

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Rules, Regulations and Statements of Policy in Titles 1—107 of the Pennsylvania Code

Text proposed to be added is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Text proposed to be deleted is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and sections are printed in regular type to enhance readability. Final rulemakings and statements of policy are printed in regular type.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the [Legislative Reference] Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Effective Dates of Statutes

See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective date of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of 1 Pa.C.S. (relating to prothonotaries to keep files of advance copies of statutes) provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the *Laws of Pennsylvania* are generally available.

BERKS COUNTY

And Now, this 12th day of June 2024 it is hereby Ordered that Local Rule of Judicial Administration No. 4002—Definitions is adopted and No. 4008.1 and 4008.4 are amended in following form. It is further Ordered Local Rules of Judicial Administration No. 5000.2, 5000.4-5000.5 are hereby rescinded.

The District Court Administrator is Ordered and Directed to:

- 1. File one (1) copy to the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts via email to adminrules@pacourts.us.
- 2. File two (2) paper copies and one (1) electronic copy in a Microsoft Word format only to bulletin@palrb.us with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 3. Publish these Rules on the Berks County Court website at www.berkspa.gov.
- 4. Incorporation of the local rule into the set of local rules on www.berkspa.gov within thirty (30) days after publication of the local rule in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 5. File one (1) copy of the local rule in the appropriate filing office(s) for public inspection and copying.

Rule 4002. Definitions.

"Clerk" as used in the rules shall mean the prothonotary, where the records of the proceedings involved are filed with the prothonotary, and the clerk of courts, where the records of the proceeding involved are filed with said clerk

"Rough Draft Transcript" as used in these rules shall mean an uncertified and unedited transcription of the proceedings, including the testimony of witnesses, that is presented in its initial form that may contain untranslated or mistranslated stenotype symbols which will need to be revised before it is finished and certified. A "Rough Draft Transcript" request is only available during the instant proceedings and may be used by counsel solely for the purposes of preparation for hearings and/or trials and may not be used for any evidentiary purpose whatsoever in a hearing and/or trial nor may it be read or displayed to a jury or other factfinder.

Rule 4008.1. Transcript Costs Payable by a Requesting Party Other Than the Commonwealth or a Subdivision Thereof.

- (A) Where a person or entity other than the Commonwealth or a subdivision thereof has requested an ordinary original transcript:
- (1) Any person or entity who obtains a Transcript Request Form shall pay to the appropriate filing office one-half the estimated cost for the transcript calculated at the rate of \$2.75 for each page of bound ordinary original transcript and \$0.75 for each page of copy to the requestor in bound paper format or \$0.50 for each page of

- copy to the requestor in electronic format and shall pay the balance upon completion of the transcript. The court reporter shall not be required to start the transcription until such one-half advance payment has been made.
- (2) Upon completion of the transcript, the court reporter shall file the ordinary original transcript with the filing office along with a notice of the balance due to the person or entity who obtained the Transcript Request Form. Checks for the final balance due shall be made payable to the filing office and shall be delivered to the filing office.
- (3) Where any person or entity other than the Commonwealth or a political subdivision thereof requests a copy of the transcript previously ordered, transcribed, and filed of record, such person or entity must complete a Request for Copy of Transcript form and may purchase the same by paying the filing office \$0.75 for each page of bound paper format. Where any person or entity other than the Commonwealth or a political subdivision thereof requests a copy of the transcript in electronic format (if available), such person or entity must complete a Request for Copy of Transcript form and may purchase the same by paying the filing office \$0.50 for each page of transcript.
- (4) Where the Commonwealth or any political subdivision requests a copy of the transcript, the court reporter shall provide the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof with a copy without charge.
- (5) Where a litigant requests a copy of the transcript and has been approved for representation by a legal aid service, the court reporter shall provide the legal aid client with a copy without charge.
- (B) The filing office shall pay the monies received for original transcript and for copies to the county promptly. The county shall thereupon pay therefrom:
- (a) to the court reporter, the sum of \$2.75 for each page of bound ordinary original transcript;
- (b) to the court reporter, the sum of \$.0.75 for each page of copy in bound paper format or \$0.50 for each page of copy in electronic format;
- (c) to the court reporter, the sum of \$2.50 for each page of copy of rough draft transcript;
- (d) to the court reporter, the sum of \$3.75 for each page of bound original expedited transcript;
- (e) to the court reporter, the sum of \$4.75 for each page of bound original daily transcript;
- (f) to the court reporter, the sum of \$6.75 for each page of bound original same-day delivery transcript.

Rule 4008.4. Additional Costs.

- (A) In cases such as mass tort, medical malpractice, or other unusually complex litigation where there is a need for court reporters to significantly expand their dictionary, a trial judge may impose a surcharge of \$0.50 per page for ordinary original transcript.
- (B) In cases of a non-technical nature where a secure electronic feed is requested to instantaneously deliver the translated notes from the court reporter to a laptop or other portable electronic device via cable, WiFi, router, or Bluetooth to the parties, a fee of \$3.50 per page per hookup shall be charged. There shall be no charge to the court for such a connection.

- (C) In cases such as mass tort, medical malpractice, or other unusually complex litigation where a secure electronic feed is requested to instantaneously deliver the translated notes from the court reporter to a laptop or other electronic device via cable, WiFi, router, or Bluetooth to the parties, a fee of \$4.00 per page shall be charged. There shall be no charge to the court for such a connection.
- (D) In cases where a rough draft transcript is requested by the court and/or the parties of all or part of a proceeding while utilizing a secure electronic feed, a fee of \$2.50 per page of rough draft shall be charged.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

WASHINGTON COUNTY

Fees for Electronic Access and Filing in the Civil and Orphans' Court Divisions; No. 2024-1

Administrative Order

And Now, this 17th day of June, 2024, pursuant to Local Rule of Civil Procedure L-205.4(d) and Local Rule of Orphans' Court Procedure L-O.C. 4.7(f), it is hereby Ordered, Adjudged, and Decreed that the following schedule of fees shall be collected for use of the C-Track Public Portal. Fees assessed in relation to the use of the C-Track Public Portal shall be paid by use of debit or credit card.

I. Document Access Subscription Fees

Docket sheets on remotely available public cases are viewable for free to registered users of the C-Track Public Portal. Registered users that are either a case party or attorney of record are not required to either subscribe or pay an individual document access fee to view documents on their case(s) in the C-Track Public Portal. Individuals or organizations that are not a case party or record attorney may choose to pay a monthly subscription fee for access to all remotely and publicly available case documents. The subscription fees are based on a "seat count" of the individual or organization paying for them. The monthly per-seat subscription fees are as follows:

100	\$10.00

II. Individual Document Access Fee

Users who do not pay for a C-Track Subscription Fee shall be charged per instance of viewing, downloading, or printing a document in the C-Track Public Portal. This fee shall be \$0.25 per page, with a minimum charge of \$5.00.

III. Electronic Filing Fee

Registered users may electronically file certain legal papers to the Prothonotary or the Register of Wills/Clerk of the Orphans' Court. A user fee of \$7.00 shall be imposed for each legal paper that is electronically filed.

IV. Debit or Credit Card Processing Fee

All payments in the C-Track Public Portal are handled via a payment processor. A processing fee shall be charged per debit or credit card transaction. This fee shall be the greater of either \$2.95 or three percent (3%) of the total transaction cost. This fee is in addition to any other charges in the C-Track Public Portal.

V. Filing Fees Suspended

It is further *Ordered* that the Register of Wills/Clerk of the Orphans' Court shall not charge a fee to a party and/or counsel of record for the filing of an order or decree of court. Collection of any such fees shall cease effective June 20, 2024.

It is further *Ordered* that the Prothonotary shall not charge an additional \$25.00 fee for arbitration referral to a party and/or counsel of record for electronically filing a writ of summons or complaint involving damages below the arbitration limits.

VI. Conclusion

The District Court Administrator is directed to:

- 1. File copies of this Administrative Order with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*;
- 2. File one (1) electronic copy of this Administrative Order with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts;
- 3. Arrange for the publication of this Administrative Order on the website for the Twenty-seventh Judicial District, www.washingtoncourts.us, within thirty (30) days of the effective date; and
- 4. Cause a copy hereof to be published in the *Washington County Reports* once a week for two (2) successive weeks at the expense of the County of Washington.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

STATE BOARD OF VETERINARY MEDICINE

[49 PA. CODE CH. 31] Fee Increase

The State Board of Veterinary Medicine (Board) proposes to amend § 31.41 (relating to schedule of fees), pertaining to fees for veterinarians and certified veterinary technicians, and add § 31.104 (relating to schedule of fees), pertaining to fees for registered animal protection organizations (APO) and euthanasia technicians, to read as set forth in Annex A. This proposed rulemaking will provide for an incremental increase to all application fees and renewal fees over the upcoming three biennial renewal cycles.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The initial graduated increase for application fees will be implemented on the date of publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, and then increased on December 1, 2026, and again on December 1, 2028.

Biennial renewal fees will increase by 3%, beginning with the December 1, 2024—November 30, 2026, biennial renewal period. This fee increase will impact licenses and certificates that expire on November 30, 2024.

Biennial renewal fees will increase again by 3% for the December 1, 2026—November 30, 2028, biennial renewal period. This fee increase will impact licenses and certificates that expire on November 30, 2026.

Biennial renewal fees will increase again by 3% for the December 1, 2028—November 30, 2030, renewal period. This fee increase will impact licenses and certificates that expire on November 30, 2028.

Statutory Authority

Under section 13(a) of the Veterinary Medicine Practice Act (act) (63 P.S. § 485.13(a)), the Board is required to set fees required for examination, licensure, certification, registration, renewal of licenses and registrations, renewal of certificates and temporary permits. Under section 13(b) of the act, if the revenues raised by fees, fines and civil penalties imposed under the act are not sufficient to meet expenditures over a 2-year period, the Board shall increase those fees by regulation so that the projected revenues will meet or exceed projected expenditures

The Commissioner is appointed by the Governor and has a number of powers and duties relative to the various professional and occupational licensing boards and commissions. Specifically, under section 810(a)(7) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 279.1(a)(7)), the Commissioner has the power and duty, "[u]nless otherwise provided by law, to fix the fees to be charged by the several professional and occupational examining boards within the department."

Background and Purpose

Under section 13(b) of the act, the Board is required to support its operations from the revenue it generates from fees, fines and civil penalties. In addition, the act provides that the Board must increase fees if the revenue raised by fees, fines and civil penalties is not sufficient to meet expenditures over a 2-year period. The Board raises virtually all of its revenue through biennial renewal fees. The Board's current biennial license/certificate renewal fees for veterinarians and veterinary technicians were established in 2010 at 40 Pa.B. 4757 (August 21, 2010).

The Board receives an annual report from the Department of State's Bureau of Finance and Procurement (BFP) regarding the Board's income and expenses. The BFP presented the following information to the Board at its public meeting on January 7, 2022.

In Fiscal Years (FY) 2018-2019 and 2019-2020, the Board incurred expenses of \$1,345,557.59 and \$1,397,676.97, respectively, and received \$2,239,892.27 and \$155,537.20 in revenue, respectively. In other words, over that 2-year time frame, the Board's total expenses (\$2,743,234.56) outpaced its total revenue (\$2,395,429.47) by \$347,805.09. The Board's overall remaining balance at the end of FY 2019-2020 was \$1,751,478.31.

In FYs 2020-2021 and 2021-2022, the Board's expenses were \$1,347,700.03 and \$1,268,000.00 (projected), respectively, with revenues of \$2,281,280.29 and \$156,000.00 (projected), respectively. In other words, over that 2-year time frame, the Board's total expenses (\$2,615,700.03) outpaced its total revenue (\$2,437,280.29) by \$178,419.74. The Board's overall remaining balance at the end of FY 2021-2022 was \$1,573,058.57.

In FYs 2022-2023 and 2023-2024, the Board's expenses were projected to be \$1,388,000.00 and \$1,306,000.00, respectively, with revenues projected to be \$2,486,000 and \$164,000, respectively. In other words, over that 2-year time frame, the Board's total expenses (\$2,694,000) are projected to outpace its total revenue (\$2,650,000) by \$44,000. The Board's overall remaining balance at the end of FY 2023-2024 is projected to be \$1,529,058.57.

According to the BFP's projections, if the Board were to keep its current fee structure in place (no increases for any of its fees), the Board's biennial revenue would remain at \$2,645,000 for each of the next 6 years. However, its expenses are projected to grow each year, so that the amount the Board would be spending above and beyond its revenue would become increasingly larger each successive year. The Board's projected revenue would fall short of meeting its expenses by \$131,000 in FY 2024-2025/FY 2025-2026, then by \$213,000 in FY 2028-2027/FY 2027-2028, and then by \$299,000 in FY 2028-2029/FY 2029-2030. Those projections also show a significant reduction in the Board's overall remaining balance, which by the end of FY 2029-2030 would be down to \$886,058.57.

Given that its revenues generated by fees, fines and civil penalties are not sufficient to meet expenditures over a 2-year period, the Board voted on January 7, 2022, to adopt the proposed graduated fee increases for application and biennial renewal fees contained in the BFP's report.

Description of Proposed Amendments

The BFP recommended a graduated fee increase that would be achieved over three biennial renewal periods rather than immediately. The fee increases are set so that the fees collected during each biennium more accurately reflect the anticipated costs for that period. The Board's proposal would create the following fee schedule over the next three renewal cycles:

Despite the proposed increases, even the highest proposed renewal fee in 2028 would be lower than some surrounding states (Connecticut and Rhode Island), but will be higher than other surrounding states (Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Vermont and West Virginia). The highest known biennial renewal fee for veterinarians in the Northeast quadrant of the United States is Rhode Island at \$580, while the lowest known biennial renewal fee is New Hampshire at \$150. Some boards do not announce current renewal fees until it is time for licensure renewal.

Application fees are proposed to be raised to reflect the true administrative cost to the Board to process each individual application. The proposed application fees are then increased on a graduated basis so that the application fees collected during each biennium reflect the anticipated costs of processing applications for that biennium. These fees are designed to cover the cost to process applications and are borne by individual applicants. Actual cost calculations for application fees are based upon the following formula:

number of minutes to perform the function ×
pay rate for the classification of the personnel performing the function

+
a proportionate share of administrative overhead

The BFP recommends increasing the current application fees on a graduated basis for veterinarians, veterinary technicians and continuing education (CE) program approval. Furthermore, the BFP recommends increasing the application fee for two applications related to new classes of registrants/licensees created by the Animal Destruction Method Authorization Law (ADMAL) (3 P.S. §§ 328.101—328.1102): registered APOs and licensed euthanasia technicians. The initial fees for these new classes of registrants/licensees were included in the Board's proposed rulemaking (16A-5726) which was published at 52 Pa.B. 1980 (April 2, 2022). The Board expects to promulgate the final-form rulemaking (16A-5726), which adds Subchapter B and §§ 31.101—31.130, and begin registering APOs and licensing euthanasia technicians in the spring of 2024. Being new classes of licensure and at the Board's request, the BFP recommended not increasing the application fees until December 2026 for these categories (rather than December 2024) to allow a larger number of initial applicants to take advantage of the lower, initial application fee and because the total number of registered APOs and licensed euthanasia technicians remains speculative. Finally, the proposed fee for APO reinspection will be contemporaneously increased with the fee for application for initial registration of an APO, which includes the initial inspection fee. Only those APOs that fail the initial inspection are expected to pay the reinspection fee. Accordingly, with regard to reinspections, the ultimate cost to the regulated community is expected to be minimal.

The "duplicate license or certificate" fee (\$5) will not be increased because it is set by statute, specifically section 226 of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs Fee Act (BPOA Fee Act) (63 P.S. § 1401-226). Similarly, the "late renewal" fee (\$5 per month or part of month) will not be increased because it is set by section 225 of the BPOA Fee Act (63 P.S. § 1401-225). Finally, the "certification of scores or hours" fee will not be increased because: 1) the BFP did not suggest that it be increased; and 2) this fee is all but obsolete—the Board having no record of ever having charged this fee. In November of 2000, the North American Veterinary Licensing Examination (NAVLE), administered by the International Council for Veterinary Assessment (ICVA), replaced paper-and-pencil tests such as the National Board Examination (NBE) and Clinical Competency Test (CCT) as the sole computer-based examination for veterinary medical licensure in the United States and Canada. The Board established the "certification of scores or hours" fee in June of 2000 for those licensees who passed the NBE and CCT prior to 2000 and sought licensure in another jurisdiction, so that the Board could certify those scores and provide them to another jurisdiction, if requested. See 30 Pa.B. 3044 (June 17, 2000). Licensure by reciprocity/endorsement, coupled with the fact that NAVLE scores are certified by the exam administrator, ICVA, has practically eliminated the need for the "certification of scores or hours" fee. However, because a licensee may possibly request that the Board certify NBE or CCT scores/hours, the Board has decided not to eliminate or raise this fee in this proposed rulemaking.

Despite the proposed increases, the Board's new application fees will be lower than some surrounding states (Connecticut, Delaware, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio and West Virginia) but will be higher than other surrounding states (Maine, Rhode Island and Vermont). The highest known application fee for veterinarians in the Northeast quadrant of the United States is Rhode Island at \$580, while the lowest known application fee for veterinarians is Maine at \$95.

The BFP also recommends that the fee for verification of licensure be incrementally increased over three renewal cycles:

Although some surrounding states do not charge a verification of licensure fee, the Board's new verification of licensure fee will be on par with the states that do charge this fee (Delaware (\$35), Maryland (\$25), Massachusetts (\$15), New Hampshire (\$20), New Jersey (\$25), New York (\$25), Rhode Island (\$50), Vermont (\$25) and West Virginia (\$25)).

Fiscal Impact

This proposed rulemaking will not have any fiscal impact on the general public.

This proposed rulemaking will increase application and biennial renewal fees on a graduated basis. Board applicants, licensees and certificate holders will be required to comply with the regulation. The fees may be paid by applicants, licensees or certificate holders, or may be paid by their employers, should their employers choose to do so. This proposed rulemaking should have no other fiscal impact on the private sector, the general public or political subdivisions of the Commonwealth.

Approximately 1,025 applicants biennially will be impacted by the increased application fees. Specifically, the number of applicants affected are as follows: (Note: numbers provided for APOs and euthanasia technicians are estimated because the Board is expected to issue registrations/licenses to these individuals in the spring of 2024).

Thus, the total economic impact of the proposed fee increase to applicants, licensees, certificate holders, registrants or employers, if employers choose to pay application or licensing fees, is \$644,504.

Paperwork Requirements

This proposed rulemaking will require the Board to alter some of its electronic forms to reflect the new application and biennial renewal fees; however, this proposed rulemaking should not create additional paperwork for the private sector.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors its regulations as required by Executive Order 1996-1 (4 Pa. Code §§ 1.371—1.382 (relating to regulatory review and promulgation)). Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on June 12, 2024, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed regulation and a copy of the Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the chairperson of the Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee of the Senate and the chairperson of the Professional Licensure Committee of the House of Representatives. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria in section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review prior to final publication of the rulemaking by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor.

STATE BOARD OF CERTIFIED REAL ESTATE APPRAISERS

[49 PA. CODE CH. 36] Distance Education and PAREA

The State Board of Certified Real Estate Appraisers (Board) proposes to amend Chapter 36, Subchapter A (relating to general provisions) by amending §§ 36.1, 36.11—36.13, 36.31, 36.42 and 36.43 and adding § 36.45 (relating to asynchronous distance education) and Subchapter C (relating to certified Pennsylvania evaluators) by amending §§ 36.224, 36.262 and 36.263 (relating to distance education courses; continuing education subject matter; and distance education) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Under section 3 of the Assessors Certification Act (ACA) (63 P.S. § 458.3) "[t]he board may promulgate rules and regulations consistent with the statutes of this Commonwealth to administer and enforce the provisions of this act." Section 4(d) of the ACA (63 P.S. § 458.4(d)) provides that continuing education is a condition of biennial renewal for certified Pennsylvania evaluators.

