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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Proposed Amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.10 and 1915.15

The Domestic Relations Procedural Rules Committee is considering proposing to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania the adoption of Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure 1915.10 and 1915.15 to provide forms for the use of non-professional custody supervisors for the reasons set forth in the accompanying publication report. Pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(a)(1), the proposal is being published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin for comments, suggestions, or objections prior to submission to the Supreme Court.

Any report accompanying this proposal was prepared by the Committee to indicate the rationale for the proposed rulemaking. It will neither constitute a part of the rules nor be adopted by the Supreme Court.

CHAPTER 1915. ACTIONS FOR CUSTODY OF MINOR CHILDREN

Rule 1915.10. Decision. Order.

(b) The court shall enter a custody order as a separate written order or in a separate section of a written opinion.

- (5) If the court orders supervised custody by a non-professional custody supervisor, the court shall require the non-professional custody supervisor to execute an affidavit of accountability using the form located in Rule 1915.15(d) after the court makes a finding on the record that the individual is capable of promoting the safety of the child. The party requiring supervision shall file the completed form with the court and serve a time-stamped copy on all other parties prior to the start of supervised visits.
- (6) A non-professional custody supervisor may revoke an affidavit of accountability by using the form located in Rule 1915.15(e) and providing the completed form to the parties. The party requiring supervision shall file the completed form with the court and serve a time-stamped copy on all parties prior to the end of supervised visits. The party requiring supervision may, contemporaneous with filing the completed form or thereafter, petition the court to designate another custody supervisor.

PUBLICATION REPORT

Proposed Amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.10 and 1915.15

The Domestic Relations Procedural Rules Committee (Committee) is considering proposing the amendment of Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure 1915.10 and 1915.15 to provide forms for the use of non-professional custody supervisors.

Following the Act of April 15, 2024, P.L. 24, No. 8, colloquially known as "Kayden's Law," the Committee was asked to propose a statewide form for a non-professional custody supervisor's affidavit of accountability. If a non-professional custody supervisor is "designated" by the court, the non-professional custody supervisor is required to execute an affidavit of accountability. See 23 Pa.C.S. § 5323(e.1)(2). At present, there are various local forms being used to satisfy the affidavit of accountability requirement.

Initially, the Committee considered whether to propose an appointment order form to facilitate the court's "designation" of a non-professional custody supervisor. An appointment order was thought necessary to be able to hold a non-professional custody supervisor in contempt for not fulfilling the role of custody supervisor. However, the Committee concluded that it would be the party requiring supervision, and not the supervisor, who should be sanctioned if that person exercised custody in conflict with the custody order. Further, the custody order itself will have the requirement for a supervisor and, therefore, another order would be redundant. Instead, the non-professional custody supervisor would be designated by an affidavit of accountability, as well as identified on the record pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. § 5323(e.1)(2).

Concerning the applicability of the affidavit of accountability requirement, the Committee considered expanding the requirement to include professional custody supervisors but ultimately favored retaining the scope required by statute, *i.e.*, non-professional custody supervisors. Presumably, a custody supervisor deemed a "professional" would understand and be obligated to fulfill the role of a custody supervisor without the necessity of an affidavit.

After reviewing several different local forms, the Committee crafted a proposed affidavit of accountability form for non-professional supervisors to be located in Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.15(d). The form identifies the supervisor, the party to be supervised, the children with whom custody is to be supervised, the relationship between the supervisor and the children, and a series of checkboxes setting forth the requirements and conditions of the supervision. There is a place for the court to record the date of the colloquy and the judge's signature to satisfy the requirement of the statute. The affidavit would also have the custody order attached. While titled as an "affidavit" for consistency with the statute, the form only requires the supervisor's signature subject to 18 Pa.C.S. § 4904. See Pa.R.Civ.P. 76 (defining "affidavit"); 42 Pa.C.S. § 102 (same).

Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.10(b)(5) will require the use of the affidavit of accountability. The party subject to the supervised custody will be responsible for filing the completed form with the court and serving the other parties with a time-stamped copy prior to the start of supervised visits. This procedure is also described at the bottom of the form in Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.15(d).

The Committee next discussed whether to propose a procedure and form for a non-professional custody supervisor to revoke an affidavit of accountability. Circumstances would likely arise when a non-professional custody supervisor is either unable or unwilling to continue in that role. The Committee concluded that the best interest of the child would be furthered with a procedure that requires notice by the non-professional custody supervisor to be given to the parties prior to the end of supervised visits.

Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.10(b)(6) will require the use of a form by a non-professional custody supervisor to revoke an affidavit of accountability. The revocation form, to be located in Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.15(e), solicits an effective date for the revocation and the date on which the parties have been notified. Like the affidavit of accountability, the party subject to the supervised custody would be responsible for filing the completed form with the court and serving the other parties with a time-stamped copy prior to the end of supervised visits.

Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.10(b)(6) also states that the party requiring supervision "may" also seek the designation of another custody supervisor. The use of "may" is not intended to foreclose the party from seeking a review of the risk of harm and need for continued supervision pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. § 5323(e)(2). The language is intended to signal that it is the party requiring supervision, not the court, who is to initiate the designation of another custody supervisor. The rule does not specify whether the new custody supervisor sought to be designated should be a professional or non-professional custody supervisor—that is a matter to be decided anew by the court based on the availability of a professional supervisor and the party's ability to pay for a professional supervisor.

All comments, concerns, and suggestions concerning this rule proposal are welcome.

LOCAL RULES OF JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION COURT OF COMMON PLEAS 43RD JUDICIAL DISTRICT MONROE COUNTY

Rule 4007. Requests for Transcripts.

- (A) General
- a. These rules shall be read in conjunction with the Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration 4001 et seq.
- **b.** Rough draft transcripts shall not be available in this Court.
 - (B) Deposit or Partial Payment Amounts
- a. For transcript requests filed prior to a notice of appeal deposit or partial payment amounts shall be 95% of the total transcript cost estimated by the Office of Court Administration and ordered by the Judge of record. Such deposit or partial payment amounts shall be made within fourteen (14) days of the date of the court order directing deposit or partial payment amount or at the time a notice of appeal is filed, whichever is first.
- b. For transcript requests filed concurrent with a notice of appeal, the requesting party shall pay a deposit of \$250.00, unless the appellant is requesting a waiver of cost because of economic hardship.
- **c.** Orders directing deposit payments and ordering transcription will be vacated if deposit or partial payment amounts are not remitted within the stated timeframe.
- (C) Upon completion of the transcript, the Court Reporter, Recorder or Transcriptionist shall file of record Form A—Notice of Completion of Transcript and serve a copy on the requesting party by **electronic mail, if available, or** regular mail and the District Court Administrator.
- a. For transcript requests where a balance is due, the Form A shall include the amount of the balance owed by the requesting party. Any balance shall be

paid within 30 days of the filing of the Form A or at the time a notice of appeal is filed, whichever is first.

b. For transcript requests that are filed concurrent with a notice of appeal, the requesting party shall comply with Pa.R.A.P. 1922(a) for payment of any balance.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF PODIATRY [49 PA. CODE CH. 29]

Child Abuse Reporting Requirements

The State Board of Podiatry (Board) amends §§ 29.52, 29.55, 29.61 and 29.91—29.97, and adds §§ 29.98 and 29.99 (relating to child abuse recognition and reporting—mandatory training requirement; and child abuse recognition and reporting course approval process) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 15 of the Podiatry Practice Act (63 P.S. § 42.15) sets forth the Board's general rulemaking authority. Under 23 Pa.C.S. Chapter 63 (relating to Child Protective Services Law) (CPSL), specifically section 6383(b)(2) of the CPSL (relating to education and training), the Board is required to promulgate regulations to implement the mandatory reporting requirements for licensees of the Board.

Background and Need for this Final-Form Rulemaking

Since 2014, the General Assembly has made numerous amendments to the CPSL, including the requirement imposed by the act of April 15, 2014 (P.L. 411, No. 31) (Act 31) on all health-related Boards to require training in child abuse recognition and reporting for licensees who are considered "mandated reporters" under the CPSL. Section 2 of Act 31 provided that these training requirements would apply to all persons applying for a license, or applying for renewal of a license, on or after January 1, 2015, and were implemented as of that date. This final-form rulemaking is required to update the Board's existing regulations on the subject of child abuse reporting to comport to the numerous amendments made to the CPSL, and to incorporate the mandatory training requirements required by Act 31.

Specifically, the Board amends §§ 29.52 and 29.55 (relating to requirements for applicants; and volunteer license) to incorporate the mandatory child abuse recognition and reporting training requirements. The Board is also taking this opportunity to replace the outdated reference to the repealed Health Care Services Malpractice Act with its successor—the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) Act (40 P.S. §§ 1303.101—1301.910).

