Applications Sought to Fill Position on the Pennsylvania Rural Population Revitalization Commission

The Pennsylvania Rural Population Revitalization Commission (Commission) welcomes applications to fill a position on the Commission. Created by Act 21 of 2024, the Commission makes reviews and recommendations aimed at attracting and retaining residents in rural Pennsylvania while addressing challenges facing rural communities due to population shifts and changing demographics. As detailed in Act 21, the position must be filled by “a young adult selected from a Statewide general farm organization. . .” The successful applicant for this position must: (1) have knowledge of problems facing rural communities in this Commonwealth; (2) have experience in advocacy relating to rural issues; or (3) provide leadership in programs or activities that improve the quality of life for rural communities or attract and retain residents in rural Pennsylvania.

The term of office for members of the Commission is 2 years, with the possibility of reappointment. The Commission will meet at least four times per year at locations throughout this Commonwealth. Commission members do not receive a salary or compensation but will be reimbursed for reasonable and necessary expenses related to the performance of their official duties.

Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Annual Plan for Awarding Grants under the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act

This notice presents the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-2025 Annual Plan (Annual Plan) of the Department of Agriculture (Department) for the administration of the grant program authorized under the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act (act) (3 P.S. §§ 1501–1510). The act prescribes how the available funds appropriated by the General Assembly shall be distributed. This Annual Plan, authorized by section 8(a) of the act (3 P.S. § 1508(a)), has been prepared with the assistance and advice of the Agricultural Fair Advisory Committee (Committee), and was approved by that Committee at its July 15, 2024, meeting.

The act authorizes the Department to make grants to organizations conducting eligible agricultural fairs, Statewide agricultural organizations which contribute to the development of agriculture and agribusiness and to eligible agricultural youth groups for support of their programs.

Funds appropriated by the General Assembly to fund the act in FY 2024-2025 shall be dispersed by the Department as follows, on a funds-available basis, in the following order of priority:

1. First priority shall be given to grants to finance a portion of a fair’s operating costs. These costs include, but are not limited to, the cost of exhibiting agribusiness products, materials and equipment, conducting agricultural or agribusiness educational activities and demonstrations, and awarding premiums to contest and exhibit winners at the agricultural fair. For these grants, the maximum payment shall be as allowed for each Class Fair under section 5(1)(i)(A) of the act (3 P.S. § 1505(1)(i)(A)). These maximum payments range from \$2,500 to \$14,000, depending on the Class Fair involved.

2. Second priority shall be given to grants to finance a portion of the agricultural premiums identified in section 5(1)(i)(B) of the act. For these grants, the maximum payment shall not exceed \$15,000.

3. Third priority shall be given to grants to reimburse a county agricultural society, or an independent agricultural society, that conducts harness horse racing at its annual agricultural fair, other than races for colts and fillies 2 years of age and 3 years of age, in an amount equal to that used during the annual agricultural fair as purse money for harness horse racing, track and stable maintenance, starting gate rental and the cost of harness horse racing officials during the annual fair. For these grants, the maximum amount of reimbursement shall be as allowed under section 5(1)(iii) of the act. This maximum amount is \$13,000, at least \$4,000 of which must be used to reimburse purse money.

4. Fourth priority shall be given to grants to reimburse a county agricultural society, or an independent agricultural society, that conducts harness horse racing for 2-year-old and 3-year-old colts and fillies at its annual agricultural fair. For these grants, the maximum amount of reimbursement shall be as allowed under section 5(1)(iv) of the act. This maximum amount is \$7,600.

5. Fifth priority shall be given to grants to reimburse a Statewide agricultural organization that conducts an agricultural fair and is otherwise eligible for grants under section 5(2) of the act, for up to \$2,000 of its fair’s operating expenses (including premium payments) on a dollar-for-dollar basis, and for 50% of all additional premium costs that are not included in that initial dollar-for-dollar reimbursement, up to a maximum amount of \$10,000. The total maximum payment shall not exceed \$12,000.

6. Sixth priority shall be given to grants to countywide or Statewide 4-H and Future Farmers of America (FFA) or combined FFA and Future Homemakers of America units of boys and girls under 21 years of age that are eligible for grants under section 5(3) of the act. Grants shall be awarded in accordance with the requirements of that provision of the act.

a. The purpose of the act is to make funds available to encourage the further development and improvement of this Commonwealth’s agricultural fairs, and to continue the contribution of agricultural fairs to agriculture and agribusiness by encouraging related careers, fostering agricultural production and agricultural product improvements, and promoting increased investments in agriculture. This Commonwealth’s agricultural fairs also enrich

the life of the community by showcasing agricultural and agribusiness achievements, offering recreational opportunities and promoting tourism. For these reasons, the Department encourages those agricultural youth groups that are eligible for grants under section 5(3) of the act to engage in projects and activities that are conducted at agricultural fairs or that are of direct benefit to agricultural fairs.

b. The Department will award grants to the agricultural youth groups previously described as follows:

i. For actual expenses incurred for activities which contribute to the advancement of agriculture or agribusiness by a 4-H youth group, a payment which will be calculated according to the following formula, under authority of section 5(3) of the act:

Tier 1: \$2,000 for total enrollment of up to 1,000 members plus \$1.50 for each traditional member and \$1 for each school enrichment/special interest member.

Tier 2: \$2,500 for total enrollment of 1,001 to 2,000 members plus \$1.50 for each traditional member and \$1 for each school enrichment/special interest member.

Tier 3: \$3,000 for total enrollment of 2,001 to 3,000 members plus \$1.50 for each traditional member and \$1 for each school enrichment/special interest member.

Tier 4: \$3,500 for total enrollment of 3,001+ members plus \$1.50 for each traditional member and \$1 for each school enrichment/special interest member, a maximum reimbursement of \$9,000.

ii. For actual expenses incurred for activities which contribute to the advancement of agriculture or agribusiness by FFA youth groups, a payment which will be calculated using the following formula, under authority of section 5(3) of the act:

Tier I: County FFA Organizations with 100 members or less will receive base funding of \$1,000 with an additional \$4 per member.

Tier II: County FFA Organizations with 101 to 210 members inclusive will receive a \$2,000 base funding with an additional \$2 per member.

Tier III: County FFA Organizations with 211 members or more will receive funding of \$2,000 with an additional \$4 per member for every member over 210.

7. Funds remaining after the previous grants have been awarded shall be utilized for capital improvement as provided in section 5(1)(ii) of the act.

The Department will endeavor to disburse the previous payments at the earliest date practicable.

Western Pennsylvania Animal Diagnostic Testing Laboratory

The Department of Agriculture (Department) is soliciting applications from higher education and other public institutions to set up, administer and manage an animal diagnostic testing laboratory in western Pennsylvania that will become part of the current Pennsylvania Animal

Diagnostic Laboratory System (PADLS). PADLS connects the Pennsylvania Veterinary Laboratory in Harrisburg, Penn State University's Animal Diagnostic Laboratory and the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine's New Bolton Center to provide diagnostic testing, field-based monitoring and producer outreach, all with a focus on protecting our citizens, our food supply and our animal agriculture industry.

The proposed western laboratory will join this system to serve as a critical resource for additional diagnostics, research and monitoring of animal diseases, contributing significantly to the health and safety of our livestock population. This notice establishes the procedures by which applications will be solicited, reviewed and awarded.

The funding is made available through the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 budget and may not exceed \$6 million to offer an assortment of diagnostic testing services, including molecular diagnostics, serology, bacteriology, virology, parasitology and toxicology, for a variety of animals. The funding is approved for costs associated with laboratory space (rental, lease), staffing, testing equipment (ELISA, PCR, freezers/refrigerators), IT services, supplies and overhead.

1. *Grant Solicitation.* The Department will accept grant applications for the purposes, in the form and according to the schedule set forth, as follows.

2. *Purpose and Scope.*

(a) The purpose is to support the development and viability of a fourth PADLS laboratory. The need for a dedicated animal health laboratory in western Pennsylvania has become increasingly evident due to the rising incidence of zoonotic diseases, demand for animal health diagnostics and the growing demand for poultry and livestock products. The absence of a facility could lead to delays in critical disease diagnosis and response, affecting the overall efficiency of our agricultural and veterinary services. Establishing a western laboratory would include, but is not limited to, furthering the reach and impact of our animal health and laboratory systems and infrastructure, improving our response to disease threats, contributing to research and innovation and creating opportunity and security for this Commonwealth's agriculture industry to grow a stronger future.

(b) The proposed location for a western laboratory is west of the Interstate 99 corridor, in a location that provides ample space for the necessary infrastructure and is strategically positioned for accessibility by local farmers, veterinarians and researchers.

(c) This proposal aims to complement our existing nation-leading PADLS. PADLS has achieved Tier 1 accreditation from the American Association of Veterinary Laboratory Diagnosticians, a distinction held by only 32 laboratories in 24 states. The accreditation is required for participation in the National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN). NAHLN is a network of animal disease diagnostic laboratories that provides ongoing disease surveillance, responds quickly to disease events, communicates diagnostic outcomes to decision makers and has the capability and capacity to meet diagnostic needs during animal disease outbreaks.

(d) In 2023, PADLS performed 595,474 tests, providing critical information on diseases such as Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, Chronic Wasting Disease and rabies. Having accurate and timely test results saves precious time and allows for quick response in treating and stopping the spread of disease, thereby creating

better outcomes for farmers, their livestock, the broader agriculture industry and the community.

3. *Services.* The intent of the western laboratory is to better serve our livestock and poultry producers while serving as an anchor for prospective economic and environmental benefits by supporting the potential to expand animal agriculture in this region. The laboratory will be equipped with modern diagnostic equipment and staffed by experienced professionals. It will offer a range of services. Key areas of focus for the new laboratory will include, but not be limited to:

- (a) Avian Influenza AGID
- (b) Avian Influenza PCR
- (c) Avian Influenza ELISA
- (d) Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus VN
- (e) Bovine Viral Diarrhea Virus PCR and VN
- (f) Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis VN
- (g) Parainfluenza 3 HI
- (h) Equine Herpes Virus 1 PCR
- (i) Streptococcus equi (Strangles) PCR
- (j) Mycoplasma gallisepticum RPA and ELISA
- (k) Mycoplasma synoviae ELISA
- (l) Ruminant Pregnancy ELISA
- (m) Parasitology Centrifugation
- (n) Small Ruminant Lentivirus ELISA
- (o) Coggins

4. *Qualifications.*

(a) Ability to achieve accreditation by the American Association of Veterinary Laboratory Diagnosticians or be approved by the NAHLN and meeting the ISO17025 standards requirement, or both, within 3 years of the awarding of the grant.

(b) Sufficient Biosafety Level 2 space (in square feet) to house the required testing equipment and staff to complete the services specified in the Request for Applications (RFA).

(c) Sufficient staff, equipment, sample storage and IT infrastructure to complete the services specified in the RFA.

(d) Ability to provide normal business hours open to walk-in customer support and sample drop-off.

(e) Ability to provide after-hours sample drop off provisions.

5. *Governance.* The western laboratory will be overseen by the State veterinarian of the Department's Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic Services. In delivering the mission of PADLS, the western laboratory director will be tasked with stakeholder engagement, attendance at the Animal Health Diagnostic Commission (AHDC) meetings and special meetings at the direction of the director/State veterinarian. This includes meetings and open lines of communications with the AHDC, industry representatives, the Department and all other appropriate stakeholders. Quarterly meetings with staff at all PADLS laboratories will provide a report of deliverables, challenges, new opportunities and spending. The western laboratory will have the same relationship to the AHDC and the same testing fee schedule as the existing PADLS laboratories.

6. *Application Requirements.*

(a) The applicant's full legal name, business address and contact information.

