then increase a third time for the September 2, 2028—September 1, 2030, biennial registration period, impacting licenses that expire on September 1, 2028, and thereafter.

Statutory Authority

Under section 302(3) of the Chiropractic Practice Act (act) (63 P.S. § 625.302(3)), the Board is authorized to promulgate rules and regulations necessary to carry out the act. Under section 1101(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 625.1101(a)), the Board shall, by regulation, fix the fees required for examination, licensure, renewal of licenses and limited licenses. Section 1101(b) of the act provides that if the revenues raised by fees, fines and civil penalties imposed are not sufficient to meet expenditures over a 2-year period, the Board shall increase those fees by regulation so that the projected revenues will meet or exceed projected expenditures. Additionally, section 502 of the act (63 P.S. § 625.502) provides the nature and content of the examination.

The Commissioner is appointed by the Governor and has a number of powers and duties. Specifically, under section 810(a)(7) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 279.1(a)(7)), the Commissioner has the power and duty, "[u]nless otherwise provided by law, to fix the fees to be charged by the several professional and occupational examining boards within the department."

Background and Need for this Final-Form Rulemaking

This final-form rulemaking increases application fees to reflect updated costs of processing applications and increases the Board's biennial registration fees to ensure its revenue meets or exceeds its current and projected expenses. The Board last increased its fees in 1996.

This final-form rulemaking increases the following application fees on a graduated basis: application for chiropractic licensure by examination; application for chiropractic licensure by reciprocity; application for certification to use adjunctive procedures; and application for continuing education course approval. Approximately 916 applicants will be impacted annually by the increased application fees.

The Board is also implementing a graduated biennial registration fee increase for chiropractors. There are approximately 4,011 licensed chiropractors who will be required to pay more for biennial registration. Chiropractic licenses expire on September 1 of every even numbered year. The first of three graduated biennial registration fee increases will be implemented and in effect for the September 2, 2024—September 1, 2026, biennial registration period.

Finally, this final-form rulemaking eliminates references to the Pennsylvania Chiropractic Law Examination (PCLE), including the PCLE fee, to reflect the Board's current license application procedure. Other health boards under the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau) do not perform this type of testing and the Board no longer believes testing an applicant's knowledge of Pennsylvania law is a necessary component of licensure.

The Board's operations are supported from the revenue it generates through fees, fines and civil penalties. The act provides that the Board shall increase fees when expenditures outpace revenue. The majority of general operating expenses of the Board are borne by the licensee population through revenue generated by the biennial registration of licenses. A small percentage of its revenue comes from application fees, fines and civil penalties. Board expenses are the result of direct charges, timesheet-based charges and licensee-based charges.

The Board receives an annual report from the Department of State's Bureau of Finance and Procurement (BFP) regarding the Board's income and expenses. The BFP presented the following information to the Board at its public meeting on February 24, 2022.

In fiscal years (FY) 2018-2019 and 2019-2020, the Board incurred expenses of \$535,006.75 and \$581,536.81, respectively, and received \$884,530.72 and \$43,090.33 in revenue, respectively. In other words, over that 2-year time frame, the Board's total expenses (\$1,116,543.56) outpaced its total revenue (\$927,621.05) by \$188,922.51. The Board's overall remaining balance at the end of FY 2019-2020 was \$1,685,626.02.

In FYs 2020-2021 and 2021-2022, the Board's expenses were \$563,936.23 and \$540,000 (projected), respectively, with revenues of \$854,455.90 and \$43,000 (projected), respectively. In other words, over that 2-year time frame, the Board's total expenses (\$1,103,936.23) outpaced its total revenue (\$897,455.90) by \$206,480.33. The Board's overall remaining balance at the end of FY 2021-2022 was \$1,479,145.69.

In FYs 2022-2023 and 2023-2024, the Board's expenses were projected to be \$581,000 and \$556,000, respectively, with revenues projected to be \$890,000 and \$43,000, respectively, meaning for that 2-year time frame, the Board's total expenses (\$1,137,000) are projected to out-

pace its total revenue (\$933,000) by \$204,000. The Board's overall remaining balance at the end of FY 2023-2024 is projected to be \$1,275,145.69.

According to the BFP's projections, if the Board were to keep its current fee structure in place (no increases for any of its fees), the Board's annual revenue would remain at \$933,000 for each of the next 6 years. However, its expenses are projected to grow each year, so that the amount the Board would be spending above and beyond its revenue would become increasingly larger each successive year. The Board's projected revenue would fall short of meeting its expenses by \$238,000 in FY 2024-2025/FY 2025-2026, then by \$273,000 in FY 2026-2027/FY 2027-2028, and then by \$309,000 in FY 2028-2029/FY 2029-2030. Those projections also show a significant reduction in the Board's overall remaining balance, which by the end of FY 2029-2030 would be down to \$455,145.

Given that its revenues generated by fees, fines and civil penalties are not sufficient to meet expenditures over a 2-year period, the Board voted on February 24, 2022, to adopt the proposed graduated fee increases for application and biennial registration fees contained in the BFP's report.

Summary of Comments and the Board's Response

Notice of the proposed rulemaking was published at 53 Pa.B. 4420 (August 5, 2023). The Board received comments from the Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association (PCA) and the American Chiropractic Association (ACA). The Board did not receive any comments from the Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC) of the Senate or the Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) of the House of Representatives. The Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) reviewed the proposed rulemaking and provided comments and recommendations as well.

PCA, the ACA and IRRC commented on § 5.6(a), specifically the proposed fee for "continuing education course approval" which will incrementally increase the current fee of \$30 per application to \$100 for FY 2024-2025 and FY 2025-2026, to \$110 for FY 2026-2027 and 2027-2028, and finally to \$120 for FY 2028-2029 and thereafter. Each year, the Board receives approximately 600 applications for approval of continuing education courses (or about 1,200 biennially). Accordingly, the proposed fee increases will generate additional revenue as follows:

FY 2024-2025 through FY 2025-2026: The fee increase from \$30 to \$100 will generate an additional \$84,000 in fees as compared to FY 2022-2023 through FY 2023-2024.

FY 2026-2027 through FY 2027-2028: The fee increase from \$100 to \$110 will generate an additional \$12,000 in fees as compared to FY 2024-2025 through FY 2025-2026.

FY 2028-2029 through FY 2029-2030: The fee increase from \$110 to \$120 will generate an additional \$12,000 in fees as compared to FY 2026-2027 through FY 2027-2028.

PCA commented that the fee increase should be reflected in a "tiered manner" specific to "per credit" ranges, as opposed to "per course" (or "per application"). IRRC requested that the Board address PCA's comment and explain why the Board's proposed fees are reasonable. For the following reasons, the Board is not amending § 5.6(a) in this final-form rulemaking: (1) this final-form rulemaking increases application fees to reflect updated costs

of processing an application; and (2) to adopt PCA's proposed "per credit" approach would deviate from the Bureau's standard "per application" approach, which would require some applicants to pay more to submit the application than it would cost the Bureau to process the application. The cost to the Bureau to process an application for approval of a program of continuing chiropractic education is approximately the same regardless of the length of the course itself. It is Bureau policy that an applicant pay the approximate cost to the Bureau to process that specific application. It would be inequitable to charge an applicant (for example) \$50 to process an application for a 1-hour course that costs the Bureau \$100 to process; or to charge an applicant \$150 to process an application for a 3-hour course that only costs the Bureau \$100 to review.

When the BFP determines that the Board's fees must be increased to cover its costs of operation, the BFP calculates the true cost to the Board'Bureau to process each application, and this calculation is provided to the Board in "fee report forms" generated by the BFP. With respect to the Board's fee for "Application for Continuing Education Program," the BFP presented the Board with the following information and recommendation:

### Fee Objective:

The fee should (1) offset the identifiable costs incurred by the Board to process an application and (2) defray a portion of the Board's administrative overhead.

Fee-Related Activities and Costs:

Analysis, Comment and Recommendation:

It is recommended that a fee of \$100 be established for processing an application for the Continuing Education Program.

Accordingly, the Board has adopted the BFP's recommendation and increases its application fees to reflect the updated costs of processing these applications. Therefore, the Board is not amending § 5.6(a) in this final-form rulemaking.

PCA also commented that "90 days lead time to approve [continuing education applications] is far too long." Section 507(c) of the act (63 P.S. § 625.507(c)) provides that continuing education course providers submit to the Board, in writing, the information detailed in section 507(c)(1)—(3) at least 90 days prior to the date on which the program is scheduled to be presented. Accordingly, § 5.73(a) (relating to application for approval of continuing education courses; attendance certificates) provides that continuing education course providers submit applications for course approval with the required fee to the Board at least 90 days prior to the scheduled date of the program. Therefore, because the 90 days "lead time" is a statutory requirement, the Board cannot deviate from this requirement in its regulations.

The ACA commented that the proposed fee for "continuing education course approval" will make the delivery of affordable, quality, approved continuing education credits

to licensed Doctors of Chiropractic in the Commonwealth a cost-prohibitive undertaking. Additionally, the ACA proposed the Board consider the continuing education models of several other states, namely Colorado, Delaware and Illinois, described by the ACA as "where the rules, regulations, or administrative codes of each state promulgate the standards of acceptable, board-approved continuing education courses or credits, the subject areas that should be covered, and the responsibility of the licensee to select courses that align with these standards." IRRC requested that the Board address the ACA's alternative approach and explain why the proposed fees are reasonable.

In this Commonwealth, as a condition of biennial renewal, under section 507(a) of the act licensees must complete at least 24 hours of continuing chiropractic education within the immediately preceding 2-year period, and under section 507(b) of the act licensees may receive credit for only those hours of continuing chiropractic education in programs approved by the Board and for only those hours directed toward keeping the licensee apprised of advancements and new developments in chiropractic which build upon the basic courses required to practice chiropractic. However, while the Board is empowered to approve continuing education programs, section 507(c) and (d) of the act, specify:

- (c) Application by sponsors.—Prior to receiving board approval for a program of continuing chiropractic education, a sponsor shall submit to the board, in writing, the following information at least 90 days prior to the date on which the program is scheduled to be presented:
  - (1) Evidence that the sponsor's program would be directed toward keeping the licensee apprised of advancements and new developments in chiropractic which build upon the basic courses required to practice chiropractic and which are in the areas specified in subsection (b).
  - (2) A detailed course outline or syllabus, including such items as methods of instruction and testing materials, if any.
  - (3) A current curriculum vitae of each instructor, speaker or lecturer appearing in the program.
- (d) Action on application.—The board shall notify each sponsor, in writing, of approval or disapproval of the application within 45 days of the receipt of the application. If an application is disapproved, the board shall detail the reasons for disapproval in order that the sponsor may cure any defect and submit an amended application in a timely manner.

Accordingly, while the act affords the Board a great deal of latitude to determine what constitutes acceptable continuing education, the act also requires that sponsors of continuing education submit written applications for continuing education program approval to the Board at least 90 days prior to the date on which the program is scheduled to be presented.

The relevant Colorado statute (C.R.S. § 12-215-113) directs the Colorado board to prepare an annual educational schedule of minimum postgraduate requirements, and the Colorado board's regulations (3 CCR 707-1:1.10(D)) state that a licensee is responsible for ensuring that continuing education courses comply with the requirements and section 12-215-113, C.R.S., which requires that each licensed chiropractor complete (biennially) 30 hours of scientific clinics, forums, or chiropractic educational study consisting of subjects basic to the field

of the healing arts. Moreover, the regulations indicate that the Colorado board does not pre-approve continuing education courses, curriculum or programs. Accordingly, like section 507(b) of the act, the Colorado statute affords the Colorado board a great deal of latitude to determine what constitutes acceptable continuing education. However, unlike section 507(c) and (d) of the act which provide that sponsors of continuing education receive Board approval for each program of continuing chiropractic education, the Colorado board shifts the burden to the licensees to ensure that continuing education courses comply with the requirements.