The Board amends § 29.61 (relating to requirements for biennial renewal and eligibility to conduct educational conferences) to incorporate the requirement that podiatrists seeking to renew a license shall complete at least 2 hours of approved courses in child abuse recognition and reporting as required under section 6383(b)(3)(ii) of the CPSL.

The Board makes comprehensive amendments to the Board's existing child abuse reporting requirements in §§ 29.91—29.97 (relating to child abuse reporting requirements) to comport to the amendments to the CPSL since 2014. Additionally, the Board adds two sections to

incorporate the mandatory training requirements set forth in section 6383(b)(3)(i) and (ii) of the CPSL. Section 29.98 sets forth the requirements that all individuals applying to the Board for an initial license are required to complete at least 3 hours of training in child abuse recognition and reporting and that all licensees seeking biennial renewal are required to complete at least 2 hours of continuing education in approved courses in child abuse recognition and reporting as a requirement of renewal. This section also includes the process for applying for an exemption from the mandatory training requirements as set forth in section 6383(b)(4) and (6) of the CPSL, for individuals who have already completed similar training or who otherwise should be exempt from the training requirements.

Finally, the Board adds § 29.99 to set forth the administrative process developed by the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau) in conjunction with the Department of Human Services, for individuals, entities and organizations to apply for approval to deliver the mandatory training in child abuse recognition and reporting required under Act 31. To be approved to provide the mandatory training in child abuse recognition and reporting, an individual, entity or organization must be able to report participation or attendance electronically to the Bureau. In this manner, the completion of the training is automatically imported into the applicant's or licensee's record with the Board at the time the course is completed.

Summary and Response to Comments

Notice of the proposed rulemaking was published at 53 Pa.B. 7497 (December 2, 2023). Publication was followed by a 30-day public comment period during which the Board received no public comments. Additionally, there were no comments received from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) other than to say that they have no objections, comments or recommendations to offer. The Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee of the Senate (SCP/PLC) and the Professional Licensure Committee of the House of Representatives (HPLC) did not submit comments.

Description of Amendments to the Final-form Rulemaking

Upon review of this final-form rulemaking, it became apparent that an amendment was needed. Because the Bureau recently moved to a new location, it was necessary to amend the street address to which individuals, organizations and entities may mail their course materials for approval as set forth in § 29.99.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The Board does not anticipate any significant fiscal impact or paperwork requirements relating to these amendments. Because licensees are already required to complete mandatory continuing education, and these 2 hours in child abuse recognition and reporting are incorporated in the existing requirement, there would be no increased burden. Only applicants for licensure would incur an additional requirement, and as there are many low-cost and free options available to complete the training, the Board anticipates this impact to also be minimal. Because all approved training providers of the mandatory training in child abuse recognition and reporting are required to report attendance/participation electronically, there are no additional paperwork requirements imposed on licensees. In addition, the implementation of an elec-

tronic reporting system for mandated reporters of child abuse under the CPSL by the Department of Human Services has decreased the paperwork requirements related to the mandatory reporting requirements.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the effectiveness of its regulations on a fiscal year and biennial basis. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on November 13, 2023, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking published at 53 Pa.B. 7497 and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to IRRC and to the chairperson of the SCP/PLC and the chairperson of the HPLC. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC, the SCP/PLC and the HPLC were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Board has made no substantive revisions based on a lack of comments received from the public, IRRC, the SCP/PLC and the HPLC.

Under section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)), on May 22, 2024, the Board delivered this final-form rulemaking to IRRC, the SCP/PLC and the HPLC. Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the SCP/PLC and the HPLC on August 14, 2024. Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by IRRC effective August 14, 2024.

Findings

The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202), referred to as the Commonwealth Documents Law, and the regulations promulgated under those sections at 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2 (relating to notice of proposed rulemaking required; and adoption of regulations).
- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and no comments were received.
- (3) Amendments made to this final-form rulemaking do not enlarge the original purpose of the proposed rulemaking published at 53 Pa.B. 7497.
- (4) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for the administration of the relevant provisions of the CPSL.

Order

The Board, acting under its authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Board at 49 Pa. Code Chapter 29, are amended by amending §§ 29.52, 29.55, 29.61 and 29.91—29.97 and adding §§ 29.98 and 29.99 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

- (b) The Board shall submit a copy of this final-form rulemaking to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to IRRC, the SCP/PLC and the HPLC as required by law.
- (d) The Board shall certify this final-form rulemaking and shall deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (e) This final-form rulemaking shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Annex A

TITLE 49. PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

PART I. DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Subpart A. PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

CHAPTER 29. STATE BOARD OF PODIATRY LICENSURE APPLICATIONS

§ 29.52. Requirements for applicants.

- (a) Professional liability insurance requirements. Applicants for licensure or licensees applying for biennial renewal, who practice in this Commonwealth, shall comply with the following:
- (1) Applicants shall furnish satisfactory proof to the Board that they are complying with the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) Act (40 P.S. §§ 1303.101—1303.910), in that the applicant or licensee, if required by the act and the rules and regulations pertaining thereto, is maintaining the required amount of professional liability insurance or an approved self-insurance plan and has paid the required fees and surcharges.
- (2) Licensees practicing solely as Federal employees are not required to participate in the professional liability insurance program, nor are they required to comply with the MCARE Act.
- (3) Licensees practicing podiatry in this Commonwealth shall carry at least the minimum amount of professional liability insurance or an approved self-insurance plan as set forth in the MCARE Act. The licensee shall carry liability insurance or an approved self-insurance plan to cover all professional services performed by the licensee. Licensees who do not practice in this Commonwealth are not required to comply with the MCARE Act.
- (b) Mandatory child abuse recognition and reporting training requirements. Applicants for licensure or licensees applying for biennial renewal shall comply with the requirements of § 29.98 (relating to child abuse recognition and reporting—mandatory training requirement).

§ 29.55. Volunteer license.

* * * * *

(c) Applications. An applicant for a volunteer license shall complete an application obtained from the Board. In addition to providing information requested by the Board, the applicant shall provide, or cause to be provided:

- (1) An executed verification on forms provided by the Board certifying that the applicant intends to practice exclusively as follows:
- (i) Without personal remuneration for professional services.
 - (ii) In an approved clinic.
- (2) A letter signed by the director or chief operating officer of an approved clinic that the applicant has been authorized to provide volunteer services in the named clinic by the governing body or responsible officer of the clinic
- (3) Evidence that the applicant has completed at least 3 hours of approved training in child abuse recognition and reporting in accordance with § 29.98(a) (relating to child abuse recognition and reporting—mandatory training requirement).
- (d) Validity of a license. A volunteer license shall be valid for the biennial period for which it is issued, subject to biennial renewal. During each biennial renewal period, the volunteer license holder shall notify the Board of any change in clinic or volunteer status within 30 days of the date of a change, or at the time of renewal, whichever occurs first.
- (e) Renewal of license. A volunteer license shall be renewed biennially on forms provided by the Board.
- (1) As a condition of biennial renewal, the applicant shall satisfy the same continuing education requirements as the holder of an active, unrestricted license, including at least 2 hours of approved courses in child abuse recognition and reporting in accordance with § 29.98(b).
- (2) The applicant shall be exempt from § 29.13 (relating to fees) pertaining to the biennial renewal fee and shall be exempt from the requirements with regard to maintenance of liability insurance coverage under section 711 of the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) Act (40 P.S. § 1303.711) and §§ 29.51—29.54.
- (f) Return to active practice. A volunteer license holder who desires to return to active practice shall notify the Board and apply for biennial registration on forms provided by the Board in accordance with §§ 29.51 and 29.52 (relating to applicants; and requirements for applicants).
- (g) Disciplinary provisions. A volunteer license holder shall be subject to the disciplinary provisions of the act and this chapter. Failure of the licensee to comply with the Volunteer Health Services Act (35 P.S. §§ 449.41—449.53) or this chapter may also constitute grounds for disciplinary action.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

§ 29.61. Requirements for biennial renewal and eligibility to conduct educational conferences.

- (a) A licensee applying for biennial renewal of a license shall have completed 50 clock hours of continuing education in approved courses and programs during the preceding biennium, in accordance with the following:
- (1) At least 30 of the clock hours must be in courses and programs in podiatry approved by the Board under § 29.64 (relating to applications for approval of educational conferences) or approved by the CPME.
- (1.1) At least 2 of the clock hours must be completed in child abuse recognition and reporting in accordance with § 29.98(b) (relating to child abuse recognition and reporting—mandatory training requirement).