(b) Specification of how the purpose (or purposes), as set forth in Section 2, will be achieved by the project.

(c) A detailed description of the project for which reimbursement grant money is sought, including the following:

(i) A project budget.

(ii) A statement of the maximum amount of grant money sought for the project.

(iii) A project implementation schedule, as appropriate for the project or purchase with respect to which the grant is sought.

(iv) A brief narrative identifying each entity that will assist with and participate in the project.

(d) An attestation signed by a duly authorized representative of the applicant verifying the accuracy of the information presented on the application.

7. *Application Delivery and Timeline.* Interested applicants must submit a complete electronic proposal and grant application using the Department of Community and Economic Development's Electronic Single Application web site at <https://www.esa.dced.state.pa.us/Login.aspx>. Completed proposals and applications may be electronically submitted beginning August 5, 2024, and must be received by no later than 5 p.m. on October 4, 2024.

8. *Informational Session.* An informational session will be held on Wednesday, September 4, 2024, at 1 p.m. at the Department of Agriculture, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110 for any interested applicants who have questions regarding any aspect of this RFA. This session is not mandatory, and interested applicants may attend in person or by audio or video conference. Applicants who wish to participate by audio or video conference may contact the Department at the address set forth in Section 13 in advance of the session for a call-in number or link for the audio/visual option.

9. *Application Review.*

(a) *Recommendation.* When the Department receives a complete and accurate grant application, it will forward a recommendation as to whether the application should be approved or rejected, whether the grant should be in an amount less than requested and whether any special restrictions or limitations should be placed on the grant.

(b) *Review committee.* The Secretary will appoint a committee to review and evaluate all applications and supporting documentation and to make recommendations to the Secretary.

(c) *Decisions.* The Secretary, in consultation with the Director of the Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic Services and the AHDC, will review all recommendations of the review committee and will have final authority to accept or reject these recommendations.

10. *Notice of Award.* Applicants shall be notified by mail of the decision on their grant application by the Department. Best efforts will be made to do so within 60 days of the application deadline.

11. *Grant Agreement.* After the Secretary approves a grant application, and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant will execute a written

or electronic grant agreement which describes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made. The grant agreement will contain and conform to the requirements of this notice and will also contain any special terms and conditions as required by the Secretary. Among the terms of the grant agreement will be a requirement that the grant recipient provide the Department full and complete access to all records relating to the performance of the project and submit the information as the Department may require. Applicants who wish to view the full terms and conditions of the grant agreement in advance of applying may contact the Department at the address set forth in Section 13. Applicants who are unable to agree to the terms and conditions should not apply.

12. *Delivery of Grant Funds by the Department.* As this grant is a reimbursement grant, the Department will not issue grant money until the successful applicant submits the following to the Department:

(a) A verified statement that the eligible project has been implemented.

(b) Bills and invoices demonstrating that expenses were incurred for which reimbursement grant funds are sought.

(c) Other information as the Department might reasonably require.

APPLICATIONS FOR NATIONAL POLLUTANT DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM (NPDES) PERMITS AND WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT (WQM) PERMITS UNDER THE CLEAN STREAMS LAW AND FEDERAL CLEAN WATER ACT

This notice provides information about persons who have applied to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) for a new, renewed, or amended NPDES or WQM permit, or a permit waiver for certain stormwater discharges, or have submitted a Notice of Intent (NOI) for coverage under a General Permit. The applications and NOIs concern, but are not limited to, effluent discharges from sewage treatment facilities and industrial facilities to surface waters or groundwater; stormwater discharges associated with industrial activity (industrial stormwater), construction activity (construction stormwater), and municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4s); the application of pesticides; the operation of Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs); and the construction of sewage, industrial waste, and manure storage, collection and treatment facilities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376). More information on the types of NPDES and WQM permits that are available can be found on DEP's website (visit www.dep.pa.gov and select Businesses, Water, Bureau of Clean Water, Wastewater Management, and NPDES and WQM Permitting Programs).

DEP provides a 15-day public comment period for Individual WQM Permit Applications for amendments.

A 30-day public comment period applies to these applications and draft permits, except when a site-specific water quality criterion is used to establish effluent limitations, in which case a 45-day public comment period applies. The period for comment may be extended at the discretion of DEP for one additional 15-day period. Notification of 15-day extensions for comment will be provided in the “Applications Received with Comment Periods Report” (Comments column).

Section III identifies individual NPDES permit applications received and draft permits indicating DEP's tentative determination relating to stormwater discharges associated with construction activities. A 30-day public comment period applies to these applications and draft permits. The period for comment may be extended at the discretion of the Department for one additional 15-day period. DEP will also accept requests or petitions for public hearings on applications. The request or petition must indicate the interest of the party filing and the reasons why a hearing is warranted. A hearing will be held if DEP determines that there is a significant public interest. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. DEP will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

This notification shall identify the licensed professional who will be on-site and responsible during the construction and testing of the gravity stormwater injection well. Notification shall be by email, letter, or phone.

e. Within 30 days of the completion of construction and testing of all gravity stormwater injection wells, the permittee shall submit a report to DEP's Regional Waterways & Wetlands and Clean Water Programs and the authorized conservation district; which includes the following and which shall be provided under the seal and signature of a Professional Geologist, licensed to practice in the Commonwealth:

- (1) A narrative describing the gravity stormwater injection well siting and sizing process.
- (2) Identification of the gravity stormwater injection wells; including specific identification number, which system the well is in, and the physical location.
- (3) The well logs showing the strata, construction details of each of the gravity stormwater injection wells, and the elevation of the soil/bedrock interface.
- (4) The acceptance rate of each of the gravity stormwater injection wells and the actual data, charts, and curves used to determine each gravity stormwater injection well's acceptance rate.
- (5) Calculations confirming that the system will accept the volume of stormwater within the allotted time period as identified in the permit application materials.
- (6) Whether or not the gravity stormwater injection well will be utilized.
- (7) The remaining amount of capacity, if any, which is required to be obtained by the system for full functionality of the proposed gravity stormwater injection well design.
- (8) Identification of site and weather conditions during installation and testing of the wells.
- (9) Any relevant observations/decisions made by the Licensed Professional who was on-site and responsible during the construction and testing.
- (10) The location and label of each Well drilled but not used and abandoned.
- (11) A narrative or log showing abandonment details for each well not used as part of the system.
- (12) A plot plan showing the label and location of all gravity stormwater injection wells, and wells not used and abandoned.

2. Groundwater Response Monitoring. To assure the gravity stormwater injection well PCSM BMP practice functions as intended, groundwater monitoring, reporting, analyses, and corrective action will be required as follows:

a. The permittee or co-permittee(s) shall implement the ____ Groundwater Monitoring Program, dated ____, as prepared by ____, except as modified in this permit condition.

b. Groundwater piezometers shall be installed adjacent to all gravity stormwater injection wells. Groundwater monitoring shall commence prior to the use of the stormwater injection wells.

c. The permittee or co-permittee(s) shall submit a Groundwater Monitoring Report within six (6) months of installation of the first gravity stormwater injection well and then annually thereafter. The report shall be signed and sealed by a Professional Geologist, licensed to practice in the Commonwealth, and contain the following elements:

- (1) Tabulated water elevation and temperature data from the piezometer data logging equipment.
- (2) Summary of observed responses to recharge events, including groundwater flow and epikarst water elevation variations.
- (3) Evaluation of the epikarst capacity to accept the recharge from the storm events observed during the monitoring period.
- (4) Proposed corrective action plan for any locations where recharge capacity has not met design standards or has diminished.

d. Should DEP determine that a gravity stormwater injection well has not met design standards or is diminished; a corrective action plan must be submitted to DEP within 30 days of written notification and implemented by the deadline specified by DEP.

3. Groundwater Quality Monitoring. To assure groundwater quality is being maintained and not degraded as a result of the stormwater recharge through the gravity stormwater injection well PCSM BMP, groundwater quality monitoring, reporting, analyses, and corrective action will be required as follows:

a. The permittee or co-permittee(s) shall implement the _____ Groundwater Monitoring Program dated _____, as prepared by _____, except as modified in this permit condition.

b. At least four (4) property perimeter piezometers and four (4) representative piezometers located within the interior of the site shall be installed prior to installation of the gravity stormwater injection wells. DEP must approve the location of the piezometers.

c. To establish baseline groundwater quality, the permittee shall sample all piezometers and analyze for the following parameters: pH, total dissolved solids, arsenic, beryllium, cadmium, chromium, copper, lead, mercury, zinc, total suspended solids, total phosphorus, nitrate-nitrogen, nitrite-nitrogen, iron, nickel, manganese, cyanide, calcium, magnesium, potassium, aluminum, sodium, sulfate, alkalinity, chlorides, benzene, total petroleum hydrocarbons, and fecal coliform. At least two (2) baseline samples shall be collected and analyzed prior to the use of the gravity stormwater injection wells. The data from the two (2) baseline samples must be kept for the life of system.

d. To establish current groundwater quality, the permittee shall sample all identified representative upgradient and downgradient perimeter piezometers and analyze for the following parameters: pH, total dissolved solids, arsenic, beryllium, cadmium, chromium, copper, lead, mercury, zinc, total suspended solids, total phosphorus, nitrate-nitrogen, nitrite-nitrogen, iron, nickel, manganese, cyanide, calcium, magnesium, potassium, aluminum, sodium, sulfate, alkalinity, chlorides, benzene, total petroleum hydrocarbons, and fecal coliform. The frequency of sampling and analysis shall be quarterly from start of construction through the approval of the NOT, semiannually for three years after the approval of the NOT, and annually thereafter. For the parameters: iron, nickel, manganese, cyanide, calcium, magnesium, potassium, aluminum, sodium, sulfate, alkalinity, chlorides, benzene, and total petroleum hydrocarbons, the frequency of sampling and reporting shall be annual.

e. The permittee or co-permittee(s) shall submit a Groundwater Quality Monitoring Report within six (6) months of installation of the first gravity stormwater injection well and then annually thereafter. The report shall be signed and sealed by a Professional Geologist, licensed to practice in the Commonwealth, and contain the following elements:

- (1) Site map with perimeter piezometer locations, groundwater elevations, and groundwater flow directions shown.
- (2) Identification and justification of the identified representative upgradient and downgradient perimeter piezometers to be sampled that will provide representative water quality information of groundwater flowing onto the site and flowing off of the site.
- (3) Tabularized and graphical summary of groundwater sampling results, including the baseline results. Each report shall include the cumulative results from all sampling.
- (4) An evaluation of the data including trend analysis with a determination of changes and impacts to the groundwater quality resulting from the stormwater recharge, including a determination of whether an adverse impact is projected or existing.
- (5) Proposed corrective action plan to address any projected or existing adverse impact.

f. Should DEP determine an adverse impact to groundwater exists or is projected to exist, a corrective action plan must be submitted within 30 days of DEP's written notification and implemented by the deadline specified by DEP.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 77.522 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters DEP may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30-days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. Copies of the appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure may be obtained from the Board. This paragraph does not, in and of itself, create a right of appeal beyond that permitted by applicable statutes and decisional law. For individuals who wish to challenge an action, the appeal must reach the Board within 30-days. A lawyer is not needed to file an appeal with the Board. Individuals who cannot afford a lawyer may qualify for free pro bono representation. Call the Secretary to the Board at 717-787-3483 for more information. City of Bethlehem Act 537 Special Study. The purpose of this planning effort is to upgrade the City’s wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) such that the WWTP’s organic design capacity can be increased to 50,000 pounds per day (lb/day) of biochemical oxygen demand (BOD). The City’s WWTP currently has a permitted hydraulic capacity of 20 million gallons per day (mgd) and an organic design capacity of 39,365 lb/day of BOD. The City’s 2023 Chapter 94 Report projects a maximum 3-month hydraulic flow of 12.6 mgd and a maximum month average influent loading of 39,282 lb/day of BOD in the year 2028. While no organic overload is projected in the next 5 years, the City has concerns that increases in influent organic concentrations have made the organic loading the limiting factor at the plant and that an organic overload may be experienced in the next 5 to 10-year period. The alternatives evaluated to address the organic design capacity in this Special Study are liquid train improvements as identified in the City’s 2012 Act 537 Plan and Chemically Enhanced Primary Treatment (CEPT). be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

11. *Unclaimed prize money:* For a period of 1 year from the announced close of \$500,000 Bonus Crossword, prize money from winning \$500,000 Bonus Crossword instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the \$500,000 Bonus Crossword instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

12. *Governing law:* In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the

State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

13. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote \$500,000 Bonus Crossword or through normal communication methods.