The relevant Delaware statute (24 Del.C. § 706(a)(10)) empowers the Delaware board to provide for the rules for continuing education, and the Delaware board's regulations require that licensees complete 24 hours of approved CE during each biennial licensing period (24 Del. Admin. Code 700-2.1), and that those continuing education courses contribute directly to the competency of a person licensed to practice as a chiropractor (24 Del. Admin. Code 700-2.1.8). Furthermore, the regulations indicate that courses co-sponsored by accredited chiropractic colleges, National or states organizations are presumptively approved (24 Del. Admin. Code 700-2.1.7). Accordingly, like section 507(b) of the act, the Delaware statute affords the Delaware board a great deal of latitude to determine what constitutes acceptable continuing education. However, unlike section 507(c) and (d) of the act which provide that sponsors of continuing education receive Board approval for each program of continuing chiropractic education, the Delaware board has "pre-approved" courses co-sponsored by accredited chiropractic colleges, National or states organizations.

The relevant Illinois statute (225 ILCS 60/20) directs the Illinois board to promulgate rules of continuing education which require that licensees complete an average of 50 hours of continuing education per license year, and the statute requires that the rules assure that licensees are given the opportunity to participate in those programs sponsored by or through their professional associations or hospitals which are relevant to their practice. The relevant rule (68 Ill. Adm. Code 1285.110(b)) allows licensees to obtain continuing education credit hours by completing formal continuing education programs conducted or endorsed by hospitals, specialty societies, medical, chiropractic or osteopathic colleges, schools or education programs, or specialty boards and professional associations. Accordingly, like section 507(b) of the act, the Illinois statute affords the Illinois board a great deal of latitude to determine what constitutes acceptable continuing education. However, unlike section 507(c) and (d) of the act which provide that sponsors of continuing education receive Board approval for each program of continuing chiropractic education, the Illinois board is required to accept continuing education programs sponsored by or through professional associations or hospitals. The Illinois board expanded the list of "pre-approved" providers of continuing education through its regulations.

Ultimately, to sum it all up, the Colorado board is empowered to shift the burden to licensees to ensure that continuing education courses comply with the requirements; the Board is not. The Delaware and Illinois boards are empowered to "pre-approve" sponsors or providers of continuing education programs; the Board is not.

Due to the specific application requirements set forth in section 507(c) and (d) of the act, the Board is not empowered to adopt the continuing education models of Colorado, Delaware or Illinois. Consequently, the Board

has not amended this final-form rulemaking and finds the fee to be reasonable given the costs incurred by the Board to process an application for continuing education program approval. It would be inequitable to expect licensees of the Board to underwrite the costs of approval of continuing education programs through their biennial registration fees. In addition, a \$100 fee for approval of a continuing education course is comparable to the fees paid by other professions under the Bureau. For example, the State Board of Massage Therapy's regulation at § 20.3 (relating to fees) sets forth a \$100 fee for approval of a continuing education program; the State Board of Podiatry's regulation at § 29.13 (relating to fees) sets forth a fee of \$75 for applications for approval of educational conference; and the State Board of Veterinary Medicine's regulation at § 31.41 (relating to fees) is being amended to increase its fee for application for continuing education program approval from \$35 to \$108. As each of these boards also set their fees based on the cost of processing the application for approval, and these fees are fairly comparable, the Board finds the \$100 fee to be

### Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The amendments will increase application and biennial registration fees on a graduated basis. Applicants, licensees and registrants will be required to comply with this final-form rulemaking. The fees may be paid by applicants, licensees or registrants or may be paid by their employers, should their employers choose to pay these fees. This final-form rulemaking should have no other fiscal impact on the private sector, the general public or political subdivisions of the Commonwealth.

Approximately 916 applicants will be impacted by the increased application fees. Specifically, the number of applicants affected are as follows: 175 applications for licensure by exam; 15 applications for licensure by reciprocity; 126 applications for certification to use adjunctive procedure; and 600 applications for continuing education course approvals.

Based upon the graduated application fee increases, the total economic impact is as follows:

FYs 2024-2025 and 2025-2026: \$134,710 FYs 2026-2027 and 2027-2028: \$18,440 FYs 2028-2029 and 2029-2030: \$19,102

Total: \$172,252

Licensed chiropractors will be impacted by the increased biennial registration fees. Based upon the above graduated increases, the economic impact is as follows:

FYs 2024-2025 and 2025-2026: \$57,150 FYs 2026-2027 and 2027-2028: \$60,960 FYs 2028-2029 and 2029-2030: \$64,770

Total: \$182,880

Thus, the total economic impact to applicants, licensees, registrants or employers (if employers choose to pay application or biennial registration fees) is \$355,132. This amount reflects the economic impact that will occur as a result of the fee increases between FY 2024-2025 and FY 2029-2030.

This final-form rulemaking will require the Board revise certain applications and biennial registration forms to reflect the new fees; however, the amendments will not create additional paperwork for the regulated community or for the private sector.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned. Additionally, the BFP provides the Board with an annual report detailing the Board's financial condition. In this way, the Board continuously monitors the adequacy of its fee schedule.

### Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on July 25, 2023, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 53 Pa.B. 4420 and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to IRRC and to the chairperson of the SCP/PLC and chairperson of the HPLC. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S.  $\S$  745.5(c)), the Board shall submit to IRRC, the SCP/PLC and the HPLC, copies of comments received as well as other documents when requested. In preparing this final-form regulation, the Board has considered all comments from IRRC, the SCP/PLC, the HPLC and the public.

Under section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)), on March 15, 2024, the Board delivered this final-form rulemaking to IRRC, the SCP/PLC and the HPLC. Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulation Review Act, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the SCP/PLC and the HPLC on April 17, 2024. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on April 18, 2024, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

#### **Findings**

The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202), referred to as the Commonwealth Documents Law, and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2 (relating to notice of proposed rulemaking required; and adoption of regulations).
- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments received were considered in drafting this final-form rulemaking.
- (3) The amendments to this final-form rulemaking do not enlarge the original purpose of the proposed rulemaking published at 53 Pa.B. 4420.
- (4) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for the administration of the act.

### Order

The Board, therefore, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 5, are amended by amending §§ 5.6, 5.15 and 5.16 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.
- (b) The Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to IRRC, the SCP/PLC and the HPLC as required by law.

- (d) The Board shall certify this final-form rulemaking and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (e) This final-form rule making shall take effect immediately upon publication in the  $Pennsylvania\ Bulletin.$

### § 5.16. Failure on examination; reexamination.

- (a) An applicant who fails one or more of the National Board Examinations is eligible for reexamination in accordance with the rules and regulations of the NBCE.

# Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

### STATE BOARD OF CERTIFIED REAL ESTATE APPRAISERS

[ 49 PA. CODE CH. 36 ] Federally Mandated Revisions

The State Board of Certified Real Estate Appraisers (Board) amends Chapter 36, Subchapter A (relating to general provisions) by amending §§ 36.41 and 36.91 (relating to continuing education requirement; and reactivation of lapsed certification) and Subchapter E (relating to appraisal management companies) by amending § 36.412 (relating to qualifications of owners and key persons) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This final-omitted rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Regarding the continuing education component of this final-omitted rulemaking, section 5(1) of the Real Estate Appraisers Certification Act (act or REACA) (63 P.S. § 457.5(1)) authorizes the Board "[t]o pass upon the qualifications and fitness of applicants for certification or licensure and to adopt and revise rules and regulations requiring applicants for certification to pass examinations relating to their qualifications for certification." Under section 5(2) of the act, the Board is empowered "[t]o adopt and, from time to time, revise such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this act." Under section 6 of the act (63 P.S. § 457.6), the Board is authorized to issue certificates to real estate appraisers that meet the minimum education and experience requirements established by the Appraiser Qualifications Board (AQB) under the Financial Institutions Reform, Recovery and Enforcement Act of 1989 (FIRREA) (Pub.L. No. 101-73, 103 Stat. 183), as amended (12 U.S.C. §§ 3331—3356). Under section 10(b), (b.1) and (b.2) of the act (63 P.S. § 457.10(b), (b.1) and (b.2)), continuing education is a condition of biennial renewal for certified residential and general appraisers, certified broker/ appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees if, and only to the minimum extent, required under FIRREA.

Regarding the qualifications of owners and key persons amendments in this final-omitted rulemaking, section 4(a) of the Appraisal Management Company Registration Act (AMCRA) (63 P.S. § 457.24(a)) authorizes the Board to implement, administer and enforce the act, including the power to adopt rules and regulations consistent with the act. Title XI of the FIRREA at 12 U.S.C. § 3353 requires the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC), the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), the National Credit Union Administration (NCUA), Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (Bureau) and Federal Housing Finance Agency (FHFA), to establish minimum requirements to be applied by states in the registration and supervision of appraisal management companies (AMC), regarding AMC minimum requirements. Under this authority, these Federal agencies jointly adopted regulations establishing the minimum requirements for AMCs found at 12 CFR 34.210-34.216, 12 CFR 225.190—225.196, 12 CFR 323.8—323.14 and 12 CFR 1222.20—1222.26.

Omission of Proposed Rulemaking

Under section 204(3) of the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL) (45 P.S. § 1204(3)), the Board is authorized to omit the procedures for proposed rulemaking in section 201 and 202 of the CDL (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) if the Board finds that the specified procedures are impracticable, unnecessary or contrary to the public interest. The Board has determined that publication of proposed rulemaking is unnecessary under the circumstances because this final-omitted rulemaking is needed to comply with recently adopted AQB requirements concerning appraiser training on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations, a recently adopted name change of the 7-hour National Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice (USPAP) Update Course and applicable Federal law concerning AMC ownership limitations.

Background and Need for the Amendments

FIRREA is the Federal legislation that established the broad framework by which state appraiser regulatory bodies are to credential real estate appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees. The Appraisal Subcommittee (ASC) was created as a result of Title XI of FIRREA to provide Federal oversight for all appraiser programs of every state appraiser regulatory agency in the United States. See 12 U.S.C. § 3310. As required under 12 U.S.C. § 3332(b), the ASC monitors and reviews the practices, procedures, activities and organizational structure of the Appraisal Foundation. The AQB and the Appraisal Standards Board (ASB) are independent boards that are under the umbrella of the Appraisal Foundation. The Appraisal Foundation, through the AQB, is charged under FIRREA with establishing the minimum initial education, continuing education, examination and experience requirements for state-credentialed appraisers. These minimum qualification criteria are binding on the Board. Additionally, under Title IX of FIRREA, the ASB is responsible for writing, amending and interpreting the USPAP, which provides the generally recognized ethical and performance standards for the appraisal profession in the United States.

Regarding the continuing education component of this final-omitted rulemaking, all State appraiser programs must meet the minimum Federal standards that are established by the AQB for continuing education, as well as the standards set forth in USPAP. The AQB publishes the Federal minimum requirements for real property appraisers in the Real Property Appraiser Qualification Criteria (Criteria) (AQB Qualification Criteria) found at https://appraisalfoundation.sharefile.com/share/view/s63f99dc2b9f241e0b3fd1645f7b63680.