- (2) The remaining clock hours must be in courses and programs in medical subjects pertinent to the practice of podiatry approved by the American Medical Association, the American Osteopathic Association, the Board or the CPME, or offered by an accredited school or college of podiatric medicine.
- (3) A maximum of 10 clock hours may be in approved courses and programs that involve the use of reading professional journals.
- (4) Clock hours may be obtained by completing approved synchronous distance education or asynchronous distance education courses and programs. Approved asynchronous distance education courses or programs must include a skill or knowledge assessment component in addition to all other requirements.
- (5) Continuing education credit will not be awarded for courses or programs in office management or marketing the practice.
- (6) Excess clock hours may not be carried over to the next biennium.
- (7) Continuing education courses completed in accordance with a disciplinary order of the Board may not be used to meet the biennial continuing education requirement.
- (8) A licensee who wishes to use a course or program for continuing education credit toward licensure renewal is responsible for ensuring that a particular course or program is approved for continuing education credit prior to participating in the course or program.
- (b) Providers approved by the Board are eligible to conduct educational conferences.

* * * * *

CHILD ABUSE REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

§ 29.91. Definitions relating to child abuse reporting requirements.

The following words and terms, when used in this section and §§ 29.92—29.99, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Bodily injury—Impairment of physical condition or substantial pain.

Bureau—Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs within the Department of State of the Commonwealth.

Child—An individual under 18 years of age.

Child abuse—Intentionally, knowingly or recklessly doing any of the following:

- (i) Causing bodily injury to a child through any recent act or failure to act.
- (ii) Fabricating, feigning or intentionally exaggerating or inducing a medical symptom or disease which results in a potentially harmful medical evaluation or treatment to the child through any recent act.
- (iii) Causing or substantially contributing to serious mental injury to a child through any act or failure to act or a series of these acts or failures to act.
- (iv) Causing sexual abuse or exploitation of a child through any act or failure to act.
- (v) Creating a reasonable likelihood of bodily injury to a child through any recent act or failure to act.
- (vi) Creating a likelihood of sexual abuse or exploitation of a child through any recent act or failure to act.

- (vii) Causing serious physical neglect of a child.
- (viii) Engaging in any of the following recent acts:
- (A) Kicking, biting, throwing, burning, stabbing or cutting a child in a manner that endangers the child.
- (B) Unreasonably restraining or confining a child, based on consideration of the method, location or duration of the restraint or confinement.
 - (C) Forcefully shaking a child under 1 year of age.
- (D) Forcefully slapping or otherwise striking a child under 1 year of age.
 - (E) Interfering with the breathing of a child.
- (F) Causing a child to be present at a location while a violation of 18 Pa.C.S. § 7508.2 (relating to operation of methamphetamine laboratory) is occurring, provided that the violation is being investigated by law enforcement.
- (G) Leaving a child unsupervised with an individual, other than the child's parent, who the actor knows or reasonably should have known:
- (I) Is required to register as a Tier II or Tier III sexual offender under 42 Pa.C.S. Chapter 97, Subchapter H (relating to registration of sexual offenders), where the victim of the sexual offense was under 18 years of age when the crime was committed.
- (II) Has been determined to be a sexually violent predator under 42 Pa.C.S. § 9799.24 (relating to assessments) or any of its predecessors.
- (III) Has been determined to be a sexually violent delinquent child as defined in 42 Pa.C.S. § 9799.12 (relating to definitions).
- (IV) Has been determined to be a sexually violent predator under 42 Pa.C.S. § 9799.58 (relating to assessments) or has to register for life under 42 Pa.C.S. § 9799.55(b) (relating to registration).
- (ix) Causing the death of the child through any act or failure to act.
- (x) Engaging a child in a severe form of trafficking in persons or sex trafficking as those terms are defined under section 103 of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (Division A of Pub.L. No. 106-386).

ChildLine—An organizational unit of the Department of Human Services, which operates a 24-hour a day Statewide toll-free telephone system for receiving reports of suspected child abuse, referring reports for investigation and maintaining the reports in the appropriate file.

Mandated reporter—A person who is required under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6311 (relating to persons required to report suspected child abuse) to make a report of suspected child abuse. For purposes of this chapter, the term includes all licensed podiatrists.

Parent—A biological parent, adoptive parent or legal guardian.

Perpetrator—A person who has committed child abuse as defined in this section. The following apply:

- (i) This term includes only the following:
- (A) A parent of the child.
- (B) A spouse or former spouse of the child's parent.
- (C) A paramour or former paramour of the child's parent.
- (D) An individual 14 years of age or older who is a person responsible for the child's welfare or who has

- direct contact with children as an employee of child-care services, a school or through a program, activity or service.
- (E) An individual 14 years of age or older who resides in the same home as the child.
- (F) An individual 18 years of age or older who does not reside in the same home as the child but is related, within the third degree of consanguinity or affinity by birth or adoption, to the child.
- (G) An individual 18 years of age or older who engages a child in severe forms of trafficking in persons or sex trafficking, as those terms are defined under section 103 of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000.
- (ii) Only the following may be considered a perpetrator for failing to act, as provided in this section:
 - (A) A parent of the child.
 - (B) A spouse or former spouse of the child's parent.
- $\left(C\right)$ A paramour or former paramour of the child's parent.
- (D) A person responsible for the child's welfare who is 18 years of age or older.
- (E) A person 18 years of age or older who resides in the same home as the child.

Person responsible for the child's welfare—A person who provides permanent or temporary care, supervision, mental health diagnosis or treatment, training or control of a child in lieu of parental care, supervision and control.

Program, activity or service—Any of the following in which children participate and which is sponsored by a school or a public or private organization:

- (i) A youth camp or program.
- (ii) A recreational camp or program.
- (iii) A sports or athletic program.
- (iv) A community or social outreach program.
- (v) An enrichment or educational program.
- (vi) A troop, club or similar organization.

Recent act or failure to act—An act or failure to act committed within 2 years of the date of the report to the Department of Human Services or county agency.

Serious mental injury—A psychological condition, as diagnosed by a physician or licensed psychologist, including the refusal of appropriate treatment, that does one or more of the following:

- (i) Renders a child chronically and severely anxious, agitated, depressed, socially withdrawn, psychotic or in reasonable fear that the child's life or safety is threatened.
- (ii) Seriously interferes with a child's ability to accomplish age-appropriate developmental and social tasks.

Serious physical neglect—Any of the following when committed by a perpetrator that endangers a child's life or health, threatens a child's well-being, causes bodily injury or impairs a child's health, development or functioning:

- (i) A repeated, prolonged or egregious failure to supervise a child in a manner that is appropriate considering the child's developmental age and abilities.
- (ii) The failure to provide a child with adequate essentials of life, including food, shelter or medical care.

Sexual abuse or exploitation—Any of the following:

- (i) The employment, use, persuasion, inducement, enticement or coercion of a child to engage in or assist another individual to engage in sexually explicit conduct, which includes the following:
- (A) Looking at sexual or other intimate parts of a child or another individual for the purpose of arousing or gratifying sexual desire in any individual.
- (B) Participating in sexually explicit conversation either in person, by telephone, by computer or by a computer-aided device for the purpose of sexual stimulation or gratification of any individual.
- (C) Actual or simulated sexual activity or nudity for the purpose of sexual stimulation or gratification of any individual.
- (D) Actual or simulated sexual activity for the purpose of producing visual depiction, including photographing, videotaping, computer depicting or filming.
- (ii) Any of the following offenses committed against a child:
- (A) Rape as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 3121 (relating to rape).
- (B) Statutory sexual assault as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 3122.1 (relating to statutory sexual assault).
- (C) Involuntary deviate sexual intercourse as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 3123 (relating to involuntary deviate sexual intercourse).
- (D) Sexual assault as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 3124.1 (relating to sexual assault).
- (E) Institutional sexual assault as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 3124.2 (relating to institutional sexual assault).
- (F) Aggravated indecent assault as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 3125 (relating to aggravated indecent assault).
- (G) Indecent assault as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 3126 (relating to indecent assault).
- (H) Indecent exposure as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 3127 (relating to indecent exposure).
- (I) Incest as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 4302 (relating to incest).
- (J) Prostitution as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 5902 (relating to prostitution and related offenses).
- (K) Sexual abuse as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 6312 (relating to sexual abuse of children).
- (L) Unlawful contact with a minor as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 6318 (relating to unlawful contact with minor).
- (M) Sexual exploitation as defined in 18 Pa.C.S. § 6320 (relating to sexual exploitation of children).
- (iii) For the purposes of subparagraph (i), the term does not include consensual activities between a child who is 14 years of age or older and another person who is 14 years of age or older and whose age is within 4 years of the child's age.

§ 29.92. Suspected child abuse—mandated reporting requirements.