A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

11. *Unclaimed prize money:* For a period of 1 year from the announced close of All Cash, prize money from winning All Cash instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons

entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the All Cash instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

12. *Governing law:* In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

13. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote All Cash or through normal communications methods.

Pennsylvania Eagles Fast Play Game 5250

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name*: The name of the Fast Play lottery game is Pennsylvania Eagles (“Eagles”). The game number is PA-5250.

2. *Definitions*:

(a) *Authorized retailer or retailer*: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

(b) *Bar code*: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

(c) *FOOTBALL WINALL*: The area located at the top of an Eagles ticket where, when a GO BIRDS (WINALL) symbol appears, the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the YOUR NUMBERS area.

(d) *Game Ticket*: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player’s record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.

(e) *Lottery Central Computer System*: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

(f) *Lottery Terminal*: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.

(g) *MONEY MARKER*: The area located at the bottom of an Eagles ticket where, when a Marker play symbol appears above a prize amount, the player wins the prize amount shown below the Marker play symbol. “MONEY MARKER” is played separately.

(h) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(i) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.

(j) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.

(k) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.

(l) *WINNING NUMBERS*: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

(m) *Winning ticket*: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

(n) *YOUR NUMBERS*: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

3. *Price*: The price of an Eagles ticket is \$5.

4. *Description of the Eagles Fast Play lottery game*:

(a) The Eagles lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Eagles tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets.

Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

(b) Eagles is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area to any of the play symbols located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol. Whenever a GO BIRDS (WINALL) symbol appears in the “FOOTBALL WIN” area, the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

(c) Eagles tickets also contain a “MONEY MARKER” area where, when a Marker symbol appears above one of the prize amounts located at the bottom of a ticket, determines whether the player wins the prize amount under the Marker symbol. “MONEY MARKER” is played separately.

(d) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(e) Eagles tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

(f) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request an Eagles ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

(g) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Eagles ticket and select the Eagles option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

5. *Eagles ticket characteristics*:

(a) Eagles tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.

(b) *Play Symbols*: Eagles tickets will contain a “WINNING NUMBERS” area, a “YOUR NUMBERS” area, a “FOOTBALL WINALL” area and a “MONEY MARKER” area. The play symbols and their captions located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area and the “YOUR NUMBERS” area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVEN), 12 (TWELVE), 13 (THIRTEEN), 14 (FOURTEEN), 15 (FIFTEEN), 16 (SIXTEEN), 17 (SEVENTEEN), 18 (EIGHTEEN), 19 (NINETEEN), 20 (TWENTY), 21 (TWENTYONE), 22 (TWENTYTWO), 23 (TWENTYTHREE), 24 (TWENTYFOUR), 25 (TWENTYFIVE), 26 (TWENTYSIX), 27 (TWENTYSEVEN), 28 (TWENTYEIGHT), 29 (TWENTYNINE) and 30 (THIRTY). The play symbols located in the “FOOTBALL WINALL” area are: FLY Eagles FLY (TRYAGAIN) symbol and a GO BIRDS (WINALL) symbol. The play symbols located in the “MONEY MARKER” area are: Football symbol and a Marker symbol.

(c) *Prize Symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions located in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area are: \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL), \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL), \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN), \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY), \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY), \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and \$50,000 (FTY THO).

(d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$30, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$1,000 and \$50,000. The prizes that can be won in the “MONEY MARKER” area are: \$30, \$40 and \$50. A player can win up to 13 times on a ticket.

(e) *Approximate number of tickets available for the game:* Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Eagles lottery game.

6. *Second-Chance Drawing:* The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct an Eagles Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Eagles lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9 (related to second-chance drawing).

7. *Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:*

(a) All Eagles prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.

(b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50,000 (FTY THO) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50,000.

(c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(d) Holders of tickets upon which a GO BIRDS (WINALL) play symbol appears in the "FOOTBALL WINALL" area and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in three of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in four of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY) appears in five of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(f) Holders of tickets upon which a GO BIRDS (WINALL) play symbol appears in the "FOOTBALL WINALL" area and a prize symbol of \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears in four of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in four of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in two of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$170.

(g) Holders of tickets upon which a GO BIRDS (WINALL) play symbol appears in the "FOOTBALL WINALL" area and a prize symbol of \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in six of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in four of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$160.

(h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(i) Holders of tickets upon which a GO BIRDS (WINALL) play symbol appears in the "FOOTBALL

WINALL" area and a prize symbol of \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in four of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in six of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(j) Holders of tickets upon which a GO BIRDS (WINALL) play symbol appears in the "FOOTBALL WINALL" area and a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in eight of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in four of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.

(l) Holders of tickets upon which a Marker symbol appears above a \$50 prize amount in the "MONEY MARKER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.

(m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.

(n) Holders of tickets upon which a Marker symbol appears above a \$40 prize amount in the "MONEY MARKER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.

(o) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

(p) Holders of tickets upon which a Marker symbol appears above a \$30 prize amount in the "MONEY MARKER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

(q) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.

(r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(s) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

8. *Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning:* The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

(b) *Participation and entry:*

(1) Entrants must have a registered lottery account in order to participate in the Drawing. To create a lottery account, visit <https://www.PAiLottery.com>. Creating a lottery account is free.

(2) A registered lottery account holder is subject to the iLottery regulations and specifically agrees to be bound by the iLottery terms and conditions located at <https://www.pailottery.com/signup/terms-and-conditions/>, as well as any related policies.

(3) To establish a lottery account, players must provide the following information:

(i) The player's name as it appears on a valid government-issued identification or tax documents;

(ii) The player's date of birth;

(iii) The entire or last four digits of the player's Social Security Number, or comparable equivalent;

(iv) The player's address;

(v) The player's telephone number;

(vi) The player's email address;

(vii) Any other information established by the Lottery to be necessary to verify the age and identity of the player.

(4) An individual may be required to provide additional information or documentation, as set forth in the iLottery terms and conditions, to establish a lottery account or register for iLottery. The information may be used for iLottery registration or to confirm information provided by that individual during the registration process.

(5) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at <https://www.palottery.com>, or the Lottery's official mobile application during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted

only once in the Drawing. Entries will automatically be awarded at the time of successful submission of a Qualifying Ticket. No other method of submission will be accepted, and entries submitted using any other method, including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Pennsylvania Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.

(6) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be accepted.

(7) Only one claimant per entry is allowed.

(8) Entrants must be 18 years of age or older.

(9) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.

(10) Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.

(c) *Drawing description:*

(1) The Lottery will conduct one Eagles Second-Chance Drawing for Qualifying Tickets. All time references are Eastern Prevailing Time.

(2) All entries received after 4:59:59 a.m. August 6, 2024, through 11:59:59 p.m. September 12, 2024, will be entered into the Drawing tentatively scheduled to be held between September 13, 2024 and September 26, 2024.

(3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site at <https://www.palottery.com>.

(4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-5250 EAGLES (\$5) = five entries.

(5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.

(d) *Prizes available to be won, determination of winners, and odds of winning:*

(1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 9(f), or those mentioned anywhere else in these rules.

(2) Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 9(c)(2).

(i) The first through the seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of two Club-level game tickets with a \$30 food and beverage credit per ticket, for a to-be-determined Philadelphia Eagles home game.

(ii) The eighth through the seventy-seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of two Mezzanine level game tickets with a \$30 food and beverage credit per ticket, for a to-be-determined Philadelphia Eagles home game.

(3) The Lottery has elected to increase the value of the prize won in section 9(d)(2)(i), above, to account for federal income tax withholding in the amount of \$255.18 and state income tax withholding in the amount of \$8.08.

(4) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site.

(5) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.

(6) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.

(e) *Prize claim procedures:*

(1) Winners of the prizes described in 9(d)(i) and 9(d)(ii), above, that are awarded in the Drawing will be contacted by email by the Pennsylvania Lottery to initiate the prize claim procedure.

(2) Winners of the prize described in section 9(d) above, will have seven business days from the date they are notified by the Pennsylvania Lottery, pursuant to this section, to claim their prizes. In order to claim their prizes, winners must respond to the Pennsylvania Lottery's email regarding prize claim procedures and must submit a properly completed prize claim form within seven business days from the date they are notified by the Pennsylvania Lottery. Failure to comply with the prize claim requirements as set forth herein, for any reason, shall result in the winner forfeiting their right to receive the prize. An alternate winner will be awarded the respective prize, according to Lottery procedure.

(3) Winners of the prizes described in sections 9(d)(2)(i) and 9(d)(2)(ii), above, must accept tickets to the Philadelphia Eagles game prize described in section 9(d) no later than 72 hours prior to the start of the event by performing the following steps:

(i) Winners must open the link contained in the email notifying the winners that a prize is won;

(ii) Winners must create or log into an existing account in the Eagles TicketMaster Account Manager; and

(iii) Winners must accept the tickets available within the Eagles TicketMaster Account Manager.

(iv) In the event that a ticket winner fails to properly accept the game tickets following the procedure in section 9(d)(3), above, no alternate winner will be awarded the prize.

(4) By entering a ticket into the Drawing, the entrant agrees to be bound by these rules, the prize claim requirements set forth herein, and expressly waives any claim against the Pennsylvania Lottery for a prize not awarded in conformance with these rules.

(f) *Drawing restrictions:*

(1) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.

(2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If an entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure. In the event that a ticket winner fails to properly accept the game tickets following the procedure in section 9(e)(3), above, no alternate winner will be awarded the prize.

(3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.

(4) Employees of the Pennsylvania Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games, LLC, MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.

(5) The Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause that, in the Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.

(6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.

(7) The Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.

(7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

(8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

(b) *Invalid or defective game tickets.* A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

12. *Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:*

(a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

(1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

(2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

(4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

(e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

(f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

13. *Funding for prizes:* Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

14. *Unclaimed prizes:* Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

15. *Purchase and prize restrictions:* A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

16. *Governing law:*

(a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Eagles lottery game.

(b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

17. *Retailer compensation:*

(a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.

(b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a

winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

20. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Eagles or through normal communications methods.

21. *Applicability:* This notice applies only to the Eagles lottery game announced in this notice.

(k) Holders of tickets upon which a 5 (FIVE) symbol appears in the play area and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the “Prize” area under that 5 (FIVE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(l) Holders of tickets upon which a POWER (WINALL) symbol appears in the play area and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in five of the “Prize” areas and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in ten of the “Prize” areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(m) Holders of tickets upon which a POWER (WINALL) symbol appears in the play area and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in two of the “Prize” areas, a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in 12 of the “Prize” areas and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in one of the “Prize” areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(n) Holders of tickets upon which a 5 (FIVE) symbol appears in the play area and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the “Prize” area under that 5 (FIVE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.