In June of 2021, the Biden Administration created the Interagency Task Force on Property Appraisal and Valuation Equity (PAVE) which is dedicated to ending bias in property valuation. The PAVE Task Force is co-chaired by Marcia Fudge, Secretary of the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and Neera Tanden, Director, White House Domestic Policy Council (DPC). The PAVE Task Force is comprised of 13 Federal agencies, including the ASC, HUD, DPC, Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, the Bureau, FDIC, FHFA, NCUA, OCC, United States Department of Agriculture, United States Department of Justice, United States Department of Labor and United States Department of Veterans Affairs. On March 31, 2022, the PAVE Task Force issued an action plan which outlined the historical role of racism in the valuation of residential property, examined the forms of bias that could impact

property valuation, and described affirmative steps that Federal agencies should take to advance equity in the appraisal process.

The AQB engaged the appraiser community Nationwide by releasing exposure drafts and soliciting written and verbal comments. On January 31, 2023, the AQB released the First Exposure Draft of Proposed Changes to the Real Property Appraiser Qualification Criteria, which can be found at https://appraisalfoundation.sharefile.com/share/view/sad153ab0d1f94d208860a41be6268580/fo691e7b-5fc0-4a99-ac55-82dbcb621eba.

The proposed changes included valuation bias and fair housing as a required component of an appraiser's qualifying and continuing education. The written comment period was open between January 31, 2023, through March 13, 2023. At its virtual public meeting on March 22, 2023, the AQB discussed the written comments received and entertained additional verbal comments. For the most part, the commentors expressed support for the changes. There was concern that the implementation date for the valuation bias and fair housing course did not provide sufficient time for states to implement it because of the various rulemaking processes of each state. Additionally, some appraisers questioned why the course was required for all appraisers and suggested that the course only be required for appraisers who performed residential appraisal assignments and for appraisers that have been identified as being deficient in understanding valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations.

At the conclusion of the March 22, 2023, public meeting, the AQB voted to release a second exposure draft. In drafting the Second Exposure Draft of Proposed Changes to the Criteria (Second Exposure Draft), the AQB considered comments received in response to the First Exposure Draft of Proposed Changes to the Criteria (First Exposure Draft), recognizing that the First Exposure Draft did not take into consideration the rulemaking processes of the different states. Regarding the question as to why everyone had to take the course, the AQB emphasized the importance for all appraisers being trained on valuation bias and fair housing issues. The Second Exposure Draft which can be found at https://appraisalfoundation.sharefile. com/share/view/sad153ab0d1f94d208860a41be6268580/ fo691e7b-5fc0-4a99-ac55-82dbcb621eba, was released on May 17, 2023. The written comment period was open from May 17, 2023, through June 17, 2023. At its virtual public meeting on June 22, 2023, the AQB discussed the written comments received and entertained additional verbal comments. At the conclusion of the June 22, 2023, public meeting, the AQB voted to adopt the Second Exposure Draft. The AQB announcement regarding the adoption of the changes to the AQB Criteria was posted on the Board's web site on June 27, 2023, was sent out to all licensees as an e-mail blast on June 27, 2023, and was announced at the July 27, 2023, Board meeting as required under § 36.2(f) (relating to application process) of the Board's regulations.

The Second Exposure Draft makes training on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations a required component of every appraiser's qualifying and continuing education. Credentialed appraisers must successfully complete a course which meets the content requirements of the AQB's valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations course outline every 2 calendar years. The first time an appraiser completes the continuing education course, it must be a 7-hour course. If an appraiser has successfully completed a 7-hour (plus 1-hour exam) course as part of their qualifying education, the 7-hour

course length requirement is satisfied. After the 7-hour course length requirement is satisfied, appraisers are required to take a valuation bias and fair housing law and regulations course that is at least 4 hours in length as a condition of renewal.

The changes to the AQB Qualification Criteria will be effective as of January 1, 2026, to ensure that each state appraiser regulatory agency has time to complete their respective rulemaking process to adopt these Federal requirements. The AQB is encouraging state regulatory agencies, however, to implement these changes as soon as their regulatory process is completed. The Board reviewed its current regulations; the AQB Qualification Criteria is adopted and incorporated by reference throughout the Board's regulations. Specifically, under § 36.42 (relating to subject matter and sources of continuing education), the Board's regulations require that continuing education subject matter and sources must comply with the requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria. Heeding the advice of the AQB that state appraiser regulatory agencies should implement the changes as soon as possible, the Board determined that it should amend the regulations as soon as possible to ensure that the regulated community is aware of the specific time frame by which all appraisers in this Commonwealth must complete their 7-hour continuing education course on valuation bias and fair housing. The regulations would be amended to reflect the AQB Criteria and would require appraisers in this Commonwealth and licensed appraiser trainees to complete the 7-hour continuing education course beginning with the 2025—2027 biennial renewal period as a condition of renewal of certification or licensure. Every biennial renewal period thereafter, appraisers and trainees will be required to take the continuing education course that is at least 4 hours in length. The Board's amendments in this final-omitted rulemaking will put the Board in compliance with the Federally required continuing education requirements.

The AQB also adopted a name change for the 7-hour National USPAP Update Course; it is now the 7-hour National USPAP Continuing Education Course. This final-omitted rulemaking updates the Board's regulation to reflect this name change.

Regarding the component of this final-omitted rulemaking addressing qualifications of owners of appraisal management companies, during a recent audit, the ASC advised the Board that § 36.412(b) of the Board's AMC regulations is inconsistent with the Federal standard under 12 CFR 34.214(a)(1) and (2) (relating to ownership limitations for State-registered appraisal management companies) regarding AMC ownership limitations. Thus, the Board must amend its regulation regarding the qualifications of owners and key persons to be in compliance with Federal regulations. Section 36.412(b) of the Board's AMC regulations currently states that "[a]n individual may not be an owner or key person of an AMC if the individual had a license or certificate refused, denied, cancelled, suspended or revoked or if they voluntarily surrendered a license or certificate, unless the license or certificate was subsequently granted or reinstated to the individual[.]" Under 12 CFR 34.214(a)(1), a state may not register an AMC that is "... owned by any person who has had an appraiser license or certificate refused, denied, cancelled, surrendered in lieu of revocation, or revoked in any State for a substantive cause, as determined by the appropriate State appraiser certifying and licensing agency." Under 12 CFR 34.214(a)(2), however, an individual is not disqualified from becoming an owner of an AMC if the Board determines that the individual's license

or certificate was not revoked for a substantive cause and the individual's license or certificate was reinstated by the state in which the individual was licensed or certified. The AMC Final Rule on Minimum Requirements for Appraisal Management Companies published at 80 FR 32658 (June 9, 2015) (AMC Final Rule) addresses the difference between a substantive and technical licensing violation. A substantive cause is a non-technical violation that would include license violations such as fraud. violations of the Truth in Lending Act (15 U.S.C. §§ 1601-1667f) and failure to perform an appraisal in compliance with USPAP. Technical violations are procedural or administrative in nature and would not be related to the quality of appraisals or fraudulent conduct, but rather, would include violations such as lapsed licenses and non-payment of fees or penalties.

### Description of the Amendments

The Board is amending § 36.41 to require completion of an AQB-compliant course on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations as a condition of renewal of certification or licensure, beginning with the 2025—2027 biennial renewal period. The first time certified real estate appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees take the AQB-compliant course on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations, the course length must be 7 hours. If the certified real estate appraiser or licensed appraiser trainee successfully completed a 7-hour (plus 1-hour exam) course as part of their qualifying education, they have satisfied this requirement.

Licensees that have satisfied the 7-hour course length requirement shall complete an AQB-compliant continuing education course of at least 4 hours on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations as a condition of renewal of certification or licensure.

The Board is amending § 36.91 by deleting the term "Update" and replacing it with "Continuing Education." The phrase "7-hour National USPAP Update Course" will, therefore, become "7-hour National USPAP Continuing Education Course."

Section 36.412(a) currently states that an individual may not be an owner or key person if they are disqualified from eligibility to be certified or licensed under REACA. Section 36.412(b) states that a person is disqualified from eligibility to be certified or licensed under REACA if the individual had a license or certificate refused, denied, cancelled, suspended or revoked or voluntarily surrendered a license or certificate, unless the license or certificate has been subsequently granted or reinstated to the individual. The Board is amending its regulations by adding § 36.412(b.1), which only applies to owners. Section 36.412(b.1) is the same standard contained in § 36.412(b), except that § 36.412(b.1) includes the Federal standard under 12 CFR 34.214(a)(1) and (2) regarding AMC ownership limitations. Accordingly, under § 36.412(b.1), an individual is not disqualified from becoming an owner of an AMC if the individual's license or certificate was not revoked for a substantive cause and the individual's license or certificate was reinstated by the state in which the individual was licensed or certified. The Board also amends § 36.412(b) to clarify that subsection (b) applies to key persons since § 36.412(b.1) now addresses ownership qualifications.

### Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This final-omitted rulemaking will have no fiscal impact on the regulated community. Appraisers and appraiser trainees are required to complete 28 hours of continuing education every 2 years as a condition of

biennial license renewal. The continuing education course on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations will fall within the 28 hours that are already required and, therefore, will not pose an additional cost to licensees. Additionally, the amendments to the AMC regulations will not have a fiscal impact.

This final-omitted rulemaking will not have a fiscal impact and will not create additional paperwork for the general public or the Commonwealth's political subdivisions.

#### Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the effectiveness of the regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

### Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(c)), on April 9, 2024 the Board submitted copies of the final-omitted rulemaking with a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the chairperson of the Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee of the Senate (SPC/PLC) and the chairperson of the Professional Licensure Committee of the House of Representatives (HPLC). On the same date, the Board submitted a copy of the final-omitted rulemaking to the Office of Attorney General under section 204(b) of the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P.S. § 732-204(b)).

Under sections 5.1(e) and (j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(e) and (j.2)), the regulations were deemed approved by the SPC/PLC and the HPLC on May 15, 2024, and IRRC met on May 16, 2024, and approved the final-omitted rulemaking.

### **Findings**

### The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of the Board's intention to amend the Board's regulations under the procedures in sections 201 and 202 of the Commonwealth Documents Law (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) has been omitted under section 204 of the CDL (45 P.S. § 1204) because publication of proposed rulemaking and public comment is unnecessary in that the rulemaking is needed to comply with recently adopted AQB Federal requirements concerning appraiser training on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations, to comply with the recently adopted name change of the 7-hour National USPAP Update Course, and to comply with applicable Federal law concerning AMC ownership limitations.
- (2) The promulgation of the regulations in the manner provided in this order is necessary to comply with Federal law and for the administration of the Real Estate Appraisers Certification Act (63 P.S. §§ 457.1—457.20) and the Appraisal Management Company Registration Act (63 P.S. §§ 457.21—457.32).

### Order

The Board, acting under its authorizing statute, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 36 are amended by amending §§ 36.41, 36.91 and 36.412, to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Board shall submit this final-omitted rule-making to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall submit this final-omitted rule-making to IRRC, the HPLC and the SPC/PLC as required by law.