Section 5(1) of the Real Estate Appraisers Certification Act (act) (63 P.S. § 457.5(1)) authorizes the Board to pass upon the qualifications and fitness of applicants for certification or licensure and to adopt and revise rules and regulations requiring applicants for certification to pass examinations relating to qualifications for certification. Section 5(2) of the act states that the Board is empowered "[t]o adopt and, from time to time, revise such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this act." Under section 6(c)(4)(i)—(iii) of the act (63 P.S. § 457.6(c)(4)(i)—(iii)), applicants for licensure as an appraiser trainee or certification as a residential or general real estate appraiser must satisfy the requirements of the act, the Board's regulations and the Appraiser Qualification Criteria of the Appraiser

Qualifications Board (AQB) of The Appraisal Foundation. Under section 10(b), (b.1) and (b.2) of the act (63 P.S. § 457.10(b), (b.1) and (b.2)), continuing education is a condition of biennial renewal for certified residential and general appraisers, certified broker/appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees if, and only to the minimum extent, required under the Financial Institutions Reform, Recovery, and Enforcement Act of 1989 (FIRREA) (Pub.L. No. 101-73, 103 Stat. 183), as amended (12 U.S.C. §§ 3331—3356).

The Appraisal Subcommittee (ASC) was created as a result of Title XI of FIRREA. See 12 U.S.C. § 3310. Under 12 U.S.C. § 3346, the ASC provides Federal oversight for all appraiser programs of every state appraiser regulatory agency in the United States. See 12 U.S.C. §§ 3332, 3346 and 3347. As required by 12 U.S.C. § 3332(b), the ASC monitors and reviews the practices, procedures, activities and organizational structure of The Appraisal Foundation. The Appraisal Foundation is an organization authorized by Congress to set standards and qualifications for real estate appraisers and provides voluntary guidance on recognized valuation methods and techniques for all valuation professionals. The AQB and the Appraisal Standards Board (ASB) are independent boards that are under the umbrella of The Appraisal Foundation. Through The Appraisal Foundation, all state appraiser programs must meet the minimum Federal standards that are established by the AQB for appraiser education, experience and examination, as well as Federal standards established by the ASB, for uniform standards of professional appraisal practice. See 12 U.S.C. §§ 3345 and 3339. Under 12 U.S.C. § 3338(b)(4), the ASC is authorized to use appropriated or collected funds to make grants to The Appraisal Foundation to defray costs related to AQB and ASB activities.

This proposed rulemaking is needed to comply with the distance education and virtual supervision requirements of the act of December 22, 2021 (P.L. 488, No. 100) (Act 100 of 2021), 63 Pa.C.S. § 3107.1 (relating to virtual operation). Under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3107.1(c), "[e]ach licensing board...shall establish rules and regulations for continuing education that provides for distance education if continuing education is required for a license, certificate, registration or permit in a practice act." In addition, 63 Pa.C.S. § 3107.1(d) requires each licensing board that has supervision requirements for licensure to "establish rules and regulations providing for virtual supervision in a manner that meets the requirements for licensure, certification, registration or permit and is acceptable to the licensing board...."

Background and Purpose

The AQB establishes the Federal minimum education, experience, examination and continuing education requirements for real property appraisers; the minimum standards are published in The Real Property Appraiser Qualification Criteria (AQB Qualification Criteria), which is available on The Appraisal Foundation web site at www.appraisalfoundation.org. In the AQB Qualification Criteria, effective January 1, 2022, the AQB established the new minimum requirements for distance education while also adding standards for virtual training and mentoring through Practical Applications of Real Estate Appraisal (PAREA). See AQB Qualification Criteria, pages 13, 14 and 30—36.

The Board reviewed its existing regulations regarding distance education. Currently, a distance education course provider must receive approval for course design and delivery mechanism from the International Distance Education Certification Center (IDECC). In addition, a written examination must be proctored by an official approved by a college, university or other course provider. There is no provision for remote proctoring.

During the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the use of online platforms for qualifying and continuing education courses increased significantly. As a result of lessons learned during the pandemic, the AQB refined the Federal distance education standards in a number of ways. First, distance education is now divided into three distinct categories: synchronous, asynchronous and hybrid. Synchronous is a distance education offering where the instructor and the learner are in separate locations but have live, simultaneous interaction on an online platform. Asynchronous is a distance education offering where the instructor and learner do not have simultaneous interaction; computer-based learning is used. Hybrid is an educational offering that uses both in-person and online synchronous or asynchronous interaction.

Second, the AQB considers synchronous distance education to be substantially the same as a traditional, inperson course. See AQB Qualification Criteria, page 9. Providers of synchronous distance education will have to meet the same classroom hour requirements as a traditional, in-person course. The classroom hour requirement mandates that a class hour is defined as 60 minutes, of which at least 50 minutes must be instruction. The prescribed number of class hours includes time for examinations. The classroom hour requirement also mandates that course credits are obtained from certain types of education providers, including colleges or universities, real estate appraisal or real estate-related organizations, state or Federal agencies or commissions, proprietary schools and The Appraisal Foundation or its Boards (AQB and ASB). See AQB Qualification Criteria, III.A and III.B, pages 8-9. To meet the classroom hour requirement, synchronous distance education does not require the education provider to seek additional approval from a certifying entity for course design and course delivery mechanism. See AQB Qualification Criteria, page 9. The IDECC is an example of an entity that certifies the design and delivery mechanism of distance education courses.

Third, unlike synchronous distance education, asynchronous distance education will require additional approval for course design and course delivery mechanism as part of the classroom requirement. See AQB Qualification Criteria, III.A, III.B and III.D.1-3, pages 8-9. The AQB has determined, however, that entities other than the IDECC can also provide approval of course design and delivery mechanism for an asynchronous distance education course. The AQB established a list of the additional approval sources. See AQB Qualification Criteria, page 9. The AQB did not eliminate the IDECC as a valid delivery mechanism approval entity for distance education courses. See AQB Qualification Criteria Q & As, effective September 8, 2023, page 5.

Fourth, hybrid courses must meet the classroom hour requirements of its component parts, whether the component parts are composed of in-person education, synchronous distance education or asynchronous distance education. See AQB Qualification Criteria, pages 8-9.

Finally, remote proctoring of an examination, including biometric proctoring, is acceptable. Biometric proctoring provides that student identity is continually verified through processes, such as facial recognition, consistency in keystroke cadence and the observation of activity in the testing location, so that aberrant behavior or activity can be readily observed. See AQB Qualification Criteria, footnote 1, page 10.

The distance education requirements contained in this proposed rulemaking reflect the minimum Federal standards as adopted by the AQB. See AQB Qualification Criteria, pages 9—11. This proposed rulemaking provides AQB-compliant distance education standards for continuing education for certified real estate appraisers, certified broker/appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees. It also provides AQB-compliant distance education standards for qualifying education for certified real estate appraisers and licensed appraiser trainees. Although assessor/ evaluator programs are not subject to the Federal oversight of the ASC, certified Pennsylvania evaluator stakeholders expressed support for complying with the same distance education standards as appraisers and the Board agreed with this approach. Currently, § 36.224 of the regulations regarding distance education for certified Pennsylvania evaluators requires that a distance education course provider must receive approval for course design and delivery mechanism from the IDECC. Appraiser and assessor stakeholders have considered the IDECC approval process to be lengthy and, consequently, burdensome. The AQB's Federal distance education standards, however, would provide welcome relief to certified Pennsylvania evaluator course providers because synchronous distance education does not require additional approval for course design and delivery mechanism. Also, approval for course design and delivery mechanism for asynchronous distance education can be obtained from a number of different sources, not just the IDECC. Therefore, in uniformity with appraiser requirements, this proposed rulemaking provides AQB-compliant distance education standards for certified Pennsylvania evaluator qualifying and continuing education courses.

The Board reviewed its current regulations regarding virtual supervision. Currently, the Board's regulations do not provide for virtual supervision or mentoring of appraiser candidates. Appraiser training requires that a candidate becomes licensed as an appraiser trainee under the direct supervision and control of a supervisory appraiser. The appraiser trainee must obtain appraisal experience by conducting physical inspections of the interior and exterior of properties. The appraiser trainee is permitted to assist in the performance of only those appraisals that are within the supervisory appraiser's scope of practice.

The updates to the AQB Qualification Criteria include Federal standards for PAREA as an alternative to the traditional supervisory appraiser/appraiser trainee model of experience training. Under the traditional supervisory appraiser/appraiser trainee model, the trainee conducts onsite physical inspections of the interior and exterior of subject properties to fulfill the experience requirement for certified residential or general real estate appraiser. The trainee assists in the performance of appraisals that are within their supervisory appraiser's scope of practice. Appraiser trainees often have supervisory appraisers whose scope of practice is limited to a certain geographic location where certain types of properties are more common than others. PAREA is the concept of using simulated computer-based, virtual training and mentoring to fulfill the experience requirement to become a certified real estate appraiser. The PAREA program must be approved by the AQB and follow all AQB requirements. A participant in the PAREA program meets virtually with a mentor, who is a certified real estate appraiser. The PAREA program allows a participant to learn

how to conduct virtual inspections of various types of properties that may have been unavailable to an appraiser candidate under the traditional supervisory appraiser/appraiser trainee model, such as condominiums. A virtual inspection is an interior and exterior inspection that takes place remotely without the appraiser candidate being physically present at the property. The mentor provides the PAREA participant with guidance, advice and counseling as the participant performs specific tasks and completes assigned work. See AQB Real Property Appraiser Qualification Criteria Q & As, effective July 18, 2023, pages 67-68. PAREA provides the necessary experience for a candidate to be qualified to take the certified real estate appraiser examination.

PAREA is an important part of the National effort to promote diversity, equity and inclusion in the appraisal profession. Real estate appraising is an aging profession. In an article on https://www.fanniemae.com/ entitled, "Intriguing Future of Appraisal Careers," it was noted that 49% of appraisers are 51 years of age to 65 years of age, and 13% are 66 years of age or older. See Fannie Mae Perspectives Blog, Intriguing Future of Appraisal Careers by Jacob Williamson, VP, Single-Family Credit Risk Collateral Management, Federal National Mortgage Association (FNMA aka Fannie Mae), June 3, 2019. The number one complaint that the AQB has received regarding entering the appraisal profession is that potential candidates cannot find a supervisory appraiser to complete the experience requirement for certification. Women, people of color and people who live in rural areas have a particularly hard time finding a credentialed appraiser who will agree to supervise them. The goal is for PAREA to make the appraisal profession more accessible to diverse groups of people, which is necessary for the survival of the profession.

This proposed rulemaking adds PAREA as an alternative to the traditional supervisory appraiser/appraiser trainee model of experience training for certified real estate appraiser candidates. The Board proposes to allow 100% of the experience requirement for certified residential real estate appraiser candidates to be fulfilled through completion of an AQB-approved certified residential appraiser PAREA program. The approved PAREA programs require participants to complete educational prerequisites prior to commencement of training for the Certified Residential Module.

This proposed rulemaking also allows 50% of the experience requirement for certified general real estate appraiser candidates to be fulfilled through completion of an AQB-approved certified residential appraiser PAREA program. Since the AQB has not yet authorized the development of a certified general appraiser PAREA program that would cover commercial or nonresidential experience, the nonresidential portion (50%) of the experience requirement for certified general appraiser candidates would have to be completed through the traditional supervisory appraiser/appraiser trainee model.

The Board began its discussions with stakeholders using two different annexes: one addressing distance education, and the other addressing virtual supervision. The Board discussed distance education at public meetings on January 20, 2022; March 2, 2022; April 14, 2022; May 26, 2022; July 7, 2022 and August 19, 2022. The Board discussed virtual supervision (including PAREA) at public meetings on April 14, 2022; May 26, 2022; July 7, 2022 and August 19, 2022. As a result of these discussions and because the statutory requirements set forth in Act 100 of 2021 address distance education and virtual

supervision together, the proposed regulatory amendments were merged into one proposed annex. The merger of the proposed regulations was discussed at the September 29, 2022, public meeting.

Prior to the merger, at the April 14, 2022, Board meeting, the Board reviewed and discussed the three written comments that had been received from stakeholders regarding the distance education annex. In attendance at the April 14, 2022, meeting were the manager of State and Industry Affairs at the Appraisal Institute, the Public Policy Manager of the Pennsylvania Association of Realtors and the Executive Director of the Assessors Association of Pennsylvania (AAP). One written comment submitted on March 10, 2022, by an AQB-Certified USPAP Instructor, stated, "...[u]pon review, I can find nothing constructive to offer that would enhance or clarify this document as written..." The Executive Director of the AAP commented that the proposed distance education regulations were great and coincided with previous Board discussions.

At the May 26, 2022, public meeting, the Board voted to amend § 36.31 (relating to provider registration/ appraisal courses) of the distance education annex to address a question that frequently presents itself, especially at the time of biennial license renewal. Licensees often ask whether the Board will accept continuing education course credits for courses that were not submitted for approval in this Commonwealth yet were approved by another state appraiser regulatory agency. Since all state appraiser regulatory agencies must comply with Federal AQB standards for qualifying and continuing education courses, the Board determined that course credit from a Commonwealth Board-approved education provider will be accepted for an appraisal course that was approved by another state appraiser regulatory agency. The Board also discussed the virtual supervision annex and made a number of amendments to the annex based on stakeholder engagement.

At the August 19, 2022, regularly scheduled public meeting, the Appraisal Institute expressed their support for the proposed regulatory changes regarding distance education. The Appraisal Institute made one suggestion regarding the definition of "asynchronous." Where the annex read that asynchronous education consisted of "pre-recorded lectures, webinars or videos for instruction," the Appraisal Institute suggested the following language:

Using computer-based learning, pre-recorded lectures, webinars or videos for instruction, students progress at their own pace and follow a structured course content and quiz/exam format.

The Appraisal Institute expressed its belief that the inclusion of "computer-based learning" would more broadly cover the types of asynchronous learning options that may be offered. The Board agreed with the Appraisal Institute's assessment and voted to adopt this suggested amendment.

The Appraisal Institute also suggested, for the virtual supervision annex, that the phrase "an AQB-approved PAREA program" should be modified to read "an AQB-approved Certified Residential PAREA Program" in §§ 36.11, 36.12 and 36.13 (relating to qualifications for certification as residential real estate appraiser; qualifications for certification as general real estate appraiser; qualifications for certification for preparation of appraisal reports; experience logs) of the regulations. This modification clarifies that completion of the Licensed Residential PAREA Program alone will not be acceptable in this

Commonwealth since the Commonwealth does not have a licensed residential real estate appraiser classification. The Board agreed with the Appraisal Institute's recommendation and voted to adopt this suggested amendment.

As previously stated, the proposed regulatory amendments were merged into one proposed annex and discussed at the September 29, 2022, public meeting. There was no opposition to the merger of the two proposed regulations.

Description of the Proposed Amendments

The Board proposes to amend Chapter 36, Subchapter A, to reflect the Federal updates to the AQB Qualification Criteria regarding distance education and PAREA.

Section 36.1 (relating to definitions) is proposed to be amended by adding definitions for the terms "asynchronous," "biometric proctoring," "hybrid," "mentor," "PAREA" and "synchronous" and amending the definition of "distance education." The definitions for these terms are drafted to conform with the AQB Qualification Criteria.

The Board proposes to amend § 36.11(b)(3)(i) pertaining to qualifications for certification as a residential real estate appraiser to reflect the updated AQB standards that must be met for a qualifying education course to be taught through synchronous, asynchronous and hybrid distance education. Subsection (b)(3)(ii) is proposed to be amended to reflect that a final, closed-book examination for a qualifying education course for certified residential appraiser candidates may be proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by a college or university or other course provider, consistent with AQB standards. The subsection authorizes biometric proctoring of the examination, consistent with AQB standards. Subsection (f) is proposed to be added to reflect that an applicant for certified residential appraiser can meet 100% of the experience requirement by successfully completing an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program provided conditions, as required by the AQB Qualification Criteria, are met.

The Board proposes to amend § 36.12(b)(3)(i) to reflect the updated AQB standards that must be met for a qualifying education course to be taught through synchronous, asynchronous and hybrid distance education. Subsection (b)(3)(ii) is proposed to be amended to reflect that a final, closed-book examination for a qualifying education course for certified general appraiser candidates may be proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by a college or university or other course provider. Subsection (b) also authorizes biometric proctoring of the examination. Subsection (f) is proposed to be added to reflect that an applicant for certified general appraiser can meet 50% of the experience requirement by successfully completing an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program. Subsection (f) also informs certified general appraiser applicants that they must complete the nonresidential portion of the experience requirement by obtaining licensure as an appraiser trainee, under the direct supervision of a supervisory appraiser, and comply with §§ 36.12(e) and 36.13 of the regulations and the AQB Qualification Criteria.

Section 36.12a(b)(4)(i) (relating to qualifications for licensure as appraiser trainee) is proposed to be amended to reflect the updated AQB standards that must be met for a qualifying education course to be taught through synchronous, asynchronous and hybrid distance education. The Board further proposes to amend subsection (b)(4)(ii) to allow a final, closed-book examination for a qualifying education course for licensed appraiser trainee

candidates to be proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by a college or university or other course provider. This subsection also authorizes biometric proctoring of the examination.

Under this proposed rulemaking, § 36.13(a)(2) would be amended by adding subparagraph (v), which would allow an applicant to complete 100% of the experience requirement for certification as a residential appraiser in an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program, provided that the applicant satisfies the requirements of § 36.13(c.1), which would require an applicant for certification as a residential real estate appraiser to submit to the Board a copy of their certificate of completion from the certified residential PAREA program. See AQB Qualification Criteria, page 14. This provision clarifies that no appraisal logs or samples need to be submitted to the Board. Proposed subparagraph (vi) would allow an applicant to complete 50% of the experience requirement for certification as a general appraiser in an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program, provided that the applicant satisfies the requirements of proposed subsection (c.2). See AQB Real Property Appraiser Qualification Criteria Q & As, effective July 18, 2023, pages 55-56. Proposed subsection (c.2) requires an applicant for certification as a general real estate appraiser to submit to the Board a copy of their certificate of completion from the certified residential PAREA program. In addition, the applicant must meet the nonresidential, commercial portion of the experience requirement for certified general appraiser by obtaining licensure as an appraiser trainee, under the direct supervision of a supervisory appraiser, and submitting appraisal logs and appraisal samples to the Board.

The Board proposes to add § 36.31(b) to clarify that education providers must obtain Board approval for each course that they wish to offer for qualifying education and continuing education credit. The Board is not establishing a new fee, but rather proposes to clarify that the applicable education provider application fee can be found in § 36.6 (relating to fees) and must be paid. In addition, subsection (c) is proposed to be added to clarify that the Board will accept course credits from a Commonwealth Board-approved education provider whose course has been approved by another state appraiser regulatory agency provided that the course meets the Board's requirements for qualifying education relating to classroom hours and for continuing education relating to subject matter and sources of continuing education and distance education. Under subsection (c), a Board-approved provider does not have to submit an application or pay a fee for courses approved by other state appraiser regulatory agencies.

Section 36.42(a) (relating to subject matter and sources of continuing education) currently states that continuing education subject matter and sources must comply with the requirements of the AQB Qualification Criteria. The Board proposes to amend subsection (a) by adding "classroom hours" as a requirement that must comply with the AQB Qualification Criteria for continuing education.