(o) Holders of tickets upon which a 5 (FIVE) symbol appears in the play area and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the “Prize” area under that 5 (FIVE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.

4. *Prizes:* The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$3, \$5, \$10, \$15, \$30, \$50, \$100, \$150, \$500, \$1,000 and \$50,000. A player can win up to four times on a ticket. For a complete description of how these prizes can be won, see section 7 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate odds).

(f) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches six entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, and upon which two Campfire (FIRE) symbols appear in the "CAMPFIRE MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150.

(g) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches five entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, and upon which three Campfire (FIRE) symbols appear in the "CAMPFIRE MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150.

(h) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches eight entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(n) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches six entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

(o) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches five entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, and upon which one Campfire (FIRE) symbol appears in the "CAMPFIRE MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

(p) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches two entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, and upon which three Campfire (FIRE) symbols appear in the "CAMPFIRE MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

(q) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches five entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.

(r) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches two entire words in the play grid, using only the

letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, and upon which two Campfire (FIRE) symbols appear in the "CAMPFIRE MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.

(s) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches four entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(t) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches three entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, and upon which one Campfire (FIRE) symbols appear in the "CAMPFIRE MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(u) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches three entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

(v) Holders of tickets where the player completely matches two entire words in the play grid, using only the letters found in the "YOUR LETTERS" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$3.

Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

10. *Unclaimed prize money:* For a period of 1 year from the announced close of S'more Crossword, prize money from winning S'more Crossword instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the S'more Crossword instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

11. *Governing law:* In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314),

61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

12. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote S'more Crossword or through normal communication methods.

Pennsylvania Steelers Fast Play Game 5251

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name:* The name of the Fast Play lottery game is Pennsylvania Steelers ("Steelers"). The game number is PA-5251.

2. *Definitions:*

(a) *Authorized retailer or retailer:* A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

(b) *Bar code:* The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

(c) *FOOTBALL WINALL:* The area located at the top of a Steelers ticket where, when a 1933 (WINALL) symbol appears, the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the YOUR NUMBERS area.

(d) *Game Ticket:* A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an

authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.

(e) *Lottery Central Computer System*: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

(f) *Lottery Terminal*: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.

(g) *MONEY MARKER*: The area located at the bottom of a Steelers ticket where, when a Marker play symbol appears above a prize amount, the player wins the prize amount shown below that Marker play symbol. "MONEY MARKER" is played separately.

(h) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(i) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.

(j) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.

(k) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.

(l) *WINNING NUMBERS*: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

(m) *Winning ticket*: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

(n) *YOUR NUMBERS*: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

3. *Price*: The price of a Steelers ticket is \$5.

4. *Description of the Steelers Fast Play lottery game*:

(a) The Steelers lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Steelers tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

(b) Steelers is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. Whenever a 1933 (WINALL) symbol appears in the "FOOTBALL WINALL" area, the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

(c) Steelers tickets also contain a "MONEY MARKER" area where, when a Marker symbol appears above one of the prize amounts located at the bottom of a ticket, the player wins the prize amount under the Marker symbol. "MONEY MARKER" is played separately.

(d) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(e) Steelers tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

(f) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Steelers ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

(g) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Steelers ticket and select the Steelers option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

5. *Steelers ticket characteristics*:

(a) Steelers tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.

(b) *Play Symbols*: Steelers tickets will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area, a "FOOTBALL WINALL" area and a "MONEY MARKER" area. The play symbols and their captions located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). The play symbols located in the "FOOTBALL WINALL" area are: PIT (TRYAGAIN) symbol and a 1933 (WINALL) symbol. The play symbols located in the "MONEY MARKER" area are: Football symbol and a Marker symbol.

(c) *Prize Symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL), \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL), \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN), \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY), \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY), \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and \$50,000 (FTY THO).

(d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$30, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$1,000 and \$50,000. The prizes that can be won in the "MONEY MARKER" area are: \$30, \$40 and \$50. A player can win up to 13 times on a ticket.

(e) *Approximate number of tickets available for the game*: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Steelers lottery game.

6. *Second-Chance Drawing*: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a Steelers Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Steelers lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9 (related to second-chance drawing).

7. *Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners*:

(a) All Steelers prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.

(b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50,000 (FTY THO) appears in the Prize area under the matching

“YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50,000.

(c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(d) Holders of tickets upon which a 1933 (WINALL) play symbol appears in the “FOOTBALL WINALL” area and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in three of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in four of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY) appears in five of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(f) Holders of tickets upon which a 1933 (WINALL) play symbol appears in the “FOOTBALL WINALL” area and a prize symbol of \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears in four of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in four of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in two of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$170.

(g) Holders of tickets upon which a 1933 (WINALL) play symbol appears in the “FOOTBALL WINALL” area and a prize symbol of \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in six of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in four of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$160.

(h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(i) Holders of tickets upon which a 1933 (WINALL) play symbol appears in the “FOOTBALL WINALL” area and a prize symbol of \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears in two of the Prize areas, a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in four of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in six of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(j) Holders of tickets upon which a 1933 (WINALL) play symbol appears in the “FOOTBALL WINALL” area and a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in eight of the Prize areas and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL)

appears in four of the Prize areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.

(l) Holders of tickets upon which a Marker symbol appears above a \$50 prize amount in the “MONEY MARKER” area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.

(m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.

(n) Holders of tickets upon which a Marker symbol appears above a \$40 prize amount in the “MONEY MARKER” area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.

(o) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

(p) Holders of tickets upon which a Marker symbol appears above a \$30 prize amount in the “MONEY MARKER” area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

(q) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.

(r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(s) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

8. *Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning:* The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

(a) *Qualifying Tickets:* Non-winning PA-5251 Steelers (\$5) Fast Play lottery game tickets ("Qualifying Tickets") are eligible for entry in the Drawing.

(b) *Participation and entry:*

(1) Entrants must have a registered lottery account in order to participate in the Drawing. To create a lottery account, visit <https://www.PAILottery.com>. Creating a lottery account is free.

(2) A registered lottery account holder is subject to the iLottery regulations and specifically agrees to be bound by the iLottery terms and conditions located at <https://www.pailottery.com/signup/terms-and-conditions/>, as well as any related policies.

(3) To establish a lottery account, players must provide the following information:

(i) The player's name as it appears on a valid government-issued identification or tax documents;

(ii) The player's date of birth;

(iii) The entire or last four digits of the player's Social Security Number, or comparable equivalent;

(iv) The player's address;

(v) The player's telephone number;

(vi) The player's email address;

(vii) Any other information established by the Lottery to be necessary to verify the age and identity of the player.

(4) An individual may be required to provide additional information or documentation, as set forth in the iLottery terms and conditions, to establish a lottery account or register for iLottery. The information may be used for iLottery registration or to confirm information provided by that individual during the registration process.

(5) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at <https://www.palottery.com>, or the Lottery's official mobile application during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. Entries will automatically be awarded at the time of successful submission of a Qualifying Ticket. No other method of submission will be accepted, and entries submitted using any other method,

including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Pennsylvania Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.

(6) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be accepted.

(7) Only one claimant per entry is allowed.

(8) Entrants must be 18 years of age or older.

(9) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.

(10) Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.

(c) *Drawing description:*

(1) The Lottery will conduct one Steelers Second-Chance Drawing for Qualifying Tickets. All time references are Eastern Prevailing Time.

(2) All entries received after 4:59:59 a.m. August 6, 2024, through 11:59:59 p.m. September 12, 2024, will be entered into the Drawing tentatively scheduled to be held between September 13, 2024 and September 26, 2024.

(3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site at <https://www.palottery.com>.

(4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-5251 Steelers (\$5) = five entries.

(5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.

(d) *Prizes available to be won, determination of winners, and odds of winning:*

(1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 9(f), or those mentioned anywhere else in these rules.

(2) Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 9(b)(2).

(i) The first through the seventeenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of two Regular Season Suite game tickets, with each ticket holder receiving food and beverage, for a to-be-determined Pittsburgh Steelers home game.

(ii) The eighteenth through the one hundred and ninety-second entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of two game

tickets and two Pre-Game Tailgate Area tickets for a to-be-determined Pittsburgh Steelers home game.

(3) The Lottery has elected to increase the value of the prize won in section 9(d)(2)(i), above, to account for federal income tax withholding in the amount of \$660.29 and state income tax withholding in the amount of \$20.91.

(4) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site.

(5) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.

(6) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.

(e) *Prize claim procedures:*

(1) Winners of the prizes described in 9(d)(i) and 9(d)(ii), above, that are awarded in the Drawing will be contacted by email by the Pennsylvania Lottery to initiate the prize claim procedure.

(2) Winners of the prizes described in 9(d), above, will have seven business days from the date they are notified by the Pennsylvania Lottery, pursuant to this section, to claim their prizes. In order to claim their prizes, winners must respond to the Pennsylvania Lottery's email regarding prize claim procedures and must submit a properly completed prize claim form within seven business days from the date they are notified by the Pennsylvania Lottery. Failure to comply with the prize claim requirements as set forth herein, for any reason, shall result in the winner forfeiting their right to receive the prize. An alternate winner will be awarded the respective prize, according to Lottery procedure.

(3) Winners of the prizes described in sections 9(d)(2)(i) and 9(d)(2)(ii), above, must accept tickets to the Pittsburgh Steelers game prize described in section 9(d) no later than 72 hours prior to the start of the event by performing the following steps:

(i) Winners must open the link contained in the email notifying the winners that a prize is won;

(ii) Winners must create or log into an existing account in the Steelers TicketMaster Account Manager; and

(iii) Winners must accept the tickets available within the Steelers TicketMaster Account Manager.

(iv) In the event that a ticket winner fails to properly accept the game tickets following the procedure in section 9(e)(3), above, no alternate winner will be awarded the prize.

(4) By entering a ticket into the Drawing, the entrant agrees to be bound by these rules, the prize claim requirements set forth herein, and expressly waives any claim against the Pennsylvania Lottery for a prize not awarded in conformance with these rules.

(f) *Drawing restrictions:*

(1) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.

(2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If an entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing,

the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.

(3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.

(4) Employees of the Pennsylvania Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games, LLC, MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.

(5) The Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause that, in the Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.

(6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.

(7) The Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.

(8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.

(9) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.

(10) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).

(11) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.

(12) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the Drawing will be disqualified and one replacement entry will be selected.

(13) Prizes are not transferrable.

(14) Winners and guests must abide by all venue policies. Any promotional partner reserves the right to revoke full or partial prize from any winner or winner's guest whom it or venue personnel, or both, may deem, in their sole discretion, to be intoxicated, a safety risk, to have violated any venue policy or law or may bring the promotional partner into disrepute.

(15) The winner is responsible for all costs, expenses and transportation, not specifically included in the prize won in the Drawing, arising from or in connection with any prize won.

(16) Prizes are not redeemable for cash.

(17) If a date is provided for a game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9(d), the date is subject to change at the sole discretion of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

(18) If no date is provided for a game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9(d), the date will be determined by the Pittsburgh Steelers and will be communicated to the winner by either the Pittsburgh Steelers or the Lottery.

(19) In the event the winner is not available on the date of the game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9(d), there will be no extensions or substitutions of prizes and the winner will not receive any reimbursement for the unused prize.