### CHAPTER 36. STATE BOARD OF CERTIFIED REAL ESTATE APPRAISERS

## Subchapter A. GENERAL PROVISIONS CONTINUING EDUCATION

### § 36.41. Continuing education requirement.

- (a) Continuing education for certified real estate appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees is necessary to ensure that they maintain and increase their skill, knowledge and competency in real estate appraising. Except as provided in subsection (b), certified real estate appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees shall satisfy the continuing education requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria, which must include at least 2 hours on the act, this chapter and the policies of the Board during each biennial renewal period as a condition of renewal of certification for the next biennial renewal period.
- (a.1) Beginning with the renewal of certification or licensure for the 2025—2027 biennial renewal period, certified real estate appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees shall provide evidence of completion of an AQB-compliant course on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations as a condition of renewal of certification or licensure. The following apply:
- (1) 7-hour course length requirement. The first time a certified real estate appraiser or licensed appraiser trainee completes the AQB-compliant course on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations referenced in this subsection, the course length must be 7 hours. If a certified real estate appraiser or licensed appraiser trainee successfully completed a 7-hour (plus 1-hour exam) course as part of their qualifying education, the 7-hour course length requirement is satisfied.
- (2) 4-hour course length requirement. A certified real estate appraiser or licensed appraiser trainee who has satisfied the 7-hour course length requirement shall, as a condition of renewal of certification or licensure, complete

- an AQB-compliant continuing education course of at least 4 hours on valuation bias and fair housing laws and regulations.
- (b) A certified general real estate appraiser, residential real estate appraiser or licensed appraiser trainee whose initial certification or license becomes effective between January 1 and June 30 of a biennial renewal year will not be required to furnish proof of continuing education as a condition of renewal of certification in that biennial renewal year.

#### MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

### § 36.91. Reactivation of lapsed certification.

A certified real estate appraiser whose certification has lapsed for failure to biennially renew certification may apply to the Board for reactivation of certification by paying the renewal fee required under § 36.6 (relating to fees) and providing documentation of having completed the continuing education hours that would have been required under § 36.41 (relating to continuing education requirement) if the certified real estate appraiser had maintained current certification, except that only the most recent versions of the 7-hour National USPAP Continuing Education Course and the 2-hour course on the act, this chapter and Board policies must be completed. A certified real estate appraiser who performed an appraisal, or held himself out as an appraiser, during a period when his certification was lapsed shall be subject to disciplinary action by the Board under section 3 of the act (63 P.S. § 457.3) in addition to being required to pay late renewal fees under section 225 of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs Fee Act (63 P.S. § 1401-225).

### REGISTRATION

### § 36.412. Qualifications of owners and key persons.

- (a) A person who would be disqualified from eligibility to be certified or licensed under REACA as defined in subsections (b) and (b.1) may not be an owner or a key person.
- (b) An individual would be disqualified from eligibility to be certified or licensed under REACA, as provided in section 8(d)(1) of AMCRA (63 P.S. § 457.28(d)(1)), and may not be a key person if the individual had a license or certificate refused, denied, cancelled, suspended or revoked, or voluntarily surrendered a license or certificate under any of the following provisions of REACA or CHRIA, or similar provision of another jurisdiction, unless the license or certificate has been subsequently granted or reinstated to the individual:
  - (1) Section 3 of REACA (63 P.S. § 457.3).
  - (2) Section 6(c)(1) of REACA (63 P.S. § 457.6(c)(1)).
  - (3) Section 11 of REACA (63 P.S. § 457.11).
- (4) Section 9124(c)(1) or (2) of CHRIA (18 Pa.C.S. § 9124(c)(1) and (2) (relating to use of records by licensing agencies)).
- (b.1) An individual would be disqualified from eligibility to be certified or licensed under REACA and may not be an owner if the individual had a license or certificate refused, denied, cancelled, suspended or revoked, or voluntarily surrendered a license or certificate under any of the following provisions of REACA or CHRIA, or similar provision of another jurisdiction, unless the Board determines that the individual's license or certificate was not

revoked for a substantive cause and the license or certificate has been subsequently reinstated to the individual:

- (1) Section 3 of REACA (63 P.S. § 457.3).
- (2) Section 6(c)(1) of REACA (63 P.S. § 457.6(c)(1)).
- (3) Section 11 of REACA (63 P.S. § 457.11).
- (4) Section 9124(c)(1) or (2) of CHRIA (18 Pa.C.S. § 9124(c)(1) and (2) (relating to use of records by licensing agencies)).
- (c) Nothing in AMCRA or this subchapter may be construed as a requirement that an owner or a key person shall possess the education or experience required by the AQB or REACA for certification or licensure.
- (d) A person who has been suspended or revoked, or has voluntarily surrendered a license under RELRA, 7 Pa.C.S. Chapter 61 (relating to Mortgage Licensing Act) or sections 301—318 of the Mortgage Bankers and Brokers and Consumer Equity Protection Act (63 P.S. §§ 456.301—456.318) (repealed) may not be an owner or key person.
- (e) The Board may consider a disqualifying violation described in subsection (b) if the individual's license or certificate has been subsequently reinstated or granted in determining whether the individual possesses good moral character as required under section 5(c)(4) of AMCRA (63 P.S. § 457.25(c)(4)).

### STATE BOARD OF MEDICINE [49 PA. CODE CH. 16]

### Conversion Therapy—Statement of Policy

The State Board of Medicine (Board) adds § 16.63 (relating to conversion therapy, sexual orientation change efforts and reparative therapy—statement of policy) to read as set forth in Annex A. This statement of policy is intended to provide guidance to Board-regulated practitioners and the general public.

Effective Date

This statement of policy will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 41(8) of the Medical Practice Act of 1985 (act) (63 P.S. § 422.41(8)) authorizes the Board to impose disciplinary or corrective measures on Board-regulated practitioners, including medical doctors, for being guilty of immoral or unprofessional conduct. Unprofessional conduct shall include departure from or failing to conform to an ethical or quality standard of the profession. Under section 3(g) of the Acupuncture Licensure Act (63 P.S. § 1803(g)), acupuncturists licensed with the Board are subject to all disciplinary provisions applicable to medical doctors as set forth in the act.

Section 102 of the Commonwealth Documents Law (45 P.S. § 1102) defines "statement of policy" as "any document, except an adjudication or a regulation, promulgated by an agency which sets forth substantive or procedural personal or property rights, privileges, immunities, duties, liabilities or obligations of the public or any part thereof, and includes, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, any document interpreting or implementing any act of Assembly enforced or administered by such agency." Statements of policy that are general and permanent in nature are required to be codified under 1 Pa. Code § 3.1 (relating to contents of *Code*).

#### Background and Purpose

The Commonwealth has a compelling interest in protecting the physical and psychological well-being of minors, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, intersex and asexual (LGBTQIA+) youths, and in protecting minors against exposure to the severe harms caused by conversion therapy. Likewise, the Board has an interest in and a duty to protect the public from practices that create a danger for patients and is dutybound to enforce the provisions of the act and its regulations. These duties compel the Board to take steps to guard against the dangers posed by conversion therapy.

Conversion therapy, also known as sexual orientation change efforts or reparative therapy, is a term that describes a wide range of interventions by mental health professionals that seek to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender expression, including efforts to change behaviors, gender identity or gender expressions, or to reduce or eliminate sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward an individual of the same gender. The term does not include counseling for an individual seeking to transition from one gender to another; counseling

that provides acceptance, support and understanding of an individual or facilitates an individual's coping; social support and identity exploration and development, including sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices; or counseling that does not seek to change sexual orientation.

Conversion therapy can pose critical health risks to LGBTQIA+ people, including suicidality, substance abuse, confusion, depression, guilt, helplessness, hopelessness, shame, social withdrawal, stress, disappointment, self-blame, decreased self-esteem and authenticity to others, increased self-hatred, hostility and blame toward parents, feelings of anger and betrayal, loss of friends and potential romantic partners, problems with sexual and emotional intimacy, sexual dysfunction, high-risk sexual behaviors, a feeling of being dehumanized and untrue to self, a loss of faith and a sense of having wasted time and resources.

Due to the lack of scientific evidence supporting conversion therapy and the risk of harm to minors, the practice of conversion therapy is strongly opposed by the American Academy of Child Adolescent Psychiatry, American Academy of Pediatrics, American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, American College of Physicians, American Medical Association, American Psychiatric Association, American Psychological Association, National Association of Social Workers, Pan American Health Organization and the World Psychiatric Association.

On June 15, 2022, President Joe Biden recognized the need to promote an end to the use of conversion therapies through the issuance of Executive Order 14075, which instructs Federal departments and agencies to formulate an action plan to prevent these therapies on a world-wide basis. On August 16, 2022, Governor Tom Wolf signed Executive Order 2022-02, which was published at 52 Pa.B. 5788 (September 10, 2022), to protect residents of this Commonwealth from conversion therapy by directing State agencies to discourage the practice of conversion therapy. See 4 Pa. Code §§ 7.921—7.924 (relating to protecting Pennsylvanians from conversion therapy and supporting LGBTQIA+ Pennsylvanians).

Given the lack of evidence to support the use of psychological interventions to change sexual orientation as well as the overwhelming opposition within the medical and psychological professions, the Board adopted this statement of policy as a public safety measure and to ensure that its licensees are aware of the Board's position on using conversion therapy on minors.

#### Description of this Statement of Policy

This statement of policy clarifies that it is the position of the Board that being LGBTQIA+ is not a disease, disorder, illness, deficiency or shortcoming. This statement of policy notifies Board-regulated practitioners that the Board may find the use of conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age to be unprofessional or immoral conduct. Additionally, under this statement of policy, a Board-regulated practitioner who uses conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age may be subject to discipline by the Board.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This statement of policy will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions and will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

Sunset Date

A sunset date is not being established for this statement of policy. Its need and efficacy will be periodically monitored by the Board.

- can Academy of Pediatrics, American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, American College of Physicians, American Medical Association, American Psychiatric Association, American Psychoanalytic Association, American Psychological Association, National Association of Social Workers, Pan American Health Organization and the World Psychiatric Association.

- (c) *Guidelines*. The following conversion therapy guidelines should be considered by Board-regulated practitioners to ensure compliance with the act and the Board's regulations.
- (1) Being lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, intersex or asexual is not a disease, disorder, illness, deficiency or shortcoming.
  - (2) Conversion therapy includes the following conduct:
- (i) A practice or treatment that seeks to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender identity.
- (ii) An effort to change the behavioral expression of an individual's sexual orientation, change gender expression or eliminate or reduce sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward individuals of the same gender.
- (3) Conversion therapy does not include a practice or treatment that provides counseling for an individual undergoing gender transition, counseling that provides acceptance, support and understanding, or the facilitation of coping, social support and identity exploration and development, including sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices. Conversion therapy does not include a practice that does not seek to change sexual orientation or gender identity.
- (4) In a disciplinary action brought against a Board-regulated practitioner, the Board may find the use of conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age to be unethical, immoral or unprofessional conduct. A Board-regulated practitioner who uses conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age may be subject to discipline by the Board.

- (ii) An effort to change the behavioral expression of an individual's sexual orientation, change gender expression, or eliminate or reduce sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward individuals of the same gender.
- (3) Conversion therapy does not include a practice or treatment that provides counseling for an individual undergoing gender transition, counseling that provides acceptance, support, and understanding, or the facilitation of coping, social support, and identity exploration and development, including sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices. Conversion therapy does not include a practice that does not seek to change sexual orientation or gender identity.

## STATE BOARD OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE [ 49 PA. CODE CH. 25 ]

### Conversion Therapy—Statement of Policy

The State Board of Osteopathic Medicine (Board) adds § 25.218 (relating to conversion therapy, sexual orientation change efforts and reparative therapy—statement of policy) to read as set forth in Annex A. This statement of policy is intended to provide guidance to Board-regulated practitioners and the general public.

Effective Date

This statement of policy will be effective upon its publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 15(a)(8) and (b)(9) of the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act (act) (63 P.S. § 271.15(a)(8) and (b)(9)) authorizes the Board to refuse, revoke or suspend the license of a physician, physician assistant, respiratory therapist or athletic trainer guilty of immoral or unprofessional conduct. Unprofessional conduct includes any departure from, or the failure to conform to, the standards of acceptable and prevailing practice. Under section 3(g) of the Acupuncture Licensure Act (63 P.S. § 1803(g)), acupuncturists licensed with the Board are subject to all disciplinary provisions applicable to medical doctors as set forth in the act. Under the Board's regulations, perfusionists and genetic counselors are subject to discipline under section 15(a)(8) and (b)(9) of the act, respectively.