The Board proposes to amend § 36.43 (relating to distance education) to reflect the AQB standards that must be met for a continuing education course to be taught through synchronous, asynchronous and hybrid distance education. Paragraph (2) would allow an examination for a continuing education course to be proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by a college or university or another course provider. This paragraph also authorizes biometric proctoring of the examination.

The Board proposes to add § 36.45 (relating to asynchronous distance education) which will provide the classroom hour requirements that are specific to asynchronous distance education. The course must provide a way for the learner to interact with the instructor through verbal or written communication. The course content must be approved by an acceptable entity such as the AQB, the Board or another state appraiser regulatory agency, or an accredited college, community college or university that offers distance education programs. The course delivery mechanism must be approved by an acceptable entity such as the AQB, an AQB-approved organization, a college or university that qualifies for content approval that awards academic credit for the distance education course or a college or university that qualifies for content approval under subsection (b)(3) with a distance education delivery program that approves course design and delivery that incorporate interactivity.

The Board proposes to amend Subchapter C so that certified Pennsylvania evaluators can benefit from the same updates to distance education standards as appraisers. As noted previously, although assessor/evaluator programs are not subject to the Federal oversight of the ASC, certified Pennsylvania evaluator stakeholders expressed support for complying with the same distance education standards as appraisers as the AQB requirements eliminate unnecessary barriers to the delivery of distance education courses.

The Board proposes to amend § 36.224 to include the AQB standards that must be met for a qualifying education course to be taught through synchronous, asynchronous and hybrid distance education. Paragraph (2) would also be amended to reflect that a final, closed-book examination for a qualifying education course for certified Pennsylvania evaluator candidates may be proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by a college or university or another course provider. This paragraph also authorizes biometric proctoring of the examination.

The Board proposes a minor amendment in § 36.262(c) to fix a clerical error which the Board wishes to correct by changing the word "of" to "or" for sentence clarity.

The Board proposes amendments to § 36.263 to include the AQB standards that must be met for a continuing education course to be taught through synchronous, asynchronous and hybrid distance education. Paragraph (2) is amended to reflect that an examination for a continuing education course may be proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by a college or university or another course provider. The paragraph also authorizes biometric proctoring of the examination.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The application costs for approval of qualifying education and continuing education courses are borne by education providers.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of the Board's regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on June 3, 2024, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the chairperson of the

Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee of the Senate and to the chairperson of the Professional Licensure Committee of the House. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor.

CHAPTER 36. STATE BOARD OF CERTIFIED REAL ESTATE APPRAISERS

Subchapter A. GENERAL PROVISIONS GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 36.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* * * * *

Appraisal review—An analysis of a completed appraisal report to determine if it conforms to specific requirements and guidelines and to ensure that the report is consistent and mathematically correct.

Asynchronous—A distance education offering where the learner and instructor are in separate locations and their interaction is not simultaneous. Using computer-based learning, learners progress at their own pace and follow a structured course content and quiz or exam schedule.

Biometric proctoring—A remote proctoring tool that uses software to continually verify a person's identity and activity through processes such as facial recognition, consistency in keystroke cadence and monitoring the activity of the remote testing location, so that aberrant behavior or activity such as eye movement, body position or speech can be readily observed.

Board—The State Board of Certified Real Estate Appraisers within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs in the Department of State of the Commonwealth

* * * * *

Certified residential real estate appraiser—A person who holds a certificate issued under $\underline{\mathbf{the}}$ authority of section 6(a)(1) and (d) of the act and \S 36.11 (relating to qualifications for certification as residential real estate appraiser) and who is authorized to perform appraisals of residential properties of one-to-four dwelling units in all transactions, whether Federally-related or non-Federally-related

Distance education—Except as otherwise required by AQB Qualification Criteria, an educational process based on the geographical separation of the learner and instructor, which provides interaction between the learner and instructor [and includes], is offered in synchronous, asynchronous or hybrid format and may include testing. Examples include CD-ROM or DVD-ROM, on-line learning, correspondence courses, pre-recorded lectures, webinars, video conferencing, and video and remote television courses.

FIRREA—The Financial Institutions Reform, Recovery, and Enforcement Act of 1989 (Pub.L. No. 101-73, 103 Stat. 183).

* * * * *

Highest and best use analysis—A study which represents the reasonable and probable use that results in the highest present value of the land or improved property after considering all legally permissible, physically possible and economically feasible uses.

<u>Hybrid</u>—An educational offering that uses both in-person and online synchronous or asynchronous interaction.

IDECC—International Distance Education Certification Center.

In good standing—

- (i) When referring to an individual certified or licensed by the Board to perform appraisals, an individual who is authorized under the act to perform appraisals or to act as a licensed appraiser trainee.
- (ii) The term includes an individual who has an active, unrestricted certificate or license, or a certificate or license that is on probation or subject to a restriction ordered by the Board.
- (iii) The term does not include an individual who holds a certificate or license that is inactive, expired, suspended or revoked.

Licensed appraiser trainee—A person who holds a license issued under section 6(a.1) of the act and § 36.12a (relating to qualifications for licensure as appraiser trainee) and who is authorized to assist a certified residential real estate appraiser or certified general real estate appraiser in the performance of an appraisal.

Mentor—A State-certified residential or general real estate appraiser who meets the AQB Qualification Criteria for guiding, advising and counseling PAREA program participants.

PAREA—Practical Applications of Real Estate Appraisal—An AQB-approved simulated experience training program that serves as an alternative to the licensed appraiser trainee pathway to licensure

under § 36.12a and provides creditable appraisal experience without direct supervision of a supervisory appraiser.

Real estate counseling—Providing, for a fee, disinterested and unbiased advice, professional guidance and judgment in the broad field of real estate, involving all segments of the business, including marketing, leasing, managing, planning, financing, appraising, providing testimony and other similar services. Real estate counseling is a specialty area in which the counselor clearly identifies the real estate problem to be solved, determines the most satisfactory solutions and, where appropriate, follows through on the implementation.

* * * * *

Review appraiser—A person who performs an appraisal review.

Synchronous—A distance education offering where the instructor and learners are in separate locations but have live, simultaneous interaction using an online platform.

USPAP—The Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice promulgated by the Appraisal Standards Board of The Appraisal Foundation.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR CERTIFICATION OR LICENSURE

§ 36.11. Qualifications for certification as residential real estate appraiser.

* * * * *

- (b) Appraisal classroom hours. An applicant for certification as a residential real estate appraiser shall submit evidence to the Board of having completed the classroom hours required by the AQB Qualification Criteria as of the date of the application.
- (1) Length of classroom hour and courses; course examination requirement.

* * * * *

- (3) Distance education. Distance education courses must comply with the requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria. A distance education course is acceptable to meet the classroom hour requirement if the course **complies with paragraphs** (1) and (2), is approved by the Board and meets all of the following conditions:
- (i) The course is presented [by one of the following] in one of the following ways:
- (A) [An accredited (Commission on Colleges or a regional accreditation association) college or university that offers distance education programs in other disciplines] Synchronous distance education.
- (B) [A course provider that has received approval for course design and delivery mechanism from the IDECC and approval for course content from the Board or from the AQB through its Course Approval Program] Asynchronous distance education that meets the requirements of § 36.45 (relating to asynchronous distance education).
- (C) Hybrid distance education that meets the class hour requirements of its component parts, whether in person, synchronous or asynchronous.
- (ii) The applicant successfully completes a written, closed-book final examination proctored in person or

<u>remotely</u> by an official approved by the college, university or other course provider. <u>Biometric proctoring is</u> acceptable.

(iii) The length and content of the course meet the requirements of paragraph (1) and subsection (c), respectively.

* * * * *

- (e) *Experience*. An applicant's experience must comply with all of the following:
- (1) An applicant for certification as a residential real estate appraiser shall satisfy the experience requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria.

* * * * *

- (4) Acceptable categories of appraisal experience include all of the following:
 - (i) Fee and staff appraisals.

* * * * *

- (x) Case studies or practicum courses that are approved by the AQB Course Approval Program.
- (f) Experience through PAREA. Notwithstanding the requirements of subsection (e), an applicant can meet 100% of the experience requirement by successfully completing an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program, under all of the following conditions:
- (1) The applicant must comply with the prerequisites for entry into a PAREA program contained in the AQB Qualification Criteria.
- (2) The PAREA program must be approved by the AQB and continuously comply with the requirements of the AQB Qualification Criteria.
- (3) The PAREA program must provide the applicant with a mentor who meets the requirements of the AQB Qualification Criteria.
- (4) The applicant must successfully complete the entire certified residential PAREA program and submit a certificate of completion to the Board to receive credit for 100% of the experience requirement. There is no credit for partial completion of the program.
- § 36.12. Qualifications for certification as general real estate appraiser.

- (b) Appraisal classroom hours. An applicant for certification as a general real estate appraiser shall submit evidence to the Board of having completed the classroom hours required by the AQB Qualification Criteria as of the date of application.
- (1) Length of classroom hour and courses; course examination requirement.

- (3) Distance education. Distance education courses must comply with the requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria. A distance education course is acceptable to meet the classroom hour requirement if the course **complies with paragraphs** (1) and (2), is approved by the Board [,] and meets all of the following conditions:
- (i) The course is presented [by one of the following] in one of the following ways:

- (A) [An accredited (Commission on Colleges or a regional accreditation association) college or university that offers distance education programs in other disciplines] Synchronous distance education.
- (B) [A course provider that has received approval for course design and delivery mechanism from the IDECC and approval for course content from the Board or from the AQB through its Course Approval Program] Asynchronous distance education that meets the requirements of § 36.45 (relating to asynchronous distance education).
- (C) Hybrid distance education that meets the class hour requirements of its component parts, whether in person, synchronous or asynchronous.
- (ii) The applicant successfully completes a written, closed-book final examination proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by the college, university or other course provider. Biometric proctoring is acceptable.
- (iii) The length and content of the course meet the requirements of paragraph (1) and subsection (c), respectively.
 - (c) Content of appraisal education.

- (e) *Experience*. An applicant's experience must comply with all of the following:
- (1) An applicant for certification as a general real estate appraiser shall satisfy the experience requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria.

* * * * *

- (4) Acceptable categories of appraisal experience include:
 - (i) Fee and staff appraisals.

* * * * *

- (x) Case studies or practicum courses that are approved by the AQB Course Approval Program.
- (f) Experience through PAREA. Notwithstanding the requirements of subsection (e), an applicant can meet 50% of the experience requirement by successfully completing an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program, under all of the following conditions:
- (1) The applicant must comply with the prerequisites for entry into a PAREA program contained in the AQB Qualification Criteria.
- (2) The PAREA program must be approved by the AQB and continuously comply with the requirements of the AQB Qualification Criteria.
- (3) The PAREA program must provide the applicant with a mentor who meets the requirements of the AQB Qualification Criteria.
- (4) The applicant shall successfully complete the entire certified residential PAREA program and submit a certificate of completion to the Board to receive credit for 50% of the experience requirement. There is no credit for partial completion of the program.
- (5) The completed certified residential PAREA program may only count towards the residential portion of the certified general real estate appraiser experience requirement.

- (6) To complete the nonresidential portion of the experience requirement, the applicant must meet all of the following requirements:
 - (i) Obtain licensure as an appraiser trainee.
- (ii) Be under the direct supervision of a supervisory appraiser.
- (iii) Comply with the requirements of subsection (e), § 36.13 (relating to experience options for preparation of appraisal reports; experience logs) and the AQB Qualification Criteria.
- § 36.12a. Qualifications for licensure as appraiser trainee.

* * * * *

- (b) Appraisal classroom hours. An applicant for licensure as an appraiser trainee shall comply with the qualifying educational standards required by the AQB Qualification Criteria.
 - (1) Content of appraisal education.

* * * * *

- (4) Distance education. Distance education courses must comply with the requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria. A distance education course is acceptable to meet the classroom hour requirement if the course <u>complies</u> with <u>paragraphs</u> (1)—(3), is approved by the Board and meets all of the following conditions:
- (i) The course is presented [by one of the following] in one of the following ways:
- (A) [An accredited (Commission on Colleges or a regional accreditation association) college or university that offers distance education programs in other disciplines] Synchronous distance education.
- (B) [A course provider that has received approval for course design and delivery mechanism from the IDECC and approval for course content from the Board or from the AQB through its Course Approval Program] Asynchronous distance education that meets the requirements of § 36.45 (relating to asynchronous distance education).
- (C) Hybrid distance education that meets the classroom hour requirements of its component parts, whether in person, synchronous or asynchronous.
- (ii) The applicant successfully completes a written, closed-book final examination proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by the college, university or other course provider. Biometric proctoring is acceptable.
- (iii) The content and classroom hours of the course meet the requirements of paragraphs (1) and (2).

* * * * *

§ 36.13. Experience options for preparation of appraisal reports; experience logs.

(a) An applicant for certification as a residential real estate appraiser or a general real estate appraiser under §§ 36.11 and 36.12 (relating to qualifications for certification as residential real estate appraiser; and qualifications for certification as general real estate appraiser) shall have acquired experience in the preparation of appraisal reports in one or more of the following:

(1) Prior to September 3, 1998:

* * * * *

- (2) On or after September 3, 1998:
- (i) As a certified broker/appraiser.
- (ii) As an assistant to a certified residential real estate appraiser or certified general real estate appraiser, provided the experience is acquired before October 1, 2010, and the assistant satisfies the requirements of subsection (b).
- (iii) As a licensed appraiser trainee assisting a certified residential real estate appraiser or certified general real estate appraiser, provided the trainee satisfies the requirements of subsection (c).
- (iv) As a certified residential real estate appraiser assisting a general real estate appraiser in an appraisal of nonresidential property or an appraisal of residential property of more than four dwelling units, provided the residential appraiser satisfies the requirements of subsection (d).
- (v) As an applicant for certification as a residential real estate appraiser completing 100% of the experience requirement in an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program, provided the applicant satisfies the requirements of subsection (c.1).
- (vi) As a licensed appraiser trainee applying for certification as a general real estate appraiser completing 50% of the experience requirement in an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program, provided the applicant satisfies the requirements of subsection (c.2).
- (b) For experience acquired before October 1, 2010, an assistant to a certified general real estate appraiser or certified residential real estate appraiser shall comply with all of the following requirements when preparing an appraisal report:

* * * * *

- (c) A licensed appraiser trainee shall comply with all of the following requirements when preparing an appraisal report for a certified general real estate appraiser or certified residential real estate appraiser:
- (1) The trainee may not be supervised by more than one residential or general appraiser on each appraisal assignment.
- (2) The trainee shall perform an inspection of the interior and exterior of the property.
- (3) The trainee may not arrive at an independent determination of value.
 - (4) The trainee shall comply with USPAP.
- (5) The trainee shall complete and co-sign a Board-approved appraiser trainee checklist that relates to the trainee's work on the appraisal report and that is made part of the appraisal report submitted to the client.
- (c.1) An applicant for certification as a residential real estate appraiser who acquires experience through an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program shall submit the certificate of completion to the Board as documentation of compliance with the experience requirement. Appraisal logs or appraisal samples do not need to be submitted to the Board.

- (c.2) An applicant for certification as a general real estate appraiser who acquires experience through an AQB-approved certified residential PAREA program shall submit the certificate of completion to the Board as documentation of compliance with the residential portion of the experience requirement. An applicant must also meet all of the following requirements:
 - (1) Obtain licensure as an appraiser trainee.
- (2) Meet the requirements of subsections (c) and (d).
- (3) Submit appraisal logs as well as appraisal work samples to the Board for the nonresidential portion of the experience requirement for a certified general real estate appraiser.
- (d) A certified residential real estate appraiser shall comply with all of the following requirements when preparing an appraisal report for a certified general real estate appraiser:

APPROVAL PROCESS—PROVIDERS

§ 36.31. Provider registration/appraisal courses.

- (a) Real estate appraisal or real estate related organizations, State or Federal agencies or commissions, proprietary schools and other providers other than accredited colleges or universities and community or junior colleges, seeking to offer appraisal courses for classroom hour credit or continuing education credit shall complete and file with the Board an application for Board approval as a provider for appraisal courses. Application forms and a list of Board approved providers of appraisal courses may be obtained from the Administrative Office of the Board, Post Office Box 2649, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17105-2649, (717) 783-4866.
- (b) An education provider must obtain Board approval for qualifying education and continuing education courses and shall pay the applicable provider course application fee as required under § 36.6 (relating to fees).
- (c) Notwithstanding the course approval requirement in subsection (b), the Board will accept course credit hours from a Commonwealth Board-approved education provider whose appraisal course was approved by another state appraiser regulatory agency. The course must meet the requirements for qualifying education under §§ 36.11(b), 36.12(b) and 36.12a(b) (relating to qualifications for certification as residential real estate appraiser; qualifications for certification as general real estate appraiser; and qualifications for licensure as appraiser trainee) or for continuing education under §§ 36.42 and 36.43 (relating to subject matter and sources of continuing education; and distance education), if applicable.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

§ 36.42. Subject matter and sources of continuing education.

(a) Continuing education subject matter, classroom hours and sources must comply with the requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria.

§ 36.43. Distance education.

Distance education courses must comply with the requirements in the AQB Qualification Criteria. A distance education course is acceptable for continuing education credit if it is approved by the Board and meets all of the following conditions:

- (1) The course is presented by one of the following:
- (i) A course provider of synchronous distance education that presents the course to an organized group in an instructional setting with a person qualified and available to answer questions, provide information and monitor attendance.
- (ii) An accredited (Commission on Colleges or a regional accreditation association) college or university that offers distance education programs in other disciplines.
- (iii) [A course provider that has received approval for course design and delivery mechanism from the IDECC and approval for course content from the Board or from the AQB through its Course Approval Program] A provider of asynchronous educational course offerings that meets the requirements of § 36.45 (relating to asynchronous distance education).
- (2) With regard to a course presented under paragraph (1)(ii) or (iii), the certified real estate appraiser or the licensed appraiser trainee either successfully completes a written examination proctored **in person or remotely** by an official approved by the college, university or other course provider or successfully completes the course mechanisms required for course accreditation that evidence the learner's mastery and fluency of the course content. **Biometric proctoring is acceptable.**
- (3) The [content and length of the course] subject matter, classroom hours and source of continuing education meet the requirements of § 36.42 (relating to subject matter and sources of continuing education).

(Editor's Note: Section 36.45 is proposed to be added and is printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

§ 36.45. Asynchronous distance education.

An asynchronous distance education course is acceptable to meet classroom hour requirements for qualifying education or continuing education if:

- (a) The course provides a way for the learner to interact with the instructor through verbal or written communication.
- (b) The course content is approved by any of the following:
 - (1) The AQB.
- (2) The Board or another state appraiser regulatory agency.
- (3) An accredited college, community college or university that offers distance education programs and is approved or accredited by the Commission on Colleges, a regional or National accreditation association, or by an accrediting agency that is recognized by the United States Secretary of Education.
- (c) The course delivery mechanism is approved by any of the following sources:
 - (1) The AQB.
- (2) An AQB-approved organization providing approval of course design and delivery, including The Appraisal Foundation or other independent AQB-approved entity.

- (3) A college or university that qualifies for content approval under subsection (b)(3) that awards academic credit for the distance education course.
- (4) A college or university that qualifies for content approval under subsection (b)(3) with a distance education delivery program that approves the course design and delivery that incorporate interactivity.
 - (5) IDECC.

Subchapter C. CERTIFIED PENNSYLVANIA EVALUATORS

QUALIFICATIONS FOR CERTIFICATION

§ 36.224. Distance education courses.