(20) In the event a prize described in section 9(d) is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

(21) The specific seats to be provided as part of any prize described in section 9(d) will be determined at the sole discretion of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

(22) The food and beverages to be provided as part of any prize described in section 9(d) will be selected at the sole discretion of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

(23) Each winner, their respective heirs, legal representatives, and assigns, agree to indemnify, defend, release, and discharge the Pennsylvania Lottery, Pittsburgh Steelers, LLC, Steelers Stadium Operator, LLC, and the NFL, as well as their employees, officers, directors and commissioners from and against any loss, claim, damage, suit, or injury arising out of or relating to this promotion. By entering, the winner indemnifies, releases, discharges, and agrees to hold harmless the Pennsylvania Lottery, Pittsburgh Steelers, LLC, Steelers Stadium Operator, LLC, and the NFL, as well as their employees, officers, directors and commissioners from unanticipated cancellation, suspension, or postponement of the promotion due to natural disaster, national emergency, or other unforeseen act of God or man. Winners participate solely at their own risk and responsibility.

(24) Prizes are not transferrable.

(25) Other restrictions may apply.

10. *Ticket responsibility:*

(a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.

(b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.

(c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

11. *Ticket validation and requirements:*

(a) *Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets.* To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:

(1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.

(2) The game ticket must be intact.

(3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.

(4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.

(5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

(6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.

(7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

(8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

(b) *Invalid or defective game tickets.* A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

12. *Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:*

(a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

(b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.

(c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.

(d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

(2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

(4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

(e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

(f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

13. *Funding for prizes:* Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

14. *Unclaimed prizes:* Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the

sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

15. *Purchase and prize restrictions:* A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

16. *Governing law:*

(a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Steelers lottery game.

(b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

17. *Retailer compensation:*

(a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.

(b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

18. *Retailer Incentive Programs:* The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Steelers lottery game tickets.

19. *Retailer bonus:* The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

20. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be

disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Steelers or through normal communications methods.

21. *Applicability:* This notice applies only to the Steelers lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania UNO™ Fast Play Game 5252

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name:* The name of the Fast Play lottery game is Pennsylvania UNO™ (“UNO™”). The game number is PA-5252.

2. *Definitions:*

(a) *Authorized retailer or retailer:* A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

(b) *Bar code:* The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

(c) *WILD WIN:* The area at the top of an UNO™ ticket containing a WILD WIN play symbol and a WILD WIN PRIZE that, when a WILD (WILDCARD) play symbol appears, increases each prize won in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area by the prize amount shown in the “WILD WIN PRIZE” area. “WILD WIN” prizes cannot be won alone.

(d) *Game Ticket:* A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.

(e) *Lottery Central Computer System:* The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

(f) *Lottery Terminal:* A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.

(g) *Play:* A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(h) *Play Area:* The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.

(i) *Play Symbol:* A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.

(j) *Prize:* A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.

(k) *WINNING NUMBERS*: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

(l) *Winning ticket*: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

(m) *YOUR NUMBERS*: The play symbols found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

3. *Price*: The price of a UNO™ ticket is \$1.

4. *Description of the UNO™ Fast Play lottery game*:

(a) The UNO™ lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. UNO™ tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

(b) UNO™ is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area to any of the play symbols located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol. Whenever a player wins a prize in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area and a WILD (WILDCARD) play symbol appears in the “WILD WIN” area, the player adds the amount shown in the “WILD WIN PRIZE” area to each prize won in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area and wins that amount. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

(c) Players can win the prizes identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(d) UNO™ tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

(e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a UNO™ ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

(f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a UNO™ ticket and select the UNO™ option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

5. *UNO™ ticket characteristics*:

(a) UNO™ tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.

(b) *Play Symbols*: UNO™ tickets will contain a “WINNING NUMBERS” area, a “YOUR NUMBERS” area and a “WILD WIN” area. The play symbols and their captions located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area and the “YOUR NUMBERS” area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE) and 0 (ZERO). The play symbols and prize amounts, and their captions, located in the “WILD WIN” area are: Draw Two (TRYAGAIN) symbol, Reverse (TRYAGAIN) symbol, Skip (TRYAGAIN) symbol, WILD (WILDCARD) symbol, \$2⁰⁰ (TWO DOL) and \$4⁰⁰ (FOR DOL).

(c) *Prize Symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions located in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area are: FREE (TICKET), \$1⁰⁰ (ONE DOL), \$2⁰⁰ (TWO DOL), \$3⁰⁰ (THR DOL), \$4⁰⁰ (FOR DOL), \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL), \$20⁰⁰ (TWENTY), \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY), \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY), \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$400 (FOR HUN) and \$4,000 (FOR THO).

(d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: Free \$1 Ticket, \$2, \$3, \$4, \$10, \$20, \$30, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$400 and \$4,000. For a complete description of how these prizes can be won, see section 7 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to seven times on a ticket.

(e) *Approximate number of tickets available for the game*: Approximately 1,200,000 tickets will be available for sale for the UNO™ lottery game.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a WILD (WILDCARD) play symbol and a prize amount of \$2⁰⁰ (TWO DOL) appear in the “WILD WIN” area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$52.

(f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.

(g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a WILD (WILDCARD) play symbol and a prize amount of \$2⁰⁰ (TWO DOL) appear in the “WILD WIN” area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$42.

(h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.

(aa) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1^{.00} (ONE DOL) appears in the Prize area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.

(bb) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of FREE

(TICKET) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one UNO™ Fast Play Game Ticket.

7. *Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning:* The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

8. Ticket responsibility:

(a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.

(b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.

(c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

9. Ticket validation and requirements:

(a) *Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets.* To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:

(1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.

(2) The game ticket must be intact.

(3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.

(4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.

(5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

(6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.

(7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

(8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

(b) *Invalid or defective game tickets.* A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:

(a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

(b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.

(c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.

(d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

(2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

(4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

(e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

(f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the

sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

13. *Purchase and prize restrictions:* A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. *Governing law:*

(a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play UNO™ lottery game.

(b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

15. *Retailer compensation:*

(a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.

(b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

16. *Retailer Incentive Programs:* The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play UNO™ lottery game tickets.

17. *Retailer bonus:* The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

18. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be

disseminated through media used to advertise or promote UNO™ or through normal communications methods.

19. *Applicability:* This notice applies only to the UNO™ lottery game announced in this notice.

The play symbols and their captions located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area and the “YOUR NUMBERS” area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE) and 0 (ZERO). The play symbols and their captions located in the “DRAW 4 TIMES” area are: Skip (NOMULT) symbol, Skip (TRYAGAIN) symbol, Reverse (NOMULT) symbol, Reverse (TRYAGAIN) symbol and a 4X (4TIMES) symbol.

4. *Prize Symbols:* The prize symbols and their captions located in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area are: FREE (TICKET), \$1⁰⁰ (ONE DOL), \$2⁰⁰ (TWO DOL), \$4⁰⁰ (FOR DOL), \$8⁰⁰ (EGT DOL), \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL), \$20⁰⁰ (TWENTY), \$40⁰⁰ (FORTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$400 (FOR HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and \$10,000 (TEN THO).

4X (4TIMES) symbol appears in the “DRAW 4 TIMES” area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.

(u) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match either of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2.⁰⁰ (TWO DOL) appears in the “prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.

(v) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match either of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1.⁰⁰ (ONE DOL) appears in the “prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.

(w) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match either of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of FREE (TICKET) appears in the “prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one UNO™ instant game ticket or one Pennsylvania Lottery instant game ticket of equivalent sale price which is currently on sale.

If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the UNO™ instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Additions to List of Class A Wild Trout Waters; July 2024

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) approved the addition of 31 stream sections to its list of Class A wild trout streams as set forth at 54 Pa.B. 2718 (May 18, 2024). Under 58 Pa. Code § 57.8a (relating to Class A wild trout streams), it is the Commission’s policy to manage self-sustaining Class A wild trout populations as a renewable natural resource and to conserve that resource and the angling that it provides. Class A wild trout populations represent the best of this Commonwealth’s naturally reproducing trout fisheries.

Classification of Wild Trout Streams; Additions; July 2024

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) approved the addition of 95 stream sections as set forth at 54 Pa.B. 2714 (May 18, 2024). Under 58 Pa. Code § 57.11 (relating to listing of wild trout streams), it is the policy of the Commission to accurately identify and classify stream sections supporting naturally reproducing populations of trout as wild trout streams. The listing of a stream section as a wild trout stream is a biological designation that does not determine how it is managed. The Commission relies upon many factors in determining the appropriate management of streams. The Commission’s Fisheries Management Division maintains the complete list of wild trout streams, and it is available on the Commission’s web site at <https://www.fishandboat.com/Fishing/All-About-Fish/Catch-PA-Fish/Trout/Pages/TroutWaterClassifications.aspx>.

Health Equity Accreditation
July 24, 2024**

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the May 25, 2024 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (RRA) (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the RRA (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Pennsylvania Health Insurance Exchange Authority (Exchange Authority) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Whether the regulation conforms to the intention of the General Assembly in the enactment of the statute upon which the regulation is based; Whether the regulation represents a policy decision of such a substantial nature that it requires legislative review.

This proposal is the first rulemaking promulgated by the Exchange Authority. It is being proposed under the Exchange Authority’s rulemaking authority granted to it by the General Assembly under Section 9701 of Act 42 of 2019 (Act 42) (40 Pa.C.S. § 9701), also known as the Health Markets Oversight Act, and their general rule-making authority of Section 506 of the Administrative

Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 186).

In order to determine if a regulation conforms to the intention of the General Assembly in the enactment of a statute upon which it is based, this Commission is guided by Section 5.2(a) of the RRA. It states, in part, the following: “In making its determination, the commission shall consider written comments submitted by the committees and current members of the General Assembly, pertinent opinions of Pennsylvania’s courts and formal opinions of the Attorney General.” Representative Bryan Cutler, Republican Leader, and Senator John Disanto, Chair of the Senate Banking and Insurance Committee, have submitted comments opposing this proposed rulemaking.

In his comments, Representative Cutler states that as the author of Act 42, he believes the proposed regulation “goes beyond the clearly defined purpose and legislative intent of the exchange authority as outlined in 40 Pa.C.S. § 9302(b)(1) and (2).” He also states that Act 42 was passed unanimously by both chambers of the General Assembly and that the agreed-upon intent of it was to “. . . create a system that made it easy to purchase plans and easy to sell plans. What the Legislature did not intend was for the future boards to add additional conditions on insurers or consumers, no matter how well intended.”

Senator DiSanto states in his comments that, “As a general rule, administrative entities such as Pennie should leave social-engineering policy decisions, into which category this clearly falls, to the elected branches of government, unless given clear statutory authorization.”

In light of these comments from current members of the General Assembly, we ask the Exchange Authority two questions. First, what evidence does the Exchange Authority have to show that this type of regulation is what was envisioned by the General Assembly when it granted the Exchange Authority the authority to promulgate regulations? Second, why does the Exchange Authority believe the type of policy set forth by this regulation is within their purview and not a policy decision that should be made by the General Assembly?

2. Need for the regulation.

Representative Cutler questions the need for the rulemaking and how the proposed regulation will lead to the desired outcome of health equity. He points to a lack of data that shows how accreditation of insurers improves health equity issues. Senator DiSanto also questions the need for the rulemaking and poses specific questions related to the information provided by the Exchange Authority in the Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF) submitted with the proposed regulation. His questions relate to terminology, data or evidence to support the rulemaking, and costs. We ask the Exchange Authority to provide more detailed explanations and data in the Preamble and RAF submitted with the final-form regulation that address the concerns of the legislators. We will evaluate the Exchange Authority’s response to the concerns of Representative Cutler and Senator DiSanto to determine if the final-form regulation is in the public interest.

3. Fiscal impact.

In the RAF, the Exchange Authority estimates that the rulemaking will impose a cost of approximately \$6,000 to \$13,080 (plus a \$.06 per member fee) for insurers. Members of the regulated community from the insurance industry have submitted comments that question the Exchange Authority’s quantification of the fiscal impact of

the rulemaking. They believe additional costs associated with dedicating staff to comply with health equity accreditation requirements will be required. Senator Disanto raised a similar concern in his comments. As the Exchange Authority prepares the final-form rulemaking, we ask that it consult with the regulated community to gain a better understanding of fiscal impact the rulemaking could have on the insurance industry. The RAF submitted with the final-form regulation should be amended to reflect the findings of the Exchange Authority.