Section 102 of the Commonwealth Documents Law (45 P.S. § 1102) defines "statement of policy" as "any document, except an adjudication or a regulation, promulgated by an agency which sets forth substantive or

procedural personal or property rights, privileges, immunities, duties, liabilities or obligations of the public or any part thereof, and includes, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, any document interpreting or implementing any act of Assembly enforced or administered by such agency." Statements of policy that are general and permanent in nature are required to be codified under 1 Pa. Code § 3.1 (relating to contents of *Code*).

### Background and Purpose

The Commonwealth has a compelling interest in protecting the physical and psychological well-being of minors, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, intersex and asexual (LGBTQIA+) youths, and in protecting minors against exposure to the severe harms caused by conversion therapy. Likewise, the Board has an interest in and a duty to protect the public from practices that create a danger for patients and is dutybound to enforce the provisions of the act and its regulations. These duties compel the Board to take steps to guard against the dangers posed by conversion therapy.

Conversion therapy, also known as sexual orientation change efforts or reparative therapy, is a term that describes a wide range of interventions by mental health professionals that seek to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender expression, including efforts to change behaviors, gender identity or gender expressions, or to reduce or eliminate sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward an individual of the same gender. The term does not include counseling for an individual seeking to transition from one gender to another, counseling that provides acceptance, support and understanding of an individual or facilitates an individual's coping, social support and identity exploration and development, including sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices, or counseling that does not seek to change sexual orienta-

Due to the lack of scientific evidence supporting conversion therapy and the risk of harm to minors, the practice of conversion therapy is strongly opposed by the American Academy of Child Adolescent Psychiatry, American Academy of Pediatrics, American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, American College of Physicians, American Medical Association, American Psychiatric Association, American Psychological Association, National Association of Social Workers, Pan American Health Organization, and the World Psychiatric Association.

On June 15, 2022, President Joe Biden recognized the need to promote an end to the use of conversion therapies through the issuance of Executive Order 14075, which instructs Federal departments and agencies to formulate

an action plan to prevent these therapies on a world-wide basis. On August 16, 2022, Governor Tom Wolf signed Executive Order 2022-02, which was published at 52 Pa.B. 5788 (September 10, 2022), to protect Pennsylvanians from conversion therapy by directing State agencies to discourage the practice of conversion therapy. See 4 Pa. Code §§ 7.921—7.924 (relating to protecting Pennsylvanians from conversion therapy and supporting LGBTQIA+ Pennsylvanians).

Given the lack of evidence to support the use of psychological interventions to change sexual orientation as well as the overwhelming opposition within the medical and psychological professions, the Board adopts this statement of policy as a public safety measure and to ensure that its licensees are aware of the Board's position on using conversion therapy on minors.

### Description of this Statement of Policy

This statement of policy clarifies that it is the position of the Board that being LGBTQIA+ is not a disease, disorder, illness, deficiency or shortcoming. This statement of policy notifies Board-regulated practitioners that the Board may find the use of conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age to be unprofessional or immoral conduct. Additionally, under this statement of policy, a Board-regulated practitioner who uses conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age may be subject to discipline by the Board.

### Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This statement of policy will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions and will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

### Sunset Date

A sunset date is not being established for this statement of policy. Its need and efficacy will be periodically monitored by the Board.

- (a) Background. Conversion therapy, also known as sexual orientation change efforts or reparative therapy, poses critical health risks to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, intersex and asexual individuals, including suicidality, substance abuse, confusion, depression, guilt, helplessness, hopelessness, shame, social withdrawal, stress, disappointment, self-blame, decreased self-esteem and authenticity to others, increased self-hatred, hostility and blame toward parents, feelings of anger and betrayal, loss of friends and potential romantic partners, problems with sexual and emotional intimacy, sexual dysfunction, high-risk sexual behaviors, a feeling of being dehumanized and untrue to self, a loss of faith and a sense of having wasted time and resources. The American Medical Association opposes the use of conversion therapy for sexual orientation or gender identity. Due to the lack of scientific evidence supporting conversion therapy and the risk of harm to minors, the practice of conversion therapy is strongly opposed by the American Academy of Child Adolescent Psychiatry, American Academy of Pediatrics, American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, American College of Physicians, American Medical Association, American Psychiatric Association, American Psychoanalytic Association, American Psychological Association, National Association of Social Workers, Pan American Health Organization, and the World Psychiatric Association.
- (b) Board authority. The Board has statutory authority to license, regulate and discipline Board-regulated practitioners in this Commonwealth. Under section 15 of the act (63 P.S. § 271.15), the Board is authorized to refuse, revoke or suspend the license of a Board-regulated practitioner who is guilty of immoral or unprofessional conduct.
- (c) *Guidelines*. The following conversion therapy guidelines should be considered by Board-regulated practitioners to ensure compliance with the act and the Board's regulations.
- (1) Being lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, intersex or asexual is not a disease, disorder, illness, deficiency or shortcoming.
  - (2) Conversion therapy includes the following conduct:
- (i) A practice or treatment that seeks to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender identity.
- (ii) An effort to change the behavioral expression of an individual's sexual orientation, change gender expression, or eliminate or reduce sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward individuals of the same gender.
- (3) Conversion therapy does not include a practice or treatment that provides counseling for an individual undergoing gender transition, counseling that provides acceptance, support and understanding, or the facilitation

of coping, social support and identity exploration and development, including sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices. Conversion therapy does not include a practice that does not seek to change sexual orientation or gender identity.

(4) In a disciplinary action brought against a Board-regulated practitioner, the Board may find the use of conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age to be immoral or unprofessional conduct. A Board-regulated practitioner who uses conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age may be subject to discipline by the Board.

The State Board of Psychology (Board) adds § 41.62 (relating to conversion therapy, sexual orientation change efforts and reparative therapy—statement of policy) to read as set forth in Annex A. This statement of policy is intended to provide guidance to Board-regulated psychologists and the general public.

Statutory Authority

Such rules and regulations shall include, but not be limited to, standards for professional practice and a code of ethics for psychologists..." Section 8(a)(11) of the act (63 P.S.  $\S$  1208(a)(11)) authorizes the Board to suspend, revoke or limit or restrict a license or reprimand a licensee who commits immoral or unprofessional conduct.

Section 102 of the Commonwealth Documents Law (45 P.S. § 1102) defines "statement of policy" as "any document, except an adjudication or a regulation, promulgated by an agency which sets forth substantive or procedural personal or property rights, privileges, immunities, duties, liabilities or obligations of the public or any part thereof, and includes, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, any document interpreting or implementing any act of Assembly enforced or administered by such agency." Statements of policy that are general and permanent in nature are required to be codified under 1 Pa. Code § 3.1 (relating to contents of *Code*).

Principle 3(e) requires that psychologists act in accord with American Psychological Association standards and guidelines related to practice.

- (ii) An effort to change the behavioral expression of an individual's sexual orientation, change gender expression, or eliminate or reduce sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward individuals of the same gender.

- (3) Conversion therapy does not include a practice or treatment that provides counseling for an individual undergoing gender transition, counseling that provides acceptance, support, and understanding, or the facilitation of coping, social support, and identity exploration and development, including sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices. Conversion therapy does not include a practice that does not seek to change sexual orientation or gender identity.
- (4) In a disciplinary action brought against a licensee, the Board may find the use of conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age to be unethical, immoral or unprofessional conduct. A licensee who uses conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age may be subject to discipline by the Board.

The State Board of Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors (Board) adds §§ 47.5, 48.5 and 49.5 (relating to conversion therapy, sexual orientation change efforts and reparative therapy—statement of policy) to read as set forth in Annex A. This statement of policy is intended to provide guidance to Board-regulated social workers, marriage and family therapists and professional counselors and the general public.

Effective Date

This statement of policy will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 6(2) of the Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors Act (act) (63 P.S. § 1906(2)) provides that the Board shall have the authority "[t]o adopt and, from time to time, revise such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this act. Such regulations may include, but shall not be limited to, standards of professional practice and conduct for licensed bachelor social workers, licensed social workers, licensed clinical social workers, licensed associate marriage and family therapists, licensed marriage and family therapists, licensed associate professional counselors and licensed professional counselors in Pennsylvania." Section 11(a)(2) and (3) of the act (63 P.S. § 1911(a)(2) and (3)) grants the Board authority to refuse, suspend, revoke, limit or restrict a license or reprimand a licensee for being guilty of immoral or unprofessional conduct and for violating standards of professional practice or conduct adopted by the Board.

The NASW's position statement on sexual orientation change efforts

provides that the practice of sexual orientation change efforts "violates the very tenets of the social work profession as outlined in the NASW Code of Ethics." Under the Board's regulations in § 48.71 (relating to code of ethical practice and professional conduct), licensed marriage and family therapists are required to adhere to the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy (AAMFT) Code of Ethics. AAMFT does not consider homosexuality a disorder that requires treatment and does not see a basis for conversion therapy. Under the Board's regulations in § 49.71 (relating to code of ethical practice and professional conduct), licensed professional counselors (licensees) shall adhere to the American Counseling Association (ACA) Code of Ethics. ACA opposes the promotion of conversion therapy as a cure for LGBTQIA+ individuals and considers it to be ineffectual and harmful. ACA considers conversion therapy to be a significant and serious violation of the ACA Code of Ethics.

On June 15, 2022, President Joe Biden recognized the need to promote an end to the use of conversion therapies through the issuance of Executive Order 14075, which instructs Federal departments and agencies to formulate an action plan to prevent these therapies on a world-wide basis. On August 16, 2022, Governor Tom Wolf signed Executive Order 2022-02, which was published at 52 Pa.B. 5788 (September 10, 2022), to protect Pennsylvanians from conversion therapy by directing State agencies to discourage the practice of conversion therapy. See 4 Pa. Code §§ 7.921—7.924 (relating to protecting Pennsylvanians from conversion therapy and supporting LGBTQIA+ Pennsylvanians).

Given the lack of evidence to support the use of psychological interventions to change sexual orientation as well as the overwhelming opposition within the medical and psychological professions, the Board adopted this statement of policy as a public safety measure and to ensure that its licensees are aware of the Board's position on using conversion therapy on minors.

### Description of this Statement of Policy

This statement of policy clarifies that it is the position of the Board that being LGBTQIA+ is not a disease, disorder, illness, deficiency or shortcoming. This statement of policy notifies licensees that the Board may find the use of conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age to be unethical, immoral and unprofessional conduct. Additionally, under this statement of policy, a licensee who uses conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age may be subject to discipline by the Board.

### Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This statement of policy will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions and will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

#### Sunset Date

A sunset date is not being established for this statement of policy. Its need and efficacy will be periodically monitored by the Board.