A distance education course is acceptable to meet the classroom hour requirement if the course is approved by the Board, **complies with** § **36.223** (**relating to providers of appraisal/assessment courses**) and meets the following conditions:

- (1) The course is presented [by one of the following] in one of the following ways:
- (i) [An accredited (Commission on Colleges or a regional accreditation association) college or university that offers distance education programs in other disciplines] Synchronous distance education.
- (ii) [A course provider that has received approval for course design and delivery mechanism from the IDECC and approval for course content from the Board or from the AQB through its Course Approval Program] Asynchronous distance education that complies with § 36.45 (relating to asynchronous distance education).
- (iii) Hybrid distance education that meets the class hour requirements of each of the course's component parts, whether in person, synchronous or asynchronous.
- (2) [The applicant successfully completes a written examination proctored by an official approved by the college, university or other course provider]
 The applicant must successfully complete a written, closed-book final examination proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by the college, university or other course provider. Biometric proctoring is acceptable.
- (3) The content and length of the course meet the requirements of § 36.222 (relating to required courses of study).

CONTINUING EDUCATION

§ 36.262. Continuing education subject matter.

* * * * *

(c) Credit for the classroom hour requirement may be obtained from accredited colleges or universities and community or junior colleges. Subject to Board approval under § 36.241 (relating to provider registration/appraisal or assessment courses) credit for the classroom hour requirement may also be obtained from real estate appraisal [of] or assessment related organizations, State or Federal agencies or commissions, proprietary schools, and other providers.

* * * * *

§ 36.263. Distance education.

A distance education course is acceptable for continuing education credit if it is approved by the Board and meets the following conditions:

- (1) The course is presented by one of the following:
- (i) A course provider of synchronous distance education that presents the course to an organized group in an instructional setting with a person qualified and available to answer questions, provide information and monitor attendance.
- (ii) An accredited (Commission on Colleges or a regional accreditation association) college or university that offers distance education programs in other disciplines.
- (iii) [A course provider that has received approval for course design and delivery mechanism from the IDECC and approval for course content from the Board or from the AQB through its Course Approval Program] A provider of asynchronous educational course offerings that meets the requirements of § 36.45 (relating to asynchronous distance education).
- (2) With regard to a course presented under paragraph (1)(ii) or (iii), the certified Pennsylvania evaluator either successfully completes a written examination proctored in person or remotely by an official approved by the college, university or other course provider or successfully completes the course mechanisms required for course accreditation that evidence the learner's mastery and fluency of the course content. Biometric proctoring is acceptable.
- (3) The content and length of the course meets the requirements of § 36.262 (relating to continuing education subject matter).

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 117] Boating; Boat Rental Businesses

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 117 (relating to boat rental businesses). The Commission is publishing this proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). These proposed amendments update the Commission's regulations relating to boat rental businesses and generally promote boating safety, ensuring renters receive training regarding the boat, waters, safety equipment and rules. The more specific rationale for each amended section is described as follows:

- 1.) Section 117.1 (relating to definitions) is proposed to be amended to include paddleboards as a rental boat, which provides standardization and clarity.
- 2.) Section 117.3 (relating to responsibilities) is proposed to be amended to include business reporting standards, safety orientation requirements and necessary documentation livery operators are required to provide to the Commission. These proposed amendments will help the Commission identify liveries, facilitate annual safety inspections and standardize regulation updates and best practices. These proposed changes also ensure that rental boats are registered or permitted, that those conducting

orientation receive standardized education, a written rental agreement that formalizes the transaction and serves as a record of lawful rental and renter orientation and that the Commission is informed of incidents involving rentals.

3.) Section 117.4 (relating to motorboat liveries) is proposed to be amended to clarify livery operators' requirements for verifying proper safety training for renters and proper measures to take to oversee the operation of rented personal watercraft. These amendments will ensure livery operators are monitoring the use of rental boats and providing information about the area in which the rental boat may be used.

A. Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect January 1, 2025.

C. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments to §§ 117.1, 117.3 and 117.4 are published under the statutory authority of section 5122 (relating to registrations, licenses, permits, plates and statistics) of the code.

D. Purpose and Background

The specific purpose and background of the proposed amendments are described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. Summary of Proposal

Boat rental businesses, also known as liveries, provide introductory experiences for newcomers to boating, convenient adventures for outdoor recreationists and opportunities to participate in boating without the commitment of boat ownership. They also provide unique experiences such as whitewater rafting, overnight stays in houseboats and opportunities to try the latest trends in boating technology. Boat rental operations in this Commonwealth have increased in number and expanded available opportunities in recent years. Because these businesses provide a wide variety of services to a broad diversity of people and are often a gateway to boat ownership, boat rental businesses play an important role in boating safety.

The Commission is authorized to promulgate rules and regulations relating to boat rental business operators under 30 Pa.C.S. § 5122(a)(2). These regulations authorize the Executive Director to provide guidance relating to boat rental orientation and introduction requirements which are posted on the Pennsylvania Boat Rental Business page of the Commission's web site. Frontline waterways conservation officers initially identified issues, including lack of clarity, with current boat rental regulations and guidelines. Additionally, technological advances have created specific challenges and opportunities regarding boat rental business operations. In response, Commission staff launched a Livery Workgroup in February 2022, conducting livery visits and interviews and established an online boat rental business questionnaire to identify challenges, gather information and recommend updates to the Commission's boat rental business regulations and guidelines to enhance communications and compliance, increase boating safety and reduce conflicts on the water. Boat rental business operators were invited to review and provide feedback on the draft regulatory amendments and safety orientation guidelines prepared by Commission staff. Commission staff reviewed and considered all input as final modifications were made to the drafts before presenting the proposed changes to the Boating Advisory Board. Commission staff proposes that §§ 117.1, 117.3 and 117.4 be amended to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. Paperwork

This proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

This proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions.

Annex A

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION Subpart C. BOATING

CHAPTER 117. BOAT RENTAL BUSINESSES § 117.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Boat livery—A commercial enterprise (person, partnership, corporation or other legal entity) that rents or leases rental boats to other persons for use on the waters of this Commonwealth.

Boat rental business—A boat livery.

Boat rental transaction—The exchange of consideration in the form of money, goods or services for the use of a rental boat for a period of time.

Livery operator—The owner or lessee of a boat livery and [employees] employees and other persons authorized to act on behalf of the boat livery.

Rental boat—A vessel propelled by oars, paddles, sail or power, rented or leased in this Commonwealth.

- (i) The term includes canoes, kayaks, **paddleboards**, inflatable boats, rowboats, sailboats, personal watercraft and other motorboats.
- (ii) The term does not include inner tubes or similar devices not considered to be boats under this title.

§ 117.3. Responsibilities.

(a) [It is unlawful for a livery operator to permit a rental boat to depart from the boat rental busi-

ness without the equipment required by this title for the type of boat being rented] [Reserved].

- (a.1) A livery operator shall provide their business information, including business name, address and types of boats rented, on a form provided by the Commission. If a change in business name, address or contact information occurs, the livery must provide an update to the Commission within 15 business days. Advertising by any means, including, but not limited to, web sites, business cards, brochures, newspapers, periodicals or billboards, that a person provides boat rentals shall be prima facie evidence of a boat livery operation.
- (a.2) A livery operator who conducts the required safety orientation for motorboat rentals must possess a boating safety education certificate issued by the Commission or other valid documentation specified by this title and produce it upon the request of a waterways conservation officer or other officer authorized to enforce the code.
- (a.3) It is unlawful for a livery operator to permit a rental boat to depart from the boat rental business without the equipment required by this title for the type of boat being rented and a boat registration or use permit affixed to the boat as required by this title for the access area or waterway where the boat will be operated during the rental period.
- (b) A livery operator shall [offer to all persons renting] provide to all persons operating rental boats an orientation/introduction to boating safety and conditions, including a review of the laws and regulations applicable to the type of boat being rented and the waters on which the boat will be used. The Executive Director will provide guidance [in the preparation] on the content and documentation of this orientation. [Persons who produce a Boating Safety Education Certificate issued or approved by the Commission under § 91.6 (relating to certificates) are exempt from review.]
- (c) Boat rental transactions shall be made using a written agreement, specifying the name and address of the boat rental business and lessee, [number of persons in the lessee's party and date of departure] the names of the individuals completing the required orientation/introduction to boating safety and the rental period. The lessee shall provide a copy of the boat rental agreement upon request to a waterways conservation officer or other officer authorized to enforce the code.
- (d) Livery boats shall be clearly marked on both sides for easy identification of the business. Each boat shall be marked with letters, numbers or decals at least 3 inches tall.
- (e) A livery operator shall only rent boats that meet or exceed minimum United States Coast Guard requirements for boats of that type. Rental boats shall be of a design and material suitable for their intended use.
- (f) A livery operator shall **[submit a boating accident report for]** notify the Commission of all reportable accidents involving one or more of the rental boats in accordance with Chapter 101 (relating to boating accidents). This requirement is in addition to the requirement that the operator of the boat file a boating accident report in accordance with Chapter 101.

(g) It is unlawful for a livery operator to rent or use a boat in excess of its capacity as set forth by the manufacturer for the total number of passengers, total weight or maximum horsepower.

§ 117.4. Motorboat liveries.

(a) In addition to the requirements of § 117.3 (relating to responsibilities), a livery operator that rents boats equipped with motors greater than 25 horsepower and personal watercraft shall verify that operators of these boats either possess a permanent Boating Safety Education Certificate or have obtained a temporary Boating Safety Certificate from the livery. The Executive Director may authorize boat liveries to issue temporary Boating Safety Education Certificates, effective for the period of rental only, to operators of these boats if the boat livery and the operator comply with the requirements governing the rental of boats and the operation of boat liveries as defined in this chapter. The Executive Director will establish rules and guidelines for the issuance of temporary certificates.] Persons born on or after January 1, 1982, who rent a boat powered by greater than 25 horsepower or a personal watercraft are exempt from possessing a Boating Safety Education Certificate when the livery operator verifies the renter has completed the required orientation/introduction to boating safety and conditions in accordance with

the Executive Director's guidance established by § 117.3 (relating to responsibilities).

- (b) A personal watercraft livery shall take measures to oversee the operation of rented personal watercraft [by persons who possess only a temporary Boating Safety Education Certificate]. These measures shall include one of the following:
- (1) The designation of a specified [, marked] area of operation for rented personal watercraft as delineated on a map carried onboard the boat.
- (2) The provision of qualified observers employed by the livery to directly observe the operation of rented personal watercraft and provide immediate assistance in case of an incident or breach of terms of the rental agreement. No more than seven personal watercraft may be under the observation of a single observer at any one time. Qualified observers shall be at least 16 years of age, have at least 10 hours of experience operating personal watercraft and have successfully completed the requirements for a permanent Boating Safety Education Certificate. The permanent Boating Safety Education Certificate shall be in the observer's possession when performing duties under this paragraph.
- (c) A personal watercraft livery may not lease, hire or rent a personal watercraft to or for use by a person who is 15 years of age or younger.

Notice of Intent to Issue A Plan Approval and Amend A Title V Operating Permit

Notice is hereby given pursuant to 25 Pa. Code Sections 127.44(b) and 127.424(b), that the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) intends to issue Plan Approval 62-00017AB to United Refining Company for: (1) the installation of a new steel welded storage tank for finished gasoline and naphtha storage, and (2) increased short term emission limits and hourly loading capacity for the proposed West End Loading Rack at the company's facility located at 15 Bradley St., City of Warren, Warren County. The facility currently has a Title V Operating Permit No. 62-00017. The Plan Approval will subsequently be incorporated into the Title V Operating Permit through an administrative amendment in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Section 127.450.

Plan Approval No. 62-00017AB is for the installation of a 138,784 bbl capacity finished gasoline and naphtha storage tank, which will be used to provide additional flexibility in inventory control. The Plan Approval Application is dated August 25, 2023. This new tank (named Tank 251) will help balance the outage schedule of other tanks and allow proper storage capacity. The tank will be 110 feet in diameter and 82 feet high, and will have a steel pan single deck internal floating roof, with a mechanical shoe seal. Volatile Organic Chemical emissions from the proposed tank are expected to be 8.8 tons per year, calculated using naphtha storage for worst case. Best Available Technology to reduce VOC emissions to the maximum extent, is an internal floating roof with a mechanical shoe primary seal. VOC emissions are the only pollutant of concern in this project.

The VOC emission increase of 8.8 tpy from Tank 251 would trigger the requirements of Pennsylvania's Nonattainment New Source Review Program described at 25 Pa. Code § 127 Subchapter E. However, United is proposing a reduced VOC limit for existing Tank 654 (Source ID 654T) of 5.0 tons per year, so as not to trigger the Nonattainment New Source Review Program. United has ample records to show the fugitive emissions from Tank 654 can be kept below 5.0 tpy. This new 5.0 tpy limit for Tank 654 will be included in this plan approval as well, to make it an enforceable limit. Reporting and Recordkeeping requirements will be imposed to ensure this new limit is not exceeded.

United also submitted a separate plan approval application dated February 13, 2024, requesting short term (i.e. lbs/hour) emission limit increases, and hourly loading capacity increases, for the proposed West End Loading Rack ("WELR"), originally authorized as Source 229 in Plan Approval 62-00017AA issued April 11, 2023. Emissions from the WELR are controlled by a proposed Vapor Combustion Unit ("VCU") Control Device (C229). The final design of the VCU is being built for anticipated new Federal requirements that will require use of extra fuel flow. As such, United has requested the WELR hourly loading capacity be increased from approx. 48,000 gallons/hour to 144,000 gallons/hour. This new loading rate

necessitates the C229 emission limits for Carbon Monoxide be increased to 12.02 lbs/hr, Nitrogen Oxides (NO $_{\rm x}$) to 4.81 lbs/hr, and volatile organic compounds (VOC) to 12.02 lbs/hr. The long term (i.e. tons/year) limits, and annual throughput capacity, for Source 229 and Control Device C229 will not change. The changes previously described for Source 229 and C229 will also be included in this proposed Plan Approval 62-00017AB. No other changes to the Federal and State requirements, or the terms and conditions in the 62-00017AA plan approval are proposed, and it will remain in effect.

The proposed Tank 251 will be subject to the applicable requirements of 40 CFR 60 Subpart Kb—Standards of Performance for Volatile Organic Liquid Storage Vessels (Including Petroleum Liquid Storage Vessels) for Which Construction, Reconstruction, or Modification Commenced After July 23, 1984, 40 CFR 63 Subpart CC [National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants from Petroleum Refineries], and 40 CFR 63 Subpart WW [National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants from Source Categories] as the facility is considered a major source for HAPs.

The Plan Approval will contain additional testing, monitoring, recordkeeping, and work practice requirements designed to keep the facility operating within all applicable air quality requirements. For the modification of the York Energy Center Block 2 Electricity Generation Project's turbine requirements. The existing facility is located in Peach Bottom Township, York County. The modification consists of the following changes to the requirements of P.A. No. 67-05083F (issued on August 1, 2016) and P.A. No. 67-05083G (issued December 14, 2021):

- 1. Revised Startup/Shutdown emission limits from a pound per hour basis to a pound per event basis. This change does not alter the amount of emissions authorized during Startups and Shutdowns.
- 2. Removed explicit Startup/Shutdown hours limitations. This change does not alter the existing annual emission limitations placed on the turbines.
- 3. Revised the definitions for fuel switching events to only reference manufacturer-approved scenarios.

- 5. Added a new once-ever-5-calendar-year stack testing condition for Block 2 turbines.
- 6. Explicitly incorporated all other conditions in Section E, Group 003 of P.A. Nos. 67-05083F & 67-05083G. This modification will supersede those group conditions in their entirety.

The York Energy Center Block 2 Electricity Generation Project consists of the following:

- 1. Two NG/ULSD fuel oil-fired CC combustion turbines (Source IDs 205 and 206) controlled by a selective catalytic reduction (SCR) system (NO $_{\rm x}$ control) and an oxidation catalyst (CO and VOC control) in series. Dry low NO $_{\rm x}$ technology will also be employed during NG fuel firing. Water injection technology (NO $_{\rm x}$ control) will also be employed during ULSD fuel oil firing;
 - 2. One NG-fired auxiliary boiler (Source ID 031);
- 3. One cooling tower (Source ID 501) controlled by a high efficiency mist eliminator (PM/ $PM_{10}/PM_{2.5}$ control);
 - 4. NG piping components (Source ID 502);
 - 5. Circuit breakers (Source ID 503);
- 6. Five NG condensate storage tanks and one ULSD fuel oil storage tank (Source ID 504).

Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12; 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart KKKK—Standards of Performance for Stationary Combustion Turbines (re: Source IDs 205 and 206); 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart TTTT—Standards of Performance for Greenhouse Gas Emissions for Electric Generating Units (Source IDs 205 and 206); 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart Dc-Standards of Performance for Small Industrial-Commercial-Institutional Steam Generating Units (re: Source ID 031); the Acid Rain Program requirements of 40 CFR Part 72; the Cross-State Air Pollution Rule (CSAPR) requirements of 40 CFR Part 97; the continuous emission monitoring systems (CEMS) requirements of 25 Pa. Code § 139.101 and 40 CFR Part 75; the Prevention of Significant Deterioration of Air Quality (PSD) regulations of 25 Pa. This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. - 8. Construct and maintain river wall, vent structures, gate control building, outfall and associated scour protection located at the western terminus of Westhall Street. This will permanently impact 0.17 acre of the Ohio River, 0.28 acre of floodway, and 0.17 acre of floodplain.

- 13. Construct and maintain vent structures located east of the D.L. Clark Building. This will permanently impact 0.10 acre of the Allegheny River's floodplain.
- 14. Construct and maintain vent structures located along S Canal Street and between Chestnut Street and Warfield Street. This will permanently impact 0.02 acre of the Allegheny River's floodway and 0.18 acre of floodplain.
- 15. Construct and maintain temporary cofferdams around the aforementioned outfall structures. In the Ohio River, it will temporarily impact 0.35 acre of watercourse, 0.32 acre of floodway, and 2.13 acres of floodplain. In Chartiers Creek, it will temporarily impact 0.11 acre of watercourse and 0.70 acre of floodplain. In the Allegheny River, it will temporarily impact 0.08 acre of watercourse, 0.06 acre of floodway, and 2.44 acres of floodplain.

For the purpose of reducing combined sewage overflows into the region's streams and rivers to improve water quality. Cumulatively, the project will permanently impact 9.75 acres of watercourse, 2.39 acres of floodway, and 4.27 acres of floodplain. Article VIII-A of the Human Services Code (code) (62 P.S. §§ 801-A—815-A) authorizes the Department of Human Services (Department) to impose an annual monetary assessment on nonpublic and county nursing facilities in this Commonwealth. See 62 P.S. §§ 803-A and 815-A.

Under Article VIII-A of the code, the Department may impose the assessment only to the extent that the assessment revenues qualify as the State share of Medical Assistance (MA) Program expenditures eligible for Federal financial participation (FFP). To ensure receipt of FFP, Article VIII-A of the code requires the Department to seek a waiver from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), if necessary, to implement the Assessment Program. See 62 P.S. § 812-A. For FY 2024-2025, 1 Act 54 of 2022, § 16 amended the Commonwealth's Fiscal Code to reauthorize the assessment under Article VIII-A through June 30, 2026. See 72 P.S. § 1606-T. the Department will submit a waiver request to CMS to implement changes to the Assessment Program as described in this notice. The implementation of these changes is contingent on CMS's approval of the waiver request.

For each fiscal year that the Assessment Program is implemented, the Secretary of the Department (Secretary) determines the aggregate amount of the assessment and the annual assessment rates in consultation with the Secretary of the Budget. See 62 P.S. § 804-A. The annual assessment rates must be sufficient to generate at least \$50 million in additional revenue, but not more than the maximum aggregate assessment amount that qualifies for FFP. See 62 P.S. § 804-A.

Before imposing an annual assessment for a fiscal year, the Secretary must publish a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The notice must specify the amount of the

assessment being proposed, explain the proposed assessment methodology, identify the estimated assessment amount and aggregate impact on nursing facilities subject to the assessment and provide interested persons a 30-day period to comment. See 62 P.S. § 805-A.