4. Section 5001.2. Purpose.—Clarity.

This section reads as follows:

The purpose of this chapter is to increase health equity and enhance the *cultural competency* of healthcare services provided in the Commonwealth by requiring insurers selling qualified plans through the Exchange Authority to be accredited in health equity by a recognized accrediting body. (Emphasis added.)

Section 5001.3, relating to definitions, defines the term “health equity.” However, the term “cultural competency” is not defined. We suggest that the final-form rulemaking define the term “cultural competency” to improve the clarity of the regulation.

5. Section 5001.3. Definitions.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) reads as follows, “The definitions in 40 Pa.C.S. § 9103 (relating to definitions) are incorporated by reference and apply to this chapter.” Subsection (b) defines four terms; Department, Exchange Authority, Health equity, and Recognized health equity accreditation organization. Since the first two terms are defined in the cited statute, we recommend that they be deleted from the final-form regulation.

The definition of “health equity” includes the terms “gender” and “disability.” A commentator has suggested that the phrase “gender identity” be used in lieu of “gender.” The commentator also encourages “Pennsylvania’s inclusion of disability as a disparity sensitive characteristic or identity.” We will review the Exchange Authority’s response to these suggestions in our review of the final-form regulation. We note that both terms are also used in § 5001.5(b)(1).

6. Section 5001.4. Achieving health equity accreditation.—Implementation procedures; Clarity.

This section establishes the requirements and timeline to comply with the proposed rulemaking. Commentators representing the insurance industry have identified two issues with this section and how it will be implemented. First, they have suggested that the regulation provide flexibility to insurance companies to align the new health equity accreditation requirement of this rulemaking with their current accreditation schedule and process. They have also suggested that the implementation be phased in over a 24-month period. We ask the Exchange Authority to work with the regulated community on an implementation schedule that is the least burdensome administratively to insurers, while at the same time, meets the goals of the Exchange Authority.

Second, under Subsection (b)(3), they question how an insurer can demonstrate that they made a “good faith” effort to attain accreditation. They have suggested that the criteria that will be used to determine if an insurer has met this standard be included in the final-form regulation. Since a regulation has the full force and effect of law and sets a binding norm, we agree that the

final-form regulation should set forth the criteria that will be used by the Exchange Authority to make this determination.

7. Section 5001.5. Recognized health equity accreditation organizations.—Implementation procedures; Clarity.

This section establishes the standards that health equity accreditation organizations must meet for the Exchange Authority to recognize them as an organization through which insurers selling plans through the Exchange Authority can obtain accreditation. Subsection (b)(5) requires a health equity accreditation organization to have “specific parameters” that the applicant seeking accreditation must have prior to becoming accredited in health equity. To assist applicants in meeting this requirement, and to improve the clarity of the regulation, we suggest that the specific parameters be included in the final-form rulemaking.

8. Section 5001.6. Penalties.—Clarity.

This section reads as follows:

Failure to comply with the provisions of this chapter will subject an insurer offering qualified plans through the Exchange Authority to referral to the Department for enforcement in accordance with 40 Pa.C.S. § 9702 (relating to enforcement) *and any other penalty provided by law.* (Emphasis added.)

The phrase “and any other penalty provided by law” is vague. The final-form regulation should either cite the other laws that may be applicable or delete the phrase.

**Department of Revenue Regulation # 15-462
(IRRC # 3402)**

Business Income and Nonbusiness Income

July 24, 2024

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the May 25, 2024 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (RRA) (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the RRA (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Department of Revenue (Department) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Whether the agency has the authority to promulgate the regulation; Whether the regulation conforms to the intention of the General Assembly in the enactment of the statute upon which the regulation is based; Implementation procedures.

The Preamble to this proposal states the following:

The purpose of this proposed rulemaking is to add § 153.24a regarding business income and nonbusiness income due to legislative changes and the further development of the unitary business principle of the United States Constitution in case law.

We have two concerns related to the criteria cited above. First, Senator Scott Hutchinson, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Representative Keith Greiner, Minority Chairman of the House Finance Committee, have submitted comments in opposition to the rulemaking. Both legislators believe the proposal is inconsistent with statutes upon which it is based. In his comments, Senator Hutchinson stated, “For example, the allocable/apportionable income provisions contained in this proposal differ from and are inconsistent with the definition of ‘business income’ found in Pennsylvania’s Corporate Net Income Tax statute, a clear administrative

overreach and undermining of the General Assembly’s exclusive legislative power.” Representative Greiner’s comments stated, “I believe that this proposal goes far beyond the department’s statutory authority and attempts to give the department powers that allow it to assess business taxes in a manner consistent with combined reporting methodologies, something that has never been authorized by the General Assembly.” The legislators also believe the proposal is contradictory to longstanding legal precedent and doctrine adopted by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court.

In order to determine if a regulation conforms to the intention of the General Assembly in the enactment of a statute upon which it is based, this Commission is guided by Section 5.2(a) of the RRA. It states, in part, the following: “In making its determination, the commission shall consider written comments submitted by the committees and current members of the General Assembly, pertinent opinions of Pennsylvania’s courts and formal opinions of the Attorney General.”

In light of these comments, we ask the Department to address the concerns raised by the legislators and to explain if the “legislative changes and the further development of the unitary business principle of the United States Constitution in case law” change the manner in which the corporate net income tax (CNIT) is imposed.

Second, the Department states in the Preamble that the majority of the proposed language for this regulation mirrors the *Model General Allocation and Apportionment Regulations (Model)* of the Multistate Tax Commission. It explains this approach has been taken to promote consistent treatment with other states. We believe that consistency of tax rules between states will benefit Pennsylvania-based taxpayers operating in multiple jurisdictions. However, as illustrated below, the verbatim use of language from the *Model* is problematic because that language deviates from the standards established by the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin Style Manual*.

The proposal contains numerous provisions from the *Model* that could be described as informative rather than regulatory. Regulations establish binding norms between the regulated community and the governmental agency imposing the regulation. Informative or illustrative language should not be included in a regulation. Two examples of informative provisions are quoted below:

From § 153.24a(c)(4):

The classification of income by the labels occasionally used, such as manufacturing income, compensation for services, sales income, interest, rents, royalties, gains, income derived from accounts receivable, operating income, non-operating income, and the like, is of no aid in determining whether income is business or nonbusiness income.

From § 153.24a(e)(2)(i):

A unitary business is characterized by significant flows of value evidenced by factors such as those described in *Mobil Oil Corp. v. Vermont*, 445 U.S. 425 (1980): functional integration, centralization of management and economies of scale. These factors provide evidence of whether the business activities operate as an integrated whole or exhibit substantial mutual interdependence. Facts suggesting the presence of the previously mentioned factors should be analyzed in combination for their cumulative effect and not in isolation. A particular business operation may be suggestive of one or more of the previously mentioned factors.

In addition, the proposal contains 23 examples that provide guidance on whether a business activity generates business income or nonbusiness income. Below is a sampling of such examples:

From § 153.24a(f):

(f) *Examples of business income and nonbusiness income.* The examples used in these regulations are illustrative only and are limited to the facts they contain.

(1) *Rents from real and tangible personal property.*

Example 1: The taxpayer operates a multistate car rental business. The income from car rentals is business income.

Example 2: The taxpayer is engaged in the heavy construction business in which it uses equipment such as cranes, tractors, and earth-moving vehicles. The taxpayer makes short-term leases of the equipment when particular pieces of equipment are not needed on any particular project. The rental income is business income.

We acknowledge that the regulated community could benefit from the informative and illustrative language included in this proposal. However, we question if this unique type of regulatory language is consistent with the intent of the General Assembly when it granted the Department general rulemaking authority under Part V of the Tax Reform Code of 1971 (72 P.S. § 7408(a)). If the Department believes the information and examples contained in the regulation are needed to assist with the implementation of it and compliance by those subject to CNIT, we suggest that those provisions be deleted from the rulemaking and placed in a policy statement or guidance document that is easily accessible to the regulated community.

2. Compliance with the provisions of the RRA or the regulations of the Commission in promulgating the regulation.

Section 5.2 of the RRA directs this Commission to determine whether a regulation is in the public interest. The Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF) and Preamble submitted with this proposal do not provide sufficient information to determine if the rulemaking is in the public interest. Specifically, we ask the Department to provide additional information for the following sections of the RAF:

- RAF # 12—This section of the RAF asks how the regulation compares to other states and how it will affect Pennsylvania's ability to compete with other states. What states impose a CNIT? Of those states, which ones have adopted or incorporated the Multistate Tax Commission's *Model*, as this proposed rulemaking does?

- RAF # 19 and # 23—These sections of the RAF relate to the fiscal impact the rulemaking will have on the regulated community. Members of the regulated community and Representative Greiner disagree with the Department's contention that the rulemaking will not have a fiscal impact. They point to pending cases before the Board of Finance and Revenue and the Commonwealth Court that will be impacted by this rulemaking. We ask the Department to quantify the impact this rulemaking could have on those pending cases.

3. Section 153.24a. Business and nonbusiness income.—Possible conflict with statutes.

The Department states in the RAF and Preamble that this proposal clarifies existing law. A major concern of the

regulated community is that the proposal does more than that. They believe it changes the way business income will be taxed for CNIT purposes, deviates from Pennsylvania tax law and conflicts with established judicial precedence. The Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants submitted a comment stating that the proposal would "...impermissibly reverse the judicially created multiform business/unrelated asset doctrine through administrative action. Only the General Assembly or the courts have the authority to reverse this judicially created doctrine."

Comments submitted by the regulated community point to specific provisions of this section to illustrate that the rulemaking does more than clarify existing law. Listed below are examples of their concerns:

- The proposal does not account for differences between the definition of "business income" in the statute and the definition of "apportionable income" in the *Model*.

- The transactional test of Subsection (b), the functional test of Subsection (c) and the definition of "trade or business" found in Subsection (h) would result in the taxation of all transactions of a unitary business, "whether that particular business or transaction has any connection with the Commonwealth."

- Subsection (b) and Subsection (c) would impermissibly repeal the multiform business/unrelated assets doctrine.

- The language of Subsection (d), relating to unitary business principle, and Subsection (e), relating to principles for determining the existence of a unitary business, contravenes the separate reporting requirements of the CNIT law by giving the Department the authority to impose mandatory combined reporting.

- The Department lacks the statutory authority to require the disclosures of Subsection (g), relating to consistency and uniformity in reporting, and the additional disclosures and reporting requirements are not needed and will have a fiscal impact.

- The proposal should not conclude that the judicial principles of "multiformity" and "unrelated assets" are no longer applicable.

A review of these concerns, and those raised by Senator Hutchinson and Representative Greiner, reveals a difference of opinion of what this proposal is intended to do and what it will do. We ask the Department to review all the concerns of the stakeholders and to explain in the Preamble to the final-form regulation why the rulemaking is consistent with the Tax Reform Code and the relevant judicial precedents cited by the stakeholders. In addition, we suggest that the Department convene a meeting of the stakeholders to reach consensus on the best way to incorporate the *Model* into the Department's regulations while at the same time ensuring that the regulations are consistent with Pennsylvania tax law and judicial precedent.

4. Clarity.

The *Model* includes provisions related to the treatment of dividends. This proposal does not include similar provisions. A commentator has suggested that the clarity of the proposal would be improved if it included language that addressed the treatment of dividends.