- (b) The Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (c) This order shall take effect upon publication in the  $Pennsylvania\ Bulletin.$

### PART I. DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Subpart A. PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

CHAPTER 47. STATE BOARD OF SOCIAL WORKERS, MARRIAGE AND FAMILY THERAPISTS AND PROFESSIONAL COUNSELORS

#### STATEMENT OF POLICY

- § 47.5. Conversion therapy, sexual orientation change efforts and reparative therapy—statement of policy.
- (a) Background. Conversion therapy, also known as sexual orientation change efforts or reparative therapy, poses critical health risks to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, intersex and asexual individuals, including suicidality, substance abuse, confusion, depression, guilt, helplessness, hopelessness, shame, social withdrawal, stress, disappointment, self-blame, decreased self-esteem and authenticity to others, increased self-hatred, hostility and blame toward parents, feelings of anger and betrayal, loss of friends and potential romantic partners, problems with sexual and emotional intimacy, sexual dysfunction, high-risk sexual behaviors, a feeling of being dehumanized and untrue to self, a loss of faith and a sense of having wasted time and resources. Due to the lack of scientific evidence supporting conversion therapy and the risk of harm to minors, the practice of conversion therapy is strongly opposed by the American Academy of Child Adolescent Psychiatry, American Academy of Pediatrics, American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, American College of Physicians, American Medical Association, American Psychiatric Association, American Psychoanalytic Association, American Psychological Association, National Association of Social Workers, Pan American Health Organization and the World Psychiatric Association.
- (b) Board authority. The Board has statutory authority to license, regulate and discipline social workers, marriage and family therapists and professional counselors. Under section 11(a)(2) and (3) of the act (63 P.S. § 1911(a)(2) and (3)), the Board is authorized to discipline a licensee for being guilty of immoral or unprofessional

- conduct and for violating professional practice or conduct standards adopted by the Board, including §§ 47.71, 48.71 and 49.71 (relating to codes of ethical practice and professional conduct; code of ethical practice and professional conduct; and code of ethical practice and professional conduct).
- (c) *Guidelines*. The following conversion therapy guidelines should be considered by licensees to ensure compliance with the act and the Board's regulations.
- (1) Being lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, intersex or asexual is not a disease, disorder, illness, deficiency or shortcoming.
  - (2) Conversion therapy includes the following conduct:
- (i) A practice or treatment that seeks to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender identity.
- (ii) An effort to change the behavioral expression of an individual's sexual orientation, change gender expression, or eliminate or reduce sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward individuals of the same gender.
- (3) Conversion therapy does not include a practice or treatment that provides counseling for an individual undergoing gender transition, counseling that provides acceptance, support, and understanding, or the facilitation of coping, social support, and identity exploration and development, including sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices. Conversion therapy does not include a practice that does not seek to change sexual orientation or gender identity.
- (4) In a disciplinary action brought against a licensee, the Board may find the use of conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age to be unethical, immoral and unprofessional conduct. A licensee who uses conversion therapy on an individual under 18 years of age may be subject to discipline by the Board.

## LAND RECYCLING AND **ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION**

**UNDER ACT 2, 1995** PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notice(s) of Intent to Remediate Submitted Under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent (NOI) to Remediate. Luxfer seeks approval to install four new wet scrubbers (Source ID C114A2, C114B2, C114C2, and C114D2). The control devices will control PM emissions from four (4) Hammermill crushers (Source ID 114A—114D), previously classified as a single source (Source ID 114). After evaluating fabric collectors, electrostatic precipitators (wet and dry), and wet scrubbers, Luxfer determined that wet scrubbers were the only feasible option due to the explosive nature of magnesium used in the process. Their analysis indicates that these scrubbers will achieve the required PM emission limit of 0.02 gr/dscf.

These crushers process magnesium at a rate of 50 lbs/hr and, for permitting purposes, are assumed to operate 8,760 hours annually. Previously, simple cyclone product collectors controlled the emissions alone and were installed under an RFD in June 2022. However, recent stack tests revealed emissions of 0.18 gr/dscf, exceeding allowable limits. Consequently, their operating permit renewal included a condition requiring a plan for installing additional controls (wet scrubbers).

In addition, requests for an informal conference, or a public hearing, as applicable, on a mining permit application, as provided by 25 Pa. Code § 77.123 (relating to public hearing-informal conferences) or § 86.34 (relating to informal conferences), must also contain a brief summary of the issues to be raised by the requestor at the conference and a statement whether the requestor desires to have the conference conducted in the locality of the proposed mining activities.

Where a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) number is listed, the mining activity permit application is associated with an application for an NPDES permit. A separate notice will be provided for the draft NPDES permit.

### MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 77.522 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters DEP may require.

Persons aggrieved by an action may appeal that action to the Environmental Hearing Board (Board) under section 4 of the Environmental Hearing Board Act (35 P.S. § 7514) and 2 Pa.C.S. §§ 501—508 and 701—704 (relating to Administrative Agency Law).

The appeal should be sent to the Environmental Hearing Board, Second Floor, Rachel Carson State Office Building, 400 Market Street, P.O. Box 8457, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8457, 717-787-3483. Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30-days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. Copies of the appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure may be obtained from the Board. This paragraph does not, in and of itself, create a right of appeal beyond that permitted by applicable statutes and decisional law. For individuals who wish to challenge an action, the appeal must reach the Board within 30-days. A lawyer is not needed to file an appeal with the Board. Individuals who cannot afford a lawyer may qualify for free pro bono representation. Call the Secretary to the Board at 717-787-3483 for more information. The appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure are also available in Braille or on audiotape from the Secretary to the Board at 717-787-3483. Important legal rights are at stake, however, so individuals should contact a lawyer at once.

Any person aggrieved by this action may challenge it in an appropriate legal forum. The State and Federal courts are currently split on whether the proper forum to challenge a Department permit, authorization or approval for a facility or activity subject to the Federal Natural Gas Act, 15 U.S.C.A. §§ 717 et seq., is the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit or the Pennsylvania Environmental Hearing Board. See *Delaware Riverkeeper Network v. Sec'y, Dep't of Envtl. Prot.*, 933 F.3d 360 (3d Cir. 2016); *Delaware Riverkeeper Network v. Sec'y, Dep't of Envtl. Prot.*, 903 F.3d 65 (3d Cir. 2018), cert. denied, 139 S. Ct. 1648, 203 L. Ed. 899 (2019) and *Cole v. Dep't. of Envtl. Prot.*, 1577 C.D. 2019 WL 2420667 (Pa. Cmwlth Ct. June 15, 2021) (Pet. for Allowance of Appeal pending); *West Rockhill Twp. v. Dep't of Envtl. Prot.*, No. 1595 C.D. 2019 WL 2426014 (Pa. Cmwlth. June 15, 2021) (Pet. for Allowance of Appeal pending).

# LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

If required, a risk assessment report describes potential adverse effects caused by the presence of regulated substances. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is required by the act for compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The DEP may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides DEP's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) hereby announces that a certain manufacturer of covered devices is not included on the Department's list of registered manufacturers, maintained by the Department under Sections 302 and 507 of the Covered Device Recycling Act (CDRA). Accordingly, under Section 302 of the CDRA, no retailer may offer these manufacturers' products for sale within the Commonwealth.

Manufacturers of new covered devices—such as televisions, laptop and desktop computers, tablets, etc.—offered for sale in Pennsylvania are required to register with the Department prior to commencing sales per Section 304 of the CDRA. Manufactures must also pay an annual registration fee and submit a recycling plan and annual report. Section 302 of the CDRA prohibits the sale of covered devices in the Commonwealth by unregistered manufacturers.

The Department is required to maintain a list of registered manufacturers per Section 302(b) of the CDRA. The list can be accessed by visiting dep.pa.gov.

The following manufacturer is not included on the Department's list and are therefore considered out of compliance:

#### Cocopar

Due to its noncompliant status and non-inclusion on the list of registered manufacturers, the Department is notifying the public, in cooperation with covered device retailers, that the CDRA prohibits the sale of devices manufactured by Cocopar within the Commonwealth, and that the sale of such devices would constitute unlawful conduct under the CDRA. Noncompliant manufacturers may once again be included on the Department's list of registered manufacturers, and their devices offered for sale in the Commonwealth, if the manufacturers return to compliance with all the applicable provisions of the CDRA.

## Approved Prearrest and Evidential Breath Testing Devices

The Department of Health (Department) has statutory authority to approve both prearrest and evidential breath testing devices for use by law enforcement officials to determine the alcohol content of blood by analysis of a person's breath. This notice contains the combined approved lists of prearrest breath testing devices and evidential breath testing devices.

Prearrest Breath Testing Devices

The Department approves prearrest breath testing devices as required by 28 Pa. Code §§ 5.101—5.104 (relating to equipment to determine blood alcohol content under the Vehicle Code and the Fish and Boat Code).

Authority to promulgate these regulations is contained in the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(k) (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(k) (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance), the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502(j) (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol) and section 2102(g) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 532(g)).

Prearrest breath testing devices approved under this authority may be used by police officers, waterways patrolmen and officers enforcing the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code in conducting preliminary determinations of the alcohol content of blood of persons suspected of driving, boating, hunting or furtaking while under the influence of alcohol. Officers and patrolmen use these devices to assist them in determining whether or not a person should be placed under arrest for violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance), for violation of 30 Pa.C.S. § 5502 (relating to operating watercraft under influence of alcohol or controlled substance), for violation of 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501 (relating to hunting or furtaking prohibited while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) or for any other criminal offense under the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code or the Game and Wildlife Code which involves operating a vehicle or boat, hunting or furtaking while under the influence of alcohol.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) of the United States Department of Transportation published model specifications for Screening Devices to Measure Alcohol in Bodily Fluids at 59 FR 39382 (August 2, 1994). These specifications established performance criteria and methods for testing alcohol screening devices to measure alcohol content. The NHTSA established these specifications to support state laws and the United States Department of Transportation's workplace alcohol testing program. The Department has elected to use the NHTSA criteria for approving devices for the prearrest testing of a person's breath to determine the alcohol content of the person's blood.

The NHTSA published its first Conforming Products List (CPL) for screening devices at 59 FR 61923 (December 2, 1994), with corrections at 59 FR 65128 (December 16, 1994), identifying the devices that meet the NHTSA's Model Specifications for Screening Devices to Measure Alcohol in Bodily Fluids. Thereafter, the NHTSA updated the CPL at 60 FR 42214 (August 15, 1995), 66 FR 22639 (May 4, 2001), 70 FR 54972 (September 19, 2005), with corrections at 70 FR 72502 (December 5, 2005) and 72 FR 4559 (January 31, 2007).

The NHTSA published revised Model Specifications for Screening Devices to Measure Alcohol in Bodily Fluids at 73 FR 16956 (March 31, 2008). These specifications removed from use interpretive screening devices (ISD) because ISDs did not provide an unambiguous test result. These specifications also removed from use the Breath Alcohol Sample Simulator as it is not necessary for testing breath alcohol screening devices. All other performance criteria and test methods were maintained. The NHTSA published an additional update to the CPL at 74 FR 66398 (December 15, 2009). The current list was published at 77 FR 35745 (June 14, 2012).

Evidential Breath Testing Devices

The Department approves evidential breath testing devices under the authority of the Vehicle Code (75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(1)), the Fish and Boat Code (30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(1)) and the Game and Wildlife Code (34 Pa.C.S. § 2502(c)).

Evidential breath testing devices approved under this notice may be used by law enforcement officials to obtain test results which will be admissible in evidence in any summary or criminal proceeding in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 or any other violation of the Vehicle Code arising out of the same action or 30 Pa.C.S. § 5502 or any other violation of the Fish and Boat Code arising out of the same action or 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501 or any other violation of the Game and Wildlife Code arising out of the same action.

The NHTSA published the Standards for Devices to Measure Breath Alcohol at 38 FR 30459 (November 5, 1973). A Qualified Products List of Evidential Breath Measurement Devices comprised of instruments that met this standard was first issued at 39 FR 41399 (November 21, 1974).

The NHTSA converted the Standards for Devices to Measure Breath Alcohol to Model Specifications for Evidential Breath Testing Devices (Model Specifications) and published a CPL of instruments that were found to conform to the Model Specifications as Appendix D to that notice at 49 FR 48854 (December 14, 1984).