This notice announces the assessment amounts, rates and methodology that the Department is proposing to implement in FY 2024-2025 and the estimated aggregate impact on nursing facilities that will be subject to the assessment in FY 2024-2025.

Proposed Assessment Methodology and Rates

Beginning with FY 2024-2025, the Department is proposing to revise the criterion for inclusion in the lower tier rate by reducing the previous MA days requirement from 80,000 MA days to 75,000 MA days. No other changes to the current assessment methodology have been made. The Department intends to continue to calculate each nonexempt facility's quarterly assessment amount by multiplying its assessment rate by the facility's non-Medicare resident days during the calendar quarter that immediately preceded the assessment quarter.

With these modifications, the Assessment Program will be implemented as follows: For FY 2024-2025, the assessment will be imposed on all licensed nursing facilities in this Commonwealth except the following nursing facilities, which will be exempt from the Assessment Program:

- (1) State-owned and operated nursing facilities.
- (2) State-owned Veteran's nursing facilities.
- (3) Nursing facilities that provide nursing facility services free of charge to all residents.
- (4) Nursing facilities that have not been licensed and operated by either the current or a previous owner for the full calendar quarter prior to the calendar quarter for which an assessment is collected. A nursing facility that changes ownership is not considered a newly licensed nursing facility for assessment purposes.

For FY 2024-2025, the Department is proposing to continue to assess nonexempt nursing facilities at two rates. The Department is proposing to continue to assess a rate of \$9.32 to the following five categories of nursing facilities:

- County nursing facilities.
- Nursing facilities that have 44 or fewer licensed beds.
- Certain continuing care retirement community (CCRC) nursing facilities (see 40 Pa.B. 7297 (December 18, 2010)).
- Nursing facilities with an MA occupancy rate of at least 94% based on calendar year (CY) 2021 resident days as of July 19, 2022. For the purpose of qualifying for the lower assessment rate, a nursing facility's MA occupancy rate will be calculated as follows: MA Occupancy Rate = Sum of Total PA MA Days from the CY 2021 resident days data ÷ Sum of Total Resident Days from the CY 2021 resident days data, rounded to two decimals (nearest whole percent).
- Nursing facilities with at least 75,000 MA days based on the CY 2021 resident days as of July 19, 2022.

For all other nonexempt facilities, including nursing facilities that began participation in a CCRC on or after July 1, 2010, the Department is proposing to continue to assess these facilities at a rate of \$33.41.

Aggregate Assessment Amounts and Fiscal Impact

The Department estimates that if the proposed assessment rates are implemented, the annual aggregate assessment fees for nonexempt nursing facilities will total \$468.256 million. The Department will use the State revenue derived from the assessment fees and any associated FFP to support payments to qualified MA nursing facility providers in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

Payments to Nonpublic and County Nursing Facilities; Proposed Rates for State Fiscal Year 2024-2025

This notice announces the Department of Human Services (Department) proposed annual case-mix per diem payment rates for State Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-2025 for nonpublic and county nursing facilities that participate in the Medical Assistance (MA) Program.

Nonpublic Nursing Facility Per Diem Rates

As required by the case-mix payment methodology in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187, Subchapter G (relating to rate setting), the Department intends to set an annual MA per diem rate for each nonpublic nursing facility provider. Each facility's annual per diem rate will have four components: resident care, other resident related, administrative and capital. For each quarter of FY 2024-2025, the Department will adjust the resident care component

of each facility's rate by multiplying the resident care component by the facility's MA case-mix index for the appropriate picture date.

Additionally, the Fiscal Code amendments in Act 54 of 2022 (P.L. 540, No. 54) authorizes a budget adjustment factor (BAF) until June 30, 2026.

A detailed description of the BAF formula is in the notice, Payment for Nursing Facility Services Provided by County and Nonpublic Nursing Facilities; Notice of Change in Methods and Standards of Setting Payment Rates; Budget Adjustment Factor published at 52 Pa.B. 3637 (June 25, 2022). Under the proposed formula, the BAF will limit the estimated Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for MA nursing facility services for nonpublic nursing facilities so that the average payment rate in effect for the fiscal year is limited to the amount permitted by the funds appropriated by the General Appropriation Act for the fiscal year. A BAF will be calculated each quarter for nonpublic nursing facilities.

Finally, in calculating the proposed rates, the Department assumed that the General Appropriation Act of 2024 will include the same level of funding that was in the General Appropriation Act of 2023.

County Nursing Facility Per Diem Rates

As required by the rate methodology in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1189, Subchapter D (relating to rate setting), the Department intends to set an annual MA per diem rate for each county nursing facility provider. As specified in 55 Pa. Code § 1189.91(b) (relating to per diem rates for county nursing facilities), for each rate year beginning on or after July 1, 2007, the per diem rate paid to a county nursing facility for a rate year will be the facility's prior rate year per diem multiplied by a BAF determined in accordance with the formula in the Commonwealth's approved State Plan. Again, in calculating the proposed rates, the Department assumes that the General Appropriation Act of 2024 will include the same level of funding that was in the General Appropriation Act of 2023.

The proposed annual per diem rates for FY 2024-2025, the July Quarterly BAF that will be applied to nonpublic nursing facility rates and the annual BAF that will be applied to county nursing facilities are available on the Department's web site at https://www.dhs.pa.gov/providers/Providers/Pages/Rates-Nursing%20Facilites.aspx and at local county assistance offices throughout this Commonwealth or by contacting Robyn Kokus, Department of Human Services, Office of Long-Term Living, (717) 857-3280.

Fiscal Impact

If the proposed payment rates are adopted as final, there will be no fiscal impact for per diem rate payments for nonpublic and county nursing facilities for FY 2024-2025. The amount of funding available for this program is dependent upon the funds appropriated by the General Assembly in the forthcoming fiscal year. Therefore, until a budget bill is passed and enacted, any estimated fiscal impact associated with this notice is based on the funding levels in the General Appropriation Act of 2023.

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue) the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of changes to the Pennsylvania Adventure Ahead ("Adventure Ahead") Fast Play lottery game rules that were published at 54 Pa.B. 3107 (June 1, 2024).

The Pennsylvania Lottery intends to update the expiration date for any iLottery Bonus Money awarded in the Buckin' Buck\$ Second-Chance Drawing from 90 days to 30 days. The correct version of this document is as follows, with ellipses referring to the existing text as it appeared at 54 Pa.B. 3107—3115:

10. Second-Chance Drawing: The Buckin' Buck\$ Second-Chance Drawing from the Pennsylvania Lottery for qualifying instant and Fast Play lottery game tickets ("Drawing"):

(e) Drawing restrictions:

* * * * *

(14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery terms and conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 30 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 10(d)(4). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash. For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required

to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's account.

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following Fast Play lottery game:

- 1. *Name*: The name of the Progressive Top Prize Fast Play lottery game is Pennsylvania Cash Boom ("Cash Boom"). The game number is PA-5247.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) CASH BOOM! NUMBER: The area below the "YOUR NUMBERS" area containing one "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol where, when matching any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area.
- (d) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (e) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (f) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (g) Play: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (h) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket, which contains one or more play symbols.
- (i) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area, which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (j) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (k) $PROGRESSIVE\ PUFF$: The area at the top of a Cash Boom ticket containing two "PROGRESSIVE PUFF NUMBERS" play symbols where, when two matching

play symbols appear, the player wins the current "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE." PROGRESSIVE PUFF is played separately.

- (l) PROGRESSIVE PUFF NUMBERS: The play symbols found in the "PROGRESSIVE PUFF" area that, when two matching play symbols appear, determine whether the player wins the current "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE."
- (m) PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize-winning ticket is sold.
- (n) WINNING NUMBERS: The play symbols found in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (o) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (p) YOUR NUMBERS: The play symbols found in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determines whether a player wins the prize under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols.
 - 3. Price: The price of a Cash Boom ticket is \$5.
 - 4. Description of the Cash Boom Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Cash Boom lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" all prizes are predetermined and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Cash Boom tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Cash Boom is played by matching the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. When the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" matches any "WINNING NUMBER" the player wins all 12 prizes shown. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Cash Boom also contains a "PROGRESSIVE PUFF" area where, when two matching "PROGRESSIVE PUFF NUMBERS" play symbols appear, the player wins the current "PROGRESIVE TOP PRIZE." "PROGRESSIVE PUFF" is played separately.
- (d) Players can win the prizes identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (e) A Cash Boom game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Cash Boom game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

- (g) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Cash Boom game ticket and select the Cash Boom option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
 - 5. Cash Boom ticket characteristics:
- (a) A Cash Boom ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Each Cash Boom ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area, a "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" area and a "PROGRESSIVE PUFF" area. The play symbols and their captions located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" area and the "PROGRESSIVE PUFF" area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT).
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTEEN), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$30^{.00}$ (THIRTY), $\$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), $\$60^{.00}$ (SIXTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$300 (THR HUN) and \$1,000 (ONE THO).
- (d) Prizes: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$30, \$50, \$60, \$100, \$300 and \$1,000. The prize that can be won in the "PROGRESSIVE PUFF" area is the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE." The "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" amount starts at \$75,000 and increases by \$0.30 every time a Cash Boom ticket is purchased. When a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winning ticket is sold, the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" resets to \$75,000. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 7 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to 12 times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 720,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Cash Boom lottery game.
- 6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Cash Boom prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which two matching play symbols appear in the "PROGRESSIVE PUFF" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE." The amount won under this paragraph is the amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE," determined by the Lottery Central Computer System, as of the time the winning ticket was purchased. The amount won will be a minimum of \$75,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

- (d) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$300 (THR HUN) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$20⁻⁰⁰ (TWENTY) appears in seven of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$60⁻⁰⁰ (SIXTY) appears in one of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in four of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in five of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$300 (THR HUN) appears in one of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in one of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in one of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$300 (THR HUN) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$300.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of 50^{00} (FIFTY) appears in four of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of 20^{00} (TWENTY) appears in four of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of 50^{00} (FIV DOL) appears in four of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of 300.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$30^{.00} (THIRTY) appears in four of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in four of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$15^{.00} (FIFTEEN) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$60^{.00} (SIXTY) appears in one of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in one of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$300.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in five of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in five of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in one of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in one of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$300.
- (j) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $$15^{.00}$ (FIFTEEN) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of $$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL) appears in four of the Prize

areas and a prize symbol of $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL) appears in six of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

- (l) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL) appears in six of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL) appears in five of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTEEN) appears in one of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$60.00 (SIXTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$60.
- (n) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH BOOM! NUMBER" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in all 12 of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$60.
- (o) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (p) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.
- (q) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (s) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (t) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- 7. Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

- 8. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
 - 9. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on

account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

- 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
 - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
 - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining

undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

- 12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" restrictions:

- (a) An amount of \$0.30 from the sale of each Cash Boom ticket will be accumulated in the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" pool.
- (b) Prize Amount: The amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" at the time a ticket is purchased can only be verified through the Lottery's Central Computer System. Any advertisement or any materials describing the amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" are only valid as of the time they are posted. If any discrepancy exists between this notice and any material describing or advertising the Cash Boom game, this notice and the data contained in the Lottery's Central Computer System shall govern.
- (c) The "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" and all other prizes are subject to availability at the time of purchase. The Lottery is not responsible for prizes that are not awarded due to technical issues. In the event of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" being reset without the actual sale of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winning ticket, all prize money that had accumulated into the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" pool (i.e., \$0.30 from the sale of each ticket) shall be awarded as part of the next "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" won.
- (d) Prizes payable to "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winners will be paid as a one-time cash payment. For the purposes of calculation of the prize to be paid to "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winners, the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" amount will be rounded up to the nearest \$0.50.

15. Governing law:

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Cash Boom lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
 - 16. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any

- compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 17. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Cash Boom lottery game tickets.
- 18. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win
- 19. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Cash Boom or through normal communications methods.
- 20. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Cash Boom lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania Hang Ten Fast Play Game 5249

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. Name: The name of the Fast Play lottery game is Pennsylvania Hang Ten ("Hang Ten"). The game number is PA-5249.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) HANG TEN X: The area at the bottom of a Hang Ten ticket containing four "HANG TEN X" play symbols where, when two matching symbols appear in the "HANG TEN X" area, the player multiplies any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area by ten and wins that amount.
- (e) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (f) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (g) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (h) Play Area: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (i) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (j) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (k) YOUR NUMBERS: The play symbols found in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (l) WINNING NUMBERS: The play symbols found in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (m) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
 - 3. Price: The price of a Hang Ten ticket is \$1.
 - 4. Description of the Hang Ten Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Hang Ten lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Hang Ten tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Hang Ten is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. When two matching play symbols appear in the "HANG TEN X" area, the player multiplies any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area by ten and wins that amount. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Players can win the prizes identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(d) Hang Ten tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Hang Ten ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Hang Ten ticket and select the Hang Ten option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
 - 5. Hang Ten ticket characteristics:
- (a) Hang Ten tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Hang Ten tickets will contain one play area consisting of a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a "HANG TEN X" area. The play symbols and their captions located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN) and 20 (TWENT). The play symbols located in the "HANG TEN X" area are: Beach Ball symbol, Starfish symbol, Shell symbol, Snorkel symbol, Crab symbol, Binoculars symbol, Anchor symbol and a Buoy symbol.
- (c) *Prize Symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: FREE (TICKET), $\$1^{.00}$ (ONE DOL), $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$3^{.00}$ (THR DOL), $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), $\$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN) and \$1,000 (ONE THO).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: Free \$1 Ticket, \$1, \$2, \$3, \$5, \$10, \$20 \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200 and \$1,000. For a complete description of how these prizes can be won, see section 7 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to six times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 840,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Hang Ten lottery game.
- 6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Hang Ten prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol

- of $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which two matching play symbols appear in the "HANG TEN X" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in the Prize area under both of the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, and upon which two matching play symbols appear in the "HANG TEN X" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any five of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$3^{.00} (THR DOL) appears in two of the Prize areas under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, a prize symbol of \$2^{.00} (TWO DOL) appears in two of the Prize areas under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in one of the Prize areas under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, and upon which two matching play symbols appear in the "HANG TEN X" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which two matching play symbols appear in the "HANG TEN X" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which any two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the Prize area under both of the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, and upon which two matching play symbols appear in the "HANG TEN X" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

- (v) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $\$1^{.00}$ (ONE DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which two matching play symbols appear in the "HANG TEN X" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (w) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (x) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING

- NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$3.00 (THR DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$3.
- (y) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.
- (z) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.
- (aa) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of FREE (TICKET) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one Hang Ten Fast Play Game Ticket.
- 7. Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

8. Ticket responsibility:

- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
 - 9. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.

- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
 - 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
 - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
 - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto

for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. Governing law:

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Hang Ten lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
 - 15. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 16. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Hang Ten lottery game tickets.
- 17. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 18. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets

from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Hang Ten or through normal communications methods.

19. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Hang Ten lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania Keys and Cash Instant Lottery Game 1693; Change to Game Rules

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 819.203 (relating to notice of instant game rules) the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of changes to the Pennsylvania Keys and Cash ("Keys and Cash") instant lottery game rules that were published at 54 Pa.B. 2708 (May 18, 2024).

The Pennsylvania Lottery intends to update the expiration date for any iLottery Bonus Money awarded in the Buckin' Buck\$ Second-Chance Drawing from 90 days to 30 days. The correct version of this document is as follows, with ellipses referring to the existing text as it appeared at 54 Pa.B. 2708—2713:

11. Second-Chance Drawing: The Buckin' Buck\$ Second-Chance Drawing from the Pennsylvania Lottery for qualifying instant and Fast Play lottery game tickets ("Drawing"):

(e) Drawing restrictions:

* * * * *

(14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery terms and conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 30 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 11(d)(4). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash. For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's account.

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of

Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following Fast Play lottery game:

- 1. *Name*: The name of the Fast Play lottery game is Pennsylvania Toucan Play This Game ("Toucan Play This Game"). The game number is PA-5248.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) *Bar code*: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (g) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket, which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area, which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) ROW: A specific, pre-defined portion of the play area which contains four "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols and a Prize symbol in a horizontal line. Each "ROW" is played separately.
- (k) TOUCAN MATCH TWO: A feature of the Toucan Play This Game ticket where, when two matching prize amounts appear in the Prize areas to the right of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, the player wins two times that matching prize amount. TOUCAN MATCH TWO is played separately.
- (l) WINNING NUMBERS: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in each "ROW," determine whether a player wins the prize for that "ROW."
- (m) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (n) YOUR NUMBERS: The play symbols found in each "ROW" in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- 3. *Price*: The price of a Toucan Play This Game ticket s \$2.
- 4. Description of the Toucan Play This Game Fast Play lottery game:

- (a) The Toucan Play This Game lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Toucan Play This Game tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Toucan Play This Game is played by matching any two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols located in the same "ROW" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown in the Prize area for that "ROW." A bet slip is not used to play this game. Each "ROW" is played separately.
- (c) Toucan Play This Game also contains a "TOUCAN MATCH TWO" feature, which is played by matching two like prize amounts in the play area. Players matching prize amounts in this manner will win two times the matching prize amount. "TOUCAN MATCH TWO" is played separately.
- (d) A Toucan Play This Game game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

- (b) Play Symbols: Each Toucan Play This Game ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area and four "ROWS" designated as "ROW 1," "ROW 2," "ROW 3" and "ROW 4." Each "ROW" area contains four "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols and one prize symbol. Each "ROW" is played separately. The play symbols and their captions located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the four "ROW" areas are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN) and 20 (TWENT).
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions located at the right of each "ROW" are: $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$4^{.00}$ (FOR DOL), $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTEEN), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$30^{.00}$ (THIRTY), $\$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN) and \$12,000 (TWELVTHO).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$30, \$50, \$100, \$200 and \$12,000. For a complete description of how those prizes can be won, see section 7 (relating to number and

description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to five times on a ticket.

- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Toucan Play This Game lottery game.
- 6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:

- (4) Holders of tickets upon which two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in the same "ROW" match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the Prize area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (5) Holders of tickets upon which two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in the same "ROW" match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in the Prize area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.
- (6) Holders of tickets upon which two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in the same "ROW" match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the Prize area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (7) Holders of tickets upon which two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in the same "ROW" match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in the Prize area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (8) Holders of tickets upon which two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in the same "ROW" match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the Prize area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (9) Holders of tickets upon which two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in the same "ROW" match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize

symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the Prize area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

- (10) Holders of tickets upon which two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in the same "ROW" match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$4⁰⁰ (FOR DOL) appears in the Prize area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4
- (11) Holders of tickets upon which two of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols in the same "ROW" match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2^{.00} (TWO DOL) appears in the Prize area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.
- (b) Determination of prize winners for holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts appear in the play area:
- (1) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$100 (ONE HUN) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (2) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

- (3) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$30^{.00} (THIRTY) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$60.
- (4) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (5) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.
- (6) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (7) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$5.00 (TWENTY) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (8) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$8.
- (9) Holders of tickets upon which two matching prize amounts of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appear in the play area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.
- 7. Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

- 8. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
 - 9. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
 - 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present

the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.

- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
 - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
 - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. Governing law:

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Toucan Play This Game lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
 - 15. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in

- exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 16. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Toucan Play This Game lottery game tickets.
- 17. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 18. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Toucan Play This Game or through normal communications methods.
- 19. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Toucan Play This Game lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania Wild and Crazy 80 Fast Play Game 5246

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. *Name*: The name of the Fast Play lottery game is Pennsylvania Wild and Crazy 80 ("Wild and Crazy 80"). The game number is PA-5246.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

- (b) Bar code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) CRAZY \$80s: The area in the middle of a Wild and Crazy 80 ticket containing one play symbol where, when a Bullseye (ANY80) symbol appears, the player wins each \$80 prize amount shown in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area.
- (d) *ELECTRIFIER MULTIPLIER*: The area above the "WINNING NUMBERS" area containing one play symbol where, when a Bolt (8TIMES) symbol appears, the player multiplies any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area by 8 and wins that amount.
- (e) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (f) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (g) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (h) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (i) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (j) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (k) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (1) WINNING NUMBERS: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (n) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (o) YOUR NUMBERS: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- 3. Price: The price of a Wild and Crazy 80 ticket is \$10.
- 4. Description of Wild and Crazy 80 Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) Wild and Crazy 80 lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Wild and Crazy 80 tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Wild and Crazy 80 is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING

NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. When an 80 (WIN80) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, the player wins a prize of \$80. When a Bolt (8TIMES) symbol appears in the "ELECTRIFIER MULTIPLIER" area, the player multiplies any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area by 8 and wins that amount. When a Bullseye (ANY80) play symbol appears in the "CRAZY \$80s" area, the player wins each \$80 prize amount shown in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

- (c) Players can win the prizes identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (d) Wild and Crazy 80 tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Wild and Crazy 80 ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Wild and Crazy 80 ticket and select Wild and Crazy 80 option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
 - 5. Wild and Crazy 80 ticket characteristics:
- (a) Wild and Crazy 80 tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Wild and Crazy 80 tickets will contain one play area containing a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area, a "CRAZY \$80s" area and an "ELECTRIFIER MULTIPLIER" area. The play symbols and their captions located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). - (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
 - 9. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
 - 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

- (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
- (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. Governing law:

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Wild and Crazy 80 lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
 - 15. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 16. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Wild and Crazy 80 lottery game tickets.

- 17. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 18. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Wild and Crazy 80 or through normal communications methods.
- 19. Applicability: This notice applies only to Wild and Crazy 80 lottery game announced in this notice.

Retail Incentive Program and Related Retailer Incentive Programs and Promotions for Fiscal Year 2023-2024; Amended Notice

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), and under Title 4, Amusements, (4 Pa.C.S. §§ 501—505) the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of changes to the Retail Incentive Program and Related Retailer Incentive Programs and Promotions that were published at 53 Pa.B. 3484 (July 1, 2023).

The Pennsylvania Lottery intends to clarify the eligibility determination and payments for the Retail Incentive Program as set forth in subsections 6(d) and 6(e) (relating to the program requirements) of the Notice. These changes are consistent with the Pennsylvania Lottery's recent computer system upgrade. Finally, section 6 is also modified to add subsection (g), which clarifies that the changes to subsections 6(d) and 6(e) are retroactive to July 1, 2023. The correct version of this document is as follows, with ellipses referring to the existing text as it appeared at 53 Pa.B. 3484—3488):

(d) A Retailer may be eligible to participate in and receive the incentives provided in section 9, below, one time for the Fiscal Year if the Retailer satisfies the eligibility requirements of this section and the requirements of section 9 and is approved for participation.

(e) A Retailer is only eligible for participation in the Program for those Quarters in which the Retailer remains eligible for the entire Quarter. Failure to maintain the requirements of a Retailer in Good Standing for any reason for any Quarter shall preclude the Retailer from receiving any retailer incentive payment or payments that the Retailer would otherwise be entitled to for that Quarter.

(g) The eligibility determination and payment set forth in subsections 6(d) and 6(e) are retroactive to July 1, 2023.

Retail Incentive Program and Related Retailer Incentive Programs and Promotions for Fiscal Year 2024-2025

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), and under Title 4, Amusements, (4 Pa.C.S. §§ 501—505) the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the Retail Incentive Program and Related Retailer Incentive Programs and Promotions (collectively referred to as "the Program") for fiscal year 2024-2025.

This notice describes the Program, including incentives, bonuses, and promotions available to Retailers throughout fiscal year 2024-2025.

- 1. Effective Date: The Retail Incentive Program and related retailer incentive programs and promotions described herein are effective as of July 1, 2024.
- 2. Purpose: The Pennsylvania Lottery ("Lottery") hereby gives notice of the Retail Incentive Program, as provided for in 4 Pa.C.S. § 504, and of related retailer incentive programs, as provided for in 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to the powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), 61 Pa. Code § 819.222(b) (relating to incentives for the sale of instant tickets), 61 Pa. Code § 875.17 (relating to the sale of terminal based tickets), 61 Pa. Code § 874.17 (relating to the sale of raffle lottery games) and 61 Pa. Code § 876.18 (relating to the sale of iLottery games) in order to detail programs planned by the Lottery for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2025. The Retail Incentive Program and the related retailer incentive programs and promotions, as described in this notice, were developed to create a comprehensive compensation package for Lottery Retailers and to reward them for helping the Lottery achieve its goals. Changes or additions to the Retail Incentive Program will be communicated through an amended notice published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Changes or additions related to the retailer incentive programs and promotions as described in this notice will be communicated through the usual methods of communication.

3. Definitions:

- (a) Agent or Lottery Sales Agent or Retailer: A person licensed under section 305 of the State Lottery Law. For the purposes of this notice each separate Retail Location with a separate Lottery license shall be considered a separate Retailer in all respects.
- (b) *Fiscal Year*: For the purposes of this notice only, the accounting year used by the Lottery beginning on July 1, 2024 and ending on June 30, 2025.

- (c) Lottery or Pennsylvania Lottery: The Lottery established under the State Lottery Law.
- (d) Traditional Lottery Products: For the purposes of this notice, traditional lottery products are limited to instant lottery games, terminal-based lottery games, Fast Play games, raffle lottery games and WebCash sold by a lottery Retailer at a physical Retail Location.
- (e) Retailer in Good Standing: To be a Retailer in Good Standing, the Retailer must meet all of the following requirements:
- (1) Must be an active Retailer permitted to sell Lottery tickets.
- (2) Must be an active Retailer on the first day of the Quarter and the last day of the Quarter.
- (f) Secretary: The Secretary of Revenue of the Commonwealth.
- (g) Standard Retailer Commission: The amount of compensation provided to Retailers for selling Lottery products, as set forth in the State Lottery Law and the corresponding regulations. The current commission is defined in 61 Pa. Code § 805.10 (relating to compensation).
- (h) State Lottery Law: The Act of August 26, 1971 (P.L. 351, No. 91), known as the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. $\S\S$ 3761-101—3761-314).
- (i) *Quarter*: A Quarter is a period of time during the year which consists of three consecutive months and which are consistent with the descriptions below.
- (1) First quarter is the period of time beginning on July 1 and ending on September 30.
- (2) Second quarter is the period of time beginning on October 1 and ending on December 31.
- (3) Third quarter is the period of time beginning on January 1 and ending on March 31.
- (4) Fourth quarter is the period of time beginning on April 1 and ending on June 30.
- (j) *Retail Location*: Physical location of a Retailer, including a physical address or other designation used by the Lottery to determine the physical location of a Retailer.
- 4. Program Goals: The Lottery seeks to attain the following business goals through the operation of the Program:
- (a) Adoption of Lottery Best Practices: The Lottery has identified certain best practices as described in section 5, below, and desires to encourage the adoption of these best practices by all Retailers.
- (b) Increasing Retailer Sales: Traditional Lottery Products can only be sold at physical, Retail Locations and the Lottery desires to award Retailers who increase their sales for the benefit of older Pennsylvanians through the Retail Incentive Program, retailer incentive programs and promotions.
- (c) Encouraging Retailers to Engage in Specific Best Practices: The Lottery has undertaken to establish the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives as identified in section 9, below, in select Retail Locations throughout the Commonwealth that elect to do so through the Program.
- (d) Rewarding Retailers: The Lottery has established an aggressive bonus program under the Sales Growth Incentive Program as described in section 8, below, for Retailers who increase their sales proportionately with

the overall increase in sales goals the Lottery has established for fiscal year 2024-2025.

- 5. Lottery Best Practices:
- (a) Lottery has identified the following ten best practices that Lottery Retailers are encouraged to adopt and adhere to maximize Traditional Lottery Product sales and player engagement at their Retail Locations:
- (1) Ask for the Sale: Encourage customers to buy Traditional Lottery Products.
- (2) Keep Lottery Fresh and Clean: Maintain and keep clean the area of their establishment in which Traditional Lottery Products are sold and displayed.
- (3) Know Lottery Products: Be knowledgeable about the wide variety of Traditional Lottery Products.
- (4) Pay Winning Tickets: Pay winning Lottery tickets of \$2,500 or less, that players present at their Retail Locations.
- (5) Post Winning Tickets: Post winning tickets sold at their Retail Locations.
- (6) Maintain Inventory: Maintain their inventory of Traditional Lottery Products, specifically instant tickets, and introduce new Traditional Lottery Products promptly upon issuance.
- (7) Post Jackpot Amounts: Post jackpot amounts prominently in places where they are highly visible to customers.
- (8) Make Lottery Visible: Make Traditional Lottery Products easily visible in their Retail Locations.
- (9) Display Indoor Signs: Post Lottery signs and advertisements inside of their Retail Locations.
- (10) Display Outdoor Signs: Post Lottery signs and advertisements outside of their Retail Locations.
- (b) To meet the goals of the Lottery and to encourage the Lottery Best Practices described in section 5(a), above, the Lottery provides each Retailer with Lottery-owned equipment and advertising materials based upon the individual retail environment.
 - 6. Program Requirements:
- (a) Unless otherwise stated in this notice, to participate in the Program, the Retailer must be a Retailer in Good Standing.
- (b) The determination of a Retailer's eligibility for participation will be made at the end of each Quarter of the Program for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2024 and ending on June 30, 2025.
- (1) The determination will be made based on the information in the Lottery's financial accounting system for the Retailer and the status of the Retailer's license as of September 30, 2024 for the first quarter.
- (2) The determination will be made based on the information in the Lottery's financial accounting system for the Retailer and the status of the Retailer's license as of December 31, 2024 for the second quarter.
- (3) The determination will be made based on the information in the Lottery's financial accounting system for the Retailer and the status of the Retailer's license as of March 31, 2025 for the third quarter.
- (4) The determination will be made based on the information in the Lottery's financial accounting system for the Retailer and the status of the Retailer's license as of June 30, 2025 for the fourth quarter.

- (c) A Retailer may be eligible to participate in and receive the incentives provided in section 8, below, for each Quarter in which the Retailer satisfies the eligibility requirements of this section and the requirements of section 8.
- (d) A Retailer may be eligible to participate in and receive the incentives provided in section 9, below, one time for the Fiscal Year if the Retailer satisfies the eligibility requirements of this section and the requirements of section 9 and is approved for participation.
- (e) A Retailer is only eligible for participation in the Program for those Quarters in which the Retailer remains eligible for the entire Quarter. Failure to maintain the requirements of a Retailer in Good Standing for any reason for any Quarter shall preclude the Retailer from receiving any retailer incentive payment or payments that the Retailer would otherwise be entitled to for that Quarter.
- (f) The final determination of a Retailer's eligibility will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.

7. How to Enroll:

- (a) Licensed Retailers are automatically enrolled in the Sales Growth Incentive Program as described in section 8, below, and the Quarterly Retailer Incentive Promotions as described under section 10 of this notice.
- (b) Retailers who do not wish to participate in the Sales Growth Incentive Program must sign a form indicating that the Retailer understands and acknowledges that the Retailer will not receive incentives as described under section 8 of this notice.
- (c) Participation in the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives is voluntary on the part of each Retailer and requires the Retailer to opt-in as described in this notice.
- (d) Retailers who wish to enroll in one or more of the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives are responsible for:
 - (1) Reading and understanding this notice;
- (2) Reading any Lottery materials describing the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives; and
- (3) Communicating interest in participation in one or more of the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives to the Lottery through their Lottery Sales Representative or by emailing the Lottery at PALotteryRetailIncentive@pa.gov.
- 8. Sales Growth Incentive Program: Retailers may qualify for a Sales Growth Incentive, in addition to the Standard Retailer Commission, by meeting the requirements of this section.
- (a) The Lottery will establish a sales baseline for each Retailer.
- (1) For a Retailer existing in fiscal year 2023-2024, the Lottery will establish a sales baseline for each Retailer based on that Retailer's fiscal year 2023-2024 sales for each Quarter that the Retailer is eligible for the Sales Growth Incentive Program under sections 6 and 7 of this notice.
- (2) If the Retail Location was not licensed as a Retailer in fiscal year 2023-2024, the Lottery will establish a sales baseline for that Retailer for each Quarter that the Retailer is eligible for the Sales Growth Incentive Program under sections 6 and 7 of this notice. The Lottery may consider any relevant factors to determine the sales baseline.

(3) If the Retailer was not a licensed Retailer for the entirety of any Quarter in fiscal year 2023-2024, the Lottery will establish a sales baseline for that Retailer for the corresponding Quarter based on sales at the Retail Location for the same Quarter in fiscal year 2023-2024.

- (b) Sales baseline figures may account for periods in which the Retailer did not have Traditional Lottery Product sales but met the definition of Retailer in Good Standing.
- (c) Each Retailer shall be provided with their sales baseline figures and sales goals by the Lottery in writing.
- (d) A Retailer who exceeds their prior year sales figure by at least 0.01%, but not more than 2.99%, for any Quarter in the Fiscal Year to which this notice applies, shall be awarded an additional 0.75% incentive above the Standard Retailer Commission. For example, assuming that the Retailer has met all other requirements of this notice, a Retailer with a sales baseline of \$100,000 for a Quarter, who raises their sales by 0.01% to \$100,010, shall be entitled to the Sales Growth Incentive of 0.75% in addition to the Standard Retailer Commission and will be entitled to a Sales Growth Incentive payment of \$750.08. With the Standard Retailer Commission of \$5,000.50 on sales of \$100,010, the Retailer would receive a total payment of \$5,750.58 for that Quarter.
- (e) A Retailer who exceeds their sales baseline figure for any Quarter by at least 3% shall be awarded an additional 1.50% incentive above the Standard Retailer Commission. For example, assuming that the Retailer has met all other requirements of this notice, a Retailer with a sales baseline of \$100,000 for a Quarter, who raises their sales by 3% to \$103,000, shall be entitled to a 1.50% incentive in addition to the Standard Retailer Commission and will be entitled to Sales Growth Incentive payment of \$1,545. With the Standard Retailer Commission of \$5,150 on sales of \$103,000, the Retailer would receive a total payment of \$6,695 for that Quarter.
- (f) A Retailer shall not receive an incentive above 1.50% for any Quarter under section 8 of this notice.
 - 9. Lottery Best Practices Initiatives:
- (a) Qualifying Retailers: In order to participate in one or more of the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives as described below, the Retailer must meet the eligibility requirements as set forth in section 6 of this notice. Only Retailers who agree to participate and are approved by the Lottery shall be eligible for the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives. Retailers that are engaging in the best practices or who have already received Lottery-owned equipment or materials listed below are not eligible to participate in the applicable initiatives unless they are increasing their level of engagement relative to a specific initiative.
- (b) Levels of Participation: Consistent with the Lottery's objectives, qualifying Retailers will fall into one of three levels for participation in the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives, as follows:
- (1) Level 1 Retailer: A Retailer that has a Quarterly average of \$75,000 or more in sales of Traditional Lottery Products for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2023 and ending on June 30, 2024 or a Retailer that is part of a Retail Chain as defined by the Pennsylvania Lottery.
- (2) Level 2 Retailer: A Retailer that has a Quarterly average of less than \$75,000 in sales of Traditional Lottery Products for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2023 and ending on June 30, 2024.

- (3) Level 3 Retailer: A Retailer that meets all of the following criteria:
- (i) The prospective Retailer submitted a complete application, in addition to any other forms and agreements that must be completed by prospective Retailers, to become a Lottery Retailer during the third quarter of fiscal year 2023-2024; the fourth quarter of fiscal year 2023-2024; or fiscal year 2024-2025.
- (ii) The proposed Retail Location was not a licensed Retailer in fiscal year 2023-2024.
- (iii) The application is approved by the Lottery in fiscal year 2024-2025.
- (c) Enrollment in the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives: A Retailer who wants to participate in one or more of the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives must opt-in by April 1, 2025.
- (d) Schedule for Delivery of Materials and Equipment: For each Retailer that has opted-in to one or more of the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives and has been approved for participation, the Lottery will determine when the materials or Lottery-owned equipment, as applicable, for each of the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives will be delivered. Delivery and installation dates will be scheduled at the Lottery's discretion. Delivery and installation dates may occur in the subsequent fiscal year.
 - (e) Lottery Best Practices Initiatives:
- (1) The following Lottery Best Practices Initiatives are available to Level 1 Retailers upon approval for participation by the Lottery:
 - (i) Increased Counter Facings Initiative:
- (A) Level 1 Retailers are required to increase their counter facings by 12 and agree to maintain the display in such a way as to prevent anything from impeding the view of the increased facings.
- (B) Level 1 Retailers are eligible to receive a one-time payment of \$1,000 following agreement and approval to participate in the Increased Counter Facings Initiative for Level 1 Retailers.
 - (ii) Designated Lottery Space Initiative:
- (A) Level 1 Retailers that agree to participate in the Designated Lottery Space Initiative must create and maintain a physical location within the Retail Location designated for customers to play the lottery and agree to install and maintain the Lottery-owned equipment.
- (B) Level 1 Retailers are eligible to receive a one-time payment of \$350 following agreement and approval to participate in the Designated Lottery Space Initiative for Level 1 Retailers.
 - (iii) Winner Awareness Area Initiative:
- (A) Level 1 Retailers that agree to participate in the Winner Awareness Area Initiative must create and maintain a physical location within the Retail Location, of a minimum of 6 square feet, designated to display winning tickets paid by the Retailer and must update the area with tickets paid by the Retailer on a monthly basis.
- (B) The Lottery will provide the Retailer with the materials necessary to display winning tickets.
- (C) Level 1 Retailers are eligible to receive a one-time payment of \$350 following agreement and approval to participate in the Winner Awareness Initiative for Level 1 Retailers.

- (iv) Signage Initiative:
- (A) Level 1 Retailers that agree to participate in the Signage Initiative must increase and maintain the amount of Lottery provided indoor and outdoor signage displayed at the Retail Location above the amount the Retailer displays prior to agreeing to participate in the Signage Initiative.
- (B) Level 1 Retailers are eligible to receive a one-time payment of \$350 following agreement and approval to participate in the Signage Initiative for Level 1 Retailers.
 - (v) Second-Chance Drawing Initiative:
- $(A)\ A$ Level 1 Retailer that agrees to participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative must conduct a Second-Chance Drawing during the Fiscal Year.
- (B) To conduct a Second-Chance Drawing, Level 1 Retailers must conduct a drawing for Lottery players in which they randomly select one or more winners. The Retailer shall receive at least \$100 worth of Lottery coupons or promotional tickets to support the drawing.
- (C) Level 1 Retailers that agree to participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative must also supply a prize, not otherwise prohibited by law that matches or exceeds the monetary value of the Lottery coupons or promotional tickets provided to support the drawing. The prize supplied by the Retailer may be made using money, merchandise or any other item of value provided by the Retailer.
- (D) Level 1 Retailers are eligible to receive the Lottery coupons or promotional tickets following agreement and approval to participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative for Level 1 Retailers.
- (E) Level 1 Retailers that participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative are responsible for developing and communicating the rules for the Second-Chance Drawings conducted by the Retailer. Retailers who participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative are responsible for implementing and adhering to the rules that they develop for the Second-Chance Drawings they conduct. The Lottery does not administer and is not responsible for the conduct or the outcome of the Second-Chance Drawings as described in this notice.
- (F) The Lottery will only support one Second-Chance Drawing for each qualifying and approved Level 1 Retailer.
 - (vi) All-In Initiative:
- (A) Level 1 Retailers that agree to participate in the All-In Initiative must conduct each of the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives as described in section 9(e)(1)(i)—(v) for Level 1 Retailers.
- (B) Level 1 Retailers are eligible to receive a one-time total payment of \$2,500, which includes a \$450 All-In Initiative bonus, as well as up to \$100 worth of Lottery coupons or promotional tickets used to support the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative, following agreement and approval to participate in the All-In Initiative for Level 1 Retailers.
- (2) The following Lottery Best Practices Initiatives are available to Level 2 Retailers upon approval by the Lottery:
 - (i) Ask for the Sale Initiative:
- (A) A Level 2 Retailer that agrees to participate in the Ask for the Sale Initiative must conduct an Ask for the Sale promotion at the Retail Location once during the Fiscal Year.