Section 2.11(a) of the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin Style Manual* states definitions should be placed near the beginning of a chapter. The definitions section for this regulation, Subsection (h), is at the end of the chapter. To

be consistent with the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin Style Manual*, we suggest the definitions for this rule-making be moved to the beginning of the chapter.

**Department of Revenue Regulation # 15-463
(IRRC # 3403)**

**Payment Methods for Obligations Due the
Commonwealth**

July 24, 2024

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the May 25, 2024 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Department of Revenue (Department) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Section 5.12. Definitions.—Clarity.

EFT—electronic funds transfer

This definition lists four types of EFTs the Department will accept. The types are: automated clearing house debit or credit; debit or credit card; Fedwire or other wire transfer, but only with approval of the Department (Fedwire); and other EFT as designated in Department instructions or publications (other EFT). The definition states that virtual currency is not considered an EFT.

We have two concerns with the definition. First, the language regarding Fedwire is vague. Would a person seeking to pay an obligation via Fedwire need Departmental approval to do so, or is the requirement for Departmental approval only applicable to other types of wire transfers? In addition, the requirement to obtain Department approval is substantive. Section 2.11(e) of the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin Style Manual* states that substantive provisions may not be included in a definition. Therefore, the provision requiring Department approval should be moved to another section of the regulation. The final-form regulation should also be amended to set forth the process a person can use to obtain the required Departmental approval.

Second, the language regarding “other EFT” is not appropriate regulatory language because it would allow the Department to establish a requirement outside of the regulatory review process. Regulations establish a binding norm for the regulated community and have the full force and effect of law. The Department should either delete the reference to other wire transfers from the final-form regulation or specifically state what other types of wire transfers are acceptable.

Treasury—This term is not used in any section of the proposed regulation and should be deleted from the final-form regulation.

2. Section 5.13. Payments in general.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) states the following, “A *person* shall remit payment of an obligation due the Commonwealth at the location the Department shall designate in Department instructions or publications.” (Emphasis added.) The existing regulation that is being deleted through this rulemaking process used the term “taxpayer” instead of “person.” What is the reason for this change? It is our understanding that the term “person” includes individuals and various types of businesses and organizations with tax obligations. Therefore, we ask the Department to define the term “person” in § 5.12 of the final-form regulation. We note that “person” is used in other sections of this regulation.

3. Section 5.14. Payments required to be paid by EFT.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) states, in part, that “. . . a payment of \$1,000 or more toward an obligation due the Commonwealth must be remitted to the Department” by EFT or a certified or cashier’s check. Subsections (b) and (c) provide exceptions to Subsection (a). We have three concerns with this section of the regulation. First, the title of this section references payments required to be paid by EFT. However, Subsection (a) allows for payment by certified or cashier’s check. We suggest that the Department amend the title of this section to reflect that option. In addition, the Preamble submitted with the final-form regulation should be amended to reflect that EFT payments include certified or cashier’s checks.

Second, Section 5.3(f) of the existing regulation lists the specific types of taxes that are subject to EFT requirements. As noted above, the existing EFT regulations are being deleted and replaced through this rulemaking process. This proposed regulation does not list the types of taxes or obligations that will be subject to EFT requirements. We note that the Regulatory Analysis Form and Preamble submitted with this rulemaking list the taxes that are currently subject to EFT requirements and new tax obligations that will be subject to EFT requirements. To improve the clarity of the regulation and to assist the regulated community with its compliance obligations, we suggest that the final-form regulation be amended to include all the taxes or financial obligations that must be remitted through EFT.

Third, if a person has a financial obligation to a Commonwealth agency other than the Department of \$1,000 or more, must the payment be remitted to the Department? If not, Subsection (a) should be clarified to specify how those obligations should be paid, or, as suggested above, the specific obligations should be listed in the final-form regulation.

Third, the intent of Subsection (b) is to provide an exception for individual taxpayers. It reads as follows:

TRC section 332.1 payments. The following payments are subject to the electronic payment provisions of section 332.1 of the TRC (72 P.S. § 7332.1) and are not subject to the payment provisions in subsection (a):

- (1) Form PA-40 (Personal Income Tax Return) and PA-41 (Fiduciary Income Tax Return) tax liability payments, including estimated payments and payments made with the return.
- (2) Form PA-40 NRC (Nonresident Consolidated Income Tax Return) tax liability payments.
- (3) Withholding payments required under sections 316.2, 324 and 324.4 of the TRC (72 P.S. §§ 7316.2, 7324 and 7324.4).
- (4) Other payments made by individuals under sections 301—361 of the TRC (72 P.S. §§ 7301—7361).

As currently written, this subsection lacks clarity and would require taxpayers to either be familiar with or have the ability to research the various sections of the Tax Reform Code cited above. We suggest that the Department rewrite this subsection of the regulation in plain language to allow for easier compliance by the regulated community. We have a similar concern with Subsection (c), regarding inheritance tax payments.

4. Section 5.15. Date of receipt of rules.—Reasonableness.

We question the reasonableness of Subsection (b). It reads as follows:

The person with the obligation due the Commonwealth bears the burden of remitting the payment by the due date. The person with the obligation due the Commonwealth is accountable for errors committed by the person, the payor or third parties. These errors are not justification for the abatement of interest or penalty.

The Department states in the Preamble that, “Persons with obligations due the Commonwealth are notified they are responsible for their choice of payment and bear the burden of any late payments associated with their choice, even if the late payment is due to circumstances beyond the person’s control.”

Section 5.7 of the existing regulation provides several reasons why penalties on late payments may be abated and provides a six-month grace period for new EFT taxpayers to resolve problems with their payments. What is the Department’s reason for not including the provisions of § 5.7 in this regulation?

The Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants submitted comments expressing concern with a lack of penalty abatement provisions in the regulation. We ask the Department to work with the regulated community on this issue as it develops the final-form regulation.

Publication of Guidelines for the Disaster Recovery Assistance Program

This notice of publication of guidelines provides updates for the Disaster Recovery Assistance Program (DRAP) as required by Act 54 of 2024, which added section 1735-H(3) of the act of April 29, 1929 (P.L. 343, No. 176), known as The Fiscal Code. DRAP is designed to provide disaster relief when other Federal, State, local, nongovernmental or private aid is not available to assist victims of disasters. DRAP is a State grant program that may offer relief to eligible homeowners and renters in this Commonwealth who have suffered certain losses due to a disaster and do not qualify for a Small Business Administration disaster loan or have insurance to cover their losses. DRAP is administered by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (Agency). The 2024 Guidance document supersedes the guidelines published on May 18, 2024.

2024 Guidance

PART I: RECOVERING FROM A DISASTER

Prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery are the five phases of Emergency Management. The recovery phase of a disaster consists of those activities that continue beyond the emergency period to return a community to normal or near-normal conditions. Recovery activities include the restoration of basic services and the repair of physical, social, and economic damages. The goal of the recovery phase is to bring the affected area back to some degree of normalcy. After life-safety risks are addressed, some immediate actions you can take to aid the recovery process include:

- Take photos of your damaged home and belongings for your own records
- If you have insurance (such as flood, homeowners, renters, auto or other types of insurance), file a claim with your insurance provider as soon as possible
- Report your property damages to your community’s emergency management coordinator

Reporting Damages is Critical to the Recovery Process:

If your home or property is impacted by a disaster, timely reporting of these damages to your local emergency management coordinator is critical to the disaster recovery process. Reporting your damages as soon as possible enables officials to determine resources that may be available at the local, state, and federal levels to help recover from the disaster. Your action in promptly reporting damages is foundational to your community’s recovery from a disaster.

Immediate and Long-Term Disaster Recovery Resources:

Disaster recovery is the cumulative effort of federal, state, county, and local governments in conjunction with non-governmental organizations and private industries pooling financial and personnel resources to assist disaster-impacted communities. Below are examples of potential resources that may be available to assist you with recovering from the impacts of a disaster:

Insurance is the first resource in recovering from a disaster. Contact your insurance agent or company representative to report your losses, review your coverage, and answer any questions. The Pennsylvania Insurance Department provides assistance with insurance related questions or issues and can be reached by calling 1-877-881-6388 or by visiting the Pennsylvania Insurance Department website.

Local programs and services may be available to assist with recovery efforts.

- Voluntary and Nonprofit Organizations are often ready to step in and help take care of immediate needs. These organizations may be able to assist with food and water, clothing, sheltering services, immediate debris clearance, home repair/cleanout, or address other immediate needs. Contact your local municipality or county for additional information. You may also contact relief agencies and local volunteer and faith-based communities directly. Resources can also be found on the Information and Referral line by dialing 2-1-1 or visiting <https://www.pa211.org/>.

- County Assistance Offices, which are part of the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, may offer assistance and other services to people and families in need.

Federal assistance may be requested if the total amount of damages from the disaster exceeds thresholds established by the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA). Damages that meet those thresholds may result in a federal disaster declaration. The importance of reporting your damages to the local emergency management coordinator as soon as possible cannot be over emphasized. In the absence of federal assistance, residents affected by a disaster may need to rely on personal resources and assistance from local programs and/or voluntary organizations.

U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) offers low-interest disaster loans to eligible homeowners, renters, businesses of all sizes and certain private nonprofit organizations in areas where a physical disaster is declared by SBA. SBA is most often the primary form of federal assistance that becomes available in Pennsylvania.

- Physical Disaster Loans are for permanent rebuilding and replacement of uninsured or underinsured disaster-damaged privately-owned real and/or personal property. SBA makes physical disaster loans to qualified homeowners, renters, businesses, and certain private nonprofit organizations.

The Disaster Recovery Assistance Program (DRAP) is designed to provide disaster relief when other local, state, federal, non-governmental, or private aid is not available to assist victims of disasters. DRAP is a state grant program that may offer relief to eligible homeowners and renters in Pennsylvania who have suffered certain losses due to a disaster and do not qualify for an SBA disaster loan or have insurance to cover their losses. DRAP is administered by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA).

PART II: 2024 DRAP GUIDELINES

Program Availability:

DRAP is made available when the following three criteria are met:

1. Federal Individual Assistance pursuant to the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act has not been authorized.

2. The U.S. Small Business Administration issues an administrative agency declaration of a physical disaster authorizing low interest loans to homeowners or renters.

3. The governor determines that the program should be activated.

When DRAP is activated, PEMA will define the disaster event and areas where DRAP is available pursuant to an SBA determination of an administrative agency declaration of a disaster. PEMA may define the disaster event and area using whatever boundaries are practicable under the circumstances, including zip codes, wards, divisions, blocks, and/or street addresses. This information will be published by PEMA on its publicly available website and sent to appropriate local officials and to the public through all appropriate means under the circumstances.

Applicant Eligibility:

DRAP is designed to provide disaster relief when other local, state, federal, non-governmental, or private aid is not available to assist victims of disasters and the losses are not covered by insurance. DRAP funds are limited, and individuals are required to utilize insurance, SBA loans, and other disaster recovery assistance programs prior to seeking DRAP funds. Survivors of a declared disaster may receive a one-time grant of up to \$10,000 per household. To be eligible for DRAP:

1. Applicants must have suffered losses caused directly by the disaster and in the areas defined by PEMA. The applicant's primary residence must be:

- In a Pennsylvania county that is identified as a primary or contiguous county in an SBA administrative agency declaration of disaster as requested by the Governor of Pennsylvania.

- In a municipality that issued a declaration of disaster emergency or equivalent within two weeks of the disaster event and has submitted at least one damage assessment report to the county emergency management agency or PEMA for damage related to the declared disaster emergency.