- (a) General rule.
- (1) Under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6311 (relating to persons required to report suspected child abuse), licensed podiatrists are considered mandated reporters. A mandated reporter shall make a report of suspected child abuse in accordance with this section if the mandated reporter has

- reasonable cause to suspect that a child is a victim of child abuse under any of the following circumstances:
- (i) The mandated reporter comes into contact with the child in the course of employment, occupation and practice of the profession or through a regularly scheduled program, activity or service.
- (ii) The mandated reporter is directly responsible for the care, supervision, guidance or training of the child, or is affiliated with an agency, institution, organization, school, regularly established church or religious organization or other entity that is directly responsible for the care, supervision, guidance or training of the child.
- (iii) A person makes a specific disclosure to the mandated reporter that an identifiable child is the victim of child abuse.
- (iv) An individual 14 years of age or older makes a specific disclosure to the mandated reporter that the individual has committed child abuse.
- (2) Nothing in this subsection shall require a child to come before the mandated reporter in order for the mandated reporter to make a report of suspected child abuse.
- (3) Nothing in this subsection shall require the mandated reporter to take steps to identify the person responsible for the child abuse, if unknown, in order for the mandated reporter to make a report of suspected child abuse.
- (b) Staff members of public or private agencies, institutions and facilities. Whenever a podiatrist is required to make a report under subsection (a) in the capacity as a member of the staff of a medical or other public or private institution, school, facility or agency, the podiatrist shall report immediately in accordance with subsection (c) and shall immediately thereafter notify the person in charge of the institution, school, facility or agency or the designated agent of the person in charge.
- (c) Reporting procedure. A mandated reporter shall immediately make a report of suspected child abuse to the Department of Human Services by either:
- (1) Making an oral report of suspected child abuse by telephone to ChildLine at (800) 932-0313, followed by a written report within 48 hours to the Department of Human Services or the county agency assigned to the case in a manner and format prescribed by the Department of Human Services. The written report submitted under this paragraph may be submitted electronically.
- (2) Making an electronic report of suspected child abuse in accordance with 23 Pa.C.S. § 6305 (relating to electronic reporting) through the Department of Human Service's Child Welfare Information Solution self-service portal at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. A confirmation by the Department of Human Services of the receipt of a report of suspected child abuse submitted electronically relieves the mandated reporter of the duty to make an additional oral or written report.
- (d) Written or electronic reports. A written or electronic report of suspected child abuse shall include the following information, if known:
- (1) The names and addresses of the child, the child's parents and any other person responsible for the child's welfare.
 - (2) Where the suspected child abuse occurred.
 - (3) The age and sex of each subject of the report.

- (4) The nature and extent of the suspected child abuse including any evidence of prior abuse to the child or any sibling of the child.
- (5) The name and relationship of each individual responsible for causing the suspected abuse and any evidence of prior abuse by each individual.
 - (6) Family composition.
 - (7) The source of the report.
- (8) The name, telephone number and e-mail address of the person making the report.
- (9) The actions taken by the person making the report, including actions taken under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6314—6317.
- (10) Other information which the Department of Human Services may require by regulation.
- (11) Other information required by Federal law or regulation.

§ 29.93. Photographs, medical tests and X-rays of child subject to report.

A podiatrist who is required to report suspected child abuse may take or cause to be taken photographs of the child who is subject to a report and, if clinically indicated, cause to be performed a radiological examination and other medical tests on the child. Medical summaries or reports of the photographs, X-rays and relevant medical tests taken shall be sent to the county children and youth social service agency at the time the written report is sent, or within 48 hours after an electronic report is made under § 29.92(c)(2) (relating to suspected child abuse mandated reporting requirements), or as soon thereafter as possible. The county children and youth social service agency shall have access to actual photographs or duplicates and X-rays and may obtain them or duplicates of them upon request. Medical summaries or reports of the photographs, X-rays and relevant medical tests shall be made available to law enforcement officials in the course of investigating cases under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6340(a)(9) or (10) (relating to release of information in confidential

§ 29.94. Suspected death as a result of child abuse—mandated reporting requirement.

A podiatrist who has reasonable cause to suspect that a child died as a result of child abuse shall report that suspicion to the coroner or medical examiner of the county where death occurred or, in the case where the child is transported to another county for medical treatment, to the coroner or medical examiner of the county where the injuries were sustained.

§ 29.95. Immunity from liability.

- (a) Under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6318 (relating to immunity from liability) a podiatrist who participates in good faith in the making of a report of suspected child abuse, making a referral for general protective services, cooperating or consulting with an investigation including providing information to a child fatality or near fatality review team, testifying in a proceeding arising out of an instance of suspected child abuse or general protective services or engaging in any action authorized under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6314—6317, shall have immunity from civil and criminal liability that might otherwise result by reason of the podiatrist's actions. For the purpose of any civil or criminal proceeding, the good faith of the podiatrist shall be presumed.
- (b) The Board will uphold the same good faith presumption in any disciplinary proceeding that might result

by reason of a podiatrist's actions under §§ 29.92—29.94 (relating to suspected child abuse—mandated reporting requirements; photographs, medical tests and X-rays of child subject to report; and suspected death as a result of child abuse—mandated reporting requirement).

§ 29.96. Confidentiality—waived.

To protect children from abuse, the reporting requirements of §§ 29.92—29.94 (relating to suspected child abuse—mandated reporting requirements; photographs, medical tests and X-rays of child subject to report; and suspected death as a result of child abuse—mandated reporting requirement) take precedence over the provisions of confidentiality in § 29.23 (relating to confidentiality) and any other ethical principle or professional standard that might otherwise apply to podiatrists. In accordance with 23 Pa.C.S. § 6311.1 (relating to privileged communications), privileged communications between a mandated reporter and a patient does not apply to a situation involving child abuse and does not relieve the mandated reporter of the duty to make a report of suspected child abuse.

§ 29.97. Noncompliance.

- (a) Disciplinary action. A podiatrist who willfully fails to comply with the reporting requirements in §§ 29.92—29.94 (relating to suspected child abuse—mandated reporting requirements; photographs, medical tests and X-rays of child subject to report; and suspected death as a result of child abuse—mandated reporting requirement) will be subject to disciplinary action under section 16 of the act (63 P.S. § 42.16).
- (b) Criminal penalties. Under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6319 (relating to penalties), a podiatrist who is required to report a case of suspected child abuse or to make a referral to the appropriate authorities, and who willfully fails to do so, commits a criminal offense, as follows:
- (1) An offense not otherwise specified in paragraphs (2), (3) or (4) is a misdemeanor of the second degree.
- (2) An offense is a felony of the third degree if all of the following apply:
 - (i) The mandated reporter willfully fails to report.
- (ii) The child abuse constitutes a felony of the first degree or higher.
- (iii) The mandated reporter has direct knowledge of the nature of the abuse.
- (3) If the willful failure to report continues while the mandated reporter knows or has reasonable cause to suspect the child is being subjected to child abuse by the same individual or while the mandated reporter knows or has reasonable cause to suspect that the same individual continues to have direct contact with children through the individual's employment, program, activity or service, the mandated reporter commits a felony of the third degree, except that if the child abuse constitutes a felony of the first degree or higher, the mandated reporter commits a felony of the second degree.
- (4) A mandated reporter who, at the time of sentencing for an offense under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6319, has been convicted of a prior offense under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6319, commits a felony of the third degree, except that if the child abuse constitutes a felony of the first degree or higher, the penalty for the second or subsequent offense is a felony of the second degree.

§ 29.98. Child abuse recognition and reporting—mandatory training requirement.

(a) Except as provided in subsection (c), individuals applying to the Board for an initial license shall complete

at least 3 hours of training in child abuse recognition and reporting requirements which has been approved by the Department of Human Services and the Bureau, as set forth in § 29.99 (relating to child abuse recognition and reporting course approval process). The applicant shall certify on the application that the applicant has either completed the required training or has been granted an exemption under subsection (c). The Board will not issue a license unless the Bureau has received an electronic report from an approved course provider documenting the attendance or participation by the applicant or the applicant has obtained an exemption under subsection (c).