The NHTSA published a notice to amend the Model Specifications at 58 FR 48705 (September 17, 1993) and to update the CPL. That notice changed the alcohol concentration levels at which instruments are evaluated for precision and accuracy, from 0.000, 0.050, 0.101 and 0.151 blood alcohol content (BAC), to 0.000, 0.020, 0.040, 0.080 and 0.160 BAC, respectively. It also included a test for the presence of acetone and an expanded definition of alcohol to include other low molecular weight alcohols, for example, methyl or isopropyl. Since that time, the CPL has been annotated to indicate which instruments have been determined to meet the Model Specifications published in 1984 and which have been determined to meet the Model Specifications, as revised and published in 1993.

Thereafter, the NHTSA has periodically updated the CPL with those breath instruments found to conform to the Model Specifications.

The NHTSA published an additional update to the CPL at 77 FR 35747 (June 14, 2012) for instruments that conform to the Model Specifications for Evidential Breath Alcohol Measurement Devices at 58 FR 48705 (September 17, 1993). The Department's list of evidential breath testing devices contains updates to the CPL published at 77 FR 35747 (June 14, 2012) for instruments that conform to the Model Specifications for Evidential Breath Alcohol Measurement Devices at 58 FR 48705 (September 17, 1993). This current list was published at 82 FR 50940 (November 2, 2017).

Instruments marked with an asterisk (\*) meet the Model Specifications detailed in 49 FR 48854 (December 14, 1984) (that is, instruments tested at 0.000, 0.050, 0.101 and 0.151 BAC). Instruments not marked with an asterisk meet the Model Specifications detailed in 58 FR

48705 (September 17, 1993) and were tested at BACs = 0.000, 0.020, 0.040, 0.080 and 0.160. All instruments that meet the Model Specifications currently in effect (dated September 17, 1993) also meet the Model Specifications for Screening Devices to Measure Alcohol in Bodily Fluids.

The NHTSA also evaluates equipment to determine if it must be operated at fixed locations (that is, nonmobile equipment) or can be transported to nonfixed operational sites in the field (that is, mobile equipment). Most equipment on the following list is approved for mobile and nonmobile operation. The instruments on the list not marked with an asterisk meet the specifications for use as prearrest or evidentiary breath testing devices. The instruments on the list marked with an asterisk may be used as evidentiary devices for blood alcohol concentrations at or above 0.050%. These instruments may also be used as prearrest breath testing devices if they are approved for mobile operations. However, these instruments may not be used for making arrests under the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code or the Game and Wildlife Code where blood alcohol concentrations below 0.050% must be determined. Nonmobile devices can only be used as evidentiary testing instruments since they are not portable. Before purchasing breath testing devices, law enforcement officials should consult with the manufacturer of the equipment they intend to purchase to verify that the devices can be used for their intended purposes.

The update to the CPL published at 82 FR 50940 (November 2, 2017) adds 12 new instruments that have been evaluated and found to conform to the Model Specifications, as amended on September 17, 1993, for mobile and nonmobile use. One instrument is distributed by two different companies, so it has been listed twice. One manufacturer changed their legal name. One manufacturer added a new product option for USB and Ethernet connectivity. One manufacturer added a Bluetooth keyboard accessory to two devices and a calibration accessory for seven of its devices. These devices were found to conform with or without the accessories. Another seven instruments are now being listed under a different distributer/manufacturer and those devices will be crossreferenced for legacy purposes. In alphabetical order by company, the new devices are:

- (1) The "AlcoMate TS600" distributed by AK GlobalTech Corporation, Palisades Park, NJ. This device will be known as the Alcoscan ALP—1 outside of the United States. The AlcoMate TS600 is a hand-held device with an electrochemical (EC) fuel cell sensor. This device is powered by internal batteries and is intended for mobile or stationary operations.
- (2) The "Intoxilyzer 500" manufactured by CMI, Inc., Owensboro, KY. This instrument is currently listed on the CPL for Alcohol Screening Devices and will be removed when that CPL is updated. Improvements to the device's sampling system allow it to conform as an Evidential Breath Tester (EBT). It is a hand-held instrument intended for use in mobile or stationary operations. It uses a fuel cell sensor and is powered by an internal battery. The Intoxilyzer 500 is also distributed as the Lion Alcolmeter 500 by Lion Laboratories outside the United States, so it has been listed twice on the CPL, once under each of its distributors/manufacturers.

- (3) The "Intoxilyzer 9000" manufactured by CMI, Inc., Owensboro, KY. This is a bench-top device that is intended for use in mobile or stationary operations. This device uses an infrared (IR) sensor to measure ethanol concentration. The Intoxilyzer 9000 can be powered by either 110 volts alternate current (AC) or 12 volts direct current (DC).
- (4) The "Alcotest 3820" manufactured by Draeger, Inc., Irving, TX. The Alcotest 3820 is a hand-held device that uses an EC fuel cell sensor to measure ethanol concentration. This instrument is powered by internal batteries and is intended for use in stationary or mobile operations.
- (5) The "Alcotest 5510" manufactured by Draeger, Inc., Irving, TX. The Alcotest 5510 is a hand-held device that uses an EC fuel cell sensor to measure ethanol. This device is powered by internal batteries and is intended for use in mobile or stationary operations.
- (6) The "Alcotest 5820" manufactured by Draeger, Inc., Irving, TX. The Alcotest 5820 is a hand-held device that uses an EC fuel cell sensor to measure ethanol. This device is powered by internal batteries and is intended for use in mobile or stationary operations.
- (7) The "Alcotest 6820" manufactured by Draeger, Inc., Irving, TX. The Alcotest 6820 is a hand-held device that uses an EC fuel cell sensor to measure ethanol. This device is powered by internal batteries and is intended for use in mobile or stationary operations.
- (8) The "AlcoQuant 6020 Plus" manufactured by EnviteC, Wismar, Germany and distributed by Honeywell GmbH, Fond du Lac, WI. The AlcoQuant 6020 Plus is a hand-held device with a fuel cell sensor. This device is powered by internal batteries and is intended for use in mobile and stationary operations.
- (9) The "Alco-Sensor FST" manufactured by Intoximeters, Inc., Saint Louis, MO. The Alco-Sensor FST is a hand-held EBT that uses an EC fuel cell sensor to measure ethanol concentration. This instrument is powered by internal batteries and is intended for use in stationary or mobile operations.
- (10) The "Intox DMT Dual Sensor" manufactured by Intoximeters, Inc., Saint Louis, MO. The Intox DMT Dual Sensor is a bench-top EBT that is intended for use in stationary or mobile operations. This device uses both an IR sensor and an EC fuel cell sensor. The Intox DMT Dual Sensor can be powered by either 110 volts AC or 12 volts DC.
- (11) The "Intox EC/IR II.t" manufactured by Intoximeters, Inc., Saint Louis, MO. This is a benchtop device intended for use in mobile or stationary operations. This device uses both an EC fuel cell sensor and an IR sensor to measure ethanol concentrations. The Intox EC/IR II.t can be powered by either 110 volts AC or 12 volts DC.
- (12) The "FC10Plus" manufactured by Lifeloc Technologies, Inc., Wheat Ridge, CO. This is a hand-held device that is intended for use in mobile or stationary operations. This device uses a fuel cell sensor and is powered by internal batteries.

This update indicates that two devices (the Phoenix 6.0 and the FC20, manufactured by Lifeloc Technologies, Inc., Wheat Ridge, CO) come with Bluetooth keyboard support

and five additional fields that users can use to enter additional information. With these features, these devices will be listed on the CPL as the "Phoenix 6.0BT" and the "FC20BT." This update indicates also that seven devices manufactured by Lifeloc come with the EASYCAL calibration accessory. Those devices include the FC10, FC10Plus, FC20, FC20BT, EV30, Phoenix 6.0 and the Phoenix 6.0BT. The CPL specifies that each of these devices conforms to the model specifications "w/or without the EASYCAL accessory."

Intoximeters, Inc., Saint Louis, MO, acquired the breath alcohol testing business of National Patent Analytical Systems, Inc. (NPAS). Since there have been no changes to the devices other than ownership and a device name change, all six devices previously listed under NPAS (BAC DataMaster (with or without the Delta-1 accessory), BAC Verifier DataMaster (with or without the Delta-1 accessory), DataMaster cdm (w/or without the Delta-1 accessory), DataMaster DMT with Fuel Cell option, DataMaster DMT with Rev A Fuel Cell option and DataMaster DMT) will now be listed under both Intoximeters and NPAS. The NPAS DataMaster DMT will now be known as the Intoximeters Intox DMT. Accordingly, this device will be listed under Intoximeters under both names.

The CPL has been updated to reflect that Draeger Safety Diagnostics, Inc. will begin operating under the name Draeger, Inc. effective July 1, 2017, to align all sales and service operations for Draeger in the United States. Law enforcement agencies should determine that an approved training program in the use of the equipment is available in accordance with the previously referenced statutes before purchasing any of the devices contained on this list. Law enforcement agencies that plan to utilize a device that does not appear on the following list should contact the manufacturer of the equipment to verify that it has been evaluated by the NHTSA and found to meet the NHTSA's performance requirements. If a device is approved by the NHTSA after the date of this publication, the manufacturer of the device will need to forward documentation of the NHTSA acceptability to Jennifer Okraska at the address given as follows so that the Department has information sufficient to enable it to include the device in the next revision of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Some of the devices included in this notice are listed under the name of more than one manufacturer due to the fact that the name of the manufacturer has changed or the right to produce a device has been transferred to a different company. In these instances, the device is listed under the name of every company that was ever associated with the device to allow law enforcement agencies to continue using devices bearing the name of a previous manufacturer.

To facilitate accessibility of information concerning breath alcohol testing devices which are approved for law enforcement purposes in this Commonwealth, the Department will publish revisions of this list of equipment semiannually as notices in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

### **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH**

Laboratories Approved to Determine Analyses of Blood or Serum or Both for Controlled Substances under The Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under The Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) or section 353 of the Federal Clinical Laboratories Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 U.S.C. § 263a), or both, and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of blood or serum, or both, for the determination of controlled substances. This approval is contingent on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories. These laboratories are also approved and designated for purposes of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755(a) (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of services which will reflect the presence of controlled substances in blood or serum, or both.

Depending upon their capability and performance in proficiency surveys, laboratories are approved to perform screening or confirmatory analyses, or both, on blood or serum, or both. Screening analyses provide a presumptive indication that a controlled substance is present. Confirmatory testing is used to substantiate screening results.

Persons seeking forensic blood or serum analysis services, or both, from any of the listed laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for medicolegal purposes. They should also determine that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing analyses for forensic purposes. Persons seeking blood or serum analyses, or both, are responsible for specifying the controlled substances for which testing is being sought. Persons seeking those analyses should first determine the purpose of the analyses, that is, whether they are for medical, legal or other purposes.

The Vehicle Code contains a provision at 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(3)(ii) that permits test results on blood or urine for alcohol or controlled substances to be introduced into evidence in legal proceedings in this Commonwealth if the laboratory is located in another state and is not licensed and approved by the Department to provide these services. This section states that the test results may be admissible into evidence at summary or criminal proceedings in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) if the laboratory that performed the test is licensed by the state in which the facility is located and licensed under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988, (Pub.L. No. 100-578). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code at 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(3)(ii).

The name or location of a laboratory, as well as the personnel and testing procedures, can change. When

changes of this type occur, the clinical laboratory permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the clinical laboratory permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test, the clinical laboratory permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories before the name of the laboratory.