- (B) To conduct an Ask for the Sale promotion, the Level 2 Retailer must agree to ask every customer to purchase a Lottery ticket during the agreed upon time frame and must display Lottery provided materials advertising the promotion.
- (C) Level 2 Retailers shall receive up to \$100 worth of Lottery coupons or promotional tickets to support the promotion by awarding any player not asked to purchase a Lottery ticket, a Lottery coupon or promotional ticket.
- (D) Level 2 Retailers who opt-in to the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative as described in section 9(e)(2) are not eligible for the Ask for the Sale Initiative.
 - (ii) Second-Chance Drawing Initiative:
- (A) Level 2 Retailers that agree to participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative must conduct a Second-Chance Drawing during the Fiscal Year.
- (B) To conduct a Second-Chance Drawing, Retailers must conduct a drawing for Lottery players in which they randomly select one or more winners. The Retailer shall receive at least \$100 worth of Lottery coupons or promotional tickets to support the drawing.
- (C) Level 2 Retailers are eligible to receive Lottery coupons or promotional tickets following agreement and approval to participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative for Level 2 Retailers.
- (D) Level 2 Retailers who participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative are responsible for developing and communicating the rules for the Second-Chance Drawings conducted by the Retailer. Retailers who participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative are responsible for implementing and adhering to the rules that they develop for the Second-Chance Drawings they conduct. The Lottery does not administer and is not responsible for the conduct or the outcome of the Second-Chance Drawings as described in this notice.
- (E) Level 2 Retailers are not eligible to participate in the Second-Chance Drawing Initiative if the same Retailer opted-in and was approved for the Ask for the Sale Initiative as described in this notice.
- (F) The Lottery will only support one Second-Chance Drawing for each qualifying and approved Level 2 Retailer
- (3) Level 3 Retailers are eligible for the Prospective Social Environment Retail Recruitment Initiative as described below, upon approval of the Lottery:
- (i) Level 3 Retailers that agree to participate in the Prospective Social Environment Retail Recruitment Initiative must meet the requirements of a Level 3 Retailer as described in section 9(b)(3).
- (ii) Level 3 Retailers that agree to participate in the Prospective Social Environment Retail Recruitment Initiative must agree to the installation of Lottery-owned equipment, as recommended by the Lottery for the specific Retail Location. Required Lottery-owned equipment includes, but is not limited to, at least two monitors for the display of certain terminal-based Lottery games, commonly referred to as monitor games.
- (iii) Level 3 Retailers that agree to participate in the Prospective Social Environment Retail Recruitment Initiative must be a Retailer in Good Standing for 6 months following the installation of the Lottery-owned equipment.
- (iv) Level 3 Retailers that agree to participate in the Prospective Social Environment Retail Recruitment Initiative must keep the Lottery-owned equipment installed

and operational for 6 months following the installation of the Lottery-owned equipment.

- (v) Level 3 Retailers are eligible to receive a one-time payment of \$500 for each monitor installed, following agreement and approval to participate in the Prospective Social Environment Retail Recruitment Initiative.
- (vi) All Lottery-owned equipment to be installed shall be determined by the Lottery. Level 3 Retailers may request certain equipment be placed in their Retail Location. The ultimate decision as to the type of Lottery-owned equipment, number of monitors, and the like, that will be placed in a Retail Location is at the sole discretion of the Lottery.
- (vii) Level 3 Retailers who agree to participate in the Prospective Social Environment Retail Recruitment Initiative must acknowledge and agree to the terms of the Prospective Social Environment Retail Recruitment Initiative. The Lottery is authorized to deduct \$500 for each monitor installed from the Retailer's bank account as part of the Retailer's weekly settlement process if the Retailer fails to have the Lottery-owned equipment installed and operational for a period of 6 months from the date of installation or if the Retailer fails to maintain its status as a Retailer in Good Standing.
- (f) If a Level 2 Retailer reaches the thresholds of a Level 1 Retailer in Traditional Lottery Product sales for either the first or second quarter during the Fiscal Year, the Retailer may apply for the respective Lottery Best Practices Initiatives for the newly achieved Retailer level. If approved by the Lottery for participation in the specific Lottery Best Practices Initiatives, the Retailer shall be entitled to the same cash payment, if any, associated with the specific Lottery Best Practices Initiatives participated in by the Retailer.
- (g) Not withstanding any other provision of this notice, the Lottery may determine, in its sole discretion, that every Retailer in the Retail Chain is eligible for the Lottery Best Practice Initiatives set forth in 9(e)(1)(i)—(vi). Retail Chain shall be defined as Retailers who have five (5) or more locations under the same employee identification number and has been designated as a corporate chain by the Lottery.
 - 10. Quarterly Retailer Incentive Promotions:
- (a) The Lottery will conduct Quarterly incentive promotions that provide Retailers with an opportunity to earn a reward by conducting various promotions related to the sale of Traditional Lottery Products.
- (b) The Lottery will advise Retailers of the Quarterly incentive promotions through Lottery sales-terminal messages, information provided by Lottery Sales Representatives and information provided on the Retailer's Corner of the Lottery web site, https://www.palottery.state.pa.us/About-PA-Lottery/For-Retailers/Current-Retailers.aspx.
- (c) The rewards to Retailers issued through the Quarterly incentive promotions may include, but are not limited to, bonus commissions and entries into drawings.
- 11. Funds for the Retail Incentive Program: For fiscal year 2024-2025 the Pennsylvania Lottery caps expenditures of the Sales Growth Incentive Program as described in section 8, above, the Lottery Best Practices Initiatives as described in section 9, above, and the Quarterly Retailer Incentive Promotions as described in section 10, above, to the statutory requirement of 0.5% of the sale of Traditional Lottery Products at Retail Locations within fiscal year 2023-2024 as required pursuant to 4 Pa.C.S. § 504(b).

- 12. Nonlapse: Amounts remaining in the Retail Incentive Program at the end of the Fiscal Year shall not lapse, but shall be used to fund retail sales initiatives including, but not limited to, new equipment, signage, training, coupons, consumer and agent in-store promotions and sales makeovers that are designed to improve in-store merchandising, foot traffic and sales as determined by the Lottery.
 - 13. Retailer Incentive Programs and Promotions:
- (a) The Pennsylvania Lottery is authorized to offer retailer incentive programs and promotions pursuant to 61 Pa. Code § 811.41. Any expenditures for the Program incurred by the Lottery that exceed the limit set forth at 4 Pa.C.S. § 504(b) in section 11, above, will be attributed to retailer incentive programs and promotions authorized pursuant to 61 Pa. Code § 811.41.
- (b) The Retail Incentive Program will run concurrently and in conjunction with the retailer incentive programs and promotions described in this notice.
- 14. Payments: Payments due to Retailers pursuant to the requirements of the Retail Incentive Program and the related retailer incentive programs and promotions described in this notice will be credited to the Retailer at a time or times determined by the Lottery.
- 15. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Retail Incentive Program for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2024 and ending on June 30, 2025 and the related retailer incentive programs and promotions described in this notice. Additional related retailer incentive programs, promotions and customer referral programs may be conducted throughout the Fiscal Year pursuant to the State Lottery Law and corresponding regulations and will be communicated through normal methods of communication.

Chronic Wasting Disease—Designation of Disease Management Areas and Endemic States and Canadian Provinces Order # 14

Executive Order

Whereas, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is an infectious and progressive neurological disease that is found in, and always proves fatal to, members of the family Cervidae (deer, elk or moose, and other susceptible species, collectively called cervids); and

Whereas, There are no known treatments for CWD infection, no vaccines to protect against CWD infection, and no approved tests that can detect the presence of CWD in live cervids; and

Whereas, CWD is designated as a "dangerous transmissible disease" of animals by order of the Secretary of Agriculture under 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d) (relating to dangerous transmissible diseases); and

Whereas, The Game and Wildlife Code (Code) (34 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 et seq.) and regulations promulgated thereunder (58 Pa. Code §§ 131.1 et seq.) collectively provide broad authority to the PGC to regulate activities

relating to the protection, preservation, and management of game and wildlife, including cervids; and

Whereas, On March 28, 2017 (effective May 16, 2017), the Commission added 58 Pa. Code § 137.35 (relating to Chronic Wasting Disease Restrictions) to give more permanent status and structure to the CWD requirements and restrictions previously established and maintained over the prior decade by and through executive orders; and

Whereas, Section 137.35(d) provides the Executive Director with the authority to designate CWD Disease Management Areas (DMAs) and Established Areas (EAs) within this Commonwealth; and

Whereas, Previous executive orders concerning designation of CWD DMAs and EAs within this Commonwealth were issued by the Commission on June 1, 2017, July 24, 2017, October 6, 2017, February 16, 2018, May 21, 2018, October 22, 2018, June 17, 2019, June 2, 2020, May 28, 2021, October 21, 2021, April 5, 2022, August 18, 2022, and June 22, 2023; and

Whereas, The Commission has determined that further designations of CWD DMAs and EAs are required to implement necessary updates to the Commission's CWD program.

Now Therefore, I, STEPHEN P. SMITH, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Code and regulations promulgated thereunder, do hereby order and direct the following:

- 1. DMAs within this Commonwealth are designated as set forth below. These DMAs are more graphically illustrated on the maps titled "DMA 2," "DMA 3," "DMA 4," "DMA 5," "DMA 6," "DMA 7," "DMA 8" and "DMA OVERVIEW" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundaries and maps of DMA 2, DMA 3, DMA 4, DMA 5, DMA 6, DMA 7, DMA 8, and DMA OVERVIEW, the written descriptions shall prevail.
 - a. DMA 1: Eliminated.
- b. DMA 2: Adams, Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Centre, Clearfield, Cumberland, Franklin, Fulton, Huntingdon, Indiana, Juniata, Mifflin, Perry, Snyder, Somerset, Union, Westmoreland, and York counties, bounded and described as follows: Begin at the intersection of Baltimore Pike (State Highway 94) and the Maryland State Line, proceed north on State Highway 94 for approximately 12.3 miles to US Highway 30. Turn right and follow US Highway 30 east for 30.2 miles to the point it meets the west shore of the Susquehanna River. Follow the Susquehanna River north for approximately 91.2 miles to the river bridge (State Highway 45) in Lewisburg. Continue west on State Highway 45 for approximately 44.1 miles to State Highway 144 in Old Fort. Continue south on State Highway 144 for approximately 3.9 miles to Old Rte. 322 in Potters Mills. Follow Old Rte. 322 for 0.4 miles to US 322. Merge onto US Highway 322 and proceed west on US 322 for approximately 13.4 miles, merging onto Interstate 99 and continuing west along Interstate 99 for approximately 11.9 miles to Exit 62 and returning to US Highway 322. Continue west on US 322 for another 11.1 miles to State Highway 504 in Phillipsburg. Proceed west on State Highway 504 and follow 0.7 miles to State Highway 53. Continue west on State Highway 53 for 9.3 miles to State Route 153 in Houtzdale. Proceed south on State Route 153 for 5.9 miles to State Highway 253 (Viola Pike). Follow State Highway 253 south for 8.6 miles to State Highway 53 in Van Ormer. Continue south on State

Highway 53 for 1.7 miles to Marina Road. Continue west on Marina Road for 5.5 miles where the road becomes Glendale Lake Road. Continue west on Glendale Lake Road for 3 miles to State Highway 36. Follow State Highway 36 west for .5 miles into the town of Patton. Continue north on State Highway 36 for 3.5 miles to Bridge Street. Continue west on Bridge Street for 1.6 miles to Spangler Street. Follow Spangler Street south for .9 miles to Municipal Road (SR 4016). Proceed north on Municipal Road for 3.6 miles west to US Highway 219 (Crawford Avenue) in Northern Cambria. Follow US Highway 219 south for 1.3 miles to State Highway 271. Follow State Highway 271 south for 2.8 miles to State Highway 553 near Nicktown. Follow State Highway 553 west for 6.9 miles to State Highway 403 near Heilwood. Continue south on State Highway 403 for 15.8 miles to US Highway 22. Follow US Highway 22 west for 14 miles to State Highway 217 South in Blairsville. Continue south on State Highway 217 for 12.5 miles to US Highway 30. Follow US Highway 30 east for 21.5 miles to US Highway 219. Proceed south along State Highway 219 for 32.6 miles to the Maryland border. Finally, continue east along the Maryland border 115.7 miles to Baltimore Pike (State Highway 94) at the place of beginning.

c. DMA 3: Armstrong, Cambria, Clarion, Clearfield, Elk, Indiana, and Jefferson counties, bounded and described as follows: Begin at the intersection of Campbells Mill Road and US Highway 119 in the town of Black Lick, proceed north on US Highway 119 for 5.3 miles to State Highway 56. Follow State Highway 56 east for 5.5 miles to State Highway 259. Continue north on State Highway 259 for 5.4 miles to US Highway 422. Follow US Highway 422 west for 3.4 miles to State Highway 553. Follow State Highway 553 east for 2.0 miles to Spaulding Road. Continue north on Spaulding Road for 3 miles to State Highway 403. Follow State Highway 403 north for 2.2 miles to State Highway 286. Continue east on State Highway 286 for 4.5 miles to State Highway 240. Follow State Highway 240 east for 8.5 miles to US Highway 219. Follow US Highway 219 north for 2.4 miles to Sylvis Road. Follow Sylvis Road east for 5.8 miles to State Highway 36. Follow State Highway 36 east for 8.8 miles to La Jose Road (SR-3016) in Newburg. Follow La Jose Road east for 3.6 miles becoming Cherry Corner Road (SR-3005) for another .3 mile to Marron Road (SR-3016). Proceed northeast on Marron Road for 2.7 miles to State Road 729. Follow State Road 729 north for .9 miles to Old Station Road. Follow Old Station Road (SR-2012) east for 2.4 miles to Douglas Road (SR-3007). Continue east on Douglas Road for .3 miles to New Millport Road (SR-2012) near New Millport. Follow New Millport Road east for 3.1 miles to Turkey Hill Road (SR-2012). Follow Turkey Hill Road 1.5 miles to Faunce Road (SR-2012). Follow Faunce Road east for 3.1 miles becoming Sanborn Road (SR-2012). Continue east on Sanborn Road for 2.4 miles to State Highway 153. Follow State Highway 153 north for 5 miles to Mineral Springs Road (SR-2027). Follow Mineral Springs Road north 3.3 miles to Bigler Cutoff Road. Follow Bigler Cutoff Road north for .1 miles to US Highway 322. Proceed east on US Highway 322 for .7 miles to State Highway 970. Follow State Highway 970 north for 1.5 miles to Interstate Highway 80. Follow I-80 west for 26.4 miles to State Highway 219. Follow State Highway 219 north for 25 miles to State Route 948. Follow State Route 948 for 0.3 miles to the Clarion River in Ridgway. Follow the Clarion River west for 28.1 miles to Belltown Road. Continue south on Belltown Road for 0.05 mile to State Highway 949. Proceed west on State Highway 949 for 16.1 miles to US Highway 322 in Corsica. Follow US Highway 322 east for 0.3 miles to

State Highway 949. Follow State Highway 949 south for 4.2 miles to State Highway 28. Follow State Highway 28 south for 13.2 miles to State Highway 839 in New Bethlehem. Follow State Highway 839 south for 21.3 miles to State Highway 85. Follow State Highway 85 west for 12.7 miles to State Highway 28/66. Continue south on State Highway 28 for 1 mile. Continue onto US Highway 422 for 1.9 miles to the point it meets the east shore of the Allegheny River. Follow the Allegheny River south for 14 miles to the point it meets the east shore of the Kiskiminetas River near the town of Schenley. Follow the Kiskiminetas River for 26.9 miles to the Washington Street bridge in Saltsburg. Follow Washington Street east for 0.1 miles to Salt Street (State Highway 286). Follow State Highway 286 east for 12.1 miles to State Highway 217. State Highway 217 south for 1.4 miles to Black Lick Road. Follow Black Lick Road southeast for 6 miles to Campbells Mill Road. Continue east on Campbells Mill Road 0.4 mile to US Highway 119 at the place of beginning.

d. DMA 4: Lancaster County, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the city of Litiz, at the intersection of state Route 772 and State Route 501, proceed north on State Route 501 for 5.1 miles to US Route 322. Proceed west on US Route 322 for 1.2 miles to Interstate 76 (Pennsylvania Turnpike). Continue east on Interstate 76 (Pennsylvania Turnpike) for 16.9 miles to State Route 625 (Reading Road). Follow State Route 625 (Reading Road) south for 6.4 miles to State Route 23. Continue west on State Route 23 for 0.3 miles to State Route 897. Follow State Route 897 south for 0.6 miles to U.S. Route 322 (28th Division Highway). Follow U.S. Route 322 (28th Division Highway) east for 0.1 miles to State Route 897 (Spring Valley Road). Follow State Route 897 south for 4.2 miles to Seldomridge Road (T-513). Continue east on Seldomridge Road (T-513) for 1.8 miles to Cambridge Road (T-907). Follow Cambridge Road south for 1.6 miles to State Route 340 (Old Philadelphia Pike). Continue west on State Route 340 (Old Philadelphia Pike) for 0.4 miles to State Route 897 (White Horse Road). Continue south on State Route 897 for 4.0 miles to U.S. Route 30. Follow U.S. Route 30 west for 0.3 miles to State Route 41 (Newport Pike). Continue south on State Route 41 for 3.0 miles to Pine Creek. Follow Pine Creek south for 0.9 miles to East Branch Octoraro Creek. Continue south on East Branch Octoraro Creek for 18.2 miles to Octoraro Creek. Follow Octoraro Creek south along the Chester/ Lancaster County border for 13.1 miles to the intersection with the Maryland border. Continue west along the Maryland border for 4.7 miles to the shoreline of the Susquehanna River. Proceed northalong Susquehanna River shorelines for 26.0 miles to a point abeam State Route 999. Continue east on State Route 999 for 7.0 miles to State Route 741 (Rohrerstown Road). Follow State Route 741 (Rohrerstown Road) north for 3.6 miles to U.S. Route 30 (Lincoln Highway). Continue east on U.S. Route 30 for 2.4 miles to State Route 4011 (Fruitville Pike). Follow State Route 4011 (Fruitville Pike) north for 6.7 miles to State Route 772 (Orange Street). Continue east on State Route 772 east for 3.6 miles to State Route 501 at the place of beginning.

e. *DMA 5*: Warren County, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the Allegheny River and the New York State Line, proceed south on the west shore of the river for 27.8 miles to the bridge at Pennsylvania Ave East (Business U.S. Route 6) in Warren. Continue south on Pennsylvania Ave East (Business U.S. Route 6) for 0.1 mile to U.S. Route 6. Follow U.S. Route 6 west for 11.6 miles to West Main St (State Route