- (b) Except as provided in subsection (c), licensees seeking renewal of a license issued by the Board shall complete, as a condition of biennial renewal of the license, at least 2 hours of approved continuing education in child abuse recognition and reporting, as a portion of the total continuing education required for biennial renewal. For credit to be granted, the continuing education course or program must be approved by the Bureau, in consultation with the Department of Human Services, as set forth in § 29.99. The Board will not renew a license unless the Bureau has received an electronic report from an approved course provider documenting the attendance or participation by the licensee in an approved course within the applicable biennial renewal period or the licensee has obtained an exemption under subsection (c). If a licensee also holds a license issued by another licensing board within the Bureau that requires mandatory training in child abuse recognition and reporting, credit for completion of an approved course will be applied to both licenses.
- (c) An applicant or licensee may apply in writing for an exemption from the training/continuing education requirements set forth in subsections (a) and (b) provided the applicant or licensee meets one of the following:
- (1) The applicant or licensee submits documentation demonstrating that:
- (i) The applicant or licensee has already completed child abuse recognition training as required by section 1205.6 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. § 12-1205.6).
- (ii) The training was approved by the Department of Education in consultation with the Department of Human Services.
- (iii) The amount of training received equals or exceeds the amount of training or continuing education required under subsection (a) or subsection (b), as applicable.
- (iv) For purposes of licensure renewal, the training must have been completed during the relevant biennial renewal period.
- (2) The applicant or licensee submits documentation demonstrating that:
- (i) The applicant or licensee has already completed child abuse recognition training required under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6383(c) (relating to education and training).
- (ii) The training was approved by the Department of Human Services.
- (iii) The amount of training received equals or exceeds the amount of training or continuing education required under subsection (a) or subsection (b), as applicable.
- (iv) For purposes of licensure renewal, the training must have been completed during the relevant biennial renewal period.
- (3) The applicant or licensee submits documentation demonstrating why the applicant or licensee should not

be subject to the training or continuing education requirement. The Board will not grant an exemption based solely upon proof that children are not a part of the applicant's or licensee's practice. Each request for an exemption under this paragraph will be considered on a case-by-case basis. The Board may grant the exemption if it finds that completion of the training or continuing education requirement is duplicative or unnecessary under the circumstances.

(d) Exemptions granted under subsection (c) are applicable only for the biennial renewal period for which the exemption is requested. If an exemption is granted, the Board will issue or renew the license, as applicable. If an exemption is denied, the Board will e-mail the applicant or licensee a discrepancy notice notifying them of the need to either complete an approved course or, if warranted, to submit additional documentation in support of their request for an exemption.

§ 29.99. Child abuse recognition and reporting course approval process.

- (a) An individual, entity or organization may apply for approval to provide mandated reporter training as required under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6383(b) (relating to education and training) by submitting the course materials set forth in subsection (b) simultaneously to the Department of Human Services, Office of Children, Youth and Families, and to the Bureau at the following addresses:
- (1) Department of Human Services, Office of Children, Youth and Families, Health and Human Services Building, 625 Forster Street, Harrisburg, PA 17120; or electronically at RA-PWOCYFCPSL@pa.gov.
- (2) Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, P.O. Box 2649, Harrisburg, PA 17105-2649; or electronically at RA-stcpsl_course_app@pa.gov.
 - (b) Submissions shall include all of the following:
- (1) Contact information, such as mailing address, e-mail address and telephone number, for the agency/course administrator.
- (2) General description of the training and course delivery method.
 - (3) Title of the course.
 - (4) Timed agenda and estimated hours of training.
 - (5) Learning objectives.
 - (6) Intended audience.
 - (7) Course related materials, including as applicable:
 - (i) Handouts.
 - (ii) Narrated script or talking points.
 - (iii) Interactive activities or exercises.
 - (iv) Videos and audio/visual content.
- (v) Knowledge checks, quizzes or other means of assessing a participant's understanding of the material.
- (vi) For online courses, a transcript or recording of audio training.
- (8) Citation of sources, including written permission to use copyrighted material, if applicable.
- (9) Anticipated credentials or experience of the presenter, or biography of presenter, if known.
 - (10) Printed materials used to market the training.
- (11) Evaluation used to assess participants' satisfaction with the training.

- (12) Sample certificate of attendance or participation, which shall include all of the following:
 - (i) Name of participant.
 - (ii) Title of training.
 - (iii) Date of training.
 - (iv) Length of training (2 hours or 3 hours).
- (v) Name and signature of the authorized representative of the provider. The signature may be an electronic signature.
- (vi) Statement affirming the participant attended the entire course.
- (13) Verification of ability to report participation or attendance electronically to the Bureau in a format prescribed by the Bureau.
- (c) The Bureau will notify the individual, entity or organization in writing upon approval of the course and will post a list of approved courses on the Bureau's web site and the Board's web site.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRY

[34 PA. CODE CH. 501]

Examinations, Fees and Provisional Registration Process for Sign Language Interpreters and Transliterators

Under section 3(4) of the Sign Language Interpreter and Transliterator State Registration Act (act) (63 P.S. § 1725.3(4)), the Office for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (Office) within the Department of Labor and Industry (Department) is submitting this proposed rulemaking for the registration of sign language interpreters and transliterators.

The Department proposes amendments to Chapter 501 (relating to registration of sign language interpreters and transliterators) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Statutory Authority

The Office is empowered to promulgate regulations that are necessary to carry out the act's provisions in section 3(4). Sections 5(a)(1)(iii) and (d), 8(a)(6) and 9(c)(1) of the act $(63 \text{ P.S. } \S 1725.5(a)(1)(iii)$ and (d), 1725.8(a)(6) and 1725.9(c)(1)) also provide specific authority to approve a registration examination and to promulgate rulemakings addressing fees, disciplinary violations and registration reactivation.

Background

The act requires the Office to register sign language interpreters and transliterators who meet the act's testing requirements. Registration renewal is required every 2 years. The act also allows the Office to charge fees, initiate discipline, impose administrative fines for violations, suspend, deny or revoke registrations and hold hearings concerning alleged violations. The Department may seek an injunction or pursue criminal action against unregistered persons engaged in sign language interpretation or transliterator services or representing themselves as being registered under the act.

The regulations in Chapter 501 currently provide specific names of examinations that test skill and proficiency. Through this proposed rulemaking, the Department seeks to delete the specific names of these examinations because they are no longer being offered. This proposed rulemaking will allow the Office to publish annually the names of the available examinations. In addition, the act of November 23, 2010 (P.L. 1355, No. 124) (Act 124 of 2010) amended the act to allow for provisional registration and, accordingly, the Department seeks to amend Chapter 501 to provide for provisional registration.

The Department engaged in a 30-day public and stakeholder outreach period during the drafting process. On August 9, 2022, the Department sought comment from small businesses; sign language interpreters; certifying organizations; private, public and non-profit organizations; citizens with disabilities and the general public by sending an e-mail to a list of all known stakeholders and posting a notice of the proposed changes to the regulations and an accessible video online on the Department's web site. The Department requested feedback from stakeholders on desired changes to the regulations. The public comment period was open until September 9, 2022, and

the Department received feedback from various stakeholders as a result of this request.

Purpose

This proposed rulemaking amends Chapter 501 to delete the identified examinations that test knowledge and proficiency, which are no longer offered. The amended language will expand the number of examinations available for sign language interpreters and transliterators by requiring the Office to publish an annual list of approved examinations. Additionally, this proposed rulemaking adds § 501.4.1 (relating to provisional registration) to provide for a provisional registration and amends § 501.2 (relating to fees) to set initial and annual renewal fees for the provisional registration.

Summary of Proposed Rulemaking

Part XV

The heading for Part XV is proposed to be amended to correct a minor error. The heading currently states "Office of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing"; however, the proper name for the Office is the "Office for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing."

§ 501.1. Definitions

Section 501.1 (relating to definitions) is proposed to be amended to delete: (1) the names of examinations previously offered by the Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf, Inc. (RID) and the National Association of the Deaf (NAD), because RID and NAD no longer offer examinations, and (2) the names of the certifications associated with those specific examinations. The Office will now publish an annual list of approved examinations. Because neither the Office nor the Department controls how long specific interpreting and transliterating examinations are provided, this change is necessary to keep the list of examinations current. This section is also proposed to be amended to provide definitions for "interpreter education program," "legal setting," "medical setting" and "mental health setting" as those terms are used in §§ 501.4.1 and 501.5 (relating to exemptions).

§ 501.2. Fees

Section 501.2 is proposed to be amended to add an annual provisional registration fee of \$50 that is renewable for the same amount. Section 5.1(d) of the act (63 P.S. § 1725.5.1(d)) establishes the provisional registration fee of \$50. The Office currently charges registration and renewal fees for interpreters and transliterators and has not observed that these fees are a barrier to individuals seeking to register.

§ 501.3. Examination

Section 501.3 (relating to examination) is proposed to be amended to provide for an annual list of examinations that are approved by the Office to test knowledge and proficiency in interpreting and transliterating. This section also includes a requirement that the examinations approved by the Office shall include, but not be limited to, a test to determine ethical decision-making. This will provide the Office with greater flexibility in approving examinations so that there are approved examinations for individuals wishing to register as sign language interpreters and transliterators. It will also allow for an expanded number of examinations available for sign language interpreteres and transliterators.