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. ## **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH**

Laboratories Approved to Determine Blood Alcohol Content under The Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under The Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code §§ 5.50 and 5.103 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services; and blood tests for blood alcohol content) to perform alcohol analyses of blood, serum or plasma. This approval is contingent on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories. These laboratories are also approved and designated under the provisions of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755(a) (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol) as qualified to perform the types of specialized services which will reflect the presence of alcohol in blood, serum or plasma.

The Vehicle Code at 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(3)(ii) also permits test results on blood or urine for alcohol or controlled substances to be introduced into evidence in certain legal proceedings in this Commonwealth if the laboratory is located in another state and is not licensed and approved by the Department to provide forensic blood, serum or plasma analysis services. This section states that the test results will be admissible into evidence at summary or criminal proceedings in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) or any other violation of the Vehicle Code arising out of the same action if the laboratory that performed the test is licensed to conduct the test by the state in which the facility is located and licensed under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988, (Pub.L. No. 100-578). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code at 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(3)(ii).

Since procedures for determining the alcohol content of serum and plasma are identical and results obtained from serum or plasma derived from a blood sample are the same, laboratories that demonstrate reliability in the determination of alcohol in serum are approved to analyze both serum and plasma for alcohol content.

Persons seeking forensic blood, serum or plasma analysis services from the following designated laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques

and procedures acceptable for forensic purposes and that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing determinations for this purpose.

The name or location of a laboratory, as well as the personnel and testing procedures, can change. When changes of this type occur, the clinical laboratory permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the clinical laboratory permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test, the clinical laboratory permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

The Department's blood alcohol and serum and plasma alcohol proficiency testing programs are approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services in accordance with the requirements in section 353 of the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 U.S.C. § 263a), and implementing regulations at 42 CFR 493.901 and 493.937 (relating to approval of proficiency testing programs; and toxicology), which are administered by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. Successful participation in the Department's proficiency testing program will satisfy the compliance requirements for both the Department and Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. ## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

Laboratories Approved to Determine Controlled Substance Content of Urine under The Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under The Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of urine for the determination of controlled substances.

This approval is contingent on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories. These laboratories are also approved and designated for purposes of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of services which will reflect the presence of controlled substances in urine.

Depending upon their capability and performance in proficiency surveys, laboratories are approved to perform screening or confirmatory urine drug analyses, or both. Screening analyses provide a presumptive indication that a controlled substance is present. Confirmatory testing is used to substantiate screening results.

Persons seeking forensic urine drug analysis services from any of the listed laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the purpose. They should also determine that the

director of the facility is agreeable to performing analyses for that purpose. Persons seeking the analyses are responsible for specifying the extent to which the presence of a controlled substance is to be verified. That specification should be predicated upon the purpose for which the analysis is being sought.

The Commonwealth's Vehicle Code contains a provision in 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(3)(ii) that permits test results on blood or urine for alcohol or controlled substances to be introduced into evidence at legal proceedings in this Commonwealth if the laboratory is located in another state and is not licensed and approved by the Department to provide these services. This section states that the test results may be admissible into evidence at summary or criminal proceedings in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) or any other violation of the Vehicle Code arising out of the same action if the laboratory that performed the test is licensed by the state in which the facility is located and licensed under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (Pub.L. No. 100-578). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code at 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(3)(ii).

The name or location of a laboratory, as well as the personnel and testing procedures, can change. When changes of this type occur, the clinical laboratory permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the clinical laboratory permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test, the clinical laboratory permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. # Laboratories Approved to Perform Blood Lead and/or Erythrocyte Protoporphyrin Determinations under The Clinical Laboratory Act

The following laboratories are licensed in accordance with The Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of blood for lead or erythrocyte protoporphyrin content. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic evaluations conducted by the Bureau of Laboratories of the Department of Health (Department).

Lead poisoning is reportable. Approved laboratories that offer blood lead testing services are required to inform the Department of actual or possible incidents of this condition in accordance with 28 Pa. Code § 27.34 (relating to reporting cases of lead poisoning). These regulations specify the following requirements for reporting by clinical laboratories:

- (1) A clinical laboratory shall report all blood lead test results on both venous and capillary specimens for persons under 16 years of age to the Department's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program, Division of Maternal and Child Health, Bureau of Family Health.
- (2) A clinical laboratory shall report an elevated blood lead level in a person 16 years of age or older to the Department's Division of Environmental Health Epidemiology, Bureau of Epidemiology or to other locations as designated by the Department. An elevated blood lead level is defined by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH). As of January 26, 2002, NIOSH defines an elevated blood lead level as a venous blood lead level of 25 micrograms per deciliter (µg/dL) or higher. The Department will publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* any NIOSH update of the definition within 30 days of NIOSH's notification to the Department.
- (3) A clinical laboratory which conducts blood lead tests of 100 or more specimens per month shall submit results electronically in a format specified by the Department.
- (4) A clinical laboratory which conducts blood lead tests of less than 100 blood lead specimens per month shall submit results either electronically or by hard copy in the format specified by the Department.
- (5) A laboratory which performs blood lead tests on blood specimens collected in this Commonwealth shall be licensed as a clinical laboratory and shall be specifically approved by the Department to conduct those tests.
- (6) Blood lead analyses requested for occupational health purposes on blood specimens collected in this Commonwealth shall be performed only by laboratories which are licensed and approved as specified in paragraph (5), and which are also approved by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration of the United States Department of Labor under 29 CFR 1910.1025(j)(2)(iii) (relating to lead).
- (7) A clinical laboratory shall complete a blood lead test within 5 work days of the receipt of the blood specimen and shall submit the case report to the Department by the close of business of the next work day after the day on which the test was performed. The clinical laboratory shall submit a report of lead poisoning using either the hard copy form or electronic transmission format specified by the Department.

(8) When a clinical laboratory receives a blood specimen without all of the information required for reporting purposes, the clinical laboratory shall test the specimen and shall submit the incomplete report to the Department.

Erythrocyte protoporphyrin determinations may be performed as an adjunct determination to substantiate blood lead levels of 25  $\mu g/dL$  or higher. Since erythrocyte protoporphyrin concentrations may not increase as a result of low-level exposures to lead, direct blood lead analysis is the only reliable method for identifying individuals with blood lead concentrations below 25  $\mu g/dL$ .

Persons seeking blood lead or erythrocyte protoporphyrin analyses should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the purpose for which the analyses are sought.

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The name or location of a laboratory, as well as the personnel and testing procedures, can change. When changes of this type occur, the clinical laboratory permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the clinical laboratory permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test, the clinical laboratory permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

The Department's blood lead proficiency testing program is approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services in accordance with 42 CFR 493.901 and 493.937 (relating to approval of proficiency testing programs; and toxicology) which are administered by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. Successful participation in the Department's proficiency testing program will satisfy the compliance requirements for both the Department and Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services.

Recalculation of the Pennsylvania Telecommunications Relay Service Surcharge; M-2024-3045235; M-00900239

#### Order

By the Commission:

In accordance with our May 29, 1990, Order at Docket No. M-00900239 establishing the Pennsylvania Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS or Relay)<sup>1</sup> and surcharge funding mechanism (TRS surcharge) and subsequent Commission orders and legislation,<sup>2</sup> we have completed the annual recalculation of the TRS surcharge rate established for the period beginning on July 1, 2024, and ending June 30, 2025. The Commission proposes to continue with the current TRS surcharge rate of \$0.00 per month for residential and business access lines3 for the upcoming fiscal year period beginning July 1, 2024.

Background

The TRS surcharge recovers anticipated costs to provide calling services and equipment to individuals that are deaf, hard of hearing, deaf-blind or have difficulty speaking to make and receive telephone calls. The surcharge funds three individual programs: the Relay service itself, the Telecommunications Device Distribution Program (TDDP),4 and the Print Media Access System Program (PMASP).<sup>5</sup> The surcharge is assessed upon the customers of wireline Incumbent Local Exchange Carriers (ILECs) and Competitive Local Exchange Carriers (CLECs) (collectively, LECs).

The annual TRS surcharge recalculation is dependent on data from several sources. LECs are required to submit annual wireline access line counts to the Commission pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 63.37. The traditional relay provider, Hamilton Relay, Inc., submitted the estimated minutes of use and charges for the fiscal year July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025. Hamilton Telephone Company d/b/a Hamilton Telecommunications submitted the estimated minutes-of-use report for the Captioned Telephone Relay Service<sup>7</sup> (CTRS).<sup>8</sup> Pursuant to Sections 6701.3(b)(3) and 6701.4(c) of the UTMPAA, 35 P.S.  $\S$  6701.3(b)(3) and 6701.4(c), The Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR), Department of Labor and Industry, submitted the 2024-2025 TDDP budget and the 2024-2025 PMASP budget.

#### Forecasted Operations Costs for 2024-2025

The Commission shall continue its active oversight of the operations of the Pennsylvania Telecommunications Relay Service. In doing so, the Commission believes it is necessary to continue to collaborate with OVR and its TDDP administrator9 to ensure adequate funding for distribution of TDDP equipment to qualified Pennsylvanians. As stated above, OVR is required to file annual budgets for the TDDP and the PMASP.<sup>10</sup> Further, we shall continue to assist OVR in its mission to ensure adequate funding for the PMASP. We acknowledge that OVR is statutorily obligated to ensure that there is adequate funding for the TDDP and the PMASP in Pennsylvania and we are willing to assist OVR to fulfill this mission.

Calculation of TRS surcharge for 2024-2025 Fiscal Year

As explained above, the monthly surcharge recalculation is based principally on the anticipated costs of three individual programs, Relay (TTY style, Speech-to-Speech, Spanish Relay, and CTRS), TDDP and the PMASP, and an accounting of access lines in service. The combined residential and business wireline access lines reported by LECs for 2023 and adjusted for Centrex lines are estimated to be 2,954,000. Accordingly, based upon the number of access lines, the anticipated Pennsylvania TRS Advisory Board<sup>11</sup> expenses, the TRS Fund administration costs, the projected TRS program costs from Hamilton (Relay and CTRS), the projected TDDP and PMASP budgets from OVR and the financial status of the TRS Fund, the 2024-2025 TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines will remain set at the current rate of \$0.00 per month per access line.

Since the set rate will not change, LECs are not required to file tariff supplements. Additionally, LECs will not have to file any monthly remittance forms with US Bank since the TRS surcharge rate will continue at zero for the period beginning July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025.

#### Audits

In November 2023, the Bureau of Audits initiated an audit of the Telecommunication Device Distribution and

Print Media Access System Programs for the twelvemonth periods ended June 30, 2020; June 30, 2021; and June 30, 2022, at Docket No. D-2023-3043989. The audit report is expected to be released in 2024.

Service of Order

In the past, our practice has been to serve the annual TRS surcharge recalculation order on every LEC in the Commonwealth in addition to each Relay service provider, the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, the Pennsylvania Telephone Association, and the Fund Administrator. Consistent with the TRS surcharge recalculation order entered May 23, 2013, at Docket No. M-2013-2341301, we now serve paper copies of the annual TRS surcharge recalculation order only when there is a change in the TRS surcharge rate or other provision in the order requiring that the LECs file a tariff supplement or take other action. As this order does not change the TRS surcharge rate, paper copies of the order will not be served. We will continue to publish the order in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and on the Commission's website.

#### Conclusion

The Commission has completed the annual recalculation of the TRS surcharge rate. The TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines will remain set at \$0.00 per month for the time period beginning July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025; Therefore,

#### It Is Ordered That:

- 1. For the period of July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, the TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines shall be set at \$0.00 per month, unless the Commission takes further action to revise the TRS surcharge rate prior to June 30, 2025.
- 2. A copy of this Order be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.
- 3. A copy of this Order be posted to the Commission's website.