27) in Youngsville. Continue northeast on West Main St (State Route 27) for 0.5 mile to State Route 27 (Matthews Run Road). Follow State Route 27 (Matthews Run Road) north for 7.2 miles to State Route 69 (Jackson Run Road). Continue north on State Route 69 (Jackson Run Road) for 3 miles to State Route 957 (Main St) in Sugar Grove. Follow State Route 957 east for 0.2 miles to Jamestown Street. Continue north on Jamestown Street for 0.7 miles to where Jamestown Street becomes Busti Road. Continue north on Busti Road for 1 mile to the New York border. Finally, follow the New York border east for 18.1 miles to the Allegheny River at the place of beginning.

f. DMA 6: Clearfield, Elk, and Jefferson Counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the town of Kersey at the intersection of Chicken Hill Road and State Route 948, proceed south on Chicken Hill Road for 0.9 mile where the road becomes South Kersey Road. Follow South Kersey Road south for 1.4 miles where the road becomes Boone Mountain Road. Continue south on Boone Mountain Road for 6.5 miles to State Route 153. Follow State Route 153 south for 4.9 miles to State Route 255. Follow State Route 255 south for 9.5 miles to Interstate Highway 80. Follow Interstate Highway 80 west for 4.4 miles to State Highway 219. Continue north on State Highway 219 for 21.1 miles to State Route 948. Follow State Route 948 east for 5.3 miles to Chicken Hill Road in Kersey at the place of beginning.

g. DMA 7: Columbia, Lycoming, Montour, Northumberland, and Sullivan Counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the town of Trout Run at the intersection of State Route 15 and State Route 14, proceed north on State Route 14 for 4.5 miles to Field Station Road. Continue southeast on Field Station Road for 2.3 miles to Beech Valley Road. Follow Beech Valley Road southeast for 0.9 mile to Calvert Road. Follow Calvert Road south for 0.1 mile to Southard Road. Continue east on Southard Road for 2.5 miles to Wallis Run Road. Follow Wallis Run Road east for 7.6 miles to Hoppestown Road in the town of Proctor. Continue northeast on Hoppestown Road for 5.9 miles to State Route 87 at Hillsgrove. Follow State Route 87 south for 2.4 miles to Ogdonia Road in the town of Ogdonia. Continue south on Ogdonia Road for 3.0 miles Loyalsock Trail Road. Continue south on Loyalsock Trail Road, becoming Route 3005, then State Route 2083, and then Deer Lake Road for 6.6 miles to State Route 220. Continue east on State Route 220 for 5.6 miles to State Route 42 in Beech Glen. Follow State Route 42 south for 17.1 miles to State Route 254 in Millville. Continue southwest on State Route 254 for 3.5 miles to State Route 44 in Jerseytown. Follow State Route 44 west for 10.8 miles to State Route 54 in Turbotville. Continue northwest on State Route 54 for 10.9 miles to State Route 15. Follow State Route 15 northwest for 6.5 miles to Interstate 180 in Williamsport. Continue west on Interstate 180 for 2.0 miles returning to State Route 15 at Exit 29. Continuing north on State Route 15 for 12.7 miles to State Route 14 in Trout Run at the place of beginning.


h. DMA 8: Dauphin, Lebanon, Northumberland, and Schuylkill Counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of State Route 283 and Interstate 76, follow Interstate 76 west 1.3 miles to the point it meets the west shore of the Susquehanna River. Follow the west shore of the Susquehanna River north for 59.5 miles to State Route 147 in Shamokin Dam. Con-

tinue east on State Route 147 for 0.47 mile to State Route 61. Follow State Route 61 east for 2.6 miles to State Route 890. Continue southeast on State Route 890 for 9.0 miles to State Route 225. Continue east on State Route 225 for 6.2 miles to State Route 61. Follow State Route 61 southeast for 0.3 mile to State Route 125. Continue south on State Route 125 for 21.0 miles to Interstate 81. Follow Interstate 81 south for 35.4 miles to Mountain Road. Turn left onto Mountain Road and continue for 0.3 miles to US Route 22. Follow US Route 22 west for 2.6 miles to Interstate 83. Follow Interstate 83 south for 3.0 miles to Interstate 283. Continue south on Interstate 283 for 3.3 miles to Interstate 76 at the place of beginning.


- 2. Established areas within this Commonwealth are designated as set forth below. The sole EA is more graphically illustrated on the map titled "DMA 2" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundary and map of "DMA 2", the written descriptions shall prevail.
- a. Established Area in DMA 2: Bedford, Blair, Franklin, Fulton, and Huntingdon counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of State Highway 75 (Fort Loudon Road) and the Maryland State Line near Kasiesville, proceed north on State Highway 75 (Fort Loudon Road) for 13.9 miles to US Highway 30. Follow US Highway 30 west for 7.8 miles to US Highway 522 just north of McConnellsburg. Continue north on US Highway 522 for 37.5 miles to US Highway 22. Follow US 22 west for 41.7 miles to Old Route 22 in Duncansville. Continue west on Old Route 22 for 2.0 miles to Valley Forge Road. Follow Valley Forge Road south for 3.4 miles to the Poplar Run Road. Continue southeast on Poplar Run Road for 0.5 mile to Knob Run Road. Follow Knob Run Road southwest for 4.3 miles where the road becomes Knob Road. Continue south on Knob Road for 3.4 miles to the Bedford/Blair County Line, where the road becomes Blue Knob Road. Follow Blue Knob Road south for approximately 1.0 mile to State Forrest Road in Blue Knob State Park. Follow State Forrest Road south for 3.5 miles where the road becomes Pavia Road. Continue south on Pavia Road for 0.25 miles to State Highway 869. Follow State Highway 869 south for 3.4 miles to State Highway 96. Continue south on State Highway 96 south for 14.4 miles to US Highway 30 in Schellsburg. Follow US Highway 30 east 4.75 miles to State Highway 31. Follow State Highway 31 southwest for 3.4 miles to State Highway 96 in Manns Choice. Continue south on State Highway 96 for 22.25 miles to the Maryland border. Finally, follow along Maryland border east for 47.0 miles to State Route 75 at place of beginning.
- 3. The previous executive order concerning designation of CWD DMAs and CWD-endemic States and Canadian Provinces within this Commonwealth that was issued by the Commission on June 22, 2023, and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on July 15, 2023, at 53 Pa.B. 3793, is hereby rescinded in its entirety and replaced by this Order.
- 4. This Order is effective immediately and shall remain in effect until rescinded or modified by subsequent order.



Order

By the Commission

The Department of Human Services (DHS) oversees the Federal Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) in Pennsylvania. DHS has indicated its inten-

tion to begin sharing LIHEAP income and household information with energy public utilities if the household grants consent on its LIHEAP application beginning with the 2024-2025 LIHEAP season. LIHEAP data sharing has been designed to allow low-income consumers to enroll or recertify in energy public utility universal service programs without having to submit a new application or proof of income-eligibility to the energy public utility. Approved and proposed enrollment and recertification requirements for universal service programs do not currently address data sharing. By this Order, the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC) establishes terms and conditions under which energy public utilities may document their election to participate in DHS' LIHEAP data sharing under a temporary and partial waiver of provisions of their approved universal service and energy conservation plans (USECPs).

I. Background

The planned LIHEAP data sharing is the culmination of a years-long detailed planning process involving

DHS, the energy public utilities, low-income advocates, the PUC, and other stakeholders who participate in DHS' LIHEAP Advisory Committee (LAC). Data sharing is expected to go live in conjunction with the 2024-2025 LIHEAP season, starting in Fall 2024.

While participation in DHS' LIHEAP data sharing is optional, the PUC encourages all energy public utilities to do so. The benefits of LIHEAP data sharing include:

- Enrollment of a LIHEAP household in an energy public utility's universal service programs, including customer assistance programs (CAPs), low income usage reduction programs (LIURPs), and hardship fund programs, without the need for submitting separate applications for each program and duplicative forms of documentation.
- Recertification of a LIHEAP household in an energy public utility's CAP without the need for submitting duplicative forms of documentation.

DHS has created a LIHEAP Data Sharing Agreement explaining the responsibilities of DHS and the energy public utilities that participate in LIHEAP data sharing. The PUC is not a signatory to the LIHEAP Data Sharing Agreement, but the PUC did participate in the development of the language in the agreement.

On August 22, 2023, the PUC issued a Secretarial Letter establishing a universal service working group (USWG) at Docket No. M-2023-3038944 to address issues related to, inter alia, streamlining the eligibility and enrollment process for universal service programs and reducing the number of eligible low-income customers who lose program benefits due to the verification or re-enrollment process. The USWG included a LIHEAP Data Sharing Subgroup which identified ways in which the PUC can help energy public utilities maximize the use of DHS' LIHEAP data sharing to facilitate and maintain universal service program enrollments. The PUC has reviewed the recommendations of the LIHEAP Data Sharing Subgroup and provides the following terms and conditions under which energy public utilities may document their election to participate in DHS' LIHEAP Data Sharing.¹

II. Discussion

If an energy public utility chooses to participate in DHS' LIHEAP data sharing, the energy public utility shall file and serve a letter at its current and pending USECP dockets no later than July 31, 2024, indicating it is participating in DHS data sharing and include clarification that the energy public utility will:

- Use the LIHEAP data to conduct individualized universal service outreach as soon as possible (ideally monthly) after receiving the household's data from DHS.
- Use a simplified/streamlined process for households to enroll in universal service programs and recertify in CAP if the income and household data was received by DHS in the prior 12 months and/or the current or prior LIHEAP program year, without requiring additional applications or documentation.
- Discuss its plans for individualized outreach and simplified/streamlined enrollment with its respective Universal Service Advisory Group/Committee.
- Send a communication to each auto-recertified CAP participant based on LIHEAP data with their updated

CAP bill amount (if applicable) and instructions on how to contact the energy public utility to provide additional updates on household income/size if the household information has changed since completing the LIHEAP application.

• Provide educational materials to inform customers about the purpose and effect of the checkbox on the 2024-2025 LIHEAP application which will grant permission for DHS to share this information with energy public utilities. Include a timeline for when the materials will be provided to customers.

The letter must also identify the provisions in the energy public utility's current and proposed USECP that need to be waived or added to incorporate the data sharing conditions described above.

Additionally, if an energy public utility chooses to participate in LIHEAP data sharing with DHS, the energy public utility shall include the following in its next proposed USECP:

- A description of its participation and compliance—or reasons for non-compliance—with the above activities.
- A summary of the impacts of LIHEAP data sharing on enrollments for all universal service programs and recertifications in CAP.
- Provisions to incorporate future data sharing from LIHEAP or other programs/agencies.

IV. Conclusion

We have duly considered the advantages of an energy public utility using LIHEAP data regarding household income and size to facilitate household participation in the energy public utility's universal service programs. We applaud the efforts that went into reaching this point where DHS and the energy public utilities anticipate having access to the data-sharing program this upcoming LIHEAP season.

Under the totality of the circumstances, the Commission, pursuant to its authority under 66 Pa.C.S. § 501(a), hereby establishes terms and conditions under which energy public utilities may document their election to participate in the DHS' data sharing under temporary and partial waiver of provisions of their approved or pending USECPs in order to implement the actions described in this Order. Following the directives herein would relieve an energy public utility from the obligation to file and serve a petition to amend its existing USECP to make changes in its approved USECP resulting from data sharing. It is expressly noted that the establishment of terms and conditions for these waivers of provisions of their USECPs neither enlarges nor limits, in any way, an energy public utility's obligations or a customer's benefits pursuant either to statute or regulation or existing USECP; Therefore,

It Is Ordered That:

1. The terms and conditions under which an energy public utility may document its participation in the Department of Human Services LIHEAP data-sharing under a temporary and partial waiver of the provisions of its presently approved universal service program are hereby established, consistent with this Order.

¹ Recommendations of the LIHEAP Data Sharing Subgroup not reflected as part of these terms and conditions, such as auto-enrolling customers into CAPs, are still under consideration by the PUC.

² The PUC encourages use of the educational template developed by the USWG Data Sharing Subgroup which is attached as Appendix A. The template includes language that could be used for bill inserts, on-bill messaging, communications with CAP and County Assistance Office administrators, and the utility's website.

- 2. All other provisions of an energy public utility's universal service and energy conservation plan remain in full force and effect.
- 3. An energy public utility choosing to participate in the LIHEAP data sharing shall file and serve a letter, consistent with this Order, at its current and pending universal service and energy conservation plan docket(s).
- 4. An energy public utility choosing to participate in the LIHEAP data sharing shall include information and clarifications related to the data sharing in its next proposed USECP, consistent with this Order.
- 5. The Commission's Bureau of Consumer Services, with the assistance of the Commission's Law Bureau, will evaluate the letters filed and served by participating public utilities and will render a staff opinion in a Secretarial Letter confirming whether a filing complies with this Order.
- 6. Each energy public utility that elects to participate in DHS' Data-Sharing shall incorporate the details and results of its participation and its plans for future participation in its next proposed USECP, consistent with this Order.

Appendix A: Proposed Language for Educational Material

LIHEAP applicants/recipients now have the option to share certain LIHEAP application information directly with public utilities to help you enroll in your utility's low-income programs. Your household may be eligible for a discount on your energy bill and/or additional benefits, including past debt forgiveness, through a public utility's low-income assistance program.

How to use the checkbox:

When filling out your LIHEAP application, you'll come across a checkbox with the following statement:

__ I allow DHS to share my income and household information with my utilities to help enroll me in a utility assistance program. I understand that my utility may need to contact me for additional information before I am enrolled in a utility assistance program.

You have the choice to either check the box or leave the box unchecked. It's entirely up to you.

Why would you want to share your data with public utilities?

Sharing your LIHEAP data with public utilities can help qualify you for additional discounts through the low-income assistance programs offered by public utilities. The purpose of this program is to help you get enrolled in your utility's low-income assistance program faster and easier. It also helps ensure that you do not need to provide the same information multiple times.

Sharing your data may also help speed up the application process because you may not have to provide the same household income information again to enroll in the public utility program.

Allowing LIHEAP to share this data directly with your public utility could help you get enrolled in public utility assistance programs that can save you a significant amount of money.

What information is being shared?

The information that is being shared with public utilities includes:

- Name of utility account holder and all household members
 - Service address
 - Phone number
 - Email address
- Income (amount and source) for all household mem-
- Age/Date of Birth for all household members

How will my data be used?

Public utilities will use your data to make it easier to verify your income and household information so you can enroll in their low-income programs, such as a customer assistance program, a utility-run weatherization program, or a hardship fund. They may also use your data to contact you about these programs.

Is my data safe?

Yes, your privacy matters. LIHEAP and public utilities are required to protect the confidentiality of your data. Your data will only be used for the specific purposes of outreach and/or determining eligibility for low-income programs provided by your public utility and will not be sold to third parties or used for any other purpose.

Can I opt out of data sharing?

Yes. You can opt out of data sharing by leaving the checkbox unchecked on the LIHEAP application. If you opt out of data sharing, it will not impact your LIHEAP application in any way. However, it may take longer to apply or recertify for other types of public utility assistance, such as your utility's customer assistance program.

If you have any questions about LIHEAP data sharing, you can contact your local county assistance office, public utility, or the Pennsylvania Office of Consumer Advocate.

Additional information:

You have the right to access and correct your data.

You can withdraw your consent to data share at any time.

Joint Statement of Chairperson Stephen M. DeFrank and Commissioner Kathryn L. Zerfuss

Today the Commission issues an Order that, in part, affirms its support of the intention of the Department of Human Services (OHS) to begin sharing income and household information for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) with electric and natural gas utilities (energy utilities) if the household consents. This data sharing would begin with the 2024-2025 LIHEAP season. While participation in DHS's data sharing is optional, the Commission encourages all eligible energy utilities to participate.

This Order addressing OHS's data sharing is the first step resulting from the Commission's formation of the Universal Service Working Group in September of 2023. LIHEAP data sharing promotes program efficiencies and eliminates paperwork redundancies by allowing customers, who are eligible for LIHEAP, to enroll or recertify in energy utilities' universal service programs without submitting new applications. This includes enrollment or recertification in an energy utility's customer assistance program, low-income usage reduction program, and hardship fund program without the household being required to submit separate applications and duplicative forms of documentation for each program. These improvements will result in cost savings and reduce 'red tape' bureaucracy to the benefit of customers and energy utilities alike.

In addition to discussing DHS's data sharing, the working group productively collaborated on other topics which address ways to increase coordination of low-income customer assistance programs amongst utilities, streamline the eligibility and enrollment process, and reduce the number of eligible customers from losing benefits. The efforts of this working group will help the Commission achieve its statutory obligations to continue the protections, policies and services that assist customers' ability to afford electric and natural gas service.³

Thank you to our Commission staff, OHS, the utilities, the advocates, and other stakeholders who have worked diligently to help us get to this point. We look forward to more good things coming out of the Universal Service Working Group.

Again, in closing, we encourage all energy utilities to participate in OHS's data sharing and take the necessary steps outlined in our action today.

Tentative Order

By the Commission:

The Commission's regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) state that an Electric Generation Supplier (EGS) license will not be issued or remain in force until the licensee furnishes a bond or other security approved by the Commission. In addition, 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(d) states that the maintenance of an EGS license is contingent on the licensee providing proof to the Commission that a bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission has been obtained.

Each EGS must file an original bond, letter of credit, continuation certificate, amendment, or other approved financial instrument with Rosemary Chiavetta, Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, 400 North

Street, Harrisburg, PA, 17120, prior to the EGS's current security expiration date. Each financial instrument must be an original document that displays a "wet" signature or digital signature, preferably in blue ink, and displays a "raised seal" or original notary stamp. The name of the principal on the original financial instrument must match exactly with the name that appears on the EGS's license issued by the Commission.

Failure to file before the financial security's expiration date may cause Commission staff to initiate a formal proceeding that may lead to the following: cancellation of each company's electric supplier license, removal of each company's information from the Commission's website, and notification to all electric distribution companies, in which each company is licensed to do business, of the cancellation of the license.

As of June 4, 2024, each EGS listed in the Supplier Table below has not provided proof to the Commission that it has a bond or other approved security in the amount or language directed by the Commission, to replace a bond which is expired, or which is noncompliant with Commission regulations.

As part of its EGS license validation procedures, the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services sent a 90-day Security Renewal Notice email to each entity in the Supplier Table above stating that original documentation of a bond, or other approved security in the amount or language directed by the Commission, must be filed within 30-days prior to each entity's security expiration date. None of the companies listed in the Supplier Table provided the required documentation.

Based on the above facts, we tentatively conclude that the EGSs listed in the Supplier Table are not in compliance with 52 Pa. Therefore,

To the extent any of the Electric Generation Suppliers listed in the Supplier Table challenge the cancellation of their license, they must file comments within thirty (30) days after publication of this Tentative Order in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Written comments referencing Docket No. M-2024-3045251 must be eFiled to the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission through the Commission's eFiling System. Absent the timely (i) filing of comments challenging the cancellation of the Electric Generation Supplier's license, or (ii) the filing of an approved security within 30-days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the Bureau of Technical Utility Services, shall prepare a Final Order for entry by the Secretary revoking the license of each Electric Generation Supplier that fails to respond.

6. Upon entry of the Final Order, Electric Generation Suppliers that remain listed as not in compliance with 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) and (d) will be stricken from all active utility lists maintained by the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services and the Assessment Section of the Bureau of Administration, removed from the Commission's website, and notifications be sent to all electric distribution companies in which the Electric Generation Suppliers are licensed to do business.

7. Upon entry of the Final Order, Electric Generation Suppliers that fail to respond will be prohibited from providing electric generation supply services to retail electric customers. That upon entry of the Final Order described in Ordering Paragraph No. 5, each electric distribution company in which the Electric Generation Suppliers are licensed to do business, shall return the customers of the Electric Generation Suppliers to default service