§ 501.4. Registration

Because the Office will publish an annual list of approved examinations, § 501.4 (relating to registration) is proposed to be amended to delete the requirement to receive proof of certification from only RID and NAD, though other registration and application criteria will remain the same, with future certifying organizations recognized by the Office. This section is also proposed to be amended to delete the specific web address for the Office's web site, since the specific web address has changed and may change again in the future. This section also clarifies that, if the Office denies an application for registration, the applicant may file a request for reconsideration with the Office in accordance with the procedures contained in § 501.9 (relating to request for reconsideration of registration denial). Finally, this section is proposed to be amended to capitalize "Office" to be consistent with this defined term.

§ 501.4.1. Provisional registration

Act 124 of 2010 amended the act to allow for provisional registration. In this Commonwealth, an interpreter must pass an examination, approved by the Office, that tests knowledge and interpreting or transliterating skills. The examinations are given in two parts. The first part of the examination tests the interpreter's knowledge, which includes ethical decision-making. The second part of the examination is the skills examination. A provisionally registered interpreter has passed only the knowledge portion of the examination, whereas a State-registered interpreter has passed both the knowledge examination and the skills examination. Due to Act 124 of 2010's amendment to the act which allows for provisional registration, § 501.4.1 is proposed to be added to provide the definition, procedure and requirements of an annual provisional registration and a required fee of \$50 that is renewable for the same amount. This amount was set by section 4 of Act 124 of 2010 which added section 5.1 of the act and the Department is not using its authority to change this amount at this time. Section 501.4.1 references that an application for a provisional registration may be obtained from the Office's web site or the Department's web site. Currently, a person seeking an application needs to contact the Office, but the Office is working on changes to its web site to (1) make this application available on the web site and (2) allow an applicant to complete the application through the web site. This section also provides procedural steps if provisional registration is denied, including the applicant's right to file a request for reconsideration with the Office, in accordance with the procedures contained in § 501.9.

§ 501.5. Exemptions

Section 501.5 is proposed to be amended to update the language of the exemption for "interpreting or transliterating as part of a supervised internship or practicum at an accredited college or university" to be consistent with the language for the corresponding exemption found in section 4(b)(3) of the act (63 P.S. § 1725.4(b)(3)). This section is also proposed to be amended to delete the specific web address for the Office's web site and to correct a typographical error.

§ 501.7. Violations

Due to Act 124 of 2010's amendment of the act to allow for provisional registration, § 501.7 (relating to violations) is proposed to be amended to include a provisional registration as a circumstance where a violation can occur. This section is also proposed to be amended to capitalize "Office" to be consistent with this defined term.

§ 501.9. Request for reconsideration of registration denial

Due to Act 124 of 2010's amendment of the act to allow for provisional registration, § 501.9 is proposed to be amended to allow the Office to deny an application for provisional registration and to allow an applicant to seek reconsideration of a denial for a provisional registration.

§ 501.12. Change of address/name/information

Due to Act 124 of 2010's amendment of the act to allow for provisional registration, § 501.12 (relating to change of address/name/information) is proposed to be amended to require provisional registrants to notify the Office in writing within 10 days if the provisional registrant's name or mailing address changes, or if disciplinary action has been taken against the provisional registrant's "registration, certification or license to provide interpreting or transliterating services by another state or government agency."

Affected Persons

The types and numbers of persons, businesses, small businesses and organizations affected by this proposed rulemaking include 1.5 million people who are deaf or hard of hearing, interpreters and interpreter education programs.

Fiscal Impact

There is no cost to people who are deaf or hard of hearing. The costs for registration and for approved examinations are to be paid by the candidates who apply and do not account for any candidate or interpreter travel and pretest course fees but are associated with registration and testing. Currently, the cost for registration and testing ranges from \$140 to \$450, depending on the specific course and testing administrator.

There are no fiscal savings or costs associated with implementation and compliance for the regulated community, local government and State government for the current year and 5 subsequent years.

Reporting, Recordkeeping and Paperwork Requirements

To implement this proposed rulemaking, the Department has prepared four updated forms, including: (1) the Interpreter Registration Application; (2) the Provisional Registration Application; (3) the Provisional Registration Renewal Application; and (4) the Provisional and State Registration Invoice. Updates to these forms were required to delete the names of specific examinations in accordance with the changes in this proposed rulemaking. These four updated forms are included in the proposed rulemaking package available on the Independent Regulatory Review Commission's (IRRC) web site at irrc.state.pa.us/regulations/RegSrchRslts.cfm?ID=3430. The Department does not anticipate any other changes to the reporting, recordkeeping and paperwork requirements as a result of this proposed rulemaking.

Sunset Date

A sunset date is not appropriate for this proposed rulemaking. The Office will periodically monitor this proposed rulemaking and submit amendments as needed.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective 60 days after publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on September 18, 2024, the Department submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to IRRC and to the chairpersons of the Labor and Industry Committee of the Senate and to the chairpersons of the Labor and Industry Committee of the House of Representatives. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey any comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections must specify the regulatory review criteria in section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 PS. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking by the Department, the General Assembly and the Governor.

TITLE 34. LABOR AND INDUSTRY

PART XV. OFFICE [**OF**] **FOR** THE DEAF AND HARD OF HEARING

CHAPTER 501. REGISTRATION OF SIGN LANGUAGE INTERPRETERS AND TRANSLITERATORS

§ 501.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this part, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Act—The Sign Language Interpreter and Transliterator State Registration Act (63 P.S. §§ 1725.1—1725.12).

[CDI—Certified Deaf Interpreter—A certification issued by RID.

CI—Certificate of Interpretation issued by RID. CSC—Comprehensive Skills Certificate issued by RID.

CT—Certificate of Transliteration issued by RID.

Department—The Department of Labor and Industry of the Commonwealth.

Interpreter Education Program—A postsecondary program that leads to professional licensure or certification as a qualified sign language interpreter and meets statutory requirements for State registration of individuals providing sign language interpreting and transliterating services to individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Legal setting—A court proceeding, including a criminal prosecution, civil suit, attorney-client con-

ference, case settlement negotiation, investigation by law enforcement, deposition, witness interview, real estate settlement or related proceeding in any court; and any judicial or quasi-judicial proceeding before an administrative, legislative or regulatory board, agency or tribunal.

[MCSC—Master Comprehensive Skills Certificate issued by RID.]

Medical setting—A location where health care occurs, including an acute care hospital, urgent care center, outpatient clinic, dental office, birthing center, emergency medical care facility, short-term care facility, long-term care facility, nursing home and medical provider office and the site of home health care services or an emergency medical situation that involves imminent danger to a person's health, whether occurring within or outside of a health care facility.

Mental health setting—A location where the diagnosis and treatment of mental and emotional disorders is the primary task of a mental health professional, including a clinic, hospital, social service agency, private professional service provider, residential facility, mental health center or other entity in which a mental health professional provides diagnosis and treatment of mental and emotional disorders.

NAD—National Association of the Deaf, an advocacy group for deaf and hard of hearing individuals which previously offered certification in sign language interpreting and transliterating.

[NAD National Interpreter Certification Test— The former performance examinations conducted by the NAD for Level IV (Master) or V (Advanced) certification as a sign language interpreter or transliterator.

NIC—The National Interpreter Certification test which is the knowledge and proficiency examination conducted for RID's National Interpreter Certification as a sign language interpreter or transliterator.

Office—The Office for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing within the Department [, 1521 North 6th Street, Harrisburg, PA 17102].

[OIC:C—Oral Interpreting Certificate: Comprehensive issued by RID.

OTC—Oral Transliteration Certificate issued by RID.]

RID—Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf, Inc. A National membership organization of professionals and its state [affliates] affiliates that provides certification for sign language interpreters and transliterators.

[RID Generalist examinations—The knowledge and proficiency examinations which are conducted by RID for CI/CT, CDI and OTC certifications in sign language interpretering or transliterating and which were formerly conducted by RID for CSC, MCSC and OIC:C certifications in sign language interpretering and transliterating.]

Secretary—The Secretary of the Department or the Secretary's designee.

Year—A calendar year.

§ 501.2. Fees.

The Office will charge the following nonrefundable fees:

(1) Registration	\$100[.]
(2) Biennial renewal of existing registration	\$100[.]
(3) Surcharge for late renewal of biennial registration[.]	\$50[.]
(4) Reactivation following suspension[.]	\$100[.]
(5) Registration identification card replacement[.]	\$10[.]
(6) Provisional registration	<u>\$50</u>
(7) Annual renewal of provisional registration	\$50

§ 501.3. Examination.