- o In general, each local governmental entity and county has a process for reporting damages caused by a disaster. Individuals who are impacted by a disaster are encouraged to immediately inform their local emergency management coordinator. The local emergency management coordinator submits a report of the damage to the county emergency management agency. The county aggregates the information and submits the collected data to PEMA.

- Identified on the list of affected properties provided by the county or municipality. PEMA will cross-check applications against damage assessments provided by the affected county's emergency management office(s) to ensure the applicant's residence appears on the list of known affected properties. If the applicant's residence is not on a list of known affected properties, PEMA will work with the appropriate county officials or other stakeholders to determine whether the property was affected by the disaster. Businesses or secondary properties, such as vacation homes or investment properties, are not eligible for DRAP.

2. Eligibility to receive a DRAP grant is based on annual household income. Households earning below 500% of the most recent National Federal Poverty Guidelines¹ published by the United States Department of Health and Human Services may be eligible to receive DRAP grants:

3. Households receiving income-based government assistance may apply directly for a DRAP grant without first applying and being denied a disaster loan through SBA. Proof of government assistance must be provided by the applicant. Examples of income-based government assistance programs include, but are not limited to: Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and Medicaid.

4. When the household is not receiving income-based government assistance, the applicant must first apply for a disaster loan through SBA and be denied because of inability to repay or inadequate credit to be eligible for a DRAP grant.

- The SBA denial notification must be submitted with the DRAP application.

For purposes of DRAP:

- A household is an individual or group living together at one mailing address.
- Annual household income is the combined gross income of all members of the household in the preceding calendar year.
- Gross income is the total amount of money earned in a year before any taxes, healthcare or payroll or deductions are taken out. Gross income is different from net income. Net income is the money taken home after taxes and any deductions are removed.

DRAP Eligible Expenses

DRAP grants may help pay for losses that were a direct result of the disaster. Covered losses fit in to one of three categories.

1. Category 1—Home Repairs for the primary residence of eligible homeowners:

- For eligible homeowners, DRAP funds may be used to return the home to a safe, healthy, accessible, and weatherproof condition. DRAP grant funds may be eligible for the following home repair categories necessitated by a disaster:
 - Entrance or exit ways from the home to ensure safe access. This does not include improvements to entrance and exit ways.
 - Disaster related debris removal that causes a threat to health, safety, or access to the residence.
 - Structural damage to the home.

- Windows, doors, floors, walls, ceilings, or cabinetry.
- Septic or sewage systems.
- Well or other water systems.
- Heating, ventilation, or air conditioning systems.
- Utilities, including electrical, plumbing and gas systems.
- Blocking, leveling, and anchoring of a mobile home, and reconnecting or resetting its sewer, water, electrical, and fuel lines and tanks.
- Permitting and inspection.
- Other projects required to make the home safe, sanitary, and weatherproof.
- Applicants may receive up to \$10,000 for home repairs.

- Applicants must submit at least two quotes from two different contractors registered with the Office of Attorney General under the Home Improvement Consumer Protection Act (73 P.S. §§ 517.1—517.19) for a particular project and meet all other eligibility requirements to recover costs for home repairs. If an applicant has already had work performed, detailed receipts must be submitted.

2. Category 2—Temporary Housing and Rental Expenses

- For eligible homeowners and renters, DRAP funds may be used for temporary housing and rental expenses if the home is destroyed, uninhabitable, inaccessible, or unavailable due to a disaster.
- DRAP grants may cover up to 60 days lodging at a licensed establishment, such as a hotel or motel, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- The maximum amount DRAP may award per room will not exceed 150% of the daily lodging rates established by the U.S. Department of General Services Administration for destinations in Pennsylvania. See Appendix A for a schedule of DRAP maximum daily lodging rates per room for various areas in Pennsylvania.
- Meals, incidental costs, and other hotel services are not an eligible use of DRAP funds.
- Rooms must be booked with at least two members of the household staying in each room, whenever possible.
- DRAP funds may be used for fees charged by the licensed establishment to allow household pets during the stay. DRAP funds may also be used to temporarily shelter

household pets at a kennel for up to 60 days while the owner is required to stay in temporary housing because their home is uninhabitable.

- DRAP funds may be used for expenses that are required by a landlord prior to or upon the execution of a residential lease agreement, including security deposits, application fees, first and last months' rent, and pet deposits. The security deposits and first and last months' rent payments are capped at the fair market rental rate for the type of unit and the location of the property, as set forth by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Fair Market Rent Documentation System for the most recently published year.² If an applicant enters a lease where the rent exceeds the fair market rental rate, DRAP funds can only be used to cover costs up to the fair market rental rate, and the applicant must pay the difference between the rent and the fair market rental rate from non-DRAP funds. The security deposit may not exceed the sum of two months' rent at the fair market rental rate. A copy of the residential lease application documents and/or residential lease agreement must be submitted with the DRAP application. PEMA reserves the right to contact the landlord to verify the information on the application and/or the terms of the lease agreement. Monthly rental payments due after the start of the term of the lease are not eligible expenses.

- Applicants may receive up to \$5,000 for temporary housing and rental expenses.

3. Category 3—Essential Personal Property

- For eligible homeowners and renters, DRAP funds may be used to cover the loss of essential personal property destroyed due to the disaster and not covered by insurance. Please see Appendix B for a list of personal property eligible under DRAP and the maximum amount that may be awarded for each item.

- Essential personal property not covered by insurance is eligible under DRAP for reimbursement up to \$5,000.

DRAP Grant Awards & Prioritization of Funding:

Each eligible household may receive a maximum grant of up to \$10,000 in DRAP funding. For example, an applicant may receive \$6,000 for home repairs, \$2,000 for temporary housing, and \$2,000 for essential personal property, where those losses are not covered by insurance or reimbursed from another source. The maximum total award applies even if eligible losses exceed \$10,000.

DRAP has limited financial resources. For disasters that occur after 75% of the annual funds for the program have been exhausted, essential personal property losses will no longer be recoverable until additional funding becomes available.

PEMA maintains discretion to prioritize DRAP funds towards certain cost categories as needed during current or future disasters. If it becomes necessary to prioritize the allocation of awards due to limited funds, the priority shall be:

1. Home repairs
2. Temporary housing
3. Essential personal property

DRAP Application Process and Requirements:

Households earning below 500% of the National Federal Poverty Guidelines must first apply for a disaster loan through SBA and be denied unless the household is

receiving income-based government assistance. PEMA will coordinate with SBA to identify individuals who were denied an SBA loan. PEMA will work to contact these individuals to provide information about DRAP and application process. Individuals that are income eligible, who were denied an SBA loan, do not have to wait to be contacted by PEMA to submit a DRAP application.³ Applicants must follow the process, and meet the requirements, specified below.

1. Applications must be for a primary residence only.
2. One application may be submitted per household.
3. DRAP grant application must be submitted within 90 days of the date DRAP activation is announced for the applicable disaster.
4. When DRAP is made available, eligible households apply for the grant using the Commonwealth online eGrants system.

5. To apply using the eGrants system, the applicant needs to register for a Keystone Login. Keystone login is a username and password that can be used to log into any Commonwealth agency online service that participates in Keystone Login. A Keystone Login can be obtained here: <https://keystonelogin.pa.gov/Account/Register>.

- A paper application may be submitted to PEMA if an applicant is unable to submit a grant application electronically using the eGrants system.

6. Applicants will be required to provide the following information on a DRAP grant application:

- Contact information.
- Insurance information including the claim denial (if applicable).
- Household information including whether the applicant owns or rents their home and the total number of adults in the household.
- Income information.
- Description of damages.

7. Applicants will need to submit the following documents to PEMA for the application to be finalized:

- Proof of residency (ex. utility bill, driver's license, lease agreement, mortgage document, or tax records).
- Proof of income (ex. tax records, Medicaid card, or three months of paystubs from the last calendar year for all members of household).
- Photographs of damage claimed.
- Receipts for any reimbursements requested.
- Quotes for remediation or repair work.
- Cancelled check for direct deposit bank account.
- Copies of Home and/or Renter's Insurance Declaration Page.
- Proof of SBA Loan Request Denial where required.
- Proof of income-based government assistance where appropriate.

8. In addition to completing the DRAP grant application, applicants will be required to:

³ Applicants receiving income-based government assistance are not required to provide proof of SBA loan denial.

- Disclose the receipt of benefits from any other source, including insurance, charitable organizations, and other government organizations related to the loss for which they are seeking benefits.

- Acknowledge that willfully making a false statement or misrepresentation in their application or failing to disclose a material fact regarding their eligibility may subject them to criminal penalties under 18 Pa.C.S. § 4904 (relating to unsworn falsification to authorities).

9. Applicants must be willing to permit an inspection of their home by PEMA or another entity designated by PEMA to verify damages.

10. PEMA may, at its discretion, perform any investigation they deem appropriate to corroborate the values placed on personal property items by an applicant.

DRAP Application Review

PEMA is responsible for receiving and managing applications, as well as making recommendations on the disposition of the applications. After review by PEMA personnel, applications will receive one of three dispositions:

1. *Approved*—The application is complete and the request is approved in whole.

2. *Incomplete*—The application is incomplete. The application will be returned to the applicant as soon as possible with feedback identifying the application's deficiencies. If an application is returned as incomplete, the applicant will be able to redress the deficiencies within: a) 30 days from the date they are first notified the application was incomplete, or b) within 90 days after DRAP was activated, whichever is longer.

3. *Denied*—The application demonstrates that an applicant is ineligible for the program, the identified losses are not covered by the program, or other good cause for denial exists.

DRAP Grant Agreement & Payment

DRAP is a state grant program. Individuals awarded DRAP funds will receive an award letter and grant agreement from PEMA. The grant agreement specifies the requirements of the grant program and items that must be completed by the recipient of the funds. The individual applicant should review the grant agreement. If the individual applicant agrees to the terms, the grant agreement must be signed and returned to PEMA utilizing the eGrants portal within 30 calendar days. If the grant agreement is not returned within 30 days, PEMA will make at least three attempts to contact the applicant via the applicant's preferred method of communication. PEMA will document each attempt to contact the applicant, with at least one attempt in writing. PEMA may rescind the grant award if the applicant does not make contact within 30 days of their first notification.

Please note that the Commonwealth is unable to process grant payments until the grant agreement is

signed by all parties. Once the grant agreement is fully executed, the grant payment will be processed as quickly as possible.

DRAP payments may be made electronically into a grant recipient's bank account. A grant recipient will need to provide banking information to allow for direct deposit. Payments may be made by check if a bank account is not available.

Post Award Requirements & Grant Closeout

1. Grant recipients must use DRAP funds for costs provided on the grant application. If funds remain after these needs are addressed, the grant recipient must either use the remaining funds for eligible DRAP costs or return the funds to the Commonwealth.

- Grant recipients shall not use DRAP funds for any loss that is covered by an insurance policy or any other funding source, including any other governmental or non-profit disaster assistance program.

2. Grant recipients must obtain and retain documentation of all expenditures of awarded funds.

3. Documentation of expenditure of all grant funds must be submitted to PEMA within 60 days after the project is complete or the grant agreement expires, whichever is earlier.

- If a grant recipient does not provide supporting documentation or PEMA determines that DRAP funds were spent on items or activities that are not eligible under the laws, regulations, policies, directives, guidelines, and requirements applicable to DRAP funds, a grant recipient will be required to return those funds to PEMA.

4. Grant recipients must maintain receipts for all purchases made for losses claimed as part of their DRAP application for three years after receiving the award.

DRAP Compliance Reviews

PEMA, through its Bureau of Grants Management, will conduct compliance reviews in accordance with its most recently published "Grant Monitoring Standard Operating Procedure." If a compliance review or audit reveals inappropriate use of state funds, the matter may be referred to the Office of Attorney General, or other appropriate authority.