- (a) [The following examinations are approved as the examination which tests knowledge and proficiency under section 5(a)(1)(iii) of the act (63 P.S. \S 1725.5(a)(1)(iii)):
 - (1) NAD National Interpreter Certification.
 - (2) RID Generalist Examinations.
 - (3) NIC.]

The Office will annually publish a list of examinations that are approved by the Office to test knowledge and proficiency in interpreting and transliterating. The following apply:

- (1) The Department will publish the list on its web site and in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- (2) The examinations approved by the Office shall include a test to determine ethical decision-making.
- (b) An applicant for any of the approved examinations shall obtain applications directly from and pay the required examination fee directly to the examination provider

§ 501.4. Registration.

- (a) An applicant for registration shall submit the following to the Office:
- (1) Proof of receiving a passing score on any of the approved examinations. [This may include proof of current certification by NAD or RID.]
- (2) A completed registration application. Applications may be obtained from the [office] Office or the Department's web site [www.dli.state.pa.us/odhh].
- (3) The required registration fee under § 501.2 (relating to fees). Checks shall be made payable to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- (b) The Office will issue a paper or electronic registration to an applicant within 60 days of the date of receipt of the application if the applicant complies with subsection (a) and meets the following criteria:
 - (1) Is 18 years of age or older.
- (2) Has passed the examination required by subsection (a).
 - (3) Has paid applicable fees.
- (4) Possesses the general fitness, competence and reliability sufficient to satisfy the **[office]** Office that the applicant is worthy of State registration.

- (c) The Office may deny an application for registration if the applicant:
 - (1) Does not comply with this section.
- (2) Fails to meet the requirements of section 5(a) of the act $(63 \text{ P.S.} \ \S \ 1725.5(a))$.
- (3) Committed a violation enumerated in section 8(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1725.8(a)) and § 501.7 (relating to violations).
- (d) [The Office will comply with the procedures contained in § 501.9 (relating to request for reconsideration of registration denial) if an application for registration is denied.] If the Office denies an application for registration, the applicant may file a request for reconsideration with the Office in accordance with the procedures contained in § 501.9 (relating to request for reconsideration of registration denial).

§ 501.4.1. Provisional registration.

- (a) An applicant for provisional registration shall submit all of the following to the Office:
- (1) A completed provisional registration application. Applications may be obtained from the Office or the Department's web site.
- (2) The required provisional registration fee under § 501.2 (relating to fees). Checks shall be made payable to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- (3) Proof of graduation from an interpreter education program with an associate degree or higher from an accredited institution of higher education within 5 years prior to the date of application for provisional registration.
- (4) Proof that the applicant has passed a written examination approved by the Office.
- (b) The Office will issue a paper or electronic provisional registration valid for 1 year to an applicant within 60 days of the date of receipt of the application if the applicant complies with subsection (a) and meets all of the following criteria:
 - (1) Is 18 years of age or older.
- (2) Has graduated from an interpreter education program with an associate degree or higher.
 - (3) Has paid applicable fees.
- (4) Possesses the general fitness, competence and reliability sufficient to satisfy the Office that the applicant is worthy of State provisional registration.
- (c) An individual who holds provisional registration may not provide interpreter or transliterator services in the following settings:
 - (1) A legal setting.
- (2) A mental health setting, unless accompanied by a qualified sign language interpreter or qualified transliterator.
- (3) A physician's office, unless the patient is informed that:
- (i) The individual engaged in interpreting or transliterating has obtained a provisional registration and is not State-registered under the act.

- (ii) The patient has the right to be provided upon request a qualified sign language interpreter or qualified transliterator.
 - (4) A critical care or emergency setting.
- (d) The Office may deny an application for provisional registration if the applicant meets any of the following:
 - (1) Does not comply with this section.
- (2) Fails to meet the requirements of section 5.1(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1725.5.1(a)).
- (3) Committed a violation enumerated in section 8(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1725.8(a)) and § 501.7 (relating to violations).
- (e) If the Office denies an application for provisional registration, the applicant may file a request for reconsideration with the Office in accordance with the procedures contained in § 501.9 (relating to request for reconsideration of registration denial).
- (f) Renewal. An individual may annually renew a provisional registration by submitting all of the following to the Office:
 - (1) The information required by subsection (a).
- (2) Proof of completion of at least 20 hours of professional development approved by the Office.
 - (3) The applicable fee.
- (g) The Office may approve only two consecutive renewals under subsection (f).

§ 501.5. Exemptions.

* * * * *

- (b) An individual engaged in sign language interpreting or transliterating during an emergency when a delay in obtaining a State-registered interpreter or transliterator might lead to injury or loss to the individual requiring the services is exempt.
- (c) An individual engaged in interpreting or transliterating as part of a supervised internship or practicum at an accredited college or university[, RID or NAD if it is not in a legal, medical or mental health setting is exempt.] is exempt if the engagement is not in any of the following:

(1) A legal setting.

- (2) A medical setting or mental health setting, unless accompanied by a qualified sign language interpreter or qualified transliterator.
- (d) An individual who does not reside in this Commonwealth is exempt from registration under section 4(b)(4) of the act in accordance with the following:
- (1) The individual possesses current certification from NAD or RID.
- (2) The individual provides interpreting or transliterating services in this Commonwealth for no longer than 14 days each year.
- (3) The individual provides the following to the Office within 5 business days of providing the interpreting or transliterating service:
- (i) Written notice of the date and duration of each sign language or transliterating service that the individual provides or intends to provide within this Commonwealth. Forms may be obtained from the Office or the Department's web site [www.dli.state.pa.us/odhh].
 - (ii) Proof of current certification.

- (4) The Office will provide notice to a sign language interpreter or transliterator that he has provided 14 days of services during the year and that the individual is prohibited from providing any further interpreting or transliterating services within this Commonwealth during the year unless the individual registers with the Office in accordance with section 5 of the act (63 P.S. § 1725.5).
- (e) An individual engaged in interpreting or transliterating at the request of a client who is deaf or hard of hearing is exempt from registration under section 4(b)(5) of the act in accordance with the following:
- (1) The interpreter or transliterator notifies the client that the individual is not registered with the Office.
- (2) The client signs a written confirmation acknowledging that the individual is not registered and acknowledging that the client desires the individual's services. Forms may be obtained from the Office or the Department's web site [at www.dli.state.pa.us/odhh].
- (3) The individual providing services shall provide a copy of the confirmation to the client and maintain a copy of the client's signed statement for 2 years.
- (f) An individual who engages in interpreting or transliterating strictly as a volunteer is exempt.
- (g) An individual is exempt from registration under section 4(b)(7) of the act for a school-related activity if the individual complies with the State Board of Education regulations establishing criteria for persons providing sign language and interpreting services for a school-related activity. See 22 Pa. Code §§ 14.105 and 711.5 (relating to personnel).
- (h) If a sign language interpreter or transliterator is required for effective communication at a physician's office, an individual is exempt from registration under section 4(b)(8) of the act if the individual provides sign language interpreting or transliterating services to a patient who is deaf or hard of hearing in accordance with the following:
- (1) The patient signs a written confirmation acknowledging that the individual providing the interpreting or transliterating services is not registered, that the patient has the right to request or provide an interpreter or transliterator who is registered with the Office and the patient desires the services of the unregistered individual. This confirmation must be completed during every office visit. Forms may be obtained from the Office or the Department's web site [at www.dli.state.pa.us/odhh].

- (5) A copy of the signed statement shall be provided to the patient.
- (i) An individual engaged in interpreting or transliterating in a judicial or in an administrative proceeding is exempt from [registeration] registration if the individual is providing services under 42 Pa.C.S. Chapter 44 Subchapter C (relating to court interpreters for persons who are deaf) or 2 Pa.C.S. Chapter 5 Subchapter D (relating to administrative proceeding interpreters for persons who are deaf).

§ 501.7. Violations.

The Department may impose disciplinary or corrective measures under section 9(a) of the act (63 P.S. \$ 1725.9(a)) or levy administrative fines of up to \$500 under section 8(b) of the act (63 P.S. \$ 1725.8(b)) on a registrant or provisional registrant for doing one or more of the following:

- (1) Obtaining a State registration, provisional registration or renewal of a registration through fraud, deceit or misrepresentation.
- (2) Being convicted of a felony or a crime in this Commonwealth or other jurisdiction relating to the provision of interpreter or transliterator services.
- (3) Being the subject of a disciplinary or other administrative action taken against this registration, **provisional registration**, certificate or license to provide interpreting or transliterating services in another state by a government agency.
- (4) Committing fraud, gross negligence or misconduct relating to the provision of interpreting or transliterating services as determined by the **[office]** Office.
- (5) Engaging in any other misconduct relating to the provision of interpreting or transliterating services as determined by the [office] Office.
- (6) Violating the provisions of the act or this chapter.

§ 501.9. Request for reconsideration of registration denial.

- (a) The Office may deny an application for registration or provisional registration if an applicant does not meet the registration requirements of [section] sections 5(a) or 5.1(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1725.5(a) or § 1725.5.1(a)) or for the grounds contained in section 8(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1725.8(a)). The Office will provide the applicant with written notification of the denial which states the statutory and regulatory reasons for the denial and sets forth the procedure for requesting reconsideration.
- (b) An applicant for registration or provisional registration whose application was denied by the Office may file a request for reconsideration with the Office within 30 days of the date of the notice of denial.

- (c) The request for reconsideration must be in writing and include the following:
 - (1) The applicant's name and address.
- (2) The facts supporting the applicant's request for reconsideration.
- (3) Supporting documentation demonstrating that the applicant meets the requirements for registration or provisional registration under section 5(a)(2) or $5.1(\overline{a})$ of the act.
- (d) The Office will review the request for reconsideration and issue a written determination containing its decision. If reconsideration is denied, the Office will provide a summary of the reasons in the determination.
- (e) If the request is granted, the Office will issue a registration **or provisional registration** to the applicant if the applicant pays the renewal fee and completes the application under section 5(a)(1) **or** 5.1(a) of the act.
- (f) An applicant may seek a hearing and appeal the denial of registration or provisional registration under sections 10 and 11 of the act (63 P.S. §§ 1725.10 and 1725.11). The Office and Department will conduct hearings and resolve appeals under § 501.8 (relating to hearings/appeals).

§ 501.12. Change of address/name/information.

A registrant or provisional registrant shall notify the Office in writing of the following within 10 days:

- (1) Any change of name or mailing address
- (2) Disciplinary action taken against the registrant's <u>or</u> <u>provisional registrant's</u> registration, certification <u>or</u> <u>license to provide interpreting or transliterating services by another state or government agency.</u>

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

Orphan Well Plugging Grant Program; Opening of Grant Application Period

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) announces an opportunity to apply for up to \$16.8 million in grant funding through the Orphan Well Plugging Grant Program (Grant Program), established under 58 Pa.C.S. Chapter 28 (relating to oil and gas well plugging oversight), offered to qualified applicants in the amounts prescribed by this law. This funding represents more than 20% of the total "Formula Grant Phase One" award received by the Department from the United States Department of the Interior under section 40601 of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (P.L. No. 117-58, Part Title VI), effective September 1, 2024.

Subawards under this Grant Program are available on a first come, first served basis to qualified well pluggers, as defined in 58 Pa.C.S. Chapter 28. Grant subrecipients must comply with all terms and conditions of the Federal award, including applicable State law, as will be detailed in the grant agreement.

Applicants can apply to plug up to five orphan wells per application. The maximum subaward per applicant cannot exceed in aggregate the total eligible funds based on the type of orphan well by depth classification, in accordance with the act as follows:

- The maximum subaward cannot exceed \$40,000 for every eligible well plugged that is an orphan well of a depth of 3,000 feet or less or the actual cost of the qualified well plugger to plug the well, whichever is less.
- The maximum subaward cannot exceed \$70,000 for every eligible well plugged that is an orphan well of a depth of greater than 3,000 feet or the actual cost of the qualified well plugger to plug the well, whichever is less.

An applicant may apply to plug additional orphan wells (up to five per application) once the last well is adequately plugged, a plugging certificate is issued by the Department, and all terms and conditions of the grant agreement have been satisfied.

Grant applications must be submitted online through the Commonwealth's Electronic Single Application web site, eGrants, at https://grants.pa.gov. Applications will be reviewed on a first come, first served basis. The Grant Program will remain open dependent on fund availability. The Department may stop accepting applications once all available funding is committed to approved projects and recommence accepting applications if additional money is made available thereafter.

Managed Care Assessment Program

The Department of Human Services (Department) is announcing a proposed adjustment to the managed care assessment fixed fee effective January 1, 2025.

Background

In 2015, the General Assembly enacted legislation authorizing the Department to impose an annual monetary assessment on managed care organizations (MCO) in this Commonwealth for 4 years beginning in State Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-2017. In 2020 the General Assembly enacted legislation to continue the assessment through June 30, 2025. See section 1601-O of the Fiscal Code (72 P.S. § 1601-0), as amended by the act of May

29, 2020 (P.L. 158, No. 23) (Act 23). The fixed fee assessed on MCOs is currently \$24.95 per member month.

Article VIII-I of the Human Services Code (62 P.S. §§ 801-I—812-I) authorizes the Secretary of Human Services (Secretary) to adjust the assessment fixed fee for all or part of a fiscal year so long as the assessment does not exceed the Federal maximum 6% limit of revenue specified in 42 CFR 433.68(f)(3)(i)(A) (relating to permissible health care-related taxes). Before adjusting the assessment percentage, the Secretary must publish a notice in the Pennsylvania Bulletin that specifies the proposed adjusted assessment fixed fee, identifies the aggregate impact on MCOs subject to the assessment and provides interested parties with 30 days to comment. After consideration of any comments received during the 30-day period, the Secretary must publish a second notice announcing the adjusted assessment fixed fee. See section 803-I(c) of the Human Services Code (62 P.S. § 803-I(c)).

Proposed Adjusted Assessment Fixed Fee

The Department is proposing to adjust the MCO assessment fixed fee to \$30.47 per member month effective January 1, 2025. The proposed adjusted assessment fixed fee will not exceed the Federal maximum limit of 6% of revenue.

Fiscal Impact

The Department estimates that the aggregate fiscal impact for this change in FY 2024-2025 will be an additional \$223.531 million in assessment revenue.

This announcement provides advance notice that the Department of Human Services (Department) intends to continue to make an additional payment to certain nonpublic nursing facilities in a county of the eighth class in Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-2025 to ensure access to necessary nursing home care in that county.

Proposed Payment

The Department intends to make a nonpublic nursing facility supplementation payment to each qualified nonpublic nursing facility. To qualify, a nonpublic nursing facility must be located in a county of the eighth class, have more than 119 beds and a Medicaid acuity of 1.11 as of August 1, 2022. The Department will calculate the qualifying nonpublic nursing facility's supplementation payment for FY 2024-2025 by multiplying the supplementation per diem by the number of paid Medical Assistance (MA) facility and therapeutic leave days for the prior fiscal year. The supplementation per diem will be calculated by dividing the total funds available by the total number of paid MA facility and therapeutic leave days for the prior fiscal year for qualifying facilities.

The Department will submit a State Plan Amendment (SPA) to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). If CMS approves the SPA, the total funds will consist of both Federal and State funding. The Department will use its best efforts to process this supplementation payment within 30 days of the date it receives notice from CMS.

Fiscal Impact

This change will result in an estimated cost of \$11.133 million (\$5.000 million in State funds) for FY 2024-2025.

> Department of Human Services— Psychiatric Rehabilitation Services Regulation No. 14-548 (# 3347)

On June 23, 2022, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Department of Human Services (Department). This rulemaking amends 55 Pa. Code Chapter 5230. The proposed regulation was published in the July 9, 2022 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a public comment period ending on August 8, 2022. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on July 25, 2024.

This regulation expands eligibility for psychiatric rehabilitation services (PRS) to include individuals 14 years of

age or older but under 18 years of age, and expands the diagnoses that allow individuals to access PRS without going through the exception process by including post-traumatic stress disorder, bipolar disorder, major depressive disorder, and anxiety disorders.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Department (62 P.S. §§ 911 and 1021) and the intention of the General Assembly. > State Board of Medicine— Licensure by Endorsement Regulation No. 16A-4958 (# 3351)

On August 1, 2022, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the State Board of Medicine (Board). This

rulemaking amends 49 Pa. Code Chapter 16 by adding §§ 16.12a, 16.12b, 16.12c, and revising 16.13(a). The proposed regulation was published in the August 13, 2022 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a public comment period ending on September 12, 2022. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on July 25, 2024.

This regulation implements Act 41 of 2019 (Act 41) (63 Pa.C.S. § 3111) which requires licensing boards and commissions to issue a license, certificate, registration, or permit to an applicant who pays fees established by the board or commission by regulation, provided the applicant meets certain criteria for eligibility. Act 41 also requires boards and commissions that issue provisional licenses, certificates, registrations, or permits to set the expiration of the provisional endorsement license by regulation.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Board (63 Pa.C.S. § 3111; 63 § P.S. 422.8; 63 P.S. §§ 272.101—272.301; and 63 P.S. §§ 1801—1806.1) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.
